Fifty-seventh Annual Session of

California State Grange

FIRST DAY-TUESDAY

Conforming to the provisions of the Constitution and By-Laws, Article IV, the State Grange of California assembled for its 57th annual session. The meeting was held in Redding in Moose Hall, and was called to order at 10:30 A. M., October 15, 1929, by Worthy Master George R. Harrison, who then proceeded to open the Grange in regular form in the Sixth Degree.

Past Master E. T. Pettit was called to the Chair.

The officers were seated in form. The flag service was given, Sister Alice Harrison of Sebastopol Grange acting as standard bearer, and the members singing "The Star Spangled Banner."

Brother and Sister Roy I. Church of Two Rock Grange assisted the Assistant Stewards in proving the members in the annual word.

The Worthy Chaplain invoked Divine blessing on the deliberations of this session.

Song, "Bringing in the Sheaves."

The Roll Call of Granges found a quorum present, delegates from the following Granges responding to roll call: Pomona

Grange was closed in the Sixth Degree and opened in the Fourth Degree.

The Assistant Stewards, assisted by Brother and Sister Roy I. Church, escorted the new delegates into the hall and seated them.

The Worthy Master extended a welcome to the assembled delegates and visitors.

Brother E. T. Pettit, Past Master, arose and feelingly spoke of the death of Past State Master and member of the Executive Committee, Frank L. Hunt. The Worthy Master called upon the members to rise and stand in reverant silence a moment as a token of respect and to the memory of our departed brother and friend.

The Worthy Master requested the Assistant Stewards to conduct Brother E. T. Pettit, Past Master of this State Grange, to his station; in like manner Brother Joseph Holmes, Past Master, was conducted to the Worthy Master. The Worthy Master extended the Past Masters a hearty welcome to this 57th annual session, and with a neat and appropriate speech, presented Brother E. T. Pettit and Brother Joseph Holmes, on behalf of the State Grange of California, with Past Master's jewels.

Brothers Pettit and Holmes expressed their pleasure at being present at this session, and thanked the members for this recognition of their standing in the Order as Past State Masters.

Brother H. G. Hecke, Director of Agriculture in California, and Brother Ralph H. Taylor, Executive Secretary of the

Agricultural Legislative Committee, were presented to the Master; they were welcomed and presented to the members.

Recess was declared until 1:30 P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Grange was rapped to order at 1:30 P. M.

The Chair appointed Brother and Sister George Stice of Rutherford Grange as assistants to the Assistant Stewards for the session.

The A. W. was taken up, and the Grange declared open

in the Fourth Degree.

Brother H. G. Hecke, Director of Agriculture, addressed the Grange, telling of the efficiency of the Agricultural Department, and the problems confronting the Quarantine officers.

Brother Craig, chairman of the committee on Order of Business, submitted a partial report. The report was accepted. Past Master E. T. Pettit was requested to take the Chair.

Brother Pettit then called upon the Worthy Master who proceeded to read his annual report, as follows:

MASTER'S REPORT

To the Officers and Members of California State Grange:

The city of Redding is entertaining this week, for the first time in its history, the California State Grange. Eight years ago, we of the south passed through, and many of us stayed over night here in Redding, on our way to Yreka, the capital of Siskiyou County, for the Forty-ninth Annual Session of the State Grange.

At that time Siskiyou County was the only Grange County north of Sacramento County. What a change has been made in our Grange map since that time! Modoc County has come in with her fine Pomona and eight splendid Subordinate Granges. Then Shasta County with five up-to-date Subordinates. Then Glenn County joined out Grange family with four Subordinates. Nearly all of these came in as the result of the efforts of our Worthy Overseer, Brother H. A. Craig. Then Lassen County joined us with a fine Pomona and five Subordinates. Then Plumas, on the west, came in with two good working Granges. We have also added Yolo and Yuba to our Grange map north of Sacramento. Also Oakdale on the south, and many Granges in other counties.

I know we are going to have a splendid session because the good Patrons of Shasta County and the people of Redding say we are.

Redding is not as great an agricultural center as some other cities, but it is one of the up and coming cities of this Golden State. For many years this was the northern terminal of the Southern Pacific Railroad, and all supplies for as far north as the Oregon line were teamed out of here. The great copper mines just north of here were for many years a great asset.

Condition of Agriculture

No question is attracting more attention today than that of the condition of agriculture, and it is quite natural that it should. Since the beginning of history agriculture haw never been out of the minds of the people, as all, rich or poor, high or low estate, look to the brown soil for sustenance, and no life or calling, occupation or profession, precedes the tilling of the soil. It is a matter of regret that the youth of our land is taking so little interest in agriculture, but, on the other hand, is looking to the cities for employment.

We of the soil must do our utmost to make the rural homes so pleasant and attractive that more of our young folk will want to stay on the farm. Also we should see that agriculture has a more prominent place in our school work. I am very much in favor of, and believe we should encourage in every possible way 4-H Club work. I would like to see this organization in some way sponsor this work.

I firmly believe that the farmers of California are today enjoying greater prosperity than for several years past, as everything produced is bringing much better prices than one year ago. Especially is this true of the fruit and poultry industries.

I believe the new Federal Farm Board has been and will be of great help to agriculture. The people of California are to be congratulated: first, because we have in this state a big man like Mr. C. C. Teague; second, because President Hoover knew and realized that he was the biggest man in California agriculture, which is the reason he was selected.

California has been favored in having for Director of Agriculture a man like Brother Geo. H. Hecke, together with his valued staff of helpers. With a rigid quarantine under their

direction we have been able to keep this state free of many fruit and other pests, which otherwise we might not have done.

The State Market Director has been and is of inestimable value to the farmer. Market reports are broadcasted three times a day. By this means the farmer has accurate and timely information and can govern his sales accordingly.

I am a firm believer in farm co-operative marketing associations, and, if honestly and properly administered, they can

and will be of great benefit to agriculture.

I am opposed to the spending of State or Federal money for developing the Columbia Basin, or on any similar projects intended to increase agricultural production which comes into direct competition with what is already grown, in many cases at a loss to the producer. Until such time as there is need for increased production, I hope this State Grange will, as in former years, take a definite stand on this question, for we do not need increased production, but better distribution, as well as reduction in handling costs, both by the railroads and at terminals, where the handling charges are well nigh prohibitive to the grower.

The growers of fruits and vegetables will be greatly benefited when we can have our state-owned pre-cooling and refrigeration plant on San Francisco Bay, which we should have at an early date. This is something all of the farm or-

ganizations supported.

One of the very serious questions before California farmers today is the labor problem. With thousands of our young men leaving the farms for the cities, a scarcity of labor for farm use is created. In some parts of the state the situation is quite acute, the farmer having to depend on labor from Mexico, on the black man from the South or from Porto Rico, or on the Filipino, as some of our work is such that the white man cannot perform it, or in many cases will not, leaving us no other alternative.

Banking

For the last few years the question of branch banking has been before this State Grange, as well as before the National Grange. One year ago I stated that it was difficult to find a locally owned home-town bank of any size in rural California. Today that condition has not changed. What the agricultural people want and need is a banker who knows their condition and needs, and is in sympathy with agricultural

problems, just as the old family doctor knows his people. Branch banking is a cold-blooded proposition, with too much rep tape and delay. Give us again the good old-time community bank.

Co-Operation

California is unique in that for the last several years it has had its three farm organizations, namely, the Grange, Farm Bureau, Farmers' Union, together with the Agricultural Legislative Committee and the California Development Association, or State Chamber of Commerce, all united and working to the end that agriculture may be benefited. Before and during the last session of the Legislature all the farm organizations often met and discussed legislation, and were practically united on a legislative program; and nearly every measure they endorsed passed both Houses and was signed by the Governor. They were also just as active in defeating or amending many vicious bills. I think much credit should be given our farm organizations for the very harmonious way in which they work together.

The farmers of California should appreciate the very valuable work and tireless efforts of Brother Ralph H. Taylor, Executive Secretary of the Agricultural Legislative Committee, in behalf of agriculture at all times, but especially during the last three sessions of the Legislature. I sincerely hope this State Grange so expresses itself.

KQW, The Farmers' Friend

Too much credit cannot be given to Brother Fred J. Hart, manager of this splendid radio station; also for the splendid work he is doing in broadcasting agricultural news such as market reports and other valuable farm information. I am asking this body of farmers in some way to voice our appreciation of his efforts and the good work he has done.

Taxation

The tax problem is an age-old one. Sacred history records that at the time of the birth of Christ the people had gathered at Jerusalem to be taxed as was the custom of that day. This problem has come down through the many centuries, and with each century taxes have apparently increased, but never with such rapidity as during the last decade; especially the last three years; and with our Governor and

State legislators trying to create more Boards and Commissions, and increasing salaries for themselves, is it any wonder that our taxes are soaring? It has been well and wisely said that despite Governor Young's loudly proclaimed "reorganization" of the State government, we have more bureaus, boards, commissions and "what not's" than we ever had; and that these bureaus, boards and commission have more power than they ever had-power to regulate and to tax the citizens of this state almost without limit. Instead of giving us reorganization with consolidations and eliminations, Governor Young has given us reorganization WITH EXPANSION. Instead of consolidating state agencies in the various departments, he has increased the number of agencies in many of the departments. During the last two Legislatures much restrictive regulative and tax-increasing legislation has been enacted. Some of these measures take from the people the power that was once theirs and places it with boards, bureaus and commissions to tax as they see fit. If it had not been for Brother Ralph H. Taylor and others watching and ever on their guard, much more legislation of this nature would have been put over.

There is one thing sure, and that is, there must be a lessening of taxes or the producer must receive more money net for what he produces. The spread has long been too narrow.

Condition of the Order

One year ago I reported twelve new Granges organized. I might just as well have said ten new Grances, because two of those organized never did anything at all. One held not more than three meetings, and the other not more than two. Last fall I sent Brother Clendening into southern San Joaquin County to try to revive them, but after a fair trial he gave it up as a hopeless case. During the year we have organized one fine Grange at Quincy, Plumas County; another at Elk Creek, Glenn County. Mrs. Harrison and I have organized two fine Pomonas. With the assistance of Brother Van Allen we organized Lassen-Plumas County Pomona, and with the assistance of Brother Tingley we organized Glenn County Pomona.

During the summer Brother Clendening went into Humboldt County and tried to interest the farmers of that county. I had for some time felt that as Humboldt County was largely

an agricultural county they should have a Grange, but after he had tried it for some time he decided the time was not ripe for a Grange. I believe that he has sown some good Grange seed there, and some day we will get the result of his work.

The Grange in California today occupies a prominent and enviable position in the business and commercial life of this state, and this most be retained.

I am pleased to report that there is a growing desire on the part of officers not only to learn their various parts in the opening and closing ceremonies, but to memorize their charges in the degree work. This always makes the work more impressive to the candidate.

I wish I could impress Masters with the importance of and the benefits derived from opening their Granges promptly on time, instead of coming and opening Grange any old time. Many of our most progressive Granges have a set time for opening their meetings. They seldom vary more than five minutes from that time, and they usually have their members, there at the sound of the gavel. All Granges could just as well do this, as there is very little difference in the amount of work done in the various communities. Not to do so is just a slack way of doing Grange work.

One matter of deep regret is that so few of our Subordinate Granges take any interest whatever in Juvenile Grange work in an effort to help them. I realize that it is quite a task to keep them interested, but what grander work can one do to help the children to become useful men and women?

Patrons, I wish you would give this some careful thought.

Our Roads

Many of us hoped that when the gasoline tax was raised to three cents it would furnish funds to build good roads as fast as they could economically be built. But we still have the same old crowd wanting to vote bonds and organize road and bridge districts without any limit to the amount of the bonds. What we need is not more money to build roads, but a more economical use of the funds we already have. What the farmer would like to see is less surveying and more actual road-building. There is far too much money used for other than regular road construction.

Schools

We are pleased to note, according to the press, that some Boards of Education have refused to employ women teachers who smoke. This is a move in the right direction. I am a firm believer in having for the young teachers who set a good example. What can be more disgusting to parents than to know that the teacher of their young children—a woman calling herself a lady—is smoking cigarettes? Such teachers are not fit persons to have a place in our schools. I certainly hope this State Grange places itself squarely on record as against this growing curse in our fair State and Nation.

Grange Fraternal Fire Insurance

I wish this year, as in former years, to call your attention to one matter, as I believe our members are not aware of the benefits derived from it. I refer to our Grange Fire Insurance. This is something on which every member who is a home owner can save each year many times his dues to the Grange. This is insurance that is 100 per cent Grange owned and operated, which more of our members should take advantage of and encourage in every way possible.

Law Enforcement

For many years this State Grange, as well as the National Grange, has taken a very definite stand favoring law enforcement, not as regards one particular law, but all laws.

It is distressing to hear so many people, yes, and to have our daily papers, denouncing law enforcement officers, who do their duty as applied to the 18th Amendment. Is it any wonder that it is so hard to enforce our laws when we have such people and the public press saying and doing things to discourage the officers and to retard the work that is being done along that line? I hope and trust that this State Grange will again reaffirm its position of many years as favoring law enforcement.

County and District Fairs

It is a pleasure to report the interest which the Granges throughout the state are taking in County and District Fairs and Apple Shows. I wish I might speak of each individual one, but space forbids. One, however, I wish especially to speak about, and that one is Mount Lassen Grange at Cotton-wood, Shasta County. While it was in part an agricultural exhibit, it was also an educational exhibit along Grange lines, showing what the Grange is, what it can do, and some of the things it stands for.

Collective Balloting

At a recent session of the National Grange the Digest was changed to admit of collective balloting on candidates, this to be approved by each State Grange. I hope this State Grange will so amend our By-Laws as to admit of collective balloting.

In Memory

This year, as in past years, we will pause in our labors and let our minds go back to the days when some of our Brothers and Sisters were with us, but who have now passed to their reward. The Master of the Great Grange above has called many since we last met. Our official family circle has been broken. The oldest member of our Executive Committee and the Junior Past Master of the California State Grange, Brother Frank L. Hunt, has been taken. We shall miss them all at this session. We bow in humble submission to Him who doeth all things well. At some time set apart by the Chaplain and the Memorial Committee, we will rest from our labors and pay tribute to their memory.

In Conclusion

We are now commencing the Fifty-Seventh Annual Session of this State Grange. Delegates have assembled here all the way from Siskiyou to Tulare. They have come to help make this meeting a success and to take home with them a renewed desire for more and better work.

Remember that because of the splendid reputation the Grange has as a careful, conservative body, the eyes of the agricultural and commercial life of this great State are looking to us for an example.

The meeting is now in your hands. Use it wisely and well.

Secretary's Report

To the Officers and Members of the State Grange of California, this report of the Secretary's office for the year ending September 30, 1929, is respectfully submitted:

There are now eighty-two Subordinate and ten Pomona Granges in this state. We have added two Subordinate and two Pomona Granges to our list this year; Feather River was organized by Deputy Van Allen with forty-four charter members, and Elk Creek Grange, with thirty-four charter members was organized by Deputy B. R. Tingley, who also organized Glenn Pomona Grange with 74 members. The other Pomona, Lassen-Plumas, was organized by our Worthy State Master, George R. Harrison, with 92 members.

We regret that we have been compelled to write three Subordinate Granges off our roll, viz: Eastern Yuba, South

San Joaquin and Ripon.

As a number of granges have not yet reported for the last quarter, we can give only an approximate tally of members,—8348 in the Subordinate Granges and 2508 in the Pomona Granges. There are thirty-four Subordinate Granges having over one hundred members, while only six Granges have fewer than fifty members. The largest Pomona is Santa Clara with 477 members, and the largest Subordinate is Napa with 354 members.

San Jose, Santa Rosa, Petaluma, Potter Valley, Mt. Bolivar, Napa, Geyserville, Redwood Valley, Beswick, Progressive, Davis Creek, Eagle, Ukiah, McArthur, Fall River, Hallwood, Orland, Standish, Johnstonville and Indian Valley Granges made a net gain in membership. Standish more than doubled, increasing from 48 to 104; and Indian Valley nearly doubled its membership, increasing from 40 to 77.

We earnestly request the delegates to urge their Secretaries to be prompt in sending in a list of new officers, immediately after election, to the State Secretary. This will assist greatly in printing the Roster for 1930 at the proper time which should be early in January. Do not wait until the officers are installed, but if any changes occur before installation, notify the State Office at once.

Report of Deputy H. A. Craig

To the Officers and Members of California State Grange: In making a report of my last years' work as District and National Deputy, I can state I have not been out in the field doing active Grange work.

I have been unusually busy with my home and ranch

work adding improvements and conveniences.

I visited all the Granges in Siskiyou County that the State Master and his wife did not visit while here. I also visited several Granges with them.

But two Granges asked to be inspected and these have

a very creditable score.

I did not know until too late that the State Master had not inspected the various Granges in Siskiyou County while making his annual visit. I am very sorry that this happened.

In summing up my work as a Deputy, I can say in the few years that I have been performing this pleasant duty, I wish to make mention of several facts that seem to be outstanding.

As you well know my work has been largely in new fields, in Counties where there were no Granges, and every one I met was a perfect stranger. Before I left these Counties, I had made countless numbers of friends (and Grangers) who in turn alded me by passing the good work along.

We have evidence of this good work in our State Grange (both last year and this year) by the splendid work of the Pomona Degree Team, (coming all the way from Modoc County at their own expense) to initiate the Pomona Class for the State Grange, with much credit to themselves and the State Grange.

Modoc is the first Grange County I organized. There are other new Grange Counties starting out as well as did Modoc County.

When I think of having organized 27 Granges with nearly 1800 Charter members, (saying nothing about the Granges organized by others) and seeing the good work being done by these 1800 members added to the work of all the other Grangers in the State, I realize that the Grange in this Great State of California is a power for good.

Report of Deputy E. K. Clendening

To the Officers and Members of California State Grange: In submitting my report, I am of the belief that you will agree that the result of my efforts towards new organization work has been very disappointing.

My first call was to San Joaquin County to try and revive the interest of the members of two new Granges organized during last year. These Granges became dorman soon after the organizations were completed. Four or five days were spent in calling on the members and trying to get them to attend a meeting, but I found it impossible to rekindle any desire to continue the work. Too mixed a population, and too many creeds made the task a hopeless one.

Efforts were also made during the year at the following places:

Escalon and Modesto in Stanislaus County, Willows, Glenn County, and Arcata and Fortuna in Humboldt County. These places were selected and suggested to me because the Farm Bureau work had broken down. Probably the work was started a little too soon. The failure of the Bureau work to hold their interest was too fresh in their memory, and almost every one whom I called upon was very positive in their belief that any attempt to unite again would prove a failure. Former leaders did not take kindly to the prospect of organizing under a different banner; also in all these places was the

difficulty of a large foreign population opposed to secrets and obligations.

I think that every Deputy engaged in organization work will agree that the past year has offered but little encouragement for new Grange growth. With but two Granges to our credit, the enthusiastic member who knows but little of the desire of those who make up our farm population in adjoining counties will find dissatisfaction in the reports presented. Let me remind you that the past year has been unsatisfactory to nearly all fraternal organizations. My experinence has been that fewer new members have been secured and attendance has fallen off.

Among our oldest organizations are the various churches. Reports recently published stated that thirty per cent of the churches did not take in a single new member during the year. A comparison with other organizations will show that we have done remarkably well. We are living in a time when people find a wide choice of amusement and most of us have become very exacting in our desires. The Grange that does not try to balance its program and offer something of material value, will fail to hold the interest of many of its members. I believe that most of our Grange leaders are fully aware of this new condition, and are earnestly striving to meet it.

In closing my report I want to point out one or two things which I believe are destructive to the best interests of the order: Petty jealousy towards those who hold office by a few who apparently try to make the position as uncomfortable as possible. Leaders become discouraged and initiative destroyed. Also, unethical methods in securing business in competing with other organizations doing a similar line of work. This has been called to my attention a number of times during the year. This should be stopped, for if allowed to continue, it will destroy the good feeling that has existed by the several leaders of Farm Organizations.

I want to express the pleasure that has been mine in serving the Grange under the direction of the two men who appointed me to the office of deputy, Past Master Frank L. Hunt, now deceased, and Brother Harrison, our present Master. It will always be a pleasant memory to me that I had the opportunity during the twelve years that I have filled the office of County, State, and National Deputy to know these men so well. Not a single discord has arisen during these years to mar the happiness I have felt. I

also want to thank the Executive Committee and the members of the Grange for the many courtesies shown me.

As your Deputy for Lassen, Modoc, and Plumas counties, I take pleasure in making the following report of the Grange work in my district for this year, 1929. After the State Grange Session last year, I took up the question of organizing a Pomona Grange, with the Lassen and Plumas county Granges. Of the six Granges, all but two voted it down, feeling that they did not need another county-wide organization, but this spring I went after them again. They had had time to think it over, with the result that on May 9, Worthy Master Harrison organized Lassen-Plumas, Pomona Grange No. 11, with a charter membership of 92. This Pomona has held two meetings since the organization one in Lassen County and the last in Plumas County. At this meeting the officers exemplified the fifth degree to a class of 15 candidates, in good shape without the use of the manual.

After working four days, I organized Feather River Grange, No. 440, at Quincy, California, on June 21, with 41 charter members. The Grange will need your help and protection as they are holding meetings in the county seat, and a certain class does not want them to grow. Those on the outside are knocking them. You know what that means. I have done my duty by organizing them. Now it is your duty, as members of the Great State Grange, to assist them and see that they do not die of neglect. Do you plant a tree among stones and foul weeds, then leave it to die? No. You cultivate it, irrigate it, you fumigate it; then you prune it; then you expect some fruit. So, with a Baby Grange, do not expect the deputy to do your work.

Some have said, "Better not organize a Grange if it is going to die." I say, "How do you or any one know that a Grange is going to live until it is organized?"

Do you know that a tree will live until you plant it? No. This, Brothers and Sisters is your responsibility. These new Granges require two things—help and protection, and work to do. Keep them busy. I know Granges that are dying for the want of work. All the older Granges in the district are doing as well as could be expected. I have visited all except three of the fifteen Granges. These three, the Worthy Master visited.

Around the roaring fireplace plans were made for another series of traveling gavel meetings which proved so successful

I have visited during the year all the Granges in my territory and have held myself in readiness at all times to do any thing in my power to advance the interests of our Fraternity. Patrons, the rapidly changing economic conditions the federal plan for farm relief and the absolute necessity of placing farming on a par with other industries makes organization among the farmers more emphatic than ever

before.

Are we California Patrons diligently cultivating the fields in our care? Are we making a gain in membership commensurate with the need for organization in this great agricultural state?

When we take cognizance of our limited members, and survey the immense field for labor does not a great desire possess the heart of every true Patron that some power be made manifest, some influence be brought to bear, some policy proclaimed, some activity be inaugurated that will place the Grange in California in the high position to which its attainments entitle it.

Shall we be content with our present progress and mem-

bership and with placid complaisance sit supinely by while other farm organizations fill the place we should occupy.

There is a great work for this State Grange to do, a work that will call for the best efforts, not only from those in high places, but from every member of the order.

I have faith to believe that in good time this work will be accomplished to this end, brothers and sisters, let us labor with cheerfulness, and persevere in all good works.

On motion of Brother Sehlmeyer, seconded by Brother Stewart, the Executive Committee was instructed to have enough copies of such resolutions as might be introduced, mimeographed, to furnish the delegates from each Grange with a copy.

Introduction of resolutions without debate was next in order. The following were presented: From Modoc Pomona Grange:

1. One relating to levying a special tax of one cent a week upon the membership of Subordinate Granges, for the purpose of creating a special fund to be used in instituting and carrying on such cooperative work with other farm cooperatives, and in securing necessary special information which may be needed in the work. Referred to the committee on Constitution and By-laws.

One relating to the taxation of timber lands. Referred to the committee on Conservation.

3. One demanding that agriculture be adequately protected against foreign importations which are being sold in home markets, and are replacing home products. Referred to the Legislative Committee.

4. One urging that the granting of water rights to any hydro-electric company be withheld, etc. Referred to the committee on Conservation.

Introduced by Mark T. Hunt:

1. One deploring the action of power companies in regard

to fish. Referred to the committee on Legislation.

From Santa Clara Pomona Grange:

1. One relating to the appointment of a committee of five to work out a uniform plan of floor work for Subordinate and Pomona Granges of this State. Referred to the committee on Good of the Order.

A recess was declared to admit a non-member to address

the Grange.

Mr. Harry B. Ogle, Chief Executive of the Boy Scouts of America, appeared before the meeting to tell of what the organization was trying to do for the youths of America.

Grange was again called to order and the introduction of

resolutions without debate resumed.

From Sonoma Pomona Grange:

1. One relating to the taxes paid by banks. Referred to the committee on Taxation.

From Petaluma Grange:

1. One relating to ineligible aliens. Referred to the committee on Legislation.

From Windsor Grange:

1. One relating to the sites of State Parks. Referred to the committee on Good of the Order.

From Bennett Valley Grange:

1. One appointing a committee to confer with the Meat Packing Companies, etc. Referred to the Agricultural Committee.

From Mt. Lassen Grange:

1. One relating to water for irrigation purposes. Referred to the committee on Conservation.

The Secretary read two letters from the Growers Tariff League. They were referred to the committee on Resolutions.

Brother Ralph Taylor read the report of the Legislative Committee during the year as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATION TO THE FIFTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE CALIFORNIA STATE GRANGE

To the Officers and Members:

During the past year your committee did all within its power to assist in securing for the farmers of this state both the enactment of statute law by the 48th session of the California State Legislature and the promulgation of rulings by our regulatory commissions of the state which would more nearly place agriculture upon an economic parity with other industries and commerce. Largely these activities were necessarily carried on in conjunction with The Agricultural Legislative Committee and the other state-wide farm organizations. On the whole, California's farmers may well feel proud not only of their legislative accomplishments but of the splendid position which they occupy in the estimation of all of the other organized groups who are actively engaged in promoting their ideas as to what would be to the welfare of the state.

The Grange plan for "FEDERAL" reapportionment as applied to our state legislative districts was enacted into law as Proposal No. 1 upon the ballot at the general election last November with a majority of over 130,000, notwithstanding the fact that over 60 per cent of the registered vote of the state lay within the three city counties of Alameda, Los Angeles, and San Francisco. While the chairman of your committee served as executive secretary in this campaign, the splendid cooperation of all of the farm organizations and the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce alone made victory possible. Brother Taylor, Executive Secretary of The Agricultural Legislative Committee, served as Chairman of the Executive Committee and Mr. A. Ahlf, President of the California Farm Bureau Federation, was Treasurer. It should be also remembered that, as far as we have been able to learn. this was the first political campaign in this state where money was ever refunded to the donors.

The committee wishes to call attention to the Final Report of The California Tax Commission as submitted to the Governor on March 5, 1929. On pages 67 and 68 will be found a statement dealing with the necessity for the taxing of publicly owned public utilities and an estimate that the exemption of taxes by these publicly owned utilities is about \$1,800,000.00 annually now. Of the revenue raised by the state from the classes of utilities which have publicly owned operations of any considerable size, this represents an exemption of about 12 per cent. (See page 19, Report of the California State Board of Equalization, 1927-1928.) The benefits of this exemption accrue almost entirely to those who dwell in cities and the loss to the state MUST be made up from other sources of which the farmer is a very considerable part. Furthermore, when San Francisco and Los Angeles take over the privately owned distributing systems for electricity, in conformity with the valuation suits recently finished by the State Railroad Commission, this exemption will increase to over THREE MILLION dollars annually, or about ONE FIFTH of all revenues collected from street railroads and electric utilities in the state. If possible, your committee urges the placing of this measure upon the ballot at the next general election by initiative procedure by the farm organizations of this state.

Your committee also feels that this session of the California State Grange should go on record in no uncertain terms against all legislation which would place a direct tax upon property without calling elections where our duly qualified voters might have the right to say whether such taxes were the wish of the majority who cared to exercise the privilege of voting. We refer to such iniquitous legislation as has been passed within the last few years and some infamous examples of which are our Bridge District Act. Joint Highway District Act, Junior College District Act, etc. The first of these is now before the United States Supreme Court and the second before the California Supreme Court to test their constitutionality. The farmers of California should demand the repeal of ALL such legislation and our Grange would do well to concentrate a large portion of its legislative activities during the next few years in attempting to call to the attention of all citizens the necessity for this being done immediately. If we are to maintain the principles upon which the American government was founded and for which the Revolutionary fathers hazarded both their fortunes and their lives in passing down to us the most splendid political heritage of the ages, it is necessary that we demand of our legislators that PRINCIPLES be placed above EXPEDIENCY. The history and tradition of the Grange make it an exceptionally well suited organization to accomplish this purpose.

In closing, we wish to voice the feeling of grief and irreparable loss which this committee suffered in the death of Brother F. L. Hunt. Sincere in motive, wise in counsel, and indefatigable in his efforts—his place can never be filled. But his life and accomplishments, his loyalty and good will, shall ever be an inspiration to those of us who knew him intimately and were priviledged to work with him.

From the foregoing report, it will be noted that, while the net gain for the past year did not quite equal that of the previous year, yet we have added a gross new business in the amount of \$365,919.00, and added insurance on old policies amounting to \$7,295.00, which speaks well for the enthusiastic interest being taken in our Association by the members of the various Subordinate Granges. The gross amount of money collected for premiums was \$5,461.87, only lacking a little of equaling that of last year and considerably in excess of any other previous year of the history of the Association.

Our total fire losses for the year were \$8,688.00, by far the heaviest of any year since the Association was organized. A study of the foregoing summary of the fire losses will show that most of them occured during the hottest months. All members and agents are earnestly urged to be diligent in their efforts to encourage vigilance and careful precautions against

fire losses. All homes and farms should be well supplied at all times with Fire Extinguishers, ladders and other means of fighting fires. Too much stress cannot be placed upon the important necessity of keeping all buildings as clear as possible of litter and other combustible material and the yards and lots clear of weeds and dry grass, etc. Also, all gasoline, distilate or kerosene stored on the premises should be safely protected and stored at least 60 feet from the insured buildings. One of our brothers experienced a sad loss this year on account of having his gasoline stored too near his buildings. Your special attention is invited to the foregoing summary of fire losses in which it is shown that, with the exception of the William A. Hawley case, all claims were paid within two to twelve days after notice of the loss. The William A. Hawley case was an exception, which required a great deal of effort, legal advice and consequent delay in determining the legal responsibilities involved. All members are urged to see that their applications for renewals are in the hands of the Secretary at least ten to twenty days before the expiration date of their old policy, thus avoiding any possibility of the banks or other interests placing conflicting coverages elsewhere.

Too much praise and appreciation cannot be expressed for the cordial, friendly and fraternal assistance and co-operation exemplified by the members of our Executive Committee during the past year. They have given freely and willingly of their time and efforts for the best interests of the Association. Likewise, the agents representing the Granges all over the state are to be congratulated for their co-operation and fraternal interest in this good work.

It is with deep regret that we report the serious illness of our beloved President, Brother Thos. Jacob, who has been unable to attend to the business affairs of the Association during the past three months, and sincerely trust that he will soon be restored to health. Much credit is due Brother S. L. Stice for the splendid manner in which he has assumed these duties, as Vice-President, and so ably assisted in successfully taking care of one of the heaviest quarter's business in the history of the Association.

On the resolution relating to ship-side storage, the committee reports favorably. Moved by Brother Brucker, seconded by Brother Stewart, that the resolution be adopted. Carried.

On the resolution relating to the action of Power Companies in regard to fish, the committee reports favorably. Brother Knight moved the adoption of the resolution. Seconded by Brother Le May and carried.

The committee reports favorably on the resolution pertaining to agriculture being adequately protected. On motion of Brother Knight, seconded by Brother Stewart, the resolution was adopted.

On the resolution relating to bridge and highway districts, the committee reports favorably. Brother Knight moved that the resolution be adopted. Seconded by Brother Le May. Carried.

On the resolution from Petaluma Grange regarding ineligible aliens, the majority of the committee reports unfavorably.

Brother Bodwell, a member of the committee made a minority report, and requested that this resolution be not acted upon until such time as Petaluma Grange has time to reconsider the resolution and then submit it to the Executive Committee for action. operation, submitted the report of the committee. The re-

port was adopted.

Sister Harrison stated that the first Master of Mt. Bolivar Grange organized July 31, 1874, and who was also the first Master when said Grange was reorganized September 3, 1925, Brother R. M. Hayden was present at this meeting. Brother Hayden and his good wife were presented to the members and applauded.

Sister Nellie W. Hunt spoke of the debt of gratitude owing to our late Brother, John Tewey, of Dinuba Grange, for his work in securing the laws that made Grange Fraternal Fire Insurance possible. She also stated that Brother Thomas Jacob of Tulare Grange had all the records and data regarding the fight for these laws and suggested that these records be put in readable form and kept in the files of this Grange.

Brother Libby at the request of Brother Pettit, the chairman, read the report of the Committee on Constitution and

Regarding the matter of collective balloting referred to in the Mater's report, the committee roommends that this State Grange adopt this method of balloting in accordance with its regulations and restrictions on page 64 of the Digest. Recommendation adopted.

On the resolution from Modoc Pomona Grange regarding the proposed increase of 1c per week per capita, etc., the

committee reports adversely.

Moved by Brother Dorris, seconded by Brother Van Allen, that the resolution be referred to the committee to be redrafted in accordance with objections as stated by the committee. Motion carried.

Brother La Rue submitted the report for the Committee on Roads and Highways. The report was adopted on motion of Brother Le May, seconded by Sister Burkhart.

Recess declared until 1:30 P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Grange was called to order at 1:50 P. M., and those present proved in the A. W.

Brother Holmes, chairman of the Credential Committee, submitted his previous report as the final report. The re-

port was accepted as final.

Sister Loosley, chairman of the Committee on Education, read the report of that committee. The committee reported adversely on the resolution from Guenoc Grange, recommending that it be not endorsed. On motion the report was adopted.

Brother Keesling, chairman, read the report of the Beau-

tification Committee. The report was accepted.

Brother Craig, Worthy Overseer, was requested to take the Chair during a temporary absence of the Worthy Master.

Brother F. S. Clifton, chairman, submitted the report of the Committee on Conservation. The report was adopted.

Brother Dudgeon, chairman of the Committee on Good

of the Order, reported as follows:

The committee recommends that the part of the Master's address relating to the Good of the Order to be endorsed, especially that part urging Masters of Granges to open Grange on time. On motion of Brother F. O. Jones, the recommedation was adopted.

That part of the Lecturer's report referred to the Committee, the Committee approves, and recommends that Subordinate Granges in counties having no Pomona Grange be visited by the Lecturer. On motion of Brother Dudgeon, seconded by Brother Bethel, the recommendation was adopted.

The resolution from Windsor Grange pertaining to State Parks, the committee refers to the State Grange without recommendation. Discussion followed. No action taken.

The committee recommends the adoption of the resolution regarding business association, introduced by Sister Elliott. Discussion followed. Brother Watson raised a point of order that members be allowed to speak on the question but once.

Moved by Brother Dudgeon, seconded by Brother Burkhart, that the recommendation of the committee be adopted,

Carried.

The committee finds that the resolution relating to uniform floor work covered by provisions in the new Manual, therefore recommends that the resolution be not adopted. On motion it was so ordered.

The latter part of the same resolution referring to in-

spection of Granges, the committee recommends that the manner of inspection be left to the discretion of the State Master.

On motion, the report as a whole was adopted.

Brother Dorris, chairman of the committee on Agriculture, reported as follows:

On that part of the Master's address referred to this committee, the committee reports favorably, and recommends its adoption. Brother Dorris moved the adoption of the recommendation. Motion seconded and carried.

On the resolution from Bennett Valley Grange pertaining to the "Packers Consent Decree," the committee reported favorably. Brother Dorris moved the adoption of the Motion duly seconded. Discussion. Resolution resolution. rejected.

On the resolution introduced by Brother Geo. Sehlmeyer, the committee reports favorably after having amended it by adding, "Be it further Resolved, That we favor the construction of the necessary dam and other work by joint action of State and Federal funds. The resolution as amended was adopted on motion of Brother Dorris, seconded by Sister Schaffer.

The committee reports favorably on the resolution pertaining to the entrance of the Great Northern railroad into California. Brother Dorris moved the adoption of the reso-Brother Van Allen seconded the motion.

Brother S. S. Knight spoke, advising against passing the resolution. Brothers Brucker, Hunt and Sehlmeyer and Sister Leroux spoke in favor of the resolution. The resolution was adopted.

The committee reports favorably on the resolutions pertaining to the Mediterranian Fruit Fly and Serious Animal Diseases. On motion of Brother Dorris, seconded by Brother Addy and Brother Talbot, the resolutions were adopted.

Song, "The Grange is Marching On."

Past Master E. T. Pettit, on behalf of California State Grange, presented to Sister Nellie W. Hunt the Past Master's jewel that would have been presented to Brother Frank L. Hunt, Past Master of California State Grange, had he lived to receive it. In presenting the jewel, Brother Pettit spoke of the high esteem in which Brother Hunt was held by the members, and of the great work he had done for the Order, and assured Sister Hunt that her husband would always be held in loving remembrance by those who had known him.

Sister Hunt accepted the jewel. She said it would always represent to her and to her daughters, the love and affection felt for Brother Hunt by the members of this Order. She thanked the members for their thoughtfulness in presenting the jewel to her, saying she prized it highly and would treasure it as long as she lived.

On motion of Brother Holmes, Sister Hunt was requested to procure the data from Brother Jacob regarding the work of Brother Tewey to secure Fraternal Fire Insurance, arrange it in readable form, and present it at the next session of this Grange. Sister Hunt said it would be a pleasure to prepare the record.

Brother Church, chairman, read the report of the Resolutions Committee as follows:

The committee recommends the adoption of the resolution regarding radio station KQW, and its manager, Fred J. Hart. Adopted on motion duly made and seconded by Brother Norton.

The memorial resolutions on the death of Past Master, Frank L. Hunt, which were presented by the committee, were adopted by a rising vote.

The committee also presented resolutions of thanks which were adopted on motion of Brother F. O. Jones, seconded by Sister Sutton.

The report of the Committee on Resolutions, as a whole, was adopted on motion of Brother Jones, seconded by Brother Stice.

Sister Biggs, chairman, read the report of the Welfare

Committee. The report was adopted on motion of Sister

Biggs, seconded by Sister Jones of Napa Grange.

On motion of Brother Jones, seconded by Brother Sutton, the old Grange seal, exhibited earlier in the session, is to be turned over to the Secretary of California State Grange to be kept as the property of said Grange, until called for by the owner. The Secretary to give a receipt for the seal to Brother Geo. R. Harrison.

Sister Stice reported that no claims or grievances had been submitted to the Committee on Claims and Grievances.

Brother M. P. Howard of Mt. Lassen Grange, gave a verbal report regarding the Pomona Feast, stating that tables had been set for 754 members and their guests. On motion of Brother Dodge of Santa Rosa Grange, Brother Howard was given a rising vote of thanks for the very efficient manner in which he had handled the Pomona Feast.

On motion of Brother Wardlow, seconded by Brother Van Allen, it was decided that the remaining reports of Masters of Pomona and Subordinate Granges be handed to the Secretary without reading, and be printed in the Journal of Proceedings.

As an expression of appreciation for the pleasure and cooperation that had been enjoyed under the leadership of the State Master, Sister Lindley, Worthy Chaplain, on behalf of the Officers of the State Grange, presented to Brother and Sister Harrison, as a slight token of their regard, a beautiful picture of Mt. Shasta,

Brother Harrison responded happily, expressing the pleasure he and Sister Harrison would have in looking at the picture and remembering the love and affection that had prompted the gift.

Recess declared until 8 p. m.

EVENING SESSION

Grange was called to order at 8:30 P. M. in open session, that the friends of the members might witness the installation of officers.

Past State Master, Joseph Holmes, assisted by Sister Lula C. Eipper of Aromas Grange, and by Sister Scott of Sebastopol Grange, and Sister McChesney of Orchard City Grange, installed into their respective stations the following officers: Master, George Sehlmeyer, Elk Grove; Overseer, W. Whereas:—The history of the Grange has been an unceasing fight for those things which make for a larger and better and purer life, and

Whereas:—The prohibition of the manufacture, sale, transportation, and consumption of intoxicating beverages has been especially urged by the Grange for many years previous to the enactment of the 18th amendment and the Volstead Act, and

Whereas:—There is now before the 71st Congress a measure, introduced by Senator Sheperd of Texas, to make the buyers of intoxicating liquors equally guilty under the National law as are those who manufacture, transport, or sell such illicit beverages, now therefore be it

Resolved:—That California State Grange, in this its 57th annual convention at Redding, October 18, 1929, do endorse the Shepherd amendment to the Volstead Act and request our State Master to ask the National Grange at its Seattle meeting to act in a similar manner, and do all within its power to secure the early passage by Congress of this legislation.

On the resolution pertaining to bridge and highway districts, we report favorably, and recommend its adoption.

We also report favorably on the resolution pertaining to the adequate protection of Agriculture against foreign importations, and recommend its adoption.

On the resolution relating to the action of Power Companies regarding fish, the report is favorable, and we recom-

mend its adoption.

On the resolution regarding ship-side storage facilities, the report is favorable. We recommend its adoption.

On the resolution from Petaluma Grange regarding ineligible aliens, the majority of the committee report adversely.

COOPERATION

The Grange, from the beginning of the order, has consistently advocated cooperation and organization of farmers to get together, to reduce cost, and eliminate needless market expense. These subjets have been discussed many times in Grange meetings, and many of the cooperatives now flourishing owe their initiative to Grange discussions. But not all cooperatives have stuck to the ideal on which they started. Lacking sufficient membership and courage, they are unable to lower the cost of reaching the ultimate consumer of their products.

And we have repeatedly heard the cry by those whom we have selected to manage our cooperatives, that any plan of eliminating any of the middlemen was too idealistic and visionary. And while we go on in the same old way of selling competitively, manufacturers of food products are merging and consolidating into a few large companies that may mean much or little to the farmers and middlemen.

It is interesting to note that at the time, that the approximate of \$7,000,000,000 paid the farmers for their raw food products each year, the consumer pays approximately \$23,000,000,000 for the same products converted. The reason is:

There is an average of eight middlemen through whom the goods pass, and this is only one reason why farmers cooperative marketing organizations must get together and see to it that selling costs are cut by greater business integration among themselves. The farmer must be put in the position to drive just as hard a bargain as the biggest of the food merger companies if an open and free market for the farmers' products is to be maintained.

There are far too many shippers handling the farmers' products, resulting in wasteful dumping of farm goods into the great city terminals. A single strong cooperative instead

of the dozens of middlemen handling the supply will assure a fair return to the farmer and an ample supply at reasonable prices to the consumer.

We need more members in the Grange and other organizations—members that will stick. With a membership of less than 3,000,000 in bonafide farm organizations, we have not progressed as rapidly as we should. Perhaps the tide will turn now when we are told by "Washington" that "Organization is necessary for the success of agricultural relief" as proposed in the bill just passed.

Two parts of the State Master's report were referred to this committee—that relating to the close cooperation existing between the other Farm Organizations and the Grange, and the other relating to the continuance of the State Market

reports. Both of these we most heartily endorse.

In making its report, your committee on Insurance desires to express sincere appreciation for the splendid progress the Grange Fraternal Fire Insurance Association has shown during the past year through the cooperation of Masters, Patrons, and Agents.

The prompt and efficient manner in which the Executive Committee effected settlement of claims for losses is worthy of special consideration by all patrons.

As shown by the Secretary's and Treasurer's reports, the Association is operating on a conservative and safe basis and furnishing patrons of Husbandry with safe and sure fire protection at a cost averaging approximately 40 per cent to 60 per cent of that usually charged by regular old line companies. Its cash reserve is ample to meet all requirements and the addition of nearly \$400,000.00 of new business during the past year shows the splendid support being given by the patrons to this splendid enterprise.

It is noted with regret that a few of the Subordinate Granges have a very low percentage of their membership carrying insurance in the Association, and there are three Subordinates that have no representatives to act as agents.

All agents for the Association are elected by the respective Subordinate Granges and it is urgently recommended that each and every Subordinate Grange in the state will give earnest and careful attention to the activities of this association and see that the insurance needs of their members are being promptly taken care of by a competent representative, bearing in mind that this is a non-profit organization, operating solely for the benefit of Patrons of Husbandry and that it is our

earnest desire to serve all patrons who desire to profit by the benefits offered by its Association.

The committee recommends that the resolution pertaining to advertising the Grange Fraternal Fire Insurance Association be referred to the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors of said Association for consideration and such action as it may deem best.

- 2. Guidance in the conduct of social features, receptions, and other forms of literary and educational service designed to help the local Grange as well as serve the community.
- 3. Discussions of home keeping including the preparation and serving of foods, harmony of decoration and furnishings, together with suggestions as to the manner of home making of articles of use and decoration, as well as the making and adaptation of dress and ornament to personal appearance. This should include harmony of colors as well as thought for the cost of the article purchased.
- 4. Consideration of home surroundings, including arrangement of kitchen and living rooms, sleeping apartments and all other arrangements which enter into the general plan of home keeping, with conveniences such as flowing water, electricity, stationary tubs, power washers, electric irons, etc.
- 5. The family garden and plans for the cultivation and propagation of superior varieties of vegetables and fruit products including the ornamentation of home grounds and lawns with suitable trees and flowers supplying beauty and utility.

We most earnestly recommend that the Home Economics Committees appointed for 1930, send to the chairman of the State Economics Committee, at the end of the year, a report on subjects that have been of vital interest to them, and the good accomplished.

MEDITERRANEAN FRUIT FLY

(Introduced by C. J. SUTTON)

WHEREAS, we the members of the California State Grange, in annual state convention assembled at Redding, California, this 15th day of October, 1929, have considered the danger to our State and Nation which exists because of the presence of Mediterranean fruit fly into the State of Florida, and

WHEREAS, we believe the action of the Federal Government in promptly taking action to aid the State of Florida in the eradication of this pest has led to most gratifying results, and

WHEREAS, we believe that the hope of eradication lies

in the continuation of the eradication program;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that we request the Secretary of Agriculture to use his best efforts to carry out the eradication program and pledge him our support;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we request Secretary of Agriculture A. M. Hyde to provide funds for the expansion of the plant quarantine work in the United States so that every maritime port of entry may be protected;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this Resolution be sent to the National Grange and to the Secretary of Agriculture.

SERIOUS ANIMAL DISEASES

(Introduced by C. J. SUTTON)

WHEREAS, we the members of the California State Grange, in annual state convention assembled at Redding, California, this 15th day of October, 1929, have considered the danger of introduction into this country of serious animal diseases such as foot and mouth disease which found its way into California during the present year and.

WHEREAS, we believe that more stringent regulations and additional man-power for the enforcement of these regulations would help to minimize the danger of introduction of this disease, and,

WHEREAS, through the timely action and efficient cooperation of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the State Department of Agriculture, and Governor C. C. Young, the outbreak of the disease in California was promptly suppressed with a minimum of cost and intereference with the business of the State and Nation; and

WHEREAS, we believe that the danger of introduction of this disease may be still further minimized by the strengthening of the regulations relating to the disposition of ship's garbage and live stores on foreign vessels, and by the addition of men authorized to enforce the regulations pertaining to the protection of the animal industry of the United States;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that we request the Secretary of Agriculture to use his best efforts to secure additional authority and additional men at the maritime ports of entry for the purpose of preventing introduction of this disease.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this Resolution be sent to the National Grange with the recommendation that this Resolution be endorsed by the national convention.

BE IT ALSO RESOLVED, that copies of this Resolution

shall be sent to Secretary of Agriculture A. M. Hyde, and to Governor C. C. Young.

PERTAINING TO WATER CONSERVATION (Offered by Mt. Lassen Grange)

WHEREAS, it is recognized that the interior valleys of California in dry years have not sufficient water for irrigation purposes,

WHEREAS, it is also recognized that the winter run off from our principal streams is ample to irrigate all lands now cultivated, or suitable for cultivation if properly stored, and

WHEREAS, this run off also constitutes a menace to certain low lying towns and farmlands, and

WHEREAS, this menace can be converted into an asset by impounding this winter run off, thereby serving as a flood control in winter and supplying ample water for irrigation and navigation as well as power,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that this 57th session of the California State Grange goes on record as favoring, and its officers and members be instructed to work for, the adoption of some state wide water conservation measure that will allev'ate the condition in certain sections of the state which now have a shortage of water; that will furnish a better summer flow for navigation; that will conserve to the public, the water necessary for future development; and the power and power sites developed by this measure; such measure to provide that no land suitable for agricultural purposes shall be included in storage reservoirs.

POWER COMPANIES—REGARDING FISH (Presented by M. T. HUNT)

WHEREAS, the operation of the power companies in the state of California, has resulted in the creation of large artificial lakes on sites where natural lakes formerly existed, which were desirable fishing places for the people of California, and

WHEREAS, on numerous occasions the operations of certain power companies having control of such artificial lakes has resulted in a withdrawal of practically all of the water therein, and WHEREAS, there has been great loss of fish because of such illegal withdrawing of water, and

WHEREAS, it is the duty of the fish and game commission of the state of California to conserve and protect the fish in the streams and lakes, artificial as well as natural,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the State Grange of the State of California in regular annual session assembled in Redding, California, that we greatly deplore the loss of fish caused by said action of the power companies, and that the fish and game commission of California should give strict attention to the operation of the power companies and other controlling dams within the state of California, and enforce the laws pertaining thereto, so as to prevent, as far as possible, the loss of fish.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be sent to the Fish and Game Commission of the State of California, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be sent to the Honorable C. C. Young, Governor of the State of California.

RELATING TO TAXES PAID BY BANKS

(From Sonoma Pomona Grange)

WHEREAS, figures have been generally published showing that since the passage of Proposal No. 3 upon the ballot at the general election last November and subsequent legislation by the last California Leg'slature that the Banks of California are paying but about 50% of the money as taxes which they previously paid, and

WHEREAS, banking as an industry has been in the most prosperous condition in our history, now therefore be it

RESOLVED by the Sonoma County Pomona Grange meeting, August 31, at Two Rock, that we most respectfully request the California State Grange at its next meeting to consider the injustice to farming as an industry and we suggest that they call to the attention of the California Banker's Association the facts and ascertain if their members desire to impugn their citizenship by escaping their fair share of the burdens of our government.

SHIP-SIDE REFRIGERATION

(Introduced by MRS. E. L. PETERSON)

WHEREAS, the growing markets for California's perishable fruits and vegetables requires ship-side storage facilities for direct loading to foreign bound boats from cold storage.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that we favor the immediate erection of such facilities as may be reasonably required together with the acquisition of permanent and adequate facilities as soon as such may be acquired at a reasonable price.

WATER FOR IRRIGATION PURPOSES.

(Introduced by GEORGE SEHLMEYER)

WHEREAS, the farmers of the Sacramento and San Joaquin Valleys are facing a serious problem for water for irrigation, and

WHEREAS, pumping from wells in some localities is becoming extremely difficult and in some instances practically impossible owing to the receding of the underground water level, and

WHEREAS, we believe that some steps should be taken to provide water for irrigation for the farmers of these valleys, and

WHEREAS, there is now pending in this state a movement to build a dam at Kennet, which if built, will supply water for irrigation for both the Sacramento and San Joaquin Valleys, besides providing extensive power development.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the California State Grange in annual session assembled in Redding, California, that we favor the construction of the Kennet Dam to provide water for irrigation for the farmers of these two valleys, and be it further

RESOLVED: That we favor the conservation of California water supply for irrigation purposes and that every protection necessary be given farmers to irrigate their farms, and be it further

RESOLVED: That we favor the construction of the necessary dams and other work by joint action of State and Federal funds.

PERTAINING TO THE GREAT NORTHERN RAILROAD (Introduced by MRS. E. L. PETERSON)

WHEREAS, the Great Northern Railroad has petitioned to be allowed to extend its line into the northern part of California and connect with the Western Pacific, and

WHEREAS, we believe that it is for the best interest in the development of the central and northern California section, and is essential to the farming interests,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the California State Grange favor the entrance of the Great Northern into California through connection with the Western Pacific Railroad.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be sent to the Interstate Commerce Commission with a request that the California State Grange be allowed to intervene and present evidence before the Interstate Commerce Commission in behalf of the Great Northern Railroad and the Western Pacific Railroad in the matter of a railroad connection between Klamath Falls, Oregon, and some point in California at or near Keddie.

RELATING TO THE NAPA GRANGE BULLETIN (Introduced by MRS. W. J. DORRIS)

WHEREAS, the Napa Grange Bulletin goes to all of the Subordinate Granges of the state, and

WHEREAS, the State Lecturer finds it a necessary and convenient means of carrying instruction and inspiration in her work to these Granges.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Conference of Subordinate and Pomona Lecturers held during the California State Grange favor the continued use of the Napa Grange Bulletin by the Lecturer's Department of California State Grange.

RALPH H. TAYLOR, EXECUTIVE SECRETARY CALIFORNIA LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

(Presented by Committee on Resolutions)

WHEREAS, Brother Ralph Taylor of Sacramento Grange, Executive Chairman of the Agricultural Committee has done such splendid work for the cause of Agriculture in this state by his untiring efforts,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by this California State

Grange, this 17th day of October, assembled at Redding, that we extend to Brother Ralph Taylor our heart-felt thanks for his services and insure him our hearty support.

RADIO STATION KQW

(Presented by Resolution Committee)

WHEREAS, KQW radio station is doing a splendid work in broadcasting agricultural news and bringing market reports to the agricultural people of the coast,

THEREFORE be it resolved by the California State Grange in regular session assembled at Redding, this 18th day of October, that we wish to express our appreciation to its manager, Fred J. Hart, for his efficient work and untiring efforts in behalf of agriculture.

REGARDING ENDORSING BUSINESS ASSOCIATIONS (Introduced by MRS. M. M. ELLIOTT)

WHEREAS, it is a general policy of fraternal organizations not to endorse commercial and business associations or bodies unless they be controlled by such fraternities, and

WHEREAS, this also has always been the policy of the Grange, now therefore be it

RESOLVED, by this 57th session of the California State Grange that the dangers of such activities be stopped and we reiterate absolute disapproval of such procedure by any and all Granges.

BRIDGE AND HIGHWAY DISTRICTS

(Introduced by Sonoma Pomona Grange)

WHEREAS, under the provisions of an Act entitled:

"An act to provide for the incorporation and organization and management of bridge and highway districts and to provide for the acquisition and construction by said district of highways, bridges and approaches thereto, and for the acquisition of all property necessary therefor, and also to provide for the issuance and payment of bonds by said districts, for the levying of taxes and the collection of tolls by said districts and for the annexation of additional territory thereto," approved May 25, 1923, as amended; bridge and highway districts may be formed embracing lands within said district without the consent or vote of the owners of said lands or of the electors of the county within which such lands are situated, and,

WHEREAS, after the formation of such bridge and highway districts, and directors therefor have unlimited power to levy taxes, and

WHEREAS, the taxes now levied upon agricultural lands in the state of California are so high as to make it almost impossible to operate said lands at a profit, and

WHEREAS, the members of this Grange are of the opinion that no county should be included within a bridge and highway district without the vote of the electors of such county,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this Grange condemn in principle any law or rule which will include within any bridge and highway district a county or city and county, or part of a county, without the consent of a majority of the electors of said county, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the State Grange lend its active support to any legitimate movement which will correct such present injustices as may have already been initiated in this state under said act, and to make their position on this question an active part of the State Grange legislative program.

RELATING TO THE TARIFF

(Introduced by W. J. DORRIS)

WHEREAS, vast uncultivated areas in forgein countries are being rapidly brought into the cultivation and production of every conceivable agricultural article which our nation produces, in great excess of their individual needs and for exportation and sale in other countries; and

WHEREAS, such foreign agriculture is carried on on a lower basis, both economically and physically, than our domestic agriculture with which it is competing in our home markets, to the injury of our farmers and the business of our country generally by the lowering of the farmers' plane of living and purchasing power; and

WHEREAS, we have now millions of acres of undeveloped agricultural land of as good quality as that to be found anywhere, that only awaits an adequate market to spring into production, now

THEREFORE RESOLVED that the California State Grange reiterates its demand made at many previous sessions that agriculture should be adequately protected against foreign im-

portations which are being sold in the home markets and are replacing the home product.

RESOLUTION RELATING TO THE APPROPRIATION OF WATER

(From Modoc Pomona Grange)

WHEREAS, large power companies are rapidly securing title to the remaining unappropriated stream flow and flood waters of the various streams of the state, to the exclusion of their further use for irrigation; and

WHEREAS, Agriculture is the basis upon which everything, great or small, ultimately rests, and is in part or wholly dependent for its existence, in many parts of our land, upon irrigation; and

WHEREAS, large hydro-electric power can be developed on many streams, without interference to their use for irrigation, now

THEREFORE RESOLVED: That the California State Grange urges that action be taken by the proper authorities to the end that the granting of further water rights to any hydro-electric power company, upon any stream in the state of California, be withheld until the water resources of such stream are fully investigated by the Division of Water Resources, and the necessary allocation of its waters made to agricultural lands so as to satisfy the present and future needs for irrigation tributary thereto. And further

RESOLVED: That, if such laws do not exist, we urge that laws be enacted to restrict the use of the unappropriated waters of the state for hydro-electric purposes, to waters not needed for irrigation.

BOY SCOUT MOVEMENT

(Introduced by MRS. GRACE BIGGS)

WHEREAS, the Boy Scout movement of America is proving itself to be one of the greatest agencies now employed in inculcating into the growing mind of the youth of the country, the principles of true manhood and honor and uprightness, and developing his physical being, and

WHEREAS, Harry B. Ogle, Scout Executive of Chico, California, appeared before the State Grange in behalf of the Boy Scout organization, and

WHEREAS, the State Grange has always looked upon the

rising generation as the most vital asset of the nation.

NOW, THEREFORE RESOLVED that the State Grange of California in its 57th annual session held at Redding, endorses the Boy Scout movement, and urges all Subordinate Granges to use their best efforts in promoting the work.


