Sister Beatie introduced Steve Cifillei, President of the Board of Directors and Marsha Ree Wilcox, Co-Director of the Volunteer Program and presented each with a cookbook and gift. Each guest spoke briefly regarding their program. A plaque was presented to the California State Grange in appreciation for their participation in Make a Wish Foundation.

STATE MASTERS ADDRESS - 1989

PART A:

INTRODUCTION

As illustrated at the reception last evening, San Bernardino has laid out the "welcome mat" for us. This being our first convention held in a high-rise hotel, we have encountered a few "firsts," like no stage. We extend our sincere appreciation to the management of the Maruko Hotel and Convention Center for their cooperation and understanding for insuring our success. This is the second time since October 1950 we have met in this city. A few things have changed since State Master Schlmeyer addressed our convention 39 years ago. Today, San Bernardino County has 1,938 farms with 1.7 million acres of farmland of which 37,000 acres are irrigated. Poultry, beef, dairy and alfalfa are the top commodities. Nationwide, San Bernardino County ranks 13th in agricultural production.

I would like to close this introduction with this quotation from Brother Schlmeyer's annual address: "We are confident the delegates in discussing resolutions and adopting a program, will always keep in mind the Grange has never been guided by expediency. It has never erected its structures on the shifting sands of policy, but has always rested on the firm rock of principle. Because of the conditions which now confront us, especially so far as world peace is concerned and the maintaining of our own democracy at a high level, we urge our delegates to be calm and deliberate in their discussions and in reaching conclusions, to always keep in mind the lofty principles and the high ideals of the Grange."

I. <u>AGRICULTURE</u> A. <u>STATE OF THE INDUSTRY</u>

California agriculture remains the state's largest

industry and most successful exporter. However, farmers are faced with potential disastrous water shortages, falling incomes, foreclosures, tighter governmental regulations and heavily subsidized foreign competition. While the California agricultural industry generated about \$64 billion in revenues last year and remains extremely diversified raising more than 250 different crops, farmers are struggling to survive.

California farmland prices have fallen steadily for the past few years, diminishing farmers' net worth. The U.S. Department of Agriculture estimates that the average value of California farmland and buildings last year was \$1,341 per acre, down 2 percent from the previous year and off 30 percent from 1984. Falling land values reduce the amount of credit farmers can obtain to buy seed, fertilizer and equipment to grow the current year's crop.

And on top of this, consumers in the U.S. that have benefitted so greatly from the hard work of farmers are now attacking the agricultural industry for wasting water, using too many cancer causing pesticides and generally being a nuisance to city dwellers.

Consumers need to take stock of what the agricultural policy in the U.S. and California offers. No other place on earth do consumers have the choice of high quality, nutritious foods that we do in the United States. U.S. citizens spend only 12 percent of their disposable income on food, the lowest of any other nation and down from an average of 16 percent in the 1960's.

B. FARM BILL

Let's not lose sight that one of the primary responsibilities of the Federal Government is to assure the citizens of this country with a safe, wholesome and dependable supply of food at reasonable prices. The 1990 Farm Bill must mesh with international realities and allow flexibility to allow producers and consumers greater freedom to respond to market signals.

The question of the cost of the farm bill is always raised and Grange members have maintained that the federal deficit must be brought under control for longterm stability. The truth is that agriculture has already contributed some \$30 billion in budget savings since 1981 and that the <u>entire</u> USDA budget accounts for only 4% of the total federal budget. Most importantly, however, is that even though the agricultural budget is relatively small, it is money well spent to ensure our nation's food security.

A new commitment must be made to research, education and extension. To insure that American agriculture stays competitive for years, we must insist on agricultural research to keep the farm and related industry on the "cutting edge" of product development.

International trade must play a central role in the farm bill as America's agricultural prosperity is geared to access to foreign markets. Aggressive export programs such as our export promotion efforts are the only means California farmers can hope to offset foreign subsidies at this time.

C. TRADE

California growers already plant about one in four acres for export and have been working steadily to increase overseas sales. California agricultural exports are expected to climb about 15% above last year's \$3.3 billion sales. However, this is well below the \$4 billion returned in 1981. Of all California exports, 53 percent goes to the Pacific rim, 13 percent goes to Canada and 29 percent are shipped to Europe.

Continued tension with the European Community (EC) over trade disputes has prompted the U.S. to propose the complete elimination of all subsidies at the recent General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) talks.

Indeed, agricultural spending accounts for 62 percent of the EC's budget because of a policy that calls for the security of food supplies at reasonable prices and a fair standard of living for farmers. We need to understand that the elimination of subsidies in Europe presents a major social and political problem because about 10.4 million Europeans work on 9.1 million farms which average just 31 acres. That compares with 3.2 million Americans working on 2.3 million farms that average 432 acres. An agreement on a phase out of subsidies may be acceptable as long as it does not disadvantage California farmers.

D. FOOD SAFETY

Questions about the safety of the food supply, pesticides in particular, have been the focus of considerable media attention. A report earlier this year by the National Resources Defense Council started a consumer panic over a chemical named Alar that sent demand and prices for apples down sharply and left farmers with warehouses of rotting fresh fruit.

California spends more than \$40 million each year for the nation's most comprehensive program to regulate pesticide use. As part of this program, domestic and imported produce is sampled and tested for traces of pesticide residues. In 1988, the program was expanded with more than 14,000 samples being taken. Less than 1.2 percent of the samples violated established standards. Since the standards include a safety margin, illegal residues rarely present a health risk. When illegal residues are detected, commodities are immediately quarantined and not allowed to be sold.

When the dust settles, the message that health and nutrition professionals are continuing to make to Americans remains the same: TO REDUCE THE RISK OF CANCER AND OTHER CHRONIC DISEASES, AMERICANS SHOULD DRAMATI-CALLY <u>INCREASE</u> THEIR CONSUMPTION OF FRUIT'S AND VEGETABLES, LEGUMES AND WHOLE-GRAIN CEREALS.

E. TRANSPORTATION

In this report last year, I stated facts and figures regarding the decline of roadway conditions and increase in traffic congestion that creates "Gridlock."

We are a little closer this year to a solution in providing the funds necessary to create a roadway and transportation system in California that will enable commodities to be shipped to market in a timely manner. The Federal Transportation aid-funds run out when the Interstate Highway Trust sunsets in 1991. Therefore, Californians must come up with a funding solution to provide the necessary finance mechanism.

Voters will be going to the polls in June next year to decide the fate of a "user fee" on fuel at the pumps, which will raise the "tax" on fuels approximately 9-cents over the subsequent five-year period. In addition, the commercial vehicle weight fees are to be increased by 50%. We continue to work with the Highway Users Conference in California and after review of the various proposals, have voiced our concern that rural roadways will not be receiving their fair share of the funding for roadway and bridge improvement.

People who live in rural areas pay more per capita into the Highway Trust Fund than do their urban counterparts. We find ourselves to be more and more isolated from commerce and economic development opportunities by the very federal-aid highway system we assisted to create. The Grange has long fought to have fuel taxes distributed evenly among the counties determined by the number of highway miles, rather than the population served. We all agree that mass transit should be developed to serve the city and urban community, but in order for agricultural commodities to reach the marketplace at reasonable rates, rural roadway improvements must be considered as important as mass transit.

You will be deciding at this convention Grange policy regarding the "User Fee vs. Fuel Tax" issue and I would ask that you consider the issue thoroughly when you hear the Transportation Committee's report. The Grange is understanding to the efforts of the administration in creating a Transportation Fund to maintain the current roadways and to improve and expand the mass transit issues.

The National Grange's new program "Local Roads and Bridges" would be an ideal avenue for the Grange to become actively involved in the issue of roadway improvement as it fits perfectly into our GRANGER ACTION PLAN and we would encourage every Grange and every Granger to be actively involved. The "LRB Project" (a nationwide cause) would accomplish ten major goals, the most important of which is that every Granger becomes involved in a project that will serve not only their community, but their Grange as well. The LRB Project will involve all Granges at all levels calling for a commitment from every Granger. It is not an optional program. If we are to be successful in obtaining our goals of improved rural roads and bridges, we must all make the commitment which will definitely enhance the visibility of your Grange.

The key to California's agricultural future depends on the urban and city consumer. The urban and cities future depends on agricultural commodities that are consistent and reasonably priced. Transportation is the key.

II. <u>INSURANCE REFORM (PROPOSITION</u> <u>103)</u>

Last year, the citizens of this state voted to approve Proposition 103, the so-called insurance reform initiative. The way it was billed, it seemed like the right thing to do. As it was publicized, it would primarily effect the auto policyholders with a 20% rate rollback. As it is later known, it effects almost every line of insurance except health and life for the average citizen.

Proposition 103, as it stands today, is a confusing political mess and its future looks even more confusing. The most recent news from the insurance commissioner is that most Californians are "not going to get lower auto insurance rates" as a result of the initiative. The Supreme Court upheld the initiative, but ruled that insurance companies are entitled to a "fair and reasonable" profit. After reviewing the insurance companies profit statements, the commissioner found only 13 companies profitable enough to warrant rate rollbacks, recommending hearings to examine the exemption claims of 34 more companies and declaring that evaluating more than 200 other companies could take as long as ten years to complete. To assist with this wonderful process: enter the state legislature. With 30-plus bills relating to Proposition 103 this year, who could ask for more. The sure winner of this are the people who drew it up -- lawyers.

The Grange has had policy for over 25 years that would solve this situation. It is called NO FAULT Auto Insurance. No fault means that each policyholder is held accountable (and liable) to his or her own insurance company. If you are negligent, you pay more premiums. If you are a good risk, you pay less.

The Grange should sponsor its own petition to qualify an initiative called "no fault auto insurance" and end the "brouhaha" surrounding Proposition 103. We have the expertise to word such a petition right here in this auditorium and the integrity of a great organization to oversee its success.

GOOD OF THE ORDER

I. <u>MEMBERSHIP</u>

Our membership has steadily decreased for several years. This year we closed out the June quarter (fiscal year) with a loss of only 111. Our congratulations to all of you as leaders of those Granges that posted a net gain. Again, our greatest factor in the membership decline equation is suspension for non-payment of dues. We have to commit ourselves to do better in this area. Make an extra effort to understand the dues billing process and to make a personal contact. Work with the insurance agent, affiliate representative or state membership department, if necessary. I have heard far too many times, the myth regarding the "insurance member." I took it upon myself to work "undercover" with the Grange Insurance Association computer division by sending them a list of all new members recruited for three quarters this year. They programmed this list with their new policy holders and concluded that the GIA agents recruited 38% of all the new members. Of the 1,792 new members, the agents recruited 681. Where are the 1,111 noninsurance members? Let's all recognize that the insurance member I am talking about, is a myth. All these people are "Grange members" and it's you, the leaders of the Grange, that has the responsibility to get them involved. Let's look at your Grange meetings as a new member. What would be your first impression of your obligation ceremony? What do you accomplish by going to your Grange meeting? If I were a new member, would I be impressed enough by my first visit to want to get involved? Is your benefits and services notebook present at each meeting? Do you invite affiliate company representatives to make presentations? Is your Grange visible in your community? At a Grange conference, I learned a quote that applies here, "Do It!, Do It Right, Do It Right Now!" If we only reduced our suspensions for non-payment of dues by one-third, we could easily receive National Grange recognition as a growing state. After all, Pennsylvania's membership is not that far from us (within 5,000). Let's give them a run as claiming to be the second largest membership state in the Nation.

II. NEW COMPUTERS

A few months ago, a new computer SYSTEM was installed at the State Grange headquarters. I emphasize the word "system," as now our offices are linked by a computer network called a L-A-N, or Local Area Network. Terminals are in place for the State Master's Secretary, the State Secretary's office, the Legislative Department and the Grange News. All inter-linked through a master databank. This enables the various departments to share information and tasks with improved efficiency. For example, in the past when the State Secretary wanted to look up a Grange or a member, she had to either look through a computer printout that may not have been current, or wait until the computer holding the membership roster was free and ask the operator to locate the information.

Today, there are four terminals that can produce the information in a matter of seconds, and if necessary, make changes on the spot.

III. GRANGE GROWTH

Looking into my "crystal ball," I see a bright future for the Grange. Grange growth is simple. But how?

A committee should be appointed in your Grange to see if there are thirteen or more kids in your community to sponsor a Junior Grange. If you say there aren't any kids, you haven't looked.

Get your leadership in gear for conducting a sharp Grange meeting. The burden of retaining members and getting your new members involved and participating is on your shoulders.

The opportunity for every Grange to sponsor youth (all ages) in local fairs has never been better. At the State Rules Committee meeting for district fairs last week, the Grange got everything they asked for. Such as, a) Grange youth under nine allowed to show small livestock, b) Grange youth nine years of age by the first day of the fair can exhibit until the year after graduation from high school, and c) a program will be recognized for college youth.

As the 4-H clubs are having a problem with federal regulations, the Grange does not. We are being approached by 4-H leaders regarding our Grange Youth Livestock Program and organizing new Granges. In addition to this, the fairs are also interested in us. Does your Grange have a representative to the local fair board?

The single most important key to new membership in the Grange is being <u>visible</u> in your community. I cannot stress how important it is for you as Grange leaders to be visible outside your Grange halls.

IV. CONCLUSION

As many of you know or should know, I am not seeking re-election to a State Grange office this year. After being a Grange member for almost 35 years, I have made some mental notes along the way. One was that the good Lord give me the common sense to step aside when the time was proper. I believe that time is now. Not only do I believe this is a healthy change for the Order, but I hope it will set an exam ple. We can be in one place too long.

My sincerest pride and gratitude goes to the California State Grange employees. They are truly profes sionals. My sincerest admiration and love is to my wife Lois for being by my side. She is a First Lady.

Lois and I wish to express to you our sincerest "thank you" for the courtesies you have given us. I have tried my best to represent the office of the Master with the honor and respect of my predecessors. I hope it has met with your approval.

This year has brought about many changes and improvements in the accounting procedures of your State Grange. These changes include new expanded accounting program, the acquisition of the GBO accounts, new Trustee management programs, and a property management program. At last year's Convention in Redding, I came before the Delegation with a budget that was balanced and reflective of prudent expenditures. Because of this, I am pleased to announce that we have achieved our goal of coming in under budget. Income for the year ending June 30, 1989 was \$578,718.00 and the expenditures were \$540,063.00. This has resulted in a net revenue of \$38,030.00.

In closing, I would like to remind you that it was your predecessors who built this Grange into a strong working organization, and it is up to you to carry on this legacy. It is my wish that all of you have a good time this week, make new friends, and when the work is done, go home with a sense of accomplishment and pride in being a GRANGER.

SECRETARY'S ANNUAL REPORT

Worthy Master, State Officers and Members of the California State Grange:

It is a pleasure and honor to greet you at this 117th Session of the California State Grange being held in the city of San Bernardino. Records show that we last assembled in your beautiful city in 1950 for our 78th Annual Session, held in the "Swing Auditorium at the Orange Show Grounds." The records go on to show that this was the first time in history the Annual Session of the California State Grange was held in the city of San Bernardino.

As this will be my last Annual Report as your State Grange Secretary, I want to especially express my sincere appreciation to all Secretaries and elected and appointed Officers for their long, continued support with this office.

I do hope my successor, who will be elected at this Annual Session, will be able to share and have the wonderful association that I have had these past years.

Would also like to express my sincere thanks to the Convention Chairman, Brother Eugene Runyon and all his committees and members who have given their services and made it possible to have a successful and productive Session in San Bernardino this year.

Billing Service: Again this year the Billing Service has been renewed and offered as a 1990 Dues Service to all Subordinate Grange Secretaries. Updated forms with a separate invoice (dues notice) will be provided for each Grange member with a file card record, plus a receipt/membership card for the billing year. Each dues notice will indicate the amount of Member's dues and return address of the Subordinate Secretary.

The Secretaries have a choice of a printed message or calendar of events, inserted in the dues notice. Or, if they prefer, we will insert the current Grange Benefits and Services for members. Cost of the 1990 Billing Service was raised to \$.55 per member. Deadline for receiving requests for this service is November 1, 1989.

Membership: Grange membership reported to the National Grange as of the June 30, 1989 quarter was 33,035 with 282 Subordinate Granges reporting (598 of those members are Golden Sheaf members.) This showed a loss of 111 members for the quarter. Total of 96 affiliate members were recorded for the 6/30/89 quarter (not included in the above figures.)

For the 1988-89 Grange year, there was a loss of 894 members. Again, most of these losses were by Suspension for non-payment of dues and by Withdrawal. The records show that our membership loss has lessened compared to 1987-88 year, however, we must continue to set our membership goals for the 1990 year.

The theme for the 1989-90 program is "Grange-The Key." As the Worthy National Master stated "We as Grange leaders and members should take *THE KEY* and turn it into motivation, action, planning, sharing and creating-all of which will produce both quality leadership and positive accomplishments." LARGEST MEMBERSHIP - Subordinate Granges

1st-Lompoc Grange #646-Santa Barbara County 595 members; 2nd-Brownsville Grange #708-Yuba

County, 518 members; 3rd-Ostrom Grange #708-Yuba County, 494 members. Pomona Grange Membership showed 5,785

members in 47 Pomona Granges. This was a loss of 347 members for the year.

LARGEST MEMBERSHIP-Pomona Granges

1st-Butte County Pomona Grange #16 - 686 members; 2nd-Mendocino County Pomona Grange #10 - 275 members; 3rd-San Joaquin County Pomona Grange #20 - 243 members.

<u>JUNIOR GRANGES</u> - California reported 159 members with 9 Granges reporting. There were 9 Junior Granges recorded as of June 30, 1989.

<u>NEW GRANGES</u> - There were no Granges organized or reorganized during the 1988-89 year.

<u>GRANGE HALL DEDICATIONS</u> - Two hundred forty-eight Grange Halls have been dedicated to date in California. No Grange Halls were dedicated this past year.

<u>CERTIFICATES</u> - Certificates were awarded to all Grange Secretaries qualifying, making prompt and efficient reports to the State Grange.

CALIFORNIA STATE GRANGE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MINUTES

October 17, 1988

Approved 10/22/88 As Amended

The meeting was called to order at 9:00 am with the Worthy State Master David Austin presiding.

Roll call showed all members present: Stephen Tait, Johnny Squire and Joe Victorine. The State Master's Secretary and Brother William Booth, Overseer, were also present.

The minutes of the September 29, 1988 meeting were reviewed and discussed. It was stated that there was no statement in the minutes acknowledging the approval of the August 26, 1988 minutes and needs to be added. On Page 3, last line of the Vacaville Senior Housing Corporation Loan section, the word "facility" should be stricken as it doesn't sound grammatically correct. On page 4, in the Computerized Bill Tracking section, the words "with the benefit of unlimited computer time" should be added to the last line in order to clarify the decision to proceed with Legi-Tech. After discussion, the Committee voted to approve the minutes as amended.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE RESOLUTIONS: ARTICLE XVI-EXPENSES OF (A) DELEGATES AND COMPENSATION AND **EXPENSES OF OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES-**The resolution regarding the above was discussed at the last meeting and the State Master was instructed to ready it for the October meeting. After reviewing the resolution, the Committee suggested that the words "Section 16.1" be added after Article XVI in order to clarify the section referring to. With no objection from the Committee, this resolution will be submitted to the Constitution and By-Laws Committee for consideration.

(B) REPRESENTATION TO STATE GRANGE MEETING-discussion of California State Grange By-Laws Section 12.1(b) was discussed at the last meeting and the State Master was instructed to draft a resolution and ready it for presentation to the Executive Committee for their approval before forwarding to the Constitution and By-Laws Committee.

(C) CHANGING THE DEMIT PROCESS-The Committee discussed this resolution as prepared by Brother Booth. The Committee agrees that the demit process needs to be worked on and streamlined in some way. There are too many demits that are not recovered. Members either forget to "transfer" their demits or never intend to use them. We need to devise a better "trail" in the demit process. After consideration, the Committee suggested that this be sent to the Constitution and By-laws Committee for their consideration. It should be made clear to the Constitution and By-laws Committee that this resolution is to change the National Digest. Brother Booth should be available to meet with the Committee, should they desire.

INTERNAL AUDIT CONTROL LETTER The State Master stated that the Internal Audit Control Letter needs to be addressed. The State Master wants to get all the concerns and comments the Committee has gathered and, if necessary, meet with the CPA and the California State Grange Bookkeeper. The Vacaville loan of \$1,000 still needs to be researched as there is still a concern of the Committee as to whether or not it is to be paid back. A letter was sent to Mr. Ken Douglas regarding the payback status of the \$5,000 loan to the Vacaville Senior Housing Corporation. The letter also stated that the State Master will be requesting at the 1988 California State Grange Convention that a resolution be adopted permitting the first \$1,000 loan be made in the form of a donation. Brother Squire expressed his concern regarding this request. Research of the minutes needs to be undertaken in order to clarify this situation.

TRUST ACCOUNTS An update on the trust accounts will be given at a future meeting. The update should include columns for interest rates, rollover dates and administrative fee charged. Discussion took place on the combining of the smaller accounts. Discussion took place on \$50,000 accounts.

The concern of the telephone answering situation was again addressed in the internal audit control letter. The State Master suggested looking into an 800 number recording system similar to the one Grange Insurance Association uses. The member can call an 800 number whereby a recording will answer the telephone with messages to complete various tasks in order to execute their call. It was also suggested to research the cost factor in having someone answer the phone. Another suggestion was made to look into separate lines for separate departments. Another suggestion was made to check into the cost of what an incoming 800 number would be. The State Master, or office staff, was instructed to check into the above suggestions and to report back to the Committee. As for the other items contained in the letter, the State Master would like the Committee to flag their concerns, and, if necessary, the CPA and

the California State Grange Bookkeeper could meet with the Committee in order to answer their questions.

1988 CONVENTION PROGRAM The State Master reviewed the program with the Committee. Thursday's activities have been changed slightly with the Memorial Service being held at 2:00 pm with the awards presentation to follow. Time Certain was discussed regarding the 10/24/87 minutes dealing with the State Master's salary. Brother Squire would like to have someone "primed" to approve the minutes of the California State Grange Executive Committee with the exception of the 10/24/87 minutes, the section dealing with the State Master's salary, which will be discussed at Time Certain. Time Certain was set for immediately following the credential committee report on Wednesday. After discussion, it was voted by the Executive Committee to approve the 1988 Convention Program and be presented to the Delegate body for adoption.

STANDING RULES The Standing Rules of the Convention were reviewed. With no objection, the Committee changed the time on Item 13 to 5:00 pm Tuesday, October 18, 1988.

MASTER'S ANNUAL ADDRESS The State Master stated that he will be trying something new with Section A of the Master's Annual Address. He will be reading an "overview" of the address part by part with questions to be answered after each part, if necessary.

The State Master stated that he attended a recent meeting of the California State Fairs Rules Committee. He stated that Grange Youth now have the same status as 4H and FFA in the livestock division.

BUDGET The State Master stated that the budget committee will be making some recommendations to the Good of the Order Committee: 1) State Grange car, and 2) "Survey" of the computer needs of the California State Grange office.

An inquiry was made as to whether or not a fund has been established for office equipment. It seems that, to date, we have not had the money to establish such a fund.

MISCELLANEOUS A letter was received from Sister Mary Wendt regarding the purchase of the Olivetti ET 121 typewriter at a depreciated value that is currently in the GBO inventory. A similar letter was received from Brother Ed Koster regarding the purchase of the Executive desk and chair at the depreciated value. The Committee suggested that the depreciated value of both requests needs to be given before they can approve these requests.

Brother Squire received a phone call a few weeks ago regarding the State Grange car. Brother Squire asked the State Master, when the State Grange car was purchased, was it registered in his name? The State Master replied "Heaven's no." The State Master suggested that Brother Squire verify this with Sister Pat Meece, California State Grange Bookkeeper.

The meeting adjourned at 9:31 am. The next meeting is scheduled for Saturday, October 23, 1988 at 8:00 am in the Redding Lodge.

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 am in the Redding Lodge, Redding, California with the Worthy State Master David Austin presiding.

Roll call showed all members present: Johnny Squire, Joe Victorine, Stephen Tait, Bob Clouse and Jim Smith. Brothers Stephen Tait and Bob Clouse (3-Year term) and Jim Smith (2-Year term) were welcomed as the new members of the California State Grange Executive Committee. State Overseer William Booth, State Secretary Marjorie Brown and Otto Kaser, representing Ukiah Autumn Leaves were also present.

The minutes of the October 17, 1988 meeting were read and discussed. Under the agenda item "Budget," last line of paragraph two, the word "operation" was changed to read "Computer needs" and under the agenda item "Trust Accounts," last line of paragraph, the word "co-mingling" was changed to read "combining" and the last sentence should be removed "we should put them into" and insert "discussion took place on". After some discussion, the Committee voted to approve the minutes as amended.

AUDIT/BUDGET REPORT A request was made to secure copies of the 1988 Audit/Budget Committee Report as submitted by Brother Tom Stefenoni, Chairman of the 1988 Audit/Budget Committee. Copies to be mailed to the Executive Committee.

NATIONAL CONVENTION COMMITTEE REPORT Sister Rosemary Hansen, Chairman of the 1988 National Convention Committee, appeared before the Committee. Discussion on the host badges for the National Session took place. Only those that have been assigned to chair the various committees and their assistants would wear the host badges and would remove the badge when they are not on duty. Sister Hansen reported her house was filling up with all the different ag commodities that had been donated by the consumers for the National Session--some to be used in the hospitality room as well as for the host banquet. The cost figure for the host meal was quoted as \$12.50 per plate. The State Master stated between 150-175 people would be invited to the banquet. Invitations have been sent out by our State Master. It will be necessary to present the invitation in order to attend this special event. RSVP's to be returned to either the National Chairman or the State Master. Sister Hansen reviewed the menu and table favors planned for the "western dress" banquet.

The following bills were received by the Chairman and submitted to the Executive Committee for payment: ODYSSEY TOURS (Redding) for the buses to be used for the National Youth Tour on Nov. 17. The charge per bus is \$220.55 for a total of \$882.20, which is payable one (1) week prior to move date. There will be a \$100 cancellation fee for any bus cancelled less than five (5) days prior to move date. Brother Joe Victorine, one of the chairmen of the youth tours, filled in with information concerning the bus tour.

LINDA'S HALLMARK-REDWOOD VILLAGE (Fortuna) for 250 "raisin keychains" for a total of \$500 plus tax. Sister Hansen stated she was unaware of these keychains being purchased by the Youth department as the expense had not been received by her for approval as Committee Chairman. Both bills now approved for payment by the National Chairman. Sister Hansen also stated that the Junior Director, Sister Carolyn Hill, had revealed to her that she needed funds for table favors for the Junior luncheon planned for the convention. Sister Hansen suggested up to \$500 should be allocated to the Junior Department for this project. It was voted to pay the bills as submitted and approve up to \$500 to the Junior Department and have Sister Hansen approve the expenses as they are received for the National Junior Luncheon. Sister Hansen will be in touch with the Junior Director.

NATIONAL GRANGE REQUESTS A letter was received by the State Chaplain, Sister Edna Cook, for the National Chaplain regarding the arrangements of soloists for the memorial service for the National Convention. Sister Cook is requesting expenses for this arrangement. It was voted to compensate the State Chaplain three (3) night's lodging (\$30 per night) and one night's lodging (\$30 per night) for the soloist. Discussion took place on the requirement of nine (9) staves for the memorial service. The State Master stated that he would take care of this matter.

The State Lecturer's requests regarding the National Grange Convention were discussed at this time for clarification to the National Convention Chairman. It was voted at the August 26, 1988 meeting to allow a total of 45 days motel lodging for the State Lecturer's advisory committee that would be assisting him with \$30 allowance per day, per person for said rooms, with no dual compensation and that mileage would be allowed for five members requested.

Discussion as to expenses of State Officers attending host dinner at the national session was undertaken. The Committee recommended they would be on their own. State Master announced a tentatively scheduled sixth degree practice for Friday, November 18, 1988 at 2:00 pm at the Red Lion Inn. It was voted to allow one night's lodging at \$30 plus mileage for State Officers with no dual compensation. Discussion took place on the "dress code" for the exemplification of the Sixth degree. No action taken.

National Convention Chairman, Rosemary Hansen, announced that office staff personnel Pat Avila, Carol Margues and Mary Wendt had agreed to share a room at the Red Lion Inn (Headquarters) for working on national registration. The cost of the Red Lion Inn motel would not exceed the cost of having separate rooms at scheduled Motel Orleans, which they stated would be a transportation problem due to working different hours. The State Secretary (registration chairman) commented that would be a great help in having staff nearby in case of change in scheduled hours, if need be. The Committee voted to have the staff, including Marjoric Brown, registration chairman, housed at the Red Lion Inn. The rooms at the Motel Orleans would be utilized as "floating rooms" as needed. Sister Hansen will be in charge of filling the rooms.

National Chairman stated out of the required \$5 registration fee charged by the National Grange, the California State Grange would receive half of the cost.

Discussion on expenses for Sister Frances McElhinney who had taken over as Chairman of the Seventh Degree for Barbara Carden was undertaken. The Committee voted to allow "Motel Orleans" rates for Sister McElhinney to stay at headquarters motel for six nights at \$34 per night.

Sister Hansen announced lunches would be

provided for all the Seventh Degree cast as well as doughnuts and coffee for the morning.

It was voted to allow compensation to Brother Stephen Tait, who had been selected as organist for the Seventh Degree, at \$30 per night for two nights plus \$.10 per mile, one-way from his home to Redding.

Expenses for the Committee Chairman and compensation of meal functions was discussed. One meal function allowed for chairman and spouse.

Sister Hansen stated that Naomi Fletcher, Deaf Activities Advisor, would notify the National Deaf Activities Committee of sales table set for National Convention.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS Sister Marjorie Brown, State Secretary, read the Journal of Yesterday (10-21-88). The Committee voted to accept the minutes of the Journal of Yesterday as read and entered into the record.

FINAL COMMITTEE REPORTS It was voted that copies of all final committee reports be entered on the agenda of items to be discussed at the next Executive Committee meeting.

RESOLUTION OF APPRECIATION It was voted that a letter be written to Brother Eugene Runyon, State Lecturer, advising him that his program was very much appreciated and that his name would be entered into the "Resolution of Appreciation."

VACAVILLE AUTUMN LEAVES The Worthy State Master stated that he would research further into the item regarding the \$1,000 loan to Vacaville Senior Housing Corporation dated January 1985.

GWA DIRECTOR A report of the convention activities was read as prepared by Sister Joy Beatie, Director of Women's Activities.

The State Master discussed the National Grange/State Grange rental contract with Redding Convention Center. It was voted to have the State Master pursue this item.

The meeting adjourned at 12:20 pm. The next scheduled meeting of the CSG Executive Committee will be Wednesday, December 7, 1988 at 9:00 am at the State Grange Headquarters.

With the passing of Brother Albert Eldrick, Secretary/Treasurer, it left a vacancy on the Board of directors for Ukiah Autumn Leaves. Sister Patricia Stephens, Ukiah Grange #419, has been elected to fill that position. It was voted to approve the existing Board of Directors.

For the benefit of our newly elected Executive Committeemen, Brother Kaser outlined the past history of the Ukiah Autumn Leaves Retirement home.

DECEMBER 7, 1988 APPROVED 1/6/89 AS CLARIFIED

The meeting was called to order at 9:03 am at the California State Grange headquarters with the Worthy State Master David Austin presiding.

Roll call showed members present: Johnny Squire, Joe Victorine, Bob Clouse and Jim Smith. Brother Stephen Tait arrived at approximately 9:20 am. Brother Bill Booth, Overseer and the State Master's Secretary were also present.

The minutes of the October 22, 1988 meeting were approved as read.

UKIAH AUTUMN LEAVES, INC. The minutes

of the Ukiah Autumn Leaves, Inc. for the months of July, August, September and October 1988 were reviewed by the Committee. The State Master explained why the California State Grange Executive Committee is put on the Ukiah Autumn Leaves and Vacaville Autumn Leaves Boards of Directors for the benefit of the new Executive Committee members. It was stated that due to the death of Brother Albert Eldrick, Sister Pat Stephens (Ukiah Grange member) was elected to fill the vacancy of secretary for Ukiah Autumn Leaves.

STATE LECTURER-BOOK REQUEST The State Master received a request from Brother Eugene Runyon for resource books (\$45.15) to be included in the State Lecturer's Library. The Committee felt that this expense was beneficial to the Lecturer's Department as well as for all lecturers as these resource materials can be checked out for their use. The Committee voted to approve the book request of the State Lecturer and to process his book order.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT Sister Pat Meece, Bookkeeper, joined the Committee at this time. She presented the Balance Sheet and budget figures for the four months ending October 31, 1988. This will be the new format in which the "financial report" will be given. The Committee expressed their approval of the new format and expressed interest in receiving the accounting status of the restricted accounts as they will be discussing these accounts in the future. The State Master pointed out that we did not have to borrow money for this year's convention.

The State Master stated that the necessary papers were signed yesterday regarding the dissolution of the Grangers Business Organization. The assets and liabilities of GBO were discussed. There are four deeds of trust and one quit claim deed, some of which the payments have started to come in to the California State Grange in mid-November. Sister Meece stated that for the time being, these payments have been deposited into the General Fund. As soon as the accounting mechanism has been established for our general ledger, the principal will be placed in a restricted account and the interest will be transferred into the General Fund. It was voted by the Committee that we set up separate accounts, the principal as one account and the interest as a separate account for the GBO deeds of trust to include current funds on deposit as per Resolution G-7-87, the principal to be invested. The income from the GBO rentals (Sacramento Credit Union, UCMD Purchasing Department, etc.) will be deposited into the General

Fund.

VACAVILLE AUTUMN LEAVES Discussion took place on the loan between the California State Grange and the Vacaville Senior Housing Corp. It was stated that in January 1985, the California State Grange issued a check in the amount of \$1,000 to Vacaville Senior Housing Corporation to be reimbursed. In September 1987, the State Master was authorized to loan \$10,000 at 9 1/4% interest to Vacaville Senior Housing Corporation for closing the application with HUD. What ensued was a \$5,000 loan at 7% interest for the closure. In October 1987, a \$1,000 check was received from Vacaville Senior Housing Corporation that was to be applied to the \$5,000 loan. Vacaville Senior Housing Corporation was under the understanding that the first \$1,000 was a donation from the California State Grange. After reviewing the minutes of the previous Executive Committee meetings, the Committee voted that the State Master inform Brother Ken Douglas, President of the Vacaville Senior Housing Corporation, of the \$6,000 loan and the sequence of events that took place in an attempt to recover the loan.

TRUST ACCOUNTS A summary sheet of the trust account balances was reviewed by the Committee. Discussion took place on the need to combine some of the smaller accounts into a super account for those Granges that do not have a charter. For those Granges that still possess a charter, we are sending them their interest income quarterly and their accrued interest annually. A suggestion was made to combine these accounts and put into \$50,000 accounts rather than \$100,000 accounts due to insurance liability and have them in short-term accounts. Sister Meece suggested that some of the accounts that are in Savings and Loan institutions be transferred to banks, and if possible, invest at our Grange credit unions.

With our total investments exceeding \$500,000 (CSG and GBO), the State Master stated that he may need some education on money management or hire someone that is knowledgeable in this field. It takes a lot of time and effort to ensure that these funds are getting the highest return. The State Master will consult with Brother Jim Smith who has knowledge in money management.

Discussion took place on the maintenance fee that was established for the trust accounts. Sister Meece stated that this has not been done yet and will be in effect as soon as the new computer program is on line.

HEALTH INSURANCE The employee health

insurance was discussed. The rates were increased 35% in September 1988. We have to maintain a minimum of ten people in order to receive a group plan. Sister Meece was instructed to check the possibility of having another group join our plan in order to maintain the program and to report back to the Committee. It was voted to have the California State Grange cover the 35% increase of the employees medical benefit, effective after the surplus of funds is expended.

STATE GRANGE CAR The State Master stated that the Grange car was in the garage at this time having the heater core replaced. He is also having the service department check the transmission hesitation that is occurring with the car, but not to fix it until discussed with him. There are 162,000 miles on the car. The State Master would like to know when it is time to start looking for a new car and where to look for one. The State Master would like someone else to purchase the car or to have someone go with him. It was suggested that the State Master start looking for a new car with the guidelines outlined in the Audit/Budget Committee report adhered to. Brother Squire offered to check the price of the car (that will be suggested to purchase by the State Master) with a company that he is familiar with so as to compare prices.

Discussion took place regarding the registration of the State Grange car in 1984, Brother Squire explained the situation again for the benefit of the two new members of the Executive Committee. Brother Squire mentioned the phone call that he had received regarding this situation prior to the State Convention. He felt compelled to follow through and provide some answers to the questions he received. He stated that a series of meetings were held at the convention with the then current Executive Committee members and two California State Grange staff members. He also explained that a letter was written to two Grange Federal Credit Unions regarding the matter of whether or not the State Grange car was used as collateral for a personal loan by the State Master. The response from one Grange Credit Union as "no" and the other Grange Credit Union could not divulge that kind of confidential information. The State Master expressed his resentment as to the way this situation was handled. He felt he should have been asked for an explanation regarding the issues himself and, if need be, he would then have his "personal file" opened by the credit union for the person questioning his personal business.

1988 NATIONAL CONVENTION UPDATE-ROSEMARY HANSEN Sister Hansen joined the Committee at this time and presented an update on the recently concluded 122nd National Grange Convention held in Redding. She felt that overall, the convention went very well. The minor problems that were encountered were solved as they arose. She praised those on her committees for their excellent assistance and to all those who donated to the success of this convention. The State Master praised Sister Hansen and Brother Arnie for their untiring efforts and superior organization. Sister Hansen submitted several bills to the Executive Committee for approval for payment. She stated that the following bills were owed by the National Grange but not as yet paid for: Youth tour lunch, Paulson's Catering for the 7th Degree lunch/coffee and Redding Welding for helium for the Junior Grange luncheon balloons. Sister Hansen is requesting that the bills owed by the National Grange be paid by the California State Grange at this time, if funds are available, with reimbursement to be provided by the National Grange so as to maintain a working rapport with the Redding businesses. Sister Hansen also stated that the California State Grange will receive back half of the registration fees that were collected at the National Session and the youth tour fee for covered expenses. Vouchers for the State committee chairmen for the various National committees were also submitted for payment. With no objection from the Committee, the above bills were approved for payment including the bills owed by the National Grange.

The State Master stated that he has received several letters from the National delegates regarding the warm welcome received, organization and success of the National Session. Sister Hansen stated that she believes Sister Judy Massabny, National Grange Director of Information and Convention Director, gave the ultimate compliment by stating that this was possibly the smoothest run convention that the National Grange has ever experienced.

The State Master discussed the vouchers received in his office from Brother Eugene Runyon, Lecturer; Sister Lillian Booth, Youth Director and a letter/voucher received this morning in his office from Sister Naomi Fletcher. The Committee discussed these vouchers at length. The Committee voted to purchase each of the department directors required meal function ticket and one banquet of their choice for two. The Committee also voted to allow any of the State Officers or Directors that were required to be in attendance at the National Session up to \$150 for meals as authorized by the 1988 National Grange Convention Chairman. In regards to the voucher/letter submitted by Sister Fletcher, the State Master explained he previously approved this voucher with the exception of the "Driver Fee" charged, totaling \$125. Instead, he granted mileage. In a letter addressed to the Executive Committee dated November 29, 1988 and a copy received in the Master's office December 7, 1988, Sister Fletcher is attempting to recover the "Driver Fee" of \$125 minus the mileage already expended to her. After much consideration, the Committee stated to deny the request of the "Driver Fec" resubmitted by Sister Naomi Fletcher.

Sister Hansen was thanked for her presentation and departed.

FILE CABINETS A request from Sister Naomi Fletcher, Legislative Department, regarding the need of filing cabinets, was discussed. It was suggested to put this item on hold until GBO has been inventoried.

GRANGERS BUSINESS ORGANIZATION The requests from Sister Mary Wendt and Brother Edwin Koster that were entertained at the October 17, 1988 meeting were again discussed. The depreciation information had been received as requested. The Committee voted to approve the purchase of the Olivetti typewriter by Sister Wendt at a price of \$50 and also approved the request of Brother Koster to purchase the executive desk and chair at a price of \$50. A similar request was received by Sister Carol Margues to purchase a brown arm chair. The Committee voted to approve the request of Sister Marques at no charge. Brother Clouse expressed an interest in purchasing the remainder of the chairs at \$5 each, if any are available.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS This item will be undertaken at the next meeting in order to secure more bids.

SACRAMENTO COUNTY GRANGE FEDERAL CREDIT UNION The State Master received a letter from Loretta Rogers, Manager, regarding the painting and carpet cleaning of the Credit Union that was performed in November. She is requesting that perhaps the California State Grange, as owners of the building, could reimburse the Credit Union for the work done or at least half of the cost. After discussion, it was voted to deny the carpet cleaning and painting request of Sacramento County Grange Federal Credit Union contingent upon our review of their rental agreement. As prior permission was not granted and due to the fact that GBO has been closed to the public for several months, the Committee felt obliged to take this position. The State Master is to make a report at the next meeting.

STATE SECRETARY'S REPORT Sister Marjorie Brown joined the Committee at this time. Due to time constraints, Sister Brown passed out the Membership Report and "Fact Sheet" for the 1988 Billing Service. Both items to be discussed at the January meeting.

Brother Joe Victorine and Brother Stephen Tait departed for the airport at this time.

COMMITTEE ON AFFILIATES A review of the Committee on Affiliates recommendation regarding LegalSaver and the deletion of the Caldwell Pre-Paid Legal Plan was discussed. It was voted to adopt the Committee on Affiliates recommendation dated December 5, 1988 as previously discussed and approved at the August 26, 1988 meeting. The State Master will send a memo to Sister Stefenoni regarding the above.

Meeting adjourned at 6:15 pm. The next meeting of the California State Grange Executive Committee is scheduled for January 6, 1989 at 9:00 am.

JANUARY 6, 1989 APPROVED 2/17/89

The meeting was called to order at 9:00 am with the Worthy State Master David Austin presiding.

Roll Call showed all members present: Johnny Squire, Joe Victorine, Stephen Tait, Bob Clouse and Jim Smith. Brother William Booth, Overseer and the State Master's secretary were also present.

The minutes of the December 7, 1988 meeting were reviewed and adopted as clarified.

STATE SECRETARY'S REPORT Sister Marjorie Brown, State Secretary, joined the Committee at this time. Sister Brown stated that she had received correspondence from the former Master of Johnstonville Grange regarding the closure of Johnstonville Grange. The State Master elaborated on the situation and stated that he has been in contact with the regional deputy regarding the Johnstonville Grange's leadership abandoning the Grange. The State Master would like permission to send a letter to all the members of Johnstonville Grange regarding this situation with a dues billing for their 1989 dues

and a meeting time, date and place when a vote will be taken on the situation. Discussion took place regarding selling their hall and move the Grange charter closer to the Susanville area. With no objection, the State Master will proceed in assisting Johnstonville Grange.

Sister Brown stated that there are 10 Granges (Subordinate and Pomona) that are delinquent two or more quarters. The State Master will contact the deputy regarding Stockton Grange as they are five quarters in arrears. In regard to Tolenas Grange, the State Master will also be in touch with the deputy. The State Master stated that Tolenas Grange has only eight members and is not legally a Grange. Discussion took place regarding merging Tolenas Grange with another Grange in the area. In regard to Palo Verde Subordinate Grange, the State Master stated that Deputy Pearl Zeck will not be able to visit the Grange until after the weather is more favorable. Membership reported to the National Grange for the September 30, 1988 quarter was 33,864 with 285 Subordinate Granges reporting. The figures show a loss of 65 members for the quarter.

BILLING SERVICE A "Factsheet" on the 1988 billing program was presented and reviewed. There were 35 Subordinate Granges participating with 6,126 billings prepared. Labor being the main concern, an increase of \$.10 per member was discussed. Sister Brown was instructed to provide an update on cost figures for the 1990 program. The Committee felt that the Granges should subsidize this program and not the State Grange.

ROSTER A suggestion was made that a printout of Secretaries and Masters be sent to the Secretaries of the Granges with an accompanying letter in lieu of a roster at this time and in July a decision could be made if a roster would be printed. Sister Brown stated that the IRS and Franchise Tax Board require a copy of the roster or listing of all the Granges in California. It was voted by the Committee that the State Secretary send a listing of the Masters and Secretaries and the meeting dates to make the necessary changes to the existing roster. Sister Brown stated that she has the balance of the ciphers to go out and would like to know who to send them to as she is receiving many changes. The Committee stated that as long as the Grange's December quarterly report was received, then to send to the officer of record.

Sister Brown stated that the quarterly report forms were in the process of being revised. A suggestion

was made if a column could be included on the quarterly report form entitled "Not obligated." These names would come from those applications that have not been obligated and then would be programmed and a listing sent to the insurance company and other affiliates. Another suggestion was made if a column could be included on the report form to check off whether or not the deputy has visited their Grange. The State Master will confer with the State Secretary before the quarterly reports are printed.

Sister Brown reported that a letter will be going out to the secretaries regarding the gross revenue of their Granges which is a requirement of the IRS and Franchise Tax Board. The Committee recognized the importance of this information and stressed that it be sent first class mail and under separate cover. Sister Brown was thanked for her report and departed.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS Three options were presented: 1. Continue the way we have, preprint in-house and job out the printing with delivery time of May/June at a cost of \$2,903--bid received from Valley Color Graphics, Inc. 2. Pre-print preparation in-house, hiring a part-time typesetter with delivery time of March/April, depending on variables such as cost of typesetter, the amount of time it will take to train someone, the speed of the typist and how much time Brother Hartz could devote to typing on the Journal during workday, cost of approximately \$3,603-\$4,103; and 3. bid received from Allied Printing of \$6,565 with cost including printing and typesetting and a delivery time of February/March, approximately 6-8 weeks. The State Master stated that the resolutions adopted at the convention are sent to the legislature and the Granges in the interim. After much consideration, the Committee voted to accept the proposal received from Valley Color Graphics, Inc. at the same cost as last year and to process the Journal of Proceedings as we have done in the past.

EXECUTONE The State Master stated he invited Ms. Berry, representative from Executone Information Systems, Inc. to make a presentation as per previous discussion regarding the telephone answering situation addressed in the CPA Internal Audit Report. Ms. Berry gave a thorough presentation on our current system, the proposed system and the automated attendant which our current system is capable of handling. The cost and payment procedure was also discussed. The Committee thanked Ms. Berry for her presentation and she departed. It was stated that a balance of \$1,900

remains on the current system and this balance would be added to the proposed \$5,300 cost. Until all alternatives have been reviewed, no action will be taken at this time regarding the Executone presentation.

SCHOLARSHIPS The scholarship program for the 1989-90 school year was discussed. A question was raised as to whether or not the Doris Deaver Memorial Scholarship have to be awarded in denominations of \$500 and do they have to be awarded to graduating high school seniors only. In researching the scholarship, no definite guidelines could be found. After much consideration, the Committee voted to award seven \$500 Doris Deaver Memorial Scholarship for the 1989 year to graduating seniors. In addition, the annual Peter Marinoff \$500 Scholarship will be awarded for a student enrolled in college as well as the two \$250 Peter Marinoff Memorial Scholarships, based on need, sponsored by the California State Grange Women's Activities Committee. A total of ten scholarships to be awarded this year. Additional research regarding the Doris Deaver Memorial Scholarship guidelines will be undertaken.

FINANCIAL REPORT Sister Pat Meece joined the Committee at this time and presented the Balance Sheet and Income Statements for the California State Grange for the 5-month period ending November 30, 1988. She stated that the two accounts (interest and principal) on the GBO notes receivable have been set up at the Sacramento County Grange Federal Credit Union as instructed. She stated that the CPA for GBO dropped by with an unexpected tax bill for GBO that had to be paid by the end of the year. Discussion took place regarding the Gibraltar Savings and the George Schlmeyer Memorial Scholarship Investment alternatives and scholarship Fund. guidelines will be presented at future meetings. The State Master stated that he will draw up guidelines regarding the George Schlmeyer Scholarship Fund for future discussion. Sister Meece stated that June 1987 was the last audit performed for GBO. The CPA, Mr. Bob Neves, has made a compilation (not an audit) of the GBO balance sheet as of November 30, 1988. Sister Meece stated this compilation will have to be verified by our CPA and recommends that this verification be done now rather than at the time of our audit. The Committee instructed the State Master to proceed with this verification from our CPA after review of a cost estimate. The Committee raised a question as to the additional expenses and if they

could be taken from the principal accounts.

EMPLOYEE HEALTH PLAN Sister Meece received information from Mr. Joe Hebert, representative of Blue Shield, regarding our group health plan as it relates to affiliate groups participating on the employee plan. It was indicated that any affiliate with the designation "Grange" could participate. The State Master stated that he will be in touch with Mr. Tyler Wilson, Regional Manager for Blue Shield, regarding this information.

RESTRICTED FUND BALANCES A summary of the "restricted fund" balances as of 11/30/88 was reviewed. Much discussion ensued regarding these "restricted funds" as the CPA, in the internal audit report, expressed concern of these accounts and their large balances. Sister Meece recommends that we keep the "extension fund" title intact, but to remove the "restricted" designation from it. The Committee voted to combine the education fund with the building fund and refer to it as the "office contingency fund" to satisfy the Good of the Order Report adopted at the 1988 convention in Redding. It was also voted by the Committee to designate the "extension fund" as an With no objection from the "unrestricted fund." Committee, the State Master will be in contact with Sister Beatie regarding the paper transfer from the GWA account to the general fund as per recommendation of the CPA.

SACRAMENTO COUNTY GRANGE FEDERAL CREDIT UNION As per a previous Executive Committee meeting, the State Master has reviewed the lease of the Sacramento County Grange Federal Credit Union as it relates to improvements to the building by the lessee. The State Master will inform the Credit Union that without prior written consent from the lessor, the California State Grange is unable to help.

STATEMENT OF PRINCIPLES A "statement of principles" regarding entrusted funds and restricted accounts under the direction of the California State Grange was reviewed by the Committee as prepared by Brother Jim Smith. Discussion regarding this issue will be reserved for the next meeting.

INTERNAL AUDIT CONTROL LETTER Sisters Pat Meece and Marjorie Brown joined the Committee at this time. The internal Audit Control letter was reviewed page by page. The situation regarding the telephone answering problem was ensued and referenced in the "Executone item" in these minutes. It was voted that a study of all incoming calls be kept for at least one month. The situation regarding the accounts receivable for resale supplies was addressed. A recommendation was made that the words "COD's for accounts over 90 days" should be printed on the invoice. Sister Brown stated that 19 accounts were 90 days overdue, 11 accounts were 60 days overdue and 9 accounts were 30 days overdue totaling \$664.68 due to the State Grange. In regards to the credit balances due to Granges or individuals, it was voted that any credit amount under \$2 on the books more than 90 days be automatically transferred into the PBC fund and anything over \$2 will be refunded to the Grange or individual at the time of the order. Regarding the cookbook accounts, Sister Meece has designed a form that will satisfy this concern.

The salary portion of the audit will be undertaken at a later date.

Regarding the Vacaville Autumn Leaves loan, this was taken care of in a letter to Mr. Ken Douglas, President, Vacaville Senior Housing Corporation, dated October 14, 1988 in an attempt to recover the loan repayment process and the sequence of events leading to the loan.

Concerns regarding the restricted accounts have been satisfied and referenced in these minutes.

A memo from Brother Jay Hartz addressed to the Executive Committee and the State Master regarding the internal audit control letter of September 17, 1988 was reviewed. In his memo, Brother Hartz expresses his concern with the results of the CPA evaluation as he never had an interview with the CPA. The State Master expressed concern of the degree of apathy this year from the CPA internal report.

YOUTH DIRECTOR REQUESTS Α. WESTERN STATES YOUTH REGIONAL CONFERENCE-The State Master stated that he has authorized the Youth Department to proceed and to keep him informed. B. REGIONAL DIRECTORS-The State Master stated that he has spoken with Sister Booth regarding the regional directors and suggested to her that the regional directors should be new appointments. State Master also discussed with Sister Booth the renaming of the "regional director" to "regional committee." The State Master stated that he will research the interpretation of "director" as it relates to compensation, mileage, etc.

Brother Jim Smith presented a program designed by Grange Mutual Life to donate \$10 for any Grange or member completing the form requesting more information on GML products. Brother Smith recommends the \$10 donations be placed in the Junior and Youth funds with the youth distributing the brochures. The State Master will present this project at the officers/directors meeting tomorrow and refer it to the membership department. The Committee expressed no objection to the program.

NATIONAL GRANGE COMPENSATION AGREEMENT The State Master received from the National Master the "compensation agreement" between the states and the National Grange. The State Master was instructed to sign the agreement.

LEGALSAVER PLAN The Committee on Affiliates had endorsed the LegalSaver Plan at an earlier date. LegalSaver is a prepaid legal plan which will save you money by reducing the high cost of legal services. Member and spouse and dependents are covered for one single premium of \$69 per year. LegalSaver has promised to donate \$10 to the State Grange for every member who enrolls in the program. The State Master would like to see this donation given back to the member or to their Grange. It could be used in their community promoting community service. With no objection, the State Master will be in touch with Brother Runyon, Lecturer, regarding this suggestion.

CSG LECTURER REQUESTS The State Master received a telephone call from Brother Runyon regarding his conference schedule for 1989. Brother Runyon would like the Committee to consider the following: approximately 20 conferences and printing costs of \$600 for a Lecturer's manual for a total cost of \$1,600. He is anticipating a few more motel stops and possible 2-6 more conferences. After consideration, the Committee voted to allow the monetary request of Brother Runyon for his conferences.

The State Master reviewed the outline submitted by Sister Lillian Booth, Youth Director, regarding the "Youth Recruiter Contest." The State Master stated that he has authorized Sister Booth to proceed with the contest as it is a National Grange Youth Department contest. The youth department will begin this contest at the February conference.

Brother Squire inquired as to the status of receiving the By-Laws for Ukiah Autumn Leaves from the Secretary of State's office. The State Master stated that he has not yet contacted her office. Rollover dates on the trust accounts were also inquired about and the State Master stated that Sister Meece is quite busy at this time and will have them at a future meeting. Vouchers for the National Session for officers was also inquired about and the State Master stated that vouchers were not sent out to the officers, but that they were available and that a letter or some form of correspondence would suffice as request for payment.

The next scheduled meeting of the California State Grange Executive Committee will be on Friday, February 17, 1989 in Santa Rosa beginning at 9:00 am. Meeting adjourned at 6:10 pm.

FEBRUARY 17, 1989 APPROVED 4/7/89

The meeting was called to order at 9:00 am on Friday, February 17, 1989 at the Sebastopol Grange Hall. All members present except Stephen Tait and William Booth. Taking the minutes was Jay Hartz, California Grange News Editor.

Minutes of the last Executive Committee meeting were read by the Committeemen. Aspects of the last meeting, including the Johnstonville Grange situation (in regards to their dues structure); insurance benefits for employees; a Journal of Proceedings update; and the on-going phone survey were discussed and clarified. The minutes of the last meeting were then approved as read.

Stephen Tait joined the committee at this time (9:20 am).

STOCKTON GRANGE The Stockton Grange per capita situation was discussed. The State Master said that both he and the Deputy have had communication with Stockton Grange, but no answer. The committee asked to be kept advised of the situation.

It was requested that four items be added to the agenda:

A. Kingsburg Grange

B. Executive Committee Minutes in the Grange News

C. The Computer Assessment

D. The insurance plan regarding GBO employees.

EMPLOYEE HEALTH PLAN The employee health plan was discussed. It was explained that to be eligible for coverage, a person needs to be employed by the Grange and that affiliate groups did not qualify under this restriction, as previously believed. State Master will have the insurance representative present at the next meeting regarding the California State Grange employee health plan. UKIAH AUTUMN LEAVES The minutes of the Ukiah Autumn Leaves were reviewed and discussed by the Committee.

VACAVILLE AUTUMN LEAVES Discussion took place regarding Vacaville Autumn Leaves. It was decided that a resolution would be developed and presented to the delegates at convention regarding the Vacaville Autumn Leaves retirement facility and the California State Grange loan of \$1,000.

COY BAKER RADIO PROPOSAL At this time, the State Master played a tape prepared by Mr. Coy Baker as a demo for proposed radio spots which would focus on the Grange and its policies. The State Master explained that what was envisioned was a program similar to the one Adrien DeVries produces for the Washington State Grange. The spots would be purchased by local advertisers and run during the day and evening hours, not as PSA's or early morning filler.

The Executive Committee discussed the proposal in light of the Good of the Order final report and their recommendation to expand the image of the Grange through expanded media use. The Committee voted that Mr. Baker formulate a written proposal complete with an outline of the project including time factors, cost factors, details of both the content and method of producing and delivering the tapes and the details of selling the time to local merchants and have ready for presentation at the next meeting. Also included should be a sample contract which gives the State Grange rights of editorial content approval and the right to approve sponsorship.

FINANCIAL REPORT The Committee studied the financial report furnished by Pat Meece, CSG Bookkeeper. The State Master stated that all California State Grange accounts payable are paid. The State Master also explained that the General Fund was out about \$7,000, cash flow, which went to pay for fees and expenses in the dissolution of GBO accounts. The committee discussed the GBO closure and transfer agreement and the expenses of which they believed would be paid from GBO funds and not State Grange funds. The manner of payment from GBO to CSG was discussed.

The Committee asked if these figures (GBO) had been checked by the CPA. Master Austin produced a letter from Seely Accounting Corporation (CSG CPA) which made a bid of between \$500 and \$1,000 to audit the transfer of funds and GBO's final financial statement. After discussing the proposal, it was voted to accept the bid from Seely Accounting

Corporation for auditing the GBO dissolution and absorption by the California State Grange.

The letter from the GBO to the Sacramento Grange Credit Union concerning the transfer of share Accounts #2341-204 (\$65,035.95) and #2341-006 (\$32,256.94) from GBO to the CSG was read. The Committee felt that a resolution should be drafted and presented at the next convention allowing the CSG to recoup the expenses involved in absorbing GBO liabilities from the principal of one of these accounts.

Master Austin expressed his belief that an interim committee should be appointed to study the procedure in awarding the George Sehlmeyer Memorial fund scholarship(s) and make a presentation. All agreed, but no formal action taken.

The Committee asked about the monies still on deposit with the various Savings and Loans. The problems with S & L's in general, and in California particularly, were discussed. The possibility of depositing in Grange credit unions was discussed, but it was pointed out that they were not paying the interest that banks and S & L's were. The opinion that safety was more important than interest rates was expressed.

It was voted that Austin, Smith and Meece formulate a plan for protecting and investing the monies currently on deposit at various S & L's and then implementing the plan as soon as feasible, with the restriction that no single account would amount to over \$50,000.

STATEMENT OF PRINCIPLES SUMMARY A discussion of the "Statement of Principles" regarding the trust accounts (previously presented) followed. It was voted to amend Paragraph 5 of the "Statement of Principles" by adding the provision "Any withdrawals by a trust beneficiary may be deferred up to 30 days with the trust beneficiary paying any withdrawal penalties involved."

The meaning of Paragraph 7 was discussed. Did "5%" refer to the interest or the principal? Austin stated that he would get clarification of this prior to publishing the principles in the minutes. It was voted to adopt the "Statement of Principles" as amended, and have them entered into the minutes of the Executive Committee (statement immediately following this days' minutes).

Attention was again focused on the spreadsheet information on the various S & L accounts. It was brought out that the interest rate from the credit union was not included and that future reports should include that information as well. SALARY INCREASE REQUEST The request of Pat Meece, CSG Bookkeeper, for a raise as remuneration for the increased workload brought about by the GBO's dissolution was discussed. It was stated that the job paid for eight hours, regardless of what is done within those eight hours. No action taken.

The billings received from Seely Accounting Corporation for training Sister Meece was explained by the State Master.

NATIONAL GRANGE CONVENTION The 1988 National Grange Convention, Income and Expense material, was discussed. Income over expenses was \$3,911.00 and this amount is expected to be placed in the Conference Center Fund, assuming no further National Grange Convention expenses surface.

KINGSBURG GRANGE Brother Squire brought up a problem encountered by Kingsburg Grange. They were exploring the possibility of selling their Grange hall and had asked for information that would assist them in making a decision. Master Austin stated that the Master of Kingsburg Grange should write a formal request to the State Master for information, then the State Master could officially inform the Master of Kingsburg Grange of the procedure as outlined in Grange Law for the selling of their hall. It was pointed out that no decision to sell the hall had been made by Kingsburg Grange and all they wanted to know were the consequences (tax liability, etc.) of such a sale. They also wanted help from the California State Grange in making sure any contract was legal, etc. Master Austin explained that the procedures for such a sale were given in the National Digest and these are the rules that must be followed. Austin said that he would be in contact with the Master of the Kingsburg Grange and then would set up a meeting with their membership to discuss the alternatives, if needed.

STATE SECRETARY'S REPORT The State Secretary's membership report was discussed at this time. The role played by affiliate representatives in recruiting members was discussed, with the point being made that the ultimate responsibility for maintaining a recruit's interest in the Grange is that of the local Grange.

It was pointed out that the word "demit" may not be understood by some of our members, particularly those who are also Masons, where "demit" means withdrawal, not transfer. It was felt a word such a "transfer" should be used so as to clarify its use. Discussion on those suspended and those who withdrew resulted in a consensus that local leadership should spend more time in working to keep the members we already have. Master Austin stated that this topic will be a feature of the upcoming Leadership Seminars which would begin on March 18, 1989 at Garden Grove Grange.

Master Austin then explained the concept of the State Lecturer's Department working with the CSG in putting on four Leadership Seminars this year as a pilot program, then next year, working to combine the Lecturer's Conferences into a Leadership Conference and conducting the seminars statewide. Austin explained that some affiliates had indicated they would help underwrite the conference expense by providing funds for a luncheon program. It was requested that those attending the seminars this year be asked to fill out an evaluation sheet as a means of providing feedback and direction for continuing next year.

The billing service program was discussed. After review of the report of last year's program and projections for this year's program, it was voted to increase the charge for this service to 55 cents per member billed.

SACRAMENTO GRANGE CREDIT UNION The request from the Sacramento Grange Credit Union to paint the ceiling (at expense of CSG) and to install an inside window at their expense was discussed. The Master pointed out that the lease had a provision stating that alterations and repairs would be accomplished at the expense of the leasee. As to the painting request, he suggested that he explore the possibility that a cleaning of the ceiling be attempted first, as in the past, the "soot" generated by the heating system could be cleaned successfully. As to the window, he stated that he would have to check on permits and any possible structural problems before making any recommendations. As the credit union is, in effect, being subsidized by the Grange through favorable leasing rates, the painting expense should be born by the credit union.

It was voted that Master Austin write a letter conveying the Committee's feeling on the painting. The letter would also state that the window could be constructed as long as any construction meets all applicable codes and all necessary permits and inspections were secured by the Credit Union.

Rental of GBO office space was discussed. Austin explained that a major handicap was the lack of parking. He said that plans were being studied to identify the cars of tenants and those permitted parking and to tow away those that did not belong on the lot.

DEPARTMENT UCDMC PURCHASING LEASE The proposal by the UCMD to expand their office space into the warehouse area now being rented by the Medical School was brought up for discussion. The bid received from the Discovery Construction Austin stated that it Company was reviewed. appeared to be very high and that further bids would be sought. It was the consensus of the Committee that the cost of the remodeling should be borne by the lessee, but that the method of amortizing the cost could be negotiated. Austin was directed to get further bids and to negotiate recovering the cost of construction with UCMD.

AG IN THE CLASSROOM REQUEST The request from Sister Naomi Fletcher to attend the "Ag in the Classroom" meeting in Sparks, NV. was discussed. It was voted to provide expenses not to exceed \$300 (all inclusive) for Naomi Fletcher to attend the meeting.

EMPLOYEE SALARIES The Executive Committee discussed the salaries of the employees. Current By-Laws, Section 16.1, was discussed as it applied to officers and employees. While all agreed on the intent of the current By-laws, it was argued that what was written did not convey that intent, and that a resolution was needed to clarify the authority of the Executive Committee to grant a cost of living adjustment of the elected Officers of the State Grange.

It was voted to give all staff employees a 4% cost of living increase, effective January 1, 1989.

It was voted to give Naomi Fletcher a raise in salary of \$200 per month, effective March 1, 1989.

It was voted to delay the cost of living adjustment for all elected State Officers until the 1989 convention. At that time, a 4% cost of living adjustment, retroactive to January 1, 1989, would be requested via delegate action.

It was voted to submit an amendment, revising the By-laws which would expressly allow the Executive Committee to grant a cost of living adjustment to elected officers, at the 1989 State Session.

The GWA Financial Statement was reviewed and discussed. No action taken.

The Legislative Department's new Granger Action Plan-the GAP supplement to the Grange News was discussed.

Brother Squire brought up the reporting of the

Executive Committee minutes in the Grange News. He said that he wanted to be sure that the reporting of the minutes would be accurate.

COMPUTER ASSESSMENT Brother Squire said that he had met Mr. Tom Sawyer at a Grange function and that Mr. Sawyer was in the business of making computer need analyses for companies. He said that he had received some information from Mr. Sawyer, but had inadvertently left it at home and would forward the information.

Brother Smith introduced the Grange Mutual Life's "Wanted" poster program which would provide a \$10 "reward" to the Junior and Youth programs for leads on the various products of GML. The program would be introduced the following day at the Young Adults Conference. He explained that if the program were successful this year that GML might repeat the program in following years--each time targeting a different activity to receive the "reward." It was voted to sanction the "Wanted" poster program as presented.

Meeting adjourned at 4:15 pm. The next meeting of the Executive Committee was set for 9:00 am, April 7, 1989, at the California State Grange Headquarters in Sacramento.

STATEMENT OF PRINCIPLES

REGARDING ENTRUSTED FUNDS AND RESTRICTED ACCOUNTS UNDER THE DIRECTION OF THE CALIFORNIA STATE GRANGE

1. Interest yield shall be maximized consistent with minimum risk.

2. Safety of principal shall be the primary concern with interest yield secondary.

3. Small trust accounts will be combined into common trusts for the purposes of economy, efficiency of administration and possible higher interest yields.

4. All monies will be deposited in federally insured accounts with financial institutions that are judged financially sound per their current financial statement.

5. Safety and diversification shall be attained by depositing no more than \$50,000 in any one account, in any one financial institution. Maturity dates of deposit vehicles shall be on a staggered basis, with

one or more maturing each month. This will avoid surrender charges should a trust beneficiary decide to withdraw at a financially inopportune time. Any withdrawals by a trust beneficiary may be deferred up to 30 days with any trust beneficiary paying any withdrawal penaltics.

6. A composite interest yield shall be calculated on all deposited funds and credited to each beneficiary account on a proportionate basis as their deposited funds relate to the total of all deposited funds under direction of California State Grange. Interest to Granges with current charters will be paid quarterly. Interest on Grange accounts with no current charter will be accrued and compounded. Interest on accounts where interest and income are to go the California State Grange general fund will be so disbursed.

7. A maintenance fee of 5% of interest shall be deducted by California State Grange for administration of the funds under their direction except for those accounts where interest or other income has been authorized to go to the general fund of the California State Grange.

8. All funds shall be handled in accordance with the "prudent man" rule first set forth in Massachusetts over a century ago which is quoted below:

"All that can be required of a trustee is that he shall conduct himself faithfully and exercise a sound discretion. He is to observe how men of prudence, discretion and intelligence manage their own affairs, not in regard to speculation, but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income, as well as the probable safety of capital to be invested."

APRIL 7, 1989 APPROVED 5/19/89

The meeting was called to order at 9:00 am on Friday, April 7, 1989 at the State Grange Headquarters with the Worthy State Master David Austin presiding.

Roll call showed all members present: Joe Victorine, Jim Smith, Bob Clouse, Stephen Tait and Johnny Squire. Also present were William Booth, Overseer and the State Master's secretary.

The minutes of the February 17, 1989 meeting were discussed and adopted as read.

UKIAH AUTUMN LEAVES, INC. The minutes and financial statements for the months of January 1989 and February 1989 were reviewed by the Committee. It was stated that the minutes were more comprehensive with information. The Committee suggested a letter be sent extending their appreciation to the secretary of Ukiah Autumn Leaves for her efforts. The Committee inquired as to the status of obtaining the By-Laws of Ukiah Autumn Leaves. The State Master stated he was able to secure Ukiah's "Articles of Incorporation" from the office of the Secretary of State. The Committee's concern in securing the by-laws is the two additional members that have been elected to the CSG Executive Committee. It may be necessary to amend the bylaws of Ukiah Autumn Leaves to include the two additional members. The State Master will request a current copy of the by-laws from the Secretary of Ukiah Autumn Leaves.

PMI DENTAL CARE PLAN The State Master received a letter from PMI Dental Health Care regarding an increase in the CSG Group Dental Plan. The renewal date of the contract is May 1, 1989. With no objection, the State Master was directed to sign the renewal contract.

MARINOFF INSURANCE AGENCY The State Master reported he received a telephone call from Sister Dorothy DeAvila of the Marinoff Agency last evening regarding the status of their insurance company. Sister DeAvila informed the State Master, effective April 7, 1989, the Marinoff Agency will cease to exist. The State Master stated that First Farwest Insurance went into receivership in the state of Oregon in late February 1989. He further stated that "our people" will remain intact. It will be a direct business--no agent will be involved. Marinoff Agency has been associated with the California State Grange for 33 years.

It was stated that the state of Oregon will honor the claims in California. Brother Clouse stated that he spoke with Sister DeAvila in regards to securing a list of those individuals in California who have a First Farwest plan in an effort to try to find a company that we could roll them into. Sister DeAvila said there is no such list, that the Grange agents would have a better idea as they would have written the plans. It was also suggested that a notification be placed in the Grange News requesting those members who have First Farwest to contact the State Grange immediately. A suggestion was made that both State Granges (Oregon and California) try to somehow solve the situation. It was also suggested that a letter be sent to the Granges with notification of the situation and remove the First Farwest information from the COA notebooks. The State Master stated he would be in contact with the insurance commissioner of Oregon and would also notify the Granges, CGIAO President and the Committee on Affiliates (COA) Chairman of the situation.

TELEPHONE CALLS-SURVEY The Committee reviewed the compilation of the telephone survey. The State Master stated that another survey should be conducted at a later date, possibly once a quarter, to get a true census.

EMPLOYEE HEALTH PLAN Mr. Dale Waters, Benefit Insurance Services, was introduced to the Committee. Sister Pat Meece, CSG Bookkeeper, also joined the Committee at this time. The State Master explained that our group does not meet the 10 employee requirement at the present time. Our group does not include the Sacramento Grange Credit Union employees nor the recently dissolved GBO employees as in previous years. A group insurance proposal for the California State Grange was distributed outlining a list of several plans with various benefits and premiums. Mr. Waters recommends terminating the current Blue Shield plan and go into the Foundation III Plan. This plan can be issued with 3-9 employees, but is not guaranteed issued (medical history application will have to be completed). Our current plan includes a \$250 deductible and the employee's portion of payment is 80%. Mr. Waters stated the Foundation III Plan is definitely an upgrade to the current plan with less premium. Mr. Waters explained that our board of directors and/or current paid directors could be included on this plan to maintain a 10 employee requirement and guaranteed issue. Mr. Waters stated he will work on figures for the proposed Foundation III Plan and will report back to the State Master. Our current Blue Shield plan is up for renewal in September. Mr. Waters was thanked for his time and presentation.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT Sister Meece presented two Financial Statements. One with the overview of January as it shows with an excess revenue of \$11,688.42. The second statement includes eight months ending February 28, 1989 with excess expenses over revenue of \$3,364.25.

Sister Meece stated that the account at Gibraltar Savings was in the amount of \$115,123 as of the end of March. She stated this was a restricted account and inquired if the interest was to be also. The Committee's response was yes. She suggested that these funds should be deposited in another financial institution that is insured as it exceeds the \$100,000 limit. After discussion, it was voted for safety reasons to coincide with the "Statement of Principles" that we split the entrusted account at Gibraltar Savings into a separate financial institution. Sister Meece stated there are two share accounts at the Sacramento Grange Credit Union. The principal is only restricted, not the interest. After discussion of these accounts, it was voted that we place the Sacramento County Grange Federal Credit Union share accounts into CD's of amounts as per the "Statement of Principles."

TRUST ACCOUNTS As voted at the previous meeting, Brother Jim Smith, Sister Meece and the State Master met to formulate a plan for protecting and investing the monies currently on deposit at various S & L's. The State Master will be setting up the first common trust account of \$50,000 next week. Sister Meece stated there was no new information on the spreadsheet regarding the trust accounts. She explained that there was an inordinate amount of work at this time due to the inheritance of the GBO assets and liabilities. She further stated that some things have had to remain "on hold" as she has spent many unexpected hours researching and correcting tax forms filed by GBO. She apologized to the Committee for this holdup. The Committee asked if an assistant would be in order and she explained that the time involved in training someone would be more time consuming. Committee asked if the workload would decrease as time passes and she responded, ves. The expenses incurred since the inheritance of GBO was discussed. It was stated that approximately \$28,000 has been expended with approximately \$10,000 of that being borne by the California State Grange, through December 1988,

Sister Meece stated that Ronnie Seely, CPA, is working on the verification of the GBO compilation as prepared by Bob Neves, CPA for GBO. Ronnie has sent out the letters to the financial institutions asking for verification of account amounts.

Sister Meece stated that the notes receivable have been set up into two accounts as requested: one for principal and one for interest.

EASTER YOUTH CONFERENCE An update on the recently concluded Easter Youth Conference was given. It was stated the conference was a complete success with approximately 71 registrants. One of the biggest conferences in several years. It was noted many of the registrants were youth. An accounting sheet of the conference was provided for the committee. It was noted that Grange Mutual Life and the California Grange Insurance Agents Organization (CGIAO) group had donated \$300 and \$250 respectively.

YOUNG ADULTS CONFERENCE UPDATE An update on the Young Adults Conference was given. It was stated that this conference was also a success with approximately 61 registered. Attendance was up from last year. Donations of \$300 and \$250 were received from Grange Insurance Association and the CGIAO respectively. An accounting sheet of the conference was reviewed. The Young Adults Conference showed a slim profit with the Easter Youth Conference being subsidized by the California State Grange. Registration fee for both conferences was \$35. The State Master stated he felt that the registration fee for both conferences should be kept to a minimum as well as Grange camp. He feels that these conferences are beneficial for training our youth and leadership.

After discussion of the telephone census and report of the bookkeeper, it was voted that Pat Meece be relieved of the telephone answering rotation of the employees.

SALE OF KBK OIL COMPANY The State Master reported he received a telephone call from Mr. James Davison of KBK Oil Company in Fresno. Mr. Davison explained that someone was interested in buying his company. The State Master told Mr. Davison to proceed with the sale of his business as he is a renter only. Mr. Wes Reeder, Buyer of KBK Oil, was told to carry on with the rental lease for one year with option to buy by the State Master. A letter was received on March 22 regarding the sale to Mr. Wes Reeder. The letter stated the company had been sold effective March 15, 1989. The lease on the property expires on April 30, 1989 and Mr. Reeder has agreed to accept responsibility for the month of April and will negotiate a new lease after that date. It was stated there was no insurance coverage on this property. After much discussion, it was voted that liability coverage be obtained by the California State Grange on the Fresno (GBO) property.

UCDMC EXPANSION BIDS The State Master obtained three bids for the expansion project of the UCDMC Purchasing Department (GBO Building). The School of Medicine who rents the warehouse is willing to release some of their space as long as the Purchasing Department finds them a like amount of space somewhere else. The first bid received from Discovery Construction was for \$12,800. The second bid, received verbally from Steve's Construction, stated he could not do the job. The last bid, received from Dennis Bender Construction was for \$12,350 plus permits, taxes, etc. The State Master stated the expansion was for a 16 x 18 foot room. The cost of the expansion will have to initially be borne by the California State Grange, but will be amortized into the Purchasing Department's lease. The State Master will have to present alternatives to the UCDMC Purchasing Department. The only request the UCDMC Purchasing Department has it that the leases be co-terminus. The State Master will work on this situation and will keep the Executive Committee informed.

DEAF **ACTIVITIES** COMMITTEE **REQUESTS** The Committee reviewed the three requests from the Deaf Activities Committee: 1. Continue the sponsoring of the Dogs for the Deaf Program at the San Francisco SPCA; 2. Create Your Own Poster Contest-recommending instead of cash awards to secure long-term bonds with face value of \$75, \$50 and \$25 for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place awards and additional prizes to include ribbons for same and certificates for all participants, Sign-a-Song books for three classes, NAD Cards for three classes, Deaf Activities buttons for all participants, and if possible, cookie cutters for three classes-total approximately \$200, including bonds; and 3. Coloring Books-The Deaf Activities Committee recommends publishing the 1989 poster contest winners and selected other posters in a 1990 coloring book much as the 1988-89 book. The remaining coloring books will be disbursed at the State Fair before publication of a new book. Approximate cost of \$800 for 7,000 books.

Sister Fletcher was called in to clarify the Dogs for the Deaf request. After discussion it was voted to approve all the requests of the Deaf Activities Committee, if the funds are available.

CSG BY-LAWS SECTION 16.1 Section 16.1 of the CSG Constitution and By-laws Revised 1988, regarding elected officers, was discussed. Brother Smith stated that after the previous meeting, he did some deep soul-searching regarding the decision the Committee had made in delaying the cost of living adjustment for all elected State Officers until the 1989 Convention. He stated the word "fixed" as stated in the first paragraph of 16.1 bothered him. After a few brief comments, Brother Smith suggested that the Committee reconsider their previous decision and to bring the issue to a vote again. With no objection it was moved, seconded and carried to be brought back for a vote. It was voted that a cost of living adjustment be granted to all full-time State Officers (same 4% as granted employees) retroactive to January 1, 1989. Brother Victorine cast a nay vote.

A suggestion was made that a survey be conducted of the other State Granges regarding their State Officers and Directors salaries.

A statement was made by Brother Squire regarding the previous decision (at his recommendation) of combining the State Secretary's compensation with additional duties compensation into one salary had been a mistake. He stated that down the line a secretary may be elected to the office that does not reside in Sacramento. He also commented on a merit compensation for CSG full-time employees.

A suggestion was made that a section needs to be added to the Secretary duties as outlined in Section 13.11 (g) of the California State Grange By-laws in order to clarify the qualifications necessary.

STATE SECRETARY'S REPORT Sister Brown joined the Committee at this time. The State Master relayed the decision made by the Committee to grant a cost of living adjustment to full-time State Officers. Sister Brown thanked the Committee for their reconsideration of this issue. Sister Brown stated that written membership reports would not be presented at this time because there are too many quarterly reports outstanding. Sister Brown distributed the revised quarterly report forms to the Committee for their review. A few minor changes have been made. She reported that two Subordinate Granges have surrendered their charters-Kelseyville Grange in Lake County and Castle Grange in Shasta County. Kelseyville consolidated with Clearlake Grange and Castle members demitted randomly. Sister Brown asked Brother Smith to report on the status of Clayton Grange and Pleasant Hill Grange. The response was they have gone defunct. The State Master stated that a blanket demit could be issued for each Grange into a nearby Grange. Brother Smith said this would be the best solution. Davis Creek Grange and Ono Grange are slowly catching up on their delinquent reports. Tolenas Grange is still not reporting. Solano Pomona Grange is five quarters in arrears and Trinity Pomona Grange is one quarter in arrears with this quarter now due.

Sister Brown stated that supply audits will be sent out this month on unpaid balances, adhering to the decisions made at a previous Executive Committee meeting. There are 23 accounts over 90 days, eight accounts over 60 days and 19 accounts 30 days or less. The form "Applications Held Over 6 Months" was also reviewed. Sister Brown reports there have been many of these forms returned by the Granges.

STOCKTON GRANGE UPDATE Brother Clouse gave a brief update on Stockton Grange as he had attended (representing the State Master) the April 2nd meeting called by Deputy Manuel Luis. He stated there were three members at the meeting (a couple and mother) in addition to the Deputy and his spouse. Those present sounded eager and willing to assist in salvaging Stockton Grange. Those members present, with the aid of the Deputy, will personally telephone each member requesting their presence at a meeting scheduled for May 25, 1989 at Ripon Grange. They even talked about calling nonmembers. This will be a meeting to discuss the future of Stockton Grange. Brother Clouse stated he offered the Ca. State Grange's assistance in sending out a follow-up letter to the phone calls. The three members present said they did not know the "mess" Stockton Grange was in until they received the notice of the April 2 meeting. Perhaps other members do not know either. Those present felt that the Grange could be pulled back together. The biggest hurdle will be a place to hold their regular meetings.

JOHNSTONVILLE GRANGE UPDATE Sister Brown stated that a letter had been sent by the Ca. State Grange to all members of Johnstonville Grange requesting their dues payment be sent to the Ca. State Grange Secretary. There were 165 billed and only 78 have paid to date. Sister Brown suggests a second dues billing notice be sent. Sister Brown was instructed to proceed as any Subordinate Grange Secretary would. The State Master stated that Brother George Sawyer, Region 1 Deputy, will be setting up a meeting regarding this situation with Johnstonville Grange. Sister Brown reported that she has received several phone calls from members inquiring as to the status of the Grange and what is going to happen.

LEADERSHIP SEMINAR EVALUATION The State Master provided a brief update on the recently concluded leadership seminar held at Grover City Grange. The State Master, State Secretary, State Lecturer and Junior Director participated in the seminar. A presentation by each officer/director was given to the group at large followed by lunch and concluding with roundrobin workshops. Brother Runyon expressed his comments regarding the seminar in a letter to the State Master, stating this was one of the most successful seminars that he has seen the State Grange present. The verbal comments he received were very flattering and positive.

KINGSBURG GRANGE UPDATE The State Master and Executive Committee received a letter and resolution from Kingsburg Grange regarding the sale of real property (Grange hall). It stated that the taxes and insurance on the building were high and the building was old and needed many repairs and the members now attending are not physically able to make the repairs nor conduct the fundraisers for the necessary money and suggests accepting the offer of purchase through Kingsburg Realty for the hall and property in the cash sum of \$75,000. At this time; however, it is not known if Kingsburg Grange will remain chartered. Kingsburg Grange will keep the State Grange informed on the progress of this transaction.

DELTA KING The State Master stated he received a request from the Sacramento Delta king regarding the sponsorship of a "frog jumping" contest. On May 20th, in an official ceremony, the Delta King will be re-christened and will include a day full of various activities. The California State Grange is being asked to sponsor the "frog jumping" contest. Brother Mike Fletcher is conducting a frog jumping contest at the Orangevale Youth Fair and thought the Delta King contest would be advantageous for the Ca. State Grange--excellent publicity. Any costs involved in sponsoring the contest would be borne by the entrants. It was voted that the Ca State Grange sponsor the frog jumping contest along with guidelines discussed here today.

1989 CONVENTION UPDATE The State Master briefly updated the Committee on his recent trip to San Bernardino to discuss convention plans. A tentative program was reviewed. This year our new schedule dates will be in effect.

MISCELLANEOUS It was voted that the Worthy State Master appoint an interim committee on the George Sehlmeyer Scholarships and report back to the CSG Executive Committee at the July meeting. Suggested committee members: Johnny Squire, Edwin Koster, Mary Wendt, Youth Director, YAC Chairman and Youth Committee Chairman.

STATE GRANGE CAR The letter sent to the Committee by the State Master regarding the purchase of a new car was discussed. The State Master stated he called the Sacramento Grange Credit Union regarding the blue book selling price and reports low blue book is \$2,950 up to 130,000 miles. Current miles on the car-169,800. The State Master stated that the trade-in offer was \$100. He received one offer of \$700 from a Ford dealer employee. It was denied. A suggestion to advertise the car in the Grange News was made. Better to sell to a deserving member for \$700 unless a better price can be obtained on the outside.

Brother Squire stated he didn't recall the Executive Committee's approval given to purchase the car. His concern is that the decision was taken from the hands of the Executive Committee. A previous decision to start the process of looking for a new car had been made, but not the actual purchase. The intent was to "look around" for the best quality deal. The Executive Committee should authorize such a major purchase and be kept informed of the transaction. The State Master explained that on a recent trip to San Bernardino, the experience of adding power steering fluid about every 100 miles and the transmission acting mysteriously was the first time he has doubted the security and safety of his travels. The State Master apologized for not keeping the Committee fully informed.

Meeting adjourned at 5:20 pm. The next meeting is scheduled for May 19, 1989 to begin at 8:00 am.

Meeting called to order by Master Austin at 8:20 am with all members present. Visiting members included Katie Squire, Lois Smith and Ruby Tait. Minutes were recorded by Naomi Fletcher in the morning and Marjorie Brown in the afternoon, due to the illness of the State Master's Secretary.

Minutes of the previous meeting were approved as read. The agenda was reviewed and a few items were added. Questions arose regarding First Farwest Insurance and its future. Worthy Master stated we should wait until the Committee on Affiliates reported this afternoon.

UKIAH AUTUMN LEAVES Several questions arose regarding the newly revised by-laws of Ukiah Autumn Leaves. It was noted that the Board of Directors does not specifically include any or all of the Executive Committee of the State Grange in the new By-laws. The Worthy Master will determine why this is so, what is the CSG's legal responsibility at this time regarding Ukiah Autumn Leaves, and will secure a copy of the Vacaville Autumn Leaves Bylaws for comparison purposes. HUD may have a say in the matter, and this will also be determined. The Worthy Master will be working with Overseer Bill Booth regarding review of the By-Laws. A question also arose regarding the validility of the 40-year payoff agreement with Ukiah Autumn Leaves and the State Grange as sponsor. It was voted that the Worthy Master compare the original HUD requirements with current Articles of Incorporation and By-Laws of Ukiah Autumn Leaves and to report back at a later date.

EMPLOYEE HEALTH PLAN The Worthy Master stated that as of May 1, 1989, the Employee Health Benefit Plan will be carried by Foundation Health. It was noted that two Directors and one Officer whose name and salary appear on the DE-3 Form were added to qualify for group status.

COMPUTER UPDATE Jay Hartz joined the Committee at this time and reviewed the status of the current computers. He stated that the Northstar Advantage in the Legislative Department has been in and out of service the past few months, and most recently lost about 350 address changes. The computer typesetter is currently being repaired. The Northstar Advantage in the News Department is currently going through "Headcrash restart" which basically means we may loose all the Grange membership records if the "crash" cannot be electronically repaired. Brother Hartz then presented several bids secured from various companies ranging from \$38,000 to over \$60,000 as recommended in the Good of the Order Committee's final report. The Executive Committee then requested a package of information regarding warranties and installation time. Several financial questions arose that will be directed to Pat Meece.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT Pat Meece joined the Committee at this time to review the financial records of the State Grange. Several questions arose regarding trust accounts of the various Granges. Pat Meece requested combining the various smaller accounts into one larger account, allowing interest to grow quicker and allowing for the administrative fee and then interest to be distributed by CSG to the proper accounts.

There was concern over the "Statement of Principles" recently adopted by the Committee. It was voted to change #5 of the "Statement of Principles Regarding Entrusted Funds and Restricted Accounts Under the Direction of the CSG" to state in the first sentence: "Safety and diversification shall be attained by depositing no more than the federally insured maximum amount in any one financial institution."

In regard to the GBO actual and budgeted amounts listed on the Income and Expense report, Pat Meece explained that there were unexpected costs in winding down the business of GBO, as well as income that was not included in the budget. Accounting procedures deal with actuals, not anticipated information.

Questions regarding the computer system were directed at this time to Pat Meece. A report of all loans on current equipment, dates of payment in full and current balances is requested, as well as an income report to date of GBO assets (notes receivable). Also, Sister Meece is to determine through Sacramento Grange Credit Union the cost of a loan for the PacTel bid on computer equipment, which is approximately \$41,000.

The annual audit bid from Seely Accountancy Corporation was reviewed at this time. Ms. Seely has recommended that since the Trust Accounts had been established, there has never been a full audit of same and this should be done to protect the interest of the accountces. She is presenting a bid in addition to the general audit bid for this purpose. It was voted to accept the general audit bid and to include the Trust Accounts in the CSG unqualified audit.

Pastor Perez from the Church of the Rock (Mortgagee of Norco Grange hall) would like the CSG to discount the loan if a buyout is made in cash. It was decided that with 10% interest locked in, that no discount for the loan balance would be allowed at this time; however, there would be no pre-payment penalties if a full-cash payment is received for the balance.

STATE SECRETARY'S REPORT Marjorie Brown joined the Committee at this time to review the membership status of the CSG. There are currently 33,146 members at the end of the 3/31/89 reporting period, with 89 affiliate members and 282 Subordinate Granges reporting. There was a net loss of 649 members for the quarter. Three Subordinate Granges were removed from the rolls at the end of the 3/31/89 quarter. They were Castle #455, Zenia #722 (consolidated with Alderpoint) and Kelseyville #778 (consolidated with Clearlake.)

It was recommended that the State Master work with the Membership Coordinator in creating a letter to be sent to all suspended and withdrawn members explaining to them that they have been removed from the rolls of the Grange and did they know why? Also, the reinstatement procedure. Some work needs to be done with Solano County and several of the members of the Committee stated they would be happy to work with the State Master on this. Johnstonville Grange will be meeting to consider the disposition of that Grange. The Grange building will be insured by State Grange at the earliest possible time, mainly to protect the interest of Johnstonville Grange. Fees will be paid from their account.

Sister Brown then stated that, if all goes well with Jay's attempt to reconstruct the computer information, membership printouts should go out around the first of June.

COMPUTER INFORMATION At this time, information received from the Accounting department was reviewed regarding the total amounts due on equipment loans, and all other loans, as well as income from GBO assets. It was also determined that a share loan from Sacramento County Grange Federal Credit Union payments at 9.9% over five years would be \$870 monthly, as compared with PacTel's lease/purchase program of \$961 per month. Also, that warranty from PacTel is included in the first year, and subsequent could be purchased for years approximately \$1,600 annually.

PROPOSITION 103 Discussion took place on Proposition 103 (insurance initiative). No action taken.

WESTERN STATES LEADERSHIP **CONFERENCE** The State Master received a letter from Lillian Booth, Director of Youth Activities, regarding the Western States Youth leadership Conference to be held in Sacramento August 4-6. The State Master and Youth Director had covered the arca previously for best suitable hotel accommodations for the conference and decided on the Red Lion/Sacramento Inn on Arden Way. Α letter with information regarding the Western States Regional Youth Conference and Grange leaders will be sent to all State Masters and Youth Directors. The State Master announced information on the Western States Regional Youth Conference with accommodation rates, etc. to be advertised in the next Grange News. He also stated State Officers and Directors would be getting invitations.

COA UPDATE-MARTHA STEFENONI, CHAIR Sister Martha Stefenoni, Chair of the Committee on Affiliates, joined the Committee at this time and reported on the results of the committee's meeting held at the CSG Headquarters May 6. Read names of committee members. A letter directed to the Committee on Affiliates Chairman from Alene Bohren, Administrative Assistant, Marketing and Advertising Division of the Super 8 Motels, Inc was distributed. The letter explained the "Super 8 Motels VIP Marketing Program" which included special features such as discounts, National Car rental, \$50 check cashing privilege and a special identification number. Chairman stated the Super 8 Motel representative was interested in a co-op program, they wanted to have good programs for our members, on national level (chains) operating in 40 states, rates run \$30 to \$50, toll call cards available. It was voted to allow Committee on Affiliates to pursue the Super 8 Motel VIP Marketing Program.

Weekly Bulletin #719, Page 4 (Aetna Insurance) was discussed.

Peter Marinoff First Farwest Insurance discussed with Committee. It was stated that Marinoff Insurance was no longer in business and First Farwest Insurance was in receivership. Sister Stefenoni had been in touch with Mr. Bruce Yelinek, Regional Manager, First Farwest Individual Marketing regarding securing a list of California members in their plan-wasn't sure this list would come throughwanted to secure list to see how many California Grange members had First Farwest Insurance. Committee on Affiliates would check out list, if and when it was received.

Chairman stated another COA meeting was scheduled for 6/17/89 at CSG Headquarters. Sister Stefenoni read a letter she received from Dorothy DeAvila announcing the closure of Marinoff Agency. COA Chairman in agreement with her committee's recommendation that the Marinoff Insurance program (Aisle #4) be pulled out of the Benefits and Services notebooks. It was voted to accept Committee Chairman's recommendations. An updated "directory list" to the Benefits and Services notebook was presented changing some of the categories to the aisle numbers. Chairman suggested a different color paper be used for the notebooks. Brother Squire proposed the possibility of a membership type card be made up as a permanent type card for members. Chairman also provided Committee with a list of 132 Granges in Region number order that had not been presented with notebooks. Suggested some could be given out at a future leadership conference. Chairman also would like existing notebooks brought to meetings for updating. Discussed feedback to COA from membership as to suggestions, complaints, etc. It was voted to accept COA recommendations. The State Master was directed to inform the appropriate parties.

RITUAL HANDBOOK State Master announced the ritual meeting would be May 27, 1989 at CSG Headquarters.

COMPUTER UPDATE Jay Hartz, CSG News Editor, rejoined the Committee meeting and was asked for his recommendations of which computer system he would select. Brother Hartz named the PacTel computer system. It was voted that CSG go ahead and purchase the PacTel system and acquire a "share" loan with Sacramento County Grange Credit Union for the required amount as soon as possible which would include first year warranty. State Master and Executive Committee discussed the reason for purchasing new equipment was due to old computer equipment that is outdated, obsolete and irreplaceable requiring the necessity of purchasing the new computer system. A Committee member recommended wiring be put in the State Master's office should the need of additional terminal be needed in the future.

AG IN THE CLASSROOM UPDATE Letter from Naomi Fletcher, Legislative Director, discussed regarding the Ag in the Classroom meeting held in Sparks, NV March 2-4, 1989. Due to scheduling, the State Master forgot to inform Sister Fletcher of the Committee decision.

In another letter, Sister Fletcher requests the need of file cabinets for her office. State Master to handle this situation.

UCDMC EXPANSION UPDATE The State Master reported that the expansion project of the UCDMC Purchasing Department (GBO building) was on hold now and he would keep the Executive Committee informed.

GRANGE CAR SALE The State Master reported the LTD Ford Grange car had been sold for \$1,200 cash.

TERMITES (GBO BUILDING) The State Master informed the Committee he had Clark Pest Control spray for termites in the GBO building. Cost for spraying was \$260.

MISCELLANEOUS: VACAVILLE LOAN The State Master handed out a report from the Development Coordinator of Retirement Housing Foundation directed to Ken Douglas, President of the Vacaville Senior Housing Corporation. A check in the amount of \$1,941.23 was received by the California State Grange on April 20, 1989 via Ken Douglas, President, reducing their balance to \$2,225.99. GLEN AVON GRANGE A letter dated 5/14/89 received from Norma Allen, Deputy of Riverside County, regarding consolidation of Glen Avon Grange with Rubidoux Grange. Glen Avon Grange is requesting they be allowed to take "interest monies" from property sale with them to Rubidoux Grange. After much discussion and rechecking with the Digest, the State Master will follow-up and send the decision to the Riverside Deputy.

PAT MEECE-BOOKKEEPER A letter from Pat Meece, Bookkeeper, discussed. Previous Executive Committee meetings, requested a salary adjustment, "not answered." This meeting (5/19/89) request "job title reclassified." At this time, Sister Brown and all visitors were excused by the State Master as an Executive session was held to discuss the employee recommendation. A thorough discussion regarding the increased responsibilities and duties pertaining to the California State Grange full-charge bookkeeper position was undertaken. It was voted to increase the salary of Pat Meece by 10% of her base income because of the increased responsibilities and knowledge of her position, effective June 1, 1989. In reference to her request of reclassifying her job title from full-charge bookkeeper to accountant or controller, the Committee took no action at this time. However, the Committee recommends that all job descriptions be reviewed for all employees before any reclassifying could be considered and they will reviewed by the 1989 Audit/Budget Committee.

The State Master ended the meeting announcing he will not be seeking re-election to office in October.

The meeting adjourned at 5:55 pm. The next meeting of the CSG Executive Committee is scheduled for July 21, 1989.

The meeting was called to order promptly at 8:00 AM with the Worthy State Master David Austin presiding.

Roll Call showed members present: Joe Victorine, Johnny Squire, Jim Smith and Bob Clouse. Brother Stephen Tait unable to attend. William Booth, Overseer and the State Master's secretary were also present.

The minutes of the May 19, 1989 meeting were

approved as clarified.

UKIAH AUTUMN LEAVES, INC: The minutes and financial statements for the months of May 1989 and June 1989 were reviewed by the Committee. A question arose as to the status of researching the Ukiah Autumn Leaves by-laws and HUD's requirement of board members. The State Master and Overseer are researching and will report at a fater date.

CONVENTION HOUSING:

ALLOWANCE/COMPENSATION/STATE LECTURER REQUEST: The standard convention letter to be sent to all Granges was reviewed. Discussion took place regarding mileage compensation for Subordinate and Pomona Secretaries and Lecturers, GWA Chairmen or Alternates of both Pomona and Subordinate Granges, Junior Leaders, Youth Advisors and Youth Delegates. After consideration, the Committee voted to approve the 1989 Convention letter as presented.

Housing allowance for State Officers, Deputies, State and Regional Directors and National Youth and Junior Contestants was discussed. After review, the Committee voted to cover the \$44 flat rate plus tax for the Maruko Hotel plus standard mileage and per diem for State Officers, Deputies, State and Regional Directors, and National Youth and Junior Contestants (if applicable). A letter will be mailed to the above mentioned regarding this decision.

Brother Runyon, State Lecturer, has three written requests for consideration by the Committee: (1) \$150 for purchase of trophics for the State Talent Contest; (2) mileage of 10-cents per mile, one-way for each member of the Lecturer's Advisory Committee that attends the State Convention, and (3) six night's lodging for the State Lecturer for convention. After consideration, the Committee voted to approve all three requests of the State Lecturer. Brother Joe Victorine casting a nay vote.

JOY BEATIE: GWA DIRECTOR: A financial report for the fiscal year ending 6/30/89 of the Grange Women's Activities Department was reviewed by the Committee. The 1989-90 GWA Program was presented for approval. A few items noted were the five classes on the State Sewing Contest, the support of the Grange RAAD Program and this year's Women's March will be donated half to the Mother's Milk Bank and half to the Infant Hearing Foundation. It was decided at a previous meeting to do away with the "Ball" jar requirement in the canning project. The State Master telephoned Sister Beatie to discuss this question and it was decided to eliminate the "Ball" sponsorship in the food preservation contest. The Committee voted to approve the 1989-90 GWA Program as clarified.

GRANGE DAY UPDATE: The State Master gave a brief update of the upcoming Grange Day activities. August 26th has been designated as Grange Day and will include the traditional day's activities with a luncheon beginning at noon, short program and Grange purse horse race beginning at approximately 3:00 PM. The cost of the luncheon remains the same. The California State Fair has again charged the Grange for one-half of the gate credential fee (\$2.50) each. This cost will not be passed along to the luncheon attendees.

The State Master mentioned that a suggestion regarding the use of the VIP tent for Grange Day was brought up by the fair representatives at a recent meeting. As the State Fair policy has changed, this may be a possibility in the future. This area is black topped, closer to the parking areas and restrooms. Each year it is getting harder and harder for our Grangers to reach Bushy Lake. The State Master will research our policy as it relates to Bushy Lake. Question arose whether or not "Grange Day" would be recognized in the fair's daily program. The State Master will double check with the State Fair.

FINANCIAL REPORT: Sister Meece joined the Committee at this time. She stated that the "numbers" look like we will have to pay taxes and is sure we will be in the "black" this year. Some of this money will be moved over into the Grange News at some time. We are eleven months into our budget with excess revenue of \$28,826.85. The CPA has the June figures and they will not be available until the financial audit is completed. The audit is supposed to be in by September 1, 1989. The State Master asked Sister Meece to hold the last payment until we receive the audit and he will be responsible. Sister Meece explained that an agreement was signed regarding the pay schedule releasing the last payment in August. The State Master will be discussing this situation with the CPA. Brother Clouse inquired as to the high monthly rental payment on the payphone at Wisteria Hall. He stated with PacBell there might be a way to get around it a little cheaper. Sister Meece will check into this and report back to the Committee. Sister Mcece was asked about her new computer. She explained that her's was a personal computer and was not hooked up to the main network of computers. It will strictly be used for the accounting system.

FRESNO PROPERTY: A letter was received from the Fresno County Assessor's office regarding the property changing title and the assessed valuation. Additional taxes will have to be paid. A suggestion was made that when the lease is rewritten, this cost be incorporated into the contract. Discussion was made regarding the sale of this property. The total value on the property is \$150,000 (\$125,000 land value/\$25,000 improvements value). A suggestion was made to notify the current tenant with some alternatives of selling the property. GLEN AVON GRANGE: The Glen Avon Trust Account is located at Sacramento Savings & Loan (\$63,025) and is due to mature on August 12th. The current interest rate earned is 7.6%. DEL ROSA GRANGE: Del Rosa Trust Account matures in November (\$37,173) and is earning 7.9% interest. Sister Meece made a suggestion to withdraw, pay the penalty and put into \$50,000 accounts. The Committee voted to move the Glen Avon account and to wait on Del Rosa.

The employee pension plan will be discussed at the next meeting. The State Master asked Brother Smith if Grange Mutual Life might have something available. We currently have six employees on the retirement plan. Brother Smith will provide information regarding an "Employee Simplified Pension Plan" at the next meeting.

WESTERN STATES CONFERENCE UPDATE: The State Master gave a brief update on the upcoming Western States Conference to be held at the Sacramento Inn in Sacramento. There are approximately 100 registered. Grange Insurance Association and Grange Mutual Life will be cosponsoring the Saturday night banquet. The tentative program was briefly reviewed. Key State Grange Officers will be involved in the conference participating in round robin sessions in addition to the youth regional conference. Those involved will be comp'd by the California State Grange. This year, \$2,200 was budgeted for the Western States After consideration, the Committee Conference. voted to comp the registration fee for the spouses of the Officer/Director participants to the Western States Conference. The State Master stated that Mr. Joe Sabol from Cal Poly will be the motivational speaker for the Friday night banquet and that he is coming "gratis." The State Master suggested that a certificate or plaque be given to Mr. Sabol.

STATE LECTURER - WORKSHOP EXPENSES AND SUMMARY: The Committee reviewed an expense voucher received from Brother Runyon, State Lecturer. The State Master explained that the expense summary is for the Committee's information only. As the workshop tour is below budget, the State Master has approved the voucher for payment. The Committee reviewed a summary and attendance figures from Brother Runyon on the workshops presented this year. Brother Runvon states in his letter that it doesn't look good. Attendance was very Of the 19 workshops presented, only 81 low. Granges were represented. Brother Runyon questions whether or not we are "wasting our time," especially when the key leaders do not participate. The State Master suggests for a future recommendation that a two-day or one and one-half day session having round robin sessions (including GWA & Lecturer conferences) and a deputy conference be considered. Put some "bucks" into it.

STATE GRANGE INSURANCE POLICY: A letter and summary outlining the insurance coverage (Policy 1D 229447) of the California State Grange was received from Brother Bill Booth. The summary included items covered and the new premiums for the coverages. It was stated that glass is now covered on Wisteria Hall. Brother Booth will check into a higher deductible which might reduce the premium.

STATE SECRETARY REPORT: Sister Mariorie Brown joined the Committee at this time and presented the membership report. There are 52 Subordinate Grange Quarterly Reports (June 30th) outstanding. As of July 20, 1989, there were 974 losses and 822 gains making a net loss of 152 members. Sister Brown reports that there are nine Subordinate Granges and two Pomona Granges that are two or more quarters in arrears. The State Master stated he will be sending a letter to those Granges. The Committee questioned the charter of Tolenas Grange as they are below the minimum number of members required. The State Master explained that they will have to consolidate. An update on Johnstonville Grange was given. Sister Brown reports that third dues notices were sent out on June 9th to 46 members who had not paid their dues. Ten have come in since, leaving 36 members who have not paid. Sister Brown was told to carry on with the suspension notices. A total of \$1,980 has been received for their dues with \$680.50 to be held in trust. We are maintaining insurance and property tax payments with their dues money. There will be a meeting set up in September with the members and the Regional Deputy. All members will be notified of the meeting.

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Stockton Grange update given. After the May 25th meeting with Stockton Grange members, a dues billing was sent on June 19, 1989 to all members notifying them that the California State Grange would be handling the collection of their dues. As of July 20, 1989 a total of \$105 has been received representing seven paid members out of 25. The dues billing notice also stated that a "town hall" meeting was scheduled for July 25, 1989 at 7:00 PM and was sponsored by Stockton Grange and presented by the California State Grange. Members and general public invited. The State Master and a few other leaders will present the program. French Camp-Lathrop Grange is the closest Grange if a consolidation is in order.

In regards to supplies, a balance of approximately \$500 is shown on unpaid accounts as of June 30, 1989. Another audit will be sent before the end of the month.

Sister Brown relayed to the Committee that she will be retiring in October. The vacation time she has accumulated was discussed. Sister Brown would like to know if she will be compensated for the 43 days of vacation time she has remaining or will she lose it? She would like the Committee to consider this as October is just around the corner and vacation time is not allowed in September. Sister Brown also stated she would be willing to assist the newly elected secretary in the transition, if necessary.

ROSEMARY HANSEN MEMBERSHIP _ DIRECTOR: Sister Hansen joined the Committee at this time. She presented a proposed membership brochure for prospective members designed by her The brochure is designed to let the committee. prospective member know what's going to happen before they get to a meeting. Discussion regarding a future "kit" was undertaken. The "kit" would contain detailed information of all the departments and programs. It would be made up of a folder with full color (5 color) at a current cost of approximately \$1 each. Sister Hansen would like the Committee to consider this project and keep it in mind for the future. Posters for Grange halls was also discussed. After consideration, the Committee voted to authorize the printing of 10,000 brochures and 20,000 new Subordinate applications, subject to a minimum of three bids, accepting the lowest bid using black ink and colored paper. It was also voted to have only a summary of the official obligation ceremony printed in the new membership brochure.

CONVENTION PROGRAM: Brother Eugene

Runyon, 1989 Convention Chairman, joined the Committee at this time. He briefly discussed the upcoming convention. The GWA and Youth breakfasts will be catered on the premises as well as a new "counties dinner." The barbecue will be hosted by the Youth Department on the patio area of the second floor. Parking will be on the third level and up only. A buffet breakfast and concession stand will be available each day, providing it pays for itself. Plans are progressing well. A tentative convention program and convention rules were reviewed by the Committee.

YOUTH DEPARTMENT FUNDRAISING Sister Lillian Booth joined the PROJECTS: Committee at this time. The Youth Department requests to sell candy bars at Grange Family Camp and at the convention. The cost of the candy bars are 50-cents each and would sell for \$1 with the proceeds to benefit the California State Grange Conference Center Fund. The Youth Department also requests to design and sell a new pin with the proceeds going to A suggestion was made that the Youth Fund. possibly a contest could be started in designing the pin or make it a camp project, etc. After consideration and discussion, the Committee voted to approve the selling of candy bars at Grange Family Camp and convention with proceeds to benefit the California State Grange Conference Center Fund. In reference to the pin sales, the Executive Committee decided to wait on approving this project until further details could be provided by the Youth Committee.

Sister Booth also presented a calendar project. A calendar would be sent to each Grange family "free of charge" with a letter stating so, but that we are accepting donations and all donations will benefit the Grange Conference Center Fund. The Grange family would not be obligated in any way. Sister Booth thinks this project will work, but states that it is too late for this year. After consideration, the Committee decided to put the calendar project "on hold" until Sister Booth can meet with her committee providing more details.

FROG JUMPING CONTEST/DELTA KING UPDATE: The Committee reviewed a summary of the frog jumping contest sponsored by the Grange RAAD Committee. The summary detailed expenses and income. The RAAD Committee is requesting \$30 for the entries comp'd for VIP's by the State Master. The Committee voted that any losses be deducted from the RAAD Committee budget.

MARTHA STEFENONI: FIRST FARWEST

INSURANCE UPDATE: Sister Stefenoni joined the Committee at this time. She shared her knowledge of First Farwest Insurance and its future. She states by order of the Oregon State Insurance Commissioner, First Farwest Insurance Company is to be liquidated. First Farwest will not be writing any new policies and will be cancelling many of their current ones, unless the policy has a guaranteed renewable clause. First Farwest will be notifying policyholders whether or not their policy will continue. Regarding First Farwest policyholders in California, the regional representative in Fresno, Bruce Yelinek, has offered to answer any questions from our Grange members.

Sister Stefenoni stated the Committee on Affiliates is surveying the membership applications that are on file for the past five years. This is being done so that when researching health insurance, the Committee can provide some demographics that are needed. The Committee on Affiliates is attempting to find a plan that First Farwest policyholders can roll into with preexisting conditions.

COMPUTERS: Brother Jay Hartz joined the Committee at this time and gave a brief update on the installation of the new computer system. He stated that the computers were all up and working and now the training begins. They are working on transferring our data (membership) to the new system. A question was asked whether or not the computers could be taken to convention. It is possible, but may not be feasible at this time.

COMMITTEE SCHOLARSHIP INTERIM UPDATE: The Interim Scholarship Committee met as requested and determined that resolutions were necessary for the purpose of defining the CSG Regarding the George Scholarship Programs. Scholarship Fund, the scholarship Sehlmeyer awarding four \$2.000 proposes committee scholarships for continuing college students only. Scholarships would be available for a maximum of four times per individual. Disbursement of funds to be administered through the college. The four resolutions regarding the CSG Scholarship Program will be presented at the October convention. The State Master suggested that these resolutions be discussed at the next meeting.

PEST CONTROL: Brother Clouse discussed the need for the Committee to consider a monthly pest control spray for the Grangers Business Organization building, the State Office and Wisteria Hall. It was voted that the State Master seek bids on a monthly termite pest control service on the three buildings and

report back to the Committee.

NEVADA STAR GRANGE: The State Master reported there was a problem with the sale of Nevada Star Grange. It seems as though the property was zoned and sold for commercial use. Now the zoning commission is saying it is zoned for agricultural use. We could be sued for the difference in the selling price, but we are trying to work out a plan with the buyer and county commissioners. The State Master has met with the realtor and Grange Master regarding this situation and will keep the Committee informed of the progress.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE RESOLUTIONS: The State Master reviewed three resolutions that could be presented by the Executive Committee: (1) Dissolution of Grangers Business Organization, (2) Article XVI - Expenses of Delegates and Compensation and Expenses of Officers and Employees, and (3) State Secretary, Section 13.11 (g). After review and a few clarifications, the Committee voted to submit the resolutions to the delegate body for consideration.

COMPUTER FURNITURE: With the new computer system now installed, the need for the proper computer furniture was discussed. With no objection, the Committee instructed the State Master to secure what is needed.

STATE MASTERS' SALARIES: As instructed at a previous meeting, the State Master obtained the salaries of the State Masters of the six western states for comparison.

In regard to the State Secretary's accumulated vacation time remaining, the Committee voted to authorize compensation for four weeks of vacation time, leaving two weeks of vacation time to be used between now and September 1, 1989.

The meeting adjourned at 6:10 PM. The next scheduled meeting is August 25, 1989 beginning at 8:00 AM.

Meeting called to order by Master David Austin at 8:03 AM. All members were present with Naomi Fletcher as acting Secretary.

Minutes of the July 21, 1989 meeting were

approved as clarified.

UKIAH AND VACAVILLE AUTUMN LEAVES:

Worthy Master and Jim Smith reported on attending the meeting recently held at the Vacaville Autumn During discussion at their board Leaves facility. meeting, the State Master committed the State Grange to consider several small projects that need funding. After discussion, it was voted to give prior approval to a project by any department, preferably the Youth Department, to appropriate a sign for the back entrance to Vacaville Autumn Leaves approximately \$200 and to circulate the other requested items to other departments.

Brother Squire stated that a resolution should come from the Executive Committee to the delegates at this convention requesting repayment of the loan that was made to Vacaville Autumn Leaves.

Ukiah Autumn Leaves minutes were reviewed also at this time.

FRESNO PROPERTY: The status of the proposed purchase and appraisals of the Fresno GBO property were discussed at this time. It was voted that the State Master contact the current tenant and request his intentions regarding the tentative purchase of the property.

PEST CONTROL BIDS: The Worthy Master presented two pest control bids for general termite inspection. It was agreed that Clark Pest Control be requested to inspect all properties at the Stockton Boulevard site and submit a bid for regular maintenance.

SCHOLARSHIP RESOLUTIONS: The George Sehlmeyer and Doris Deaver Scholarship resolutions presented by the Interim Scholarship Committee were reviewed at this time. After much discussion, it was voted to approve the Sehlmeyer and Deaver resolutions and submit them to the Good of the Order Committee. The other resolutions presented by the Interim Scholarship Committee, titled "Scholarship Judging Committee" and "Scholarship Committee as Standing Committee" were referred back to committee with no action.

NAOMI FLETCHER-PURCHASE REQUEST: A request to purchase an obsolete piece of furniture in the Legislative Department was considered. It was voted to allow this purchase for \$25.00.

After further discussion, it was agreed that all obsolete computer equipment and furniture be placed in one location in the office and have an outside firm provide a bid on removing all from the premises.

FINANCIAL REPORT: Pat Meece joined the

committee at this time to report on the Financial condition of the order. She stated all audit information is not yet in, and an end of year balance could not be accurately determined and would not be released until such time as a final audit was available. She stated she has secured a loan for purchase of the new computer equipment. Mrs. Meece was also asked to present information regarding the employee pension plan for comparison purposes. Brother Smith will present our current plan to GML for consideration. Sister Meece also stated that she received two more tax returns back from IRS for proper filing from the GBO dissolution.

SECRETARY'S REPORT: Sister Marjorie Brown was on vacation at this time, but the Committee reviewed the information she had prepared. The June quarterly report to National Grange stated the California State Grange membership at 33,035 plus 96 Affiliate Members with 282 Subordinate Granges reporting. This is a loss of 111 members for the June quarter, with 598 Golden Sheaf members.

The report also states that there are seven Granges delinquent two or more quarters in dues as well as one Pomona Grange. The Worthy Master stated it is entirely likely that Tolenas #587 will consolidate with Vacaville #575; Clayton and Pleasant Hill into Danville and Contra Costa Pomona into Solano Pomona. Stockton Grange #758 will attempt to hold one more meeting before dissolution. Johnstonville Grange is to be having a leadership meeting.

It was suggested that in light of various counties loosing Granges that a resolution on Pomona Grange jurisdiction be presented to the delegates stating how many Subordinate Granges are required to constitute a Pomona Jurisdiction¹.

It was reported that Bellevue Grange hall was the victim of arson about a week ago.

Worthy Master also presented the New Membership Brochure and appreciation to the Committee at this time.

WESTERN STATES LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE:

Worthy Master reported on the outcome of the Western States Leadership Conference hosted in Sacramento the beginning of August, and reviewed the letter received from the Shoemakers, National Youth Directors, complementing the State Grange and Youth Department for a comprehensive and successful program.

NORCO GRANGE CONSOLIDATION: Worthy Master received a letter from Riverside County Deputy Norma Allen regarding the possibility of Norco Grange consolidating with Rubidoux Grange. It was voted that the Worthy Master proceed with the consolidation request after determining that proper procedure has been followed by members of Norco Grange.

NATIONAL GRANGE ADVANTAGE: The Committee reviewed the program presented by the National Grange similar to the State Grange "Benefits and Services" program. It was recommended that the committee would need to see the finished product, as this was presented to the Worthy Master within the last week, before a membership list could be released to the National Grange.

COMMITTEE ITEMS: <u>BUSHY LAKE</u>: Brother Clouse requested policy be researched regarding the Bushy Lake picnic area at the State Fair before considering using the State Fair grounds for our picnic in the future.

GRANGE RURAL AREAS AGAINST DRUGS: Brother Clouse received a communication from Mike Fletcher, Chairman of State Grange RAAD requesting funds appropriated from the RAAD fund for the Delta King Frog Jump be replaced. The RAAD Committee had not previously approved this expense. After further review of minutes from previous Executive Committee minutes, it was voted to replace said funds, reversing all Frog Jump activity from the RAAD fund.

STATE MASTER'S INCOME: Brother Clouse voiced some concern that the State Master's salary does not reflect personal use of the Grange car. It was agreed that Pat Meece would contact the CPA in this regard. It was also stated that some form of reporting personal use and all expenses be designed for future officer expense.

SILENT PROPOSAL: At this time, the State Master was asked to leave the room, whereupon Brother Clouse stated that, since the State Master has publicly announced his desire not to seek re-election, and that State Secretary's announced retirement, a resolution of appreciation and/or plaque should be given each for years of service to the organization. It was agreed that Brothers Clouse and Booth would write said resolution, and that Sister Fletcher would make sure a Past Master's and Secretary's pin would be secured and she would also make sure a plaque was ordered for each.

COMPUTER UPDATE: (Previous bid was by PacTel. PacTel has been purchased by Computerland. Our NEC system is sold and serviced by D&G

Computers.) Brother Jay Hartz joined the committee at this time and gave an overview of the status of the new computer system, as well as presented the new Grange News format. All agreed the new paper looked "cleaner." Brother Hartz stated that D & G Computers came in almost \$3000.00 under the original bid. He also reviewed the advantage of having a scanner for the Grange News department. It was voted that Brother Hartz be given permission to purchase said scanner to do the job described, not to exceed \$1,500.

COMMITTEE ITEMS: <u>SECRETARY'S SALARY</u>: Brother Squire presented resolutions regarding items in the Constitution and By-Laws that should be changed in regard to "other authorized person" in the absence of a full-time Secretary. These will be presented to the Constitution and By-Laws Committee as presented. Discussion ensued regarding a resolution to determine a fixed wage for the Secretary which would re-iterate the Secretary's duties, and be presented prior to Nomination of Officers. It was recommended that a resolution setting the base wage for the Secretary be presented, with the understanding that another employee would come on board in the State Grange Headquarters, be it the new Secretary, or another person.

Meeting adjourned at 5:15 PM. The next meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, October 11, 1989, the day before the convention as required by Grange Law. (The foregoing minutes are to be approved and signed at the October 11th meeting in San Bernardino.)

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

June 30, 1989

Note 1: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The California State Grange was incorporated October 7, 1946, under the laws of the State of California. The following is a summary of significant accounting policies:

(a) Assets, liabilities, income, and expenses are recorded on the accrual basis of accounting, The company uses the same basis of accounting for income tax purposes.

(b) Inventory is valued at cost.

(c) Property and equipment are stated at cost except for \$10,681 of office furniture and equipment for which a no-cost basis has been maintained. This amount was derived from personal property tax statements. Accumulated depreciation was established to represent the difference between the stated and assessed values of \$5,297. It is the policy of the company to provide for depreciation over the estimated useful lives of the assets using the straight-line method. The estimated lives range from 4 to 50 years.

For assets acquired after December 31, 1980, the company adopted the policy of conforming to the accelerated cost recovery system under the Economic Recovery Tax Act of 1981 of determing the recovery deduction for personal property only.

Maintenance and repairs are charged to expense as incurred. Renewals and betterments which extend the useful lives of assets are capitalized.

The California State Grange is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)8 of the Internal Revenue Code and 23701(g) of the California Revenue and Taxation Code. The organization has also filed exempt organization business income tax returns for net income of non-exempt activities.

Note 2: Lease Commitments

The Company is obligated under a long-term lease for its mailing system. The lease has an original term of five years expring January 28, 1994. The monthly payment under the lease is \$403.86 and at June 30, 1989, the remaining lease commitment totaled \$22,212.30.

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LECTURER'S REPORT

Worthy Master, Officers, Delegates, Members and Friends,

This past year your State Lecturer's goals were to train Lecturers and educate the membership in the area of programs and Lecturer's activities. This was attempted in several ways. The main thrust being placed on Conferences and Workshops.

During this past year, Sister Juanita and I conducted a total of 19 workshops across the State of California. We traveled a total of 3998 miles over a 26 day period. Talked to 354 Grange members representing 81 Grangers. There were 56 Lecturers, 37 Masters, 6 State Officers, 6 Regional Deputies and 22 County Deputies in attendance at these workshops. These workshops were designed to show you, the membership, how to plan and present a program. They were conducted in May and June so that newly elected Officers could attend. From the small attendance and the fact that our leaders did not attend, the conclusion I come to is, that the majority of you don't want to know how to plan or even have a Lecturer's program.

So often I hear the remark "I only took the Lecturer's office because they said I wouldn't have to do anything." What a sad commentary on the state of our Granges.

But then, on the other hand, we were involved in planning and conducting the three Leadership Seminars that we conducted in the upper part of the State. Now these drew a very high attendance and appeared to be what the members wanted. Those who presented the Seminars came away with a very positive attitude. We had finally done something that the people wanted. The written comments on those attending indicate to me that this is the type of conference or training activity that the State Grange should continue to present to the membership.

I had the opportunity to conduct a workshop on Community Service for our Young Adults during their February Conference. If you have never attended a Young Adults Conference, you should. They are a very active and positive section of our Grange. I have learned over the years to expect to become involved when I attend one of their activities. Who knows, you might wind up being a famous detective, trying to solve a series of murders.

I was also involved, along with Sister Lillian Booth our Youth Director, in the planning of the Western States-Grange Youth and Leadership Conference hosted by the California State Grange in Sacramento. The combination of our Grange Leaders and the Youth is a stimulus that each of you should experience. Take advantage of the opportunity to participate in every Grange conference or workshop. You'll be surprised at the new ideas and the enthusiasm you will draw from these meetings.

One of the highlights of my year was being asked to represent the National Grange at the Corn State-Grange Leaders Conference in Iowa during March. As a member of the National Grange Lecturer's Advisory Committee, I was asked to present a workshop on the Lecturer's Projects Book. That's what I expected to do, but once again I found myself getting involved in all their activities.

The status of our Grange is very hard for me to determine when only 27% of our Lecturers submit reports. That's 75 out of 282 Granges. Of course, those that submit reports are for the most part very active Granges, involved in the community. Does that mean that the remaining 207 Granges are doing nothing? I think not. What I find is an attitude of apathy, the feeling that reports are not important. Well, they are! It is only from your reports that the State and National Grange can determine the direction in which to travel.

The Lecturer's Department spent more time and money this year than in years past. This was due to additional conferences and workshops. We had a total expenditure of \$5,398.83 which includes my annual salary of 624.00. I average 25 hours per week on State Lecturer's work and that computes at 48 cents per hour. Pretty cheap labor.

My work has been made a lot lighter through efforts of the State Lecturer's Advisory Committee. Jaunita Hutcherson, Jerilynn Langes, Jim Bird, Lois Smith, Tom Sawyer, Lorena Wasley, Hazel Lynch, Dorothy Bolton, Bob Westfall, Francis McElhinney and Nancy Moramarco. The State Grange Office Staff continue to support and work in the Lecturer's fields. Thanks to each of you.

The "Special Assistant to the State Lecturer," Juanita Runyon, continues to fulfill her obligations to council, guide, assist and support me even under the most adverse conditions-believe me she can be "Hell on wheels." What can I say but, "I love you, dear."

And to you the Lecturers and Lecturer's Committees who continue to support and lead your Granges by presenting educational and entertaining programs-I salute you. It is through your efforts that the Grange will grow and prosper. But these Lecturer's will only continue to produce, when you, the members, give them the help and support they need and want.

Grange is the key and the Lecturers have the key that will open the way. Please let them.

ROUND ROBIN COMMENTS

If you have looked over the Convention Program you will see that there is no Lecturer's Conference scheduled this year. I purposely did not schedule a conference because I wanted the opportunity to speak not only to the Lecturers but also to the Masters and other leaders of each Grange.

During the past several years, I have received many complaints from Lecturers such as "My Master won't let me have more than 5 or 10 minutes for a program." I often wonder about a Grange where one person has the power to dictate to the members what they shall or shall not do. I always thought that the Grange was a democratic organization in which the majority rules.

Another comment that I constantly receive from Lecturers is "Our meetings are so long that I'm asked to skip the Lecturer's Program." To begin with the Lecturer's program is the 16th order of business and should not be passed over. If business seems to take up the entire meeting, then let me suggest that the Lecturer's program be set at a time certain and no matter what is before the Grange when that time comes, the Lecturer will present the program. I know from personal experience that business meetings do not drag on when the Lecturer's program is presented at a decent time during the meeting. Try it-it works.

The other comment that I frequently hear is "I took the office of Lecturer because they told me that I wouldn't have to do anything." I don't know who these people "they" are. I've never met any "theys." If you are electing members to the office of Lecturer just to fill the position, you are doing an injustice to that member and to your Grange. Being a Lecturer does not have to be a hard, grueling task. The Lecturer's position should be one of fulfillment and enjoyment. A good Grange will see that the Lecturer has a committee to assist with the programs. Those of you who took the time to attend one of the State Lecturer's Workshops this past summer learned how a committee is formed and how it functions. Reports

that I receive from Lecturer's across the State prove to me that those Granges that present educational and informative programs are the Granges that are growing. Good programming and growth go hand in hand.

In the most recent Bulletin from our National Lecturer, Mary Buffington, there is a list of ideas for programs that was developed during the New England Lecturer's Conferences. These were programs that they wanted or that had already been presented. Mary states in this bulletin, and I quote "One very enlightening fact is that the types of programs people desired were not the usual programs some Lecturer's presented-a light reading and a game. Non-Lecturers in attendance and Lecturers themselves showed interest in worthwhile topics of an educational or community-oriented nature. The 'desired' programs reflect the intelligence of members." Isn't that something-programs reflect the intelligence of members-are you selling your members short? I hope not.

To you Lecturers and your committees-can you plan programs this next year that are not on the same subjects as last year? And if you present annual theme programs, can you approach them from a totally different perspective? This is my challenge to all of you.

Just a few words about participation. During this past year the Programs and Contests in the Lecturer's department had a very poor rate of participation. In fact, in most areas, we received approximately 1/2 of what was submitted last year.

In the area of reports, I have received them only from 1/4 of our Lecturers. Without your participation and without your reports, the State and National Granges are unable to determine the needs for new programs or if the present programs and contest should be revised or replaced. You are the ones to tell us-your State and National leaders-just what you want. Remember, the Grange is a grassroots organization-that means in everything-Youth, Juniors, Womens Activities, Lecturers, etc.,-grassroots does not apply only to legislation.

We had some problems this past year with the Lecturer's Projects Book and the time period that it covered. After consulting with the National Lecturer and explaining our election dates, California has been given permission to change our reporting time to July 1, 1989 through June 30, 1990. This will be for both the Projects Book and the Recognition Report. These will now be due to the California State Lecturer on

July 20, 1990. Delegates, be sure to advise your Lecturers of this change. What this means is that each Lecturer will report only for the year that they were in office.

Another change will be the Talent Contest Entry time. All entries for the Talent Contest must be to the State Lecturer no later than September 1st, 1990. This is to give time for the ordering of trophies for the actual number of entries.

Please take time to visit all of the exhibits in the Lecturers, GWA and Junior Rooms. See what talent with which your fellow Grangers have been blessed.

Now a short commercial: We have a limited number of the California Grangers Poetry Books remaining. As a special offer to you during this convention they will be selling for only \$3.00. They are available in the Lecturer's room.

I thank you for the opportunity to speak with you today. I will be presenting the State Lecturer's Annual Report as part of the Lecturer's Program on Friday evening.

It is with great pleasure that I offer this report on our National Community Service Award program for the State of California. Our year began in February when our National Chairman, Mary Buffington, mailed out the entry cards to all the Granges in California. Naively, I thought all secretaries would mail the cards back immediately so they wouldn't get lost or misplaced as that is what they were for-Wrong. A few dribbled in and I became anxious as to whether any one was going to get started. Late in the Spring, I received a few but they seem to be coming from the wrong places. The State Grange and the State Lecturer. It seems no one had read the new Chairman's name and address in the California Grange News. May I restate again-Have one major project yearly. We must not use a Grange serving project. Keep the on-going separated from your One major thrust.

The judges were greatly impressed with the four winning entries as well as the other projects turned in. They really learned a great many things about the Grange and its place in the community. This has been a most interesting year and I will have more faith when we start next year again. Watch my byline "Community Capers" in the California Grange News and I will make every effort to keep you informed and up to date.

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT 1988-89 REPORT

Brothers and Sisters:

The California State Grange Legislative Department has gone through a lot of revisions this year, all for the better, we would hope. We have become more actively involved in advocating policy before Congress with favorable results, and have become more familiar with our own state government through the Granger Action Plan.

You have seen changes in the Grange News with the introduction of the Legislative Department insert. This section is devoted entirely to Legislative Activity month by month, except in those months where the California Legislature is not in session, and in the February Issue, when the Grange Program handbook is reproduced for all members to enjoy. The Legislative Department; however, is covered in this handbook review.

Various committees have met through the year, including the Interim Water Committee, the Interim Farmland Preservation Committee, and the Interim Pest Eradication Policy Committee. The Water Committee reviewed the current Auburn Dam proposal and voiced concern over the priorities of Area of Origin Water rights, as well as certain language in the bill that appears to cover a broad base of "other environmental purposes" in prioritizing water usage. This concern has been addressed by the Legislative Department in a recent statement to the author, Senator Ruben Ayala regarding his bill SB 1712.

The Interim Farmland Preservation and Pest Eradication Policy Committees were a bit more difficult to formulate. The Legislative Department tried early on to assemble the two committees with the required number of members (seven as required by resolution A-4-88 for the Farmland Preservation Committee and typically five for the Pest Eradication Policy Committee as set forth by A-3-88). After repeated attempts to secure the proper amount of members for each committee that were knowledgeable about the required subjects, it was decided to combine the committees and discuss each issue separately.

The Farmland Preservation discussion encompassed review of the Soil Conservation Report produced by the State Grange and agencies and associations having a concern with Soil Conservation, various testimonies regarding Farmland Preservation, and Grange Policy over the last 50 years. The Committee agreed that in order to present a policy statement to the delegates, two years would be necessary to review all material at hand and come to an educated conclusion. Each member was assigned a number of resolutions to review and place in categories such as Farmland Preservation, Soil Conservation, Land Use Planning and Zoning. Several members have submitted their reviews, and once the final reviews are received, a draft report will be prepared for committee review. This method is much the same as the Interim Water Committee study that was conducted in 1985.

The General Pest Eradication Policy discussion centered around the current Food Safety Issue. Future discussion will include expertise by a few members on the committee, and a policy statement regarding the pest eradication policy currently utilized by the State Grange. We hope to have a comprehensive report for both Farmland Preservation and Pest Eradication at the next session of the State Grange. CONGRESSIONAL ACTIVITY

On the Congressional level, we have again

responded to the American Heritage Trust Act, this year in the form of HR 876. We strongly feel that this Act would circumvent the Homestead Act as signed by President Lincoln, and would discourage instead of encourage private land owner-ship. We would like to thank all those Granges and their Legislative Chair who responded to the Call to Action. The network does work. HR 876 is currently stalled in the House. The National Grange has worked diligently to introduce amendments, and have been successful on some counts, and not so successful on others. We will keep you up to date on this issue in the Grange News and through Calls to Action.

The Desert Wilderness Act, this year in the form of S 11 by Senator Cranston, is again being opposed by industry and the Grange through the Public Landusers Alliance. The restricted method of testimony collection by Congress and the public outcry in the restrictions has resulted in one hearing being scheduled in the desert area regarding the issue presented by Cranston. We would hope that enough other public sentiment is voiced so as to encourage more hearings in California.

Testimony was presented to the Office of Transportation in the Department of Agriculture, as well as to the Department of Transportation. Areas of concern included rail abandonment, the farm-tomarket system, funding, truck regulations, as well as specific California issues, namely motorcycle helmets, CHP Radar use, billboard removal, agricultural

vehicle registration, freeway barriers, alternate fuels, and rest areas. In capsulizing the testimony, the Grange feels fortunate to have a freeway network We are fully aware of traffic such as ours. congestion concerns with the increasing population and again feel that, with a revised allocation schedule utilizing miles per county, instead of population served, will provide an equitable and economically feasible farm-to-market transportation mechanism. This will not only enhance market prices by lowering transportation costs, but assure a safe roadway for us all. Portions of this testimony were included in the Transportation Facts publication "Beyond Isolation: The Future of Rural Transportation as Described at the Transportation 2020 Forums,"

STATE ACTIVITY

In advocating the State Legislature, several issues of concern were addressed; however, those most important to the general membership will be addressed at this time. Other issues of interest have been covered in the Legislative Roundup in Grange News.

<u>AB 2500-AG BARGAINING</u> This bill, signed into law by the Governor and supported by the Grange, is a conciliation process that will help resolve disputes between cooperative bargaining associations and processors of fruit and vegetables.

AB 2500, by Assembly Speaker Willie Brown, follows the Speaker's AB 1944 of 1984 which created a grower-processor bargaining component within the Department of Food and Agriculture (CDFA) and established fines and penalties for failure to bargain in good faith.

AB 2500 authorizes the CDFA to initiate a conciliation procedure at either party's request, if it determines that conciliation would help growers and processors reach a bargaining agreement. Conciliation costs would be shared equally by each bargaining party.

The American Arbitration Association would provide the conciliator who would be given 10-15 days in which to facilitate a settlement. The conciliator would not determine the final price. A civil penalty not to exceed a \$5,000 fine would be imposed for failure to comply with conciliation.

"I am pleased that the Governor saw the wisdom of taking this extra step to assure that bargaining terms are settled in a fair and timely fashion," stated Speaker Brown. "Our farmers must have assurances of equitable prices for the crops they grow." <u>AB 2161-FOOD SAFETY</u> AB 2161 is a multifaceted bill which, among other things, would:

1. Test processed foods by establishing a longoverdue routine processed food monitoring program for pesticide residues, chemicals, microbes and other contaminants.

2. Target pesticide residue testing by substantially expanding CDFA's "focused" pesticide residue monitoring program targeting those pesticides of greatest health and dietary concern.

3. Evaluate the risk from pesticide residues on fresh food based on an assessment of dietary risk using actual acute and chronic health effects data.

4. Provide protection for infants and children by requiring an evaluation and modification of the existing pesticide regulatory system to ensure that they are adequately protected.

5. Provide pesticide usage data by requiring that farmers keep and submit pesticide use logs for <u>all</u> pesticides used.

6. Speed the identification of the newest scientific analytical methods so that the most effective pesticide residue testing methods will be used.

7. Require the accreditation of private laboratories that test raw or processed foods.

8. Require those private laboratories to report overtolerance findings so that proper enforcement protection is carried out.

9. Establish and fund further alternative pest management research.

We felt Grange policy encompassed several of these points, and have supported AB 2161. This bill has been signed by the Governor.

<u>AB 1212-CALIFORNIA GROWN</u> Recently signed into law by the Governor, this bill would authorize CDFA to create a "California-grown" seal for use as a marketing tool on agricultural commodities produced in the state. This Grange supported bill is not intended to denote the quality of a product, rather, it will be created for marketing, advertising and promotional purposes only.

Use of the seal by a farmer would be voluntary. Application for certification by the Department would be necessary before use of the seal would be permitted in order to prevent fraud.

"AB 1212 would allow growers and processors to take advantage of California's reputation for quality products in competing with foreign imports. By increasing consumer awareness of agricultural commodities produced in California, the measure will help to substantially level the playing field," stated author Rusty Areias in a recent statement.

The Department earlier this year requested a "Quality Assurance Label" in their budget, but was blue-penciled by the Governor. It was felt too much liability would be tied to the label.

SB 1110-CRUELTY TO ANIMALS AND AB 2524-AGRICULTURE: VEAL PRODUCTION Grange opposed SB 1110 on the grounds that agricultural production should be regulated by the affecting agency, and not mandated by state law. As an alternative, industry introduced AB 2524 to study the effects of production on veal calves. Grange has supported the premise of the study. We have considered both sides of the "animal rights-animal welfare" issue, and have been a member of the California Animal Welfare Coalition for several years. Maybe it's time both sides sat down and discussed the issue rationally, unemotionally, and came to an agreement regarding how veal calves are raised. We still adhere to the need for a study within this state's boundaries, and feel that information should be incorporated into a compromise by both sides when creating regulations to determine humane and correct procedure in raising veal calves.

We cannot condone the actions of the animal rights groups in destroying public and private property, nor can we condone the theft of study animals. The implications of the theft of study animals is frightening. Do the "thieves" know what disease they may spread by releasing those "innocent" rabbits? Human health now becomes a factor when the "thieves" remove the study animals from their sterile atmosphere.

The Grange should consider a moderate approach to the veal calf, and other production animal, issues, and suggest to all parties concerned the rational avenue of discussion and compromise from a scientific and unemotional standpoint.

VISION: CALIFORNIA 2010 The Grange was invited to present views regarding the future of Agriculture in this state and reviewed the following issues: Education, Agricultural literacy, Water policy, Environmental Policy, Farm Labor, Biotechnology, International Trade, Land Use, Transportation and the Role of Government. In this last, we follow the premise that "In Essentials, Unity, in Non-essentials, Liberty, in All things, Charity.

An excellent community service project can be incorporated along with this report regarding Agricultural Literacy and Educating the public about the importance of agriculture in and for this state. Would you believe many inner city children in our own state still believe that chocolate milk comes from a chocolate cow, and that the milk in the carton comes from the store, not some animal who grazes the fields of California? But not only that, nonagriculturally oriented individuals are not as literate when it comes to the use of agricultural chemicals, and thus an emotional "Alar Returns" advertisement campaign brings fear to the hearts of Mothers and School districts alike. The scientific approach is never listened to. It's not "fancy" enough. And invariably, the damage has already been done when the offending party finally admits their error.

WATER-A CALIFORNIA ISSUE

The California State Grange presented testimony to the Committees of the Assembly on Water, Parks and Wildlife, and the Senate Agriculture and Water Resources. Grange stated that a "dry dam" will not be the solution for future generations, and encouraged a multi-purpose dam at the Auburn site. Citing James O'Sullivan's accomplishment in securing and seeing the end product with the Grand Coulee Dam, the Grange feels that this dam and its struggle to become reality should serve as a model for the Auburn Dam. This particular project has been on the drawing board over 25 years. It's time to get it off the drawing board and into the Auburn Ravine.

In additional testimony before the US Department of Interior Bureau of Reclamation regarding the draft EIS for proposed water contracting programs in the Sacramento and American Rivers and Delta Export Service Areas, the Grange reviewed policy in the areas of Delta Water Quality, Area of Origin, Agriculture Use, Delta Export, and Water Subsidy.

In reviewing the testimony, the Grange stated a belief that the free-flowing waters of the state belong to all the people and should provide benefits to its many users.

The Grange was the first agricultural organization to support the joint Federal/State Water project in the early 1930's, and continues to endorse this joint effort and strongly supports the Coordinated Operation Agreement entered into by the state and federal government to meet water quality standards in the Delta. It was this agreement that cleared the way for the resumption of long-term contracting of available and uncommitted water from the CVP.

IN CONCLUSION

The California State Grange Legislative Department will strive to further advocate the policy of this State Grange before Congress and the State Legislature, but without your commitment to involvement via the Granger Action Plan or requests to serve on interim committees, this effort will be for naught. We encourage you to become actively involved in your Legislative Department either through the written word or a few weekends a year in committee with fellow Grangers in Sacramento.

I cannot look into my crystal ball and tell you what's on the drawing board, but one suggestion I would like to throw out for your consideration is the ability of this Department to utilize the membership to attend statewide hearings, meetings and discussions that would further enhance the knowledge of the Department, and keep you, the membership, informed on what's happening not only in your local area, but your state as well.

I look forward to a productive year, and to working with you all. I would like to take this time to thank you all for the opportunity to serve you in this capacity as we look to the future and what it may bring.

CALIFORNIA GRANGE NEWS

Worthy Master, Honored Guests, Brothers and Sisters:

The biggest thing to happen to your newspaper since we last met was the installation of the new computer system, which Master Austin covered in his annual address. While the new computers were received in the proverbial nick of time, I do want to clear up one little detail, matters weren't quite as bad as some of the rumors I have heard would have it. We were NOT holding the old equipment together with staples. Actually, we were using a strategically wedged staple remover to keep the equipment running.

Learning the new system has been interesting. The relationship of computer program designers to real life working conditions is about as close as the relationship of Stephen King to Uncle Wiggly. The training books are correctly described as volumes, not manuals, and all are written at the level of a fullydeveloped, mind-reading telepath. While we do learn shortcuts and the work gets done on time, we're still not sure about the end results.

For example, under the old system there was a simple command, "set eject off". This allowed the operator to begin printing anywhere on the page rather than submit to the computers desire to start everything on a nice clean sheet. The new system does not recognize that command. Now, I'd like to talk to you about another tool, a tool that is available for your use as well as the use of the State office that tool is the Grange News.

You have probably noticed that the paper is basically composed of three parts. First, there is the "Grange News", which includes information on the various programs of the State and National Grange. It includes columns from our State Grange leaders and directors, such as the State Master, Lecturer, GWA, Youth and Junior Grange directors. This is literally the voice of the State Grange talking to its membership, particularly those members who may not attend meetings on a regular basis. It is the tool with which the State Grange keeps in touch with all of its members.

The next section I would call the digest section, for it is not really "news" of current events. The very nature of our product precludes the reporting of what TV journalists like to call "breaking" news stories. We report on the activities of the National Grange and Congress, the State Grange and the Legislature, the progress of transforming Grange policy into law, and informing you of events and developments that may effect you and your community.

The information we pass on is not really "news" unless your local media did not cover it and you are reading it for the first time. We readily admit that our reporting on the Legislature or Congress is influenced not by what is "news", but by what is "Grange

News". We report those stories which, because of policy created at sessions like this one, we perceive to be of interest or concern to our members.

The third section of the paper is devoted to news of and by the local Granges. It is here that you, as leaders of your local Granges, have a tremendous tool at your disposal if you want to use it.

This section includes letters to the editor, stories about the achievements of individual Grangers, stories about the achievements of a Grange in its local community, and of course, the section called "In The News".

Here, for the cost of a twenty-five cent stamp, you have a chance to talk to members throughout the state. You can exchange ideas, present your views on the issues, find out what other Grangers are thinking.

The idea is catching on. Each issue we receive stories of Granges actively involved in their community. From scholarships to community activism, Granges are becoming visible. Yet from the majority of the submissions, you'd think the predominant Grange activity was the decorating of Grange halls for potlucks. Which is fine, if that's what you want to talk about. But then we should at least be talking about future potlucks in case the rest of us would like to drop in and enjoy them.

In the end, the choice is yours. You here are the Grange leaders, and it is you who will decide the activities of your Grange that will be reported "In The News". Like the structure of the Grange itself, the Grange News is there for your benefit. I hope you will use it. And if there is any way that I can assist you, please, just stop and tell me how.

RURAL AREAS AGAINST DRUGS COMMITTEE

Worthy Master, Delegates and Friends,

The California State Grange RAAD Committee was formed with the idea of creating effective programs that would lead the way in combating Drug and Alcohol Abuse in our communities. So many programs are being introduced by grassroots organizations, an effective effort is often duplicated.

Within the structure of the California State Grange are 280 Subordinate Granges with the desire to implement good programs for their communities; however, no real guidance on how to show a program from the State Office exists.

In order for this program to be effective, it must

first be unique, and it must be a program that will be attended by the community in large enough numbers to create interest enough for repetition, thereby promoting the Grange as a leader in the community.

There have been hundreds of Drug and Alcohol programs introduced to communities by every organization with little public turnout, all with the same message. Everybody is doing the same thingbring out the professionals, Sheriff or other Law Enforcement, supply hand outs. Let's educate the public, and direct the information at our kids.

Grange RAAD wanted to develop a program that local Granges could reproduce, would ensure turnout, increase support for the Grange, and develop a sense of self esteem in our young people and stimulate a stronger grassroots effort and stronger community bonding.

Grange members, like those in other community organizations, are ill-equipped to deal with drug and alcohol problems effectively because we are not professionals in the field. There are many areas we can choose to target, yet are limited to the availability of materials and professionals to do the program. All we have been able to do is organize the event and provide a public hall.

This program will deal with one area of concern, our KIDS! By concentrating our efforts on one program, we become effective as a whole organization and help each other develop our program to provide it's maximum potential.

Until now, every effort to provide a drug and alcohol program for the benefit of our kids has seen little participation by the kids and parents. Rather than a program that shows what Drug and Alcohol Abuse IS, the California State Grange RAAD is currently developing a program that shows what Drug and Alcohol Abuse ISN'T.

I'd like to take this opportunity to thank the members of the committee for their efforts in the infancy stages of this committee, and the State Master for the opportunity to serve in this capacity.

REPORT ON GRANGE CREDIT UNIONS

Worthy Master, Honored Guests, Brothers and Sisters:

Several Grange Credit Union leaders got together in February of this year to discuss common problems and possible solutions among the remaining Grange Credit Unions in the state of California. A survey was made following the meeting regarding membership and services. Of nineteen credit unions surveyed, there were fourteen responses. Most are still serving Grangers and their families, although a few have expanded to 4H, FFA and small employee groups, mostly those serving the agriculture industry. You may ask why the expansion?

Assume for a moment that you are a new applicant for Grange membership. You have applied to a local Grange and wish to join the other members in serving their community. After having been told you have been accepted, you wait for that meeting to take your obligation. Well, it seems there won't be a business meeting for two months because the Grange doesn't meet during the summer, or the meeting has been changed without your knowledge, and you miss it. Then, when you do make the meeting, it seems there are barely enough members present to hold a regular meeting. Someone gives you the obligation and welcomes you to the Grange, but nothing else is said about what benefits are available to you as a member. You may be asked to serve on a committee or work on a project being planned by the members. Great.

Sometime later, you purchase a new car and take it to the next meeting. Someone may ask you about the financing deal you found. When you tell them about the dealer financing, one will say "Gee, you could have got a better rate at our Grange Credit Union." That's the first you hear about it.

The lack of communication is one of our major shortcomings. Most credit unions are unaware of the new members in your Grange and have a difficult time reaching them. Due to the age of the majority of our members, we seem to be losing more than we are gaining. Now you can see why many Grange credit unions are beginning to serve other fields of membership. In order to be competitive and increase member services, we must grow. We need you, your children, and grandchildren to join your Grange credit union.

All children need to learn the lessons of thrift which were taught in the past by our parents and grandparents. Today's Americans are becoming debtors more than savers. A recent article in the news stated that Americans save less than most people in other nations. We need to return to the past by teaching our children to be thrifty.

Credit unions were started by individuals wishing to band together to form a mutual cooperative for its members. The savings in each credit union is used for low-cost loans for worthwhile purposes only to the members who belong, and not to outsiders. All earnings are returned to the member-owners and not for the benefit of outside stockholders.

Your credit union welcomes you and your family members. It is not necessary to wait until you have a large amount to open your account. Small amounts set aside regularly add up to a tidy sum in no time. Most credit unions do not "charge" you for having a small account as do most banks. Dividends, or interest, are earned on all amounts above the minimum share value set by the Board of each credit union. Your savings are insured by the strongest of all federal deposit insurance programs.

Now if you are a credit union member, you're probably thinking "How can I bring in a new member?" First, we need communication. Tell your new Grangers about your credit union. If you are a Subordinate Secretary, ask about information to give new members. Perhaps flyers could be sent out with your annual dues notices or in your newsletters. Unless you regularly report new members to your local Grange credit union, they have no way of reaching that new member. Do you have a bulletin board in your hall? Keep a poster or other notice about your Credit Union on the board.

Membership is basic. Without purpose or a sense of belonging, members soon whither and fade away. Whether in the Grange or in any other organization, a member is "a part of the whole" according to the dictionary definition. Credit Union members are recognized as an important part of the whole organization. Member-owners are given personal service at their credit unions, because without them, we wouldn't exist.

Thank you for your time. It is my hope and prayers that we will both continue to grow and serve our members.

VACAVILLE AUTUMN LEAVES ANNUAL REPORT

Worthy Master, Executive Committee Officers, Delegates,

It has been my privilege to report to this delegate body on the dreams, hopes and progress of the Vacaville Autumn Leaves.

Today, I'm very pleased to announce that the

Vacaville Autumn Leaves apartment complex is in full operation. This 56 unit apartment complex consists of 34 one bedroom, 16 efficiency and 6 handicap apartments. There will be a twelve month inspection by Housing and Urban Development (HUD) on October 26, 1989 and hopefully they will sign the closing in November of this year. The last report to this convention in October 1988, was not yet approved for occupancy, however on October 29, 1988 at 4:00 pm, permission was given to occupy these apartments. By midnight, 21 apartments were occupied. November 5, all apartments were occupied.

Vacaville Subordinate Grange, California State Grange, Retirement Housing Foundation, a representative from HUD, and the entire city of Vacaville Council held an open house.

All apartments have been continuously occupied. The Vacaville Subordinate Grange and California State Grange formed a non-profit organization and requested Retirement Housing Foundation, because of their proficiency in developing this type of housing nationwide, and has a good relationship with HUD, to co-sponsor Autumn Leaves.

The second application was submitted and approved in the amount of \$3 million. The City of Vacaville purchased and donated the land in the amount of \$100,000 and forgave the payments for building fees and hook-up fees in the amount of \$125,000, which was imperative to qualify for HUD.

The residents have formed an association and named it Autumn Leaves Residents' Association. They have approved by-laws, officers and their objective is to provide a caring relationship and activities for all residents. Their activities consist of bible study services provided by a local pastor, potlucks, barbecues, bingo, a game night, and movies on a VCR the residents raised the money to buy.

Retirement Housing Foundation does the hiring of the manager and all the financial billing for the project.

Vacaville Senior Housing Corporation is the legal owner. It is an eleven member organization. The board of Directors consist of the Master of the State Grange, three executive Committee members, and six of the local Vacaville #575 members, as well as one Retirement Housing Foundation member.

The State Master and the Executive Committee members have been most cooperative and have kept on top of the project from start to finish.

The Retirement Management Corporation has an excellent management team. All money goes through

Retirement Housing Foundation and they pay all bills from there. All money is collected and an audit is taken by HUD annually.

I find it necessary to express myself in proper terms. The occupants are called residents, the efficiency apartments are normally called studio apartments, except when you deal with HUD. Which reminds me of the country boy that attempted to enroll in a city school. His country school being a one room class and eight grades, he didn't know what grade he was in. The teacher said she would give him a quiz to decide his grade level.

Question 1: How many days in a week begin with the letter "t".

Answer: 2 - Today and Tomorrow

UKIAH AUTUMN LEAVES ANNUAL REPORT

Worthy State Master, Worthy State Officers, Dignitaries, Brothers and Sisters,

The board and management sends you greetings and best wishes for a very successful convention. We also extend our best wishes to Vacaville Autumn Leaves for every success in their venture.

Ukiah Autumn Leaves is ending its 14th year of successful operation. We just recently received the results of the HUD internal inspection of the complex, also the grounds in general and evaluation of the financial condition. I'm proud to be able to inform you that all were found to be in superior condition. Also received congratulations on our excellent financial status. There were some minor discrepancies noted, but all were in the process of being corrected. Also, auditor had not properly filled out all reports and some expenditures had been improperly grouped together. Auditor was notified and necessary corrections and explanations made to HUD.

The proposed budget for 1989 is: Income-\$338,568, up from last year by about seven thousand dollars, with expected expenses to be about the same as income. We did not request an increase last year, but this coming year we will have to because of increases in operating costs mainly due to inflation. The amount of fire insurance on buildings and contents is just under \$3,700,000 and liability is \$3,000,000.

We have just recently been informed that HUD has authorized us to invest our replacement reserves in a HUD approved program so these reserves can bear interest instead of just sitting there. Also, as soon as HUD receives notification of monies placed, we will be reimbursed from HUD for invested funds so we still retain use of our reserves as needed. Board voted to invest \$80,000 in HUD approved investments which include US Treasury notes and bonds. They also allow only certain investment firms to be used. This is a new program so there is much more to be learned as time goes on.

We are replacing a number of things that have just worn out. To date, of the 92 units, 50 refrigerators, 6 stoves, new sets of draperies in 37 units, new carpets in 40 units and 39 units cleaned and painted. All replacement items are of better quality than those originally installed. Also, ground floor and all stairs carpets have been replaced. Security inside and outside complex has been replaced with a better system for the protection of our tenants. Next big item is the roof. Had it inspected and was told it was good for another year or two. Estimated cost of a better roof with a guarantee is \$50,000 at present.

We also have had the good fortune of getting a contract with Sears Roebuck and Company to purchase any item they carry at wholesale and all items are guaranteed to be name brand products and top quality.

Vacancy is no problem as there is a waiting list still for some two years ahead at present and so many that inquire do not even bother to sign up. We could easily keep another 50 units full if we just had them. The need is there, getting funding to fill this need is another matter.

We want to extend an invitation to all if they should be in our area to stop by and see our complex for yourself. We will be most happy to show you around. Just go to the manager's office, tell her who you are and she will take it from there. Including coffee.

AM Best, an independent rating company that reviews financial strength and operating performances of thousands of life/health insurance companies, rated GML as A (Excellent). They stated "Grange Mutual Life has over 80% of its invested assets in bonds and mortgage loans." Actually, 65% of our assets are in bonds. I'm sure you've heard a lot this year about "junk" bonds, which offered a higher rate of return. Results were bad! GML did not buy junk. They bought investment grade! Results were excellent-no defaults on any of our securities.

Yes, we really are financially well and healthy, and growing.

What have we done to help the California State Grange?

We continued to advertise substantially in the Grange News. We continued to support our young people through their youth and young adult conferences (both in participation and contribution). We financially supported the Western States Youth and Leadership conference. We contributed to the California State Grange Leadership conferences.

A new program-Wanted Posters-was conceived to help youth and young adults. \$10 reward for inquiries from Grangers, via reply cards.

We developed our third Grange training program "The Twelve Keys to a Successful Grange." This is a complete slide presentation with script. Available for your use, free of charge. This promotes and builds the Grange by training and educating our members. Two new products were introduced last year. These were pre-need funeral plans. They are rapidly becoming our best sellers. They are relatively easy to obtain and no medical exams necessary. Particularly good for some of us over age 50 and perhaps with a few medical problems.

We have made a substantial investment of time, effort and money to help build the California State Grange. All we ask in return is that you think of Grange Mutual Life when you consider the purchase of life insurance, health insurance and annuities. Why should you send your premium dollars to New York, Florida or the mid-west and build the Eastern economy, when you could send them to GML and build the Western economy and of California? Those "other" companies do not contribute to the California State Grange or its functions, which benefit the membership of CSG. Please help us help you!

TO THE OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE CALIFORNIA STATE GRANGE

We at the Grange Insurance Association wish to send our best wishes to the California State Grange, assembled here at San Bernardino. We at Grange Insurance Association are proud to be a part of this organization serving the insurance needs of the membership and look forward to serving these needs of the California State Grange in the years ahead.

Table 1 is an extract from GIA's 1988 Annual Statement, compared with the same data for the past two years.

1988 Premiums increased 3.3% to \$74.8 million. Assets grew 6.8% to an all-time high of \$135.8 million. Policyholders' Surplus increased \$9.1 million, or 24.6%. Financially, 1988 was GIA's best year in the past 15. A good share of the improved results for 1988 can be attributed to efforts of the past several years to control loss experience and improve operation efficiency. Also, it helped to have relatively good weather in 1988.

As we have reported in the past, membership in Grange is one of our greatest concerns as well as that of the State Grange. We are seeing a slowing of membership decline within our operating states and hope to be able to report, in 1990, that Grange membership is on the "plus" side.

We have begun, and in some areas in conjunction with the Granges, to have booths at trade shows, fairs and other such events to see if increased membership can be developed in this manner. After three or four such events, preliminary results look favorable. We still feel that the juniors, youth and young adults need to be brought to the front and we are participating wherever possible in these areas. We will continue the 25 cents per member donation to Junior Grange membership as well as 25 cents per member of the California State Grange. We have also increased the number of Junior Grange T-Shirts which we donate to the camping program. I feel that the associate membership program has some good potential to increase Grange membership if it is used properly, but it will take some work by the individual Subordinate Granges.

Grange Insurance Association made direct contributions to the Granges in the eight states in which it operates in excess of \$150,000 and is continuing to give twenty-two \$500 scholarships within its operating states. Washington continues to develop the largest percent of income for GIA, followed by California, with Colorado and Oregon both showing just over 8% of the total written premium each.

1989 COMMITTEE ON AFFILIATES REPORT

Worthy National Master, Worthy National Assistant Steward, Worthy State Master, Brothers and Sisters all:

It is with great pleasure that I come before you today to report on the activities this year of the Committee on Affiliates. For those of you who are unsure of just what this committee does, it is our job to research, review and recommend to the State Executive Committee new programs of Benefits and Services as well as updates to existing programs for you as Grange members.

Our year began with our first meeting in May to establish our agenda for the year. In addition to the ongoing process of research, review and recommendation, we were faced with the financial demise of First Farwest Insurance Co., who was one of the providers of major medical and medicare supplement policies for California Grangers. As we attempted to begin discussion with other health care providers, it was soon obvious that we lacked the statistical data necessary regarding our membership to answer the questions of the health providers. At that point in time, we began the arduous task of compiling the necessary data to be informed, about our membership. My thanks to all those who assisted in the compilation of this data. To date, we have surveyed approximately 3,000 Grange applications with some interesting results which I would like to share with you. Regarding the ages of those applying for Grange membership over the last 10 years, there are 4 categories: 14-24, 25-44, 45-64, and 65+. The results were:

These numbers are contrary to many of the opinions we hear expressed that the Grange is a dying organization. In our random survey, do you realize that over the last 10 years of those making application for Grange membership, less than 1/3 were over the age of 65? This is in direct contrast to the ages of the majority of those regularly attending Grange meetings. Add the 25-44 age group with the 45-64 age group, and the result is 62% of those surveyed fall within these two groups. 62%!. These are the young families and working groups within our order. But, where are they on meeting nights? Why are they not attending? In the 14-24 age group, only 4% of those surveyed fell into this category. This age group is our future. They are the sons and daughters of our members, but why aren't they joining? Questions with no pat answers. At all levels we need to ask-Why? And, with the responses, put our departments and committees to work, working together to provide programs and projects, benefits and services that not only gain new members for our fraternity, but new participants within our Granges.

If you have been keeping a running total, you can see that we've reached 95% of the applications surveyed. What about the 5%? Well, these applications either had no indication of age or some of the applications provided no place for age or birthdate. However, on our new membership applications, there is a specific request for the birthdate and we ask your assistance in making certain that the applications coming into your Grange are completed in their entirety.

We have two new programs that are being added to our benefits and services offerings. We are now a part of Super 8 Motel's VIP program, which offers you, a Grange member, a 10% discount on lodging at any of their participating facilities by using your Grange VIP# when making your reservations. Also, just approved this week was the Magic Kingdom Club sponsored by Disneyland and Disney World, which offers you a discount on admission to either theme park along with special vacation packages just for Magic Kingdom club members. Both of these programs are available with no enrollment fee because you are a Grange member.

Benefits and Services are tools to be used in recruiting new members and retaining current ones. The Supermarket of Benefits and Services notebook is a tool of communication to inform both new and existing members of what is available to them as Grange members. There are still Granges that do not have their notebook. Plans have been made to see that these books get to those Granges. If your Grange has a notebook, but you don't see it at Grange meetings or Grange sponsored functions, ask where it is. Tools can only help when put into use.

I would like to thank all of the Affiliates for their continued generous support of the Granges in California. Also, thanks to the Committee: Lester and Barbara Rougeot, John and Elsie Espinola, Jim and Lois Smith, Arne and Rosemary Hansen and Tom Stefenoni.

Worthy National Master, Brother Barrow, spoke about developing our potential...that it is not good enough just to have what others have. This statement describes one of the top priorities of the Committee on Affiliates which is to provide Benefits and Services that will offer people a reason to join the Grange.

Thank you, Worthy State Master and Brothers and Sisters, for allowing me this opportunity to serve you in this capacity.

In addition, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the delegate body for their adoption of S-G-8, making this a Standing Committee of the State Grange.

MEMBERSHIP REPORT

Worthy Master, State Officers and Members:

As I took over the position of Membership Coordinator, a new committee was formed, and I believe we have had a productive year, with more plans yet ahead.

I felt we needed some new, interesting material to

work with, and therefore, a new member brochure was written. It has only recently been ready for distribution, but has been readily accepted as a good new tool for telling prospective new members about the Grange. It also includes two revised applications. These brochures are being sent to each Grange, Insurance agents and Credit Union offices. A copy was also included in your packet.

I think you will find they are a quick introduction to the Grange and easy to read, and I hope you will use them to bring in more members for your Grange.

A new member manual is being prepared and will be forthcoming in the next few months. This is to be given to the new member at the time they take the obligation and will give them a broader view of California Grange.

I am pleased to announce that we had a smaller loss in total membership this year than in any year in the recent past.

I am pleased to show that 78 Granges had a net gain in membership. 10 Granges showed 10-25% net gain, 7 showed 26-50% net gain, and 2 had 50-100% net gain. These Granges will be recognized with a certificate. 12 Granges held their membership at the same figure as last year.

11 Pomona Granges gained 1 or more members. 5 held the same membership as last year.

Hilmar Grange #537 had the largest new gain with 81 members and also the largest percent gain for this year at 177% new gain. This is a real success story and we should be very proud of what Hilmar Grange has done this year to increase their membership and become an active, enthusiastic Grange again. Just ask any one of their members how they did it, and I know they will be happy to tell you the story. I am very pleased to present them with this plaque.

1989-91 State Master's Remarks William R. Booth

We have all heard the expression that today is the first day of the rest of your life. This expression applies equally as well to the Grange. I believe that we can have a useful and productive future for the Grange in today's modern world, if... we are willing to accept our part in this modern world that we have today.

Our Grange ritual teaches us many lessons, some of which I would like to review at this time:

In our first degree the Overseer exhibits to the candidates a memorandum book and admonishes them to note down new and useful ideas that come to them so that they may not be lost. The Overseer declares that new ideas are the material with which progress is made. If we in the Grange are to make progress, we must note the new and useful ideals so that they are not lost and we must not be afraid to implement them.

The installing officer in our installation ceremony advises the Master to encourage improvement; remembering that Nature's motto is onward; SHE never goes backward.

Our ritual teaches us many lessons and that change is an important part of God's plan. We, as Grangers, must embrace change as a necessary part of life and in doing so strive to accept those changes that will improve our order and our society. We must not change for the sake of change, but must change when necessary for the improvement of our order.

As we embark on our Grange journey for the next two years I would like to discuss with you some areas that are important to the future of the Grange here in California.

We are all familiar with the fact that our membership has declined over the last several years and we will be addressing this problem. I accept Past Master Koster's challenge on behalf of the Grange and I do intend that you as delegates to the Visalia Convention will receive a report that our membership

has increased. It will not be easy, but by pulling together we can do it.

In examining the membership statistics, we can see that recruitment is not the major problem. For example, during the March 89 Quarter we had Gains of 846 members of which we took in 665 new members by initiation and in this same quarter we lost a total of 1,495 members of which 1065 members were lost by either Suspension or Withdrawal. Looking closer at the losses, we see that 71% were lost due to suspension or withdrawal. What this tells us is that we are not having a problem in bringing new members into the Order, but for what ever reason we are not meeting the needs of these new members once they have been obligated and they are leaving our Granges. From the State Grange level we will be working to address this problem from several different approaches.

I will be requesting that the Executive Committee authorize a New Member's support program that will include the following features;

1) A uniform dues receipt and membership card that will be printed on our new computer system and sent to each Subordinate Grange Secretary. After the member pays his or her dues, the secretary simply signs the card, affixes the Grange seal, and mails the card to the member. This feature can apply to all members and not just new members.

2) In keeping with the new capacity of our computer system, we will be developing a database of our quarterly reports. It is our aim to have the computer generate the report form, bringing the prior quarter's balances forward and providing additional historical data on the membership performance of each respective Grange. Once the reports are received in the State Office the information will be compiled by the computer and summary reports printed for the Pomona Granges and District Deputies. In knowing where we have been, will give us an idea of our direction in the future.

3) After a new member has been obligated or received into membership via the degrees, they need to develop the habit of attending Grange. To this end we need to provide to the Secretaries a series of Post Cards that would be sent these new members notifying them of the meetings. These

cards would be sent for the first three months of membership. We must face facts: if they are not regularly attending Grange meetings after three months, these members should be considered inactive members.

4) As soon as we receive notification of a person being received into membership, a special designed packet should be mailed to each of these new members, which will include a welcome letter from the State Master and additional support information on the Grange, and information about what are the benefits of Grange Membership.

The most important part of retaining our new members involves the Subordinate Grange meeting itself. The membership department has been and is developing the tools we need to introduce prospective members to the Grange. When the new member attends his or her first meeting, the most important part of the membership equation comes into play. This part of the equation is the first impression of what the Grange is all about. We must do everything that we can do to make sure that we make a good first impression. If we don't, we usually will not get a second chance.

Each Grange needs to take a critical look at their meetings. Examine your meeting from the perspective of the new member. Is the ritual performed with proper decorum and dignity? Do you accomplish something at your meeting or are you simply meeting and paying your bills? Take a critical look at your meeting and in doing so, make plans for the future of not only your Grange but the Grange as a whole in California.

In a few short months the election process will begin in the Subordinate and Pomona Granges. As soon as possible after the Master is elected, that Master should call a meeting of the officers and appointed committee members in order to plan a program for the coming year. (After January, we will be sending to each Grange a packet that will aid in this planning process). If a plan is developed and followed, you will find that your programs will appear better organized and you will have less surprises and more things going right than you ever thought possible. If you fail to plan, then you should plan on failing.

In your planning meeting, a long term project should be included. This project should span a period of at least six months in time and may span several years if necessary. Some ideas for this type of project that have been used in California include building a community center, working to preserve a local pioneer cemetery, getting a para-medic service started, getting street numbers for all residences to aid emergency services in locating properties. These are but an example of what has been done. Look for a need in your community and try to fill it. I guarantee that any Grange that gets involved in a serious community project that truly benefits your community, the Grange will benefit in membership growth.

The benefits of Grange membership are varied and extensive. We offer more to our membership than most any other organization. Yet many of our members are referred to as "benefit" members. What we need to realize is that we all are benefit members. Those who only attend the potluck dinners receive the benefit of socializing with other Patrons, even those who only attend the business meeting can be considered as benefit members. If we, the Grange, fail to offer a benefit to our membership, then we will fail to attract new members. When I joined Grange some twenty years ago, I joined for a benefit. You see, the benefit I derived from Grange membership was not having my Grandmother always nagging me to become a member. Little did I know at that time that I would find the Grange to be one of the greatest organizations available for man.

As our Grange journey begins, the benefits we receive from the Grange change. We as members need to work with our new members so that the benefits they obtain from membership become compatible with the goals and aims of the Grange as a whole.

The resolutions that we have adopted here at this annual session and resolutions that have been adopted in sessions like this one over these past One Hundred and Seventeen years are useful in guiding our course of the Grange, but they don't clearly define where we are going twenty years from now. In order to set a course for the Grange, we must have clearly defined goals, both short term and long term goals, which will give our organization a direction. Without clearly defined goals, we are like a ship at sea, without a destination, at the mercy of the wind and current of the seas.

If asked, could you define the goals and purposes of the Order of Patrons of Husbandry here in California? I believe that our purpose has become clouded as time has progressed. Prior to our next annual session, a special committee composed of selected state officers and deputies will meet in Sacramento for the purpose of redefining the goals and purposes of the California State Grange. When that task is completed you, the delegates at our next annual session, will have the opportunity to make the final determination as to our acceptance of these goals and purposes. As always, we are a grassroots organization.

As your Master, I see the purpose of the State The first is to support the Grange as two-fold. activities of the Subordinate and Pomona Granges within its jurisdiction. The second is to carry out the policy mandates as defined by the resolutions passed at this and prior annual sessions. In regard to the second, in the next several months, we will examine the legislative program of the State Grange in minute detail. I believe that in order to have an effective State Grange, we must have an effective legislative program. My personal goal is that when an opinion or statement is printed in the news that concerns small family farmers or rural Californians, it will be credited to the California State Grange. To this end we plan to redouble our efforts in our State Capitol in improving the standing of the Grange with our legislators.

To be effective in Sacramento, we will also require the help of our membership base across California. One of the most effective means of swaying legislative opinion is through letters and phone calls from constituents to their legislators. When we issue the call for help on a legislative issue, we will surely fail without your assistance. We will be asking for your support, especially for those of you who have a personal relationship with our state lawmakers.

a Grange, we must have effective As communication between our State Grange and the Pomona and Subordinate Granges, and also between the State Grange and our membership. To this end, we will be looking at the California Grange News as a way in which it can be used to communicate our legislative goals and needs to the membership. It is important that the Grange News provides a forum for our membership and that it is used as a tool to educate our membership. As more and more of our members come from a non-agricultural background, we as an organization must use the tools at our disposal, such as the Grange News to educate our membership to the needs of the Agricultural sector of our country. We will also be looking at ways in which the Grange News can become more self supporting from advertising revenue.

In closing, I expect that you will notice changes in how things are being done in the State Grange Office. If you didn't, I am sure that I would not be here now addressing you. Each person who has held this office has placed his own personal touches on the administration of Grange policy and law. I believe that we are a people of laws. We as citizens of this great country realize that it is the law that gives order to our society. So, to, in the Grange we are controlled by laws. It is my intention to fully support the laws, rules and regulations of the Grange at all levels. For if we fail to abide by these laws, we fail to maintain order and discipline within the Grange and we will fail to garner the respect of our Brothers and Sisters of the Order and of those whom we may wish to invite to become members of our order.

(REF: Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, Chapter XIX, Section 58.)

- 1. <u>BADGES</u>: No one will enter the Session without a badge which signifies their \$5.00 Registration Fee has been paid.
- 2. \$5.00 REGISTRATION FEE shall close on SATURDAY, OCTOBER 14, 1989 at 12:00 PM.
- 3. <u>\$5.00 REGISTRATION FEE</u> per person shall be waived for Junior Grangers, invited guests and anyone not attending the general business session.
- 4. <u>RESOLUTION CLOSING TIME</u> for the acceptance of properly submitted resolutions shall be 11:30 AM, THURSDAY, OCTOBER 12, 1989.
- 5. COMMITTEE RESOLUTION CLOSING TIME shall be 4:00 PM, THURSDAY, OCTOBER 12, 1989.
- <u>RESOLUTION IDENTITY</u>: Resolution properly submitted after September 15, 1989, but before the October 12, 1989, 11:30 AM deadline, will be included in the supplemental resolution pad and will lose their Grange identity.

The Executive Committee shall have the authority to grant only cost of living increases in the compensation of officers who work for the California State Grange. This percentage of increase shall not exceed the cost of living index published by the Federal Government and shall become effective on January First of each year and shall be submitted to the delegates for approval at which time said increase shall become the base compensation. If not approved by the delegates, the increase shall be rescinded effective on the date the delegates disallowed the increase.

The Executive Committee may reduce or increase the compensation of an officer if during the term of office the work of an officer is increased from a part-time to a full-time basis or reduced from a full-time to a parttime basis or because of an unwillingness or inability to perform the duties of the office.

All forms of compensation, no matter how they are classified, shall be subject to the limits placed in this section.

All officers salaries may be paid semi-monthly in addition to necessary expenses while engaged in the work of the order.
