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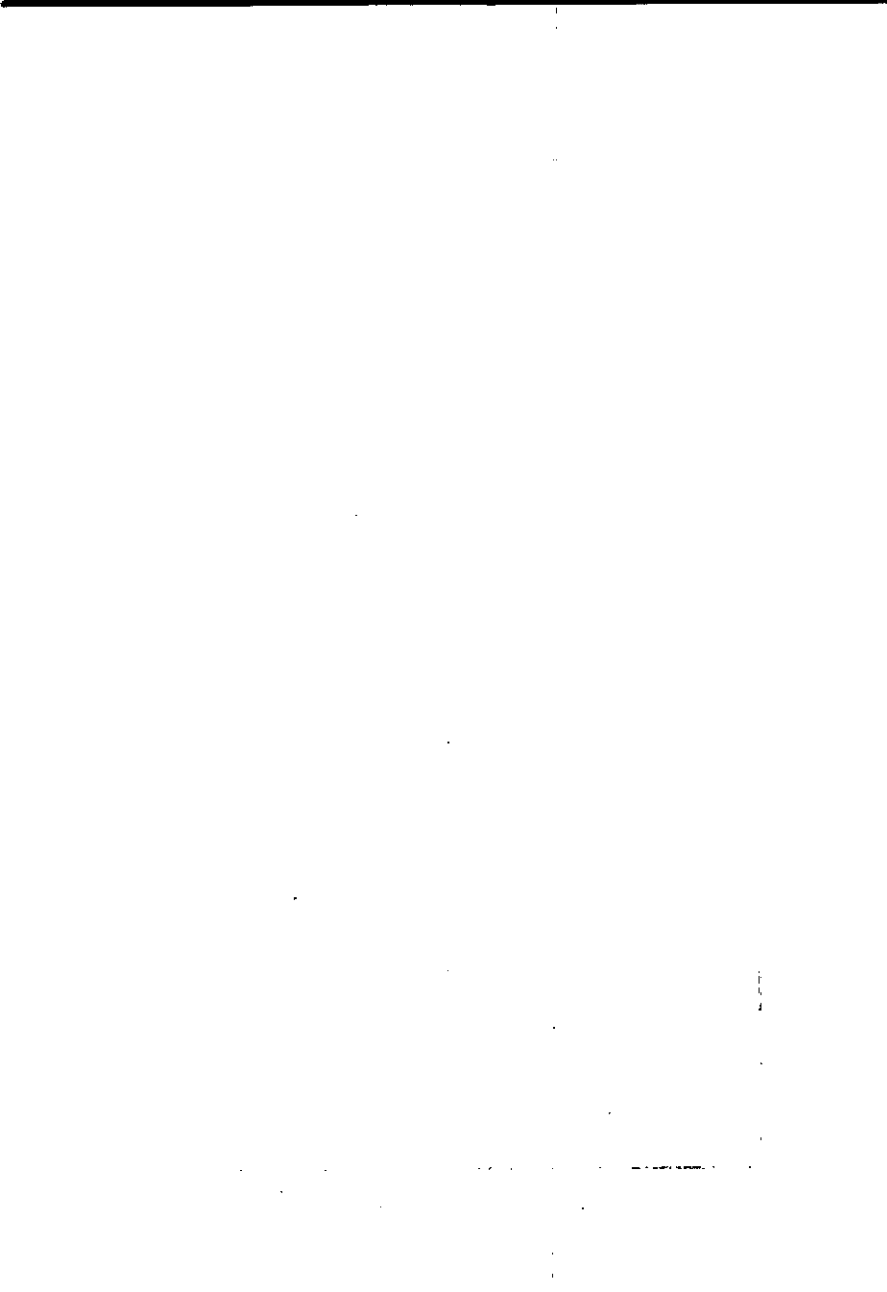

## MASTER'S ANNUAL ADDRESS

### INTRODUCTION

As we open the 86th Annual Convention of the California State Grange, it would be interesting to engage in a perspective of the meeting held 85 years ago in the City of Napa when the California State Grange was organized.

The people who met there were sincere in their purpose. Notwithstanding 85 years have passed the principles of the Grange have never changed. True, many issues we discuss today are different from those when the Grange was active in its early history. But it is interesting to note that the first report in October, 1873, of the Irrigation Committee almost completely parallels the position of the California State Grange today on the problem of water conservation.

This session is being held in the beautiful City of Santa Cruz. It is in this area that the redwoods were first discovered in California. The Grange members in this County have made extensive plans to make this both a profitable and pleasant State Grange session. We are also pleased to state we also have had complete support of the local Chamber of Commerce and Convention Bureau. As this State Grange session opens, we are meeting at a time of a troubled world and some unrest at home.

There should be important changes in the farm program. The responsibility of proposing a new farm program and suggesting other changes in our economy, rests with delegates of this session. Many other issues will be before the Convention. It is probable some of the resolutions considered will be controversial, but we rely on the calmness of the deliberation and the charity for those who may have different views.

We hope this Convention will, as in former sessions, act courageously on the many issues before this session. We are confident when the 1958 State Grange meeting closes here, as in former years, a program will have been adopted which will be helpful in solving many of the important problems now confronting not only farmers, but consumers as well.

### CALIFORNIA FAIRS

During the past year, as in former years, Grangers throughout California have actively supported County and District Fairs.

It is very advantageous to have Grange booths at fairs. Not only in many instances do Granges win valuable prizes, but these exhibits constitute a valuable source of Grange publicity. If Granges did not exhibit, many fairs would be seriously lacking in displays of agricultural commodities and other products. We therefore congratulate the Granges that have entered booths in County and District Fairs, and urge that all Granges in California continue to give active support to their local fairs.

This year, Grange Day at the California State Fair was held on September 3rd. The usual luncheon was well attended, and was served by the Sacramento County Pomona Grange Home Economics Club. The Grange luncheon at the California State Fair is now one of the largest held during the State Fair and Exposition.

The movement is now under way to improve the new State Fair site just north of Sacramento. The site borders on the American River. Those who have charge of arranging for the improvements are hopeful it will be possible to hold either the 1960 or 1961 California State Fair at the new fair site.

### HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION

California is engaging in a very extensive highway construction program, including several large freeways. Apparently in some instances, those responsible for selecting routes of large freeways, are either indifferent to, or have given little consideration to the large areas of very fertile agricultural land which is being used for freeway purposes.

We believe in many instances, without materially impairing the directness of the route of the freeway, less valuable agricultural land could be used. In one or two occasions, the California State Grange has vigorously protested the destruction of valuable agricultural land when it was apparent another route could be used where the land was of much poorer quality.

While these freeways will prove very important to California's highway use, both by automobile and transportation facilities, every effort should be made to use those routes which will prove less destructive to good land, and at the same time will not impair the value of the freeway.

The State Department of Highways has very courteously notified our office and, also requested the names of the secretaries of the number of Subordinate Granges adjacent to the proposed freeway, to acquaint them with the

route planned for the freeway. We hope these Granges attended the hearings, and where the freeway was using too much good land, vigorously protested. Apparently in some instances, these protests were effective.

The building of freeways over agricultural land, and the rapid expansion of subdivisions for dwellings which in some areas in California have destroyed some of the finest agricultural land available, may many years ahead prove highly detrimental. We therefore believe especially freeways should always be built on the route where good land will not be destroyed.

The cost of the California highway program will reach very high figures, even though in some instances the Federal Government is participating. Not only in selecting routes which are less expensive, but all costs of highways should be given careful consideration, and the strictest economy followed which will not interfere or lessen the value of the highway.

### COMMUNITY SERVICE

Several of our Subordinate Granges participated in the National Grange Community Service Contest.

This contest is arranged by the National Grange with the cooperation of the Sears Roebuck Foundation.

Even those Granges which participated in the contest, and did not win a prize benefited from this activity. Many of the Granges in California gave outstanding community service. As in many other instances, a community service program by a Subordinate Grange not only materially benefits the community, but at the same time gives the Grange some very valuable publicity. Considering the number of Granges in California, their participation percentage wise, was rather low. We fully realize due to home economics work and many other projects, Granges may not have had the time for a community service project.

The 1959 program has been announced by the National Grange. We most respectfully urge all Subordinate Granges in California to consider entering the Community Service Contest for 1959.

Only two young couples in California entered the National Grange Young Grange Couple of the Year Contest.

Brother and Sister Beach, members of Fair Oaks Grange, Sacramento County; and Brother and Sister Watson, members of Three Forks Grange, El Dorado County, both were prize winners.



We suggest young couples in Granges in California acquaint themselves with the rules of this contest, the prizes offered, and enter the contest.

### HOME ECONOMICS DEPARTMENT

During the fiscal year just closed, the California State Grange Home Economics Department, under the able leadership of Mrs. Mabel Glenn has again made outstanding progress in the valuable contribution this department makes to growth and activities in California.

There are a few State Grange programs with the possible exception of legislative and economic movements in which the women of the Grange have not taken an important part. To attempt to even present a limited number of the activities and achievements of Home Economics Clubs in California, might well occupy the greater portion of this entire report. The funds they have raised for Pomona and Subordinate Granges and their charitable work is not only outstanding but constitutes a record for such work in the State of California.

The California State Grange is very appreciative of the membership campaign by the Home Economics Clubs in California.

Mrs. Mabel Glenn, State Grange Home Economics Chairman, will give a more detailed report to this State Grange Session.

### OUR INCREASING TAX PROBLEMS

During the last few years there has been in many areas a rapidly increasing tax problem. The Federal Government will probably in the next year or so spend an additional \$12,000,000,000 in the cost of government. This estimate is apparently based on present government expenditures. California during the next fiscal year will probably be confronted with a substantial deficit.

We believe the whole California State Government should be completely reviewed and in those instances where there are duplication of services and overlapping government agencies, these should be removed.

A proposition will appear on the November ballot in which if adopted will make radical changes in our tax system. From information so far available, it appears this proposal might seriously interfere with a sound tax program. It seems one of the largest losses in state tax income is due

to the drop in sales tax. But even if this source of revenue is restored to the former levels the problem of keeping California's expenditures within the present high tax system will be difficult unless the changes referred to above are made.

Apparently all tax levels, district, municipal, county, state and federal governments, if changes are not made, these costs of government may become almost confiscatory.

According to reports received in some areas the taxes have reached a level where the small home owner is finding it difficult to meet taxes.

We fully realize the difficulty with which a proposal to reduce government costs or taxes would be confronted. Immediately all the agencies in government which might be affected would raise a clamor that the removal of or reducing the functions of that department or agency would have a detrimental affect.

Tax reforms, especially if they have a downward trend are always difficult. But these changes can be affected only when public opinion is aroused and when those organizations which undertake this movement move on a sound economic basis.

The National Tax Equality Association will probably again promote legislation in Congress to place an income tax on dividends paid by cooperatives. If such a law would be passed many cooperatives throughout the United States could not continue to operate.

### CONDITIONS OF THE GRANGE

During the last year, our Home Economic Clubs made substantial contributions in membership gain.

Most of the new applications were presented by members of our Subordinate Grange Clubs. During the quarter ending June 30, there was a good gain in membership. All departments of the Grange are operating at an all-time high. Most of these are referred to in other parts of this report.

The cost of administration for the State Grange has faced a sharp increase during the last few years; printing costs, travel, and other expenditures are higher. California has one of the lowest per capita dues to the State Grange of any state in the west. Notwithstanding this, due to the sound and constructive administration by our State Grange Executive Committee, the finances of our State Grange are in a healthy condition.

Several Granges, at the present time, are constructing new halls, and during the year, several were dedicated. Building or purchasing a hall is one of the most worthwhile projects in which a Subordinate Grange can engage.

Insurance affecting those Granges which own halls, is referred to in another part of this report.

We are happy to say, the prestige of the California State Grange has shown a steady upward trend in legislative matters both in Sacramento and Washington, D. C.

The California State Grange Treasurer and the Secretary will present a detailed report on the financial operations of the California State Grange.

### INSURANCE

During the last year, the Grange Compensation Insurance paid a very substantial dividend on all premiums. The refund was 27.35 percent of the premium paid. This policy is available to all Grange members engaged in agriculture. It should be kept in mind, compensation insurance rates are fixed by State law, and not by the insurance carrier. There have been changes in the benefits under compensation insurance which may increase the rates.

We most respectfully suggest all our members who are qualified, acquaint themselves with the Grange Compensation Insurance policy. It was first designed to make compensation insurance available to our members who had a low payroll, but now, no matter how high the payroll, a policy can be secured.

All Granges, whether incorporated or not, should carry a liability, and if there is any work done on the hall or any work for the Grange the liability policy does not protect a Grange when an injury occurs where a member or other person is performing services for the Grange.

In both liability and compensation insurance, if a Grange is not incorporated, each member is jointly and severally liable. In some instances, Grangers seem to be of the opinion if they carry liability insurance and a member or other person was doing some work in their hall, liability insurance would protect the Grange. This is not the case. Such an injury can be covered only by compensation insurance. The principle value in incorporating is if a liability should accrue, only the assets of the corporation are liable; members would have no liability. We most respectfully suggest all Granges in California give some attention to these insurance policies.

Due to the frequency of automobile accidents, and the high costs of repairs, and in some instances, the very high judgments rendered by courts in automobile accidents, have resulted in a steady upward trend of automobile insurance costs. It is only when this State takes some drastic steps to stop highway accidents can we look forward to at least no higher costs, but the possibility of some reduction.

The question of highway safety is referred to in another part of this report.

If Grange members or other persons in California are nearing 60 years of age, it is very advantageous, if they have a reasonably good automobile insurance policy, they retain it. No person over 60 years of age can, at the present time, get automobile insurance in California at the regular rates and with the usual coverage. True, such persons can get automobile insurance, but will generally place in what is known as the assigned risk, an agency set up by the large companies in which each must carry their proportionate shares of those policies they do not carry in their general insurance program.

We are hoping, in the near future, some method can be found which will to some extent, reduce the almost exorbitant cost of automobile insurance for boys under 25 years of age. Several times we have discussed this matter with insurance carriers, but each time were referred to the record. It is disheartening to note the frequency of very serious automobile accidents which occur when a driver under 25 is at the wheel.

The California Grange Insurance Association will render their report and financial statement to this Convention.

Through this Association, fire and extended coverage is available to all Grange members. We most respectfully suggest Grange members who reside in those areas where these policies are available, acquaint themselves with the costs of insurance and the service of this Association.

The Farmers Insurance Exchange of Los Angeles has reported to every State Grange Convention for many years. Some years ago, this Exchange was endorsed by the California State Grange, and also by the National Grange as the official insurance carrier for all Grange states west of the Mississippi River.

As usual, the Farmers Insurance Exchange will present a report to this Convention.

### CHANGES IN JUVENILE ADMINISTRATION

While several years ago, the California State Grange vigorously supported Child Labor Laws, we think it is now appropriate that we should give further consideration to a course which might be effective in lessening what we have come to term "Juvenile Delinquency."

Under the present law, no child in California 16 years of age or under, can work unless they have a special permit. Some of these young boys have an over-supply of energy, their parents live in an apartment, there is nothing for the boy to do, and naturally, in many instances, the boys turn to other activities which sometimes result in sort of dare-devil crimes, which otherwise if they had something to do, would not have occurred.

While this question should be approached and considered very carefully, we believe the time has come when it might be advantageous to let children, especially boys at 16 years of age, secure something to do during the vacation season without necessity of securing a permit.

We will not cure juvenile delinquents by building juvenile halls, by arresting them, and putting them under the jurisdiction of the Juvenile Court, but other steps must be taken before we believe the present unhappy condition can be remedied.

Juvenile delinquency of course is not confined to the young people who have so far been discussed in this report. It is a jarring note which should alert all people, when children as young as five years of age break into a church and wreck the interior. There is something wrong which cannot be cured by law.

We have come to the conclusion our first remedy must start in the home, and not in courts of law. It appears in some of the instances which came to our attention, home life is almost completely lacking. It is apparent that America needs a moral rearmament. We cannot expect young people, especially children, to have respect for law or moral principles where both the father and the mother sometimes over-indulge in intoxicating liquors. Such an occasion inevitably develops a feeling of contempt for parents, and such contempt can only lead to a moral breakdown on the part of the children.

### CALIFORNIA GRANGE NEWS

During the year, there has been substantial progress in the administration of the California Grange News. The publication now is in the strongest financial position since it was first established in 1932. We believe the State Grange Headquarters now has a complete list of all members who are entitled to receive the Grange News.

While Grange dues receipts in California indicate a contribution to the Grange News, practically the entire cost of the paper is still carried by advertising. Every effort is being made to have each Grange family in California receive the State Grange publication.

Members changing address can give much assistance if they will send their change of address to the State Headquarters through the Subordinate Grange Secretary where they are members. Sometimes members write a change of address, give no indication of which Grange they are a member—this inevitably leads to some delay.

Within the last few years, the California Grange News has become recognized as one of the leading farm publications in this State.

Craig Hazlewood, Jr., Managing Editor, will give a more detailed report to this Convention.

### GRANGE CREDIT UNIONS

Since 1934, when the movement was started for Grange Credit Unions in California, there has been a steady expansion and growth in Grange Credit Unions, and their activities in the State. In several instances these Credit Unions have attained a financial position to make it possible to take care of all the members' credit needs.

When the movement was first started, it was looked upon largely as an organization from which to borrow funds. Some Grange members apparently were of the opinion by buying a \$5.00 share, they could secure a loan. While this is true, we hope that all Grange members in California will realize Credit Unions are not only designed to make loans to members, but at the same time offer a very desirable savings program for all Credit Union members.

We hope all of our members who are not now members of Credit Unions will acquaint themselves not only with the possibilities of loans, but at the same time, the most advantageous savings program available.

During this Convention, the Chairman of the State Grange Credit Union Committee will report.

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### GRANGE YOUTH PROGRAM

Under the able leadership of the California State Grange Youth Committee, Dr. Carle Fiedler, Chairman, there has been substantial progress in this program.

For the first time this year, in addition to the Easter Youth Conference held in the California Polytechnic College in San Luis Obispo another conference was held in the extreme northern part of the State at the Humboldt State College in Arcata. Several of the young people who attended this conference apparently knew very little about the Grange, and less about the Youth Program. We greatly appreciate the outstanding cooperation of Humboldt State College and feel confident this conference did much to not only acquaint these young people with the Youth Program but also to give them better understanding of the Grange and its objectives.

As in former years during this Convention, the Grange youth members will present a program. They will hold some conferences, and will present their annual entertainment on Tuesday evening at 7:30 p.m.

This year again the Fifth Degree on Thursday evening will be conferred by the Grange youth members.

The California State Grange is deeply interested in the progress and the success of the Grange Youth Program. This State has made outstanding progress in the last two years. We are convinced however that no matter how able the leadership of the Grange Youth Committee is, much of the progress will be due to the interest and activity of the youth members.

We also urge every Subordinate Grange in the State where there are youth members, to give these young people a part in the Grange program and activities.

### STATE GRANGE CALIFORNIA PHYSICIANS' SERVICE PROGRAM

During the last few years, there has been a very rapid increase in hospital costs.

When the California State Grange signed the contract with California Physicians' Service at the end of 1946, beginning operations in 1947, it was possible to get a three-bed ward room for about \$8.00; now this cost has almost tripled. Doctors' fees, in many instances, have also shown a very sharp increase. We are wondering how much further this increase in costs for hospital and medical care will go. At

the present time, persons of ordinary means are finding it extremely difficult, if not impossible, to pay the necessary medical and hospital costs in case of illness.

We think it appropriate that a note of warning should be given to both hospitals and the medical profession when costs go too high, where people of ordinary means cannot afford medical care or hospitalization, there will be a movement for limited government participation in hospital costs and medical care.

During the past year, Mrs. Lydia N. Joiner, who for it was necessary to make a nominal change in the State Grange C.P.S. program. There is no change in rates, but members using the program will be required to pay 20 percent of the hospital costs. Those not using the program, will have no additional charge. Our program is the only one that has no definite age limit. There is no difference in the cost of C.P.S. program in regard to age.

We have interviewed a number of insurance carriers, and while most of them contend they have no age limit, when a person's age goes beyond 65 years, the benefits are materially reduced. One of the most recent suggestions by an insurance company was a \$300.00 deductible policy; that is, the member could either carry both C.P.S. and their insurance. C.P.S. would pay the first \$300.00, or up to that amount and the other insurance carrier would pay any higher costs. Or if the member did not have C.P.S., then the policyholder would pay the first \$300.00 and the insurance carrier pay the balance. It is almost unnecessary to state this policy, due to the high deduction, would be lower in cost. After consulting with quite a large number of insurance companies, the California State Grange Executive Committee is of the opinion none of them equal the benefits now available in the Grange California Physicians' Service Program.

Mr. L. Paul Putnam, representative of the C.P.S., will report to this Convention.

### JUVENILE GRANGES

During the year, owing to the heavy increase in costs, several years was California State Grange Juvenile Grange Superintendent, due to ill health, found it necessary to retire.

The California State Grange greatly appreciates the valuable contributions Mrs. Joiner made to the Juvenile Grange Program in California. We are very confident that the thousands of children in Juvenile Granges who had the



privilege of meeting Mrs. Joiner, will bear a lasting influence of her high ideals in the years ahead.

Mrs. Emma Michalk has been appointed to the important position of California State Grange Juvenile Superintendent. She has had wide experience in Juvenile Granges, and also in the State Grange Youth Department. We are confident under her able leadership, the Juvenile Grange movement will continue to go forward.

We most respectfully suggest all Subordinate Granges which do not have a Juvenile Grange and where there are children, give attention to organizing one of these worthwhile Granges. The training, the inspiration and the high ideals children receive from a Juvenile Grange, will be very valuable to them in years ahead.

We suggest, where there is a possibility of a Juvenile Grange, the Master appoint a committee to investigate and start the movement for a Juvenile Grange, and you will always find the District Deputy ready to help organize such a Grange.

#### **GRANGERS BUSINESS ORGANIZATION, INC.**

During the last few years, the Grangers Business Organization, Incorporated has enjoyed a very successful operation.

This cooperative organized by the California State Grange in 1935 experienced some very rough years during the depression and shortly thereafter, but now is in a very strong financial position. More and more members of the Granges in California are learning the savings they can make, by making purchases through this buying cooperative.

Petroleum products are still the major operation. Sometimes members call at the office and say "We can buy from any major company at the same price as we can from Grangers Business Organization, Inc., after the dividend is being paid." No doubt this is true, but we can say with reasonable assurance, if the Grangers Business Organization, Inc., were not operating in the petroleum field, suppliers would not only charge the full price, but something additional to take care of the loss they may have sustained in trying to put cooperative movements out of business.

When the Grangers Business Organization, Inc., started operations, the difference in price between the service station and the tank wagon deliveries was two cents per gallon. In other instances in communities 50 miles apart, there would be a cent difference in the prices of gasoline. Shortly

after the Grangers Business Organization, Inc. began operations, the differential between the service station and tank wagon was increased to four cents per gallon. In other instances, companies found it convenient to abolish the one-cent difference in price. We understand people forget easily, but we think it is appropriate to remind Grange members every where when they take the small savings given them by a distributor of another company, they are assisting in destroying the cooperative movement and paving the way for increased prices of gasoline and other petroleum products delivered not only by tank wagon but service stations as well.

We therefore repeat, Grange members should support the Grangers Business Organization's petroleum program and likewise whenever possible avail themselves of the saving which can be made by the purchase of other commodities handled by the Business Organization.

Paige L. Harper, Manager of the Grangers Business Organization, Inc., will also report to this Convention.

#### **DEVELOPMENT OF WATER RESOURCES**

Ever since 1935 when the first appropriation was made for the construction of the Central Valley Project, California State Grange conventions have consistently supported the development, construction and administration of the Sacramento and San Joaquin Valleys as a coordinated integral project, by the Federal Bureau of Reclamation. This project was proceeding with reasonable success when suddenly the State of California decided to build the Feather River Project. This move resulted in the Federal Government withdrawing from the Feather River development, and has also greatly interfered with the orderly construction of the water resources and power development in central valleys.

During the 1957 session of the California State Grange, a resolution was adopted, opposing the State construction of the Feather River, and advocating the project be built by the Federal Government.

When the legislative budget session of 1958 opened, the California State Grange was the only large organization opposing State construction. When the legislative session closed, no additional funds were made available for actual construction of the Feather River Project.

Interests in Southern California demanded the State make an irrevocable supply of water available to Southern

California. If this was not included in the program, legislators in the southern part of California would vote against any further appropriation for construction of this project. For several days, in the closing hours of the session, the legislature was dead-locked on this question. We are firmly of the opinion, if the people of California were aware of the great cost of this project, and the debt the State would have to assume, they would oppose its construction. Frequently we were told by legislators, when we requested that before the project be constructed, the people of California be given an opportunity to vote on \$1,500,000,000 in General Obligation Bonds. The answer usually given, "We can't do this, the people will not vote for it." In other words, the proponents practically admit the lack of feasibility of the project. It is estimated, under Federal construction, water could be delivered to the central areas of the State for approximately \$5.00 an acre-foot less than under State development. There is no prospect of Federal Construction as long as the State of California is attempting to get the project under way.

Many times we have been asked why the State project was started; no doubt there are several reasons. But one of the most frequently advanced is, probably to avoid the Acreage Limitation in the Reclamation Law, and to turn the power developed over to a private utility, and in this manner, prevent the electric energy from being integrated with the Central Valley Project.

There have been many changes in this proposal after it was first proposed. We are wondering today, if the State Water Department can give exact and direct answers to all the different problems involved. We believe, the only sound and constructive course is to have the Federal Government develop the Feather River and thus avoid the almost insurmountable debt which would result in State construction.

### **San Luis Reservoir**

The San Luis Reservoir on the west side of the San Joaquin Valley was first proposed for construction by the Federal Government, and here too, the State wanted to undertake a part of this development. The final result was, no action was taken by Congress on the construction of the San Luis Reservoir.

We believe the Federal Government should proceed immediately with the construction of the first million acre-feet in order that water may be available to those areas where it is greatly needed.

The proposal of distribution of water from the San Luis Project in parts of Kern County had the aspect of being merely an attempt to avoid the acreage limitation. The San Luis Project will also be used to store water from the Trinity River development. While the Trinity River construction is under way by the Federal Government, the question of the so-called partnership of the power facilities is still undecided. It has been stated many times that the proponents of this partnership scheme believe private enterprise should be given participation in the project.

We fail to understand how the Secretary of the Interior can speak of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company as a private enterprise. True, this great company is owned by private stockholders, but private enterprise is always open to competition, but no company can enter into a competitive system with this private utility. They are not in a true sense private enterprise, but a government protected monopoly.

The construction of the power facilities on the Trinity River by the so-called partnership program would be a complete betrayal of the best interests of the people in the areas affected. During the next session of Congress, this partnership proposal should be defeated, and the Federal Government should proceed without delay with the construction. All the large multi-purpose projects should be built by the Federal Government, and the smaller projects, of which there are many, constructed by the State of California.

Water and power development are still the two major issues in this State. Electric energy developed at the larger projects, should be conserved in the interest of the people, not turned over to private utilities for profit at the expense of the users.

### ACREAGE LIMITATIONS

In 1902, when the first great conservation movement was undertaken by the Federal Government in the western states, a limitation was placed on the number of acres for which any owner could receive water from a Federal project. The acreage was limited to 160 acres. When the delivery of water in the central valleys was started by the Federal Government, movements were started to exempt the project from this provision in the Federal Reclamation Law. Probably there are few laws where there has been more misrepresentation than acreage limitation.

Since the beginning of water delivery by the Federal

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Government of this State, 800,000 acres have received water—all owners were subject to the acreage limitation.

The Federal Government has taken the position in states where there is a community property law, the wife could own an equal acreage with the husband, therefore, the number was increased to 320 acres. This law is based on a sound principle, when water is impounded by public funds, it should be as widely and as equitably distributed as possible, and should not be made available to large corporate farms at the expense of the smaller owners. When attempts were made to exempt the Central Valleys Project from this provision, the last bill presented in Congress was not even reported from the Sub-committee on Public Lands to the General Committee.

Earlier this year, the California Water and Power Users Association, an organization set up by the California State Grange, started a movement to amend the California State Constitution to provide all water projects constructed by the State should be subject to the same acreage limitation now in the Federal law.

Petitions were printed and circulated. The California State Grange and many organizations vigorously supported the movement, but due to lack of time and misunderstanding, it was not possible to complete the petitions during the period allowed for their circulation. This measure would not have appeared on the ballot until 1960. During the first six months of 1960, there will be ample time to circulate petitions to place this very worthwhile amendment in the Constitution of California. We are firmly of the opinion, if this is done, much of the clamor for State construction of large projects will disappear, and at the same time, water developed by the State will be equitably distributed among all users.

Large corporate farms sometimes ruthlessly try to control water. Then this amendment becomes of the greatest importance.

It is therefore suggested, the California State Grange continue to vigorously support the acreage limitation, and give full assistance to placing this provision in the Constitution of California.

### **CALIFORNIA'S SCHOOL PROGRAM**

Due to a heavy increase in the enrollment of our schools, and the rapid upward trend in population in many areas, there are many localities facing construction of

school buildings and other facilities where the cost is beyond the ability of local taxpayers.

Twice bonds have been voted by people in California for assistance, but notwithstanding this aid, there are school districts in the State where there are two school sessions, one in the forenoon, and one in the afternoon. We believe there can be a material reduction in the cost of school buildings by amending the law to provide the State Department of Education make available plans for school buildings which can be used without the additional cost of architects' fees.

The State Department of Education is preparing plans for a substantial increase in expenditures for schools in this State. While everyone agrees added facilities must be made available, care should be taken that extravagance in expenditures is avoided, and at the same time the necessary facilities be provided.

Twice during recent years attempts were made to close the smaller high schools and have greater consolidation of these schools. Every time the proposal was defeated.

Time and space in this report does not permit an explanation of unification and consolidation programs for schools in California. Suffice to say that in unification several districts are combined in one administration. Some suggestions provide the superintendent of instructions in these unified districts should be appointed and not elected. Under consolidation schools are united, probably some closed, and the children attending there are transferred to a consolidated district.

Education cannot wait. We cannot say to the children of this year, "you may have to wait until next year." Therefore, the construction of facilities, the administration of our schools, is a problem which should interest all our people in the efficient and the economical administration and construction of school facilities.

### FARM LEGISLATION

During the 1958 Budget Session of the California Legislature, only a few important farm measures were considered. Among these was A.B. 11, a poultry sale promotion measure. When the bill was first introduced, it was opposed until important amendments were adopted. When this was done, the bill was supported. The measure was considered something of a "stop-gap" movement to try to bring relief to the poultry industry. As this report is being writ-

ten, there are indications the measure may not have the required number of votes by poultrymen under the referendum to put the law in effect.

The State Grange, through the California Grange News, and deputies' letters have tried to warn the poultrymen, unless there are enough votes in the affirmative, the measure will die.

The greater problem of farm legislation now rests with Congress. During the last session, there was a very unusual proceeding in voting on the omnibus farm bill. Namely, this measure had unanimous support of the House of Representative Agriculture Committee, was approved by the Rules Committee and when it was presented on the floor of the House for vote, the members of Congress refused by a large majority, to even consider the bill. There has been much speculation why this unusual proceeding occurred. The one most generally advanced, is that Congressmen coming from the large centers of population, where the consumers in their district were dissatisfied with the type of farm program which had been in effect for several years, and the feeling many millions of dollars have been spent on the farm program to buy commodities off the market; thus compelling the consumers who are taxpayers to pay a higher price for these commodities.

We believe the time is at hand when a new concept for a farm program must be adopted. Everyone recognizes the present program is slowly but surely crushing the home-owning farmer out of existence. The only program which has worked successfully is the 1954 "Wool Act." Under this law, the producers marketed their wool. If the market price drops below the parity level, then the government reimburses the producer for the difference.

If the wool sold does not go below or is above the parity level there is no payment by the government.

For the last few years the California State Grange has approved a program to allow farm commodities to flow into the market unrestricted. If market prices drop below the parity level, the government will then reimburse the producer for the difference. However, such a program could not operate successfully unless there is a rigid limitation on how much one producer can receive in parity payments. It appears there is a growing sentiment in the United States, the present method of buying farm commodities off the market to lower surpluses and then allowing some of the commodities to deteriorate until they can no longer be used

and sending some free of cost to nations throughout the world where there is need, or engaging in so-called "dumping," is not a sound program.

One of the most important steps necessary to bring about understanding has been advocated by the California State Grange for the last two or three years. Namely, Congress should make an all-out investigation by a Congressional Committee to determine the relationship of farm income to consumers dollars. We believe further there is room for investigation of some of the major processing plants in the United States. There have been rumors of collusion. If such an investigation is made, it will do much to bring about a better understanding by many consumers as to cost of farm commodities. There are resolutions before this Convention relating to most of these issues. Contract farming is making an insidious and dangerous invasion of farm operation. Along with this is the so-called vertical integration of agriculture. While we frequently hear the statement, "we don't like contracts, but what else can be done." We believe remedies can be adopted which will prevent the further spread of these undesirable trends.

The Grade B or so-called manufacturing dairymen and many poultry producers are facing a desperate condition. Many dairymen are discontinuing their business. We have been informed that in some counties a large number of Grade B dairymen have found it necessary to sell their herds due to insufficient income. Recently, the California State Grange started a movement to make it possible for the Grade B dairymen to put a program into operation under the provisions of the California Marketing Act of 1937. A committee of dairymen is now working on this proposal. However, before a program can be adopted, it will be necessary to make a legislative change in the Marketing Act. It might be in order to state, the Marketing Act of 1937, was sponsored in the Legislature by the California State Grange. There are now 29 or 30 farm commodities under this Act. Where large farm holdings dominate, the community life which has been one of the greatest bulwarks of American democracy, disappears. Where there are home-owning farmers, schools and churches, there is community interest. Unless the home-owning farmer program is supported, this community interest which is almost invaluable, may be greatly diminished, and finally disappear. We believe the California State Grange has the courage and foresight to adopt a courageous and forward looking program



which will result in preserving the home-owning farmers and the all-important community interest of both this State and the Nation.

### **CALIFORNIA HIGHWAY SAFETY PROBLEMS**

Notwithstanding the construction of more freeways and attempts by highway engineers to lessen traffic hazards on highways of California, our State is still confronted with the inexcusable death rate on our highways.

California, according to records, has the unenviable position of killing more people on highways than any other State in the Nation. While this is due to heavy increase in population, and a heavy increase in highway use during the last few years, this does not excuse the number of traffic deaths. It is apparent the principle cause is excessive speed. The present laws which are supposed to regulate speed on our highways are wholly ineffective. These provisions leave it to the judgment of the driver as to how fast his car can travel safely. At the present time a movement is under way to amend these laws to place a 65 mile per hour rigid speed limit on California's highways. This program also includes a proposal to increase the number of highway patrolmen to make it possible to enforce the law.

It is unfortunate but true, where an accident occurs where death results no matter how flagrant the violation, which in some instances might very properly be termed "voluntary manslaughter," the driver responsible for the accident is hardly ever prosecuted.

Persons suffering from highway accidents, even including deaths, seem more concerned about the amount they can collect in damages than prosecuting the guilty driver.

Only when drivers of automobiles or other motor vehicles are guilty of violating the law to the extent where criminal prosecution can be used, and the driver is prosecuted, is there a prospect of reducing highway deaths. At the same time, we believe if the 65 miles per hour is enforced there will be a material reduction in the present traffic deaths. Records should be kept giving the number of accidents where death results, giving the name of the driver involved, and when guilty of violation, jail sentence should be imposed. Small fines will not cure this type of driver.

All too frequently when an accident occurs, the driver states, "We are covered by insurance." Some insurance car-

riers are responsible by telling the insured, "If an accident occurs, you can forget it, we will take over."

California' highway safety program can become effective only when excessive speed is stopped and the killers of the highway be brought to trial.

### SOIL CONSERVATION

Soil conservation is still one of the most important movements which effect not only rural people, but all citizens of the State and Nation.

Unfortunately there has been much misrepresentation regarding the operation and administration of a soil conservation district. Some of these rumors seem to have originated from some of our farm organizations.

Frequently we hear the statement, "There can be no reason to spend money on soil conservation when it is designed merely to help farmers get better returns from their farms." This is not the case. Soil conservation is a long-range movement.

Along with soil conservation should go forestry and water projects which are too small for State or Federal consideration. There are areas in the United States, where due to erosion, the production on hillsides has been reduced to a very low level.

History clearly indicates, those Nations where the productivity of the soil had been conserved, there has been greater progress. While this movement seems well under way not only in California but nation-wide, still there are many large areas where the value of the soil is gradually being depleted either through erosion or some other cause. Protecting and retaining the fertility of our soils is not only a question which will effect people at the present time, but will be invaluable to generations yet unborn. Those citizens who give their time and interest to promoting soil conservation are performing an invaluable service. We are certain those who in years ahead will be benefited by the work they are doing now, will pay tribute in the simple and yet eloquent words "How Great Is Our Heritage."

We are happy to say, the California State Grange has vigorously supported the development of soil conservation districts in this State.

### CHANGES IN SOCIAL SECURITY

During the recent session, Congress increased Social Security payments by approximately 7½ or 8 percent. A

person now receiving payments will not be required to make application for the increase.

The administration of Social Security for self-employed farmers is facing some difficulties. Due to the many short-time employees harvesting California crops, it is sometimes difficult to keep the proper records. If Granges or Grange members are interested in explanations of records of self-employed farmers must keep for Social Security, we are confident the State Department will send representatives to Grange meetings to explain the procedure.

The National Grange was the only farm organization which appeared before Congressional Committees in favor of social security for self-employed farmers, whenever a workable plan would be adopted by Congress.

Social Security has become an important factor in our economic system.

### ATOMIC DEVELOPMENT

While the Federal Government has spent many billions of dollars in the development of atomic energy, it now appears the Government is turning over to private industry not only the construction but the administration of this almost immeasurable source of power. This development may have a great impact on the whole industrial and economic structure of this Country. Allowing this all important development to be turned over to private industry, might result in corporate control which may prove highly detrimental to the welfare of our people.

Due to the billions spent in development, we believe the Federal Government should retain control and use of this invaluable source of power which, when properly developed, may have an almost unbelievable effect on the future economic welfare of the United States.

### IN MEMORIAM

Since last year in the march of time many Grange homes in the State of California have been saddened by a loss of a member of the family. These members who are gone, in their lifetime, were loyal and devoted members of the Grange.

We realize how inadequate the printed page or how futile the spoken word. In those Grange homes where today there is a vacant chair and where a step will not be heard again, we express our deep and sincere sympathy.

It is appropriate the California State Grange pause in our busy session to pay tribute to these departed members. On Thursday afternoon a memorial service will be held under the direction of our State Grange Chaplain, Leta Littler.

### CONCLUSION

Changes have taken place in the economy of the United States which if allowed to continue may prove detrimental and even dangerous.

We were recently informed in the great City of Los Angeles approximately six large marketing companies practically control the distribution of farm commodities. Information has also been presented that in the City of Seattle approximately eight large companies are in control of food distribution. It is only reasonable to assume if the distribution of food is centralized there may develop a movement which might be very difficult to control. This centralization constitutes a dangerous trend. This development, along with contract farming and vertical integration of agriculture may in the very near future become a problem not only for producers, but probably even more for consumers.

The California State Grange throughout its history has been the outspoken champion of the home owning farmers. A little over a year ago a man employed in the Agriculture Department in one of our largest banks made the statement that the year before 14,000 farmers had gone out of business. He further stated "this is good." However, a short time ago the chairman of the Board of Directors of the largest bank made this statement, "we should get more boys and girls on the land."

In defeating movements to exempt the great Central Valleys Project from acreage limitations the California State Grange and other organizations who cooperated made a valuable contribution to protecting the interest of the home-owning farmer. Many times we have stated that movements should not be tolerated which might make it very difficult, if not impossible, for young married people to establish a home on the land. When this is done the roots of these young people go deep in the soil. They become the type of citizen which constitutes the greatest safeguard against those isms we look upon with so much disfavor.

It is customary on the part of some interests when a movement is started or supported which is in the interest of the people that a cry of socialism is raised and some persons are influenced by such a statement. However, we are

happy to say that the California State Grange on down through the years has held firm to the principle of great natural resources should be conserved in the interest of all the people.

We are living in a changing world, a vast majority of the people of the world are living in what we are inclined to call the backward countries. The people in many of these nations, particularly at the present time, are not qualified for self government. It is probable the majority are not so much interested in what type of government they have, as if they will have enough food. In some of the backward provinces the great fear is famine. But everyone in the United States should remember that many of these nations are now moving forward. We believe our country should take the leadership in assisting the people of these nations in their attempt for improvement.

There seems to be a dangerous trend towards war. No one can even estimate the destruction or terror which would result from another world war—by the almost indescribable destruction of the atom bomb. A country like Russia today is spending doubly the amount on education that we are spending in the United States. If recent reports received are correct, in industrial development they are almost likewise, doubling our progress. Apparently there is a dangerous feeling of complacency on the part of many people in the United States regarding these developments.

History clearly indicates where people become indifferent to the affairs of government corruption nearly always begins. We believe one of the greatest dangers that confronts our Country is the indifference of our people to the responsibility of citizenship. On November 4th of this year in this State many high officials will be elected. All citizens should become conscious of their responsibility and avail themselves of the right to vote.

During the last few years there has been a trend to what we generally term "big business" becoming more effective in the affairs of government. Many years ago someone wrote "eternal vigilance is the price of liberty." We believe at the present time there is a great need for vigilance on the part of what we like to call the common people. Sometimes in discussing the present trends of government high officials are inclined to minimize or excuse the trends. But equivocation cannot becloud, irony cannot belittle, nor can subterfuge avoid the issue. There it stands.

Here in this State Grange convention we should pledge

ourselves anew to the principle that the home-owning farmers shall not be destroyed, and community life with interest in churches and schools shall continue to be the great bulwark of our American Democracy.

**WORTHY MASTER, FELLOW OFFICERS and MEMBERS:**

During the past two and one-half months in which I have been privileged to serve you as Lecturer of the Cali-

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ifornia State Grange, I have reaffirmed my opinions as to the importance of this office.

Following the resignation of Sister Margaret Avery, the Lecturer's work entered a period of confusion and to our Subordinate Lecturers it became a challenge of self reliance. Their success is evident, according to the accomplishments contained in the reports sent in to this office.

It is my firm opinion, however, that to maintain a progressive march on the road to success, certain changes must take place in the overall Lecturer's program. A lack of personal contact, educational and instructional training emanating from the State level is apparent. I believe, a system of scheduled conferences on a State level should be incorporated into the Lecturer's program. Consideration for such a program should be given priority in planning next year's activities.

On September 7th and 8th I attended the Northwest Grange Leaders Conference held in Portland, Oregon and conducted by officers of the National Grange. The lessons, facts and knowledge I learned there were of great importance to me. Leaving that conference, my faith in our Grange was even greater than ever before, and I felt most highly honored and privileged in being an officer and member of the California State Grange.

During these past two months, the Lecturer's Bulletin was temporarily interrupted because of the work load placed so suddenly upon me. This program will be revised and resumed as quickly as possible. In the meantime, articles in the Grange News will be used as a supplement.

Grange membership reviewed and officers conferences were discussed. State Grange Master Sehlmeier stated the deputies should call on Masters.

Mrs. Glenn recommended we submit a Certificate of Award to members who secure a certain number of applications for building membership. It was suggested more officers conferences be held and deputies visit Granges and offer to help in building membership.

Brother Piper moved, seconded by Brother Mensinger, if time permits State Grange Master Sehlmeier attend the Western States Water and Power Users Conferences held in Dallas or Denver. Meeting in Dallas to be February 2nd, and the Denver meeting will follow Farmer's Union Convention.

Deputy Clark's statement approved by the committee.

The State Grange Lecturer's requests: printing of Recognition Awards were approved. However, State Grange Lecturer's request for increase in salary was not approved.

A motion was made and seconded reimbursement payment would be drawn on the unused portion of Compensation Insurance Fund to reimburse building fund account for California State Grange certified copy of the Articles of Incorporation for California State Grange.

Mr. Dempsey, Security Benefit Life Insurance Company, gave a resume of the benefits of the policy. For a minimum of 5,000 members at \$50.00 per policy—\$200,000.00—24 per cent is taken for the company, and the remainder for the Grange. \$150,000.00 left. Entire family is under one policy as follows: \$100.00—child 14 days to 6 months; \$200.00—Six months to 2 years; \$400.00—Child—two years to three years; \$600.00—three years to 4 years; \$800.00—Child—4 years to 5 years; \$1,000.00—Child of 5 years to 19 years of age; \$1,000.00—wife, and, \$4,000.00 head of family. Premium—\$50.00 per year with a \$2.00 per year enrollment for administration fee allowance. The administrative work would be accomplished by the California State Grange, and the Security Benefit Life Insurance Company will realize 25 per cent for themselves. The policy is renewed yearly and the \$2.00 administration fee is due each year. No age limit.

The committee discussed alterations and repairs for office building. However, the leaks would be taken care of first and major alterations would be delayed until the weather cleared.

Mr. Allan A. Martin, Agricultural Representative of the Occidental Life Insurance Company acquainted the committee with the following benefits outlined:

1. A specially tailored life insurance plan as to risk.
2. No financial responsibility to the State Grange.
3. Extra money for State Grange Treasury—\$5,000.00.
4. A substantial yearly advertising schedule—\$6,500.00.
5. Your own Grange Life Insurance Department.

Cost to the members \$85.00 per year, and furnishes an educational plan for the youngsters. Age: One day to 75 years. Ages 25 and 30 in excess of \$5,000.00. Liability will be extra or over the \$85.00. Age 75 would cost \$100.00 a year for a \$1,000.00 policy. Members would have access to all the



counselling service from the company. They would require 1,000 members as a minimum and need three months to build up a reserve in their advertising fund on the advertising schedule. The policy continues from year to year. Good standard life insurance policy. According to the records—farmers are only 7 percent insured. The family group: Maximum age for man: 50 years of age; maximum age—woman: 40 years. Plan not accepted.

The office manager of E. A. Boyd Company, Mr. Yasbeck and the committee discussed trading in the Chrysler.

State Grange Master Sehlmeier read letters from Mrs. Katharine A. Etter, Ettersburg, California, regarding a Government bond which the Grange purchased during World War II. The Grange surrendered its charter and is no longer in existence. The office was directed to write Deputy Floyd E. Davis, Carlotta, have him go there and see what the circumstances are and what disposition could be made of the bond.

Discussion regarding expense statement presented by Charles O. Busick, Jr., to cover California Grange Credit Union Conference at Long Beach amounting to \$27.36. A motion made by Brother Piper and seconded by Brother Mensinger the report be approved and motion carried.

State Grange Master Sehlmeier oriented the committee regarding the legal firm of Busick and Busick. The agreement was first made with Busick, Sr., and Charles, Jr., was taken in at a later date. The members left it up to Master Sehlmeier to check some of the attorneys in town. However, members of the committee will have a talk with Busick, Jr., sometime in the near future.

Request for a list of Sacramento County Farmers for the purpose of mailing information regarding tours from the Greyhound Travel Bureau, 715 "L" street, Sacramento 14, was disapproved—a commercial arrangement.

The resolution covering the tuberculosis testing program received from Escalon Grange No. 447 will result in requesting the Veterinary College at the University of California at Davis to develop a new program with a more definite test.

The Fertig Products letter promoting the Kinsey Pen and Pencil Set was read by Master Sehlmeier. It was decided a letter be written Mrs. Lydia Joiner informing her these sets were available.

The news letter presented by Dr. Fiedler was approved.

to have 500 copies mimeographed. The copies to be mimeographed in this office and mailed to Dr. Fiedler. The committee approved proposal to help teen-agers obtain employment.

After discussion of placing funds on interest, Brother Piper moved \$30,000.00 be deposited on interest. Brother Mensinger seconded the motion. Carried.

A motion was made by Brother Mensinger, seconded by Brother Piper both Editor Hazelwood and Master Sehlmeier should be allowed to draw 25 per cent of the 75 per cent of the earnings and at end of year final accounting be made.

Mrs. Mabel Glenn, Chairman of the Home Economics Department, appeared before the committee regarding the trip to the Oregon State Grange Convention. Moved by Brother Raines, seconded by Brother Piper, the California State Grange furnish gasoline for automobiles making the trip to Oregon for the convention and include the expenses of the Master of the California State Grange. Motion carried.

It was moved by Brother Piper, seconded by Brother Raines, the bonding of those State Grange officers which are bonded be renewed through the National Grange. Motion carried.

Moved by Brother Raines, seconded by Brother Piper, if the cost is not too great, a public pay telephone be installed in Wisteria Hall. Motion carried.

The committee also discussed, at some length, the rentals for Wisteria Hall. For larger groups where the kitchen facilities are used, the rental should be \$25.00 and up. The committee concluded rentals for other groups should be decided by the State Grange office.

A motion made by Brother Mensinger, seconded by Brother Piper, an editorial be written for the Grange News, pointing out the statement made above is false. Motion carried.

Editor Hazlewood and Auditor Pfanner appeared before the committee in regard to an increase of \$160.00 a month in the News bill submitted by Manager Chester O. Badgley, Shopping News-Times, Manager Badgley appeared before the committee and submitted a letter for inclusion in the minutes regarding the printing increase which is enclosed. Brother Hazlewood also announced the postage rates have increased from \$90.00 a month to \$200.00 a month.

State Master Sehlmeier informed the members the State

Grange should have a duplicate of the film "The Grange Story" and presented a bill in the amount of \$276.00 for the duplicate film. A motion made by Brother Piper and seconded by Brother Mensinger to have the film "The Grange Story" duplicated. Motion carried.

Since the State Grange Gardener Raymond W. Beehler has been ill and a patient in the Veterans Home in Napa County, the subject of salary was discussed. A motion was made by Brother Mensinger, seconded by Brother Raines to pay a salary of \$20.00 (one month) to Raymond W. Beehler. Motion carried.

A letter directed to Thomas W. Olson, Jr., Attorney-at-law was read over the 'phone to Attorney Olson in regard to his employment as legal counsel for the State Grange. The letter met with Attorney Olson's approval.

The proposal to make Brother Whitley an honorary Deputy was discussed and approved by the members.

The following resolutions were read:

a. Resolution opposing open season on shooting hen pheasants and practice of drowning baby hen pheasants. In addition, quail and pheasant seasons be opened on same date—Sonoma County Pomona Grange No. 1.

b. Resolution regarding recreational fishing adopted by Newport Harbor Grange No. 776 and Sonoma County Pomona Grange No. 1.

c. Resolution regarding fishing for "Albacore" adopted by Newport Harbor Grange.

d. Resolution regarding conservation, propagation, and retention of adequate runs of King Salmon, adopted by Newport Harbor Grange.

e. Resolution regarding elementary and high school building costs adopted by Windsor Grange and Sonoma County Pomona Grange.

A suggestion was made to invite both candidates Attorney General Brown and Senator Knowland to speak at the State Grange Convention. Brother Raines made a motion, seconded by Brother Piper, Attorney General Brown and Senator Knowland be invited to speak at the State Grange Convention in October at Santa Cruz with the understanding they confine their remarks to their platform and no derogatory remarks to opposing candidates. Motion carried.

Meeting adjourned at 4:50 p.m.

### HOME ECONOMICS REPORT

Worthy Master, Officers and members of the California State Grange, Greetings:

The Home Economics Clubs numbering 341 subordinate and 44 Pomonas have proven worthy of the trust given them. Taking baskets as our theme there are 36 Pomona Baskets representing the Granges of each County on exhibit with produce of their County and handwork.

Their baskets are very educational, just a glance and one knows what each county produces. The "Meals for Millions" basket held \$762.09, a gift from the women of the Grange through collection of pennies for a year. This fund will help to alleviate hunger wherever found, administered through Cliftons of Los Angeles.

The Scholarship Basket March will establish a scholarship fund, this fund to be presented Women Students who show outstanding ability but need financial assistance to receive a college education to Cal Poly College. \$1,636.73 was realized.

Thirty district and Tri-county meetings have been held over the State reaching some 4,000 members and friends through the efforts of the Seven District Chairmen.

We as Home Economics members have been responsible for 1,144 new members so far this year. Last year membership goal of 2,000 members was met. We hope to reach this goal again this year.

A visitation to the Oregon State Grange Convention in June was promoted with Six District Chairmen, other State Officers and myself attending. A hospitality booth was maintained during the California State Fair for twelve days.

Each member of the Home Economics Club is reached through articles published twice a month in a special column in the California Grange News.

In September I attended a meeting with The National Home Economics Chairman and State Chairmen of six Western States in Portland, Oregon.

The educational loan fund has been the means of assisting three students this year with loans of \$800, \$500 and \$300.

We have placed over 9,000 Wisteria Hall Cook Books over the State.

In the National Grange Sewing Contest, 522 dresses were made, of this number 62 were entered by the ladies of Hangtown Grange.

Twelve achievement reports were received and one Pomona.

The results of the year were encouraging and the credit belongs in no small measure to the support the members of the H.E.C. have given the 1958 program.

This work has grown too large for one person; without the help and cooperation of the Seven District Chairmen we could not accomplish all that has been done.

During the past nine months the H.E.C. has earned \$155,979.00 and contributed to welfare projects the sum of \$23,456.00.

There have been many outstanding meetings held throughout the State. I sincerely thank one and all for their loyalty and cooperation. Without sincere workers no program can succeed. Also to the seven State Committee ladies, my thanks. This work would not be the success it is without their able assistance.

**FORTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT  
OF THE  
GRANGE INSURANCE ASSOCIATION OF CALIFORNIA**

Worthy State Master, Delegates, and Patrons:

The fiscal year, just closed, highly successful from the standpoint of written business and premium income was somewhat offset by an avalanche of fire and extended coverage losses during the winter and spring months. Notwithstanding the unusually heavy trend in losses, we are happy to report that we closed the year with substantial gains in our operating surplus funds and controlled assets.

By actual count, our office processed during the year, a total of 2,810 applications of insurance, coming from Grangers in 50 of the 58 California counties, thus bringing our inforce insurance up to \$42,631,253.00; a gain of slightly more than 16 per cent over the previous year.

Total premium receipts from September 1, 1957 to August 31, 1958 aggregated \$146,585.61. The Association's state controlled insuring code provides that we shall carry reinsurance with a secondary company on all risks in excess of a stipulated legal retention. This retention is defined as the margin of safety in ratio to the Association's admitted assets. Of the aforementioned premium receipts, we therefore, ceded \$30,356.93 to our reinsurer giving them a proportionate liability in risks so ceded. Business so ceded to the reinsurer yielded us a commission discount of \$11,220.23.

Total assets controlled by the Association as of August 31, 1958 were \$316,975.24 with a surplus of \$182,772.05. This figure represents our reserve held in trust for insuring members for operational costs and loss contingencies. Breaking the assets figure down into its various categories, we find that we had current assets of cash in the banks, and premiums receivable of \$50,122.36. Under our investment program we have a portfolio of U. S. Government Bonds, Mortgage Receivable, Preferred and Common Stocks divided between recognized leaders in the banking and in-

dustrial fields. At the fiscal period, the market value of all such investment holdings by your Association were worth \$247,595.27. They are quoted considerably higher today, as you well know, if you follow the current market trends. But, be that as it may, we are not inclined toward the idea of speculation, but rather, in terms of safe, sound investment of surplus funds. This past year, our dividend earning from invested assets in actual hard earned cash were \$10,979.33. We also control certain fixed assets as represented in our building, land, and equipment holdings having a fixed valuation of \$19,123.00 after depreciation.

In the loss department, as I have before said, we did experience a rather rough year, comparatively speaking, to prior years. The total outlay for adjustment of all losses was \$82,269.14, with fire loss absorbing \$74,681.25, extended coverage perils \$5,931.99, residential glass endorsements \$131.76, and hail storm losses \$1,524.14. Using our own personnel for making adjustments the field cost of handling all claims was \$1,830.08. Under our reinsurance contract terms, we recovered \$11,627.51 on the losses and \$224.33 of the adjustment expense. While we deplore the mounting loss trend, keeping in mind that no one, the insured or the insurer, profits from such tragedies, we can truthfully say that we glory in the fact that we, in some measure, were instrumental in saving a Granger some portion of each loss through our adjustment payments. We've just passed what is known as National Fire Prevention Week, in which the insurance industry nationally urges on all people to observe a few simple rules to avert or reduce the consistently higher trends in fire loss. Newspapers up and down the length and breadth of the land proclaim these rules and we all should have them tucked away in the back of mind. But, if we don't put them into actual practice, they go for naught. Therefore, as an insurer, we urge each and every one of you to go back to your Granges and set aside one night to talk about and plan for fire prevention. You thus will be individually and collectively contributing your bit toward reducing a national calamity.

Rate-wise, the Grange Association held its cost of insurance to Grangers at about the same level while competing insurers were scrambling to raise rates. We intend to keep rates within the bounds of reason insofar as it is consistent with loss trends, operational expense, and good business judgment.

The Grange Association is a firm believer in the merits

of conducting a good program of advertising, working on the theory that one has to "toot his own horn" if he wants to sell his services. Throughout this present year we have carried quarterly ads of one-half page size in your California Grange News. We also have helped support news issues by the Pomona Granges, of Tulare and San Diego Counties with ads contributed monthly. Large size calendars have been placed in all Grange halls. All told our advertising and promotion expense for the year ran to slightly over sixteen hundred dollars. We feel that we benefited greatly from this advertising in getting our story across to the Grangers of California, and with the concurrence of our policyholder members, we expect to continue this program in the new year.

Perhaps you know, but if you don't, I would like to tell you, that all insuring organizations, like retail outlets and other businesses, are rated for stability, financial worth, and appraisal of management methods so that their policyholders may acquaint themselves with full facts on their insurer. In the insurance industry, we have the Dunn's International Insurance Reporting Service whose sole function is to prepare and publish impartial and factual analysis of insurance company finances based on certified audit reports. January 1st of this year Dunn's gave us a rating of "A-plus", the highest obtainable. We are extremely proud of having been put into this top credit bracket. We have a supply at our lobby desk if you would like to read the full contents.

In closing this report, we want to publicly thank Grange policyholders for their continued support and good will to the Grange Insurance Association, in helping us to achieve the results as so clearly shown in our continuing growth. May we remind you one and all, that on Thursday P.M., just after the Memorial Services, we will hold our annual meeting. You are cordially invited.

#### **REPORT OF CALIFORNIA STATE GRANGE CREDIT UNION COMMITTEE TO CALIFORNIA STATE GRANGE CONVENTION**

The Grange Credit Union movement in California continues to expand. During 1958 two new credit unions were organized to serve our Grange members. Among them is the

Plumas-Sierra County Grange Credit Union with offices located at P. O. Box 1183, Quincy, Plumas, Sierra County, and the other The Sutter County Grange Credit Union.

All totalled we now have forty Grange Credit Unions in California. The State of California continues to lead all the states in the union in the number of Grange Credit Unions, the number of members affiliated with Grange Credit Unions and the amount deposited in the Credit Unions, together with the amount loaned out.

There is only one other state in the union, namely North Dakota, having more rural credit unions and in that particular state, the farm organization sponsoring the credit unions does not confine membership in the credit unions to members of the organization.

At the present time the Credit Union National Association is launching a program to organize more rural credit unions so that the farm population will be more adequately serviced than it has been in the past by credit unions. During the recent contraction of credit the Grange Credit Unions of California rendered valuable help to many Grange members who found themselves caught in the credit squeeze.

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## **ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CALIFORNIA STATE GRANGE YOUTH COMMITTEE**

Worthy Master, Officers and Members of the California State Grange, Greetings:

During the months of January and February 1958, a series of conferences for Youth Advisors were held at key points in the state. The object of these conferences was to create interest in Youth activity in the Grange and to increase attendance at the Youth conferences.

The Granges throughout the state were well represented at these conferences, and many more Granges organized Youth committees and sent representatives to the Cal Poly conference.

The theme adopted for the Cal Poly conference was: "Grange Growth and Advancement".

The college faculty, members of the panel discussion, treated the subject from many angles; thus giving the Youth many ideas to advance the Grange and to build membership.

In addition to the usual panel discussion by members of the college faculty, the California State Grange Master and all members of the State Grange Executive Committee conducted a symposium; thus giving the Youth Grangers the privilege of gaining knowledge, of Grange procedure, directly from those whose duty it is to conduct the business of the Grange during the time that the delegate body is not in session.

Also at this conference the Youth gave their usual fine exemplification of the first degree, thereby demonstrating their interest in Grange Ritualism.

As California is an extremely large state, and the distance from the northern part of the state to Cal Poly is so great, the idea was conceived that a second conference be held, during the summer, at a suitable location in the north.

Humboldt State College; being an outstanding college in the fields of forestry, conservation, fish and game as well as the arts, and being located conveniently for all Granges in the northern section of the state, was contacted and arrangements, similar to those at Cal Poly, were made for a conference in August 1958.

The theme for this conference was: "Responsibility".

Faculty members of Humboldt State College conducted an outstanding panel discussion on this subject; and again the

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State Grange Master and Executive Committee appeared and held a symposium for the Youth Grangers in the north.

The conference was well attended, more than had been estimated for a first conference. A fine degree team, made up of youth members from Northern Humboldt County, did an excellent job in conferring the first degree.

We wish to thank Cal Poly and Humboldt State Colleges for the wonderful co-operation and hospitality shown the California State Grange Youth Committee. Combining the themes of both conferences, "Grange Growth and Advancement and Responsibility", the California State Grange Youth Committee accepted the Responsibility to do something about Grange Growth and Advancement, and as a result the State Grange Youth program has doubled in this past year, as we now have a conference within reach of all Youth Grangers, and there has been a healthy increase in Youth membership and activity.

The dates for the conferences at Cal Poly and Humboldt State College have been made for 1959. At Cal Poly the conference will be March 22 to 26 inclusive; at Humboldt State College the conference will be a week during the month of July, the exact dates will be given later.

As a result of the northern conference a number of Youth Grangers are here who would not otherwise be taking an active part in the Youth conference here at convention. We are glad that some of them are in the fifth degree team and that some have taken part in the Youth program.

The Youth are thankful for the privilege of conferring the fifth degree again here at this convention. The team includes members from every corner of the state.

We sincerely hope that during this coming year that we can again double the Youth activity in the Grange; we are willing to accept that Responsibility and we wish to have the co-operation of every Granger in the state of California.

Our thanks to Sister Emma Michalk for her work on the Youth Committee, we are sorry to lose her. We extend our congratulations to her in her new office as Juvenile Grange Superintendent and wish her every success.

Farmers Insurance Exchange Report was given by Richard Garrod, Special Representative.

### **FARMERS INSURANCE REPORT**

Master Sehlmeier, Brother and Sister Grangers:

It gives me great pleasure to bring to you this report from the Farmers Insurance Exchange, which is the major company of the Farmers Insurance Group. Though this is the first time I have given this report, I am looking forward to this becoming an annual event in the future.

As most of you probably know, for a number of years the Farmers Insurance Exchange has contributed to the California State Grange, on the basis of 10 cents a year for each policyholder who is a member of the State Grange. Inasmuch as we presently have well over 40,000 California State Grange members who are policyholders of the Exchange, this contribution has run into a considerable sum. In the past, the major portion of this contribution has been in cash, with a part, however, held out for prize money in connection with farm safety contests and other contests. But in the year 1957, the entire contribution was made in cash, which means that the Grange had the opportunity of using the money as it felt best. In 1957, the Farmers Insurance Exchange contributed to the California State Grange the sum of \$5,068.71, which included \$500.00 in prize reserve held over from 1956.

In the year 1957 and the first part of 1958, the insurance business was a "rough go", just like a crop failure—more going out than coming in. I could use charts and figures which explain everything, but let's use a language with which we are all familiar. Last year was a dry year and everything burned up; this spring was too wet and we lost our cots and other crops. Being an Act of God, this situation was beyond our control. Well, in the insurance field we set rates which we felt would cover our losses and allow us a reasonable profit, but during the last few years the losses have been like the rain last spring, too much and too often.



The number of personal injury claims has steadily increased over the past two years. Some of this is because people are becoming more claims conscious, but the fact remains that people are having more accidents. The new cars have more horsepower; the road building has not kept up with the increase in the number of automobiles and, perhaps people are becoming a little more careless.

Now, to complete the picture; we all admire the fine new cars on the road today and their improvements over the past models. The low-priced car, with accessories, is approximately \$2,600 by the time it is paid for. This same type car ten years ago was approximately \$1,500. At that time, a car could be repaired at a reasonable cost. Damaged fenders, windshields, and so forth, cost very little, but now, just replace the windshield of one of our modern cars—\$125.00 is not unusual. Instead of a fender being replaced today, the whole side is replaced by skilled labor at \$4.00 to \$5.00 per shop hour. And with the new 1959 cars, who knows yet what they will cost to repair. Also, ten years ago wages were lower, and the commodities we grew on our farms and ranches sold for much less than they do today.

There is one other large outgo which could be compared with the culls and offgrades of farming: large jury awards and expensive legal defense. I am not saying that people should not be properly compensated when they are wrongfully injured, but insurance is a catastrophe loss proposition—not the cure-all for the carelessness of mankind. At the same time, if you and I, as the purchasing public, demand greater services and fancier cars, we will have to pay in proportion for these greater demands.

In the years 1956 and 1957, Farmers Insurance Exchange's surplus reserve was reduced about 9,000,000 million dollars even though they wrote \$11,000,000 in more premiums, which is exactly as it sounds—they lost money! With the average bodily injury claim cost in 1956 being \$573.00 and in 1957 \$645.00, what did this mean to insurance companies? Just this, insurance rates had to be raised so that capital reserves would not be depleted.

At the present time the picture looks better. There appears to be a leveling off in the number of accidents and the cost per claim. We hope this will continue so there should not be any need for further rate increases. What the future holds is entirely up to you, the driving public. The cost of insurance is definitely connected with the cost

of repairing wrecked cars, broken and maimed human bodies.

All these factors establish the insurance rates, so you can readily see it is the driving public which fixes the amount which you have to pay for your insurance protection.

### **AGRICULTURE—COMMITTEE RESOLUTION**

Substitute for Agriculture 1 and 2.

WHEREAS: the California State Grange headquarters in Sacramento has been cooperating with the work of the new statewide manufacturing milk committee, and

WHEREAS: this committee is trying to develop a marketing order for Grade B dairymen under the 1937 California Marketing Act so that the Grade B dairymen can improve his economic position,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the California State Grange continue to encourage and support the work of the statewide manufacturing milk committee and hopes that it will be successful in developing a marketing order for Grade B dairymen.

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### **8                      Conversion of Agricultural Surpluses                      Agri. 8                                          OAKDALE GRANGE NO. 435**

WHEREAS: Requesting President Eisenhower to reactivate the Riverbank Aluminum plant to at least in part so as to facilitate conversion of fruits and potatoes into industrial alcohol and to utilize such industrial alcohol into the National Defense effort; such as providing rocket fuel in the international race for control of outer space, and

WHEREAS: Our experimental rockets have long used industrial alcohol as their source of power. Rocket planes

utilizing alcohol as fuel have long held world speed records of over 2000 miles per hour; and rocket planes are now doing experimental research work in the National Defense effort, with special effort toward high altitude research as a preliminary to further conquest of space.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the California State Grange recommend by the conversion of such agricultural surpluses into industrial alcohol and its utilization in the National Defense, the well being of thousands of American fruit growers could be stabilized at income levels in line with the American standard of living. While the surplus portion of crops so converted could be a National safety factor in protecting the entire American nation, as well as that of the other peaceful nations of the world, in addition to serving as a possible deterrent to any possible transgressor nation.

**9                    Developing a New and More Accurate                    Agri. 9**  
**T.B. Test for Livestock**

**ESCALON GRANGE NO. 447**

WHEREAS: The tuberculosis testing program has shown a large number of reactors to the T.B. test during 1957 in the Escalon and Valley Home areas of San Joaquin and Stanislaus counties, said reactors varied from 10 percent to 50 percent of some herds, and

WHEREAS: Cattle owners in the area do not understand why there should have been such an increase in reactions when the previous T.B. tests indicated there were very few T.B. reactors in the area. (State Veterinarians) also could not understand the increase in reactors, and

WHEREAS: The tuberculosis test used in tuberculin acid fast reaction test, Dr. C. B. Bills DVM, veterinary supervisor for the Modesto office of California, State Department of Agriculture, Division of Animal Industry Livestock Disease Control made some tests of soils and drainage waters of the area and found bacteria or soil organisms that reacted to the T.B. acid fast reaction test. Said organisms were also present in the animals reacting to the T.B. test and said organisms were not tuberculosis bacteria, and

WHEREAS: Cattlemen in the area or other areas could suffer financial hardship because of losing valuable animals reacting to organisms other than tuberculosis, and

WHEREAS: The accuracy of this acid fast test is doubtful in this area,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the California State Grange request the California State Legislature to allocate funds to the University of California Veterinary College to do research work to either develop a new T.B. test that is more accurate or find a solution to the problem to avoid animals reacting to organisms other than tuberculosis.

**Increase Bond for Sale of  
Agricultural Products**

Agri. 10

**VALLEY CENTER GRANGE NO. 631**

WHEREAS: Dealers that buy and sell agricultural products are required by State law to carry a bond of only \$2,000, at a cost to them of about \$30,000 per year, and a yearly license at around \$40.00, and

WHEREAS: This small outlay of money invites men with little financial backing to enter the business of buying and selling farm products, sometimes to the sorrow of the farmer, and

WHEREAS: In Northern San Diego County an egg buyer picked up the eggs twice each week, paying for them the week following, as most egg buyers do, and after selling \$22,000 worth, paid off other debts with the money received and went into bankruptcy,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the California State Grange do all in its power to have this bond, that the dealer of agricultural products carries, raised from \$2,000 to not less than \$10,000.

**11 Change Method of Scoring Produce Exhibited at  
County and District Fairs**

Combined Agri. 11 &amp; 7

**GAZELLE GRANGE NO. 380**

WHEREAS: We believe that the present method of scoring the County and District Fairs is hurting the quality of the produce exhibited,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the California State Grange bring to the attention of the State Fair Board the percentage on the educational value be reduced to twenty per cent, and give a higher percentage of fifteen per cent to variety and thirty per cent to quality of agriculture produce exhibited.

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**55 Remedial Legislation on Farm Prices Agri. 12**  
**SONOMA COUNTY POMONA GRANGE NO. 1**

WHEREAS: The spread is growing between the low price the farmer receives for his product and the high price that the consumer pays in the retail market, and

WHEREAS: The spread is growing and the inequities remain as in previous years, and

WHEREAS: The California State Legislature and the United States Congress have not as yet investigated this condition,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the California State Grange urge the incoming State and National Legislatures set up special commissions to investigate and adopt remedial legislation to correct this unjust situation.

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**56 Changing National Farm Program Agri. 13**  
**SONOMA COUNTY POMONA GRANGE NO. 1**

WHEREAS: At this time the small family farmer has practically no protection of a National Farm program with the exception of the wool growers, and

WHEREAS: the 1954 Wool Act of the Federal Government has worked very satisfactorily in the sheep industry, and

WHEREAS: this act calls for payments by the Federal Government where the wool price goes below parity, and for no payments if the price is equal to or above parity, and

WHEREAS: a program such as the 1954 Wool Act can be applied to other farm commodities,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the compensatory payment program of the 1954 Wool Act be applied to other farm commodities by legislative action of the United States Congress, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a rigid limit be placed upon payments made to any one farm under such a program.

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**57 Objections to Contract and Agri. 14**  
**Vertical Integration Farming**  
**SONOMA COUNTY POMONA GRANGE NO. 1**

WHEREAS: The present trend of contract and vertical integration farming is growing rapidly in agriculture, and

WHEREAS: This type of farming denies the farmer any

voice in the marketing of his products and will curtail the effectiveness of farm cooperatives, thus preventing farmers from working together for their mutual benefit,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the California State Grange protest this dangerous trend and explore ways and means such as long term, low interest loans by the Government to bonafide farm co-operatives and associations to counteract this condition, and

BE IT ALSO FURTHER RESOLVED, the California State Grange request the California Legislature to make a further investigation of vertical integration and contract farming.

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**Domestic & Foreign Cotton Policy      Agri. 15**  
**FAIRFAX GRANGE NO. 670**

WHEREAS: Authentic cotton reports indicate a lack of confidence in our foreign cotton markets, and

WHEREAS: The Secretary of Agriculture and the politicians of the United States should realize that the yardstick for the cotton market the world over is set by the American cotton policy, and

WHEREAS: The policy now existing is and has been one of the greatest factors in our loss of export markets and has also left the market open to synthetics, and

WHEREAS: This policy has thrown thousands of mill hands out of work and in some cases has closed down cotton mills, and

WHEREAS: The uncertainty created by the American cotton policy has helped reduce the world cotton consumption, and

WHEREAS: This is a condition which has existed for a number of years and seems to be growing worse, and

WHEREAS: In order to have a stable market we must have a stable policy.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: that the California State Grange ask the National Grange to continue an investigation into the National cotton policy and foreign marketing situation to ascertain why such lack of confidence exists in the world market and to ask Congress to make every effort to eliminate such a situation.

WHEREAS: the California State Grange supported the State poultry promotion act, Assemble Bill No. II, when it was before the 1958 session of California Legislature, and

WHEREAS: poultry producers are currently voting in a state wide referendum on this poultry bill and the deadline for voting has been extended from October 15th to October 31st, and

WHEREAS: this proposed poultry promotion act appears at this time to be the best poultry legislation available, although it is recognized it is not a cure for all the ills of the poultry industry,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the California State Grange urge al lof its poultry producing members and all other poultry producers in California who are eligible to vote in this referendum, to cast a "Yes" vote and to return their ballots to the State Department of Agriculture on or before the October 31st deadline.

WHEREAS: puncture vine is a noxious weed that has spread throughout California, and

WHEREAS: mechanical and chemical means of control have failed toward eradication of serious noxious weed, and

WHEREAS: a biological control program is showing some promise

Department of Agriculture and California State Department of Agriculture to expedite this biological control program by supplying the necessary manpower and financial assistance and declaring puncture vine as a primary target for eradication.

## NEWPORT HARBOR GRANGE NO. 776

WHEREAS: There has been and is now controversy in the matter of conservation, propagation, and retention of adequate runs of King Salmon in the waters o fthe State of California, and

WHEREAS: These controversies generally evolve them-

selves into two segments, "commercial" and "sport", neither of which feel their actions are responsible for the present shortage of this specie of fish, and

WHEREAS: King Salmon can be successfully produced within the protection of hatcheries where dangerous hazards can be watched and eliminated, or at least, reduced to a minimum to enable the fish to mature to desirable size, and

WHEREAS: This situation has become so acute that special Committees have now been appointed by interested groups to function with the State Department of Fish and Game in an effort to provide some recommendation and feasible solution to the present difficulties, and restore this fishery to its high place in our recreational and commercial fields, and

WHEREAS: Discussion has been along the lines of reduction of the bag limits as a possible avenue of relief, and

WHEREAS: Further reduction of the bag limit would be antagonizing to people who fish for sport in view of the financial outlay for license, equipment, accommodations, etc., all of which add to the general economy of the area and the State, and

WHEREAS: The basic principles of the Grange provide for conservation of our natural resources and judicious application of restrictions whereby the public is entitled and able to enjoy these resources, but at the same time sufficient restraint enforced to make the law applicable to all participating in the use of the resources, whether commercial or recreational,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the proposal of Bodega Bay Grange for full operation of all present hatcheries, and enlargement of areas for the release of the King Salmon within certain protective areas against natural and man-made hazards as being a superior plan than stocking headquarters of the Sacramento River which has been State Fish and Game Commission policy, with cost of such operations financed jointly by all interested segments with the help of the State Departments jurisdictionally responsible, meets with the approval of the members of the Newport Harbor Grange No. 776,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the California State Grange, through its committee on Fishing, take an active part in all plans proposed and exert every effort toward a successful inclusion in future efforts for the conservation and propagation of the King Salmon.

14                      **De-Salting Sea Water**                      **Con. 3**  
                         **STANISLAUS COUNTY POMONA GRANGE NO. 21**

WHEREAS: Water is the crying need of, and the limiting factor in the development of certain sections of the State, and may prove to be the limiting factor for California,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the California State Grange urge the State of California to exert every possible effort to promote research in the field of de-salting of sea water.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the California State Grange lend its every effort to this end.

15                      **Repealing Sub-Section "e" of the 1939 Amend-**  
                         **ment**                      **Combined Con. 2, 4 and 6**  
                         **SAN JOAQUIN COUNTY POMONA GRANGE NO. 20**

WHEREAS: The California Supreme Court did on January 24, 1957 declare that subsection "e" of Sec. 9 of the Federal Reclamation Projects Act of 1939 was in conflict with the California State water law; thereby stalemating further development of the Central Valley Project until such conflict is resolved; and

WHEREAS: Said sub-section of said section of said law does provide that the Bureau of Reclamation may forever retain the water rights granted by the State to be held in trust for and returned to the landowners of the Central Valley Project; and

WHEREAS: Said sub-section is in conflict not only with State law but also with the intent of all Federal Reclamation laws enacted prior to the year 1939 and with specific provision of the Act of June 17, 1902, which says:

"Nothing in this Act shall be construed as affecting or intended to affect or in any way interfere with the laws of any State relating to the control, appropriation, use or distribution of water used in irrigation, or any vested right acquired thereunder", and "Nothing herein shall in any way affect any right of any State or any landowner, appropriator or user of water in, to or from any interstate stream or the waters thereof."

WHEREAS: Said sub-section is in conflict with a decision of the U. S. Supreme Court which declares that under Federal Reclamation laws water rights are "property rights

of the landowners, wholly distinct from the property right of the Federal Government in the irrigation works."

WHEREAS: Said sub-section directly conflicts with the published Legislative Policy and Program of the National Grange, which says:

"All Acts for the construction of federal projects should provide for the preservation, without impairment in any sense, of established individual water rights for irrigation and other agricultural purposes."

WHEREAS: It is evident that Sub-section "e" of the Reclamation Projects Act of 1939 changes for the worse the whole intent of all prior federal irrigation acts, that contracts drawn under it take from landowners invaluable, vested, property rights; is inimical to the public interest, and should be amended,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the California State Grange take action looking to such amendment.

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**16                      Federal Construction of Feather River Project                      Con. 5**

**STANISLAUS COUNTY POMONA GRANGE NO. 21**

WHEREAS: The people of the State of California are irreconcilably divided upon the question of the distribution of the water, as well as to the generation of the power of the Feather River Project; and

WHEREAS: It should be an integral part of the over-all State water plan,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the California State Grange oppose the State of California spending more money on said Feather River Project, but include same in the Federal Bureau of Reclamation's water development program.

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**18                      Opposing Partnership Plan                      Combined Con. 7, 8, 9, 10 and 13**

**STANITLAUS COUNTY POMONA GRANGE NO. 21**

WHEREAS: The State of California is torn by internal cleavage over the development of the State's water and power resources; and

WHEREAS: It appears that each faction has its own selfish interests at heart, instead of the general welfare of the State and all the people; and

WHEREAS: It is plain that the main objective in State development over Federal Bureau of Reclamation development of our water resources is to get away from the acreage limitation and publicly owned power;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the California State Grange reaffirm its previous stand that our water resources be developed by the Bureau of Reclamation on a multi-purpose plan, with both the water and power being developed and owned by the people, rather than a comparatively few shareholders in a so called private industry, and that we reaffirm our stand and support of the 160 acre limitation.

WE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the California State Grange oppose the partnership plan as proposed by the present administration, and do all in its power to defeat this spurious plan.

#### **Conservation of Pheasants**

WHEREAS: The shooting of hen pheasants being permitted in Sonoma and Marin Counties and other areas of the state has practically rendered these birds extinct in these areas, and

WHEREAS: There is at present a movement on foot by interested groups to have the Fish and Game Commission of the State of California replenish the supply from the State Game Farm, and

WHEREAS: It is apparent that the conservation of pheasants has been badly neglected resulting in needless slaughter and depletion of these game birds,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the California State Grange go on record as opposing open season on hen pheasants and exert every possible effort to effect a reasonable program of conservation of these game birds,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the quail and pheasant season be opened on the same date.

#### **Proclaiming Geysers a Natural Resource Con. 12** **SONOMA COUNTY POMONA GRANGE NO. 1**

WHEREAS: Last year our State Grange asked Governor Knight to proclaim the geysers a natural resource, for the reason that taxpayers' money had been appropriated and spent during the last 30 years to advertise them as the larg-

est natural water resource of their kind in the world, and he failed to do so, and

WHEREAS: Successful drilling and harnessing of steam wells by a private company is now an accomplished fact, and geyser stock has phenomenally increased in value during the last year. And the Pacific Gas & Electric Co. is now seeking a franchise from our Public Utility Commission to buy this steam for the generation of electricity in perpetuity, and

WHEREAS: Basic and fundamental issues are involved in this franchise, to wit: the taxpayers in the County of Origin have an inherent right in their own natural resources and this manifesto has been declared legal by Attorney-General Edmund G. Brown, also grubstaking the geysers for over 30 years as a tourist attraction—which overnight turns out to be a fabulous bonanza for two mining companies from Los Angeles. Furthermore, destroying the scenic beauty, and silencing the roar of our geysers which has been going on for centuries calls for compensatory benefits,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the California State Grange seek the classification of our geysers as a Natural Resource and Public Utility, thus placing them under the control of the Public Utility Commission, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: that the Public Utility Commission by legislation, if necessary, be required to protect to the fullest extent possible, in accord with the general public welfare, the economic and recreational interests of the counties in which these natural resources are located.

## EDUCATION

### 25 Support Proposition No. 2—State School Educ. 1 Building Aid

#### AMERICAN RIVER GRANGE NO. 172

WHEREAS: School-age population in the State of California has increased fifty percent in the last six years and continues to grow at the rate of 185,000 pupils annually, and

WHEREAS: Public schools in California now have more than 160,000 pupils on double session, and thousands more in overcrowded classrooms, and

WHEREAS: If equal educational opportunity is to be given to all, more than 5600 additional classrooms or approximately 370 new schools must be built each year, and

WHEREAS: Many local school districts have exhausted their bonding capacity and are financially unable to provide school facilities needed in their communities, and

WHEREAS: The people of California have consistently demonstrated their desire to develop and maintain a high quality of education for all the children of the State,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the California State Grange urge all California citizens to support Proposition 2 on the November, 1958 ballot, authorizing the sale of \$220 million in bonds for State school building aid to qualified districts.

**28                    Changes in School Construction Law**  
**Combined Educ. 2 and 4**  
**WINDSOR GRANGE NO. 410**

WHEREAS: Both elementary and high school building costs are entirely out of line with domestic and industrial building costs, and

WHEREAS: From present indications California will have to continue building schools for some time to accommodate the ever increasing number of students, and

WHEREAS: The California taxpayers are already heavily burdened with school and numerous other taxes,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the California State Grange adopt the following:

1. California State Department of Education prepare plans for construction which may be used for elementary and high school buildings to accommodate the maximum number of students the State Board of Education permits congregated in any one school, so that Trustees may choose a State prepared plan; and

2. Eliminate the present law that an architect must be hired for each school building and paid at the rate of 8 percent of the total cost of the building.

WHEREAS: The working class of people have to stretch their budget to afford a television, and

WHEREAS: A television is purchased to see programs which furnish entertainment, education, and news for the entire family, and

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the California State Grange go on record as being opposed to "Paid Television."

#### **COMMITTEE RESOLUTION**

#### **Education No. 7**

WHEREAS: the fast-growing population of California is imposing an increasingly heavy burden upon the state's institutions, namely, the state colleges, the University, the correctional institutions, the mental hospitals, and the Youth Authority, and

WHEREAS: there are presently enrolled in the state colleges and the University of California 94,000 full-time students, which number will be increased by 1966 to 215,000, more than double the present enrollment, and

WHEREAS: there are at present 46,000 in mental hospitals and 21,000 in correctional institutions, but there will be in 1959, 59,000 in mental hospitals and 31,000 in correctional institutions, and

WHEREAS: a constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of \$200,000,000 worth of bonds for a state building construction program (Proposition 3) will be on the November 4, 1958 ballot, and

WHEREAS: California has traditionally led in education, scientific and cultural development and must face the length of the times.

WHEREAS: During legislative sessions, both of Congress and the State Legislature, there are bills that are good as well as detrimental for farmers of which subordinate Grange members have no knowledge until they are passed, and

WHEREAS: Oft times our members could write or call on their respective legislators to influence their vote if informed of the committees that these bills were in, and their scheduled hearings,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the California State Grange send a news letter during legislative sessions containing pertinent information on pending bills directly to Pomona Granges that they might take immediate action, and work with District Deputies to keep the Subordinate Granges informed.

**35 Limiting Judgments in Automobile Legis. 1**  
**Accident Cases**  
**MERCED COLONY GRANGE NO 527**

WHEREAS: Motor Vehicle Insurance costs are increasing at an alarming rate, and

WHEREAS: Court awards in liability cases are "unrealistically high" thus causing liability insurance rates to increase "out of reason",

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the California State Grange ask that necessary research be instituted in an effort to make more realistic judgments.

**36 Controlled Burning Legis. 2**  
**CONTRA COSTA COUNTY POMONA GRANGE NO. 45**

WHEREAS: Many rigid laws on burning are being enforced, such as trash and incinerator, and

WHEREAS: The disposal of orchard prunings, grasses and stubble are non-injurious. Disposition other than by burning would create a great problem and incur added expense to rural populace, and

WHEREAS: The ash from such burning is beneficial to the soil, promotes better growing conditions, supplants fertilization, and

WHEREAS: The greatest percentage of toxic carbonaceous gases create the conditions that result in smog,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the California State Grange urge the smog control boards not to place restrictions on farm lands or rural areas on such burning, except as outlined or enforced by the rural fire districts.

**37                      Social Security Withholding Taxes                      Legis. 3**  
**PALERMO GRANGE NO. 493**

WHEREAS: Senator John J. Williams of Delaware has brought to our attention the shocking disclosure of what happens to the withholding of Social Security taxes, collected by business firms and corporations in the United States, and

WHEREAS: He reports that \$300,678,000 collected from employees in 1957 never reached the Federal Treasury. Acting Revenue Commissioner, O. Gordon Delk's estimate for 1958 may reach \$500,000,000. The number of defaulters for 1956 was 356,748 and for 1957 it reached 377,253. Adding the 1956 default of \$279,000,000, Senator Williams finds that over 1 billion dollars (\$1,000,000,000) has been retained unlawfully in the pockets of employers.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the California State Grange go on record to demand that all taxes when deducted from payrolls be paid to the government within the specified time.

**41                      Opposing the Proposed                      Legis. 7**  
**"Sacramento Metropolitan Area Advisory Committee Plan"**  
**NORTHERN HUMBOLDT POMONA GRANGE NO. 48**

WHEREAS: This is a system which will remove another right of the citizen to govern himself and put absolute control in the hands of a few, and

WHEREAS: We are unalterably opposed to the section proposed whereby through a Constitutional Amendment, this "plan" could be put into effect throughout the State of California, and

WHEREAS: The elimination of the 2/3 majority vote and adopting the simple majority system by constitutional amendment would be disastrous as far as the citizens of the State of California are concerned,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the California State Grange be directed to investigate this proposed plan to determine its effect on a State level.

**42                      Amendment to Short-Doyle Act                      Legis. 8**  
**MONTEREY COUNTY POMONA GRANGE NO. 17**

WHEREAS: In recent legislation enacted in Sacramento known as the Short-Doyle Act making funds available to counties on a fifty-fifty matching basis for the operation of child guidance clinics and psychiatric services, and

WHEREAS: These monies at present apply only to those cases which enter the services on a voluntary basis, and

WHEREAS: Many cases are necessarily channeled through the probation department and other law enforcement agencies, these cases being considered as not voluntary,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the California State Grange be requested to sponsor an amendment to the Short-Doyle Act which would make these funds applicable to those cases processed through law enforcement agencies.

**43                      Amendment to Election Code                      Legis. 9**  
**MONTEREY COUNTY POMONA GRANGE NO. 17**

WHEREAS: At the present time in California, where voting machines are not being used, the election officials are not permitted under the Election Code to count ballots until the polls are closed, which is 7:00 p.m. in the evening in most instances, necessitating a prolonged affair in tabulating ballots and the inability of making the election results available to the public. In order to correct this inadequate method of obtaining election results, the California State Grange presents the following resolution:

WHEREAS: Throughout the State of California there appears to be a growing demand from the press, radio, T.V. and the general public, for an earlier return of the election results on a state-wide basis, and

WHEREAS: Under the present method of conducting elections where voting machines are not used, the Board officials are not permitted to tabulate the results of the ballots until the polls have been closed, thereby consuming long hours after their closing and causing fatigue to the election officials and reducing the percentage of accuracy in the tabulations,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Monterey County Pomona Grange be requested to introduce or support the necessary Legislation at the next session of the Legislature at Sacramento which will make it permissible for the



THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the California State Grange recommends an analysis of this condition be made, and any raise in postal rates be on mail that may show a loss to the Postal Department.

**47 Investigate Extension Service Budget Legis. 18**  
**SAN LUIS OBISPO COUNTY POMONA GRANGE NO. 27**

WHEREAS: We have reason to believe the Extension Service costs the taxpayers of our County \$87,670.00 dollars. \$57,000.00 in salaries and \$30,670.00 for operation. The staff being the County Agent and Senior Home Economist with five assistants. Records show 1,065 requests for information in one year, which would make the cost \$82.33 per request.

WHEREAS: There are fewer farmers and more Extension Service personnel which seems to be a waste of the taxpayers money. The Service costing more than 5 million in the State of California.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that California State Grange obtain the cost of the Service per County and try to determine if the taxpayers are receiving their money's worth. Also that the Public be informed through the Grange News and other media of the findings of this investigation.

**57 Research Program for Cystic Fibrosis Legis. 15**  
**SONOMA COUNTY POMONA GRANGE NO. 1**

WHEREAS: Bill H. R. 12331 was introduced in the last congress by Congresswoman Knutson from Minnesota but was not passed, and

WHEREAS: This bill asked that the United States Government sponsor a research program for the disease of Systic Fibrosis which has a high rate of mortality in children, and of which there is little known,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the California State Grange support a bill for Cystic Fibrosis Research if it is re-introduced in the next Congress.

**Commercial Fish Gear Compensation Legis. 15-A**  
**NEWPORT HARBOR GRANGE NO. 776**

WHEREAS: the legality of a law passed in 1958 compensating the commercial fishermen of the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta for loss of their boats and equipment by reason of a previous law passed in 1957 removing them from

these waters as a conservation measure, has been placed in "considerable doubt" and

WHEREAS: a ruling of such "considerable doubt" has been handed down by Attorney-General Edmund G. Brown, questioning the constitutionality of the law of 1958 so passed, and

WHEREAS: the Attorney General states that he has received complaints against the payment of this compensation from sportsmen's clubs, and

WHEREAS: these commercial fishermen were removed from this inland fishing ground where they had earned their living for many years, under the pressure of sportsmen interests on the claim that the fish were being destroyed, were in danger of extinction, and that immediate conservation measures were necessary, and

WHEREAS: the removal of the commercial fishermen now gives complete freedom to sportsmen interests for the use of these waters and areas as recreational areas, and

WHEREAS: the investment of the commercial fishermen in their boats and equipment represents their savings and the implements with which to earn their living, and

WHEREAS: the comparison by the Attorney General of this equipment with "duck hunters' shotguns and big game hunters' rifles and ammunition" is unfair, unjust, and has no bearing on the legality of the compensation payment law—the feature now an issue, and

WHEREAS: the amount allowed by the Governor of \$350,000 in the budget against claims of \$594,000 is already far below the value of the equipment involved,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Committee on Fishing of the California State Grange call this matter to the attention of the 86th annual California State Grange Convention at Santa Cruz, and

DOES FURTHER REQUEST the office of the California State Grange to register a protest with the Attorney General against any reduction or possible interference with or elimination of this compensation payment, and in addition

FURTHER REQUESTS that until this question is resolved and the payment law of 1958 is out of jeopardy, and compensation duly allowed as provided by the law of 1958, that these commercial fishermen be allowed to resume and continue their livelihood of commercial fishing in the waters described in the law, without interruption, and that such commercial fishing shall be permitted until the compensa-

tion payments are made, and that the inherent and constitutional right to earn a living shall not be denied these people.

**59 Federal Construction of The North Bay Aqueduct Legis. 16**

**SONOMA VALLEY GRANGE NO. 407**

WHEREAS: The development and conservation of water by the State of California has been retarded by the inability of the Legislature to agree and pass enabling Legislation, and

WHEREAS: The Counties of Solano, Napa, Sonoma and Marin, failed to agree on the need for the North Bay Aqueduct, and

WHEREAS: Development by the Bureau of Reclamation would be financed by the Federal Government, interest free, to be paid back by the revenue received from the sale of the water, thus saving additional taxes that would otherwise be necessary.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the California State Grange request the North Bay Aqueduct be built by the Bureau of Reclamation, if possible.

**Include Guns in Fish and Game Code Legis. 16-A  
GRIDLEY GRANGE NO. 457**

WHEREAS: pellet guns, air rifles, and BB guns are not included in the fish and game code, section No. 2006 titled "Loaded Rifles or Shotguns" and

WHEREAS: pellet guns, air rifles and BB guns are capable of doing serious damage, and

WHEREAS: the above mentioned air rifles, pellet guns, and BB guns are not mentioned in the fish and game code, Section No. 3004, titled "Hunting near dwellings, etc."

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: that the California State Grange does request the State Legislature to amend Section 2006 and 3004 of the state fish and game code to include pellet guns, air rifles, and BB guns.

**Illegal Use of Narcotics Legis. 17  
STOCKTON GRANGE NO. 758**

WHEREAS: The Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks in the State of California have pledged themselves in a concerted effort to awaken lawmakers and fellow citizens to

the seriousness of the problem of the illegal use of narcotics, and

WHEREAS: The Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks in the State of California have pledged themselves to do something about it by actively participating in the campaign, and

WHEREAS: The members of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks have circulated petitions securing over 750,000 signatures, and said petitions demand that during the coming session of the California Legislature, the State Assembly and the State Senate respectively enact legislation to make mandatory a 30-year minimum sentence, without parole, for any person, convicted of selling heroin or other addictive drugs in a manner not permitted by law,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: that the California State Grange endorse this worthy project of Elkdom and assist in this crusade, which is worthy of the attention of every citizen of the state of California.

**Amendment to Bradley-Burns  
Uniform Sales Tax Act**

**Legis. 18**

**STANISLAUS POMONA GRANGE**

WHEREAS: the Bradley-Burns Uniform Sales Tax Act authorizes the levying by the various counties of a one per cent sales tax which is applicable within the incorporated cities of the counties as well as in the rural areas, and

WHEREAS: the failure of the act to provide for an equitable division of the monies collected under the law has resulted in a very unfair division thereof, and

WHEREAS: in many counties the overwhelming majority of the sales tax collected by cities is paid by rural residents, and

WHEREAS: it is contrary to democratic principles to pay taxes to any government under which the person does not live and vote,

NORTH FORK GRANGE NO. 763**

WHEREAS: The existing road across Oregon Mountain near Weaverville is a continuous hazard to travel by school buses transporting children to and from schools in Weaverville because of the following conditions, specifically:

1. The existing grade is greater than is accepted standard for roads of this type: creating hazardous conditions

during snow and rain-storms. There is, at many times, a fog condition on this route, creating an additional hazard.

2. There are, near the crest of Oregon Mountain, several mud and rock slide areas, that in spite of much expensive maintenance, have at numerous times prevented the school buses from reaching their destination.

3. This route, by reason of its steep grade leading directly into the center of Weaverville, creates additional dangerous conditions to Weaverville from heavy hauling vehicles in the event of brake failure, and

WHEREAS: This is at the present time a possible alternate route, following a safe water grade between Junction City and Douglas City, which will make a safe, all-weather route for traffic, eliminating the hazardous and at times impassible route now in use,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the California State Grange propose action be taken to reroute California State Highway No. 299 between Junction City and Douglas City with access road to Weaverville, eliminating the present conditions faced by our school buses.
