Standing Rules of Convention

The Standing Rules of the Convention, will apply only to the 132nd Annual Session of the California State Grange, Sparks, Nevada, 2004 (Reference: Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, Chapter XIX, Section 58.)

REGISTRATION FEE: The \$30 registration fee shall be waived for Junior Grangers, invited guests, and out of state guests

BADGES: No one will be admitted to the session without a badge which signifies their registration fee has been paid (except as noted above).

DELEGATE REGISTRATION: Closing date and time for Delegate Registration shall be Thursday, OCTOBER

14, 2004 at NOON. Any late registrant MUST have the approval of the State Master.

RESOLUTION CLOSING TIME: The closing time for the acceptance of properly submitted resolutions shall be 12 Noon, THURSDAY, OCTOBER 14, 2004. For committee resolutions, the closing time shall be Friday, OCTOBER 15, 2004 AT 4:00 PM.

RESOLUTION INTRODUCTION: A vote shall not be taken on a resolution unless it has been in the delegates' hands at least two (2) hours.

COMBINING C&BL RESOLUTIONS: Constitutional Resolutions shall not be combined in Committee (SG-36-82)

AMENDMENTS TO RESOLUTIONS: All motions to amend resolutions which are excessively long shall be presented in writing to the Secretary's Station, so as to be properly entered into the minutes.

FLOOR MOTIONS IN WRITING: All motions made from the floor concerning subjects new to the Grange and not presented in resolutions shall be presented in writing to the Secretary's Station, so as to be properly entered into the minutes.

FLOOR DEBATE: Shall be limited to two (2) minutes per delegate on any given question.

OFFICER REPORTS: The written reports of all officers shall be submitted to the Secretary's Station prior to the close of the first day of session for inclusion in the Journal of Proceedings.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES: The Executive Committee shall have the authority to approve the minutes of the final day of session at their meeting after the close of the session.

C&BL RESOLUTIONS: All C&BL resolutions shall be presented no later than 1:30 P.M. on the 2nd day of the session and be processed until completed, except for those being recommitted. (91-006)

CONVENTION SITE (S) VOTING: Voting by the delegate body to select future convention sites for the Annual Session of the California State Grange shall be conducted only by paper ballot. (97-003)

Minutes of the Annual Session

Thursday, October 14th

Opening of the Grange

William Booth, Past Master of the California State Grange had the honor of introducing the officers of the California State Grange.

The opening song of America The Beautiful was lead by Sister Kathy Parra, Lecturer of the California State Grange.

Sister Linda Chernoff, Worthy Flora with the aid of the Assistant Stewards Mike Blesch and Susie Laskowski, presented the Flag of our country.

Worthy Master, Tom Stefenoni, Master of the California State Grange declared the Grange open in the Sixth Degree.

Roll Call of Officers

Roll call of the officers of the California State Grange found all officers present.

Lowering the Grange to the Fourth Degree

Master Stefenoni lowered the session to the fourth degree and all fourth degree members were allowed in the session.

Honored Guests

Honored Guests were escorted to the Master's Station. William Steel, Master of the National Grange, Leo T. Bergeron, Past Master of the California State Grange, William Booth, Past Master of the California State Grange and Sister Lillian were received and asked to give welcoming remarks.

National Master Brother Steel gave an official greeting from the National Grange on the opening of the 132nd annual session of the California State Grange. The Grange is recognized as an historic organization, a voice for farmers, rural residents and families across America. It is our chance to change tomorrow's history. Brother Steel advised the delegates that he would be leaving the session on Friday as he has the unique opportunity of chartering the Alaska State Grange.

Past Master Brother Bergeron greeted the delegates with great pleasure. The members are the important part of the Grange. He said the delegates are truly the honored guests.

Past First Lady Sister Lillian mentioned that she has known the Worthy Master since the day he joined the Grange. She shared a couple of "isms" that apply to "us" as Grange members. If it is to be it is up to me; a system is only as good as its use; remember who you are; do it, do it right, do it right now.

Past Master Brother Booth stated the brothers and sisters of the Grange come first as they are the lifeblood of the organization. Brother Booth remembered Sister Emily Felder who was the State Lecturer when he was State Master. The future of our organization is up to us.

Brother Bergeron introduced his wife Sister Kathy Bergeron who as well as being the current Secretary of the California State Grange, is also a Past First Lady.

Partial Credential Report

The Secretary Kathy Bergeron gave a partial credential report. There are 60 subordinate Granges and 15 Pomona Granges represented. A quorum was called.

The Worthy Master gave a history of the large gavel used to open the session, which was made with the wood from one of the first three orange trees sent to California by William Saunders. He also gave a description of the gavel he will use for the rest of the session which was given to him by Jules Faoro whose Grange membership and that of Sister Irene are an inspiration to him.

A time certain was moved by Bergeron on Resolution 04-038 for 2:00pm on Thursday. Seconded. Motion adopted.

A time certain was moved by Bergeron on Resolution 04-025, 04-026, 04-027 and 04-028 for Friday prior to the approval of the budget. Seconded. Motion adopted.

The Worthy Secretary and Treasurer announced that there is a table behind their station for the purpose of writing letters to our armed forces. Please join them in writing letters to our service men abroad and at home to show our support.

Moved to adopt Resolution 04-004 PP. Seconded. Motion. Discussion. Resolution adopted.

04-020 PP Changing California Property Tax Deadlines. Committee report was favorable. Discussion. Resolution adopted.

Master's Address

Worthy Overseer Randall Lewis was called to the Master's Station. The Worthy Overseer presented the California State Grange Master Tom Stefenoni for his report. Master Stefenoni gave the Part 1 of his General Address.

It was moved to accept Part 1 of the State Masters General Address and print it in the journal of proceedings. Seconded. Motion adopted.

It was moved to accept the Grange Youth Fair Program report and enter it into the journal of proceedings. Seconded. Motion adopted.

Brother Bergeron requested a 15-minute recess prior to the approval of the Executive Committee actions.

04-009 PP – Adopt Low-Ignition Cigarette Standards. Committee report is unfavorable as there are currently laws to address this issue. Discussion. It was moved to recommit the resolution to the committee. Seconded. Motion adopted. The resolution 04-009 is recommitted to the Public Policy committee.

Officer and Directors Reports

Sister Betty Eyler, GWA Director, gave her report. It was moved to adopt the GWA report and print it in the Journal of Proceedings. Seconded. Motion adopted.

Patty Allen and Bill Allen gave their Youth Director report. It was moved to adopt the Youth Director report and print it in the Journal of Proceedings. Seconded. Motion adopted.

Sister Leslie Parker, Director for of Family Health Resources, gave her report. It was moved to adopt the Family Health Resources report and print it in the Journal of Proceedings. Seconded. Motion adopted.

Sister Lucette Moramarco, State Junior Grange Director, gave her report. It was moved to adopt the Junior Grange report and print it in the Journal of Proceedings. Seconded. Motion adopted.

The meeting was recessed for 10 minutes. The Assistants Stewards were instructed to close the altar on the bible.

The meeting reconvened at 11:25am and the bible was opened.

Approval of the Executive Committee Actions 2003/2004

Chairman Johnny Squire gave his Executive Committee report. It was moved to adopt the Executive Committee Report and print it in the Journal of Proceedings. Seconded. Discussion. Bergeron corrected the voting of the Overseer as being granted in 1997 but implemented in 2003. Motion adopted.

Discussion - Brother Booth expressed concerns with the web site proposals discussed in the meetings. He stated the actions were not communicated to him in an "above board" manner.

Amanda Booth stated her concerns regarding the e-mail meetings. The by-laws 9.1 state "members present" and it is not possible to determine if the members were present.

Kathy Bergeron stated as State Secretary, she is now excluded from the Executive Committee e-mail meetings.

Kirby Hitt stated other avenues of telecommunication meetings.

Brother Jim McDaniel expressed that the most important thing the California State Grange does for the members is to have a lobbyist.

It was moved by Ron Trombley to approve the actions of the Executive Committee for the 2003/2004 year.

Brother Booth advised the CSG that the agreement between AMS and the California State Grange would be terminated effective October 31, 2004.

The Worthy Master stated the gavel he is using today was originally awarded to a builder Grange in 1959. The wood from the gavel came from the Kelley Farm.

It was moved to accept the Election Committee results and print them in the journal of Proceedings. Seconded. Motion adopted.

The Worthy Chaplain Pat Dahms gave a reading titled PUSH.

The Worthy Master left the hall to greet our guest speaker. Worthy First Lady Martha Stefenoni assumed the chair.

Approval of the Minutes

It was moved to approve the minutes as corrected and print them in the Journal of Proceedings. Seconded. Motion adopted.

Worthy Secretary Kathy Bergeron requested that the minutes be passed out in the morning as the delegates enter the hall so that they have more time to review prior to their approval.

Resolution Processing

Kathy Van Tuyl, Chairman of Legislative Committee, presented a partial report.

04-006 Parolees and Alcohol Treatment – Committee report is unfavorable. Grange policy states that a self-induced state of mental incapacity is not a criteria for reduced punishment. Discussion. Recommendation adopted. Resolution rejected.

04-008 Reinstate The Open Primary – Committee report is favorable. Discussion. Recommendation adopted. Resolution adopted.

04-014 Deserted Vehicle Disposal – Committee report is unfavorable. There are currently county government programs already in place as well as existing Grange policy supporting a reduction in taxes and government spending. There is also policy opposing any legislation to increase vehicle license fees. Discussion. Recommendation adopted. Resolution rejected.

04-022 Re-Evaluation of California's Three Strikes Law – Committee report was favorable. It was moved to substitute the resolution for the committee report. Seconded. Motion adopted.

It was moved to reject resolution 04-022. Seconded. Motion adopted. The resolution was rejected.

04-023 Curtailing Riders to Legislative Bills – Committee report was favorable. Discussion. Kirby Hitt moved to accept the committee recommendation. The committee report was adopted. The resolution was adopted.

04-033- Limit Grange Political Work – Committee report was unfavorable. There is existing State and National Grange policy supporting legislative efforts in telecommunication, ESA Reform, energy security, rural education, public safety in rural areas, rural health care, tax reform, transportation improvements protecting rural mobility, and many other areas that the committee believed the Grange should not abandon. Discussion. The committee report was adopted. The resolution was rejected.

04-045 Lobbying Action Report – Committee report was favorable. Discussion. It was moved to amend the resolution. Seconded. Motion adopted. Committee report was adopted. Resolution was adopted as amended.

It was moved that a press release be issued regarding issuing policy on the open primary 04-008. Seconded. Motion adopted.

Honored Guests

The Worthy Master introduced our honored guest William Steel, Master of the National Grange. Brother Steel gave an update on current National Grange projects and programs. He also gave an overview of the upcoming National Grange convention. Brother Steel encouraged the members to take advantage of their positions to step up, to act, to be brave and to go for it!

The Worthy Master gave the Worthy National Master a letter of congratulations to the Alaska State Grange on the momentous event of chartering the Alaska State Grange.

GWA March

Betty Eyler, GWA Director, and ladies of the California State Grange were escorted into the hall. Sister Betty and her directors made a presentation to the Worthy Master of a stuffed lamb made with wool from his own sheep.

Total of \$750.00 was received from the GWA march and will be donated to the City of Hope for their cancer research.

Guest Speakers

Robert Rivett from the Pacific Legal Foundation was introduced as the guest speaker. PLF is a private property law firm. They were established in 1973 as the oldest conservative public interest law firm. Mr. Rivett spoke about the relationship PLF has with the Grange.

State Master's Annual Report

Part 1

It is an honor and a privilege to welcome you to the 132nd Annual Session of the California State Grange. It hardly seems possible that a year has passed since our last session in Ukiah. Standing here before you this morning I find myself in a unique place. As a matter of fact, we're all in a unique place as this is our first step across the border to meet in the eastern most reaches of the California State Grange's jurisdiction, Sparks, Nevada. Because of this "first", I can't refer to previous State Sessions held in this location or quote comments made by one of my predecessors at those meetings. I would, however, like reach back into our historical record, a little closer to home, to 1912 when State Master E.T. Pettit addressed the 40th annual session of California State Grange in my home town, Sebastopol. Brother Pettit, in his annual report reminded the delegate body of the 40th annual session that their purpose was little changed from that of those in attendance at the first annual session. They were to meet and counsel together "for the promotion of the welfare of the Order, our country and mankind." He later told the delegates, "It is gratifying to note that practically all of the important amendments approved by our State Grange one year ago were adopted by the voters of the State. The most important of these was the amendment extending the franchise to women....The Initiative, Referendum and Recall measures are still on trial and the verdict is yet to be rendered by the voters of the State." I believe that "verdict" was rendered this past October.

I would like us all to consider ourselves "trail blazers" as we are leading the way for the National Grange which will be holding its 141st Annual Session here at John Ascuaga's Nugget in November 2007. I also wish to remind you that we are, at this state session as with every past state session, forging the history of the California State Grange. Our deliberations and actions will establish the policies of this State Grange and provide direction to the National Grange.

In this section of my report I will, it seems, be touching on subjects and issues that have been a substantial part of California State Grange policy advocacy for a number of years. They are still a high priority as sufficient and acceptable change has yet to occur and our strong advocacy is still required. Endangered Species Act reform, Land use and property rights issues and water policy, especially as they relate to and impact agriculture, are key among them.

WILDFIRES AND HEALTHY FORESTS

The week after last year's Annual Session in Ukiah found San Diego County ablaze. In the end, the three major fires (the Cedar, Paradise and Otay) combined burned 376,257 acres, destroyed 2,454 dwellings, 763 outbuildings, 24 commercial buildings and 148 vehicles. The human cost was even greater. Sixteen civilians and one firefighter were killed and 145 firefighters were injured. As a result of the devastation to property and the high human cost, on October 29, 2004 Congress took the Healthy Forests Restoration Act of 2003 "off

the shelf" in committee to the Senate floor for a vote, to the House through a House/Senate conference committee, and finally, to the President for his signature. On December 3, 2004, just five weeks after the measure was laid before the Senate, with President Bush's signature the Healthy Forest Restoration Act of 2003 became Public Law No. 108-148. Both the California State Grange and the National Grange lobbied Congress for the passage of Healthy Forests. The Act directs the Secretary of Agriculture to (among other things): 1) plan and conduct hazardous fuel reduction projects (fuel projects) on specified types of Federal lands, including on certain lands that contain threatened and endangered species habitat; and 2) give priority to fuel projects that provide for the protection of communities and watersheds. The only down side of the passage of Healthy Forests is that Congress was shamed into acting by the pain and suffering of the people in San Diego County.

RURAL CALIFORNIA SPEAKS UP IN RECALL OF GOVERNOR

October also saw Californians set the political world on its ear when we voted to recall a career politician in Governor Gray Davis and replace him with a political neophyte, Austrian-born actor Arnold Schwarzenegger. The significance of the recall wasn't just that a sitting Governor, who had been reelected with a solid majority, was recalled; it was that the recall petition campaign had been orchestrated over the internet. Log on. Point. Click. Down load. Print. Sign. Mail. This might be an over-simplification, but the point is made. The recall's success speaks for itself. When you combine the gubernatorial recall campaign's success with the lessons we learned in 1993 with our "No Budget – No Pay" initiative we attempted to qualify for the ballot, you can see why one succeeded while the other fell short. Our goal of gathering over 600,000 signatures in less than five months was just not realistic when you consider the fact that we were attempting to, as Brother Booth said in his 1993 Master's Address, "go it alone" and be the sole sponsoring organization. Maximizing our efforts through the use of current technology and partnering with other like-minded organizations and individuals as sponsors will be the road to success in any future attempt to place an initiative on the state ballot. How does the "No Pass – No Pay Initiative of 2006" sound to you?

There is another important fact regarding the recall vote that many have missed. That is, as with past initiative votes, Los Angeles County and the thirteen counties surrounding San Francisco Bay with 48% of the ballots cast, voted together and against the recall. The remaining forty-four counties with 52% of the total vote cast their ballots in favor of the recall. So Orange and San Diego along with forty-two predominately rural counties cast 73% of all the votes in favor of the recall. For once, non-urban California carried the day in a state-wide election. The message in this should be clear to all of us. The fact is, that our voice and our vote do count. Rural California can stand up, be counted and prevail even when faced with the large voting blocks of the urban population centers.

BSE & THE UNITED STATES ANIMAL IDENTIFICATION PLAN

In December a new acronym entered the domestic vocabulary: BSE! Bovine spongiform encephalopathy, commonly called "mad cow disease", burst on the scene when the USDA announced that a Holstein cow in the State of Washington had tested "presumably positive" for BSE. While BSE isn't new, (it was first described in cattle in the U.K. in November 1986), this was the first potential case identified in the United States. The vast majority of BSE cases have been reported in the U.K. Through November 2000, approximately 177,500 cases of BSE had been confirmed there in more than 35,000 herds of cattle. The U.K. epidemic peaked in January 1993 at nearly 1000 new cases per week. Surveillance in Europe has also led to the identification of cases of BSE in Belgium, Denmark, France, Ireland, Liechtenstein, the Netherlands, Portugal, and Switzerland, and more recently, in Germany, Spain and Italy. This announcement of the positive BSE test in Washington State sent ripples through both the domestic and export beef markets. Even

though it was later determined that the suspect cow had been imported from Canada several years earlier, the damage was done. At the National Grange Legislative Fly-in this spring we were party to a panel discussion on "The Trade Implications of Mad Cow Disease on U.S. Farmers and Ranchers". Participating in the discussion were Karen Stuck of the USDA's Food Safety and Inspection Service; Tadashi Sato, Agricultural Attache and First Secretary of the Economic Section in the Embassy of Japan; and Arturo Calderon, Agricultural Attache in the Embassy of Mexico. Ms. Stuck assured us that existing safeguards are in place to protect consumers against the causes of BSE, and Agriculture Secretary Ann Veneman said in a published report that the administration is "committed to science-based measures to enhance and protect the public health". When discussing the impact of BSE on trade she noted that, in the short run, the U.S. and Canada had lost virtually all their beef export markets and the USDA is forecasting a further decline in beef exports in 2004. Prior to the BSE scare Japan had been the second largest importer of beef in the world. Mr. Sato of the Japanese Embassy explained that prior to the current BSE scare Japan was the top U.S. beef export partner, accounting for 40% of U.S. beef exports amounting to \$1.4 billion a year. He also shared that the Japanese are very cautious as a people and do not want "minimal" risk; they expect a perception of NO risk. To this end the domestic beef market in Japan has yet to recover as well. Japan is now importing beef only from countries certified BSE free. The bulk is coming from Australia and New Zealand. The "saving grace" is that U.S. domestic beef market has stayed strong in the face of the turmoil in the international markets.

Where does this all lead? To the national Animal Identification Plan that has been in the works for a number of years. The goal of the plan is to assign a premises ID to every farm in America and an individual ID to every animal which will follow it from birth on the ranch to the slaughter house. Unfortunately, as John Clifford, the USDA's chief veterinarian told a congressional hearing, "there is no one size fits all technology" that would be applicable to all species. It appears that cattle and hogs are the likely to get priority among domestic animal species placed on the system with others to follow. Any implementation will be slowed by the fact that the USDA has allocated only \$33 million of the estimated \$73 million needed for the first year of the system's operation. The expectation is the remaining funds will come from the producers and industry groups. Needless to say, the regulated are, once again, being asked to bear the cost of regulation. Will this ID system increase food safety? Who knows? As a sheep producer, we currently participate in the USDA Scrapies Identification program. With this program we have a premises I.D. number and each of our lambs, at birth, are given their unique individually numbered I.D. tag. No sheep can leave the ranch for sale or show without their scrapies tag in place. Will another I.D. program add value to our product? Once again we are seeing the costs of implementing, operating and managing a government regulatory program being borne by the farmers, private businesses and property owners of this country.

FORM FOLLOWS FUNCTION - CPR

At the 1993 Annual Session we heard of the Clinton Administration's blueprint to reinvent government. In 1995 Brother Clouse reviewed the recommendations of the California Constitution Revision Commission which was established by legislation signed by Governor Pete Wilson in 1993. The commission spent 20 months reviewing California's Constitution paying particular attention to state and local finance. In 2004 the plan to restructure, reorganize and reform state government is the California Performance Review (CPR). Governor Schwarzenegger stated, "We cannot afford waste and fraud in any department or agency. This unprecedented action will mean a total review of government; its performance, its practices, and its costs. Together with my dedicated team of experts, we will make California the first true 21st century government in America, a government that is as innovative and dynamic as the state itself."

The ultimate goal of the CPR is to restructure, reorganize and reform state government to make it more responsive to the needs of its citizens and business community. Only by demonstrating through concrete

action the responsiveness of state government can the public's trust and confidence be regained. The CPR has four major components as documented in this year's budget:

1. Executive Branch Reorganization;
2. Program Performance Assessment and Budgeting;
3. Improved Services and Productivity; and
4. Acquisition Reform

The 2,500 page CPR Report in its top-to-bottom review of state government proposes the elimination of nearly 1,200 paid and unpaid posts on 117 boards and commissions and transferring their functions to a consolidated system of agencies under the executive branch.

A state government reorganization of this magnitude will require time and a great deal of public input. Some of the CPR proposals may be accomplished by executive order, most require either legislative approval or voter approval. This means that we will all have the opportunity to provide the input so desperately needed in an undertaking of this proportion. Information on CPR is available on the State of California web site at www.cpr.ca.gov.

WATER - CALFED

On September 15, 2004 Governor Schwarzenegger commented, "Passage of CALFED legislation in the Senate today is a significant step towards bringing \$389 million to California for important water projects." On Wednesday, October 6, 2004 the U.S. House of Representatives passed the bill, sending it on to President Bush, who is expected to sign it. The Water Supply, Reliability, and Environmental Improvement California Water Security and Environmental Enhancement Act which authorizes federal agencies to participate in the CALFED Bay-Delta Program. It authorizes the Secretary of the Interior and agency heads to carry out Program activities in the following categories: water storage; water conveyance; water use efficiency; water transfers; integrated regional water management plans; water quality; levee stabilization; and diversification of water supplies. House Resources Committee Chairman Richard Pombo stated, "This historic bill is a giant step forward in resolving California's water supply problems". Congressman Pombo cosponsored the legislation. The house approval came after he and other House members decided they could accept the version of the bill passed by the Senate last month. This legislation seeks to satisfy the diverse range of stake holders including agricultural users, residential users and environmental groups by including provisions for storage, restoration and recycling. The bill authorizes feasibility studies for major new storage projects and includes \$90 million for reconstructing levees. The bill did not, however, include everything hoped for. The bill, as passed, leaves out the "pre-authorization" language that would have allowed the Secretary of the Interior to approve four specific water storage projects without Congressional sign-off - enlarging Los Vaqueros reservoir, raising Shasta Dam, surface storage on the upper San Joaquin, and the Sites reservoir in the Antelope Valley.

ESA REFORM

It seems that the subject of ESA reform has been a constant in our legislative advocacy program since soon after the Acts passage in 1973. Every Master since my involvement with the California State Grange began twenty years ago has stood at this podium to inform this delegate body of the failings and down-right detrimental impact of the implementation of the ESA. The need for reform is evident at every turn in the road. Bills are introduced in Congress, but seldom make it out of committee. The ESA, however, has not been amended or altered since its inception. Bills are introduced, but seldom make it out of committee. This

year may well go down as THE breakthrough year for the reform of the ESA. Two bills have been passed by the House Resources Committee and ordered reported to the full House. The first, HR 2933, Critical Habitat Reform Act of 2003 sponsored by Rep. Dennis Cardoza, amends the ESA of 1973 to require the process for designating critical habitat to be practicable, economically feasible and concurrent with the approval of a recovery of a species. It also specifies factors for consideration of the economic impact on landowners under the Act, including lost revenues and costs associated with preparing reports, surveys, and analyses. The second bill, HR 1662, Sound Science for Endangered Species Act Planning Act of 2003, is sponsored by Rep. Greg Walden of Oregon. This bill will amend the Endangered Species Act of 1973 to require the Secretary of the Interior to give greater weight to scientific or commercial data that is empirical or has been field-tested or peer-reviewed, and for other purposes. Requirements that economic and human impacts be included the habitat designation process and sound, peer- reviewable science be given greater weight! Maybe this IS the year we finally see real and significant ESA reform.

Part 2

Standing here before you as we set out together on the journey that is the 132nd Annual Session of the California State Grange, I have had the opportunity to reflect back over the past year. I look back with a certain amount of satisfaction and some disappointment as well. Last year, when Leo T. asked me, as Overseer, if I planned to run for the office of State Master, I told him no, not as long as you wish to run for reelection. When he told me that he wasn't, he again asked if I would run, I told him I would. So, one year later, here I am! No matter how long you've been involved in an organization, until you are put in the ultimate leadership position, you never really know how you'll respond. The transition period took longer than I had hoped for or expected. With the Executive Director position functioning as designed and responsible for the daily operation of the office, I found myself doing the field work, which, for the past two years, had been the responsibility of the Membership Development Coordinator, a position that was defunded in this year's budget. One of the true joys of this position is traveling throughout the state, meeting and working with local Granges and Grangers. Whether in a formal meeting setting or at a casual gathering, I am always impressed with the individual member's commitment to the Order. Traditional and non-traditional Granges alike are defining their roles in the communities they serve and are happy to share their successes with me.

Soon after taking office, Sister Martha and I represented the California State Grange at the 137th Annual Session of the National Grange in Burlington, Vermont. Serving on a National Grange Committee was a real educational experience. In their structure, just as in ours, if a committee is going to bring a resolution to the floor with an unfavorable recommendation, they will offer the Master of the State Grange of origin an opportunity to withdraw the resolution rather than come to the floor with the unfavorable recommendation and sure defeat. When offered the opportunity to withdraw several California State Grange resolutions, my reply to the committee chair was that I was directed by my delegate body to present and advocate their policy provision, even if it meant sure rejection by the National delegates.

Financial Matters

Faced with a large deficit in the operating revenues of the State Grange, I, working with and as a member of the Executive Committee, found it necessary to curtail spending until the financial standing of the organization could be ascertained. While some programs were put "on hold" in the short run, the results are quite evident and substantial. Included in this year's delegates packet is a June 30, 2004 Financial Statement. For so many years, the only financial data received at the Annual Session was the year end financial statement from December 31st of the prior year. While the information gives a great historical perspective of where we, as an organization, have come from, it gives little insight as to the current financial standing of the

organization. Past attempts to provide a financial statement printed closer to the second week in October have included changing the fiscal year ending date in our bookkeeping system. This 6/30/04 financial statement is provided in the same format as the year-end statement so as to be able to make a direct, "apples-to-apples" comparison. Copies of the audited, year-end financial statements for the Grange, the Foundation, and the Asset Management Account are available on the Master's, Executive Committee and Overseer stations for your inspection. The statement shows that through the first six months of the year the California State Grange is operating within the budget passed by the delegate body last October and is showing a small surplus. Indications are that, barring any unforeseen catastrophes, the trend should continue through the year's end.

Several years ago, under the direction of the State Master and Executive Committees, the funds in the Asset Management Account (formerly listed as "Trust Account"), were invested in keeping with the practice set forth in the "Statement of Investment Principals" allowing no account balance to exceed the maximum insured deposit for that type of account and institution. To accomplish this end \$100,000 accounts (maximum FDIC insured amount) were established at financial institutions throughout the State. While this met the investment goal of having no more than the insured amount in any one account, managing these assets was time consuming and a logistical nightmare. I am pleased to report that our Asset Management Account funds, with a certain few exceptions, are invested in insured CDs managed by Morgan Stanley and provide a maximum rate of return and the necessary liquidity. These accounts meet the insurability and maximum safe rate of return clauses in the Statement of Investment Principals.

GRANGE INSURANCE GROUP

The working relationship between the California State Grange and Grange Insurance Group continues to be strong. The annual meeting of Grange Insurance Group was held at the corporate headquarters in Seattle, WA on March 15th. The main order of business at the meeting was a vote on the revision of the company's bylaws. There was concern expressed by some over a proposal for such a complete restructuring of the company's bylaws. In the end the changes were adopted by a 10 to 1 margin with the bulk of the votes coming from proxy ballots. Among the changes wrought by this vote were the insertion of an upper age limit for Board members; a complete restructuring of the corporate officers, with the CEO now being the President and the presiding officer of the Board carrying the title of Chairman of the Board. In the Board meeting that followed the annual meeting, California's Darrelld Larrigan was the first elected to fill that position. Darelld has expressed his commitment to Grange Insurance Group's continued success while maintaining its 110-year relationship with the Grange. In a meeting with the State Masters present, former President Pro-tem, Tom McKern, reiterated the company's commitment to the Grange, but stressed the need for open two-way communications between the company and the Grange.

The services agreement between Grange Insurance Group, the National Grange and the State Granges in the company's operating area has been signed for another year bringing much needed financial support to the Grange.

GRANGE PROPERTIES

It has often been said that our Grange Halls are our greatest assets. The same holds true for the California State Grange. Our properties at the Headquarters Triangle provide us not only the space for our offices, but income from the rented spaces. I am pleased to report that all of our available rental space is occupied and under contract for the coming year. We did, however, have to modify the lease for Crossroads to allow them to sub-lease a portion of the office space in the GBO Building. It seems a small concession to make in order

to stay 100% occupied. The leadership of your State Grange is always looking to maximize the return we can receive from our rental properties. You will recall earlier this year the request in the Grange News for architects and/or draftsmen to assist with some preliminary design work on a project to remodel Wisteria Hall with the ultimate goal being to add office space to the building while maintaining the building as a meeting hall. The project, as envisioned, would provide for a totally renovated kitchen, new ADA compliant restrooms, a reconfigured meeting hall/dining room and the addition of up to five offices. Would this be a monumental undertaking? Absolutely! Would it require the input, involvement, and support of Grangers from throughout the state? Undoubtedly! Can we, as a State Grange made up of a diverse membership with a myriad of temperaments, talents and convictions see a concept of this portion grow into a reality? Only time will tell.

Earlier I spoke of our Grange halls being the greatest asset any Grange owns, but as a valuable asset we need to treat it as such. We must maintain our buildings and grounds. We must be make sure that when another civic club or community organization is looking for meeting space they think of the Grange hall first as a location they would want. Through the simple act of making our hall available to a 4H Club or a Scout Troop we add value to our community and to our organization.

Recent events have led to the California State Grange being named in law suits involving activities of Subordinate Granges. Because of this, your Subordinate and Pomona Granges will all be receiving letters from the California State Grange, drafted in consultation with our insurance agent, requesting the California State Grange be added as an Additional Insured on your Grange's Insurance policy. By so doing you will not only be providing the State Grange much needed protection, but you will be giving your own Grange the added peace of mind from knowing that a third party, the State Grange, will be notified if your policy cancels for any reason. The State Grange can, in turn make sure the Grange is aware if this occurs.

GRANGES AND MEMBERSHIP

Overall we experienced an approximately five percent decline in membership between the June quarter of 2003 to the June quarter of 2004, although the number of Granges is up by four to 202. As a State Grange we need to work on membership development in two areas: gaining new members and retaining existing members and Granges. To the latter I propose the Granges in Need Program. A good number of Subordinate Granges are struggling, having a difficult time holding meetings, making their quarterly reports and attracting new members. These Granges need assistance and as a State Grange we ask the question, "What can we do to help?" The following is a brief sketch of the Granges in Need Program.

- ❑ Included in those who will assist the Granges in Need are local representatives who will be appointed by the State Master to assist a particular Grange in Need. With over 200 Subordinate Granges throughout the state it is impossible for any one person whether their title is State Master, Membership Director or Membership Coordinator to be directly responsive to any one Grange. Therefore, a Local Grange Representative will be appointed to act as mentor for the Grange in Need.
- ❑ Granges in Need will either directly indicate they need assistance by asking for help or indirectly indicate the need for assistance through a lack of reporting or by comments made. The Mentor appointed to assist the Grange in Need will be knowledgeable in Grange matters and trained in assisting the Grange in Need in devising an Action Plan. The Mentor can be a State Officer, Past State Officer, Deputy or Special Deputy. The Mentor along with the State Master will assist the Grange in Need in developing their Plan of Action. Once the Plan of Action is in place and functioning an on-going evaluation will chart the progress of the plan and refine it as necessary.

- The expenses involved in training the local Grange Representatives, paying their expenses in the field and assisting the Grange in Need in implementing the Plan of Action (printing, postage, etc.) will come from membership development and deputy training funds.

COALITION BUILDING AND LEGISLATIVE ADVOCACY

In this day and age, in order for our voices to be heard, we have to speak out long and loud. No one of us, alone, can be heard as well as we can when we act together in groups, associations, coalitions and, yes, in the Grange. During this past year the California State Grange has worked on building coalitions to speak out on common issues and causes with a diverse group of individuals and organizations. Among the groups and organizations we have partnered with through me, our Executive/Legislative Director, committee chairs and individual members are The California Farm Bureau Federation and local chapters throughout the state; the California Cattleman's Association; California Women in Timber, Western Growers, California Chamber of Commerce, the Agricultural Roundtable; the National Grange; the State Granges in Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Wyoming, Michigan, and with Pacific Legal Foundation. We have lobbied for ESA Reform, the passage of the Healthy Forests Initiative, Personal Property Rights and in favor of delisting from ESA consideration the Gray Wolf, the Tiger Salamander, the Red Legged Frog, the Aleutian Goose and, of course the Coho Salmon and related salmonoid species at local, state and national levels. We have given or provided testimony from Washington, D.C., to Sacramento, CA, to Klamath Falls, OR. We have had successes? Yes we have! Are we satisfied with the gains we've made? To quote American patriot Samuel Adams, "Instead of sitting down satisfied with the efforts we have already made – which is the wish of our enemies – the necessity of the times, more than ever, calls for our utmost circumspection, deliberation, fortitude and perseverance."

LEGISLATIVE ACTION PLAN

The Grange has long prided itself as being a grassroots legislative advocacy organization. The Legislative Action Plan is designed to make the phrase "Grassroots Legislative Organization" more than just mere words. The plan would develop a structure that encourages and supports grassroots activism and member-based advocacy.

The plan is designed to develop structure that will encourage and support grassroots activism among our members by:

- Communicating the Grange's position on given issues to our members
- Not expecting one person to be the sole source of information on Grange Legislative Policy
- Encourage members to communicate Grange policy to their government officials via letters, phone, fax and e-mail.
- Review existing policy and up-date on a regular basis, establishing policy where none presently exists
- Establish a Legislative "Drive-in" at Sacramento based on the National Grange "Legislative Fly-in". The "drive-in" will bring together members who desire to be active on issues and educate and enlighten them on the functioning of our political system. Participants will have an opportunity to meet their elected representatives.

CONCLUSION

I would like to conclude by taking this opportunity to thank a number of people who have made this year a special time for me.

First, let me thank the volunteers in this State Grange. We are a member-based organization and it's the member volunteers that make it work.

To all the local members throughout the state who make their local Granges function on a daily basis and who have welcomed me into their Granges and their homes. It is only through the local subordinate Granges does the State Grange exist to serve.

To the Officers, Directors and Committee Chairs whose labors on behalf of the Order could never be adequately compensated.

To the Deputy force, who are the first line contact for the California State Grange in the field, thank you.

To the headquarters staff, Jay, Corissa, Amy and Summer, without whom the job would be impossible. Their dedication to the California State Grange isn't recognized nearly as often as it should be. So let me say a personal and public thank you to you all. It is only after you spend some time in our State Grange headquarters that you understand just how well this staff functions as a team.

Finally, to my family whose love and support are a constant reminder to me what a truly lucky man I am. Whatever sacrifices I have made to take this position, their sacrifices are exponentially greater. They, like the State Master's families who preceded them, do it for the good of and in the name of the Grange.

Reports of State Officers

Treasurer

As noted in the California State Grange By-Laws, the Treasurer's duties are as follows:

14.11(f) Treasurer - to receive all monies from the Secretary, giving receipt for the same to keep an accurate account thereof, and pay all orders of the Grange signed by the Master or authorized person and Secretary. To render a full account of the office at each annual meeting and deliver to his successor in office all monies, books and papers pertaining to the office. To give bonds in a sufficient amount to secure the monies that may be placed in care of the office of the Treasurer. Said bonds issues by the Treasurer to be approved by the Executive Committee.

The Secretary's duties are listed as follows:

14.11(g) Secretary - to keep a record of all proceedings of the California State Grange, to conduct all official correspondence of the California State Grange pertaining to this office, and to perform such other duties relating to the office as may be required by the Master and the Executive Committee.

The Master's duties are listed as follows:

14.11(a) Master- to preside at all meetings of the Grange, to see that officers and members of committees properly perform their respective duties, to sign all drafts upon the Treasurer, and generally to perform all duties pertaining to such office.

When I was elected to this position last year, I stood ready and willing to accomplish the task listed here. These duties are well within my abilities. I serve as a Grange Analyst for a non-profit health clinic. My job duties entail monitoring and reporting the financial transactions related to 35-40 active grants at any given time. Unfortunately, I didn't realize the incompatibility between the Secretary and Master's listed duties, those of the Treasurer, and the current policies of the State office.

I have no information regarding the income received by the State Grange during the past year. I cannot tell you if the assumptions made in budgeting income for this year were on target or not, or the extent of our receivables for dues or other income. Although I have been asked to sign signature cards for several bank accounts, I have not had any reports on these, so cannot attest to the activity in or out of those accounts. I have received no monies from the Secretary - indeed as you have just heard in the duties, the Secretary has likely not received any funds at all.

During the past year, I have received draft copies of income statements and balance sheets and check registers from the State office. In reviewing these reports, I can see that sheets and check registers from the State office. In reviewing these reports, I can see that the budget approved by the delegates at the 2003 session had been changed in excess of \$40,000. I have not been provided any data regarding these changes or the assumptions they were based upon. There have been no drafts from the Master and Secretary to the Treasurer requesting payment. The check registers I received list the vender to whom the check was written and the amount of the check, but no detail is given regarding the type of item or service provided, or where the expense was posted in the chart of accounts. I cannot tell you that we took advantage of discounts available to us for timely payment or that we have investigated to be sure we have secured the vendor with the most reasonable cost for the services we require.

As you can see, these reports do not provide the detail I need to report to you regarding the financial status of the California State Grange as is required of my position. I enlisted the assistance of some patrons who were in the position of my duties, but they were unable to provide the information to me. I have not yet seen the audited financial report for the calendar year ended December 31, 2003. I have not been provided final copies of the income statements or balance sheets, so I don't know if changes were made in the entries after review by the Executive Committee or others.

As a result of the forgoing, I must report to you that I cannot provide any assessment of the financial statement of the California State Grange either positive or negative. I hope that we will receive such a report from another member with more information than I have.

I want to let you know that because I felt I had not earned the stipend paid to me over the past year, I donated the full amount in support of the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer 3-Day. This is a 60-mile walk over three days to raise money for research into breast cancer and I sponsored my brother-in-law Kirby and his wife Vicki this year in the San Diego walk which took place at the beginning of this month.

I report all of the above to you as support for the following recommendations:

1. The duties of the treasurer as written in the California State Grange By-laws be reviewed and re-written by the Grange Law committee to be consistent with those of the Secretary as the current

procedures in place at the California State Grange office and provide for the report of the financial status of the California State Grange be made by another person with more familiarity of the transactions and reports - perhaps the Master, the Executive Director, the Executive Committee, or the auditing CPA.

2. The \$1,000 stipend paid to the Treasurer annually be eliminated immediately as the actual efforts required of the member holding the office do not merit this payment.

It is my hope that in accepting my report you will adopt these recommendations and make them part of the work of this session.

The staff at the CSG office has the resources and back up to do the job of record keeping, financial tracking and correspondence in a professional manner that a volunteer does not have the time or possibly the skill to do. We all know there has been turmoil in the CSG office this year and without exception it has also affected the office and operations of the Secretary. I believe the staff has risen above the "problems" and done their very best, often times with both hands tied behind their backs. Thank you from me personally and professionally, Jay, Corissa, Amy and Summer.

As CSG Secretary I have maintained a tracking visibility only, to make sure that schedules and deadlines were kept and reports filed when they should have been. I take the minutes at the Executive Committee meetings and once approved, make sure they are properly stored at the CSG headquarters. I have also had the opportunity as Secretary of the CSG to attend a Congressional hearing rally, several conferences and even saw the Vice President of the United States with several other fellow Grangers in Central Point, Oregon.

At times during this past year, I have brought to the attention of the Executive Committee areas of great concern that were unprofessional, unethical, and on more than one occasion in direct violation of the constitution and by-laws of the CSG and the National Grange. Brothers and Sisters, our organization desperately needs to jump on a fast track if it is to survive. You have heard this before. During this last year more effort has been put in to management and the office than anywhere else. Yes, there was a problem this year and it has been resolved. It would be easy to put blame for all problems in that area, but it wouldn't be fair. At this time last year our organization had 13,466 members. Today we have 11,962. That is a drop of 1,504 members. If you don't think that number is significant, you have your head buried in the sand. There has been no membership program whatsoever this last year. That is where our survival lies. You, the delegates, had enough foresight to realize there was a problem several years ago and you established a pilot program. It worked. But it is not here now.

Change is good and we need to change.

Brothers and Sisters, Delegates

This has been a year with many firsts.

1. The Executive Committee has been incorporated into the management of the business and financial affairs of the California State Grange.
2. We implemented the Executive Director position with the intended duties to manage the day to day details of the business and financial affairs of the California State Grange, under the direction of the Executive Committee, while also following the directions of the Worthy Master on Fraternal activities and acting as our Legislative lobbyist.
3. The accounting department regularly reports to the Executive Committee while also keeping the Master and Executive Director informed.

Remember, the Master and the Overseer are an integral part of the Executive Committee. The Overseer for the first time has a vote in Executive Committee meetings.

After we organized in October of 2003, the first action necessary was to put the brakes on the uncontrolled and unreported spending. The California State Grange simply could not continue to bleed red ink it had been over the past several years. There had been huge expenditures of the financial reserves of the California State Grange with questionable or unverifiable results.

We now receive a monthly financial report from the accounting department. We have fine-tuned this report several times this past year so that it is easier to read and understand, while giving much more information up front without having to ask the accounting department for extra information. We have refined the expense reporting forms several times so they are more user friendly and more accurately reflect expense allocations. Amy Self, our bookkeeper, is rapidly assuming all of the required tasks necessary for this department to operate smoothly and accurately, with a minimum of outside direction.

The State Secretary's department has started an audit of the membership records. Corissa Young has been in the process of reconciling the reports with the actual membership to correct mistakes that have occurred over a number of past years.

The financial subcommittee under the leadership of Inger Bevans (she has a long history of credit union work and has an understanding of loan and audit paperwork procedures) has audited the Grange Hall loan program and found several deficiencies in the paperwork on file, which occurred over a number of years. These are being corrected on an ongoing basis. We have reorganized the Grange Hall loan paperwork process and now there is a checklist that before any funds are disbursed on a loan a designated Executive Committeeman will check off each box and then sign off that the file is complete.

We have had a complete report done by the accounting department on the Grange invested funds and are now in the process of reinvesting in higher interest certificates of deposit.

We have developed several new forms for seeking Grange member skills and interest in volunteering to help in the many different areas in the Grange, also to find out what other areas of interest the membership has. As directed by delegate action at the 2003 convention, a mandatory background check procedure has been established for those working with the youth of our organization. Also, report forms have been developed to accurately assess the areas of need for support of the Grange Youth Fair program and to gauge the effectiveness of the outreach of this program.

There is an ongoing process of working with our insurance agent of record, Kathy Bergeron, to make sure we are adequately covered. We have many Grange Halls that the California State Grange is responsible for that

are not insured for many reasons, we are now working to alleviate this problem. This is a particularly tough nut to crack.

We have been and are currently involved in several legal actions. There have been several Subordinate Grange sued with the California State Grange also named as a defendant. This has required the California State Grange to expend funds for legal work to remove us from these suits. At the present time we are involved in a suit to retain ownership of one of our halls. We have found several instances where Grange Halls or property has been transferred out of Grange hands but we can find no record of these having been approved by the Executive Committee as required by Grange Law.

Due to the questionable allocation of income and especially expenses over the last several years along with the delegates defunding of both the Membership and Regional Representative departments last year, we were unable to fund the outreach to Grange land that we would have liked. We have been working with a lot of unknowns from the last several years, necessitating operating on an extremely conservative basis this year until we had a real good handle on all the financial ramifications of the past.

As you can see from the June 30, 2004 financial report, which you have in your packet, we are on track with our budget this year. The August financial report shows we are still on that same track. At present time it appears we will not suffer the same huge deficits that we have in the past several years.

We met numerous times in workshop format to work in the 2005 budget. With the very capable leadership of Inger Bevins along with a huge amount of information from our accounting department we were able to put together a very workable budget. While each department didn't necessarily get all they wanted, we believe this budget will serve the California State Grange well. We are recommending funding the Membership and Deputy departments. These are necessary for the outreach of the Grange to assist the Subordinate and Pomona Granges. The Worthy Master will be announcing several new programs necessitating the operation of these departments.

We highly recommend that the delegate body approve the budget as proposed as well as the transfers of funds requested from the G.B.O. restricted accounts to fund the Membership and Deputy Departments. This delegate action is allowed and requires by the original resolution, and all following resolutions and motions dealing with these funds, before any use of the G.B.O. funds is allowed.

As with any organization, there comes a time when painful decisions must be made. One such decision was to dismiss the services of our Executive Director. As you all know, this is a personnel matter, and by law may not be discussed with you be the Executive Committee. Rest assured that the decision was made in the best interest of the Grange.

We want to thank the California State Grange staff for the invaluable assistance and advice they have given us over the past year; Jay Hartz, Corissa Young, Amy Self and Summer Maddux.

We strongly recommend that the Subordinate and Pomona Grange add the California State Grange as an additional insured to their policy. In this way the State Grange will be protected if named in a lawsuit. Also if a policy were going to be canceled for any reason the State Grange would be notified. Many of the Grange Halls that the California State Grange is responsible for have no insurance, because the Subordinate Grange allowed their policy to lapse before notifying the State Grange they were closing their doors.

Due to the number of situations with Grange property ownership issues we must find a way to include the

California State Grange on the titles of Subordinate Grange properties so the State Grange is notified when there is action on a title. In some instances Grange property has been transferred and we had no record of this happening. Grange Law required that permission be received from the State Grange prior to selling, donating or gifting any Grange real property.

With the budget under control and the new programs the Worthy Master will introduce in the next few days we will be able to move into the future and persevere in good work.

Family Health Resources

My Brothers and Sisters:

While it's been a busy year, the Family Health Resources team has not been able to accomplish anywhere near what we had planned. After Convention last year, for various reasons, several of the members of the team did not remain actively involved. My thanks to Christina Fletcher, Lois Murphy, Betty Ann Biringer-Rehm, Jennifer Blackburn and Judy Byers who have helped to accomplish our successes this year. While Health Coach Jennifer Blackburn is still considered a member of the team, her own success in her business is consuming most of her time. Like many a Subordinate Grange, it's difficult to do many things with a few people.

This year, the ever- faithful Mt Vernon Grange held their yearly Deaf Awareness Program in September. Team Member Christina Fletcher invited Program Director Ralph Dennard of the San Francisco SPCA Hearing Dog Program to come and do not only a demo with a trained hearing dog, but an entire program. Other Granges have requested Lecturer's Programs and informational packets to hand out to the public.

We attended two Hearing Dog graduations this year and hope to be able to attend the next one with a check in hand. We announced in the Grange News the Coin March for the SF SPCA HDP, asking Granges to donate their coin march funds, juniors to raid piggy banks for pennies and a "pick up a penny" campaign where you pick up a lost penny on the ground, or in the couch, or cars ashtray and donate it to the HDP Fund. All funds were to be collected at convention.

One ongoing project is the "H.E.A.L.T.H. e-notes" [healthy notes]- a series of emails full of tidbits of information, ranging from safety in food handling to vacation tips in the car with kids to info on cochlear implants. By the way, it stands for: H = health, E = education, A = awareness, L = love, T = tolerance, H = happiness and of course, e-notes refers to e-mail. In the last year or so, Fiddletown Jr. Grange merged with Ione Jr. Grange, while Gazelle and Muscoy Jr. Granges closed. Winnetka Center, Rosedale, Corcoran Agricultural and Corcoran Community Junior Granges are no longer active, while Concow Grange is looking into reviving its Junior Grange. New Junior Granges that have been chartered since last October are Santa Clara, Lockeford and Orcutt-Sisquoc. Junior Granges that applied for charters are Manton, McCloud and Lake Earl. Granges that are working on starting Junior Granges include Redwood Valley, Scotts Valley, Happy Camp, and Danville. Kathy and Ben Parra as well as Dolores Larrigan have been a big help as consultants for the Grangers up north.

One of my goals this year was to enable the State Office to complete our Junior Grange Membership report in June. I wrote about the importance of Quarterly Reports in my newsletters and made sure the State Office had an updated

address list for sending out the forms and instructions. I also contacted our State Youth Fair Director and enlisted his help in reminding those Jr. Granges involved in the Fair program to make reports. Even so, we are still working on getting numbers for each Jr. Grange in October.

The Youth Fair Program has been a major recruiting tool for the Junior Granges, bringing in numerous new members and serving as a catalyst for most of our new Junior Granges. And most of the active Junior Granges have Youth Fair members who are very busy from February through October with their animals.

I was unable to get away from work to attend Family Camp this year and thank you, Kathy Parra, for directing the Junior Grange activities there in my place. We had one Junior Jamboree this year in August at Rainbow Valley Grange that included Junior Grangers from Rubidoux and Apple Valley Jr. Granges.

Besides developing the Junior Grange department's budget and goals for 2005, I sent my input to the National Grange Task Force for its review of the Junior Grange Program. I also chose the themes for next year's Junior Grange sponsored contests as well as organizing the Silent Auction Fundraiser and writing the Junior Grange column for the Grange News each issue.

National Grange theory, implementation and execution of a process to gain new Grange awareness in a community and new Grange members.

The first procedure is to choose a series of community service programs that the community is already a willing participant in. Next, choose a Grange that is willing to participate and wants new members.

How to Implement - This requires a commitment by the participants of the Grange and the surrounding Granges and deputies in that area, members and officers of the State of California. Choose a 4 to 8 week period of time that there is at least 6 or more events in the community that the Grange may participate in. During this period of time we concentrate all of our efforts on the single area and a single Grange and the events involved in that community.

This is called "saturation". By choosing a small area and impacting it with a large number of Grange people that show interest and support in the community project you are projecting an image of strength and teamwork. Give the community a voice through the Grange to enlarge and grow. You do this for a 4 to 8 week period of time, as mentioned earlier. This creates a strong connection between the community and the local Grange and ties them together in the projects. This is called "networking" and "affiliating". They get to see our programs such as legislation, our halls, our networking and what the Grange stands for. In turn, we support them in their program.

After the connections have been made, you have to continually support that Grange from the State office and local deputies and masters of surrounding Granges in all of the programs until the Grange is a strong and vital membership. This is not 100% effective in every case but it is a program that has a plan and an outline to follow.

This program is adaptable to the California State Fair program as well. With a family membership plan in place, such as the National Grange has, we choose a community and a Grange or a group of Granges in a community that are all participating in the same fair, we can apply the same principles of support to the fair program. With Norm and Lori Dahlia's help in choosing which areas to saturate during that period, we can support the fair and help it get up and running. We need to participate in all of the awards. We may choose a group of 3 or 4 fairs in close proximity and saturate them with Grange members, officers and entries in the various events.

This is not the total picture, this is a rough sketch of how Grange awareness in the community should generate new members. Not every Grange will choose the same community services and attract the same type of member. You will find some communities totally involved in youth fair programs, rodeos, fairs and agriculture. You will find other communities that are interested in legislation and government issues. These members that are drawn into the Grange, will determine the direction that Grange chooses to proceed in community services in their area and become the center of the community at large.

There are many Granges out there who do a great deal of community service, but do not have the manpower to make a strong enough showing at these community service events to show the diversity and the power that the California State Grange has to offer as a voice in the state. They are always in the background offering the Grange kitchens and halls. With state members, deputies from the surrounding areas, masters and willing volunteers of the Grange, we can make a strong showing for the Grange at the fair or the events that will create acknowledgement and awareness of the Grange and its diversity. This is what the National Grange has a rough outline of. Over two years ago a similar outline was done at the New Vision seminar but was never funded or implemented. This will take a strong effort on the part of all delegates, officers and members of the California State Grange. The key to this is not taking on a large area at one time but concentrating on a local community and supporting a local Grange where the membership growth is needed.

The meeting of the California State Grange Executive Committee was called to order at 10:10am by newly elected Master Tom Stefenoni at the Ukiah Fair Grounds in Ukiah, California.

Welcome:

Newly elected officers Overseer Randy Lewis, Executive Committee John Squire and Bob Lange and Secretary Kathy Bergeron were welcomed by the Master and committee.

Past Master Bob Clouse was introduced for his comments. He congratulated the new members and stated now is a time for unity and harmony. His vision for the CSG is to be strong with the legislative agenda. He is one phone call away for any help or advice needed. Bob & Jeanne left the meeting.

Past Chairman of the Executive Committee Don Sharp was introduced – Don stated he has enjoyed his time on the committee. The Executive Committee was elected to do a very difficult job and the delegates need to know the E.C. is working for them. It is amazing what we can accomplish when it doesn't matter who gets the credit.

Don expressed his concern that practices and policy need to be put in place that does not change. The State Grange Secretary and Treasurer must remain informed from a remote location and kept in the loop. He also said he believes the CSG needs a new independent auditor in place who reports to the chairman of the committee. Don will be available for concerns, issues etc. Our management needs to be able to operate and not be micro managed. The committee thanked Don for his work and service. Don left the meeting.

Membership Development/General Manager Field Operations Mike Byers was introduced and requested continued guidance. There was discussion regarding the Orcutt/Sisquoc Grange reorganizing. Leo offered some clarification regarding funds and interest. Monies have been paid to Los Alamos Grange improperly. The same situation exists at Costa Mesa/Garden Grove. Sawyer requested the Grange reports be put in writing. Muscoy Grange hall sale is also a concern. Squire recommended that the CSG tell Sisquoc that it doesn't make any difference if they organize a new or reorganize the old Grange. It will not effect disbursement of the funds. Grange law needs to be researched and a written policy be made available for local Granges to follow when requesting the use of trust funds.

Direction for Sisquoc Grange – The E.C. directed Byers to try reorganizing the old Grange. The trust funds are still under the administrative authority of the CSG. Byers recommended they reorganize and apply for use of some of those funds according to Grange Law.

It was moved by Sawyer to recommend the Orcutt/Sisquoc Community Grange #461 reorganize and apply to the E.C. for the use of some of the trust funds held on behalf of Sisquoc Grange according to Grange Law for the reorganization of their Grange. Seconded by Lange. In favor: 7 Opposed: 0.

Requesting funds will require a written business plan and formal request. It was also requested that Byers be provided in writing with the process required to reorganize and request funds.

Muscoy Grange – Byers reported Muscoy Grange has decided to close and sell their hall along with the four ½ acre parcel it sits on. The hall is locked up, but can not be left for long as it is located in a very rough area. The CSG received a copy of their minutes surrendering their charter and advising a request for disbursement of monies from the sale of their hall. It was requested that Mike seek more information and that this item be placed on the agenda for the next Executive Committee meeting.

Byers stated funds from the Centerville Grange were designated for the Grange Youth fund and the Membership program. Mike said documents are in Jay's file at the CSG office. Stefenoni requested Byers come to Sacramento next week.

Lewis and Lange were requested to bring to the next meeting a written policy for the investment of trust funds, and with a written policy for local Granges to follow when requesting the use of trust funds.

Past Master Leo Bergeron was introduced – He will be available for the transition of Masters for the rest of the month. Leo will be using the van to transport the National Grange representatives Dan and Kim Bascom. Leo advised the insurance agent for the California State Grange has changed.

It was moved by Stefenoni seconded by Sawyer that Kathy Bergeron be the agent of record for the California State Grange insurance policies. In favor: 7 Opposed: 0.

Leo advised the committee that the CSG has received a request to fund the Cal Poly scholarships.

A complaint was filed with the Master prior to the convention and notices were given to the Executive Committee at this time. Lillian Booth filed charges against Hank Hitt. An arbitration committee has been appointed with a chairman by Master Bergeron.

Leo gave the committee two of Mike Byers credit cards. He still has his sub account card. Leo will return his card after he finishes with the Bascoms.

Leo recommended an "audit of the expense accounts of all the different departments using an independent person. At this convention he was provided with information that there was a possible impropriety which was made known to two people on the Executive Committee. This information was withheld from the Master which is an improper and unethical action. Something should have been done at that time, by specifically the Master of the CSG. This action by the two members was despicable. If you are on the E.C. of the CSG, you have a responsibility to forward this information to the Master so that proper action can be taken in a timely manner." Leo continued his remarks by saying that the individuals on the Executive Committee who had this information knew who they were. "If there does turn out to be an impropriety, those individuals who knew should voluntarily resign from the Executive Committee because they violated their oath of office".

#3 – Approve Agenda

Santa Cruz Live Oak and computer language were added to the agenda.

#4 – Action Items – Select/Appoint Recorder

Squire appointed Sawyer to keep a record of any action items discussed during the meeting to include the action required and the person responsible to take the action. This list will be distributed to all the members at the close of the meeting. Sawyer or the Executive Director Julie Clausen will report back on what action was taken, at the next meeting.

#5 – Master's Comments

Master Stefenoni reported the transition of Masters has been very smooth. He thanked Leo and Kathy Bergeron for all their time and input. Needless to say it is a daunting task. An e-mail was read from the National Grange advising us that Past California State Grange Master Bob Clouse had a slight stroke. Our prayers are with him. Stefenoni has been working closely with Executive Director and has had staff meetings. The process is working well. People understand their jobs and what it takes to do them. They are addressing the need for cross training. He and Martha are preparing for the National Grange session. They leave next Thursday for Burlington, VT. Tom & Martha will step into the positions left by Leo & Kathy in committees. He will have a report on National session at the next meeting.

Past Master Bergeron commented that he is a resource. Please use him, he is here for that purpose as part of the transition.

The bank cards need some housekeeping. The Bank of America, American Express and Morgan Stanley signers need to be established and brought current. It was moved by Lewis that the Master, one Executive Committee member, the Executive Director and an Executive Director alternate be the signers on all Grange financial accounts. Seconded by Sawyer. In favor 6, opposed 0 (Nichols stepped out briefly).

Moved by Sawyer to designate Marion Nichols as Executive Committee alternate and Jay Hartz as Executive Director alternate. Seconded by Lewis. In favor 7, opposed 0.

Bergeron recommend based on past history that a required minimum of two signatures be required on the accounts. Squire assigned the finance committee to write a policy regarding the use of two signatures and report back.

A bill has been received from CPA Karl Gunther for professional services through 9/1/03 in the amount of \$4,200.00. It was moved by Lange to pay the CPA bill of \$4,200.00. Seconded by Lewis. In favor 6, opposed 1.

#7 - Convention Recap

As a convention recap was done yesterday at the officers and directors meeting, the committee did not have any further input. Sawyer had a couple of items. Good of the Order - Good facilities; elevated seating positive; sound system worked; meals good with good service; all degree work with opening and closing done well; Dan & Kim were excellent; Dr. Sabol best ever; Assemblyman Doug LaMalfa good; Frank Nichols did well on elections; Memorial service better this year; reception good idea and need to continue and include introductions; talent night great; hero awards are important and a real contribution; vets honored, good; GWA breakfast and march positive; Tom & Martha not thanked enough.

Bad of the Order - Frost speech far too long. Resolution handling mixed up; prefer reading the whereas in the resolution, (the executive committee did not agree, referred to convention committee); consider a reader or presentation by committee chairs; thinks chair should present resolutions; budget presentation; installation of officers should be after degrees, not before; people who went out to eat didn't know where to go. All Sawyer items and officer/directors items will be referred to the Convention Committee.

Expo Convention Recap - Expo director Katie Squire reported the Expo ended up with \$2,288.00 premium money to be paid. There were slightly over 1,000 Expo entries this year. Grange Youth Fair is still not

actively participating. They need to be targeted this year so they know they can show in the Expo as well as their fair and the Expo emphasizes non-livestock entries. 25% of entries were new or returning and there was an increase in guest participants. Being able to set up early was a large help. Katie will be looking into the possibilities of shipping in entries next year, similar to the process used by the National Grange. First draft of 2004 Expo book is in the computer. She requested the Master appoint all directors to the Expo Committee. Sawyer stated "Katie gets a gold star for a job well done... again".

#8 National Grange - Resolutions being sent

Master Stefenoni reported the necessary resolutions have been sent to the National Grange. He reviewed a couple of resolutions that will be addressed at their annual session this year and will have a full report at the next meeting.

#9 - Financial report

Currently the CSG Finance Department is frustrated with the report being generated. Clausen requested they move their reporting period from the 1st of the month to the 15th of the month for better accuracy. The committee agreed.

#13 - Executive Session - Closed

All were excused except the Executive Committee, Master and Overseer.

Lunch was served.

The meeting reconvened at 1:07pm.

Jay Hartz joined the meeting to report on Grange halls. Other guests Grange members Sherry Lange and Jess Ahumada.

Reports on Granges

Jay Hartz presented his written report.

Biggs Grange. We currently have a purchase offer that will expire this month. A decision needs to be made. There is a possibility of reorganizing a Grange in the area. It was moved by Lewis CSG make an active attempt to reorganize the Grange in the Biggs area. Seconded by Sawyer. In favor 7, opposed 0. Biggs Grange will be put back on the agenda in six months.

Brownsville Grange - Sale of hall. Documents delivered to Master Stefenoni which he read to the Executive Committee. It was moved by Lange that the Executive Committee accept the Brownsville

Grange request to sell their Grange hall and all normal procedures will apply. Seconded by Lewis. In favor 7, opposed 0.

It was moved by Lewis that the CSG pay the Brownsville Grange bills until the hall is sold at which time the CSG will be reimbursed. Seconded by Sawyer. In favor 7, opposed 0.

Calaveras Grange – Jay requested a decision to sell the Grange or enter into a long term lease with the Historical Society. It was moved by Lewis to offer the Historical Society a triple net lease (renter pays maintenance, insurance, taxes, and rent) for use of the Calaveras Grange hall. Seconded by Lange. In favor 7, opposed 0.

Janesville Grange – The director of the preschool located next door to the property has expressed an interest in purchasing the lot for \$1,000. Bergeron reported the lot is currently vacant and overgrown. It was moved by Lewis allow the preschool to make a \$1,000 donation to the Grange Foundation and Quit Claim them the deed to the Janesville Grange property. In favor 7, opposed 0.

Lucerne Valley Grange – The Grange hall is in excellent condition. It sits in a community of approximately 4,000 people. This is an ideal location for a fair program. It was suggested to delay action until the February meeting.

Lake Earl Grange Grant – It was again expressed that no funds were to be moved until the per capita dues were brought current. Their reports must be received immediately. The Secretary was asked to verify that all reports have been received and if not, contact the Lake Earl Grange immediately.

Centerville Grange – Master Stefenoni read a letter from the Secretary of the Centerville Grange regarding the disbursements of their funds. It was suggested to delay action until next Executive Committee meeting.

El Camino Grange – They held a meeting last Friday. A quorum was present. However they failed to notify their members that the purpose of the meeting was to close the Grange and sell the hall. They will be notifying their members. The Executive Committee will review at next meeting.

Executive Session – Closed

All were excused except the Executive Committee, Master, Overseer, and Jess Ahumada, from Visalia Grange.

3:52pm back in session

It was moved by Sawyer that the California State Grange have an internal audit of expense accounts and credit card usage. Seconded by Bevans. In favor 7, opposed 0.

It was moved by Lewis that the California State Grange reinstate the Costa Mesa Grange charter due to procedural errors that have occurred at various levels. Seconded by Lange. In favor 7, opposed 0.

National Grange.

Lewis and Lange were appointed to review the resolution and submit a recommended procedure for implementation.

#20 – Green Van

The Executive Committee will discuss disposition of the van via e-mail and report at the next meeting.

Wrap Up

Dahlia brought up Western Fairs Conference 2004. It is necessary for him to pay conference fees now. Cost for rooms, conference, dinner is approximately \$3,700. Six people will be attending. As this is a budgeted item for 2004, there was no objection.

Welcome Visitors

Squire welcomed Past State Master Leo Bergeron.

Moment of Silence

A moment of silence was held for the passing of Past Executive Committee Jim Smith, Gatekeeper Ray Snyder and Betty Ann Beiringer-Rehm's husband Charles.

Roll Call

Master Tom Stefenoni; Executive Committee members John Squire, Marian Nichols, Inger Bevans, Overseer Randy Lewis, Secretary Kathy Bergeron; Past State Master Leo Bergeron. Absent: Executive Committee members Tom Sawyer and Bob Lange; Executive Director Julie Clausen.

Minutes of the Previous Meeting

(Tom Sawyer joined the meeting) There was discussion regarding the voting of the Overseer at the Executive Committee meetings and what is currently stated in the constitution and by-laws. A ruling was requested from the State Master as to Grange law as it was believed that a mistake had been made in the printing of the 1998 by-laws. Squire stated he believes the committee is operating under the current written issue of the constitution and by-laws; however, if there is a problem, it should be corrected. The work we did at the last meeting was done in good faith as the constitution and by-laws were reviewed during executive session. Discussion continued.

It was the ruling of the State Master that the Article 14.2, section 6 of the CSG By-laws of the CSG should state:

State Grange – There shall be an Executive Committee consisting of the Master and five elected members and the Overseer as an ex-officio member without vote. The committee shall elect its own chairman at its first meeting following each annual session.

Approval of the minutes – It was moved by Sawyer to approved the minutes of November 2, 2003 Executive Committee meeting as corrected. Bevans seconded. In favor 5, opposed 0.

It was moved by Sawyer that we reapprove all actions voted upon at the November 2, 2003 Executive Committee meeting. Seconded by Nichols. In favor 5, opposed 0.

Master's Comments

Master Stefenoni reported on the 137th National Grange session which was interesting. As a freshman delegate he and Martha were provided with a mentor. Their mentors were John and Hanna West from New Hampshire. Martha served on Grange Law/Good of the Order Committee. Tom served on the Labor & Judiciary Committee. (Executive Director Julie Clausen joined the meeting.) He gave a brief synopsis of the California resolutions presented at the National Grange session. The hospitality in Vermont was great. Tom & Martha spoke with Secretary of Ag from New Hampshire and also went on the delegate's tour which was a very efficient dairy operation. Tom's report is attached to these minutes

Tom read Martha's report which is attached to the minutes. The New England States voting block was very evident again this year. The new theme for the National Grange is "The Grange, Advocating for American Values".

Membership form from National was passed out. Also, a letter was read from Rosemary Hansen regarding Vacaville Autumn Leaves asking for help filling three vacant board positions.

Executive Director's Comments

Clausen reported this is a good time of year, gearing up and winding down at the same time. Inventory of CSG is currently being performed. (Tom Nickens joined the meeting.) A Dental Plan for the employees has been negotiated which will cost the CSG \$28.00 per month for the annual premium and will provide an additional \$1,000 per employee in coverage.

The CSG received a request to file an amicus brief on behalf of Lake Earl Grange regarding the flooding of Lake Earl on species act violations. Clausen will keep the Executive Committee informed.

A Christmas tree contest with staff is now going on. The winner will get a gift certificate. The Executive Committee was asked to vote for their favorite Christmas tree. Each employee will also get \$25.00 for Christmas.

Clausen and Bookkeeper Amy Self attended an "Exempt Organizations and Charitable Activities in California" seminar. Tuition was steep, but the benefits were very high. Copies of the book were given to the committee members.

Cross training of the CSG staff is continuing. The goal is for everyone to have a more expanded idea of how the duties of the office are performed.

Report of Attorney – Tom Nickens

Nickens gave a brief seminar regarding the Executive Committee's "Fiduciary Responsibility". He stated the duties of care, inquiry and loyalty to the members of the Grange are most important. It is the duty of the Executive Committee to do what is in the best interest of the organization. Personal interests are put to the side and do not exist.

Nickens also discussed the need for Directors and Officers Professional Liability Insurance.

Amador County Fair update. A Grange Youth Fair participant was showing a steer. The steer jumped the fence and injured several people. A lawsuit ensued. The CSG is not involved.

Nickens discussed the Executive Committee rights regarding executive sessions. In executive session, there are no minutes and no one need be allowed in the session except the committee. Agenda items should be administrative such as employee's issues. The sessions can not be for items that are of general interest of the Grange. There is a standard of what people are entitled to know.

Executive Session

All were excused except the Executive Committee, Master, Overseer and Tom Nickens. Executive session to address personnel was held in Wisteria Hall.

(Nickens left the meeting.)

Lunch was served.

The meeting reconvened at 2:53pm

There were no actions to be reported following the closed executive session.

Lewis suggested all future closed executive sessions be held at the end of the Executive Committee meetings

if possible to allow those not attending to leave.

Approve Agenda

Additional items to be added to the agenda were: Pacific Legal Foundation - Gray Wolf delisting and correspondence from National Grange regarding action involving the past State Master.

Background Check Committee Report - Lewis/Lange

Information from the committee Lewis and Lange and also from attorney Tom Nickens was passed out. Discussion. Issue will be brought up again at the next meeting.

Action Items Updates

The action list prepared by Sawyer was discussed. Items listed were updated.
(Frank Nichols joined the meeting.)

Departmental Reports and Requests

Grange Youth Fair Director - Squire reported Norm Dahlia requested to have a training session on how to approach fairs with the GYF program and get classes into the fairs. He wants to transfer funding into other areas for this training. It was requested that he submit a written proposal.

Lewis requested the leader training program be put in writing with documentation, lesson plans, schedule, costs, etc. for future use. The Worthy Master will communicate with Dahlia. It was stressed that an administrative structure must be implemented.

Report of Granges and Properties - Jay Hartz presented his written report, which is attached.

Fair Valley phone bill is \$30.00 per month, local calls only. Apparently the phone is required for possible emergency situations. Lewis will investigate.

Janesville Grange - left message with deadline of 12/17/03 to call back.

Farmersville Grange. Need to contact Tom Nickens regarding action required to vacate property.

El Camino - Stefenoni reported the Grange correctly notified their members that there will be a vote to surrender their charter. A meeting has not been scheduled. There are some issues regarding disbursement of the funds following the sale of the hall by the CSG.

West Visalia - \$1,000 was advanced to the Grange as reorganization funds. This money was to be paid back. They have been billed for three months and have not responded.

Centerville - Stefenoni referred to a letter from the Secretary of the Centerville Grange regarding the disbursement of their fund. It was agreed that a motion/resolution signed by one member is not acceptable. It was suggested that a letter be sent to all members listed.

Crescent Redwood - There was some dissention which has created problems. Stefenoni has met with the members and requested they resolve the problem. Reorganization efforts are ongoing.

Kings River Grange - Stefenoni read a request from the Kings River Grange to sell their hall. They want to keep their charter and remain an active Grange. The Executive Committee requested the minutes of their meeting authorizing the sale and an appraisal of the building before they will consider the request for the sale of the Kings River Grange hall.

Pleasant Valley Grange - The Pleasant Valley Executive Committee meeting minutes state beer and wine can be purchased and consumed at the potluck that precedes regular meetings. No alcohol can be consumed at the meetings.

Biggs Grange - Stefenoni checked the property. The hall is still for sale. The grass should be cut, but the hall is secure.

Lucerne Valley Grange - The hall and location has potential.

Lewis stated the California State Grange needs a marketing program to address these halls. We are allowing the halls to just close. His Grange would love to have a hall. The CSG needs to come up with some way to make sure someone is responsible to get out to these Granges and make them work. If we don't do it now, it will never happen. We can't let these halls go. If we let these halls walk away, we are letting our Grange walk away.

Past Master Leo Bergeron reported someone has been responsible successfully over the past two years with the Membership Development Department. You have to have someone who will go into the community and reorganize a Grange.

West Visalia Grange - Stefenoni reported on a call he received regarding problems with the West Visalia Grange. Squire reported his attempts to contact the Master of the Grange Jess Ahumada have been unsuccessful. Bergeron suggested the only course of action is to close the Grange and restructure.

It was moved by Sawyer that the Master immediately take whatever action necessary regarding the West Visalia Grange. Seconded by Bevans. In favor 5, opposed 0.

Jay Hartz submitted a memo discussing the terminology of "Trust Account" vs "Asset Management Account". There is a big difference. It was suggested the term "Asset Management Account" be used when referring to the money held for the Granges. This should cut down on confusion for Granges, Title Companies and the CSG. The By-Laws of the National Grange, 4.11.1-G state "The State Grange shall hold the net proceeds of the sale...in trust for the selling Subordinate..." It does not say a trust account, just trust. It appears that no change in the By-laws is needed.

Green Van

The blue book value of the green van is approximately \$2,500.00 - \$3,700.00. The estimated repair costs are \$1,500.00 to \$2,000.00.

It was moved by Sawyer to sell or donate the green van and spend nothing on repairs. Seconded by Bevans. In favor 5, opposed 0.

Recording of Executive Committee Meetings

Squire proposed recording Executive Committee meetings. It was advised by attorney Tom Nickens that we should not record the meetings.

National Grange Arbitration Panel

Bergeron reported on the National Grange Arbitration Panel results regarding Hank Hitt vs Leo T. Bergeron. The Arbitration Panel findings were that the charges filed by Hitt do not rise to a violation of Grange law. All charges have been dismissed and the CSG was requested to resume the task of returning the Costa Mesa Grange to active status and working order before lifting the suspension of the charter in questions.

Grey Wolf

Bergeron also reported on actions regarding the delisting of the Grey Wolf. He has been in contact with the Pacific Legal Foundation who has requested the participation of the Idaho, Michigan, Minnesota, Montana, Oregon, Washington, Wisconsin, Wyoming, California and National Granges. He reported on the "Memorandum of Understanding" which Leroy Watson, Legislative Director for the National Grange is helping him secure from each of the western Granges. The fees will be approximately \$7,825.00 divided between the states. Individual amounts would be around \$869.00. The agreement is contracting with the PLF to take action on behalf of the CSG.

Bergeron also expressed the CSG need for marketing the Grange. Without a marketing program, a business/Grange will die. He made suggestions for the funding of this program.

It was moved by Sawyer to accept the invitation to partner with the Pacific Legal Foundation regarding the reclassification/delisting of the Grey Wolf litigation. Seconded by Bevans. In favor 5, opposed 0.

The meeting was recessed at 6:32pm for dinner.

The meeting reconvened at 8:00pm.

Web Site

Master Stefenoni presented a "Proposal for California State Grange Web Site Redesign" by Jamie Spooner with Planeteria. Lengthy discussion.

Meeting was recessed at 9:10pm.

Meeting reconvened on Wednesday 12/17/2003 at 9:18am with Stefenoni, Squire, Sawyer, Nichols, Lewis, Bevans, K. Bergeron and L. Bergeron present.

It was moved by Sawyer that we proceed with negotiations on the web site proposal from Planeteria and report back at the next meeting. Seconded by Stefenoni. In favor 5, opposed 0.

Computer Programs - Language

The suggestion was to use Microsoft Office for all applications to be compatible.

Youth Department

Youth Conference - Stefenoni read a report from Bill & Patty Allen regarding the youth conference scheduled for February 13-15, 2004 in Pismo Beach. They are working with Bob Lange and the hosting Grange.

Western States Conference - It is the CSG's turn to host the annual Western State Conference. The Allen's have been in communication with Cindy Greer from the National Grange. The conference is

scheduled for August 6-8, 2004. The location is still being considered.

Grange Family Camp – Stefenoni read a letter from Jim McDaniel who chaired the camp last year.

State Secretary Report

For future meetings, the Executive Committee stated they would like to know the status of the Granges, ie. who is delinquent, what quarterly reports are missing, suspended Granges, etc. It was also suggested that the amount of dues they owe be included so that the Committee would know how much of a loss in dues this represent as CSG income & National dues. It was suggested a summary report be sent every quarter to each Regional Representative on the status of each Grange. The Executive Committee would like a regular summary report every quarter. Junior Grange and Grange Youth Fair information is also needed for the roster. Corrisa Harvey joined the meeting and gave an update on the roster and database programming.

Insurance Committee – It was previously suggested by Tom Nickens that a committee be appointed. Lewis, Stefenoni & K. Bergeron were appointed to look at our total insurance package including officers & directors and recommendations for Subordinate and Pomona Granges. Lewis will chair and report back at the next meeting.

Financial Report

The 12/16/03 Financial Report ending 11/03 was discussed. Bevans was requested to report back at the next meeting on how the Grange Hall Loan Fund payments are booked.

(Executive Director Julie Clausen joined the meeting.)

State Lecturer, Kathy Parra joined the meeting. Parra reported she attended the National Grange and met Tom Guinn who is the Lecturer from the State of Washington. Quinn is putting on a Lecturers training seminar on February 27-29, 2004. Parra advised the Committee that if she had known she was speaking at National Grange as a show case and not as a contestant, she would not have gone.

Basically competition ends at the Western Regional Conference. Parra made a proposal for Junior Grange information, Family Camp competition, Speech Contest and Sign-A-Song. She is willing to obtain sponsors for contests. Kathy also volunteered to be the Camp Director. (Squire left the meeting briefly.)

It was moved by Sawyer to support the proposal of awards presented by the State Lecturer and assist in pursuing the necessary funding. Seconded by Nichols. In favor 4, opposed 0.

Finance Committee Report

Bevans reviewed the November 2003 Financial Committee Report mailed to the committee. The members were asked to review the report and send their comments to Bevans.

It was moved by Sawyer to remove the Disaster Relief Section from the Executive Committee handbook. Seconded by Bevans. In favor 5, opposed 0.

Budget Discussion

Adjustments to the budget were discussed and made.

Executive Session – Closed

All were excused except the Executive Committee, Master and Overseer. Executive session was held for the purpose of discussing salaries.

The meeting reconvened.

It was moved by Bevans, to increase the salary of the Executive Director \$3,000 with \$2,000 coming from the general fund, \$1,000 from Legislative. Seconded by Nichols. In favor 5, opposed 0.

Vacant Accountant – Auditor position

(Nancy Koschyk joined the meeting) Stefenoni had proposals for an audit from Karl Gunther CPA. Nancy Koschyk is again working for him and will perform the audit.

It was moved by Sawyer to accept the proposals for an audit by Karl Gunther CPA with a draft to be presented at the February meeting. Seconded by Bevans. In favor 5, opposed 0.

Koschyk discussed on going accounting services. Hourly rate would be \$50.00 with a proposed 10 to 15 hours per month. (Koschyk left the meeting)

It was moved by Stefenoni to accept Nancy Koschyk's proposal to provide accounting services at an hourly rate of \$50.00 estimating 10 to 15 hours per month for the first quarter and to be reviewed at the end of the first quarter of 2004. Seconded by Sawyer. In favor 5, opposed 0.

The next Executive Committee meeting will be held on February 27 & 28, 2004 starting at 10:00am in Sacramento.

Master Stefenoni noted that we have received from the past Secretary; reports and correspondence from the 2003 convention, \$700.00 in donations to the George Dupray scholarship fund, the GIA general per capita donation of \$3,509.25 and GIA donation to the Deaf Activities Fund of \$500.00, keys to the outside door of the office in Sacramento, secretaries office and vault room.

The meeting adjourned at 3:11pm.

Minutes of the Previous Meeting

It was moved by Lange, that the minutes of the 12/16/04 meeting be approved as amended and corrected. Sawyer seconded. In favor 6, opposed 0.

It was moved by Sawyer that the minutes of the 1/23/04 e-mail meeting be approved as corrected. Seconded by Lange. In favor 6, opposed 0.

Master's Comments

Master Stefenoni stated he was very fortunate to have been invited by the Lake Earl Grange to speak at the Rural Resources Alliance. The Alliance is the classic type of coalition built in a rural area that he has been talking about. The coalition crosses the border, agriculture interests, fishing, etc. Emma Swarez from Pacific Legal Foundation was the key note speaker. Stefenoni also received a tour of Lake Earl from Grange member Helen Ferguson.

Stefenoni is currently in negotiations with Lithia Dealership Group for a \$500.00 vehicle discount similar to what the Farm Bureau has.

Stefenoni traveled to Reno to discuss details for the annual convention at the Nugget. Martha Stefenoni, Bill & Patty Allen, Dave & Pat Wilson also attended representing the interests of the Youth, GWA and Expo.

Stefenoni passed out a copy of the Santa Rosa Press Democrat newspaper where he was featured in an interview "State Grange looks to Santa Rosa man for leadership, viability."

Squire, Norm Dahlia, director of the Grange Youth Fair and Stefenoni were invited to the West Visalia Grange for a BBQ. They were able to meet the officers of the Grange. They were also able to meet a banker who puts together loans for project animals.

Stefenoni had the opportunity to attend a Fish and Game hearing regarding the strategic recovery plan for the Coho Salmon in California.

Lewis, Dahlia and Stefenoni attend the World Ag Expo in Tulare and were able to make contacts that will serve the California State Grange well.

The annual National Master's meeting was held in Kansas City. Sally Crosair, the facilitator and coordinator for the Action II program, made an excellent presentation. Clyde Berry, National Program director, and Ed Luttrell, National Membership Program director, also presented their programs. During the meeting he met with the western and mid-western State Masters regarding the Gray Wolf issue.

An Action Grange II workshop will be held next weekend at the Sebastopol Grange. Sally Crosair will be the facilitator.

Executive Director's Comments

Clausen reported a transformer blew on Wednesday and the State Grange office lost power, phone service, etc. She has ordered a battery back-up and surge protector for the phone system which will keep the office up for about three hours. This will provide protection of the equipment and give staff the ability to notify key people of the power loss. She also had the cost for replacement of the computer system in the finance department.

Clausen was pleased to report the operations of the Grange business office are running very smoothly. Communication is still a problem. Staff understands their positions and timelines.

Clausen testified before the California Fish & Game commission. The State Master also attended for the

morning session. Copies of the submitted letter and testimony were passed out to the Executive Committee. Also, as President of the California Women in Timber, Clausen developed a petition regarding the recovery plan for the CoHo which will go to Fish & Game and the Governor of California. A decision in the 9th circuit court of appeals regarding the federal listing of the CoHo Salmon PLF predicts success in the Grange vs NMFS lawsuit.

Clausen reported on the proposed Veteran's Cemetery in Redding. She spoke on behalf of the Grange. Also, Clausen will be in Washington, DC March 27-April 3 as President of California Women in Timber. She will prepare a position paper from the CSG that the women will present for the Grange.

Clausen presented a project California State Grange Lecturer Kathy Parra is proposing as community service project, Heavenly Hug Bear.

Approve Agenda

Added items: revisit by-law wording; department forms; Junior Grange; Legislative Department; Expo.

Action Items Updates

By-laws: Stefenoni discussed his ruling at the last meeting regarding Article 14.2, section 6 of the CSG By-laws. He stated we are an organization that operates under majority vote at the grass roots level. The situation regarding the publishing of our constitution and by-laws was incorrect, however it has been published and in common use for several years. A precedent has been established. The printed by-laws may be wrong, but the fact is we operate under our published by-laws. If the delegates want to correct them, it needs to be addressed at the annual convention. Stefenoni reversed his decision and the by-laws will stand as published.

Action Items

Sawyer presented the action list to the Executive Committee. Sawyer requested the committee review the list and give him updates.

Department Reports

Lewis reported on the World Ag Expo in Tulare. He attended with Stefenoni and Dahlia. They had an opportunity to with many many people. Lewis asked if it was acceptable for Koschyk to audit her own work as she was the interim Executive Director during a portion of 2003. Gunther stated they discussed this issue and they are independent as auditors. Their

firm is subject to peer reviews every three years to make sure they are adhering to professional standards.

Koschyk and Gunther left the meeting.

It was moved by Bevans that the CSG make the appropriate adjustments based on an independent audit, in the principal balance of each active Grange Trust account and send notification with explanation to each Grange. Seconded by Lange. In favor 7, opposed 0.

The meeting was recessed for a short break.

Reconvened at 2:34pm.

Jay Hartz joined the meeting.

Grange Properties
Jay distributed his report.

Biggs Grange – The Executive Committee discussed reorganizing a Grange instead of selling the hall.

Calaveras Grange – A review of rental costs in the area needs to be done. L. Bergeron stated there are Grange Youth Fair kids in the area. Reorganization is possible. Stefenoni will contact members in the area.

It was moved by Sawyer that we delay decision on the Calaveras Grange Hall until we have more information to be obtained by the Master including comparable leases. Seconded by Lange. In favor 6, opposed 0. (Stefenoni left the meeting briefly.)

Centerville Grange – (Stefenoni rejoined the meeting). It was moved by Sawyer to delay the sale of Centerville Grange until the State Master has a chance to meet with the Grange. Seconded by Lange. In favor 7, opposed 0.

Freshwater Grange – Stefenoni spoke with Lois Trumbull regarding the Grange. The hall is in need of repairs. There are people in the community that would like to see the Grange continue.

Janesville Grange – Requested Hartz send Betty Harrison a letter giving her a 30 day deadline requesting she make a decision regarding the property.

Kings River Grange – Check is in the mail.

Lucerne Valley Grange – Lewis stated he will contact Dahlia and work to reorganize.

Costa Mesa Grange – Stefenoni stated we have not received an updated roster. He will contact the Grange.

Orangevale Grange – Orangevale Grange and Fair Oaks Grange have voted to consolidate. Clausen will follow up on suspension of Orangevale Grange Corporation with the Secretary of State.

El Camino Grange – Stefenoni reported the El Camino Grange met yesterday and voted to consolidate with Independent Grange.

Legislative Policy Handbook

Hartz presented a suggested computer process to organize our resolutions so that they can easily be researched. (Stefenoni briefly left the meeting.) The committee requested that Hartz implement the process. Hartz left the meeting.

Financial

Finance Committee – Bevans reported there were no updates to the Finance Report that was passed out at the last Executive Committee meeting. (Stefenoni joined the meeting.)

It was moved by Lange to approve the California State Grange policy on "Reimbursement Submission and Credit Card Usage" as amended. Seconded by Lewis. In favor 7, opposed 0.

It was moved by Lange to approve the California State Grange "Travel, Meals and Lodging Expenses (Employees) and (Non-Employees)" as written. Seconded by Lewis. In favor 7, opposed 0.

The meeting was recessed for a short break.

Reconvened at 4:15pm.

Web Site and E-mail System

Squire introduced Brian Murphy with Winnet Technologies, Inc. who made a presentation regarding web site and database upgrades. He answered questions and will bring a proposal back to the Executive Director.

Insurance Committee Report

Lewis stated he is not comfortable serving on the Insurance Committee he was appointed to at the last meeting. K. Bergeron stated the same. Lewis, Stefenoni and Bergeron previously resigned from the committee due to conflict of interest and potential for professional exposure.

K. Bergeron advised the committee that she is now the Agent of Record for the CSG Auto Policy. The other two policies will not be transferred until their renewal in July.

The committee asked the agent to review the current policies and bring back a recommendation to the next meeting. The committee also needs to establish written policy regarding the property management notification for insurance needs.

Lewis recommended the California State Grange be an Insurance Certificate holder for every Grange in the state.

Youth Department

Stefenoni read the report submitted by Bill and Patty Allen, Youth Directors, regarding Youth and Young Adult Conference held on February 13-16 at the Grover City Grange. See report attached.

Family Camp – Stefenoni read a letter from Jim McDaniel the overall director of this years camp. Camp will be held at Camp Tehama again on June 14-19.

Squire read a letter from Lecturer Kathy Parra, thanking the committee for approving her plan for awards.

Western States Conference will be held August 20-22 in Sacramento. The committee is working with Cindy Greer from the National Grange.

Secretary Report

K. Bergeron reported quarterly reports are now current. The roster is completed except for the State Master's appointments. By our By-Laws, the roster is due to be mailed no later than March 1st. The Journal of Proceedings has been sent to several members of the Executive Committee for proofreading. Membership

Squire passed out a proposal for a membership program using three of the current Action Granges. Discussion was deferred to tomorrow's meeting after the committee has had a chance to review the proposal.

Stefenoni discussed supporting appointed positions in a regulatory agency. National Master Bill Steel stated it is possible to endorse and send letters of recommendation in a position of appointment within an agency.

The meeting was recessed for dinner at 6:10pm with the Grange Foundation meeting to follow dinner.

Call to Order:

The meeting of the California State Grange Executive Committee was called to order at 10:06am by Chairman John Squire.

Roll Call:

Executive Committee Members John Squire, Marian Nichols, Inger Bevans, Robert Lange, H. Tom Sawyer; Overseer Randall Lewis, Secretary Kathy Bergeron.

Approve Agenda:

Items added to the agenda included vacation policy, telephone procedures, expense voucher appeal, travel policy, junior expo, letter to Granges with asset management accounts.

Minutes of Previous Meeting:

Master Tom Stefenoni joined the meeting. It was moved by Sawyer that the minutes of the 2/27/04 meeting be approved as corrected. Bevans seconded. In favor 7, opposed 0.

Executive Director Julie Clausen joined the meeting.

It was moved by Lewis to approve the minutes of the 4/11/04 e-mail meeting as corrected. Lange seconded. In favor 7, opposed 0.

Past Executive Committeeman Ernest White joined the meeting to address the Executive Committee. White had concerns about the Grange and what has happened to it. He expressed his ideas and what he thinks should be done. The most important thing is communications. Very little information is going out to the Granges which has created rumors. He suggested sending a letter to all the Granges telling them that we have problems and people are working to correct them. He also suggested sending a letter to the Granges requesting their

input on regional rep appointments. Let everyone know what is happening. White stated the Grange is a great organization and he would like to see it work, but the members cannot be left out in the dark. He thanked the committee and was thanked by Squire for his input. Sawyer stated he appreciated White attending the meeting and informing the Executive Committee.

Master's Comments:

The Action II Conference was hosted by Sebastopol Grange and was attended by representatives of seven California Granges, three Ohio Granges and the Master of the Ohio State Grange. Sally Crosiar of Canadaigua, NY served as the conference facilitator. Sally's easy-going but direct style, as well as the bulk of the conference work being done in small groups, allowed for open communication and quick progress. The conference provided the tools for the participating Granges to: assess the current realities of their Grange; create a vision to guide their Granges into the future; identify the possibilities to better serve their members and communities; develop goals to turn the vision into reality; build the team's leadership capacity and have fun doing it. The conference was well worth the time and money.

Legislative - Stefenoni attended a legislative reception hosted by the California Forestry Association and Western Growers. Both provided the opportunity to interact and network with Assemblymen and State Senators and Department heads.

PLF - Stefenoni reported PLF is revising their filing on the Gray Wolf listing for a more flexible management plan approved for the northwestern states. The California State Grange has been asked to join on a number of ESU's that are very similar to the Coho suits now in progress, including the Central California Coast Steelhead and the Central Valley Spring run Chinook Salmon.

GIA Annual Meeting - The much discussed by-law amendment for GIA passed with 11,000+ in favor and 1,100+ opposed. The State Masters present were invited by the President pro-tem, Tom McKern to meet with him. The meeting was both positive and contentious. The newly elected Chairman of the Board is Dareld Larrigan of California. Stefenoni met recently with Larrigan who assured him that if he ever had any questions or concerns that he is available.

Benefits and Services - Stefenoni has contacted an insurance agency to see if they have association type plans which are non-competitive with GIA. He is still working with the Lithia Dealership Group regarding vehicle discounts.

Stefenoni has recently attended the State FFA conference with 3,000 screaming teenagers. The organization presentations are practiced and polished. Attendance was valuable and we should continue support of the program and participation in the career show with our booth.

Grange Experiences - North Fork Grange in Trinity County has reorganized with 15 recently joined members and four more applications. Stefenoni attended the McCloud Grange where they have an active Junior Grange.

Executive Director Comments:

Clausen passed out Fundamentals of Board Leadership Workshop which will be held on May 5th.

Progress is being made with the web-site. She passed out a side by side comparison of proposals from Planeteria and Winnet and a letter she will present for funding of the project.

Clausen passed out information for the World Ag Expo 2005, CA State Fair package options for participation, recent Pioneer Press article, and the Veterans Cemetery.

Legislation - Clausen reported coalition building is continuing. She recently went to Washington, DC as President of California Women in Timber. She attended and led meetings with legislators and advisors. The CSG is getting ready for the National Grange Fly-In in DC and plan to have position papers organized ahead of time for distribution.

The meeting was recessed for lunch at 12:51pm.

Following a power point presentation by Randall Lewis, the meeting reconvened at 2:25pm.

Report of Granges and Properties

Jay Hartz's written report was presented. Action was needed regarding a written standard and guidelines for grants which was referred to the California State Grange Foundation.

Past Master Leo Bergeron and Jay Hartz joined the meeting.

Calaveras Grange - It was moved by Lewis to accept the Calaveras Grange quit claim deed to the California State Grange. Lange seconded. In favor 7, opposed 0.

Hartz was instructed to obtain the quit claim deed.

Woodbridge Grange - It was moved by Lange to secure a quit claim deed to the Woodbridge Grange Hall. Sawyer seconded. In favor 7, opposed 0.

CSG has paid the insurance. Hartz was instructed to obtain the quit claim deed. Obtaining a title search of the property was discussed.

CSG Property Triangle - Hartz was instructed to proceed with the proposal from Crossroads subject to a lease approved by our attorney.

Past Master Bob Clouse joined the meeting. Clouse shared that knowing the computer system needs to be upgraded, maybe it is time that subordinate Granges assist the California State Grange. The website proposals were reviewed once again.

Insurance Agent:

Kathy Bergeron explained that she is currently the agent of record for the CSG Commercial Business Auto Policy. The other CSG policies will transfer to her agency at their renewal. Director & Liability coverage - Markets are currently being searched.

Expense Voucher Appeal - Kathy Bergeron presented her appeal.

It was moved by Lange that the \$79.00 be reimbursed because it was prior to the Executive Committee meeting, but the mileage be paid one way. Seconded by Nichols. In favor 6, opposed 0, abstained 1.

Lewis brought up the tax possibilities for officers and directors to deduct their Grange expenses from their taxes.

It was moved by Lange that parcel two from the Gridley Grange transaction be quit claim deeded to the new owners. Seconded by Nichols. In favor 7, opposed 0.

The meeting was recessed for the evening at 5:55pm.

The meeting was reconvened on Friday April 23, 2004 at 9:47am with Executive Committee Squire, Nichols, Bevans, Lange, Sawyer, Master Stefenoni, Overseer Lewis, Secretary Bergeron, Executive Director Clausen present.

Financial

Bevans and Clausen left the meeting.

Squire stated he has received the final 2003 audit from Karl F. Gunther CPA. Discussion.

Bevans, Clausen joined the meeting.

Past Master Bergeron joined the meeting.

It was moved by Lange that a letter from the Executive Committee be sent to the CSG Fair Directors informing them that due to their lack of diligence on financial reporting, they have seven days to properly account for their expenses or the credit card and financial rights will be suspended. Seconded by Sawyer. In favor 7, opposed 0.

Executive Committee Handbook:

Bevans passed out a draft of the new Executive Committee Handbook.

K Bergeron requested the 20 cents per mile (one way) for non-employees be reconsidered.

It was moved by Sawyer to change the non-employees mileage reimbursement by replacing the 20 cents per

mile (one way) with the allowable IRS charitable mileage rate (round trip). Seconded by Lewis. In favor 7, opposed 0.

Report of Attorney:

Leo Bergeron as the representative of Bergeron Insurance Agency asked Nickens questions regarding insurable interest. When does the CSG become legally liable for a Grange Hall? Nickens stated when a Grange charter is surrendered, suspended or revoked, the CSG becomes responsible immediately. The rights of the existing insurance policy can be assigned to the CSG. The CSG can also be listed as an additional name insured if they are added to the policy prior to surrender of the charter. Nickens recommended if an insurance policy ceases, at that point the CSG should pick it up as they become responsible.

Master Stefenoni presented Past Master Bergeron with a shovel from the Shovel Brigade in Jarbridge, Nevada and a bucket from the Klamath Basin Bucket Brigade in Klamath Falls. It was moved by Lewis that a member of staff answer all incoming phone calls and direct them accordingly when possible. Seconded by Lange. In favor 7, opposed 0.

Membership Promotion:

Discussion regarding a membership mailing. There was also discussion regarding the CSG newspaper outsourcing the production of the newspaper to be processed and mailed using the GIA policyholder list and CSG member list. Squire appointed Lewis to continue to develop the program and keep the committee informed.

Website:

Stefenoni reported that Winnet contacted him to clarify that in the presentation the hosting hardware was not to host the website in house but to host the CSG database and e-mail on site. The expanded capacity was to make the process quicker. Stefenoni read a letter from Affinity Media Services proposing changes to the current website.

It was moved by Lewis that the State Master respond appropriately to the AMS letter. Seconded by Sawyer. In favor 7, opposed 0.

Both parties would then initial the list after check off so there is no misunderstanding later as to what was require or promised. This would be nothing more than an informal RFP. At this late date and in view of the crucial necessity, rather than a full RFP which will take a lot of time to prepare, the above plan would suffice.

Lange stated that he has already expressed his opinion on the computer system and the web-site. He said the one mistake that he personally made was voting for either one of them. We should have gotten more proposals. He said the computer system should be revisited at our next meeting.

Lewis respectfully did not agree with Squire for several reasons. The Executive Committee must take

advantage of the offered gift and not waste it. We need to have done our research well and in his opinion are derelict in our fiduciary duties if we do not have an RFP. The RFP is an instrument of the contract. We need to have a contract that puts our requirements clearly in writing for the vendor we select to see. The offer made by Squire wipes out the requirement for having the RFP in writing.

On 6/8/04 at 11:42pm Squire called for the vote.

6/13/04 at 11:32pm Squire rechecked all e-mails and found the results, in favor 7, opposed 0.

Squire thanked the members for their efforts and discussion. The meeting was adjourned.

Visitors

Minutes of Previous Meeting

It was moved by Sawyer to approve the minutes of the 4/22/04 meeting as corrected. Seconded by Nichols. In favor 7, opposed 0.

The June 6, 2004 e-mail meeting minutes were distributed. They will be placed on the agenda for approval at the next meeting.

Master's Comments

Stefenoni attended an exciting day at the Lake Earl Grange rededication. There was broad-based support from the community and members. The artisans and vendors in the community did a lot of work at cost. He has never seen so many kids in red vests at one time in one place. They received recognition for their fair recent achievements.

Stefenoni is working with the Crescent Redwood Grange. They recently had a clean up day. He has made contact with new interested members to organize the next meeting.

National Grange legislative fly-in was a well-planned program this year and offered a lot of diversity in their workshops. The workshops included wind-generated power and bio-diesel. There was also an interesting discussion on BSE and the impact for the beef market. Two days on the hill was excellent. With the four people Tom & Martha Stefenoni, Legislative Chairman Kathy Van Tyle and Executive Director Julie Clausen,

the CSG was able to reach our entire congressional delegation. Discussions with the congressional staff were very positive. The most interesting meetings were with the urban congressman.

Rohner Grange awards and member recognition night found Stefenoni traveling from Washington DC to Fortuna.

Santa Clara Valley – Orcutt/Sisquot Granges were presented their charters. They have a lot of young families. They are ready to go with fair programs and be involved.

Stefenoni attended the California Tiger Salamander (CTSW) public hearing and was able to give testimony. Copies of his testimony as well as background materials handed out at the hearing were provided.

Stefenoni advised the Executive Committee of the National Grange compensation agreement for the organization/reorganization of Granges.

It was moved by Lange to sign and adopt the new National Grange compensation agreement for the organization and re-organization of Granges. Seconded by Sawyer. In favor 7, opposed 0.

Stefenoni also updated the Executive Committee on the National Grange Medicare-Approved Discount Card Education Program. Granges will be able to participate in up to three programs.

Executive Director Comments

Julie Clausen reminded the Executive Committee that they had received a packet of information in the mail. Most of the items are on the agenda and will be taken up during the meeting. She reported that Property Manager Jay Hartz was sent to a Title Examination Seminar that provided education on preliminary reports, impact of trusts and vesting of title records and title insurance; types of title insurance and endorsements; how claims are made and resolved; how and when to use special title consultants; new development and title insurance in the modern electronic age.

National Fly-In – Clausen displayed the packet distributed to the congressional offices. The packet included the CSG Legislative Policy Handbook, a welcome statement, Bridging the Gap, ESA Reform and CSG history. They had very positive meetings with very good response. They could have given out more packets.

Clausen will be testifying next Wednesday on the Sierra Nevada Conservancy.

Martha's Comments

Stefenoni read Martha Stefenoni's comments on the National Grange Fly-In. Martha thanked the CSG for a very educational experience. She stated the National Grange did an outstanding job in setting up an interesting and informative program. The corporate sponsorships they were able to garner allowed for an exceptional program. She also expressed her thoughts and observation on what we can do better or different if given the opportunity to go again.

Sawyer stated that he was pleased to hear and understand what has been done by the CSG and that we have been able to get the type of response we have. He also stated that the CSG needs to let our own members know what we have been doing. We need media presence and we need to send something substantial to the Granges.

It was moved by Sawyer that Clausen be requested to put together a legislative summary packet to be distributed to the Granges. Seconded by Stefenoni. In favor 7, opposed 0.

Lewis stated that he has talked with GIA regarding using a third party vendor for mailings. It was also suggested that we need a fully developed media program.

Lewis stated our Past Master Leo Bergeron is a master at promotion and publicity and asked for his input. Bergeron pointed out that our current newspaper can include a take-out legislative section. The legislative whole program can be put in the newspaper at the very least once a year.

The meeting recessed for a five minutes break at 10:55am.

Reconvened at 11:05am.

Approve Agenda

Reviewing the Karl Gunther CPA contract was added to the executive session. The Executive Director evaluation process and form was also added to the Executive session.

Action Items Updates

Insurance requirement letter. Squire stated his proposal of writing an Executive Committee resolution regarding the policy to require the CSG be listed as an additional insured on subordinate Granges insurance policies. Discussion. It was agreed to continue the process from the original motion.

Letter to Norm Dahlia - The request letter was sent to Dahlia and he is filing his reports.

Letter to Granges with asset management accounts - The letter to all asset management accounts is done and being mailed today.

Property Manager Jay Hartz joined the meeting.

Report of Granges and Properties

Biggs Grange - Hartz asked is it on the market or are we holding it off the market? Do we want to talk to the real estate agent or the church? A real estate agent has made an offer for \$76,000. No offer has been received from the church. The property has been off the market for over a year. Hartz will ask church for written offer if they are interested. Sale of the property will remain on hold while the CSG attempts to re-organize the Grange.

Calaveras Grange - Information was received from the Calaveras Grange secretary. They have asked that someone pick up their charter, monies etc. by September 1st. Building is in good condition with a large lot. Stefenoni will ask a deputy to make contact.

Centerville Grange - The real estate agent proposed dropping the sale price to \$98,500. Clausen will inspect hall next Friday 7/2/04.

Cherry Valley Grange - Squire reported that he has called the Cherry Valley Grange Master. They are current on all quarterly reports. The hall was donated to the parks and recreation district seven or eight years ago. Stefenoni will contact Past Master Clouse to verify that the donation was done correctly as he was master at the time.

El Camino Grange – Hartz is getting an appraisal on the property. A church would like to lease the property with an option to purchase.

Fair Oaks Grange – Stefenoni has necessary documentation regarding the consolidation of Fair Oaks Grange with Orangevale Grange. Stefenoni has written a letter to the Fair Oaks Grange. He also has a letter to Clouse regarding the sale of the Fair Oaks property and depositing funds with CSG. Both letters are dated today 6/25/04 and will be mailed Monday.

It was moved by Lewis that a demand letter be sent to the Fair Oaks Grange for the net proceeds from the funds from the sale of their hall to be deposited into the asset management account of the CSG. Seconded by Sawyer. In favor 5, opposed 1, abstained 1.

Farmersville Grange – The lawsuit continues to wind its way through the court system.

Janesville Grange – Randy Lewis and Leo Bergeron offered to donate \$500.00 to the California Grange Foundation in exchange for a quit claim deed to the Janesville Grange property. The property is unusable, non-buildable and a liability risk for the CSG. It has been on the market and no offers made for the past five years.

It was moved by Stefenoni, seconded by Bevans to accept the offer from Randy Lewis and Leo Bergeron to donate \$500.00 to the California Grange Foundation in exchange for a quit claim deed to the Janesville Grange property. In favor 3, opposed Nichols and Lange, abstained Lewis and Squire. Motion carried.

Lewis requested a roll call vote. Squire abstained; Sawyer aye; Nichols nay; Bevans aye; Lange nay; Lewis abstained; Stefenoni aye. In favor 3, opposed 2, abstained 2.

It was suggested that an article be put in the Grange news explaining why the Janesville Grange was sold to Lewis and Bergeron, so that the members understand that the property was of no value to the CSG and was a liability risk.

Little Lake Grange – The Little Lake Grange has requested authorization to sell ½ of their property. The property holds a single mobile home and would be used to pay for the necessary work to update/restore their hall. It was recommended that the CSG require a written proposal of the work to be done and costs including contractor plans, prior to approval to sell the property. It is also required that the proceeds come to CSG to be deposited into an asset management account to be administrated by the CSG.

It was moved by Lewis that no formal action be taken on sale of half of the Little Lake Grange property until the complete project package showing scope of work, cost of work and permit fees is presented to the CSG. Seconded by Stefenoni. In favor 7, opposed 0.

Woodbridge Grange – Hartz talked with the Lodi Arts Council. They are interested in forming a Grange. They plan to rent the hall to the Arts Council for a showroom. The process is still on hold until the county comes up with figures.

Hartz reported on the seminar he attended. It was very interesting. Majority of the course was regarding title insurance.

There were questions regarding a procedure for grants. Hartz is working on a check list.

Patio Fence – Solid fence off kitchen area is falling down. They are currently getting bids to replace the fence.

Janitorial Contract – The Executive Committee was notified the contract for janitorial and landscaping maintenance services will increase approximately 5% beginning 7/1/04 with another 5% increase on 1/1/05.

UC Davis Medical Center has purchased property/building and there is a possibility they will be dropping their lease with us. Projected time table is approximately two years.

Phone system – Hartz advised the Executive Committee that it will cost approximately \$80.00 to \$100.00 to change programming of the phone system.

Lewis left the meeting briefly.

It was moved by Sawyer to spend the necessary money not exceeding \$200.00 to get the phone system re-programmed, allowing the office staff to answer incoming calls. Seconded by Lange. In favor 6, opposed 0.

The meeting was recessed for lunch at 1:21pm.

The meeting reconvened at 2:21pm.

Secretary Report – Secretary Kathy Bergeron secretary's assistant Corissa Young joined the meeting. Young stated the quarterly reports are current and actually going to National Grange two weeks early.

Now that the Roster and Journal are finally done, the next big project is an audit of past quarterly reports to National Grange. This audit will cover approximately the last four years.

Young distributed spreadsheets for 2002/2004 for quarterly reports and monies received for all Granges, Subordinate, Pomona and Junior. She request that any Grange two or more quarters behind be suspended. Six Granges were suspended in May. Three of the registered letters were returned. One Grange has been reinstated. She requested an officer or deputy take the letters and personally deliver them. She passed out sample letters that are sent to the Granges.

This edition of the newspaper will have an article that each Grange officer should know the answer to, regarding EIN numbers, article of incorporation, etc. This will be discussed at the Secretary workshop at the convention this year.

Roster updates and changes will be printed in the CSG newspaper starting with this issue.

Convention information needs to be done by the end of next month. Officer reports must be submitted prior to convention so that they can be put in the packets.

Corissa gave an overview of postage information request regarding shipping of free information, such as extra copies of the roster and Expo book. She asked for policy on the shipping of free items.

It was moved by Bevans that supply items shipped from the CSG office include postage and handling charges. Seconded by Stefenoni. In favor 5, opposed 2. Motion carried.

Bergeron requested a letter be sent from the Secretary's office to the North Fork Grange. They have recently reorganized and need to be advised as to what is needed to bring their Grange current.

She also advised the committee that the approved minutes have been regularly e-mailed to the editor for printing in the CSG newspaper.

Bergeron thanked Corissa for her work. Corissa left the meeting.

Bergeron passed out the copies of the signed approved minutes through 4/11/04.

Accountant Nancy Koschyk and Bookkeeper Amy Self joined the meeting. The monthly financial report for May 2004 was reviewed.

Squire asked that the entire staff join the meeting. He stated the Executive Committee is very appreciative of their efforts in disseminating a lot of new information. The office staff is doing a good job of helping us in lowering our expenses. Lange added we are doing a good job because of the staff. Sawyer encouraged them to do more of the same. Staff left the meeting.

The new chart of accounts was reviewed. Assets management accounts and the Grange Foundation are also receiving a new chart of accounts. Self left the meeting.

A list of the current loans held by the CSG was reviewed.

It was moved by Lewis that the property manager take the appropriate action to secure a Note and Deed of Trust from all Granges with loans and no note or Deed of Trust. Seconded by Lange. In favor 7, opposed 0.

It was moved by Sawyer that if the property manager received a refusal from a Grange to sign a Note or Deed of Trust, the Executive Committee be notified immediately. Seconded by Lewis. In favor 7, opposed 0.

It was discussed that if a refusal is received, the Grange immediately be suspended.

It was moved by Lewis that we adopt and enforce the application and approval procedures for Grange Hall loans. It was seconded by Lange.

It was moved by Stefenoni to table the motion, seconded by Sawyer. In favor 7, opposed 0.

There was discussion regarding changing our financial year to a fiscal year instead of calendar year. No changes were made. Lewis asked how over budget are we to date. Koschyk stated approximately \$20,000 to \$40,000. The need for membership development was discussed. Clausen thanked Koschyk for donating the food for the budget workshop held by the Executive Committee. Koschyk encouraged the members to e-mail her if they have questions. Koschyk left the meeting.

Bergeron recommended that an outside audit be performed on the CSG loans every year. Lewis stated that the audit should be performed by a committee of the Grange. He stated the cost of an outside auditor could be prohibitive. Squire stated the committee has been remiss and that the problem needs to be fixed.

Insurance Report – Insurance agents Leo and Kathy Bergeron reported that since the last Executive Committee meeting they have reviewed the CSG policies in depth with Grange Insurance Association in Seattle,

Washington. They spent half a day with the underwriting staff reviewing and analyzing the policies and coverage to be reasonably certain that the coverage is adequate and correct. They gave a detailed report of the current coverage and their recommendations.

Lewis requested a written report be given to the EC. He also requested that all the halls now in the possession of the CSG be inspected to determine if they qualify for property coverage. Clausen discussed that she and Hartz would visit these halls and obtain the necessary information.

The meeting recessed for the evening at 6:06pm.

The meeting was reconvened on Saturday, June 26, 2004 at 9:00am with Executive Committee Squire, Nichols, Bevans, Lange, Sawyer; Master Stefenoni, Overseer Lewis, Secretary Bergeron, Executive Director Clausen present. Visitors present Past Master Leo Bergeron and Frank Nichols.

L. Bergeron advised the committee that the Coho Salmon listing was postponed at yesterday's hearing. The Cattlemen, Farm Bureau and Grange did an excellent job with their presentations during the hearing. Helen Ferguson, Chairman of the Conservation and Environmental Affairs Committee, represented the CSG. L. Bergeron left the meeting.

Grange Hall Loan Process

It was moved by Lewis to bring the motion that we adopt and enforce the application and approval procedures for Grange Hall loans, back on the floor. Second by Nichols. In favor 7, opposed 0.

It was moved by Lewis that we adopt and enforce the application and approval procedures for Grange Hall loans. Seconded by Lange. In favor 7, opposed 0.

Sawyer requested that the final Grange Hall Loan Process be attached to the minutes.

Background Check – Lewis stated that he would e-mail the final procedures to the Executive Committee.

Patio Fence – Clausen and Stefenoni will get a design and prices.

Grange Hall Lease terms and requirements – Squire will compile suggestions for a lease agreement.

It was moved by Sawyer to authorize the property manager to proceed with the proposed lease for the El Camino Grange. Seconded by Lange.

It was moved by Stefenoni to amend the motion to authorize the property manager to proceed with gathering the necessary information for the proposed lease for the El Camino. Seconded by Sawyer. In favor 7, opposed 0.

The amended motion, in favor 7, opposed 0.

Lewis advised the Executive Committee that their Worker's Compensation Insurance Policy covers the CSG employees in the State of California. We need to verify that our employees are covered if they are working outside the state. Clausen will check with the CSG Worker's Compensation carrier. Squire asked for the information she receives to be in writing.

File reports with pictures of Grange Halls – Clausen explained that the office will be going to a centralized filing system with a sign out log.

Technology

Gestetner Duplicator – Clausen presented a proposal for the purchase of a replacement Gestetner Duplicator as the current machine needs to be replaced.

It was moved by Nichols to borrow money for the purchase of a Gestetner Duplicator from the Asset Management Account of Surrendered Charters at a rate of 2% for five years. Seconded by Stefenoni. In favor 7, opposed 0.

The meeting recessed for a short break at 10:45am.

The meeting reconvened at 11:07am.

Website and E-mail System – Two proposals have been received, one from Winnet and one from Planeteria. Lange stated he is not satisfied with the proposals and expressed his request to obtain bids from other vendors. Lewis stated his reasons for requiring a Request For Proposal.

Lewis provided information in writing regarding how to write a request for proposal for a web site development project. Discussion.

Stefenoni gave information on the Western Leaders Conference which will be held in Sacramento on August 20-22. He also passed out information from the National Grange Action Alert regarding the ESA Reform petition. The online petition process was discussed.

Convention - Stefenoni passed out a draft schedule for the annual convention in October along with the cost of meal function.

It was moved by Lange to approve the draft agenda schedule for the annual session. Seconded by Sawyer. In favor 7, opposed 0.

It was moved by Lewis to establish a registration fee of \$30.00. Seconded by Lange. In favor 4, opposed Squire, Sawyer and Nichols. Motion carried.

It was moved by Sawyer to accept the schedule of meals and costs. Seconded by Lange. In favor 7, opposed 0.

Bergeron left the meeting.

Inger Bevans -Regarding the motion to reconsider, I agree after reading your other e-mails. The one thing I have not researched in the older minutes, is did we authorize the sale of this hall and did we list it? If the offer just came out of the blue, we need to get our own appraisal and then consider offering it for sale. If we have previously approved the listing for sale of any hall, then we do need to consider offers as they come in, but not if we haven't. Those can wait.

Johnny Squire: The information Bob and Randy have presented is very different than what I had heard earlier, which was the property was located in a depressed undesirable area. I personally don't know. The sale price offered by the school district is about \$43,560 per acre. In my book that's a pretty good price. If it has development or industrial potential, then maybe we need to look at those possibilities. I personally wouldn't want the Grange involved in a development project unless there is some surefire guarantees. However I wouldn't be opposed to dividing it into saleable lots or some other idea of this type if it would increase the value significantly. I am open to any ideas that look good. This may be a property that we can speculate with and increase the net income of the Grange into the future. It's paid for and we sure haven't got a lot to lose but time, if we tried as long as we don't put up a lot of money.

Tom Sawyer - I don't know anything about Muscoy Grange property or the Grange. I expect to do some history research, as is Inger. In general I trust Jay to do a fair amount of research before he requests us to approve. Without further research and regarding Randy and Bob's e-mails, there is a reason to go slow, we should ask to give us details of what he knows. I am not in favor of selling any hall if there is a possibility of grange use, but we can speculate forever about what might happen should we hold out for more money. Since the school district will give us a fair price and no possibility of reorganization exists, we should sell before the offer goes away. This is not to say we should take a look at the new information proffered before voting. Randy, you are our greatest protector - keep it up.

Johnny Squire: I think Mike Byers made a report on Muscoy in one of our meetings before Jan. 2004. If I am right it was about Muscoy.

Inger: Found this report in the October 7, 2003 minutes:

" Muscoy Grange -Have letter of interest in purchasing the Grange. Muscoy has sent letter stating that the hall would be sold and the funds would be given to the Yucca Grange Junior program. Outside of hall is okay. County did weed abatement because of citation and bill will be sent to the State Office. Hall inside is not good. The hall sits on two parcels, one of which is four acres of grazing land. Byers advised the real estate agent to take signs down, and would advise the CSG intent. Fire station on one side, and a drug rehabilitation house next door. Four horses are grazing on the property behind. Locks were changed and property was secured. "

The meeting reconvened at 1:30pm.

Lange asked that a straw vote be taken signifying that the Executive Committee realizes the value of the Grange properties. Everyone agreed.

1:45 PM - Dahlias called. They were in Madera headed for Sacramento.

Invested Funds:

Squire stated that next week the Worthy Master will meet with Morgan Stanley regarding investing the funds that are currently in the Money Market account. Lange questioned if the amount that will be invested will be insured. The Worthy Master stated we would comply with the policy regarding invested funds.

The question was raised when does the investment of the funds need to be completed? The Worthy Master stated this needs to be done before convention. Moved by Lange, seconded by Bevans that all but \$500,000 of the Morgan Stanley funds be invested at the discretion of the Master. In favor 6, opposed 0.

Expo:

Stale Dated Expo Checks - Moved by Bevans, seconded by Nichols we void all checks that have not been cash from 2003 Expo winnings. In favor 6, opposed 0.

Our bookkeeper Amy Self suggested placing a check off box on the Expo Receiving form if the participant wants to donate their prize check to a department/program within the Grange. Also the form will state that checks must be cashed within a specified number of days.

Grange Youth Fair:

Based on the 2004 Budget and the expenses that have been reported to date, the Grange Youth Fair program has spent all but approximately \$10,500 of the amount budgeted. The problems of timely reporting of expenses and accounting for the expenses on the Grange credit card were discussed. Moved by Nichols, seconded by Sawyer and passed to recall the Grange credit card from Dahlia and replace it with a prepaid debit card with a limit determined by the Master as conditions warrant. Replenishment to the debit card will be based on Expense Reports and Travel Activity Logs completed, received and reviewed in the State Grange office. In favor 5, opposed 0, abstained 1.

Moved by Lange, seconded by Sawyer that no expense for rental car(s) for Directors will be reimbursed unless prior approval has been given by the Master. In favor 6, opposed 0.

State Master's Report:

The Worthy Master reported that in view of the Executive Committee action August 27th to release the Executive/Legislative Director of her responsibilities, he has been working on ways that the Grange can still be effective in the Legislative arena until the position can be reviewed and a determination made on the future of that position. He presented a *Legislative Action Plan* and a *Grange in Need Plan*. Both of these plans would encourage participation by the membership.

Budget:

Bevans reported that the Budget Committee had revisited the budget allocations regarding the extra duty compensation for the State Master based on the additional duties that he will be assuming due to the vacancy in the Executive/Legislative Director position. It was moved by Nichols, seconded by Bevans that the State Master be paid the extra duty compensation from August 28th. In favor 5, opposed 0, abstained 1.

Grange Youth Fair:

The Dahlias arrived at approximately 4 PM. The State Master reviewed the difficulty the State Grange has had in receiving timely and complete expense reporting for the Grange Youth Fair program. Worthy Master Stefenoni laid out how the program has to run and that Expense Reports MUST be in as prescribed in the Policy and Procedure Manual. The Worthy Master also stated that the State Grange still does not have a complete list of members (names, addresses and Subordinate Grange membership) from the Youth Fair program members. Brother Dahlia reported on the concern of the Youth Fair Program members about additional fees that might be due from them to the State Grange.

Health Committee

During 2004 I have particularly enjoyed my work as chairman on the California State Grange Health Committee. This work helps me draw on my past experiences which include 10 years with the State Department of Mental Health during which I held several positions, including 4 years in the medical surgical department of a state hospital in Auburn. That was followed by 10 years as a Rehab Counselor and Supervisor for a five-county program. Later I operated at the Opportunity Center for the Handicapped in Hayford for 4 years, and spent 28 months working at the Siskiyou Opportunity Center in Mt Shasta and 11 years as a board member for PRIDE in Roseville.

A major interest of mine is working to address the serious lack of mental health care in our state since Lanterman Petris Short and Short-Doyle legislation inadequately modified the provision of mental health services in the 1970's.

This year our committee was comprised of Betty Ann Biringer-Rehm, Yvette Adams and Miklos Nemeth. Leslie Parker made it clear after she arrived, that she wanted to work with us should there be more resolutions. A very agreeable man told me in the hallway that he was assigned to my committee. I promised to find him if we had more resolutions but did not get his name.

We had only three resolutions, they were:

- 1- Tax Exemptions for Physician-Ordered Over-the-Counter Drugs
- 2- Support Proposition 61
- 3- Medication Purchased Outside the U.S.

All were discussed, one was restructured and all were presented by the committee as favorable.

In 2004 we held no meetings during the year but communicated as needed by phone. I recommend we meet more often in 2005 if possible.

We have a Health Committee and a Family Health Deaf Awareness Committee, both functioning in the California State Grange. As we go forward we can't have too much emphasis on health. Communication is excellent between our two committees.

Problems facing us are numerous, and include:

- 1- Dangerous viruses such as: West Nile, Avian Flu, with the added concern of the mutation of these.
- 2- AIDS, which still increases in much of the world.
- 3- Substance abuse i.e. illegal drugs and alcohol.
- 4- Ever-accelerating obesity.
- 5- Problems increasing among our aging population.
- 6- Poorly-treated psychiatric disorders.
- 7- Venereal diseases of several types now appearing in grade children.

Again, I want to thank you Worthy Master and the delegates for participating in setting California State Grange policy as we renew our commitment to the values of citizenship, non-partisan participation in public affairs and promoting family values which the Grange has always done.

Water Committee

Today one of the largest concerns facing the people of the State of California is water. The water system that is in place in California today was put in place in the early 1960's. The water distribution system was designed to accommodate a population of approximately 16,000,000. That system has remained in place without any significant changes for the past forty years.

The population of the state of California during the last forty years has more than doubled to approximately 35,000,000 and the projection for the next ten years is that the population will increase to approximately 50,000,000.

Where will the water to sustain a population of 50,000,000 come from?? The answer is "AGRICULTURE". The past forty years has seen a dramatic reduction in the amount of water available to agriculture. Over forty percent of the water allotted to agriculture has been diverted to sustain the growth in our urban areas and satisfy environmental requirements.

The agricultural community has adjusted, refined and created new methods for its use of water. Even with the reduction of 40% of its water, the State of California is the 7th largest agriculture producing "country" in the world. Yes, in comparison to other countries, California ranks 7th in world production of agriculture commodities.

The central valley project from Mt. Shasta to Bakersfield is the reason that the State of California is one of the greatest agriculture producing regions in the world. The central valley project is a GRANGE PROJECT. The California State Grange worked for over thirty years to implement this project. The past Master of the California State Grange George Schelmeyer helped to write the legislation that empowered the Army Corp of Engineers to build the Shasta dam.

The population figures indicate that more water is needed to sustain the growth of the state. Where will it come from? It can no longer come from agriculture. The agricultural community has given up all the water that it can. The bucket is empty.

The only way agriculture can reduce the amount of water it uses is to take land out of production. Many think that is foolish and would never happen. How can we feed the country if we take land out of production? Well, it is happening right now. Today thousands of acres of prime farm land are being taken out of production. The government is buying water rights and creating "water banks". The Endangered Species Act is requiring more water for endangered species. The water is coming from these water banks.

The picture is grim, but the solution is so simple that it defies common sense that it has not been implemented. There is no water shortage in California. The problem is the management of the water that the state produces. Since the early sixties there has not been a water storage facility (dam) built in this state.

THE SOLUTION IS MORE WATER STORAGE!!! A simple solution, yet unattainable for the last forty years. Very few dams have been built in California in the past forty years. The perfect example of this is the Klamath Basin. For the whole basin project to work, to satisfy every need, farmer, Indian, fish, bird, urban growth, is 100,000 acre feet of additional water in the system. There has been a plan on the books for over thirty years to create a reservoir that would have the capacity of storing up to 500,000 acre feet of water. This is five times what it would take to make the system work for every need.

The Grange needs to fulfill its obligation to the people of California and the world, and see to it that the GRANGE PROJECT is completed. Today the answer is additional water storage. The original plan was additional water storage as needed. Well, it was needed thirty years ago and not done, and today we are seeing the consequence of our inaction.

The Grange must take the lead and institute action that will result in more water storage throughout the state of California.

- WHEREAS Governments are precluded by limits on their Constitutional authority and may not take space, water and food without just compensation, and
- WHEREAS The United States Supreme Court has ruled that the few should not bear the burden of policies that benefit the people as a whole; therefore be it
- RESOLVED No Endangered Species Act recovery plan should be put into effect without the financial means and a program to pay just compensation for the loss to individuals and the private sector for the costs of feeding, watering and sheltering rare, endangered, and threatened species.

WHEREAS All Fraternal members who reach Golden Sheaf are exempt from paying dues to their subordinate Grange, although the State Grange must continue to pay dues to the National Grange on all members who have reached Golden Sheaf on or after January 1, 2001; therefore be it

RESOLVED We urge the National Grange to amend Chapter X, Code of All Granges, Section 10.11.1, Alcoholic Beverages, to read as follows: "All Granges are prohibited from having distilled spirits either in the Grange Hall or on any Grange property during any Grange meeting or Grange sponsored event; nor can any Grange lease or rent its hall or property for functions that may include the sale or use of alcoholic beverages, or any other purposes prohibited by Grange Law, except that a State Grange may allow the use of alcoholic beverages at non-Grange functions in the Grange Hall or on any Grange property by vote of the State Grange at its Annual Meeting."

04-007-H (National)

Tax Exemption for Physician-ordered Over-the Counter Drugs

Proposed by Siskiyou County Pomona #6

- WHEREAS Physicians frequently instruct patients to take medications which can be purchased "over-the-counter" (i.e: fiber substances, cal-mag, zinc, specific vitamins, etc.) and later monitor patients' use of these medications, and
- WHEREAS The cost of these medications cannot be used as an income tax deduction, and
- WHEREAS When tax deductible prescribed medications become available over-the counter, they are then no longer tax deductible; therefore be it
- RESOLVED The CSG and the National Grange urge the implementation of legislation which states that if a physician is agreeable to stating in writing that any medications, vitamins, minerals and other supplements available over-the-counter without a prescription but by doctor's orders shall be, in such situations, tax deductible.

Support Proposition 61

Proposed by Clovis-Sanger Grange #478

- WHEREAS: The California State Grange policy generally does not support bond measurers that are not self-funding; therefore be it,
- RESOLVED: that the CSG endorse legislation to fund grants to eligible children's hospitals for construction, expansion, remodeling, renovation, furnishing and equipping of children's hospitals. Twenty percent of bonds shall be available for grants to certain University of California general acute care hospitals, and eighty percent of the bonds shall be available for grants to other general acute care hospitals whose missions focus on children with illnesses such as leukemia, heart defects, sickle cell anemia and cystic fibrosis, and which meet other stated requirements.

- WHEREAS Due to the discontinuance more than twenty years ago of the open primary in California, voters in this state are not allowed choice during primary elections under the existing law, and
- WHEREAS Voters during a primary election in California are allowed to select a ballot for one of only three political parties - 1) American Independent, 2) Democratic and 3)

- Republican - unless they choose a non-partisan ballot on which no offices are listed above the local county supervisor, and
- WHEREAS In a primary election a voter is not allowed to select candidates belonging to more than one of the parties competing; therefore, be it
- RESOLVED That the CSG urge the implementation of legislation allowing the reinstatement of the open primary which would allow a California voter to vote for candidates of their choice regardless of the candidate's party affiliation.

Curtailling Riders to Legislative Bills
Proposed by Gazelle Grange #380

- WHEREAS Some solid legislative bills are defeated at the polls because the attached riders are not approved by voters and sometimes the reverse is the case. An unpopular bill when defeated may have a rider added that votes would otherwise approve; therefore be it
- RESOLVED That the California State Grange and National Grange urge the passage of the legislation prohibiting the adding of any riders to legislative bills unless such riders clearly relate to the basic legislative proposal, thus providing additional clarification.

Proposed by Gazelle Grange #380

- WHEREAS The rising cost of renting or purchasing homes or other dwelling places in California is increasingly restricting workers from residing close to their place of employment, and
- WHEREAS In some areas, home owner groups boycott low-cost housing developments, and
- WHEREAS This problem of low-cost housing is now impacting development or expansion of places of employment; therefore be it
- RESOLVED That the CSG strongly lobby on behalf of and persistently support the development of affordable low-cost housing throughout to accommodate families in need.

04-004-PP (National)

Preservation of Christmas

Proposed by Gazelle Grange #380

- WHEREAS As the name implies, Christmas is a celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ , and
WHEREAS Member of faiths other than Christianity and non-believers seek now to change Christmas to a kind of winter festival; therefore be it
RESOLVED That the CSG and National Grange establish and maintain a firm stand in support of re-affirming and maintaining every aspect that has been traditionally a part of our Christmas observance, and be it further
RESOLVED That the traditions of other faiths be undisturbed as they partake of celebrations and observances that may differ from Christianity as is set forth in the First Amendment of the Constitution of the United States of America.

04-009R - PP (National)

Adopt Low-ignition Cigarette Standards

Proposed by Lake Francis Grange #745

- WHEREAS Cigarettes cause many deaths and property damage throughout the country, and
WHEREAS Fire-safe cigarettes are "market available;" therefore be it
RESOLVED That the CSG and National Grange urge our legislators to implement such laws as are necessary to adopt low-ignition cigarettes.

04-015 - PP (National)

Banker Take-over Attempt

Proposed by Little Lake Grange #670

- WHEREAS The American Banker Association is instituting an all out aggressive campaign to have non-profit status removed from Credit Unions, placing them in a taxable status, and
WHEREAS Credit Unions were established in rural areas because bankers were practicing unfair preferential treatment (Red Zoning) leaving many areas out, and
WHEREAS The financial risks and responsibilities were not studied by the Banking Organizations until Credit Unions became a "threat"; therefore be it
RESOLVED That the State Grange urge our State Legislators to continue to treat Credit Unions as non-profit organizations, and be it further
RESOLVED That the California State Grange urge the National Grange to insist likewise from our U.S. Legislators.

The Fiscal Payback

Proposed by Little Lake Grange #670

NOTE 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The California State Grange (the Grange) was incorporated on October 7, 1946 under the laws of the State of California as a nonprofit corporation. The Grange is subject to and governed by the constitution of the National Grange. The Grange is a fraternal, family, and community service organization seeking to preserve agricultural heritage and traditions.

Basis of Accounting: The financial statements of California State Grange have been prepared on the accrual basis and accordingly reflect all significant receivables, payables and other liabilities.

Basis of Presentation: Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations. Under SFAS No. 117, the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets and permanently restricted net assets.

Fund Accounting: To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Grange, the accounts of the Grange are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes to funds established according to their nature and purpose. Separate bank accounts are not maintained for each fund. The following is a brief summary of each funds' activity and purpose:

General Fund: Accounts for all transactions of the Grange not accounted for in the other funds. The funds are unrestricted, however, unrestricted funds are used to pay expenses of the restricted funds and a due to/due from is recorded in both the general fund and respective restricted fund.

Deaf Activities Fund: Provides resources for Grange members to act as advocates for deaf and hard of hearing people; promoting deaf awareness (education about deafness, hearing and the need for hearing protection); affording leadership for county, local and Junior Granges; providing community service to organizations benefiting the deaf; donating time, efforts, skill, equipment and funds to better fulfill the needs of the deaf community. Funds are donated and occasional fundraisers are held. Donations are disbursed through a separate entity, the California Grange Foundation. The Deaf Activities Fund Committee expenses are paid through the Deaf Activities Fund.

Extension / Membership Development Fund: Provides resources for the internal and external promotion of the Grange and for education of members about the Grange. Income sources include donations from affiliates. Expenditures include tokens of appreciation, promotional prizes, Officer/Deputies supplies, and membership director expenses. The fund is also holding Emergency Relief Effort donations received by the Grange.

Convention Fund: This fund was created so an accurate accounting could be made of the Convention income and expenses. The Convention is the annual policy making session where representatives from each Grange statewide attend. The delegates provide resolutions for the good of their community, county, state and nation. These funds are unrestricted.

Rental Fund: This fund was created to account for properties owned by the State Grange that are leased to provide additional income. These funds are unrestricted.

Grange News Fund: This fund was created to account for the properties of the official publication of the California State Grange. It is issued bimonthly, providing an information link to the 30,000 plus members statewide. These funds are unrestricted.

Youth Fund: Provides resources for activities oriented towards younger members. Income sources include donations, conference fees and resale proceeds. Expenditures include conferences, director expenses, youth and young adult officers and ambassadors expenses, meetings, camp, coordinating council and fundraisers. These funds are restricted for these purposes.

Conference Center Fund: Provides resources for the promotion of camp and conference facilities. Funds are being collected to build or purchase grounds/complex for a combined center for conferences, camps and conventions. These funds are restricted for this purpose.

Junior Grange: Provides resources for activities oriented toward children ages 5 through 14. The fund sponsors programs for children to become involved in community activities, fair programs, and learning situations all involved with the Grange. "Junior Granges" are independent though affiliated with a Subordinate Grange. These funds are restricted for this purpose.

Grange Women's Activities Fund (GWA): Provides resources for activities oriented to-wards female members. The programs of the GWA give women opportunities to participate in community services, and educate others in many ways. Income is derived from the sale of cookbooks Expenditures include directors expenses to plan programs, organize contests and sponsor events. These funds are restricted for this purpose.

Grange Youth Fair Program: Enables Junior Grangers and Grange Youth members, ages 5 through 22, the opportunity to display their talents at local, county, and state fairs. These funds are restricted for this purpose.

Grangers Business Organization: Established for the purpose of holding proceeds, from the sale of the dissolution of the former Grangers Business Organization. These funds are restricted for this purpose.

Office Contingency: Established to provide emergency funds for the Grange to cover un-foreseen events. These funds are restricted for this purpose.

Grange Hall Loan Fund: Established to loan funds to local Granges to assist in their development or improvement of Grange Halls. These funds are restricted for this purpose.

Capitalization and Depreciation Policy: All expenditures for land, buildings and equipment and the fair market value of donated land, buildings, and equipment are capitalized. These assets are stated at cost or fair market value, if donated. The cost of repairs and maintenance are charged to an expense account as incurred. Significant renewals and

replacements are capitalized. Depreciation is computed by the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the related assets:

Inventory: The inventory consists of cookbooks, various publications, jewelry, and supplies and is valued at cost on the first-in, first-out method.

Statement of Cash Flows: The Grange considers all highly liquid debt instruments purchased with a maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents. The Grange had no cash equivalents at December 31, 2003.

Donated Services: A substantial number of unpaid volunteers have made significant contributions of their time in conjunction with the Grange programs and services. The value of the contributed time is not included in these financial statements, since it is not susceptible to objective measurement.

Income Taxes: The Grange is a corporation exempt from federal income taxes under Internal Revenue Code section 501(c)(8) and is exempt from state income taxes under California Revenue and Taxation Code Section 23701(1). The Grange may be subject to income taxes on unrelated advertising and membership list revenue over related expenses. No provision for income taxes is made in the accompanying financial statements.

NOTE 2 - Trust Fund Assets

The By-Laws of the National Grange stipulate that proceeds from the sale of real property belonging to a Subordinate or Pomona Grange shall be transferred to the State Grange having jurisdiction to be restricted and held in trust for said Subordinate or Pomona Grange. All income derived from such Trust shall be the property of the selling Subordinate or Pomona Grange. The State Grange may be paid up to 5% of the earned income as a trustee's fee for administering the Trust. During the period ending December 31, 2003, the Grange earned \$2,097 in administration fees.

Funds received from discontinued or dormant Granges, are held in trust by the Grange for the benefit of the inactive Granges in the event said Grange is reorganized. The by-laws provide that such funds revert to the State Grange after seven years. The Grange is entitled to 100% of the income during this seven-year period.

The Trust Assets are restricted for the beneficial use of each respective surrendered charter or active grange, respectively.

NOTE 5 - Compensated Absences

Employees of the Grange are entitled to paid vacation and sick leave depending on job classification, length of service and other factors. At December 31, 2003 the accrued expense for compensated absences was \$6,968. The maximum amount of vacation that can be accumulated is 40 hours. Sick days accumulate, but are forfeited when employees leave the Grange. The maximum amount of sick leave that can be accumulated is 720 hours.

NOTE 6 - Pension Plan

The Grange adopted a defined contribution pension plan covering all full-time employees after completion of any hours of continuous service. Employees must be employed for three months to be eligible for the plan. This plan is fully funded by the Grange which contributes 5% of gross wages towards the purchase of an annuity for the benefit of the employee. All employees qualify for 100% vesting. Contributions for 2003 totaled \$5,286

NOTE 7 - Operating Lease

The Grange is obligated under a long-term operating lease for its mailing system, its phone system, its folding machine and its collator system. The leases have an original term of sixty months expiring July 30, 2006, December 31, 2007, and December 31, 2008 respectively. The payments under the leases are \$1211.28, \$258.66, \$331.77 and \$351.27 respectively. The balance of the lease commitment is as follows:

NOTE 1 - Significant Accounting Policies**Purpose**

The California State Grange has created an informal trust to hold and administer funds that belong to active Granges and funds resulting from the surrender of Grange Charters. All funds in the asset management account are restricted and must be administered in accordance with the National Grange By-Laws.

Basis of Accounting : The financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and accordingly reflect all significant receivables, payables and other liabilities.

Statement of Cash Flows: The Trust considers all cash on demand and certificates of deposit accounts to be cash and cash equivalents.

Asset Restriction: As disclosed in Notes 2 and 3, the assets of the Asset Management Account are restricted for the beneficial use of each respective Surrendered Charter or Active Grange, respectively.

NOTE 2 - Surrendered Charters:

Funds received from discontinued or dormant Granges are restricted and held in trust for the benefit of the inactive Granges in the event said Grange is reorganized. The by-laws require such funds to revert to the California State Grange after seven years. The California State Grange is entitled to 100% of the investment income during this seven year period. These funds are reported as both an asset and a liability on the financial statements of the California State Grange as restricted funds.

NOTE 3 - Active Granges:

The By-Laws of the National Grange stipulate that proceeds from the sale of real property belonging to an active Subordinate or Pomona Grange shall be transferred to the State Grange having jurisdiction to be restricted and held in trust for said Subordinate or Pomona Grange. All earned income derived from such funds shall be the property of the selling Subordinate or Pomona Grange.

The Organization has concentrated its credit risk for cash by maintaining deposits in banks located within the same geographic region. The maximum loss that would have resulted from that risk totaled \$6,827 at the end of 2003 for the excess of the deposit liabilities reported by the banks over the amounts that would have been covered by federal insurance.

NOTE 7 - Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Notes to Financial Statement

NOTE 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The California Grange Foundation was created as a nonprofit corporation. The purposes of the corporation are to provide educational activities to the public concerning the preservation of the agricultural heritage and traditions of California and of America, through publications, workshops, assisting in research, and to provide educational assistance in the form of scholarships. The California Grange Foundation is affiliated with the California State Grange.

Basis of Accounting: The financial statements of the California Grange Foundation have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and accordingly reflect all significant receivables, payables and other liabilities.

Investments: The Foundation adopted SFAS No. 124, "Accounting for Certain Investments Held by Not-For-Profit Organizations," in 1996. Under SFAS No. 124, investments in marketable securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are valued at their fair values in the statement of financial position. Unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets.

Basis of Presentation: Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations. Under SFAS No. 117, the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets.

Fund Accounting: To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available

to the Foundation, the accounts of the Foundation are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified according to their nature and purpose. Separate bank accounts are not maintained for each fund. The following is a brief summary of each funds' activities and purpose:

General Fund: Accounts for all transactions of the Foundation not accounted for in other funds. These funds are not restricted.

Youth Fund: Accounts for Youth activity transactions of the Foundation not accounted for in other funds. These funds are not restricted.

Junior Fund: Accounts for Junior Activity transactions of the Foundation not accounted for in other funds. These funds are not restricted.

Deaf Activities Fund: A health project designed to educate and serve deaf and hard of hearing people. These funds are restricted.

Sehlmeyer Fund: Established for the purpose of aiding, through college scholarships, the education of the Grangers. These funds are restricted.

Doris Deaver Fund: Established for the purpose of aiding, through college scholarships, the education of Grangers. These funds are restricted.

Dixon Fund: Established for the purpose of aiding through college scholarships, the education of children. These funds are restricted.

Runyon Fund: Established for the purpose of aiding through college scholarships, the education of children. These funds are restricted.

Marinoff Fund: Established for the purpose of aiding through college scholarships, the education of children. These funds are restricted.

George Dupray Fund: Established for the purpose of aiding through college scholarships, the education of children interested in legislative issues. These funds are restricted.

FFA Building Fund: Established for the purpose of building an FFA building for the children involved in the fair programs.

Donated Services: Volunteers have made contributions of their time in conjunction with Foundation functions. The value of the contributed time is not included in these financial statements, since it is not susceptible to objective measurement.

Statement of Cash Flows: The Foundation considers all highly liquid debt instruments purchased with a maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents. At December 31, 2003, the Foundation had no cash equivalents.

Income Taxes: The Foundation is a corporation exempt from federal income taxes under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3) and is exempt from state income taxes under California Revenue and Taxation Code Section 23701(g). No provision for income taxes has been made in the accompanying financial statements.

NOTE 2 - Investments – Morgan Stanley

Investments – Morgan Stanley are stated at market value. On February 28, 2000, \$35,000 was invested in Lehman Brothers Bank FSB Wilmington, Delaware. The certificate will mature July 19, 2004. At December 31, 2003, the cost and market value of the funds were as follows:

NOTE 3 - Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

NOTE 4 - USDA Grant

The Foundation obtained a USDA grant to assist a subordinate grange to make needed repairs to their grange hall. This is a reimbursement grant, whereby as costs are incurred, the Foundation pays the invoices and prepares a monthly reconciliation which is sent to the USDA along with the invoices for reimbursement.
