# TUESDAY, OCTOBER 20, 1987

The 115th Annual Session of the California State Grange was called to order at 8:00 a.m. in the Stockton Civic Memorial Auditorium, with Worthy Master David Austin presiding.

Grange was opened in the Sixth Degree.

The invocation was given by Worthy Chaplain Edna Cook.

Opening song, America The Beautiful.

Presentation of the Flag by Worthy State Flora, Rosemary Hansen. The Star Spangled Banner was sung by all.

# **MASTER'S ANNUAL ADDRESS**

#### SECTION A

#### I. Introduction

We are extremely happy to be here once again in San Joaquin County and the City of Stockton. This marks our fifth visit to Stockton, convening our 115th Annual Convention. One hundred years ago (October 4, 1887), W.L. Overhiser, Master of the California State Grange from Stockton, San Joaquin County, gave his annual address to a Grange delegation in Santa Rosa. What was at issue a century ago? Legislative influence

through the ballot box. Here is an excerpt from that address:

"State and national legislation can be so thoroughly controlled by this powerful army of voters that no unjust or burdensome laws can be enacted. The repeal of those of which they complain can be effected, and the passage of such laws as are necessary to the inauguration of an era of 'justice' and 'equality' secured. The founders of our noble Order did not do all they intended to be done, but they did more than any other set of men ever have done to advance the interests of the tillers of the soil and make it easier for us to fulfill the great purpose. If we want to do a great and good thing and get out of the old grooves and ruts, the sooner we set about it the better for us and for those who follow after us. I know of no grand invention, no noble reform, no peerless enterprise, no superb stroke of work of any sort, which was not started from a spark - in the fervent fires of youth."

Does that sound like a Granger Action Program?

After reading his address, I can see why Stockton has many success stories they can pride themselves with - like the unique texture of the Delta peat soil making a huge contribution to early California production agriculture. As the "mother of invention" was amplified with their past cultural practices, inventing "multiple" plowshares and Mr. Benjamin Holt inventing the Holt tractor, a "track-laying" wheel tractor nicknamed "caterpillar". Items like these gave way for new inventions for the prosperity of our American farmers and the defense of our great nation by inventing a machine used in World War I and World War II.

The struggles and successes of the "Port of Stockton" and its 1,000 miles of Delta waterways were influenced and guided by the Granger movement. We can all be proud of the Grange and of Stockton's pioneering accomplishments that has assisted in making our industry the envy of the

world.

# II. Agriculture

# A: State of the Industry.

After the worst five-year economic crunch on agriculture since the 1930's, there are signs of recovery. While the decline in California's agricultural economy affected all segments of the industry, the recovery

will not be nearly as widespread. The prosperity of growers, merchants and processors will depend on the segment of the industry with which they deal.

The factors that brought about the downturn in agriculture have largely been reversed: The value of the dollar has fallen below its 1980 level; interest rates, while beginning to inch up, are still at their lowest levels in years and world economic growth has reappeared. Many producers of California crops are beginning to benefit from these improvements. However, problems persist in those crops that are in surplus, such as grains, because of worldwide government subsidies.

The California Department of Food and Agriculture says exports plummeted from a peak of \$4.2 billion in 1981 to a \$2.9 billion in 1984 and an estimated \$2.8 billion in 1986. California commodities have become more affordable in 1987 with the dollar's decline, fueling increased exports of wine, kiwi fruit and citrus. Cotton and almonds have also turned around, yet nobody is willing to predict how many markets ultimately will be

reclaimed.

Perhaps the most encouraging aspect of today's market is that the supply and demand of many California crops appear to be balanced. Chronic oversupply has plagued agriculture and depressed prices. For the first time in years, many crops will be entering the marketing years with low carry-overs and stable demand. Coupled with low interest rates and a weak dollar, the situation appears to be encouraging.

Nationally, net cash income - the difference between cash receipts and cash expenses - could be in the range of \$48 billion to \$52 billion this year, edging to another record and perhaps signaling a general recovery in the nation's troubled agriculture sector. Farmland values could also stabilize in 1987, compared with an 8 percent decline last year. Despite recent improvements, farmers trying to pay debts taken on when land prices and interest rates were higher are still having financial difficulties.

# B. Trade

America's agriculture is the most productive on earth and the sales of farm products from California farms and ranches leads the Nation for the 36th consecutive year. California's agricultural industry exports more than 40 percent of its total production while America's share of world exports has been steadily declining, down more than \$36 billion since the beginning of the 1980's.

The Uruguay Round of negotiations under the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) began early this year. The trade talks are an important vehicle for trade liberalization particularly on such issues as agricultural subsidies. While American farm interests complain about the European Community's subsidies and import barriers, Europeans are pointing to our massive export subsidies which have recently been added to our long-time use of production subsidies. The reduction of agricultural subsidies must be given a high priority in GATT negotiations,

to which the United States, EC members and 79 other countries are signatories. However, we must proceed with caution and not sacrafice

our family farms in the process.

A major package of trade legislation is likely to emerge from a conference committee of the 100th Congress. The trade deficit is expected to shrink by about \$35 billion in 1987, down from 1986's record breaking deficit of \$170 billion. Congress will be looking not only for a reduction in imports, but also an increase in exports. If the U.S. export performance fails to improve, there will be strong demands for greater overseas market access and possibly even retaliation. One such provision, known as the "Gephardt Amendment", would make retaliation mandatory against trading partners that have large trade surpluses and that impose trade restrictions on U.S. exports that we determine are unfair. We must not be tempted into thinking that protectionist or retaliatory measures are in the best interest of agriculture. Agriculture's continued increases in productivity is the key to restoring our competitiveness and regaining our markets.

There are a number of measures before the California Legislature and Congress that deals with export promotion. One such measure would increase the funds available for the Targeted Export Assistance Program (TEA) which helps U.S. producers finance promotional activities for U.S. agricultural products disadvantaged by the unfair trade policies of competitor nations. In California, overseas trade offices are providing marketing services to promote the sale of California's products in that country. These measures are intent on getting the message out that California and U.S. products offer unsurpassed quality, not enhancing the price and therefore, appear appropriate until more substantial measures can be adopted by all trading countries to level the playing field and return to fair trade.

#### III. Conservation

### A. Proposition 65

Proposition 65 "The Safe Drinking Water and Toxics Enforcement Act of 1986" was approved by the voters on November 4, 1986. The Governor has designated the Health and Welfare Agency to serve as the lead agency responsible for the implementation of Proposition 65. The Health and Welfare Agency will also serve as the leader of the "Cabinet Working Group" which will consider recommendations made from the 12-person Scientific Advisory Panel when advising the Governor on appropriate state actions to implement the initiative.

The Health and Welfare Agency has issued a set of Interpretive Guidelines to reflect the Agency's current interpretation of the Act. Con-

sider the following:

★ Clear and Reasonable Warning - identifies methods to be used to provide proper warning for consumers, environmental exposures and oc-

cupational exposures to a listed chemical;

- ★ Discharge of Water clarifies that irrigation water that travels across and through a field which picks up listed chemicals in a greater concentration than when it was received may not be discharged;
- ★ Naturally Occurring Substances in foods, do not require warnings for "exposure" nor does drinking water which meets state standards;
- ★ Detectable Levels for Discharge are defined by utilizing the reporting limits for chemicals in drinking water analysis administered by the Department of Health Services. However, limits now set at parts per billion could be set at parts per trillion as technology is developed;
- ★ Methods for Establishing Safe Use would be generally the same as those used to set safe drinking water standards. For example, if the level of a given chemical from the point of discharge (pipe, property line, etc.) is low enough to allow ingestion of two liters per day of water taken directly from the effluent stream and still convey insignificant risk, then such a discharge level would likely be judged a safe use.

There has been and still remains considerable controversy over which chemicals should be covered by Proposition 65. The Governor originally designated 29 toxic substances that were known to be human carcinogens. A lawsuit filed on behalf of a number of environmental groups has since prevailed, expanding the list to include toxics that also cause cancer in laboratory test animals.

The placement of a chemical on this list and therefore under the heavy regulation of Proposition 65 should be done so only with the best scientific facts available. The paramount issue with the initiative is determining which chemical should be used as "bench mark" for risk assessment relative to cancer-causing chemicals in humans.

### B. State Water Project

Agricultural water users in California will come under increased scrutiny and can expect requirements to decrease water consumption through conservation and increased irrigation efficiencies.

The State Water Project, a complex system of dams, canals, reservoirs, aqueducts and pumps, transports large quantities of water from the Delta to agricultural users in the Central Valley and residential users in Southern California. Political interests from agriculture and the south have been trying to increase the carrying capacity of the project, citing contracts signed in the 1960's for the state to deliver more water.

These efforts have repeatedly been defeated by Delta/Bay interests, who claim that the water shipments have already harmed the ecology of the bay and the delta and that more shipments will do even more damage. This year was no exception as lawmakers defeated two plans aimed at increasing shipments of Northern California river water to the Central Valley and Southern California.

The California State Grange, through the help of its Interim Water Committee, adopted policy to strengthen its long-standing policy to preserve the water quality in the delta while providing adequate water supplies to valley growers and all citizens of California. The Grange supports diverting high winter water flows south of the delta as a means of increasing water yields while maintaining summer delta water quality.

Research and development of efficient irrigation practices and equipment must be given the highest priority. It is in the best interest of all Californians that growers have available, affordable high-tech irrigation equipment and management skills to raise high quality crops that can compete in the world marketplace. In addition, high efficiency plant facilities and equipment should mitigate the possibility of hazardous water discharge. And perhaps most importantly, this necessary research will reduce the amount of water used for agriculture and will greatly reduce any environmental burdens to our greatest renewable resource -WATER.

#### IV. National Welfare

### A. Immigration Reform

California growers spent a very anxious year being concerned about the prospect of severe labor shortages this harvest season. Many problems arose because of the way the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) implemented the new Special Agricultural Workers (SAW) program.

The SAW program was enacted as part of the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986 to assist growers in getting a stable, legal work force and alien farm workers seeking legal status. It was designed to provide additional agricultural workers to harvest California's perishable crops under conditions making the exploitation of foreign workers less likely, and dependence on undocumented workers unnecessary.

The shortcomings on the implementation became obvious when INS proposed that all Special Agricultural Worker applicants who were not in the U.S. must apply at a single processing center n Mexico City. A coalition of western agricultural interests, including the Grange, advanced a positive four point program to relax the seasonal requirements that includes streamlining the application process for farm workers; abolishing the May 1 cutoff date for farm workers to have been in the United States; allowing presentation of applications at the border; and conducting an extensive public relations program about legalization in both the United States and Mexico.

In June, the INS announced that the documentation requirements were being relaxed and that another processing center would be opened at Calexico. This was a good starting point but does not go far enough. With California's specialty crops beginning to climb out of the depression that has plagued them in the recent past, the industry deserves help - not hinderance - from the federal government.

### B. Farm Credit

Adverse economic factors affecting California Agriculture continue to have a severe impact on farm credit.

California bank loans to agriculture were 26 percent lower than in 1986. During the same period, the Farm Credit Banks of Sacramento reported that loans from California Production Credit Associations also decreased by 25 percent. The reduction in loan volume is the result of several important factors, including the overall reduction of demand for agricultural credit and declining farmland values which reduce collateral values and farmers' net worth.

Non-performing agricultural loans for all types of lending institutions increased while the percentage of year-end ag loan charge-offs remained the same as in 1984. While banks take possession of farmland only as a last resort, the number of foreclosures increased to 330 in 1986 representing a 114% increase over the amount of foreclosures in 1984.

Congress is attempting to come to the aid of the Farm Credit System, a nationwide network of cooperatives owned by farmers to provide credit. Some of the proposals before Congress include provisions that are clearly not in the interest of California Agriculture. California would like to maintain the present democratically decentralized character of the FCS and is opposed to any moves for more centralization.

Under current FCS rules, farmers-borrowers automatically become "stockholders" which is really just a kind of "points" process in which the cost of the loan is increased by the stock amount which farmers get back when they pay off the loan. Unfortunately, with the FCS losing money, that "stock" becomes liable for the losses, pushing farmers to take profitable loans out of FCS into the commercial credit system, depleting FCS's income and capital.

California would favor a system wherein all FCS banks would go to the general debt market on the basis of their own individual performances. In turn, it would be hoped that instead of foreclosures or a big fire sale, FCS would engage in an extensive restructuring of the non-performing loans, writing some of them down, lengthening the payment terms and bringing them back into a cash-flow mode.

#### SECTION B

### I. Condition Of The Order Membership

Membership has continued to decline to a level of 35,071 since June 1983 or 1,913 average per year for the last four years. Although our recruiting is significant, our retention of members seems to elude us. Listed for you is a summary of our losses and gains prepared by our Worthy State Secretary (see charts I and II).

As you can see, suspension relates directly to reinstatement. This chart shows that 46 percent of our losses are suspended members. One half of

one percent of our gains are reinstated from that suspended list. If we would have retained 50 percent of those suspended members each year since 1984, our budget would have a surplus this year of \$32,000 instead of a deficit of \$41,000.

It is clear we need to attempt a recruiting effort to reinstate those we suspend. If not, then we need to take advantage of the recruiting tools available from the membership department.

### Leadership

Your California State Grange leadership believes we have the recruiting tools to bring a new prospect to be obligated, but what then? What happens at that new prospect's first meeting? Do we first read the minutes, pay the bills, have refreshments and socialize? Can we expect that person to be an active member? We can blame everything from

apathy to zeal.

We believe that our way out of this vacuum is to have a visible "cause" and tangible benefits and services. Benefits and services that truly serve the needs of our membership and a cause that provides us with a goal we, as Grange members, can attain. When this occurs, we have a feeling of pride when we ask spmeone to join our Grange. When was the last time you asked someone to join the Grange? Weren't they excited to hear you didn't accomplish anything at your Grange meetings, that your Grange was not active in any community service and that the benefits and services that once lured new members are no longer exclusive to Grange membership?

### Granger Action Program

Enclosed in your resolution packet is a pamphlet describing our "Granger Action Program". This is a broad-based program that can be used to knock on your neighbors' door and get your neighborhood involved. It is a cause you can use as a Grange member to influence your state legislators and Congressmen and interest others in joining the Grange as well as providing a community service. You can be privy to the legislative process from your armchair as a voice, not as one, but as a Grange membership.

As the budget will allow, we can provide you with Political Action Committee (\$) transfers, bill tracking, legislative promises and voting records. It is a vital tool for us as a general fraternal farm organization and our grassroots policy development. It gives leverage in numbers in-

stead of dollars.

### Committee On Affiliates

The interim "Committee On Affiliates", chaired by Brother Leo Bergeron, is composed of business people and dedicated Grange

members. They have designed a "Grange Benefits and Services" manual, which explains (in simple form) your Grange benefits and services. A person will be appointed in each Subordinate Grange and will be responsible for its contents and possession. Everything you (especially new members) need to know about a Grange affiliate and a contact person and/or phone number will be provided. Our sincere appreciation for the financial support of approximately \$1,000 from our affiliates. We had hoped to introduce the "manual" at this session, however cost estimates have created a delay.

#### SECTION C

#### II. Good Of The Order

Let's Get Organized!

This past year, we lost eight Grange charters to consolidation. This means we transferred their membership into the nearest Grange as required by Grange Law.

This past year, we organized two new Subordinate Granges with a third Subordinate Grange to be organized on the "drawing board." Please recognize the delegates from Smith River Grange #823 (Del Norte County) Harlan Ziegler, organizing Deputy, and Palo Verde Grange #824 (Southern Humboldt County) Pearl Zeck, organizing Deputy.

I am asking our Deputy State Masters to give us the name of a community that could support a new Subordinate Grange. The California State Grange will provide materials and assistance in the organizing process.

After studying Grange history, reviewing trends, plotting numbers and second-guessing nature, three things stand out as to the future of this organization. The first is to recruit and continue to blend all ages of our membership. (Is that happening in your Grange?) The second could be to sponsor a young family Grange (with kids) and let them "do their thing" by majority rule (the way the majority of you did). The third is to organize new Subordinate Granges in new communities. The three items I have just listed can be obtained by understanding our cause, packaging our benefits and services that truly serve a need and by marketing the Grange.

### Ritual

At the National Grange leadership conference held this year, our National Master emphasized the need to review our Grange ritual and to recommend changes for our changing society. I am requesting our Good Of The Order Committee to consider a resolution from California to have the National Grange, when and if they make significant changes in the ritual (especially the degree exemplification), to offer it as an option and not a mandate for our Subordinate Granges.



Since January, 1983, the Consumer Price Index (C.P.I.) has risen 14.4%. Just to stay even with inflation, State Grange per capita dues would have to be \$9.73 today. To put it another way, the work you did for one dollar in 1983 would only earn you 85 cents today. Your State Grange leadership has held the line against inflation, for in 1983 dollars, expenses for 1987 are nearly \$13,000 less than that spent in 1983.

#### **Finances**

As you know, we will be entertaining resolutions this year regarding a per capita dues increase. The Budget Committee will provide more details this afternoon; however, I would like to provide everyone with the following illustrations which reveals our membership as it directly relates to our income base (see charts III & IV).

### State Master's Salary

In view of our California State Grange By-Laws requiring any salary adjustments for State Officers to be made on the biennial election year and prior to the election of officers, I am compelled to make this request.

Your State Master has had no salary adjustments since the Redding Convention in 1983 and since there will be no other salary adjustment period until October 1989, I am asking you and the Good of the Order Committee to consider an increase matching the Consumer Price Index (inflation) rise for the last four years and compensation for additional duties.

As the Grangers Business Organizaton attempts to dissolve this year, transferring title to the California State Grange, it is going to require more management responsibilities of the Master of the California State Grange. In view of this and my domestic obligations, I am asking you to consider a salary increase of 25%. An adjustment of 15% for inflation and 10% for additional responsibilities. This would elevate my salary you adopted in 1983 from 25,020 to 31,275 (before taxes).

### Conclusion

In addition to our legislative cause, I firmly believe there are programs and services out there that should be *exclusive* to Grange membership. I would like to pursue this avenue for future recommendations to the

delegate body.

I am challenging every Subordinate and Pomona Grange Master to have a planning meeting (with your officers and interested members) as soon as you can. Something should be planned for each month of the year. What do you, as members, expect to accomplish this year? Ask for volunteers or appoint committees to accomplish these goals. Let your membership know by mail or through the Calfornia Grange News of your plans.

Your Grange should have a resolution committee appointed at all times to present issues, by statement or resolution, at each meeting. In addition to "doing something," it will give your members a feeling of accomplish-

ment after a Grange meeting.

Remember the story, "you can lead a horse to water but you can't make 'em drink?" Currently we can lead a prospective member to the Grange water trough, circle it a few times, but to have them take a drink must be

done by you at your Grange meetings.

Please remember there are only two ways to join our Grange. To ask or to be asked. The next time you ask a person to join the Grange, be prepared to say, "You should join my Grange because..." and have a good list of reasons why.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT

Worthy Master, National Representative, State Officers, Guests, Fellow

Grangers:

First of all I would like to welcome everyone to the 115th Annual Session of the California State Grange. I sincerely hope that everyone attending this year's convention will not only have a good time, but come away with a better understanding of the workings of the California State Grange. It is through your participation that Grange Policy is formulated at State level, and in some cases, it is a stepping stone to possible National Grange Policy.

Before I go into the Treasurer's Report, I would like to express my appreciation to a wonderful lady and an outstanding bookkeeper. Pat Meece is not only a pleasure to work with, she is also a dedicated Granger in the

truest sense of the word. Through her efforts and dedication, she has made my job an easier one.

For the last two years I have come before this body proposing a deficit budget that the Budget Committee felt was necessary and workable. I also explained that the deficit was a deficit on paper only, and that the State Grange would do everything in its power not to overspend its income. Last year I was able to tell you that we achieved this goal. This year we did not.

The income for the year ending June 30, 1987 was \$499,907.00 with expenditures of \$528,862.00. This has resulted in a net deficit of \$28,955.00.

There is no set or pat answer for this deficit, as the reasons are numerous (these will be discussed during the course of this convention). The most prominent reason is the decline in membership over the past four years, without an increase in dues to compensate for the lost revenue.

In closing, I would like to say that your State Master, his Staff and the Executive Committee have done their best to stretch the Grange dollar, but you cannot possibly operate in 1987 on what the same bought in 1983: it simply cannot be done!

### SECRETARY'S ANNUAL REPORT

Worthy Master, State Officers and Members of the California State Grange:

Best wishes from the office of Secretary. Once again we are gathered in the city of Stockton to hold our 115th Annual Session. Records show that we last assembled in your fair city in 1975 for our 103rd Annual Session.

Again, I want to express my sincere appreciation to all the Secretaries all over the state for their cooperation and assistance with the State Secretary's office and to thank them all for their many invitations extended to me during this past year.

Would also like to express my sincere appreciation to the Convention Chairman, Brother Manuel Luis, and all his committees and members who have given their services and made it possible to have a successful and productive Session in Stockton this year.

### **Billing Service**

Again this year the Billing Service has been renewed and offered as a 1988 Dues Service to all Subordinate Grange Secretaries. Updated forms with a separate invoice (dues notice) will be provided for each Grange member with a file card record, plus a receipt/membership card for the billing year. Each Dues Notice will indicate the amount of member's dues and return address of the Subordinate Secretary.

The Secretary's have a choice of a printed message or calendar of events inserted in the Dues Notice. Cost for the 1988 Billing Service will remain the same as last year ... 40¢ per member. DEADLINE for receiving requests for this service is NOVEMBER 1, 1987.

### Membership Recruiting Program

This incentive program, instituted in 1984, has again been offered to all members for credit towards their 1988 dues. Each member who recruits a new member and signs the "Recommended By" (1st signature on application) will receive a \$5.00 Credit Memo against their 1988 Dues (effective for the March 31, 1988) quarter. The member has the option to deduct this \$5.00 amount from his or her Annual Dues or pay in full, giving a contribution of \$5.00 to their Subordinate Grange.

The member will also receive either a "Member Builder" badge with an '87 cluster or an '87 cluster to put on the badge they received last year.

The program is planned for each year through the 1988 National Convention, which is being held here in California.

#### Membership

Grange membership reported to the National Grange as of the June 30, 1987 quarter was 35,071 with 287 Subordinate Granges reporting. (496 of those members are Golden Sheaf Members.) This showed a Loss of 636 members for the quarter. Total of 39 Affiliate Members were recorded for the 6/30/87 quarter (not included in the above figures).

For the 1986-1987 Grange Year there was a loss of 1,157 members. Again most of these losses were by Suspension (non-payment of dues) and by Withdrawal.

The records show that our membership loss has lessened compared to the 1985-1986 year, however, we must continue our efforts in building and expanding our Grange membership for today and tomorrow ... we must continue to have our goals and objectives and know how to implement them.

### MINUTES OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE CAZIFORNIA STATE GRANGE 1986 - 1987

October 20, 1986

Approved 12/5/86

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 AM at the Bakersfield Civic Auditorium by the Worthy State Master David Austin.

Roll Call showed all members present: Bob Clouse, Stephen Tait and Joe Victorine. Brother William Booth, State Grange Overseer, was unable to attend the convention. In the absence of the State Master's Secretary, the minutes were taken by Brother Jay Hartz.

The minutes of the August 22, 1986 meeting were approved as read.

Ukiah Autumn Leaves, Inc: The minutes and financial statements for the last three meetings of the Ukiah Autumn Leaves, Inc. were reviewed and discussed by the Committee.

Booster Barrel Program: The question of continuing the Booster Barrel Program of the California Grange News was discussed. Editor Jay Hartz explained that the program had not been in effect for a full year and that toward the end of the period, more entries were received and several ads had been sold as a result of the program. It was voted by the Committee to extend the program for one more year.

First World Livestock Producers Conference: A request from the National Grange regarding the State Granges to provide representation to the World Livestock Conference in Colorado was discussed. The consensus was that the benefits gained would not justify the expense of sending a representative from California. It was also noted that the Grange would be well represented and that the California State Grange could be kept in-

formed of developments through the National Grange.

Pre-Paid Legal Services: A pre-paid legal services plan that had been presented to the State Master was discussed. Brother Clouse was familiar with this type of "legal insurance" and explained what these plans usually offer. He suggested that a plan of this sort be tailored by the company and designed specifically for Grange members may be worth looking into. The Committee directed the State Master to persue the possibility of a specifically designed program for the Grange.

Keyes Grange Update: The Committee was brought up to date on the developments in the foreclosure action on the sale of the Keyes Grange

property.

The Committee was advised that Welcome Grange had sold an acre of land they had originally purchased with the thought of building a Grange hall on. The State Master explained that he had advised Welcome Grange not to accept an offer they had received as it was considerably below market value. Subsequently, the property was sold at fair market value. This transfer of title is being handled in the same manner as the sale of a Grange hall and property, with the State Grange setting up a trust fund and acting as administrator.

A question was raised as to the source of funds disbursed for legal services or other fees which may be incurred in the course of administering these trust accounts. It was explained by the State Master that all payments of this sort were made from the individual account of the trust fund that incurred the debt and no money was disbursed for these expenses from the general fund of the California State Grange. A resolution

regarding an administration fee is being presented this year.

Grangers Business Organization (GBO): The possibility of the California State Grange receiving title to GBO properties was discussed. A new lease agreement between the California State Grange and GBO looks evi-

dent as dissolution of GBO gains momentum.

American Flag - Junior Granges: The State Master was directed at a previous meeting to obtain estimates on small American Flags. After full consideration, the Committee voted to purchase a supply of American Flags suitable for presenting to new Junior Granges as they receive their Charter.

GWA - Miscellaneous Account: Sister Joy Beatie joined the Committee at this time. She explained the accounting statement. The Committee accepted the statement and suggested that in the future, the "miscellaneous" section of the statement contain more detail. Sister Beatie agreed and will comply with this request.

Sister Beatie stated that she had just recently been informed that the Fairfax Grange Orchestra would be charging \$250 for performing at Monday night's reception. She stated that \$50 was usual and had not been

prepared for this bill. She also stated that a tentative offer to pay the fee had been received. The Committee advised her to persue the offer, however: they would back whatever action on the matter she made. In the absence of Brother Booth, Overseer, it was suggested that no Response be given at Monday night's reception. Instead, the Master would incorporate the Response into his remarks.

Internal Audit: The internal audit received from the CPA was discussed. The items on the report were referred to the State Master to consult with the appropriate California State Grange Staff members. The results of the discussions to be reported on at a future meeting.

Swank Case & Medical Foundation: The State Master advised the Committee that the GIA-Swank/Jones case had been closed with no action be-

ing required by the California State Grange.

The Medical Foundation case was also discussed. A balance of \$600 was due. The Committee asked the State Master to look into the fiscal advisability of initiating small claims action and to report back at a future meeting.

State Officers' Salaries - Review/Resolution: The Committee reviewed the Officers' salaries in accordance with the recommendation of the 1985 Good of the Order Committee. No change was deemed necessary at this time as it was discussed at a previous meeting.

Glen Avon Grange Update: An escrow update on the sale of the property of Glen Avon Grange was given by the State Master. The sale was being handled with the assistance of Red Carpet Realty. As the contract called for a two-year payment plan, the question of "negative improvement" protection was raised. The State Master explained that a clause had been added to the contract to the effect that no devaluation action could be taken without approval of the Grange.

Berry Creek Grange: The certified letters from Berry Creek Grange were discussed. The State Master said he would correspond with the

Grange outlining Grange Law and proper procedure.

1986 Convention Program: The 1986 Convention Program was reviewed with minor changes being made. It was voted that the Convention Program be presented to the Convention Delegates for adoption.

Standing Rules of the Convention: The Standing Rules of the Convention were reviewed and adopted by the Committee as printed. The Stan-

ding Rules will apply to the 1986 Convention.

Master's Annual Address: The State Master reviewed his annual address with the Committee.

Budget: After a short discussion regarding the positive efforts of the Budget Committee, the meeting adjourned at 9:30 AM.

The next meeting of the California State Grange Executive Committee will be October 25, 1986 in Bakersfield.

Ukiah Autumn Leaves, Inc.: Brother Victorine gave a report of the meeting between the Executive Committee and Ukiah Autumn Leaves, Inc. and the Vacaville Autumn Leaves held October 23, 1986 in Bakersfield. It was voted to replace Brother Bob Clouse on the boards of both Ukiah and Vacaville Autumn Leaves with Johnny Squire. It was voted to include the minutes of the meeting in the Journal.

Resolution Amendments: The motion passed by the Convention Delegates to have all future amendments to resolutions put into writing and delivered to the Secretary's station was discussed. It was suggested that the motion be made a part of the Standing Rules of the Convention and marked with an asterisk (\*) so that it could be explained to the

delegates at the next convention.

GWA Director: Sister Joy Beatie joined the meeting at this time. She reported that the GWA had decided to donate the proceeds from the Women's March 50% to the City of Hope and 50% to the Special Olympies.

She stated that the California Bear would be the "theme" for 1987 and 1988 contests, with the entries being used as gifts and centerpieces at the

1988 National Convention in Redding.

Sister Beatie reported that Norma Wilkins had been named a new Region 9 director, replacing Lela Hughes. She also stated that the GWA would like to make a quilt as a gift for Dorthy DeAvila in recognition of the many cash donations she has made to the Grange.

A 1987 fundraiser for the National Convention was discussed. The State

Master reported that the Junior Department was considering a project and that there was a possibility that all departments would work on a project jointly. A strategy meeting would be scheduled in the near future.

Sister Beatie was then excused with "thanks" for her efforts over the

past year. After a brief discussion, her report was accepted.

It was voted that Brother Stephen Tait be made the auditing member of

Convention Registration: Registration procedures were discussed with the aim to streamline the process. The minutes of the October 20, and October 25, 1986 meetings as well as the Ukiah Autumn Leaves, Inc. and Vacaville Autumn Leaves meetings were approved as clarified.

Ukiah Autumn Leaves, Inc.: The minutes and financial statement for the month of September 1986 were reviewed and discussed by the Committee.

State Grange Lecturer's Report: Brother Runyon submitted a summary of the Lecturer's Reports for the Third Quarter of 1986. The number of Granges presenting programs on Junior Granges is increasing. The number of Pomona Granges reporting were up, but the number of Subordinate Granges reporting were less than last quarter. It was stated that the Deputy State Master Field Evaluation Report will assist in getting the Granges to file the reports as required by each department.

James Ranch Grange: The State Master discussed the letter received from James Ranch Grange regarding the interest on the sale of their property. The State Master was instructed to: 1) have an attorney and C.P.A. make an interpretation of our Grange Law regarding the mortgage payment interest, and 2) have the National Master give the California State Grange a ruling on the matter. James Ranch Grange is challenging the wording in the letter written by the National Grange Master in 1984. The State Master will write a letter to James Ranch Grange stating our intentions.

National Grange Convention Update: The State Master gave an update on the recent conclusion of the 120th National Grange Convention. California was represented with a delegation of approximately 15 members. California fared very well at the National Session with many honors. Our congratulations to all the winners and all those who participated.

Joy Beatie - GWA Director: Sister Joy Beatie joined the Committee at this time. The proposed 1987 GWA Program was reviewed by the Committee. Sister Beatie explained that she is stressing, in the GWA Program, membership participation and promoting Grange leadership. In addition to our on-going programs, new contests this year will include "Christmas Tree Ornaments" and a "Stuffed Toy Bear Contest", with the entries into the "Bear" contest being used for the 1988 Women's Banquet as table decorations.

The 1987 Women's March proceeds are requested to be donated to the

City of Hope and Special Olympics. The GWA will again sponsor the Peter Marinoff Memorial Scholarships. Sister Beatie would like to present this 1987 program to the membership on a statewide conference schedule. It was voted to approve the 1987 GWA Program as presented.

Jay Hartz - Grange News: PIK Program Update: Brother Hartz joined the Committee at this time and gave a brief update on the "Payment In Kind" (PIK) program. To date, there are over 1,881 badges issued. This program will be in effect next year and will conclude in the Golden State in 1988.

FFA "Golden Harvest" News Update: Brother Hartz reported on this new endeavor between the California State Grange and the California Future Farmers of America Foundation (FFA). The California State Grange is sponsoring their first statewide newspaper. The California Grange News is providing the equipment and materials for producing the FFA "Golden Harvest" newspaper which is distributed to their 20,000 members every other month. The FFA has never had a statewide newspaper. The State Master showed the Committee the many letters of "thanks" and appreciation sent to he and Brother Hartz, Editor of the Grange News, from the FFA members throughout the state.

Journal of Proceedings: Brother Hartz presented two bids for the printing of the 1986 Journal of Proceedings. After full consideration, the Committee voted to accept the bid of Valley Color Graphics, Inc., of

\$2,903.

Dues Billing Update: An update on the 1986 billing service was given. A 40¢ per member fee is currently charged to each Grange participating in the billing service program. There has been 6,704 bills sent out for 37 Subordinate Granges participating. There were 30 manhours spent in mailroom and production labor and 60 manhours and computer hours in computer production and programming. After some discussion, Brother Hartz was instructed to perform a cost analysis for next year.

Junior Grange Promotion: The State Master presented a suggestion for a cookbook promotion. Since 1988 is the centennial of the Junior Grange and California is hosting the National Convention, to consider having the Junior Grange Director and the State Master sign copies of the cookbook,

the proceeds going to the Junior Grange Department.

Christmas Card Program Update: A Christmas Card Program update was given by Brother Hartz. There were 25,475 letters mailed to California Grange families. 5,965 responded they did not want the cards; of the 5,965 negative responses, 203 included donations to the Grange exceeding \$2,000. 19,510 boxes of cards were mailed representing 78%, or more than three-fourths of the Grange households. Thus far, a total of 161 additional boxes of cards had been sold to Grangers as of December 12, 1986. Brother Hartz will put a reminder notice in the Grange News and the actual figures as to where we stand with the program.

Committee on Affiliates: The State Master gave a brief update on the Committee on Affiliates progress. A "benefits/services handbook" was

reviewed by the Committee as designed by the Committee on Affiliates. It contains information of the benefits and services of the California State Grange sponsored programs. The Committee will be meeting again this year and will plan a marketing strategy.

Delta Dental Plan: A brochure on the PMI Dental Plan sponsored by the California State Grange was reproduced and copies mailed to each Grange for their convenience. This project was paid for by the dental peo-

ple.

State Secretaries Report: Sister Marjorie Brown joined the Committee at this time and presented the membership report. Membership reported to the National Grange for the September 30, 1986 Quarter was 36,175 with 295 Subordinate Granges reporting. This showed a loss of 53 members for the quarter. It was also reported that Colusa-Yolo Pomona Grange #40 was 5 quarters in arrears and that Lassen Pomona Grange #11 was to be dropped. Potter Valley Subordinate Grange #115 (Mendocino County) is two quarters delinquent. Hinkley Valley Subordinate Grange #674 (Mojave Valley) seven quarters delinquent, Stockton Subordinate Grange #758 (San Joaquin County) two quarters delinquent. Hopeton Subordinate Grange #760 (Merced County) is consolidating with Merced Colony Grange. The State Master stated that he would proceed with the necessary action regarding Hinkley Valley Grange #674 and Hopeton Grange #760. In regards to Colusa-Yolo Pomona Grange #40, Brother Frank Nichols, Deputy State Master, is working on this problem. Sister Brown was commended for her fine work for keeping the Committee informed.

Financial Report: Sister Pat Meece, Bookkeeper, joined the Committee and presented the Balance Sheet, Income Statement and Budget Report for the period ending October 31, 1986. The Committee reviewed and discussed the financial status with the Bookkeeper. The State Master stated that the June 1986 National Per Capita dues were not paid by October 1, 1986 and the State Grange delegates (State Master and spouse) could not vote at National until the dues were paid and motion was adopted by the National Delegates.

Wisteria Hall - Janitoral Service: We are paying \$60 a month to have the janitor clean the California Association of Resource Conservation District (CARCD) office, restrooms and to mop and sweep the auditorium monthly. Complaints regarding the "cleanliness" of Wisteria Hall's auditorium and kitchen from our monthly renters may necessitate a raise in rent. Cabinets: The State Master stated that he had hired a handyman to build storage cabinets in the kitchen of Wisteria Hall for our rentors at a cost of \$220.

1987 Scholarships: After reviewing the figures of the Doris Deaver Trust Certificate, the Committee voted to award two (2) Doris Deaver Memorial Scholarships at \$500 each. The GWA will be awarding two (2) Peter Marinoff Memoral Scholarships of \$250 each and the Marinoff Agency will be awarding one \$500 scholarship, making a total of five (5)

scholarships awarded through the California State Grange.

Fitzpatrick - Bayside Grange #500: A letter had been received by the State Master from Harold Fitzpatrick, Master of Bayside Grange #500 in Humboldt County, regarding his per diem check from convention. After reviewing the letter and discussing the situation, the Committee voted to pay Brother Fitzpatrick and the State Master was instructed to provide an appropriate letter.

Pre-Paid Liability Service: This item was discussed with the Committee at the Convention Executive Committee meeting in October. No action

taken at this time.

Berry Creek Grange Update: The State Master gave a brief update on the Berry Creek Grange situation. He suggested that we go there and have a preliminary hearing, before it goes to the Review Board and possibly the Trial Court procedure. The State Master will be in contact with the National Grange Master for a ruling before the California State Grange takes any action.

Miscellaneous - Resolutions: The resolutions taken to the National Grange Convention were discussed. A listing of those resolutions submitted to National were passed out to the Committee. The status of these resolutions will appear in the California Grange News. National Grange "New" Digest: The State Master read the letter from the National Grange Master regarding the "new" Digest and its "construction". The letter stated that they would make the Digest available as soon as possible. The State Master stated that based on the recommendation of the 1986 California State Grange Interim Constitution/By-Laws Committee, that he voted against the adoption of the "new" digest. Western Regional States Conference: Instead of the "traditional" Western States Leadership Conference, a National Grange leadership team is proposing to fly into the state, spend five to six days conducting conferences before moving on to the other Western States. Times, dates and places have yet to be decided. It is Brother Austin's understanding that the Western States Youth Conference will remain the same. United American "Over 65" Supplement: The State Master had received information regarding a medicare supplement policy for Grange members from D.E. Rohrer and conveyed it and a drug program to the Committee on Affiliates. A recommendation from that committee will be forthcoming. GBO Lease Agreement: The Board of Directors of the Grangers Business Organization has voted to raise their rent from \$25 per month to \$2,500 per month for the land the building sits on, effective January 1, 1987. National Convention Reimbursement: Sister Katie Couch returned \$143.23 from her expenses as the talent winner attending the National Convention to the National Talent Travel Fund.

Unfinished Business: The Committee asked for an update on the date change of the 1988 convention in Redding as it pertains to the recently passed resolution. The State Master stated that he had talked with the Redding Convention Bureau and they are tentatively blocking those new

dates for us. We need to make sure with Shasta County that they will be willing to go along with the date change, then we need to present a resolution to the 1987 delegate body for approval.

The meeting adjourned at 4:45pm. The next meeting is scheduled for February 6, 1987 at the State Grange headquarters.

The meeting was called to order promptly at 9:00am with the Worthy State Master David Austin presiding.

Roll Call showed members present: Joe Victorine and Johnny Squire. Brother Stephen Tait being delayed due to foggy weather. The State Master's Secretary was also present. Brother William Booth, State Grange Overseer, was unable to attend.

The minutes of the December 5, 1986 meeting were reviewed and approved as clarified.

Ukiah Autumn Leaves, Inc.: The minutes and financial statements of the Ukiah Autumn Leaves, Inc. for the months of November 1986 and December 1986 were reviewed and discussed. The financial statement only, was received for the month of January 1987 and was reviewed.

Kellums/Keyes Grange Trust Account Update: In the final hours of the foreclosure process on January 23, 1987, the State Master signed papers on behalf of Keyes Grange and accepted a check in the amount of \$20,000 from a finance company in Modesto who purchased the property representing Mr. Kellums. The \$20,000 will be put into the Keyes Grange Trust Account.

San Dimas Grange: Problems have arisen with San Dimas Grange (Los Angeles County) relative to the Grange treasury and past officers. The State Master has recommended that they refer to the California State Grange Constitution and By-Laws, Revised 1985, as it relates to an audit procedure and Grange Law. The State Master stated that it would be necessary for their Subordinate Grange Master, Secretary, Treasurer and Executive Committee to examine their accounts, books and records and attempt to reconcile said accounts and to forward the findings to his office. The Deputy State Master, Sister Virginia Spoonemore, will also be requested to offer any assistance that might be necessary.

Executive Committee Audit: There appears to be a need for guidelines to assist the Granges in performing an audit as required by Grange Law. The State Master, State Treasurer and California State Grange Book-keeper are working on an "Executive Committee Audit" worksheet. This worksheet would provide guidelines for performing an audit. This audit "worksheet" will be mailed to all Granges as soon as it is refined. This form will also assist the California State Grange in its I.R.S. annual

report.

State Lecturer's Report: Brother Runyon submitted a summary of his Lecturers' Reports for the last quarter of 1986. The attendance information contained in this summary were the figures for the last three years.

Jay Hartz - California Grange News: Brother Jay Hartz joined the Committee at this time. The Committee had some concern regarding the cost to the State Grange for printing the FFA newspaper "Golden Harvest" which is mailed statewide to over 20,000 FFA members. Inquiry was made regarding the accounting fund that the money was appropriated from, the State Grange revolving fund or the Grange News fund? Brother Hartz stated that it was costing roughly \$60 an issue (\$38 for film, \$17 for stats and approximatley \$5 for utilities). A \$360 a year investment for six issues. The State Master was instructed to request the appropriations from the PBC Committee for this project.

Christmas Card Program Update: Brother Hartz reported on the Christmas Card Program's progress. As of January 31, 1987, income was at \$44,890 and expenses totaled \$41,725.27 which included Mary Wendt's part time salary. This is an approximate profit of \$3,000. A reminder notice billing was discussed. An approximate cost of \$1,482.48 to send out a reminder notice billing (postage, envelopes, printing) to those who have not paid was discussed. A suggestion was made to change the reminder notice in the paper to "people" figures instead of "dollar" figures. Brother Hartz stated that we need to stress the fact that this is a fundraiser and not a merchandising project.

Joy Beatie - GWA Director: Sister Beatie joined the Committee at this time. The Committee was interested to know how her conference schedule was progressing and how the attendance had been. She stated that everything was going well and that she had already received

assistance for the 1988 National Grange Convention in Redding.

Berry Creek Grange Update: The State Master discussed the Berry Creek Grange situation with the Committee. The State Master, Sister Mary Wendt and Brother Bob Clouse went to Berry Creek Grange on January 17, 1987 to perform a preliminary hearing. All members of Berry Creek Grange were sent a letter regarding this meeting date, time and place. All were invited to attend to "air" their comments. After recording the comments of those concerned members, the State Master sent a letter to the Master and Secretary of Berry Creek Grange as well as all those who attended on January 17, 1987 the findings of the preliminary hearing which indicated no clear violations presently, that would require a Grange Trial. The procedure for any future violations were outlined to the Grange.

State Secretary's Report: Sister Marjorie Brown joined the Committee at this time and presented her partial report. Membership total as of the December 31, 1986 quarter was 34,588 with 274 Subordinate Granges reporting. Nineteen (19) Subordinate Granges with outstanding reports left the California State Grange with a gain of two (2). Palm Grange #604

was dropped (12/31/86) and Hopeton Grange #760 was dropped (12/31/86) and is consolidating with Merced Colony Grange. Sister Brown also presented a report of those delinquent Subordinate Granges which included 19 Subordinate Granges and five Pomona Granges. Lassen Pomona Grange has been dropped. The State Master reported that Forestville Grange will be consolidating with Sebastopol Grange. In regards to Hinkley Valley Grange, the State Master has been in contact with the current Deputy State Master, Brother Kenny Greene, and they are working together to resolve the situation.

The 1987 Roster mailing cost was \$589.92 which included the mailing of 802 rosters. Sister Brown also stated that the newly revised Quarterly Report Forms willgbe going out soon and they include the "Affiliate Member" status on the report forms.

Grangers Business Organization Update: Brother Koster, President of Grangers Business Organization, joined the Committee at this time. He presented the State Grange with a check in the amount of \$5,000 which represented the first two months of the new GBO lease agreement. Brother Koster explained the dissolution process the GBO is going through to protect the certificates. The State Master and Brother Koster have been working with attorneys and Assemblyman Norm Waters, Chairman of the Assembly Ag Committee, in implementing a bill whereby the certificates will be protected. They are desiring an exemption from the "escheat law". Brother Koster also gave an update on the properties that GBO owns.

Parking Lot Estimate: The Committee discussed and viewed the California State Grange parking lot and its need for repair. A bid of \$2,000 to repair the deteriorating areas of the parking lot was received. The Committee directed the State Master to obtain other bids.

Financial Report: Sister Pat Meece joined the Committee at this time with the Balance Sheet, Income Statement and Budget Report for six months ending December 31, 1986 and reviewed them with the Committee. Sister Meece stated that we have a note due at Sacramento Savings and Loan that we took out for the convention. It will be paid for on February 19, 1987. The vehicle loan we have at the Sacramento County Grange Federal Credit Union will also be paid soon. The September quarterly dues to National were paid on February 2, 1987.

A report was also given on the status of our "failing" copy machine. The copy machine will have to be taken into the shop for a complete overhaul at an estimated cost of \$800. With this repair cost, last 12-months of down time estimated at \$514 and an annual maintenance contract of \$600, it will be cost effective to consider a new machine. After discussion, the Committee directed the State Master to obtain "proposals" for a new copy machine before the next meeting.

Painting Fence and Gate: A section of the fence at the California State Grange property was removed in order to run a line from GBO to the SMUD (Sacramento Municipal Utilities District) transformer housed in the California State Grange patio. SMUD required the CSG to put up a gate so as to allow access to the transformer. We received a \$216 bill from the contractor for installing the gate. The State Master felt that the cost was high and is requesting an itemization. The painter charged \$250 to

paint the new fence and gate.

GIA Meeting - Seattle, Washington Trip: The State Master was invited to attend the Grange Insurance Association meeting in Seattle, Washington for the State Masters in the western region in which GIA serves. The meeting will take place on February 17, 18 and 19 at the GIA home office. Among the subjects of this meeting are: a) listening to the thoughts of each of the State Masters regarding what is happening in each of their states as it relates to GIA business, b) review the 1986 results, c) demonstrate GIA's new claim system as it enhances the service to our members and d) development of new members. Airfare, lodging and most meals are covered in the invitation.

Miscellaneous: Western Leaders Conference: The State Master discussed the changes of the Western Leaders Conference schedule as proposed by the National Grange. The State Master will have an opportunity to discuss this with the other western State Masters in Seattle at the GIA meeting. Committee On Affiliates: The State Master stated that the Chairman of the Committee on Affiliates, Brother Leo Bergeron, will make a presentation at the next meeting as their project must be approved by the Executive Committee before implementing. California State Grange Supply Department: Discussion regarding the inventory of the California State Grange Supply Department and the capital invested in some of the resale items ensued. An accounting of the supply department was requested for the next meeting to see if it is feasible for the California State Grange to inventory some material when the Granges can order the same from supply houses. John Welty: Brother Squire inquired on the status of Brother John Welty in relation to his status with the California State Grange. The State Master discussed the "phase-out" process of the legislative director. This "phase-out" period expands over a three-year period. Brother Welty's salary was reduced 1/3 in 1985 and 1/3 in 1986 and we are currently paying Brother Welty \$474 a month as a consulting fee for a legislative analysis of Grange related bills, articles for the Grange News and on an on-call basis to the State Master. Brother Welty is currently employed with the Tomato Growers Association. 1987 California State Grange Convention: A visit to the Stockton Memorial Auditorium is planned for March 4, 1987.

The meeting adjourned at 3:20pm. The next meeting is scheduled for

March 5, 1987 at the CSG headquarters.

The meeting was called to order promptly at 9:00am with the Worthy State Master David Austin presiding.

Roll Call showed members present: Stephen Tait and Johnny Squire. Brother Joe Victorine was unable to attend nor was Brother Bill Booth. The State Master's Secretary was also in attendance.

The minutes of the February 6, 1987 meeting were reviewed and approved as clarified.

Ukiah Autumn Leaves, Inc.: The minutes and financial statement for the month of January 1987 were reviewed and discussed. The Committee noticed that there were two vacancies at Ukiah Autumn Leaves, Inc. and the State Master was instructed to check on this matter and report back.

Vacaville Autumn Leaves: The State Master received a letter from Mr. Martin Mackey, Housing Consultant, regarding the Initial Closing for the Vacaville Autumn Leaves project. Before this step can be taken, we must provide HUD with the California State Grange's current list of Officers and Directors. All new Officers must sign and return a Conflict of Interest form.

Grange Insurance Association - State Master's Meeting Update: The State Master gave a brief update on his recent meeting to GIA's home office in Seattle, Washington for the State Masters of the seven Western States. He stated that GIA may get its "A" rating from Best Insurance Rating Company this year. The continued rating improvement lends credit to their positive management changes and corporate image.

Lompoc Tours: The State Master discussed the liability insurance of Subordinate Grange tours with the Seattle representatives of Grange Insurance. Due to excessive exposure, GIA will not insure a Grange-sponsored tour if non-members are involved. They suggested that the Grange pursue the travel company and obtain a certificate of insurance for each event. GIA will be sending a letter to the State Master regarding this situation.

National Grange Leadership Conferences: The State Master received a memo from Brother Harry Massey, National Director of Membership Development, regarding a "proposed schedule" for the conferences in our state. The State Master will be suggesting an itinerary of the conferences with dates and routing for the National team. The suggested months are August and/or September.

Committee On Affiliates Presentation: Brother Leo Bergeron, Chairman of the Committee on Affiliates (COA), joined the Committee at this time with a presentation of the COA's benefits/services project. He stated that the prototype was ready to go. He explained that the function of the committee is to market the benefits and services that are available to the Grange membership. The COA would like to utilize the young people of the Grange to present the "benefits and services book" to the individual Granges rather than just a mass mailing. They would like to use the

Easter Conference as the initial "training" session for the young people. They would also like to place ads in the Grange News. Once the "supermarket" of benefits is presented to the Granges, it would be left in the hands of a responsible Grange member who will use it as a membership recruiting tool. The books would cost \$5 each and they will need 300 copies, with a few for the trainers and the State Grange as well as a small overflow. Total cost of \$1,500 will be covered by the affiliates. A suggestion was made to have the Committee on Affiliates send a letter to the Executive Committee outlining their "plan of action." The \$1,500 would be the physical cost of the book as the COA will continue working on a volunteer basis.

Pre-Paid Legal Services: Brother Bob Clouse and Mr. Larry Steenburgen joined the Committee at this time. Mr. Steenburgen made a presentation on a Pre-Paid Legal Service Plan. This plan covers civil/criminal cases and the policy is good anywhere in the United States as well as Canada. A policyholder may use his own attorney - the company will pay their attorney. The policy covers the policy-holder, spouse and dependents under 21 years of age. The cost of the plan would be \$179.00 per year (\$14.95 per month) and a one-time enrollment fee of \$10. It was stated that this is a multi-level marketing program. Brother Clouse stated that the California Grange Insurance Organization is interested in this program as a marketing tool.

The Committee Recessed For A Lunchbreak.

After the lunchbreak, Mr. Steenburgen discussed the plan further and answered the questions of the Committee. The State Master thanked Mr. Steenburgen and Brother Clouse for the presentation. The State Master stated that this plan has been presented to the Committee before by Brother Don Verrue. Action will be taken at the next CSG Executive Committee meeting.

Financial Report: Sister Pat Meece joined the Committee and presented the Balance Sheet, Income Statement and Budget Report for seven months ending January 31, 1987. She stated that the dues for the March

quarter will start coming in, in the middle of March.

It was also reported that we have received two payments from Norco Grange, but they are still in arrears on their February mortgage payment. We have also received a notification of "insurance cancellation." After several unsuccessful calls to the Pastor (also the bookkeeper) of the group who purchased Norco Grange hall, we contacted Brother Booth and we now have liability coverage on the property. In their contract, it states that if they are five days late, they can be assessed a late penalty charge. The State Master was instructed to write a letter to the Pastor regarding this situation.

State Secretary's Report: Sister Brown presented the membership report to the Committee. Membership reported to the National Grange for the December 31, 1986 quarter was 36,174 with 293 Subordinate Granges reporting. This showed a loss of 1 member for the quarter. The

Quarterly Membership Reports were mailed out to the Deputies for the Granges in their jurisdiction. The Subordinate and Pomona "revised" Quarterly Reports have been printed which include the "affiliate member" status on the form and are in the process of being mailed out. Sister Brown stated that there will be a new Junior Grange (Quartz Hill Junior Grange) to report to the National Grange next quarter.

Brother Squire asked why the demit figure in the loss column was so large. Brother Squire would like the demit figure itemized in the future.

National Grange Digest Revisions: The State Master received a letter from the National Master which was sent out to all Subordinate and Pomona Masters regarding various subjects among which was the new Constitution and By-Laws and Codes for the National Grange ratified by the State Granges at their annual meetings during 1986. This new Constitution, along with new By-Laws and the other rules and regulations, as adopted, will be incorporated in a new 1987 Digest. The new digest will be available in two or three months. All sections within the new Digest are in effect on January 1, 1987. The State Master stated that the State Grange's "Interim Constitution and By-Laws" Committee will be meeting again on March 21, 1987.

Youth Department Handbook: A copy of the revised Youth Handbook was presented to the Committee for their review. If there are any questions or concerns, the State Master asked that the Committee contact him. Action will be taken at the April Executive Committee meeting.

Junior Grange Fundraiser: The Junior Grange will have a fundraising project for the 1988 Convention. They will be selling tickets for prizes such as two roundtrip tickets to anywhere in the continental United States or equivalent, secondary prizes will be a video cassette recorder (VCR), 13" television and ceiling fan.

Unfinished Business: Copy Machine: The State Master stated that he had talked to each Committee member on the phone regarding the purchasing of a new machine. Time was of the essence because of the "sale" that was going on. We got a new copy machine that retailed for \$3,995 for \$2,295. We hope to sell the other machine as the company would not take it as a trade-in. Supply Department (Inventory Accounting): Sister Pat Meece, Accounting Department, had been instructed by the State Master to prepare a financial accounting of the California State Grange Supply Department. The report only covered the resale supplies category. Resale Supplies has one physical inventory per year at the Fiscal Year End June 30th. All inventory is valued at cost. Resale Supplies Inventory at the Fiscal Year End 6/30/86 shows: SUPPLIES at \$6,055.65 totaling 37% of inventory, JEWELRY at \$10,460.20 totaling 63% of inventory with a subtotal of \$16,515.85 minus \$40.25 in obsolete jewelry dropped, a grand total of \$16,475.60. Further discussion regarding the "phasing out" of the jewelry inventory will be undertaken at the April meeting. This would allow approximately \$10,000 to enhance our cash flow.

FFA "Harvest News" - PBC Request (Funding): As voted on at the last

meeting, a memorandum has been sent to the Publicity Builders Committee requesting the appropriations for the FFA newspaper of \$360 a year. John Welty Letter: A letter was received by the State Master from Brother John Welty and Naomi Fletcher regarding the legislative priorities of the California State Grange for the 86-87 California State Legislature and 99th Congress. California State Grange Scholarship: One winner of the \$250 Peter Marinoff Memorial Scholarship award sponsored by the California State Grange GWA has finally submitted a "Verification for Outside Scholarship Award" form from California Polytechnic University. The form will be verified through the school before awarding the scholarship monies. Christmas Card Letter: Brother Hartz joined the Committee at this time and discussed the reminder letter for the Christmas Card Program. It was voted by the Committee to send out an invoice billing along with the reminder letter. Brother Hartz was instructed to design an invoice to be included with this mailing.

Miscellaneous: 1988 National Grange Convention Committee: There have been several meetings with the State and local committees that will be involved with the 1988 National Grange Convention. Rosemary Hansen, State Flora, is the chairman of the local committee. At their last meeting, the committee voted to recommend to the Executive Committee the purchase of 500 pins which features the State of California, the Golden Bear and the Grange logo as well as the date. The committee also recommends the purchase of 2,500 pins with the poppy instead of the Grange logo and no lettering that could be used and/or sold after the 1988 convention. Brother Hartz has secured costs and samples of the pins at an approximate cost of 92¢ each. The Committee voted to purchase 500 pins with the Grange logo and date and 1,000 of the generic pins at this time. GWA Report: An accounting summary of the California State Grange -Grange Women's Activities was received from Sister Joy Beatie, Direc-tor. The Committee reviewed the summary and noted that the "miscellaneous" column was itemized as requested. Her summary was accepted and will remain on file. Hinkley Valley Grange: The State Master discussed the letter he sent to Brother Charles Lawson of Hinkley Valley Grange. The State Master had requested a detailed summary outlining the financial status as well as the membership status of Hinkley Valley Grange. This information has been received and the State Master will be working with Brother Kenny Greene, Deputy State Master of Mojave Valley, in resolving this situation. Executive Committee Audit: The State Master discussed the "Executive Committee Audit" worksheet that has been sent out to all Granges. This audit is designed as a guideline for the Granges in performing their annual audit as prescribed in the Constitution and By-Laws.

Miscellaneous Continued: Deaf Activities: The Deaf Activities Committee had several recommendations presented to the Executive Committee: 1) create activities chairman and list in next year's roster; 2) purchase 500 "I Love You" buttons with the Grange logo, cost approximately 48¢

each and would sell for \$1 each; and 3) co-sponsor (\$100) a seminar (a first of its kind) for the deaf and hearing impaired with the University of California, Davis on May 29 and May 30, 1987. It was voted to aprove the requests of the Deaf Activities Committee. Mojave Valley Pomona Grange Resolution: The State Master discussed the resolution received from Mojave Valley Pomona Grange regarding the "Governor's Commission on 'Mojave' County" which is proposed to be a new county. They are asking for California Grange support, if possible. CalPoly Easter Conference: A request from Brother Tom Stefenoni, Youth Director, had been received via a telephone message regarding the CalPoly Easter Conference registration fee. A request to the California State Grange to underwrite the conference at \$9 per person (\$4 over last year's cost). The cost of the conference would remain the same - \$50. The Committee voted to subsidize the conference and requests the Youth Director to itemize the rise in cost of \$4 per person.

The meeting adjourned at 3:55pm and the next scheduled meeting of the Calfiornia State Grange Executive Committee is April 8, 1987.

The meeting was called to order at 9:00am with the Worthy State Master David Austin presiding.

Roll Call showed all members present: Joe Victorine, Stephen Tait and Johnny Squire. Brother Booth and the State Master's secretary were also present.

The minutes of the March 5, 1987 meeting were reviewed and approved as clarified.

Ukiah Autum Leaves, Inc.: The minutes and financial statement for the month of February 1987 were reviewed and discussed by the Committee.

National Grange Compensation Agreement: The Master received a letter regarding the "Compensation Agreement" between the National Grange and the California State Grange for organizing Granges which provides the State Grange financial assistance and reimbursement for organizing new Granges and reorganizing inactive Granges. After review, the Committee voted to have the State Master sign the agreement and return to National.

"Wisconsin Granger" Newspaper: The State Master presented a report of the financial and fundraising figures from the "Wisconsin Granger" after hosting the National Grange Convention in 1986. Our National Convention Committee was forwarded the same information.

State Secretary's Report: Sister Marjorie Brown, State Secretary, joined the Committee at this time and presented a partial membership report. As of April 7, 1987, a total of 216 Subordinate Granges have reported with

losses of 184, gains of 798, withdrawals of 323 and suspensions of 451. A suggestion was made that we send out a letter to all Granges explaining the word "withdrawal" (column) on the Quarterly Report and include the subject in the convention conference. Sister Brown also reported that ten Granges have taken in affiliate members which totals 14 affiliate members to date. She stated also that we will have a new Grange organized to report this quarter in Del Norte County (Smith River Subordinate Grange) with twenty members with some of those charter members being affiliate members. Sister Brown also stated her concern for simplifying the quarterly report reporting mechanism. The "phasing out" of the jewelry inventory was discussed with Sister Brown. The Committee wanted her

feelings on this consideration.

California State Grange Interim Constitution/By-Laws Committee Meeting Update: Brother Booth. Chairman of the Interim Constitution/By-Laws Committee gave an update on the work of his committee. The committee has met recently and has determined that there are 60 sections in the California State Grange Constitution/By-Laws that need to be corrected as they could be in conflict with the newly revised National Grange Constitution/By-Laws. With these 60 sections, the committee is faced with two alternatives: 1) 60 different resolutions presented to the delegate body clearing up the conflicts, or 2) a complete rewrite of the California State Grange Constitution/By-Laws. The rewrite will be simplified and it will not include anything that is not currently in the California State Grange Constitution/By-Laws or the National Digest. The Executive Committee was very impressed with the work of the Interim Const/By-Laws Committee. Salaries: A suggestion was made that a review of the salaries of the State Master and the State Secretary by the Executive Committee should be made. The last review took place in 1983.

Financial Report: Sister Pat Meece, Accounting Department, joined the Committee and presented the financial report of the California State Grange. The Balance Sheet, Income Statement and Budget Report for eight months ending February 28, 1987 were reviewed and discussed by the Committee. Below projected income was noted in the Christmas Card Program and cookbook sales.

The Committee recessed for a lunchbreak.

1987 Convention Update: The State Master reported on his recent meeting with Mr. Leo Burke of the Stockton Civic Memorial Auditorium finalizing some of the specific requirements of our upcoming convention. Mr. Burke would like the State Master to detail our "daily requirements" agenda so he can accurately determine the cost of the auditorium to the California State Grange. Committee rooms seem to be a little tight this year. The GWA Breakfast will be on Thursday morning at the Holiday Harborside and the Youth Breakfast will be on Friday morning in the GWA room (south hall) near kitchen facilities. The Holiday Harborside was established as "headquarters" with a flat rate of \$40 per night for the California State Grange delegation. In addition to our room block, the

hotel has extended the \$40 flat rate to any of our delegates that wish to stay there. The hotel is within walking distance of the auditorium. There is plenty of RV parking adjacent to the Holiday Harborside (no hookups). The State Master discussed the possibility of having a buffet breakfast set up in the ballroom of the Harborside for our delegation for the entire week. The Committee felt that this was an excellent suggestion and for the State Master to pursue it with inclusion of lunch and dinner.

The Committee discussed the compensation of Deputies, Directors and State Officers for convention expenses. A suggestion to reduce expenses was made to allow \$20 per night per representative for lodging expenses and the balance to be paid by the individual. A comment was made that this is the only compensation they receive all year for their efforts. This

suggestion should be presented in resolution form, if pursued.

National Grange Leadership Conference: The "proposed" dates for the 1987 National Grange Leadership Conferences in California are scheduled for August 14 through August 18, 1987. The State Master reviewed the "proposed" itinerary with the Committee. After conferring with the Washington State Grange, the State Master telephoned the National Grange and is awaiting a response.

Unfinished Business: Ukiah Autumn Leaves: Brother Squire had a question on the two vacancies which appeared on the last set of minutes reviewed. The State Master explained that one of those vacancies is now filled and the other is being readied for the next tenant. Committee On Affiliates (COA) Update: The Committee on Affiliates met recently and proposed their "plan of action" as follows: a) in the months of May/June -"requisition"; b) July/August - "assembly"; c) September - "regional representative meeting"; d) October - "convention/delegate exposure"; e) November - "regional or area meetings"; and finally, they would like to see a roster change which would include a "Membership and Benefits Chairman". A financial request would come from the affiliates, the assembly would meet at Wisteria Hall with California State Grange staff members involved and a booth would be set up for display at Convention. Pre-Paid Legal Services: The State Master reviewed the Pre-Paid Legal Services plan which was presented at the last meeting. The State Master stated that he would be meeting with Brother Don Verrue (who first approached the State Master on this plan), Brother Bob Clouse and Mr. Larry Steenburgen regarding this plan to discuss further details before the California State Grange Executive Committee should consider approving this plan. Youth Handbook: The Committee reviewed the "draft" of the revised Youth Handbook. The Committee suggested that on Page 2, Section III - Duties of the Officers of the Subordinate, Pomona and State Youth Committees, should include an "Item E. Chaplains Duties." Also Page 4, Section VII under "Order of Business" an item should be added "Adoption of Minutes" just before the "adjournment" item. The 'rewrite" is generic enough so that the Youth Committee and Young Adults Committee can operate under one handbook. Supply Department Inventory

(Accounting): The "phasing out" of the jewelry inventory of the California State Grange supply department was discussed. The Committee was given an accounting summary by the Accounting Department of the supply inventory at the last meeting. The Committee felt that there were only two alternatives: 1) to phase it out completely, or 2) raise the price to include the postage and handling (handling is currently not included). After much discussion, the Committee voted to "phase out" the jewelry portion of the California State Grange supply department with an equitable program. CalPoly Conference Cost Update: The State Master has talked with Brother Stefenoni, Director of Youth Activities, regarding the \$4 per person rise in registration fee. Motel room rent rose \$1 per person per night. The State Master also spoke with Brother Stefenoni regarding some new ideas and plans for the conference as the attendance seems to be down from previous years. Publicity Builders Committee (PBC): A response was received from the PBC regarding the financing of the FFA "Golden Harvest" newspaper as requested by the Executive Committee. The Publicity Builders Committee approved providing \$180 (half the cost) for the production of this publication, with the balance to be provided through the extension fund. The PBC also requested the approval of the Executive Committee for the following donations: 1) Pacific Legal Foundation (\$100); 2) FFA Ag Mechanics Award (\$100); 3) 4-H Annual Donation (\$100); 4) Farm Labor Alliance (\$100); and 5) FFA "Golden Harvest" (\$180). After discussion and reviewing the balance in the PBC fund, the Committee voted to approve all the requests of the PBC. Also, in the future, the Committee would like the "backup work" on the donation requests for reference.

Miscellaneous: Orangevale Grange #354 "Per Capita" Resolution of 1986: The "Per Capita" resolution submitted to the California State Grange last year for consideration was assigned to the Good of the Order Convention Committee and, therefore, was not treated as a constitutional resolution. This resolution will be included in this year's packet as a constitutional resolution and will be circulated 30 days in advance as prescribed by Grange Law. The Committee voted to approve the date changes to read that "Jan. 1, 1987" date in the number seven resolved be changed to read "Jan. 1, 1988", and in the number eight resolved that "1987" be changed to read "1988". Interim Water Committee Report: A report of the Interim Water Committee was reviewed and discussed. The Interim Water Committee met in March to review pending legislation and to review the Boyden Delta Barrier Plan. Brother Mike Ireland addressed the water committee to present the Boyden Delta Salt-water Intrusion Barrier. Legislative bills reviewed by the water committee were in seven main areas which were included in the report. This report is in a draft stage and has to be approved by the Interim Water Committee before final presentation to the California State Grange Executive Committee and Delegate Body. The Executive Committee recommends that the Legislative Department write letters in support of the Boyden Delta

Barrier Plan to get it on the model in Sausalito. It was voted that we write letters to Mr. Lehman and Mr. Pashayan stating that the California State Grange has no objection to HR 799, if amended to include "in the lower level work area."

Brother Squire has some concerns he would like addressed by the Executive Committee and/or State Master. He would like the issue of reviewing the State Officers and Directors salaries on the agenda for the next meeting. Brother Squire also had some concern with the Legislative Department and the "directorship" versus a "staff secretary." The State Master explained that he is the registered lobbyist for the California State Grange and does the testimony on legislative matters. We also have a bill tracking service which assists us tremendously, eliminating our need to be present at the Capitol all the time. The State Master further stated that aside from budgetary constraints, he currently does not have an individual in mind that he feels comfortable with as a Legislative Director. Finally, Brother Squire had some concerns regarding the Kings River and the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act as he was approached at his last Pomona Grange meeting.

The meeting adjourned at 4:20pm and the next scheduled meeting is June 10, 1987 at 9:00am at the California State Grange Headquarters.

The meeting was called to order promptly at 9:00am with the Worthy State Master David Austin presiding.

Roll Call showed all members present: Joe Victorine, Stephen Tait and Johnny Squire. The State Master's Secretary was also present. Brother William Booth was unable to attend due to illness.

The minutes of the April 8, 1987 meeting were approved as clarified. Ukiah Autumn Leaves, Inc.: The minutes and financial statements for the months of March 1987 and April 1987 of the Ukiah Autumn Leaves, Inc. were reviewed by the Committee. An audit for the peripd ending December 31, 1986 was also reviewed as prepared by Michael A. Celentano & Company, CPA. The Committee examined the financial statements and there was some concern regarding the auditor's recommendations as to the status of the financial condition of Ukiah Autumn Leaves, Inc. The CPA states no written opinion on the financial condition of Ukiah Autumn Leaves, Inc.

Washington/Oregon State Grange Conventions: The State Master stated his plans on attending the state conventions of Washington and Oregon. The Committee felt that it was important for the State Master to attend these Sessions. The State Master is planning to take the Youth Ambassador and her chaperone to the conventions.

The State Master has accepted invitations to meet with the Redding Convention Bureau on Saturday evening; Red Lion Inn personnel Sunday; Oregon State Convention (Hermiston) Monday evening and Tuesday; Washington State Convention (Port Angeles) Wednesday evening and Thursday (speaker at Junior Grange luncheon); present charter, \$100 check and install officers at Smith River Grange #823 on Saturday and return on Sunday. The State Master asked the Committee's approval to have some of the materials returned from defunct Granges be assigned to Smith River Grange with the understanding that the materials belong to the State Grange. No objection from the Committee.

Youth Department Requests: The California State Grange Youth Department submitted a proposal to sell binders and tab dividers at the 1987 Convention in Stockton. Sister Fletcher, after speaking with Brother Tom Stefenoni (Youth Director), presented a revised binder/divider proposal to the Committee for their review. The Committee voted to approve the Youth Department's revised request to purchase 100 binders and 250 tab dividers to be sold at Convention at their proposed rates (binders \$7.50 each, dividers \$2.50 each and binder/divider combination \$6.50 each). The coffee mugs were also discussed and it was determined that there were enough on hand for this year's Convention. The Youth Director would consider reordering on a limited basis for the 1988 Convention with a modified design.

Lecturer's Report: The State Master received the first "semi-annual" Lecturer's Report from Brother Eugene Runyon, State Lecturer. Thirty-four percent of the Pomona Granges sent in reports with only 23.1% of the Subordinate Granges reporting. The report also contained the attendance figures for the same period. The Committee feels these reports are very important and commend Brother Runyon on his fine work. The Committee would like to see some demographics on the reports received. The State Master will talk to Brother Runyon regarding these reports to discuss what incentive we can provide to get the Granges to complete and return these reports.

Resolution G-15-86 - GWA Director Report: The Committee discussed the resolution adopted at the 1986 Convention. The resolution stated that the State GWA Director's Report be published in the California Grange News and be it further resolved that this report, with a report from local GWA, may be published in the papers within their community. The State Master felt that the I.R.S. and Franchise Tax Board would be "very interested" in seeing the income and disbursements of the California State Grange - Grange Women's Activities Committee. As shown on the GWA Director's Report (part of the Resolution G-15-86), it appeared that more money was earned than donated. Sister Beatie joined the Committee at this time and presented her views on the adopted resolution. After careful consideration, the Committee voted to print only the donations to National Projects and if the Subordinate Granges want to publish their local donations, they could.

GWA Director: Sister Beatie announced the National Sewing Contest winners to the Committee. California fared very well this year with Class A Adult: Fern Whitaker (DeSabla Grange) - Honorable Mention; Class C Adult Sewing for Children: Jeanie Barone (San Jose Grange) - First Place and Class D Boys and Girls: Audrey Underhill (Anderson Grange) - First Place.

Sister Beatie stated that a Regional GWA Conference was held recently in Sacramento at Wisteria hall. The program for the 1987-88 year was discussed and formulated at this conference. The regional directors and Sister Beatie are presenting the proposed program to the Executive Committee now for approval so that the program can be ready to be released at Convention in October. The money from the 1988 Women's March will be donated to the "California Hospice Program". The Committee voted to approve the 1987-88 GWA Program. The State Master felt that this "early" program approval was a great idea and would like to see all directors follow suit.

Scholarship Winners: The State Master announced the 1987 Scholarship winners to the Committee. This year there were 21 requests for applications with only four completed applications returned for judging. The Committee voted at a previous meeting to award two Doris Deaver Memorial Scholarships, one Peter Marinoff Agency Scholarship and two Peter Marinoff Memorial Scholarships sponsored by the GWA if we have the applicants. The winners will be notified and an announcement will be in the Grange News.

Officers'/Directors' Salaries Review: A "Schedule & Distribution" chart of Officers' and Directors' salaries was reviewed as prepared by the Accounting Department. Cost of living figures were discussed. No action taken.

CSG Employees' Job Descriptions Updated: The Committee reviewed the updated job descriptions of the California State Grange officers and employees. No action taken.

The State Master discussed AB 1309 (Norm Waters) bill regarding the GBO certificates that are unclaimed. After seven years, the certificates would revert to the State of California. The California State Grange is sponsoring a uill, authored by Assemblyman Norm Waters, that would allow the unpaid certificate dividends to be transferred to a trust account administered by the California State Grange which would allow the annual interest to be used for a scholarship for vocational education students. This bill has already passed through the Senate Ag Resources Committee and is now before the Appropriations Committee. Then, hopefully, through both houses and on to the Governor. The bill carries an urgency clause that means it is effective with the Governor's signature.

Brother and Sister Jules and Irene Faoro joined the Committee at this time. They presented the final report on the status of Forestville Grange in Sonoma County. Forestville Grange has surrendered their charter and the members have been issued a blanket demit into Sebastopol Grange

#306.

The Committee recessed for a short lunchbreak.

California State Grange Convention Pre-Registration Update: The State Master discussed the possibility of a pre-registration procedure at the state office prior to convention. He suggested that a letter be sent out (or via Grange News) offering a pre-registration packet for any member who would like to take advantage of it. The packet would include pre-payment for resolution pads (non-delegates), barbecue tickets, youth breakfast, registration fee, etc. This is a possibility and the State Master will research it further with his staff.

The State Master also gave a brief update on the arrangements of the

upcoming convention.

Room At Convention For Students w/Instructors - Delegate Mandate 1986 Convention: The Committee discussed the motion adopted on the floor of the 1986 convention in Bakersfield regarding the California State Grange providing a room on the convention site for the students to do their studying, and that teachers be asked to volunteer their time to instruct them when and as needed. Times of instruction to be set by the volunteering instructors and announced and/or posted. After consideration, the Committee instructed the State Master to contact several teachers to volunteer their time to instruct students at convention.

California State Grange Audit: To date, we have only received one audit proposal for the California State Grange. We had asked for another proposal to be submitted, but no response. After reviewing the proposal received, the State Master asked the Committee if they would like to accept this one or should he obtain another proposal. the Committee voted to accept the proposal received from Mr. Gregory Burbage, C.P.A., as it was in line with last year's proposal.

Financial Report: Sister Pat Meece joined the Committee at this time. She presented the Committee with the Balance Sheet, Income Statement and Budget Report for the month ending May 31, 1987 to the Committee for their review. Outstanding bills include the Christmas cards at \$32,000; National Grange dues at \$17,000 and cookbooks at \$16,000. At this time, the California State Grange does have a cash flow problem.

Brother Squire was quite concerned with the fact that the March 1987 dues to National Grange have not yet been paid. He received (as well as all Executive Committee members) a copy of the letter from the National Master to the State Master regarding our non-payment of the March 1987 dues. The State Master discussed the response letter he drafted to the National Master with the Committee and stated that the National Grange dues have been behind for several years. Brother Squire was also very upset with the designation of the Holiday Harborside as headquarters motel for convention at a \$40 flat rate versus his suggestion (at the last meeting) of utilizing Motel 6 at a lesser rate. Brother Squire made a motion that we look into Motel 6 off Charter Way of 100 rooms at an approximate rate of \$20 per night. No second. After much discussion and due to

budgetary constraints, the Committee voted that we allow a \$20 lodging expense per night for motel rooms for designated officers, directors and deputies.

Sister Meece would like authorization to write off a small bad debt of \$4.50 for resale supplies charged to Brother John Ellwanger since July 1984. The Committee voted to allow Sister Meece to write off this bad debt. Brother Squire asked Sister Meece if she has any ideas on how to manipulate our funds. She feels that we may have to borrow money or sell cookbooks and have a membership gain.

Christmas Card Program Update: An update on the Christmas card program was given. We have an outstanding bill with Brick Mills Studio for \$32,000 for the 20,000 boxes of cards sent out. Of the 20,000 boxes sent out, approximately 8,000 boxes have been paid for. Discussion of a third reminder notice was undertaken. Brick Mills' experience with third reminder notices said we can expect a 10% response. After consideration, the Committee decided not to send out a third reminder notice, instead continue the paper reminder with emphasis on reaching our projected goal.

Cookbook Ad Update: Brother Jay Hartz joined the Committee at this time with a cookbook ad update. An ad in the Washington and Oregon State Grange newspapers would cost \$170.00 (ad runs statewide in both states). An ad in Sunset Magazine would cost \$2,289 and would run in the "food/wine" section of the magazine and has a regional circulation. A classified ad in the Early American Life magazine (national circulation) runs \$71 per column inch. California Farmer (statewide circulation) rates run from \$140 to \$234.

The Committee voted to place a cookbook advertisement in the Washington and Oregon State Grange newspapers for one issue. Brother Hartz was instructed to go ahead with the ad procedure.

Brother Hartz also presented a proposal for a new California Grange News labeling service. Presently, we are utilizing the Pennysaver labeling service at \$440.59 an issue. Metro Mailing Service has submitted a bid pf \$350 an issue with free set up and delivery to the Post Office. The Committee would like to wait until after convention before considering this change. Brother Hartz was instructed to call some of their clients regarding the service of Metro Mailing.

The Committee will consider any future Christmas card program at the next meeting.

Junior Grange Fundraiser Update: The Junior Grange fundraiser for the 1988 convention is progressing well. Several Granges have requested more tickets.

State Secretary's Report: Sister Marjorie Brown joined the Committee and presented the membership report of the California State Grange. Membership reported to the National Grange for the March 31, 1987 quarter was 35,707 plus 21 affiliate members totaling 35,728 members for the quarter with 291 Subordinate Granges reporting. This showed a loss

of 467. With the organization of Smith River Subordinate Grange #823 in Del Norte County, California now has a total of 292 Subordinate Granges. Shiloh Grange #515 (Stanislaus County) and Tehachapi Grange #662 (Kern County) were consolidated (dropped) during the quarter.

Sister Brown discussed the memo sent to the State Master (6/5/87) regarding the delinquent Granges. Klamath Valley Grange #712 (Del Norte County) 3 quarters delinquent; Stockton Grange #758 (San Joaquin County) 4 quarters delinquent; Hinkley Valley Grange #674 (Mojave Valley) 9 quarters delinquent; and Winnetka Center Junior Grange #210 (San Fernando Valley) 3 quarters delinquent. The State Master stated that Klamath Valley Grange was closed and also that he would like to travel to Hinkley Valley Grange to discuss their future. Also presented was a letter received from M.E. Painter, San Diego County Deputy, concerning membership status of San Diego Harbor Grange #775. San Diego Harbor Grange has voted to surrender their charter and disband. Sister Brown also received a letter from the Secretary of Orick Valley Grange #508 (Humboldt County) regarding their membership status. All back quarterly reports were received including the March 31, 1987 quarter.

The State Master stated that the membership director is supposed to be in contact with the State Secretary regarding a mailing to each Grange to the Master or Membership Chairman with the membership of the last quarters. The State Master is sending a directive to the deputies (regional and state) to submit potential sites for a new Grange in their jurisdiction.

In regards to the "jewelry phase-out", Sister Brown wrote to the National Grange and Fuller Regalia Flag Company regarding the Executive Committee decision and whether or not they could provide us with catalogs and order blanks for direct ordering from the Granges. Fuller Regalia sent 350 catalogs (no charge) and 100 catalogs were ordered from National (50¢ each). The Committee reviewed the letter that will be mailed to the Grange secretaries. After discussion, the letter was signed by the State Master and Executive Committee for mailing.

The Journal of Proceedings will be mailed out in two or three weeks. It was suggested that we include a cover letter explaining the delay. Legislative Department Resolution - Grange RAAD (Rural Areas Against Drugs): The California State Grange has been approached by the State Attorney General's Office to join the Rural Areas Against Drugs (RAAD) Program for the specified reasons noted in the resolution. The State Master would like to see the Deaf Activities Committee changed to "Grange Health Committee"; that would make it a generic committee to work with deaf, drugs, etc. It was voted by the Committee to support the RAAD Program of the Attorney General's Office and to present this resolution to the delegate body. The State Master was instructed to ask Sister Fletcher to research this and make sure there is no oppositon to it.

National Grange Membership Update Report: A National Grange Membership Update report was reviewed by the Committee as prepared by Brother Harry Massey, National Membership Director. Noted in the "Welcome New Granges" column was Smith River Subordinate Grange #823 organized in California by Deputy Harlan Ziegler on March 28, 1987 with 20 Charter Members.

National Grange Leadership Conference Update: The State Master received a telephone call from Brother Harry Massey regarding a date change in the National Leadership Conferences scheduled for California. The new dates are September 10 through September 13, 1987. A confirmation memorandum was received from the National Master with a meeting agenda and time schedule attatched. They plan to arrive in Los Angeles or Ontario and travel north through California to Oregon. The State Master will be setting up times/dates/places in the appropriate areas with the deputies. Suggested locations are: Los Angeles, Bakersfield, Merced, Danville, Willows, and the Redding area.

Interim Water Committee Report: The State Master referred to Page 4 of the Interim Water Committee Report regarding AB 1707 - Costa: Groundwater Management. The State Master notified the Committee (after consulting with Brother Welty) that letters were sent opposing AB 1707 - Groundwater Control.

Legislative Package: A Legislative Package was presented to the Committee for their review and information. The package contained legislative matters that the California State Grange has been involved in (11 letters, 9 issues) since the last meeting. The State Master also reviewed the letter received from Brother Welty on the progress of the legislative session for 1987-88.

National Master's Letter: The State Master has received a letter from the National Master regarding California's late dues payment. A "rough draft" of a response letter was shared with the Committee. We are in a financial cash flow "crunch". The State Master has spoken with Mr. Koster, President of Grangers Business Organization, regarding a loan request from the GBO to the CSG. Effective January 1, 1988, the GBO will dissolve and their assets and liabilities will be transferred to the California State Grange. It was voted by the Committee that we initiate a letter to the Grangers Business Organization President, Edwin Koster, regarding a co-signature loan in the amount of \$75,000. The Committee felt at this time that was the only feasible way to go. The Committee stated that we have no other choice but to go to a financial institution to borrow the money if the GBO does not approve.

Interim Constitution And By-Laws Committee Update: The Interim Constitution and By-Laws Committee met on June 6, 1987. They are attempting to conform the California State Grange Constitution and By-Laws with the newly revised National Grange Constitution and By-Laws and Codes. They have two alternatives: 1) rewrite the entire Constitution and By-Laws; or 2) propose about 60 resolutions to the delegate body. The Committee felt that the idea of the "rewrite" was a good one. In the printing of the rewrite, the Interim Constitution and By-Laws Committee should make sure that all new parts are put into italics or highlighted in

some way. More discussion on this at the next meeting.

Collider Project: The State Master had received a telephone call from the Deputy of Solano County regarding a resolution on the "collider project". She was concerned about formulating a resolution on this subject. She would like the CSG Executive Committee's views on this subject. The Committee was given a copy of a "summary" on the collider project for their review. The State Master was instructed to resolve their concern.

The meeting adjourned at 4:33pm. The next scheduled meeting is

August 28, 1987 at 9:00am at the State Grange office.

The meeting was called to order promptly at 9:00am with the Worthy

State Master David Austin presiding.

Roll Call showed all members present: Joe Victorine, Stephen Tait and Johnny Squire. The State Master's Secretary and Brother William Booth, Overseer, were also present.

The minutes of the June 10, 1987 meeting were approved as clarified. Ukiah Autumn Leaves, Inc.: The minutes and financial statement for the month of May were received and reviewed by the Committee.

Stockton Convention Update: The State Master gave a brief update of the Stockton Convention. The City of Stockton wants a \$6,000 auditorium rental fee for our 1987 convention use contrary to the "gratis" invitation we received. The Convention Bureau is also shocked at the rental fee. The City of Stockton is operating at a deficit and they want to charge us auditorium rental fee plus lights, sound and set up. We have been negotiating with the Conventin Bureau representatives in trying to resolve this situation. The State Master received a telephone call at home from the Convention Bureau Manager stating that the charge for the auditorium to the California State Grange would be \$3,000 and that the Convention Bureau will be paying the balance of the \$6,000 fee. In addition to the \$3,000 fee for the auditorium, we would have to pay for lights, sound and set up fees.

The Holiday Harborside will be setting up a buffet breakfast in the lounge area for our convenience Tuesday through Friday. There will also be a concession stand set up at the auditorium for our members Tuesday

through Friday as long as it is supported.

The State Master stated that March Fong Eu, Secretary of State; Jack Parnell, Director of Food and Ag; and Brother Norman Waters, Chairman of the Assembly Ag Committee have been invited to attend the convention as their schedules permit. The State Master suggested that we design a "resolution of appreciation" for Norm Waters as he was instrumental in assisting with the passing of the GBO bill regarding the dividend certificates.

National Grange Leadership Conferences: The State Master discussed the upcoming National Leadership Conferences with the Committee and reviewed the schedule. The conferences are scheduled for September 10 through September 13, 1987. The National team will be arriving in California on September 9, 1987. The State Master will be escorting the team through California.

Wisteria Hall Rental Increase: A rental increase for the "rentors" of Wisteria Hall was discussed. At this time there are varying rates for the different groups as they all use it for various purposes. The Committee suggests a 10% increase across the board. There is definitely a need for an increase. The State Master will establish a 10% increase rate schedule and will present it at the next Executive Committee meeting. The State Master stated that a water heater had to be replaced in Wisteria Hall.

Blue Shield: A letter had been received from Blue Shield of California regarding a rate increase in the employee health benefit plan. A 5% increase will become effective September 1, 1987. The State Master suggested that it may be time to shop for a competitive health plan.

Harvey & Teresa Thompson Deed Of Trust: The Thompson's have purchased the Clev Avon property at a buy-out cost of \$58,272.81 which was invested at Sacramento Savings and Loan in a 12-month CD yielding 7.25%. Glen Avon Grange should be receiving back approximately \$1,000 interest quarterly.

Financial Report: Sister Pat Meece joined the Committee at this time. The Income Statement, Balance Sheet and Budget Report were not given at this meeting as the California State Grange audit is in process at this time and will be completed on September 1, 1987. A summary report of the Grange Trust Accounts was presented and reviewed with the Committee. There are currently 23 trust accounts with seven Granges still in existence and they receive their interest directly. After seven years, the Granges that have surrendered their charters, the account will revert to the California State Grange. Negotiations are being made for an assumption of Fall River's Deed of Trust and escrow is to close soon.

Sister Meece reported that Sister Juanita Hutcherson (camp cook) returned a certified check to the California State Grange of \$500 as camp was cancelled.

Calfornia State Grange Audit Update: The California State Grange audit is currently in progress and will be completed and returned to the California State Grange by September 1, 1987.

Resolution G-33-86 - "Trustee Maintenance Fee": After discussion, it was voted by the Committee to have Sister Meece contact a financial institution or the California State Grange Certified Public Accountant to determine what is the reasonable and customary maintenance fee for trust accounts. Maintenance fee plus all expenses incurred maintaining these accounts should be considered before determining the maintenance fee.

Vacaville Autumn Leaves: Martin Mackey, Housing Consultant, joined the Committee at this time. He stated there has been a 5% increase from

the contractor over the original bid. The California State Grange, as a cosponsor, needs to come up with \$10,000 which would be in the form of a loan to the Vacaville Senior Housing Corporation at 9¼% interest (not to exceed 9¼% interest). HUD requires "funds available for case re-

quirements" in order for the application to be accepted.

The Committee discussed the money in the trust accounts that is available to the California State Grange from the Granges that have surrendered their charters. It was voted by the Committee to instruct the State Master to see if Vacaville Grange has the funds in their account to back this loan and the second alternative of one or more of the trust accounts that are in CD's to do the same, but not to exceed \$10,000, and then possibly to GBO, if necessary. This transaction is a reinvestment of funds and not a gift. The Committee discussed that it is their responsibility as trustees of these accounts to see to it that these accounts are duly maintained and that the best return is made possible in which the 9¼ % interest would go into these accounts.

Deaf Activities Recommendations: The Deaf Activities Committee met in June and discussed the following programs and requests approval from the California State Grange Executive Committee: (1) Create Your Own Poster Contest; (2) 1987 Convention Raffle; and (3) Coloring Book. After consideration of the above programs, the Committee voted to approve the "Create Your Own Poster Contest" program and denied the request on the other two items for the present time. The State Master suggested the possibility they could run the poster contest in conjunction with Grange Week.

The Executive Committee recommends to the Deaf Activities Committee that at this time a limitation is to be imposed on the number of raffles at the State Convention and the Committee also would like more details on the "coloring book" program and a cost analysis be provided for future consideration.

PBC Requests: The Publicity Builders Committee requests approval for the following donations: English Only Initiative (\$100); Highway Users Conference (\$100); CAST (The Nation's Voice for Food and Agriculture Science [\$100]); and Ag Council (\$100). After full consideration, the Committee voted to approve the requests of the PBC. Previously approved by the State Master was \$100 to the Ag Advisory Committee of the State Fair, co-sponsors of the Ag Day Luncheon.

Christmas Card Program: As of August 17, 1987, 8,721 respondents have donated \$59,078 to the Christmas card program. It was voted to "drop" the past Christmas card program and to spend no more time in trying to get people to pay for the cards. In regards to future Christmas card programs, and after much discussion, the Committee voted to table the Christmas card program until the end of the 1987 Convention as to the outcome of the financial standing.

State Secretary's Report: Sister Marjorie Brown, State Secretary, presented the membership report to the Committee. Membership

reported to the National Grange for the June 30, 1987 quarter was 35,071 with 287 Subordinate Granges reporting. The following Subordinate Granges were dropped during the quarter: Forestville Grange #367 (Sonoma County) with a blanket demit into Sebastopol Grange #306; Klamath Valley Grange #712 (Del Norte County) with a blanket demit into Crescent Redwood Grange #596; Konocti Grange #755 (Lake County) with a blanket demit into East Lake Grange #727; San Diego Harbor Grange #775 (San Diego County) demits were secured locally; and Pescadero Grange #793 (San Mateo County) demits were secured locally. There were a total of 39 Affiliate Members reported to National.

Subordinate and Junior Granges delinquent two quarters or more: Potter Valley Subordinate Grange #115, Windsor Subordinate Grange #410, Ono Subordinate Grange #445, Hinkley Valley Subordinate Grange #674, Pleasant Hill Subordinate Grange #737, and Winnetka Center Junior Grange #210. Orick Valley Subordinate Grange #508 has reported up to and including June 30, 1987 quarter, however; the records show an unpaid balance of \$331.51 on their Per Capita dues for the five quarters.

A check in the amount of \$500 has been received from Pescadero Grange #793. Pescadero Grange would like this check applied to the Doris Deaver Memorial Scholarship Fund in memory of their Past Master, Ward Williamson. Sister Brown explained that this is a restricted fund and no funds are applied and would like direction as to what should be done with the donation from Pescadero Grange. The Committee suggested that we put the check into the PBC Fund or any fund that is readily available and to write the Pescadero Grange explaining the procedure of the Doris Deaver Memorial Scholarship Fund and ask Pescadero what they would like done with the \$500 donation. The State Master will be in touch with Pescadero Grange.

Sister Brown stated that the billing service is going out soon. We have all the materials on hand and they will be sent out first class as required.

Cookbook Ad Results (WA/OR): The California State Grange cookbook ad ran in the August issues of the Washington and Oregon State Grange newspapers and to date thus far, we have 31 orders between the states. Washington State Grange traded ad space with us and Oregon State Grange charged for the ad space.

State Lecturer Report And Request: Brother Runyon, State Lecturer, submitted a written breakdown of the Lecturer's reports by areas as requested by the Executive Committee. The list included each region and the counties within that region that submitted the reports. The State Master stated that we have to look into the incentives to get the reports filled out and returned. The State Master also suggested that we put this on the Deputy Field Evaluation Report.

Brother Runyon also submitted a written request regarding reimbursement allowed to all State Officers. He is requesting six nights lodging and six days meal allowance. *The Committe voted* to allow Brother Runyon his request.

Worthy Overseer, Bill Booth, pointed out that on Page 16, Article III, that the California State Grange Executive Committee were provided for and that the ruling made allowing \$20 per night cannot be extended to the Executive Committee for their convention expenses. After discussion, the Committee individually and voluntarily consented to receive the same housing allowances as given other state officers for the 1987 convention.

Klamath Valley Grange Property: The State Master sent a letter to the Granges in Del Norte County requesting that they write a letter to the California State Grange Executive Committee requesting their wishes from the properties of the recently closed Klamath Valley Grange. The State Master would like to have the inventory list of Klamath Valley Grange and the requests from Smith River Subordinate Grange and Lake Earl Subordinate Grange.

California Highway Users Conference: There was no action taken on the resolution accompanying the letter and billing statement of the California Highway Users Conference. The Committee voted previously to allow the PBC to donate \$100 to this project and requested the resolution be presented to the Transportation, Roads and Highways convention

committee.

Interim Constitution And By-Laws Committee Update: Brother Bill Booth presented the "findings" of the Interim Constitution and By-Laws Committee to the Executive Committee. The first part contained resolutions to amend the present Constitution and By-Laws of the California State Grange and the second part is a complete rewrite of the California State Grange Constitution and By-Laws.

After much consideration, the Committee voted to present both the 57 resolutions to amend the Conmstitution and By-Laws and the newly proposed Constitution and By-Laws with the changes suggested to the delegate body for adoption. Brother Booth will provide an original copy

for printing for the resolution packets.

Resolution G-33-86 - "Associate Membership": As per resolution G-33-86, the California State Grange Master continues with an Interim Constitution and By-Laws Committee to study the associate member concept and make recommendations by resolution to the 1987 delegate body. This will be satisfied.

Owens Valley Grange Resolution: Owens Valley Subordinate Grange submitted a six-page resolution to the California State Grange for consideration, however, they have no Pomona Grange to forward the resolution to as mandated by resolution G-3-85 adopted in Visalia. The Committee voted to accept the resolution as presented. The Committee also suggested that any reference material on the subject of the resolution be forwarded from Owens Valley Grange to the California State Grange for the convention committee.

Room At Convention For Students w/Instructors Update: The State Master has written several teachers regarding this mandate and to date, has received only one response - a negative response.

Miscellaneous: Deputy Letter Re: Grange Sites: The State Master stated that he sent a letter to the deputies regarding potential new Grange sites. He asked the deputies to forward names of cities where there is a need for a Grange and to date, only two have responded. James Ranch Grange (Nat'l Letter): The State Master finally has received a response from the National Master regarding a December 1986 letter requesting an interpretation of Section 15 on Pages 66-67 of the 1982 Digest as it relates to James Ranch Grange. The interpretation of the State Master was correct. A suggestion was made to get an interpretation of the legal counsel of the National Grange as well. GWA Financial Report: Sister Joy Beatie forwarded a copy of last year's earnings and donations reported by the GWA's that had not been printed in the Journal of Proceedings. The fiscal report of the State GWA accounts was also received. The State Master stated that the donations to NHtional Projects will be printed in the Grange News.

California State Grange Executive Committee Resolutions: The State Master presented resolutions to the Executive Committee for their consideration and approval to be presented to the delegate body at the 1987 convention. The following resolutions were presented and acted upon: Investigating Committee (no action); Installation Before the Annual Convention (approved); Grange RAAD (Rural Areas Against Drugs) (approved); Deaf Activities Appointment (approved); Membership Chairman Title Change (approved). The State Master also discussed a per capita dues increase resolution(s) with a \$2 raise, \$2.50 and a \$3 raise (approved). The State Master will see to it that they are properly submitted for inclusion in the resolution packet.

The meeting adjourned at 5:10pm. The next meeting is scheduled for Monday, October 19, 1987, the day before convention as required by Grange Law. (The foregoing minutes are to be approved and signed at the October 19 meeting in Stockton).

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS June 30, 1987

# NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The California State Grange was incorporated October 7, 1946, under the laws of the State of California. The following is a summary of significant accounting policies:

- (a) Assets, liabilities, income, and expenses are recorded on the accrual basis of accounting. The company uses the same basis of accounting for income tax purposes.
- (b) Inventory is valued at cost.
- (c) Property and equipment are stated at cost except for \$10,681 of office furniture and equipment for which a no cost basis has been maintained. This amount was derived from personal property tax statements. Accumulated depreceiation was established to represent the difference between the stated and assessed values of \$5,297. It is the policy of the company to provide for depreciation over the estimated useful lives of the assets using the straight-line method. The estimated lives range from 4 to 50 years.

For assets acquired after December 31, 1980, the company adopted the policy of conforming to the accelerated cost recovery system under the Economic Recovery Tax Act of 1981 of determining the recovery deduction for personal property only.

Maintenance and repairs are charged to expense as incurred. Renewals and betterments which extend the useful lives of assets are capitalized.

(d) The California State Grange is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)8 of the Internal Revenue Code and 23701(g) of the California Revenue and Taxation Code. The organization has also filed exempt organization business income tax returns for net income of non-exempt activities.

# **NOTE 2: LEASE COMMITMENTS**

The company is obligated under a long-term lease for its mailing system. The lease has an original term of five years expiring January 28, 1989. The monthly payment under the lease is \$386, and at June 30, 1987, the remaining lease commitment totaled \$7,334.

# **NOTE 3: DEFERRED INCOME**

Deferred income consists of advance advertising revenue.

# LECTURER'S ANNUAL REPORT

Worthy Master, State Officers, Delegates, Members and Friends:

Much has happened this past year in the Lecturer's Department, but

I'm afraid, not enough.

We had the pleasure of attending the National Grange Convention in Madison, Wisconsin where California captured six awards in the Photo Contest. Gordon Rowe, Banner Grange, placed 2nd in Color Photo's, Animals; Ruth Lepper, Ramona Grange, placed 3rd in Black and White Scenes; Margaret Kelly, Encinitas Grange, placed 1st in Black and White Close-ups. A 1st Place to John Espinola, Waterford Grange, in the Time-Lapse, Color; and to Katie Couch, San Jose Grange, 3rd Place in Color Slides, People as well as a 2nd Place in Color Slides, Close-ups.

While at National Grange Convention I had the honor of presenting the Lecturer's Workshop. I was also reappointed to the National Lecturer's

Advisory Committee.

Lecturer's Contest entries have declined this year. A Complete Program saw only two entries at Pomona Level and three at Subordinate Level. This contest is open to all Grangers and I know that there have been some excellent programs presented but apathy and laziness have taken their toll. The Grange Yearbook had 2 Pomona and 7 Subordinate entries. The same as last year with the same Granges entering, with one exception.

Recognition Award Reports were filed bk 5 Pomona Lecturers and 21

Subordinate Lecturers. That's less than 8% of all Lecturers.

The Art and Photo Contest are way down this year. Pre-registration of 40 people with 71 entries. This was less than half the number of entries for 1986.

The Talent Contest improved with 9 entries this year. I suggest that part of the problem was the lack of State Lecturer's Conferences this past year. The decision that the National Grange Leadership Conferences would replace the State Lecturers Conferences was a result of lack of cash flow. But they came too late in the year to motivate members toward Lecturer's Contests.

We did conduct 4 Conferences this year. One at Rainbow Valley Grange, at their expense and three while on the road to and from the Oregon State Convention. These were at Oakdale Grange, Lake Earl Grange and Clear Lake Grange. The results of these Conferences show in the entries in the contests. These four areas are well represented. I think this speaks well of, and points out the need for, conferences.

The highlight of this past year was when Sister Juanita and I represented California at the Oregon State Grange Convention. I learned that there are different ways to get to the same end. We could take some lessons from our sister states. A complete report of this trip was printed in

the August issue of the State Grange News.

Reports from Pomona and Subordinate Lecturers are still lacking. Less than 12% of all Lecturers submit reports. The few reports that are sub-

mitted do not give a very pretty picture of our local Granges. Most of the reports I receive are very negative. With comments like, "We're too old to do anything", "My Grange only wants 5-minute programs", "All they want to do is play Bingo", "No one is interested in programs", etc. A few of the reports are very positive, outlining excellent meetings and programs. These are the Granges who have high attendance and participate in the Contests. The National Grange Award of Excellence was awarded to several of these Lecturers: Dora Mallow, Siskiyou Pomona #6; Diane Lucido, Shasta Pomona #13; Merle Milosevich, Merced County Pomona #23; Ruby Evans, Lake Earl Grange #577; Lorena Wasley, Banner Grange #627; and Mary C. Bey, Encinitas Grange #634. The Lecturer of the Year for 1987 was Fannie Glazier, Guenoc Grange #20.

There has been some concern about the amount of money spent on the various Grange Programs. Let's talk about the Lecturer's Department. During the past year we have expended for: Supplies - \$403.60; Postage -\$407.12; Telephone - \$97.36; Reproduction - \$1487.80; Books for the Library - \$120.37; Mileage - \$788.76; Lodgings - \$795.44; Meals -\$157.96; Production Costs - \$272.00; Lecturer's Salary - \$600.00. Total expenditure: \$5,130.41.

That figures out at less than 15¢ per member per year. Do we really have to be concerned about this Department's expenditures? There are some very special people that I want to recognize. For each of these I have created a special award.

To the staff in the State Grange Office I give the "Busy Little Elves" Award for making sure that all my requests were met - Marjorie Brown updating the Lecturer's Roster, Pat Avila for keeping me informed, Pat Meece for making sure my expenses were covered and Naomi Fletcher for processing and mailing the Lecturer's Quarterly Bulletins. Without these ladies my job would have been near impossible.

To the State Lecturer's Advisory Committee: Dora Mallow, Mary Starnes, Marie Douglas, Louise Strain, Marilyn Johnson, Dorothy Bolton, Ruthe Kibler and Carol Dennis, I present the "Wise Owl" Award. Their counseling, advising, criticizing and just generally assisting me this past year was and is greatly appreciated.

To my loving wife, Juanita, I give the "Push and Shove" Award. She, of all people, knows what it is like to put up with the State Lecturer. Her help and advice has kept me out of "hot water" on several occasions.

### **MEMBERSHIP COORDINATOR - 1987**

Worthy State Master, State Officers and Members:

It gives me great pleasure to report that our losses in Membership are less than last year. Our losses this year were the smallest since 1982. We lost 1,157 members, 132 less than last year. This year there are 87 Granges with a net gain, 20 Granges had a 10% to 25% net gain and 3 Granges had 26% to 50% net gain. Ten Granges had the same as last year. Seven Pomona Granges had a net gain. These Granges will be recognized later on at this session.

I would like to congratulate everyone that has worked on membership development this past year. With your efforts and hard work we kept our losses down. Let's all try for a net gain this year. It would be great if we could show a net gain in membership when we host the National Grange in Redding.

I must digress here for a moment and talk about the Membership Committee and how it can effect membership growth in more Granges.

A Membership Committee is a legal standing Committee in every Grange, according to the National Handbook. We wish that every Grange would establish a Membership Committee, and every Master appoint a Membership Chairman. The name of the Chairman should be sent to Marjorie Brown, Secretary of the California State Grange, for inclusion in the Roster, a copy of which goes to the Master and Secretary of every Grange in the State.

The Membership Committee should be three or five members, including some young members, to aid the Membership Chairman in the important task of convincing dues-delinquent or disinterested Grange Members that they are missed, and that their presence and influence is needed by the Grange.

The Secretary and the Membership Chairman should strive to work together so that the committee can begin calling in plenty of time to save the threatened member from being dropped from the roll. It is not the duty of either the Chairman or the members of the committee to recruit members. That is up to every member of every Grange.

There is no such thing as an un-needed member. Whether a member is active or not, whether he or she is among those present or not, whether he or she is a so-called "insurance member" or a "knife and fork" member is not the criteria by which he or she is to be judged. Some Grange member thought the endangered member would make a good Grange member, and he or she thought the Grange a good organization to join for whatever reason. It is up to the Granges to have some good programs going to attract and hold his or her interest if he or she is to become a productive member.

It is easy when we see new members coming in to our Grange to think we are growing, even though dues-delinquent members are permitted to be dropped continually.

Unfortunately, we do not see them walking out the door since dropping them from the roll is simply a bookkeeping procedure, sometimes quite automatic, not even being brought up as an agenda item by the Secretary.

Grange programs do not necessarily add new members to Granges, nor do they convince dues-delinquent members to remit. Grange programs can only inform Grange members, who then make up their minds, and

who translate ideas into action.

The Granges who have made the finest gains are also large and small, and found in every area of the state. This is one of the most encouraging facts about the whole membership picture. No one area is to be praised, or blamed; no one set of conditions can be pointed out as criteria for loss or for growth.

By and large all Granges have the same old problems, each thinking it is theirs alone. Granges are using available information and are attacking their problems in their own way, and they are working out their own pro-

blems successfully, which is the way it should be.

With determination and a positive attitude on your part, your Grange will be successful in your membership programs.

I want to thank the Worthy State Master for allowing me to play a part in the future of the greatest organization in the world.

## DEAF ACTIVITIES COMMITTEE - 1987

Worthy Master, Delegates and Friends:

The California State Grange Deaf Activities Committee is re-organized and working on several new projects and continuing with already

established programs.

The Sound and Hearing packet was begun by National Grange in conljunction with deaf educators about 6 years ago. It has been acclaimed as the best curriculum tool on deaf awareness by National Deaf associations. Designed for fourth through sixth grade students, our goal is to have at lleast one packet in each grade class each year in this state. An ardous task, but we ask your assistance in contacting the schools in your local areas. Packets can be ordered directly through the National Grange Headquarters. We have a limited supply on hand at State Grange headquarters on a first-ordered, first-shipped basis. These packets are free. Your Grange donations to National and State Grange Deaf Activities make these possible.

In order to make the Sound and Hearing curriculum more interesting to the younger student, the Deaf Activities Committee in Galifornia has developed a "Greate Your Own Poster" contest, specifically for fourth graders enrolled in the 87-88 school year. Prizes on the Subordinate level would be donated by the local Granges judging. First place winners would be sent to State Grange Headquarters for state judging in May, which is Deaf Awareness Month. We would display the winners at the State and National Conventions in Redding in 1988. Awards would reach the students in time for end of school assemblies, and we would hope the Subordinate Granges could arrange to present the awards at that time. Our success in this project, again, depends on you, the Subordinate Grange.

A continuing joint Women's Activities, Junior and Deaf Activities project is the Dogs for the Deaf. We donate about \$6,000 annually to the San Francisco SPCA Dogs for the Deaf Program. The SPCA has revamped their teaching technique and now train 12 dogs and recipients in a single class, three time a year. Our \$6,000 donation for the 1987-88 year will be divided equally among the three classes. As contributors, the Grange is in-

wited to attend each graduation.

The Deaf Activities Committee fund-raising effort to benefit Dogs for the Deaf is the "I Love You" button. When you donate one dollar to the fund, you receive in return a button promoting Grange Deaf Awareness.

Legislative links to the puzzle in Deaf Awareness include the recently signed AB 51, which designates American Sign Language, or ASL, as a foreign language in schools. This enables a school to teach ASL to hearing high school students as a foreign language. Requirements for high school, graduation in California include that a student must have at least two semesters of a visual or performing art or foreign language. Nor Cal Center on Deafness has stated this is the major milestone in promoting Deaf Awareness and opens so many avenues for the deaf, knowing-that students would be learning their language.

This is only the beginning of better things to come. Future plans include creating a coloring book promoting Deaf Awareness, and expansion of the Create Your Own Poster Contest

Your Deaf Activities Committee, at work, to promote Deaf, Awareness in 1987.

## REPORT OF LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT: - 1987/

Worthy Master, State Officers, Delegates, Brothers and Sisters:

The legislative activities of the California State Grange continue to improve, giving better representation to Grange members; and family, farmers. The issues the Grange support remain diverse. The major issues, addressed by the California State Grange Legislative Department in 1987, include:

#### **Blood Donations**

The California State Grange was an original sponsor of Senate Bill 1542 which was passed into law last year to allow parents to donate blood specifically to their offspring. This gave assurances against contaminated blood being transmitted by blood banks and hospitals to the recipient. The Grange sponsored Senate Bill 1008 that would allow individuals to donate blood to designated persons when compatible and prescribed by a physician. The bill has been signed by the Governor.

Center of Cooperatives

The Grange was founded around the cooperative movement and indeed the laws that gave rise to Cooperatives as we know them today are commonly known as the Granger Laws. The California State Grange supported Assembly Bill 1597, signed into law, will establish a California Center for Cooperatives within the University of California system. Once in operation, this Center will serve as a focal point for the University of California, California State Universities, private institutions of higher learning and individuals in developing and supporting education,

research and public outreach programs of direct benefit to cooperatives and their members.

**Refunds For Containers** 

The California State Grange has supported efforts to reinstate deposits and refunds on beverage containers since the effort began many years ago. Assembly Bill 20 signed by the Governor will help implement the intent of the Bottle Bill passed last year with the support of the Grange. These laws will help reduce the amount of litter now evident, encourage recycling, and reduce the average cost to consumers by conserving natural resources and energy. The Grange can certainly be proud of contributing to the reduction of litter and encouraging recycling.

Pest Control

The Grange was vitally involved with the Med-Fly infestation that shook the urban and agriculture communities alike. A great lesson was learned on co-existence and the need to make decisions in the face of a potentially devastating pest. The Grange supports local control but at the same time realizes that people must work together for the common good. Assembly Bill 75 signed by the Governor allows the California Department of Food and Agriculture to take necessary action during a pest infestation when the state is "reasonably certain" that the health concerns of local citizens are being met.

**Dairy Trust Fund** 

State Grange Policy adopted in 1986 supports the resolution of the "dairy handler" problem as it pertains to the dairy industry. The Grange supported Assembly Bill 2400/Senate Bill 29 as signed by the Governor to address the dairy problem of a handler going bankrupt and not being able to pay the farmer. The new law provides a surety bond varying in size depending upon the plants' volume and the establishment of a "Security Trust Fund" to be administered by the California Department of Food and Agriculture and funded by fees collected from the handlers. The Grange felt this approach was preferable to a "Priority Lien", insurance, or cash approach.

Grange Trust Fund

The California State Grange sponsored legislation that would clarify Civil Procedures as it affected the Grange. Grange families, many now deceased, who participated in our cooperative dividend certificate program had dividends they did not claim and the Grange is unable to find proper heirs. Assembly Bill 1309, signed by the Governor, allows those dividends to revert to the Grange as a donation instead of being taken by the State. Since consumer cooperatives were given protection last year, the Grange was successful in attaining equal treatment so future generations of Grange members would benefit through the Grange Trust Fund satisfying the wishes of our past generations.

California Grown Produce

Assembly Bill 121 is signed into law and will require any public entity, when purchasing food, to give preference to California grown produce.

The Grange strongly favors this bill as a very efficient method of distributing support from the state. There will be minimal cost for administration so most of the dollars go directly to the grower through increased demand. While the Grange would like to see a targeted program to help family farmers, this program lets the market distribute the funds. Most importantly, the Grange supported this bill because tax dollars used to purchase food for public entities will be used to support California's farmers and not to build subsidized foreign exchange for some country at the expense of California's family farmers.

It has been a pleasure serving you.

You very seldom think of goals but you do think about problems, injustices and inconveniences.

The Community Service Award Program is designed to encourage every Subordinate Grange to step forward and provide the necessary

leadership and initiative needed to improve its community.

For years the Grange has headed up countless improvement projects in the community, improved and brightened appearances, worked on recreational facilities, worked to repair community churches, helped on a project involving community facilities, housing, health programs and many others. It is important that your Grange enter the Community Service Program, carry out the projects, and report them fully to the State Grange.

Problems in your community can be corrected by a wide variety of factors, some of which are clearly visible and some of which may not be obvious. Using Community Service is an opportunity to project the image of your Grange into the Community and demonstrate to everyone the in-

terest and concern that you have.

In California we have two other means to recognize those who have been of a service to their community.

The Grange Image Award is used to recognize those Subordinate Granges who have performed an outstanding service to their community or done an excellent job in improving their Grange meeting place. Every Subordinate Grange may enter but only if they submit entry forms for the Community Service Award program. You do not need to submit a final report in the Community Service Award Program, just enter.

The other Award used to recognize Community Service is the Volunteer of the Year Award. This is presented to an individual who has performed service to the community away from the Grange and in the name of the

Grange.

Today we wish to recognize and present awards to those persons and Granges who have followed through with their project and reported the same to the State Grange.

We had a total of 57 Granges enter the Community Service Award Program with only 17 submitting final reports. This was 10 less than in 1986. For the Grange Image Award and Volunteer of the Year Award we received 12 entries, again this was less than in prior years.

## **GRANGE NEWS REPORT - 1987**

Worthy Master, Honored Guests, Brothers and Sisters:

I can see it now ... 72-point banner headlines which tell how the Grange News came in under budget. But, as Paul Harvey would say, the Rest of the Story might be buried on page 20 ... the Grange News requires

a subsidy from the State Grange to survive.

Survival seems to be one of the themes of this convention. To survive, we need more income. And the best way to get that income appears to be in recruiting new members. For the Grange News, survival is also in recruiting new advertisers - and membership and advertising go hand in hand; the more members we circulate to, the greater our desirablity as an

advertising medium.

We have tried many schemes to gain advertisers, many of them involving you, the membership. We have tried to pay you a commission to sell advertising, we have tried to bribe you with a chance on a trip to Mexico. None of them worked. We will continue to come up with plans and schemes, and most of them will probably involve asking you, the general membership, to help.

Will they work? Only you know the answer to that, for it is you that holds the key to their success. Currently, we are asking two things of you:

First, as a local Pomona or Subordinate Grange, please take the time to send a Christmas card, or thank-you note, to the Grange News Advertisers in your community. You are the only reason they are advertising in the News. A card from us in Sacramento is meaningless, they want to know that the people in their community, their potential customers, see the ad and know that they are there.

Unfortunately, there are not that many of them, it is not a hard nor time consuming task we are asking of you. But the P-R value to the Grange News would be immeasurable.

Secondly, we are asking that if you do shop with a merchant who is not an advertiser, please write his name and address down, what his product is, and give us permission to use your name as a customer, then send it to us in Sacramento. We will write him a personal letter asking him to advertise in the Grange News. Of the few Grangers who have taken the time to send us the names of merchants, I am happy to report that we have had a 50% closing rate in gaining new advertising.

And the more advertising revenue we generate, the less of a subsidy we will need from the State Grange.

I would like to take a moment now and tell you about the Department called the Grange News.

Foremost, of course, is the publishing of the California Grange News, a product I am quite proud of. It is a proprietary pride, since I am the writer, the editor, the typesetter, the photographer, the camera room operator, the paste-up artist, the equipment maintenance man, the copy boy and the gofer.

All these activities take up about 70% of the time and about 80% of the materials in the Grange News Budget.

About 10% of the time I wear a computer programmers hat. I create the programs that keep the Grange Roster and Subscription lists current: programs that allow us to offer help to the general membership as with the Billing Service; and to create special statistical reports such as the Deputy Evaluations which can help us keep the members we have and possibly help attract new ones.

About 20% of the time I get to be creative and wear my Graphic Arts cap. Here, too, is where the other 20% of the materials are spent, in creating certificates for all occasions, special presentations, flyers, brochures, tickets, badges, pins, letterheads, forms, and whatever else a

Master whose first words in the morning are usually, "Hey! I've got an idea" can dream up. It is here also that we produce the Journal of Proceedings and other Grange booklets.

We do keep busy. We are always looking for ideas that will enable us to

better serve the membership.

I have one last task before closing, and that's to find out who will be going on our Booster Barrel trip. And the winner is Jules Faoro.

## **GRANGERS BUSINESS ORGANIZATION - 1987**

State Officers, Delegates, and Members of the California State Grange: This will be my last oral report to the California State Grange as president of the Grangers Business Organization. We will try to complete the dissolution of the G.B.O. this year, but in any event no later than the close of our fiscal year, 1988.

Last year I outlined an orderly schedule to conclude the business affairs

of the Grangers Business Organization by:

(A) Transferring all the certificate information to the computer in an acceptable form for the State of California in the event the G.B.O. must transfer all unclaimed certificate funds to the Treasurer of the State of California. This has been accomplished; all accounts are in the computer, totaling \$111,085.14.

(B) Pursuing in conjunction with the California State Grange the feasibility of introducing legislation to exempt the Grangers Business Organization from Sections 7132 and 7411 of the Non-Profit Mutual Benefit Corporation Law, to permit the payment of unclaimed certificate funds to the California State Grange instead of the State of California. Legislators were consulted regarding an amendment to Sections 7132 and 7411 of the Non-Profit Mutual Benefit Corporation Law.

The problem with this approach was that it would open up a Pandora's Box and bring in many, many similar organizations and therefore was abandoned at the suggestion of legislators. Our current attorney concurs.

The California State Grange and the Grangers Business Organization lobbied successfully in 1987 to secure passage of Assembly Bill 1309 by Assemblyman Norman Waters, amending Section 822 of the Food and Agricultural Code to exempting any propriatory interest in an agricultural corporation from the Escheat Laws of California, if specific conditions are met so the interest would become property of the Association rather than being transferred to the State of California.

The Grangers Business Organization, after research, does not qualify under this legislation unless it changes its Articles of Incorporation to an

Agricultural Cooperative.

Attorney Wulff, in an opinion on January 8, 1981, stated:

- 1. "The basic effect of the change in the structure of the Grangers Business Organization is to change G.B.O. from an Agricultural Purchasing Cooperative to a Non-Profit Mutual Benefit Corporation.
- 2. "The current operations of the G.B.O. do not truly reflect the requirements of a purchasing cooperative and therefore the structure *must* be changed.
- 3. "The net result of the new structure of a Non-Profit Mutual Corporation will be minimal from the viewpoint of the individual G.B.O. members."

We followed the legal advise given in 1981. The changing of the G.B.O. status to an Agricultural Cooperative at this time would be futile.

Attorney Griffin concurs in our decision. She stated, "We have also obtained an exemption from unclaimed property law for agriculture cooperatives only to discover that the G.B.O. can no longer qualify as a cooperative."

A potential solution has been offered by our legal counsel. G.B.O. representatives, together with the California State Grange, seek a minor legislative amendment to Assembly Bill 1309 to clearly place the G.B.O. within the terms of the enacted legislation. As an example, the Association entitled to the exemption could be those formed as Agricultural Cooperatives as of a specific date regardless of their later conversion to a Non-Profit Corporation or dissolution.

### Sale Of Property

Pursuant to a certified appraisal ordered by the Board of Directors, the San Jose property was sold to Michael and Rena D'Angelo for \$74,000; and the Lancaster property to John and Eloise Butler for \$75,000. In both sales the G.B.O. took back notes of \$66,000 and \$72,000 at 10% interest, secured by deeds of trust. In both instances, principal and interest are payable each month with 20-year pay out.

The Fresno petroleum plant which was appraised at \$140,000 has not sold due to a depressed market for road maintenance materials.

The property is leased to KBK Oil Co. until April 30, 1988 for \$670.05 per month. This property will be deeded to the California State Grange on dissolution.

The only other real estate property owned by the G.B.O. is the store and warehouse building now occupied by the Grangers Business Organization, Sacramento County Grange Federal Credit Union and the purchasing department of the U.C.D. Medical Center. This property has an estimated value in excess of \$300,000. This property will also be deeded to the California State Grange on dissolution.

#### George Sehlmeyer's Place In History

Some of you probably know very little about him. Let me tell you something about the man. I might have been tempted to use some information which was in print in November of 1962 and forgotten by maybe all of you, but I do recall that recently Senator Biden, who was a candidate for president of the United States, was caught doing just that and as a result he has elected to resign from the race. Therefore, I will quote entirely the editorial. I couldn't say it better. Quote:

The recent passing of George Sehlmeyer closed the career of one of the most forceful and courageous characters ever gracing California public life. In the 1930's when farmers and homeowners were losing their homes and life's work, he battled for ways to forestall foreclosure and was instrumental in inaugurating prorate and marketing orders on fruits and vegetables which saved large areas of

California from utter ruin.

These types of marketing orders from George Sehlmeyer's brain became patterns for most of the same type used today throughout

America.

Probably his greatest single achievement was his bulldog determination which resulted in the waters impounded by Shasta, Folsom and similar dams, be allocated to independent family farm operations, with the sale of electric power generated by the dams,

reducing the cost of water within the range of agriculture to profitably use it.

In a large measure California's annual three million dollar agricultural output is the result of this man's energy, foresight and influence.

Pages could be written reciting his battles over the years for the rights of the individual against entrenched wealth.

His greatest love, next to his family, was his Grange - No sacrifice was too great, no distance too far to travel, in promoting the welfare of his fellow Grangers.

For thirty years he guided the destinies of the Grange in California and his name is known from the Oregon border to the Mexican line

His abilities were equally recognized beyond the borders of California. The National Grange acknowledged him the major Parliamentarian of the Order.

Thousands of lives are richer by association with this truly great man.

As the years roll on, the name of George Sehlmeyer will be increasingly honored.

Truly, he was one of the Giants. Unquote

#### Certificate Account - Gibraltor Savings & Loan

The Certificate Account in the amount of \$111,085.04 is deposited with the Gibraltor Savings & Loan in Sacramento. The purpose of this separate account is to separate from all other deposits the amount which will be due to the Treasurer of the State of California, unless the California State Grange is successful in amending Assembly Bill 1309, specifically exempting the California State Grange and Grangers Business Organization from the California Escheat Law.

Our attorney has advised, "Absent a change in the law, we cannot recommend a method to allow Grangers Business Organization or California State Grange to retain the certificate holders' funds without exposing the Directors of both entities to potential liability."

A prime objective then for the California State Grange and G.B.O. in 1988 is to exert energies to amend the present law to exempt the California State Grange and G.B.O. from the California Escheat Law.

In conveyance of the Grangers Business Organization assets to the California State Grange upon dissolution, the Board of Directors will specify that if the California State Grange is successful in amending the intent of Assembly Bill 1309, the funds presently deposited in the certificate account must be changed to a "George Schlmeyer Memorial Scholarship Endowment Fund" for the purpose of awarding annual scholarships to under graduate students majoring in vocational education.

Why a George Sehlmeyer Memorial Scholarship Fund? The funds deposited in the Certificate Account were earned during the tenure of

George Sehlmeyer as Master of the California State Grange and President of the Grangers Business Organization while the G.B.O. was operating as an Agricultural Cooperative.

#### Conclusion

The Board of Directors of the Grangers Business Organization in session last Sunday, October 18, 1987, approved the dissolution of the G.B.O. and authorized and directed the President and Secretary to carry out the dissolution within legal restraints which may be imposed and further directed that the President, Secretary and Executive Committee together with the Master of the California State Grange to continue to seek legislative approval exempting the G.B.O. and the California State Grange from the California Escheat Law on the funds now on deposit in a G.B.O. Certificate Account at Gibraltor Savings & Loan in Sacramento. The Board of Directors further resolved to time the dissolution of the G.B.O. to a specific event happening, either the approval of amending AB1309 to exempt the G.B.O. and the California State Grange from the Escheat Law or the defeat of the legislation.

I am reminded, if the legislation to amend AB1309 is successful the G.B.O. will again be required to contact all certificate holders unless the

present terms of AB1309 is amended.

## **GRANGE INSURANCE ASSOCIATION REPORT - 1986**

To the Officers and Members of the California State Grange:

Following is an extract from GIA's 1986 Annual Statement, compared with the same data for the past two years:

1986 premiums were up 5.8% and the Association's net worth increased 25.1% to an all time high of \$116 million in assets. This is an over-all increase of 6.5% for the year. Policyholder surplus increased by nearly \$6 million in 1986. A good share of the improved results for 1986 can be attributed to recent efforts to control loss experience, improved operational efficiency, and help from relatively mild weather in the fourth quarter within our operating states.

Even though 1986 was a much improved year from the last two or three years, at this time we cannot see any reduction in rates for 1987 due to continuing adverse trends in some coverages and several unknown large

cost items that we possibly may be drawn into before year's end. One item that could change our expenses in the 1986 tax reform act. We could be facing a sizeable payment to the Internal Revenue Service for the 1987 operating year. Another item which we have no control over is the failure of other insurance companies within our operating territory. By law, insurance companies are assessed by State Guaranty Associations for claims owed by failing companies. We are currently facing potentially large assessments within our operating states for the recent failure of one large company.

The continuing decline of membership in our operating states is also a very serious item which affects both GIA and the State Granges, and in some areas requires adjustments in operation for both the State Grange and GIA. Washington continues to develop the largest percent of income followed by California and Oregon:

## INTERIM CONSTITUTION & BY-LAWS COMMITTEE **REPORT - 1987**

Officers and Members of the California State Grange:

As Chairman of the Interim Constitution and By-Laws Committee I would like to thank the members of the Committee:

Bev Westphal, Lake County Pat Schunneman, Santa Clara County Pat Prescott, Placer County Steven Hood, Fresno County

Our work started prior to the previous convention, when we were charged to make a recommendation on the new proposed National C&BL. We

met that challenge with enthusiasm and with an open mind.

We were next charged with the responsibility to review the 1986 C&BL of the California State Grange, since the National Grange was about to adopt the new C&BL. We accomplished this charge in stages. The first was to match section-for-section our 1986 C&BL with the National C&BL. The second was to note all sections in conflict. The third was to propose resolutions to bring our 1986 C&BL into conformity with the National Grange. Our final stage was to propose a newly written C&BL patterned after the new National C&BL, using it as a framework.

We met many times over the past year, devoting hundreds of hours of work to our task. Between meetings, we corresponded, noting errors and corrections that needed to be made, prior to our next meeting. We accepted input from the Worthy Master and Executive Committee. The work that we presented to you in the form of C&BL Resolutions 12

through 70 is the result of the work of our committee.

Where possible in the rewrite, we used the language of the new National Grange C&BL to avoid conflicts. Those sections which were unique to our 1986 C&BL were also incorporated into the rewrite. New sections were clearly marked, as we wanted everything to be above-board, and available to you the delegate. We feel that the new C&BL will be a step forward for the California State Grange. We have now incorporated into the C&BL references to the Junior, Subordinate, Pomona and State Grange into one, easy-to-use document. You may note that the rewrite is about half the size of the 1986 C&BL. This was made possible by elimination of the duplication of the sections between the various sections of the 1986 C&BL.

In conclusion, we feel that the rewrite of the C&BL adopted here in Stockton will serve as a blueprint that we can build a new and revitalized

California State Grange with.

## INTERIM WATER COMMITTEE REPORT 1987

Worthy Master, Delegates and Members:

The California State Grange Interim Water Committee met several times in 1987. Committee members include Johnny Squire, Ernie White, Richard Dahms, Joe Plagenza, Howard March and Paul Tschirky. John Welty, Legislative Consultant, and Naomi Fletcher, legislative Staff, were available for information and resource material.

The committee reviewed pending legislation and the Boyden Delta Barrier Plan. Brother Mike Ireland from Butte County addressed the committee to present the Boyden Delta Salt-Water Intrusion Barrier. This barrier is based on the Dutch Tide Barrier that has been in use several years and works quite effectively. The Interim Water Committee voted unanimously to encourage the Army Corps of Engineers to place the Boyden Barrier on the Sausalito Water project Model at a cost of \$100,000 to study its feasibility. The Department of Water Resources has studied this barrier extensively.

Two of the committee members attended a presentation on the Boyden Delta Barrier Plan to the Delta Protection Advisory Panel in Rio Vista and reported back to the committee on the hearings. The committee has sent a request to the Corps of Engineers to have a tour of the Bay and Delta

hydraulic model in Sausalito.

Legislative bills reviewed by the committee were in seven main areas including: Federal legislation, Water Resources Development, Water Rights, Groundwater Management, Water Project Financing, Water Sales and Exchanges, and Water Reclamation.

Federal Legislation

Congressman Lehman from California has introduced the Mid-Valley Canal Project in the form of HR 572. The Committee recommends letters to all parties concerned to reiterate the need for overdraft protection in the mid-valley and south-valley areas, and that the water is already developed, it merely needs the transportation mechanism. The cost would be reimbursed by the users.

Congressman Lehman has also introduced HR 799 which would designate portions of the Kings River as a Wild and Scenic river. The committee recommends an opposed position on the grounds that the Rogers Crossing project remains incomplete. It is noted that Senator Cranston has hopped on board this particular issue in support of Wild and Scenic Rivers.

A concession has been negotiated on this issue which will allow the raising of the Pine Flat Dam and place the Upper Kings River in projected designation, which does not totally preclude future development. The committee recommended to the Executive Committee that the California State Grange support the bill as negotiated. The Executive Committee gave its support and the appropriate letters were sent.

Water Resources Development

The Committee recommends SUPPORT of the following: AB 712 - Waters. This bill would include the Auburn Dam as an authorized unit of the State Water Project. In a related resolution from Fair Oaks Grange that appears in the 1987 Resolution Pad, the committee felt they could support a funding mechanism as provided for in the resolution through extension.

SB 27 - Ayala. Water: National Parks. It only goes without saying that we should offer support to this bill. It will prohibit construction or enlargement of any dam, reservoir, or other water impoundment facility

within the boundaries of a national park.

The Committee recommends OPPOSITION of:

AB 975 - Costa. Dams. This would require the Department of Fish and Game to compile a listing of those dams on all rivers and strams naturally frequented by fish and to examine those dams regularly and periodically. The committee felt there are insufficient funds to carry on a program such as this on the limited Fish and Game budget on a continuous basis.

Under further study is SB 1210 - Keene and Marks. This bill would require the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) to include a determination on plans and proposals for authorization of a water project for construction or operation by the state, and that those plans and proposals pose no adverse impact on beneficial uses. There is a question regarding "beneficial uses."

The California State Grange Water Committee will remain neutral on local case use issues, such as SB 1339 - Sacramento River Flood Control Project. Ernie White, Committee member, will provide further input in

the future in this regard.

In addition, the committee recommends SUPPORT of the following:

SB 28 - Ayala: Water Resources Development. This bill would provide for the Governor's Delta Water Facilities, but prohibit inclusion of a peripheral canal. The committee feels that if an executive order is necessary to complete the projects, then our support is offered.

SB 32 - Ayala: Water Resources Development. This bill designates construction of a Delta Facility, Los Banos Grandes Reservoir, Kellogg Reservoir, Los Vaqueros Reservoir and the Mid-Valley Canal. It also requires

these projects to be placed on a schedule for construction.

SB 35 - Ayala: Delta Water Resources. This bill suports the US Supreme Court decision to uphold Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta Water rights and

water quality.

SB 36 - Ayala: Water Resources Development. This bill will remove the operational limits imposed on the project aqueduct system for the Army

Corps of Engineers.

AB 525 - Stirling: Water Facilities. this bill calls for an isolated canal to transport water through or around the delta. It also requires the SWRCB to carry on necessary studies to establish objectives for the protection of reasonable and beneficial uses of water in the Bay.

AB 1710 - Costa: Water Resources Development - Delta Improvements. This bill, in general, provides funding for delta levee repairs and would direct the Department of Fish and Game and the Department of Water Resources to provide necessary facilities to provide for fishery protection when the Delta facilities are constructed.

The committee recommends OPPOSING the following:

AB 2128 - Bates: Water Resources. This bill would be opposed on three main points:

- 1. Prohibits SWRCB from issuing new permits which allow for diversion from delta to areas south except for water available as a result of conservation;
- 2. SWRCB will reject applications which divert water from Eel, Klamath, Smith, Trinity or Van Duzen to other hydrological basins in the state;
- 3. Oppose the denial of applications unless the conservation methods are met by the user.

AB 2244 - Bates: Water Resources Development - Delta Plan. This bill is opposed in general and in specific as those noted in AB 2128 above.

Water Rights

Several bills are still under study in this particular area; however, support is being offered to:

SB 33 - Ayala: Water Rights. This bill makes no substative changes to established code relative to water rights.

SB 34 - Ayala: Water Rights - Standards. This bill is supported in that it will prohibit reservations as a condition of a permit or license.

Groundwater Management

AB 1708 - Costa: Groundwater Management. This committee felt it could suport this bill as long as the joint powers agreement that would be established does not exclude the vote of the people the agreement will impact. The bill authorizes local agencies to establish programs for management of groundwater resources within the area which that water service is being provided in accordance with prescribed procedures.

Those bills being watched for their movement include:

AB 795 - Water Conservation Projects

AB 813 - Groundwater Recharge Facilities

AB 844 - Water Conservation: Groundwater Recharges.

The committee OPPOSES:

HR 2320 - Management Plan: Groundwater Controls. Reference S-A-85-1978 and S-C-2-85.

Water Project Financing

AB 2314 and 2315 by Norm Waters will be watched closely without Grange support. Both bills provide unspecified funding for several projects.

Water Sales and Exchanges

The committee recommends SUPPORT OF AB 734 - Johnston and Vasconcellos: Water Sales and Exchanges. This bill would require any sale or exchange involving a change in the point of diversion, place or use, or purpose of use to be approved by the SWRCB. The review would occur

at least once every four years.

#### Water Reclamation

Bills covering water reclamation are in the "watch" category. None fit specifically into Grange Water Policy, or are local use issues.

East Bay Municiple Utility District

The committee is following the developments of the East Bay Municipal Utility District plans to transport American River water around the Delta in an isolated canal (their own version of a peripheral canal). The committee feels the water should be taken out of the Delta like everyone else is required to do.

Pleasant Valley Water District

The committee received and reviewed a request from the Pleasant Valley Water District, which was originally included in the San Luis Unit the Central Valley Project and removed by an administrative ruling. Their request was for help in reinstating them in the CVP. The committee reviewed the correspondence from the district and the Bureau concerning this matter. The appropriate letters were written to the District stating that we support their position and at the appropriate time, will send letters to the Bureau.

At this time, the Bureau of Reclamation is doing a series of Environmental Impact Reportsgon the upper Sacramento River system, the Delta area and the South San Joaquin Valley area. These are being conducted to determine the affects of future deliveries of more water through the Delta to the South. The California State Grange has been participating in this process. Also, several Subordinate and Pomona Granges are participating at this time. The bureau estimates there is possibly 1.5 million acre/feet of water still available to be delivered.

A resolution was written for presentation to the delegate body supporting Groundwater Management plans as long as the control of said plans remain under the control of the local areas.

#### Conservation Reserve Program

The Conservation Reserve program of the 1985 Farm Bill was discussed in limited details as a large amount of land is being entered into the program and this will have an effect on water use patterns.

#### Conclusion

The committee reviewed several packets of bills of interest to the Grange concerning water issues. These were compiled and sent to the members by Noami Fletcher, Legislative Staff of the California State Grange. The committee wishes to express its thanks to Naomi for keeping it informed on a regular basis on developments in the legislature, researching the files for position statements and preparing position statements and letters to be sent to the Legislators and Government agencies. She also kept the Executive Committee and Master informed on the workings of the committee.

We greatly appreciate the help and efforts of John Welty in analyzing

legislation and preparing responses.

The committee members wish to thank the State Master for the opportunity to serve the California State Grange in this capacity. We have enjoyed this work, and look forward to being able to continue on with this most important aspect of Agriculture.

- 1. Badges: No one will enter the Session without a badge which signifies their \$5.00 Registration Fee has been paid.
- Registration \$5.00 Fee shall close on Thursday, October 22, 1987 at 12:00 PM.
- 3. Regisration Fee of \$5.00 per person shall be waivered for Junior Grangers, Invited Guests and anyone not attending the general business session.
- 4. Resolution Closing Time for the acceptance of properly submitted resolutions shall be 11:30 AM, Tuesday, October 20, 1987.
- Committee Resolution Closing Time shall be 4:00 PM, Tuesday, October 20, 1987.
- 6. Resolution Identity: Resolutions properly submitted after September 18, 1987, but before the October 20, 1987, 11:30 AM deadline, will be included in the supplemental resolution pad and will lose their Grange identity.
- 7. Resolution Introduction: A vote shall not be taken on a resolution unless it has been in the delegates' hands at least four (4) hours (G-7-79).
- 8. Resolutions: Constitutional Resolutions shall not be combined in Committee (SG-36-82).
- Amendments To Resolutions: Any delegate wishing to amend a
  resolution on the floor will attempt to have his amendment in
  writing to be read to the delegation and submitted to the Secretary's

# Greenhorn Grange #384 THE WHITE GARDEN SNAIL (Theba Pisana)

- 1. WHEREAS: The recent introduction of the white garden snail into San Diego County is capable of adapting and establishing in most climatic zones in California, and
- 2. WHEREAS: Quarantine compliance costs estimated by the California Department of Food and Agriculture may ultimately exceed \$1 million annually, and
- 3. WHEREAS: The statewide establishment of this pest may result in an annual crop loss of over \$8 million, even after chemical controls are used, and
- 4. WHEREAS: The White Garden Snail is a known intermediate host of significant parasites of sheep and cattle, and assists in the dispersal of plant pathogens, and
- 5. WHEREAS: This snail would become a major pest of gardens, flowers, and evergreen trees, and would result in doubling the amount of pesticide (methaldehyde) currently being used in our environment, therefore, be it
- 6. RESOLVED: That Siskiyou Pomona Grange #6 urges the California State Grange to request of the California Department of Food and

Agriculture to initiate an eradication program against the White Garden Snail in San Diego County.

# Tulelake Grange #468 CONCERNING SUPPORT OF THE HARKIN/GEPHARDT "SAVE THE FAMILY FARM ACT"

- 1. WHEREAS: The economic viability of this nation is contingent upon the production of new and real wealth, and
- 2. WHEREAS: This wealth is generated primarily from the production of food and fiber on America's family farms and ranches, and
- 3. WHEREAS: A reasonably priced, adequate supply of food and fiber can most efficiently be produced by a family farm system based on widely dispersed land ownership, and

- 4. WHEREAS: The retailer would probably package for the 3% short weight rather than the printed weight, and
- 5. WHEREAS: This would be a fraud on the consumers, therefore, be it
- 6. RESOLVED: The California State Grange oppose AB2513 and any other legislation proposing this kind of action by sending a letter to all committees hearing AB2513 and any other legislation of this type, and be it futher
- 7. RESOLVED: That the California State Grange support the policy of packaging to the weight printed on the package.

### Feather River Grange #440 COUNTY GOVERNMENT FISCAL RELIEF

- 1. WHEREAS: The ability of the county governments to raise revenues is limited by law, and
- 2. WHEREAS: The state legislature and state department continue to pass on to counties state mandated programs without providing funding for them, and
- 3. WHEREAS: An average of 95% of counties revenues are required to fund these programs leaving only an average of 5% in discretionary funds for normal county functions, and
- 4. WHEREAS: SB90 (passed in 1972) and known as the "Property Tax Relief Act of 1972" required the state to reimburse local governments for the costs of mandated programs or increased levels of service required of them, and
- 5. WHEREAS: Counties are losing control over the mandated programs they administer, state laws and court decisions keep changing the rules, and
- 6. WHEREAS: Many normal county functions must be cut back or eliminated to provide mandated programs such as Sheriff's Patrols, welfare fraud investigations, Libraries, reading programs, recreational programs, etc., therefore, be it
- 7. RESOLVED: That the California State Grange urge the proper implementation of "Property Tax Relief Act of 1972" (SB90), and be it further

8. RESOLVED: That the California State Grange oppose all state mandated programs, be they legislated laws or department directives with power of law, that do not provide funding.

- 5. RESOLVED: That the California State Grange use its influence to encourage the state legislature to make it mandatory that an offender be required to restore an altered vehicle to "stock" specifications within a specified period of time or face a contempt of court action, and fine.
