Standing Rules of the Convention

When adopted, the Standing Rules of the Convention, will apply only to the 130th Annual Session of the California State Grange, Bakersfield, California, 2002 (Reference: Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, Chapter XIX, Section 58)

*Registration Fee: The \$10 registration fee shall be waived for Junior Grangers, invited guests, and out of state guests
*Badges: No one will be admitted to the session without a hadge which

*Badges: No one will be admitted to the session without a badge which signifies their registration fee has been paid (except as noted above) Delegate Registration: Closing date and time for Delegate Registration shall be Friday, October 11, 2002 at Noon. Any late registrant MUST have the approval of the State Master Resolution Closing Time: The closing time for the acceptance of properly submitted resolutions shall be 12 Noon, Thursday, October, 10. 2002. For committee resolutions, the closing time shall be Friday, October 11, 2002 at 10:00 am.

*Resolution Introduction: A vote shall not be taken on a resolution unless it has been in the delegates' Hands at least four hours. (G-7-79). *Combining C&BL Resolutions: Constitutional Resolutions shall not be combined in Committee (SG-36-82).

*Amendments to Resolutions: All motions to amend resolutions, which are excessively long shall be presented in writing to the Secretary's Station, so as to be properly entered into the minutes.
*Floor Motions In Writing: All motions made from the floor concerning subjects new to the Grange and not presented in resolutions shall be presented in writing to the Secretary's Station, so as to be properly entered into the minutes.

*Floor Debate: Shall be limited to two (2) minutes per delegate on any given question.

*Officer Reports: The written reports of all officer shall be submitted to the Secretary's Station prior to the close of the first day of session for inclusion in the Journal of Proceedings.

*Approval of Minutes: The Executive Committee shall have the authority to approve the minutes, of the final day of session at their meeting after the close of the session *C&BL Resolutions: All C&BL resolutions shall be presented no later than 1:30 pm on the 2nd day of the session and be processed until completed, except for those being recommitted. (91-006

*Convention Site (S) Voting: Voting by the delegate body to select future convention sites for the Annual Session of the California State Grange shall be conducted only by paper ballot. (97-003)

Minutes of the Annual Session

The first day of the 130th annual session of the California State Grange was opened at 9:00 am, by Sister Kathy Bergeron, First Lady

of the California State Grange, who introduced the State Officers of the California State Grange reminding us of our history as well as our future.

Upon the officers taking their stations, Worthy Master Bergeron requested a prayer for Brother George Dupray, who is ill. Worthy Chaplain, Pay Dahms, led the assembly in a prayer of healing and strength for Brother George and Sister Marilyn.

The session was opened in full form in the Sixth Degree. Opening song, America the Beautiful. Flag was presented by Worthy Flora, Linda Chernoff.

Master Bergeron lowered to the Fourth Degree and members were invited to enter.

Honored Guests were introduced and escorted to the Master's Station. LeRoy Watson, National Grange Director of Legislative Activities; Mary Johnson, Chaplain of the National Grange and Master of the Idaho State Grange; Don Johnson, Past Master of the California State Grange; Bill Booth, Past Master of the California State Grange; John Felder and Sister Emily Felder, were escorted to the Master's Station. Each gave a short welcoming remark.

Harvey L. Hall, Mayor of the City of Bakersfield, was escorted to the Master's Station. He thanked the delegates for the warm welcome he received. He didn't get as warm a welcome from the 10,000 people at the Lakers Game the night before. He brought greetings from the City of Bakersfield, and stressed the importance of the continuing commitment to Youth Scholarship, Fair Programs, and reaching out to the Urban Communities to give them an understanding of the things the Grange stands for.

Master Bergeron explained the items at his Master's Station. The bucket, shovel and flak jacket are reminders of when he was on the other side of the podium, and what he knows is now coming his way.

Motion by Hank Hitt to adopt the Standing Rules. Seconded. Motion by K. Bergeron to amend the standing rules by changing "Delegates" to "members". Seconded. Standing count was called. Aye: 53 Nay:71 Amendment has failed. Original motion carried. Standing Rules adopted.

Kermit Richardson, Master of the National Grange, sent a letter read by LeRoy Watson, expressing regret that he was unable to be with the California Grangers and extending wishes for a productive session.

Grange Law resolutions transferred to other committees. 02-002 to GA; 02-014 to GA; 02-023 to GA; 02-030 to GA; 02-037 to GA; 02-038 to GA; 02-044 to GA; 02-047 to GA; 02-049 to Public Policy; 02-050 to Public Policy.

Inger Bevans, auditing member of the Executive Committee was called to the podium. Budget proposal for 2003, was discussed. Motion by Felder to recommit. Discussion. Bill Booth moved to un-restrict \$28,020 from the GBO restricted funds to balance the 2003 budget.

Hank Hitt moved to amend that this be a one-time withdrawal. Heidi Hitt moved to amend the amendment that funds be repaid by the sale of the Fresno property.

It was explained that money returning to the GBO funds from the sale of the property includes approximately \$60, 000 due to be returned to the California State Grange from the clean-up of the Fresno property.

Amendments were withdrawn. Motion as stated carried.

Motion by Randall Lewis that the GBO funds be repaid the \$28,020 to the GBO fund from the

funds owed to the California State Grange expended for the cleanup of the property. Seconded Carried.

State Master's Annual Report

Part I

Many years ago, Moses delivered his people out of Egypt. He parted the Red Sea and delivered them into the desert where they wandered for forty years seeking the promised land.

Well, this is 2002. I am not Moses, and unlike his people, we do not have 40 years to wander the desert trying to find ourselves. Our allotted time for wandering is up.

1963, the Eastman commissioned by National Grange, came to the conclusion that unless serious changes were made in the operations of the Grange, it would not survive much past the turn of the Century. Changes were not made. We are at the turn of the Century. And we are very close to no longer existing. Unless we are able to renew the Grange now, this year, at this Convention, within 5 years the Grange as we know it will die!!

For over 100 years the Grange has been synonymous with Rural America, and it is Rural America that is the backbone of this great country. It was Rural America that enabled the Industrial Revolution. It is Rural America which continues to nourish our urban cousins as they explore new frontiers in the human experience. And it is Rural America which is the foundation of the American Dream - a home in the country, a small ranch or farm, a cabin in the mountains or by the lake, a place to retire to. Rural America is as much a state of mind as it is a location on a map. And the Grange embodies Rural America.

That is my belief. Now you know why I am so passionate in my efforts to save this organization. Not to preserve it as some museum display of what was, but rather to fulfill the promise of what it should be, a vibrant part of our American culture.

That, Brothers and Sisters, is my message to you today. I want you to share my passion for rebuilding our Grange.

YEAR ONE - PLANNING

It should be obvious from the membership numbers that the Grange needs to change if it is going to survive. But change without proper planning is worse than no change at all. While I have many ideas on what could work to turn our

Grange around, I prefer to narrow them down to those that should work. Like our demand for sound science, I wanted to analyze the facts and then have these plans reviewed by my peers, in this case, the leaders of the Grange.

The result is that these plans were reviewed and discussed by your Master, your Overseer, the members of the Executive Committee, your Secretary and your Treasurer. In implementing these plans and programs, there was not a single dissenting vote on any of the actions taken. Not one.

Change is seldom instantaneous. Both those making the change, and those affected by the change must make adjustments, and during this time of uncertainty, rumors will fly. Unless you've spent the summer lost in the high country, I'm sure you've heard some of them. I usually pay little attention to rumors. But some that I became aware of actually accused this administration of intentionally trying to hurt or even destroy the Grange. Shame on those that would say such a thing, and double-shame on anyone who would believe that I would ever want to destroy the Grange. If you ever have a question on what this administration is doing, please take a moment and call me. We have a toll-free number at the office: 1-866-4GRANGE. That's 1-866-4GRANGE.

There are those, however, who had genuine concerns about what was happening to their Grange. Some appear confused over the changes, particularly those changes which involve ritual, meeting structure and business practices. One of the most common concerns we have heard is that "this is not the same Grange I've been involved in for the last 25 years, and I'm not sure I feel comfortable with it." And this is a true statement. But it should be a positive, not a negative. The Grange for the past 25 years it has been dying. The changes are making the Grange live again.

It is human nature to feel uncomfortable with change. Yet change is perhaps the only true constant in our lives. At any given time, anything living is in a state of change..

But why are we changing the Grange? Consider an old pick-up truck in the barn. We're fond of it, it has great memories associated with it, it just won't run. And someday we intend to restore it. Well, that someday has arrived. A rebuilt motor, some new parts and a paint-job, and

we have a classic. The basic structure of our pickup is unchanged, but now it works!

How do we know that our rebuilt Grange will work? Easy. Results.

We have taken our changes into the field and tested them in real-life situations. They work! And because of these changes, this old Grange is again showing signs of life. In the year ending June, 2000, we lost 13% of our membership. For the year ending June, 2001, we lost 20% of our membership. In the year ending June, 2002, we had cut our membership loss to 3%.

Now for some good news. In the quarter ending June 2002, for the first time in ten years, we enjoyed an increase in membership - we took in over 800 new members. Hallelujah!

YEAR ONE - IMPLEMENTING

In the mid-1990's, the Delegate Body recognized the need for a business administrator in the State Office. However, the decision to implement this change was put off by several administrations.

Within two hours of the close of the 2001 Session, the Executive Committee met and began implementing the will of the delegates. Your new Master, Leo T Bergeron (that's me) made two motions.

First was the appointment of an Executive Director. Next, your State Master moved that a Chairman of the Executive Committee be chosen. Don Sharp was nominated and elected.

These moves were made by your Master knowing full well that 1) I had just cut my salary by 50%, and 2) that this was a radical change from the way we have conducted business in the past. But that is exactly what I felt was needed to jump-start our Order. The old ways were not working. It was time to implement "best business practices" in the operations of our Grange.

Now I want it made clear that by implementing the Executive Director position, I did not turn the position of Master into a part-time job. Just ask Kathy on this issue. I am still a full-time Master, but now I can spend all of my time fulfilling the responsibilities of a Master without the distraction of also trying to be a full-time business administrator. For example, just this past week as your State Master, I attended and spoke at a rally in Tracy, met and talked with Congressman Richard Pombo, met and talked with San Joaquin County Supervisor Lynn Bedford, put on a rally on the steps of the capitol in Sacramento, met with

State Assemblyman Briggs' staff, met with Rob Rivitt of the Pacific Legal Foundation, visited the Mountain View Grange, and we met with the Grange's legal counsel. And as a sideline we made last minute preparations for Convention.

By adding a professional business director, I can be in the field attending to the Fraternal needs of our Order while your Business Director is in the office attending to the needs of the business operations.

Your Grange is a multi-faceted business operation. In addition to the normal routine of running an office to provide support and services for our membership, we also oversee property and trust funds of many Granges throughout the state. We see to the details of both state and local regulations, such as taxes and property maintenance, so they do not become a liability to our Order.

In the past, there has been no real business plan, no direction, no system for taking care of all the different aspects of our operation. We had good Grange people, with the best of intentions, work long and hard to administer both the Fraternal and business sides of our Order, but without a system that included modern business practices, they were doomed to failure even before they began.

We have taken the operations of the Grange from off the kitchen table and placed them into the boardroom where they belong. The security of your funds, your property, your organization demands nothing less. We are still in the process of creating the system that will remain stable from administration to administration. We can no longer afford to work under the fallacy that the office seeks the man, that our operation, our very existence, can be maintained through good intentions. So we instituted a business plan for your State Grange office.

YEAR ONE - DISCOVERY

So what did we find, and more importantly, what have we done about it?

The very first thing that became obvious was that we needed a system that provided trackability and accountability. We needed an analytical process that identified the activity of each department, that budgeted for those activities, that accounted for the expenses of those activities and identified the funding sources for those activities.

I called for a complete financial review

and audit. The result? We found that we were in a world of horse pucky!

We found funds entrusted to the State Grange by subordinate Granges in a multitude of accounts spread all over the state. There was no organizational structure to account for them, no plan to invest and gain the maximum return available on them.

We found we had property around the state owned and managed by the State Grange and with no system for administering these properties. We did not know if they had insurance. We had no clear idea of the status of the deeds, or whether taxes were paid or owed. We had no idea of their state of repair, nor just how much of a liability they represented to the Grange.

We found hand-written ledgers, no billing system that tracked and sent out past due notices when needed. This lack of a system created an accounts receivable book of \$191,000. This is \$191,000 owed to the California State Grange by members of the Grange.

We found over 1500 members still carried on the rolls who had not paid dues, but for whom we were paying National Grange dues. We found we had Granges that had not paid per-capita for over 3 years, but were still on the books.

And when the Executive Committee reviewed the budget the delegates passed for 2002, it was discovered that not only was the budget grossly inadequate, but also grossly erroneous.

In 2001, we spent \$162,141 more than we budgeted for. In actuality, we spent \$200,011 more than we took in. This was paid for by utilizing funds received from the Grange Insurance Association's agreement through the National Grange that had been placed in reserve.

When the budget for 2002 was first proposed, it was based on including the annual income from the Grange Insurance Association of \$199,600.00, plus the belief, based on the Audit & Budget Report given last year, that we had about \$300,000.00 in the reserve fund. But we found that actually there was only \$134,690.77 in the account. The delegates had approved spending for programs and activities based on the assumption that the California State Grange could draw on that \$300,000 in the Grange Insurance Association fund to get them started and running. This not being the case, the Executive Committee was immediately called in to review and revise the

2002 budget.

Changes had to be made, changes that affected both the structure and the operations of the Grange. For example, the Legislative Directors position was eliminated, which removed a \$60,000 budget expense. It was determined by the Executive Committee that this department could be handled by the Executive Director and the State Master, and the resulting savings put into the operations of these two departments.

We also discovered that there was no money in the budget to fund the Grange Youth Fair Program. This program is actually showing a return on our investment. Nearly 400 new members can be directly attributed to this program. Funding it was a no-brainer.

Even so, you will notice that the revised budget spends \$13,924 more than we make. That means depleting the Grange Insurance Association reserve account by another \$14,000.

YEAR ONE - TAKING ACTION - BUSINESS OPERATIONS

So what steps have we taken to solve some of these problems?

First of all, we now have a professional financial management firm. For the astronomical sum of \$300 per year, we have professionals that will administer the fund, advise us on proper investing, and provide detailed reports. I sleep a lot better now than I did in October 2001.

Under the direction of the Executive Director, we are now getting a handle on the properties entrusted to the State Grange, and finding some we should have known about and didn't. We are establishing a solid standard operating procedure for keeping track of and managing these properties.

We knew we must establish standard operating procedures for running the business side of your organization. Are we there yet? No, but we are getting close. We have hired a professional consultant to review the guidelines for our business operations, and we hope to have them in place by the end of the year.

George Dupray retired as our Executive Director in September, and Nancy Koschyk is serving as Interim Director. We are now in the process of reviewing resumes for the hiring of a permanent Executive Director.

YEAR ONE - TAKING ACTION - FRATERNAL OPERATIONS

The Fraternal side of our organization is

what creates the need for the business side. Without members, there would be no business to conduct for there would be no Grange. We found a similar pattern here as we did for business operations. There was no system for success, there was no organized structure, and we were grossly inadequate in the number of people we needed to make our organization work.

Our Deputy corps had shrunk with only a limited number who were active. The Deputies were acting more in the role of trouble shooters rather than advisors, helpers and promoters of the Grange, it's policies and programs. Over this past year, we have changed both the structure and the direction of your Deputy program. We started by changing the name.

The new name reflects more clearly the mission of the program. Regional Representatives have a dual purpose. Yes, they represent the State Grange in that they are there to explain Grange programs and policies, to assist local Granges in taking advantage of all the Grange has to offer, and to advise and assist local Grange leaders when asked. They are also there to represent you and your interests to the State Grange. They are there to advocate your concerns and interests, so take advantage of them.

The concept is attracting volunteers. We have about 35 "Reps" serving just about every county in the state. We are still seeking key people to help, and still refining and tuning the program. We have established an administrative structure which includes a senior Regional Representative who is directly responsible to the State Master. Extensive training is ongoing, and an extensive handbook has been created. And if they don't have an answer to your question at hand, they know where to go to get it.

We have also established a Master's Council program. We kicked this program off at last year's Convention, and advances in the program will be demonstrated at this year's Session. We have held training sessions throughout the state, and again a Master's Manual has been prepared. These manuals contain a wealth of information, but are only given to a Master when they attend the training session that instructs them on its use.

Both of these programs have the common goal of opening communications channels. Communication between individual Granges, and between subordinate Granges and the State

Grange. And by God its working.

We have also enhanced the Membership Department. We now have on staff an organizer, promoter, marketer, and most importantly, a dedicated Granger. He has the fancy title of Membership Development Coordinator. In reality, he's in charge of our "Find A Way To Make It Work" Department.

He is there to coordinate all of the activities of the Grange as they relate to membership. And membership is the bottom line. Without membership, we have no Grange. This Department, I am pleased to report, has been very successful. We have had to close some Granges. But we have also organized new Granges and reorganized others.

We are working with organizations that have the same ideals, values and goals as we do. We have implemented the paperwork to establish a new Grange, #835. The thrust of this Grange will be political action dealing mainly with protecting the rights of THE PEOPLE OF THE USA to have and own property as guaranteed by the Constitution.. I will speak more on this subject this afternoon. But this new Grange has the potential of being the largest property-rights, political action Grange in the country, and may well increase our membership by several hundred members.

We have formed Mariposa Grange #836. We have revitalized Buckeye #489, Lake Earl #577, Ojai Valley #659, and Sacramento County Pomona #2. And we are currently working with ten other Granges who are attempting to reorganize. The number of Junior Granges is also

Part II

It was 20 years ago, in 1982 for our 110th Annual Session, that we last experienced the hospitality of Bakersfield and the Grangers of Kern County. In looking over the Journal of Proceedings from that year, I find that although twenty years has passed, many of our problems have not.

The Master's address of that year tells of "...the great difficulties experienced in operating a successful farming venture." Then, as now, there was debate on a per capita dues increase (it passed!). And the delegates had begun to skirmish with the government on property rights and water, we were just

expanding. As I said earlier, the last quarter has shown an increase of 800 new members, the first time in ten years. This program works!

There have been some disappointments. The Lecturer's Department did not function this year. Activities of that Department are vital and this created a tremendous void. You will have an opportunity to elect a new Lecturer at this session. Please choose wisely.

Where are we now? Today is that moment in time when we as Grangers must decide if we are going to live or die. If we chose to live, how are we going to live. Are we going to be an organization that lives in the shadows just barely existing, or are we going to fulfill the vision of our forefathers and again become the most influential organization in the country.

We are entering into a new century. And in the next three days, you the delegate body, will determine the future of the California State Grange

In closing, I would like to borrow from the writings of John Cottrell, the Master of New Jersey State Grange.

"We must remember that today is only as good as we make it. If you are not helping to advance the Grange, then perhaps you are part of our problem. If you talk with a negative attitude about the Grange, perhaps you are the problem. If you can't be bothered to attend your meetings, perhaps you are part of the problem. If you feel apathy towards your Grange, perhaps you are the problem. Remember,

Today is only as good or bad as we make it!"

beginning to take on the "Wild and Scenic Rivers Act."

Well, those skirmishes have become all out war. Now my advisors tell me, "DammitLeo," (that's all one word, it seems to be my new name) "DammitLeo," they say, "you shouldn't talk that way. War is a very serious word." But DammitAdvisors, that's the way it is. Today we are in an ideological war with those who would usurp the Constitution. Our battlefields may be in the courts, the laboratories and the halls of Congress, but the fallout is being felt by every citizen in this country.

Particularly vulnerable is rural America, for they are on the front lines, taking the direct

hits. But make no mistake about it, everyone will feel the consequences. When you turn on the tap, will there be water? When you go to the store, will you be able to afford the food, and perhaps more importantly, just how safe will the food you buy be? In a world where humans are at the bottom of the eco-survival chain, will you be able to purchase land for your family, afford the house you want to build, or even have a job to support those dreams?

The right to own and use property free from outlandish government rules and regulation, or the fear that your government can come and take it away from you at its whim, is basic to the "American Dream." There are those that would change that dream into a nightmare. What are the ultimate goals of the leaders of these so-called "environmentalists?" I know it is not just about some fish or bird that needs protection. If that were the case, we would not have decisions purporting to save one species, but destroying another, including those on the endangered species list. They obviously hold humanity in low esteem, but the ultimate goal I simply cannot fathom.

In this address, I am going to cover several issues, such as the Klamath Basin and the Sawgrass Rebellion, which may appear to be rural issues. But the consequences are universal. They concern your protections under the Constitution of the United States. So when you hear me talk about making the Grange the number one property rights advocate in the Nation and the defender of Rural America, know that I am speaking for all Americans, everywhere. Rural America is a state of mind as well as a place on the map. It is our Constitutional guarantees, our birthrights, that bind us together as Americans. We can ill afford to have them ignored by any ideology.

THE SAWGRASS REBELLION

Our latest accomplishment was putting on a rally on the steps of the Capitol in Sacramento. With the assistance of Assemblyman Mike Briggs and Senator Thomas Oller, the Grange obtained the necessary permits and provided support for the rally. Maggie Bloom, Mike Beyers and the State Grange staff worked hard to make it happen. However, the effort was an exercise in partnering with other groups, showing just how effective we can be

when we work with other organizations towards a common goal.

The current issue of the Grange News carries a full description of the "rebellion." In short, in 1992 Congress directed and funded restoration and flood control projects for portions of the Everglades in Southern Florida. The project was begun, including starting on the canals needed for flood control to protect landowners, cities, and towns in the area. The canal project was abandoned when ESA activists thought there was an endangered bird in the area. No one has seen the bird, but if it was there, the project could have changed its habitat.

The canals now dead-end wherever and at whatever stage they were in when the ban on construction came, some in the middle of towns. So where does the water go when it hits the end of the canal? So far, there has been over \$1 billion in flood-related losses and 14 flood-related deaths.

Jan Michael Jacobson, the Director of the Everglades Institute and former board member of the Florida Sierra Club, has produced scientific evidence that these actions are in fact destroying the Everglades, not protecting them. These findings have been concurred with by other respected scientists. But without a peer review requirement in place, the "greens" can pay for and use whatever "scientific" study that suits their purpose. It has been reported that the goal is to turn 90 percent of Florida into Federal land. 90 percent!

What has this to do with you? Let's compare the Everglades to our Delta. Both were swamps drained for farmland. Both are desired by environmentalists for habitat for species other than human. Both have been flooded and FEMA became involved in protective measures. The Department of Energy said that people choosing to live in a flood plain is unsustainable, and need to be relocated. The Nature Conservancy, a major player in Florida, has purchased thousands of acres of prime California farmland and flooded them for habitat.

Now for the kicker. The largest processor in the Delta area, Heinz, closed it's plant this year. They will use no more locally-grown tomatoes, causing a huge financial crisis for thousands of people. And most dairies are

up for sale. Without subsidies, the dairies cost more to run than the milk can bring in. A double whammy to create a financial crisis, and "willing" sellers forced to give up their land for pennies on the dollar. This same scenario is being played all over this country. Don't you see a pattern here?

KLAMATH BASIN

As you know, the Grange played a major role in getting the water turned back on in the Klamath Basin. We participated in demonstrations, we participated in court cases, and we made several trips back to Washington, D.C. to advocate for Klamath farmers before Congress. We were effective in getting the water turned back on for the local farmers, but the battle has not yet been decided. We are still fighting in the courts, in the halls of Congress, and in the media.

You have no doubt seen the headlines about the huge fish kill in the lower Klamath. According to *EarthJustice*, in a mass mailing seeking donations, "A major cause is the Bush administration's disastrous water policy. So much water has been diverted from the Klamath River for irrigation that salmon are dying in record numbers. Last week we filed a lawsuit ..."

Such accusations have appeared on the front pages of many papers, including the New York Times. No pun intended, but these accusations simply do not hold water. For one thing, irrigation by farmers in the Klamath Basin uses only about 3 percent of the water. The rest is used for other programs, such as a wildlife sanctuary and habitat protection along the river.

The facts are not yet in, scientific study has just begun. But we do know that, according to real-time U.S. Geological Survey data, water volume at the mouth of the Klamath River ranged from 2,200 to 2,400 cubic feet per second at the time of the kill. And by comparison, in 1991, '92 and '94 the water flows were less with no resulting fish kills.

Initial reports from biologists and fish pathologist say that most of the fish died of suffocation due to bacterial and protozoan infections, which resulted in significant damage to the fish's gills. We also know that these infections are common in hatcheries where the

fish are crowded together. In addition, there was no large-scale mortality observed in other organisms, nor even in different life stages of the species affected. The initial conclusion is that there were too many fish in this year's run for the river to handle - TOO MANY FISH!

Oceanographers have an explanation for this. Without going into great detail, the currents which control the temperature of the water, and thus the food supply, are cyclical. The current cycle includes an ideal temperature and abundant food at the mouth of the Klamath. Add to this the number of fish released from the hatchery whose time it is to spawn, and the conditions are rife for a large-scale fish run. But then facts have never stood in the way of a good environmental fundraising issue.

There are two points that need to be made here.

First, be it the Klamath Basin, the Everglades, or any spot in this country of ours, this whole issue would be moot if Constitutional law were upheld. If the people ... and the bureaucrats and agencies making these regulations are supposed to be representing the people ... if the people want land for habitat, then let the people, ALL the people, pay for it. Not just 1400 farm families in the Klamath Basin, not just families who live near the Everglades in Florida, but every taxpayer of this country. Let the government buy the land, at fair market value and at 100-cents on the dollar, pay for relocating and retraining, and then they can turn the land into whatever kind of habitat they want. There is, however, one slight problem with this, and the Environmentalist know it. For what they want, the cost could never be covered. They want so much that it can only be obtained by creating refugees, not willing sellers.

If you are not familiar with the proposed National Forest Ecosystem Protection Act being proposed by the Habitat for Wildlife, I urge you to get a copy and study it. The very first sentence of their proposal states, "Environmentalists hope to create large wild areas, where every species formerly living in that area could once again live and reproduce there in natural conditions." Why do the words "Jurassic Park" come to mind?

Within the study are proposals to create huge wild areas, surrounded by large protected

areas. There are "Economic Transition Payments" authorized to retrain ranchers and farmers to earn their living in different occupations. And this does not affect just the West. They have these plans for every state in the Union. They are not alone in their quest.

California is the seventh largest agricultural producing area in the world. It is also a target of Conservation International. CI, as it is called, states on their website that they seek only 1.4 percent of the landmass of the planet for habitat. But included in that quest is 70 percent of the landmass of California, including all of the agricultural producing areas along with all of our large cities. Think about that.

Now, do you really want the government telling you where to live, how to live, what profession you will work in and how you will raise your family? It didn't work for the U.S.S.R.!!

I mentioned earlier that there were two major lessons to be learned in this Property Rights struggle. I just talked about the need to know why the desire for land. We must also be aware of the methods they intend to use to accomplish their goal.

To date the most damaging method used to achieve their goal has been the practice of "junk science." Most of us have grown up with the belief that science was a fact-driven discipline, and that scientists were seekers of truth. Naive at best.

So many federal agencies have been exposed falsifying environmental data that you have to wonder how many other frauds remain undetected. We have had the Fish and Wildlife Service and the Forest Service plant fake wild lynx hair in states where there were no lynx. The spotted owl habitat, the sucker fish, everything from moles and snakes to faerie shrimp and bears, decisions affecting millions of lives have been made on what at best is faulty science, to what at worst is outright fraud. So why all the lying? Is deceit the only way they have to advance their agenda?

SOUND SCIENCE

After much urging by groups like the Grange, the House of Representatives has determined that sound, peer-reviewed science is a must. On several occasions, the California

State Grange sent representatives to advocate before Congress the need for sound science. We joined coalitions, wrote letters, we fought very hard to convince our lawmakers that decisions that effect so many of our citizens needed to be based on fact, not fiction.

Guess what. We won. At least the preliminary battle. For the first time the House passed a bill that adds protections for people in the Environmental Protection Act.

The House passed HR 64, the "Strengthening Science At the EPA Act." It creates a Deputy Administrator for Science and Technology at the EPA. The Deputy will be responsible for coordinating the scientific effort among EPA's numerous offices, and ensuring that sound science is the basis for regulatory decisions. This measure is now in the Senate, and it is doubtful that it will be considered this session. However, as it passed the House, it will be brought up at the next session.

This is a victory, a small one, but a victory nevertheless. We now must make sure that legislation similar to HR 4840, the 'Sound Science for Endangered Species Act Planning Act' is again introduced, and this time enough pressure put on our lawmakers to ensure passage. This measure spells out the criteria to be used in determining "sound science," such as independent scientific (peer) review. It includes factors which MUST be considered, such as clear and convincing evidence that includes data collected in the field from landowners. And all actions must be published in advance of decision making which invites public input of data.

FOREST PROTECTION

Like Nero who fiddled away while Rome burned, so too is Washington fiddling around while our forests burn. By now, everyone knows "why" the devastating wildfires. Even most of the Environmental groups do not deny that current forest management practices (or lack thereof because of lawsuits and EPA rulings) created the conditions leading to fire. The biggest debate is on which side is at fault for creating the situation in the first place.. Did the conditions come about because current practices failed to remove the fuel, or were previous practices of removing the fuel and not allowing the forests to

"burn naturally" the cause of the problem.

Now you know me. I'm one of the last ones to declare rhetoric a useless tool. It's just in my case, I prefer the word "eloquence." But in this case the time for "eloquence" is over. Decisions must be made and made now! Do we "preserve" our forests by abandoning them and letting nature take its course, or do we "conserve" this precious resource with proper scientific forest management? And who should be responsible for that management?

Let's return to the Constitution of the United States. Article I, Section 8 clearly sets forth the purpose for which the federal government may purchase land, with the consent of that State's Legislature. That is "for the erection of forts, magazines, arsenals, dock-yards, and other needful buildings." Needful buildings!

Until early in the 20th Century, land owned by the federal government was acquired with the intention of getting it into the private hands of its citizens as quickly as possible. That's what the Homestead Act was all about.

Years ago, when National Forests and Parks were being acquired, the reason given was to ensure that U.S. citizens would have the wood, minerals and other resources needed by this nation. Today, we have taken the U.S. citizen out of the picture, and inserted the need for "biodiversity."

Looking at the charred ruins of our forests, I can't help but ask why do we allow the federal government to hold title to our land? By definition, federal land is that land owned by the citizens, private citizens who have a property right - water, grazing, logging, mining, whatever. When those lands are no longer being managed for the benefit of the owners, it is time to change managers. When a government of, by and for the people take the people out of the equation, it is also time to change government. And that's as close to partisan politics as I'm going to get.

SOUND SCIENCE AND CLIMATE

For a moment, I had hopes that the climate change debate was about to come to an end. New, credible scientific evidence has demonstrated very strong correlations of solar and orbital variability with climate change. Advances in the science of the natural processes

of climate change, along with a better understanding of climate history, trends and rates of change have all merged to provide a clear picture of climate change.

It is quite likely that the climate is warming, but natural drivers such as solar activity, are the primary cause, not people. There is scientific proof that these changes have happened in the past, and with beneficial results overall to the human condition.

But I did not count on the tenacity of those with a vested interest in global warming caused by human activity, interests like fundraising, land acquisition, political expediency, and humanity bashing.

Climate change is a natural process, and global warming is inevitable during some periods. We must adapt to the changing climate, just as we adapt to daily changes in local weather. We must adapt, not fight the changes, for it is a fight we cannot win.

Climate changes all the time, warmer or colder, in all time scales, and at varying degrees. And now that we understand that we cannot control global climate, we should start helping people to adapt to natural variability. We must worry about how we will feed the people of the world over the next millennia.

GENETICS

Which brings us to food and the debate over genetic engineering. I do not intend to enter into debate on the safety of genetically modified foods. Again, very sound science has found nothing to support the claims that this food is in any way bad for humans.

I am here to protest the zealots who would harm fellow human beings through their words and actions.

Greenpeace and Friends of the Earth have apparently adopted the ethics of the Ku Klux Klan in Africa, where they have lobbied the governments of drought-stricken countries not to distribute American corn donated as food aid to their millions of starving people because it might contain genetically modified kernels.

Apparently it doesn't matter to them that most of their American members have been eating such foodstuffs for the past decade with no ill effects. Apparently starving Africans should forgo the food so that Western environmentalists can make some obscure

political point.

The President of Zambia says the activists told him the corn is "poison." This is the same pest-resistant corn approved for safety by three U.S. government agencies, and eaten daily since 1995 by millions of Americans in such forms as corn flakes, corn flour, hamburgers and ice cream. Biotech foods have undergone more testing than any foods in history, with no danger found.

I don't care if you choose not to eat genetically altered food. You and your family are not starving. Eat what you want. But in Zambia, 17,000 tons of U.S. corn is locked in warehouses while desperate women and children grub for roots and eat tree bark.

An observer in Johannesburg at the so called Earth Summit wrote, and I quote, "the message of Greenpeace was clear. 'You darkies must go hungry ... until we, the great white Bwanas of Europe, decide the GM crops are acceptable.' The sickening, condescending, callous, racist arrogance of Greenpeace!" Unquote. And I would include in this statement all organizations who would place their own ideology over the life of even one human being.

But then we have self-proclaimed terrorists right here to deal with. For example, the Earth Liberation Front has declared that this "global revolutionary movement is no longer

ago at this time, we did not have an accurate accounting of assets or expenditures. It took several months for George and Nancy to reestablish an accurate understanding of just exactly where we, as a Grange stood financially. In doing this research, it was evident that many expenditures were posted to wrong accounts. It appeared that money was available when in actuality, it was not. This also created difficulty in establishing an accurate line item budget.

The original budget income for 2001 was nearly \$824,000.00. This was later revised down to \$737,335.00. The cost of goods sold (COGS) was \$13,904.00. The actual expenditures for the year ending December 31, 2001, were \$723,842.00 This resulted in a net expenditure over revenue of \$411.00.

The National Grange in the 2001 session increased dues to the states by \$1.00. This increase could not be recouped until this session. So it could be said that we started this year already \$15,000.00 in the hole. At this session, it will be up to you, the delegates, to decide which path the Grange is going to take. Grange dues are less than half of other fraternal organizations. While others have increased

Worthy Master, State Officers, Directors, Guests, and most importantly, Brothers and Sisters. I bring you greetings as Secretary of the California State Grange, a California non-profit corporation. Yes, Brothers and Sisters, a non-profit Corporation. I have learned a great deal this year about the business of the California State Grange and have endeavored to lend my assistance to help make that business run more smoothly.

Do you remember when you moved into your first house? That first day when it was all ready for you to take ownership? It wasn't always a brand-new house. If it was an older house, you knew there was some work that needed to be done to it to make it ready for you, to make it yours. Maybe it was painting, or new carpet, or new landscaping, but these were all cosmetic. You were fairly certain that the structural integrity of the house was sound.

At the end of the last Annual Session, I was able to "move into" the State Secretary's office and make it my own. In doing so, I found what every new homeowner who buys a fixer-upper dreads -- several cracks in the foundation. Because the foundation needs to be the strongest part of the house, I had to start digging out the old foundation and getting down to basics. With the help of Executive Director George Dupray, and Master Leo Bergeron, I started to look at where the Secretary's office needed to repair the foundation, and what needed to be dug out and rebuilt completely.

If any of you have ever had to rebuild a foundation, you will know how much time, effort, sweat, tears, swearing, and precision such a task will take. Meanwhile, you have to keep the rest of the house balanced and level, while rebuilding.

was that the membership information I had been given previously was incomplete. So, I started a complete audit of the Quarterly Reports from 1999 forward. This audit included a file by file review of the membership figures and the amounts paid, along with any reports that had not been filed, nor per capita taxes paid. The next major crack was that the membership database was corrupted. Jay Hartz made huge efforts to keep resuscitating a 10-year old program, but it was really ready to give up the ghost. The program had an annoying glitch in that if I deleted member, the program would invariably delete the member above or below in the list, but not the member in question. We received numerous requests to make changes. which were made (I swear), and then the old data would re-appear. A prototype had been made for a new program, but it was not approved by the prior administration.

After consulting with Jay Hartz, Master Bergeron & George Dupray, it was decided to implement the new program. This program was designed and donated by Affinity Media Services. If the Grange had to contract for the programming, it would have cost upward of \$5,000. It's nice that my husband, Bill, needed to do projects for his Chico State University degree – hence the California State Grange received the benefit.

The membership Data was converted into the new database. After that it was a matter of finding out what people wanted in the way of retrieving information. The Regional Representatives needed data reports in one format, while the Grange Secretary needed formats in another, and the Roster in another. This program was put into place, with the understanding that there would be a great deal of work to reconcile the data with the Grange Secretaries. This program can now print numerous types of reports for the Subordinate

Grange, Pomona Grange, and the State Grange. I reviewed many of these reports at the Secretary's workshop.

Part of the integrity of the database is the accountability for the data entered. At the end of each Quarter's data entry, a report is generated back to the Grange Secretary with the changes they submitted on the Quarterly Report. Because there are so many keystrokes, there will be errors. Who better to catch those errors than the Secretary submitting the information. If there are errors, the information is sent back to the State Office and a correction is made. My appreciation to all of the Secretary's who sent in and said "Here's our list". This makes the job much, much easier to do.

With the last mailing that went out in September for the dues billing notices, this should give us the final data we need to make sure that when the Quarterly Report says 152 Fraternal members, 6 Golden Sheaf, and 12 Associates, the database will say the same.

In January, a new employee came on board at the State Grange. Office Assistant, Corissa Harvey. Corissa brought with her a great deal of experience in Accounts Receivable. Which brings me to the next crack in the State Grange Foundation. The Quarterly per-capita reports had never been entered into the Accounts Receivable in the bookkeeping system. There was no way to track how much a Grange had paid, or when, or if nothing had been heard from them for more than two quarters, unless physically going to the file and manually pulling all of the information each time. Unfortunately, this does not track well with my accounting background, nor does it make it easy for the management of your State Grange Office to determine any type of cash flow. So, a new project was embarked upon which was to enter any balance owing from the Subordinate Granges into the Bookkeeping System as Accounts Receivable.

This entry was started in July of 2002, with the audited balances from the Quarterly reports showing on the invoices. This caused a storm, hurricane (?), tornado (?) of information into the State Grange Office. We had Subordinates saying, "Well, if you would cash my June & September checks from last year, we would send the December & March ones in." Not only were there no reports in the office,

there were no checks, and no record of anything having been received. This example was repeated numerous times.

Thanks to Nancy Koschyck, accountant for the State Grange for several years, there has been an expansion of the information available in the bookkeeping system. Because of Corissa's work with the Accounts Receivable, we are now able to accurately track information and answer questions of a Grange if they call in and say "what is this for?", or "when did we pay last?", right down to the check numbers and the date it was received in the State Office. This is also a management tool to assist with tracking your Cash Flow into the State Grange Office. Managing cash flow is one of the most important factors in any corporation.

Retrieving information quickly and accurately is the only way a business can assist its The membership is the customer/owner of the California State Grange and as such, deserves the best possible service. In trying to retrieve information, we found another crack in the foundation, that was in the filing system. Files held in three different rooms were consolidated into a file room and the Secretary's Office. Now, when you pull a file for a Grange, all of the information is in one place. I have to thank Barbara Geiger, Inger Bevans, and Margaret Daley, for their help with the consolidation of the files. I have to especially thank my daughter, LoRee Booth, who has spent numerous hours volunteering at the State Office cleaning and straightening files - of course those shopping trips to Arden Fair Mall didn't hurt her either.

I once entered the National Grange Public Speaking contest with a topic of Statistics – pretty dry huh? I ended that speech by saying that Statistics are like a bikini bathing suit – what they reveal is most enticing, but what they conceal is most essential. The membership numbers that are presented at this Convention are accurate and matched to the information provided to the State Grange Office. I have personally handled and reviewed each Quarterly Report. My initials are on each one.

I believe in accountability. If something isn't done, it's because I didn't get to it yet, or the system was still being built. I have said numerous times — I can't fix it if I don't know about it. Please do not be afraid to tell me what I can do to improve the job performance of the Secretary's

Office. I do not want to limp along with the work of the Grange – I want to step out briskly with my head up and shoulders back. I am proud to serve you, my Brothers and Sisters, and I am proud to be a Granger.

This last year has been spent in building a system, a solid foundation, that will continue the work of the business of the California State Grange. With these systems and procedures in

The Fair Program has made many of those empty old Grange Halls become full again. True, not all of them, but some are building and ready to burst with Grange members wanting to go into their communities to be a working friend to its neighbors and other Community Service Organizations.

There is a perception that these "Fair People" only want to be in the Grange to show their livestock and crafts projects. I would like to let each and everyone of you know that this is the wrong perception. We now have Granges with more than just 4 to 7 people trying to keep their Grange alive. We now have all of the offices

filled at more Grange meetings and fresh, up-todate ideas instead of living-in-the-past ideas. We have youthful ideas that will keep us alive.

Some of our more seasoned Grange members have been uncomfortable because of the changes that are occurring as a result of the Fair Program. The first message we present to those interested in the Fair Program is - you must be a Grange member first, before you can be involved with our Fair Program. They are not there just for the Fair season, they are On Board all the way.

The Grange Youth Fair Program competed in approximately 26 County Fairs, the State Fair and approximately 40 Breed-Sanctioned Shows for Rabbits, Dairy Goats, Beef & Dairy Cattle, etc. This is a great deal of exposure for the California State Grange. Grange Youth also competed in approximately 20 craft shows in which they did very well.

Our Fair Season started in February in Indio and will end in November with the Farmers Fair in Perris, California and the Grand National Show at the Cow Palace in San Francisco, featuring our newest Grange Youth Fair Team from Lake Earl Grange.

Moved into discussion of the Executive Director position.

Opinion was expressed that the person should also be a lobbyist. Needs to be a constant

presence with the legislature.

National is holding off on their Chief Operating Officer until after National Session. If no dues increase is allowed, then National will have to cut \$500,000 from their budget.

Executive Director needs to be someone who pulls the implementation of the policy and gets it done. Needs organization skills to allow the work to be done. Need to draft duties and responsibilities carefully, and be specific. The person would be accountable firstly to the State Master and secondly to the Executive Committee.

Budget report reviewed. Included leaving it up to the delegates to pass any resolutions regarding the Executive Director.

Carpet Bids:

All bids include moving furniture. Looking at a high-quality/high-use carpet. Acquired samples. All bids include gluing. All are bidding on the same type of carpet. Have currently spent \$3,800 on paint, \$6,000 on blinds.

It was moved by Bergeron to obtain Capital Commercial to replace the carpet in the building. Seconded by Hitt and carried.

Convention:

It was moved by Hitt to extend one additional nights' lodging for Officers, Deputies and Directors. Seconded by Bergeron, carried.

Reports:

Financial report for the 8 months through 08/30/01 is attached. Nancy Koschyk., accountant, will be here Wednesday & Thursday to answer any questions.

Western Coalition Letter for review and recommendations for regional areas for the National Grange

Food-Fiber-Flowers-Fun. Request for donations to assist with this program that assists with putting gardens at the school level. It was moved by Bergeron to fund gift certificates of \$180 for Ag Network that sponsors this program. 2nd by Squire. Motion carried.

Ameri-Plan Vision plan. States it is not an insurance plan, however it appears that it is. Information only.

Largest Flag – Wonder Valley Grange is submitting materials to build the Largest Flag. It was moved by Bergeron to refer this to the Grange Activities Committee with a strong recommendation that an appropriate resolution be drafted. Seconded by White and carried.

Letter from Bob Clouse—will be read on the floor.

RV NUCCIO & ASSOCIATES – obtained information for Grange Halls uninsurable through

Grange Insurance Association. SafeCo & others can make recommendations. Need some sort of insurance structure. It was moved by Hitt to explore alternate insurance companies for Grange Halls uninsurable through Grange Insurance Association. Seconded by White. Motion carried.

Grange Halls:

Orangevale: Attorney is now demanding officer list. State Master responded on procedure and to contact the Grange directly for the information. Still a potential lawsuit. GIA gave letter of no coverage.

Garcia Grange: Three factions having problems. Bruce Brunell went to the meeting, and the situation is not resolved.

San Dimas: Evelyn Ray is the only member that the State Master is hearing from. Grange has \$250 in checking and \$18,000 in savings. They are considering donating to the CSG and not putting into trust. Too much negativity to try to re-build at this time. Tabled to next meeting.

Dos Palos: Neighboring Grange will accept them, but funds only need to be expended for necessary Grange bills. Still no bank statements from them. It was moved by Hitt to allow acceptance of their Charter providing that they have funds to pay their members' dues, and blanket demit them to Merced Colony Grange. Seconded by Bergeron. Carried.

Buckeye Grange: Day Care request for Grange Hall. The administrator of the Day Care has volunteered to be the next Master. Appears interested and happy to continue the exploration process further. No action at this time.

Fair Valley: Requesting to turn in their Charter. Currently has a church leasing their property. Nice Grange hall zoned residential. Master instructed to contact them and tell them the procedures, obtain the last tax bill, lease and insurance policy. Defer action for more information.

Sister Booth left meeting at this time, due to other responsibilities. Notes taken by Sister Fletcher.

Squire commented that he was uncomfortable with spending Services Agreement funds to balance the CSG Budget for 2002. Bro Bergeron was concerned that the bottom line went from \$3,900 to (\$39,000) after the changes to the budget. He stated the entire budget is subject to change dependent upon the actions of the delegates.

Question arose regarding the authorship of the Telecom Statement with Maggie Bloom

listed as Legislative Director. State Master reported that Brother Leroy Watson, Legislative Director of the National Grange drafted the statement with input from Maggie as a result of her trip to Washington, D.C. to lobby Congress for rural DSL lines in California. The title of Legislative Director was included merely for credibility. Bro. Dupray was not available when the statement was drafted and timeliness was of the utmost importance.

Bro Bergeron expounded on the delisting petitions filed by the CSG to delist the Coho and Short-nose sucker fish from the Threatened/Endangered Species list.

Squire was concerned about a letter he received regarding a dues billing for Riverdale Grange. State Master was unaware of this correspondence and will speak to the Secretary in this regard. State Master also requested that if an Executive Committee member receives a correspondence from a Grange, it would be appreciated if a copy could be forwarded to the State Office to deal with the concerns directly.

Bro. Squire again questioned the breakdown of the Services Agreement monies. State Master stated that there would be a complete breakdown in the Good Of The Order Address on Wednesday. Bro Hitt stated each member had received no less than three copies in the last four months upon Squires' request.

Bro Squire requested the Membership Department create a budget separate from the Extension Budget. It was moved by Squire to pull the Membership Department out of Extension and to develop their own budget. Seconded by Hitt. Motion carried.

Squire was adamant that the position of the Executive Director needs to be instituted immediately, and that the delegates will be so informed. State Master reminded Squire of the language in the by-laws, the Labor Code definitions of Executive Director and Executive Assistant, and the difference between exempt and non-exempt employees. It was also suggested to move the Executive Director resolution to a time-certain. However, no action was taken. It was also suggested to allow the Budget Report to carry the concerns.

It was moved by Squire to approve the Convention program, with one time correction. Bergeron Seconded. State Master reminded the committee the Executive Committee had already adopted the program at a previous meeting.

Meeting adjourned at 5:40 pm. Next meeting will be after closing of the Annual Session on 10/13/01.

October 13, 2001

Meeting of the California State Grange was called to order at 1:15pm on Saturday, October 13, 2001, in Sebastian's Restaurant, Radisson Hotel, San Bernardino.

Those present were Executive Committee members; Johnny Squire, George Dupray, Inger Bevans, Ernest White; State Master Leo Bergeron, State Secretary, Lillian Booth. Also present were Mary White, Kathy Bergeron, Margaret Daley, KayLynn Booth, Steven Hood, and Nancy Trempe. Katie & LeRoy Squire, Martha & Joseph Stefenoni joined the meeting at a later time.

Master Bergeron welcomed the two new members to the committee.

Minutes:

Minutes of the meeting of 10/08/01, were reviewed and minor corrections were proposed. It was moved by White to approve minutes as corrected. Dupray seconded. Motion carried.

State Lecturer, Steven Hood made personal request to be sent to the National Grange Convention in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. Committee will review the costs, amount budgeted, and advise Bro. Hood as soon as possible of their decision.

Costa Mesa Grange:

Steven Hood & Nancy Trempe, representing Costa Mesa Grange reviewed the proposal for the remodel to the Hall. They have found it is more extensive that at first thought. Costa Mesa was sent \$100,000 from their trust fund for the remodel. They have expended \$19,000 thus far on permits, and other prebuilding costs. The funds are held in a moneymarket account with Wells Fargo. They had made written request to the Executive Committee for additional funds, and had received a written reply from Master Fletcher outlining options. As per the options, the members of Costa Mesa would like to have the CSG cash out the interestbearing note from the sale of the Garden Grove Hall, balance of which is approximately \$130,000, with CSG assuming the note on that property, and they would borrow an additional \$70,000 from the Grange Hall Loan Fund. They do not see any problem with repayment on the note. The City would be happy to have small office space to rent in that area, and to have an updated building there. They will be eliminating the Quonset hut and leaving the footprint of the original. When property is finished, it will be worth over \$300,000. in that area.

Squire expressed concern that the Committee does not know what liquid assets are

available at this time. May need an independent real estate appraisal to loan that large of an amount.

It was moved by Dupray to place the discussion of assuming the note of \$130,000 with interest, and loaning an additional \$70,000 on the Executive Committee agenda for the next meeting under Old Business. Seconded by Bergeron. Motion carried.

Steven and Nancy left the meeting at this time.

Chairman of the Executive Committee.

Under the current structure, the Chairman would set the agenda and preside at the meetings. Any preparation of materials, etc., would be done by staff.

It was moved by Dupray to elect Don Sharp as Chairman of the Executive Committee for this year. Seconded by Bevans. Motion carried.

It was moved by White that Johnny Squire be named as the Vice-Chairman, to preside in Don's absence. Seconded by Dupray. Motion carried.

Executive Director Position:

It was moved by Squire that this was now the appropriate time to hire/appoint an Executive Director for the California State Grange. Seconded by Bevans. Motion carried unanimously.

Members have expressed concern that an Executive Director would take away from the current programs of the Lecturer, GWA, Junior, Youth, etc. There would be no diminishing of the programs. The State Office needs to communicate with the membership regarding the Executive Director position.

It was moved by Squire to appoint George Dupray, a member of the Executive Committee residing in the area, as the interim Executive Director, until such time as the Executive Committee can meet to discuss hiring a permanent director, and direct the Worthy Master, Leo Bergeron, to prepare and sign a letter addressed to any interested party, giving full authority for George Dupray to act in the business interests of the California State Grange. Seconded by White. Motion carried.

Because of the criteria that an elected officer cannot hold the Executive Director position as a salaried employee, Dupray will act as a volunteer until the meeting of the Executive Committee

Past Master Fletcher will meet with Master Bergeron on Tuesday, October 16, 2001 in the State Offices.

It was moved by Squire to have two signatures on every bank account to authorize checks. Seconded by Bergeron. Discussion. Question regarding day-to-day operating accounts. Motion and second withdrawn by makers. It was moved by Squire that Bro Dupray look at all of the bank accounts and make a list of recommendations for signatures on each account. Seconded by Bergeron. Motion carried.

Orangevale Grange:

Question arose during the convention regarding the delegate status of the Grange. They are currently in arrears for approximately six quarters. Master of the Grange faxed the Committee a promissory note stating they would pay the debt of approximately \$3,700 in the next two years. Voting status was granted to the delegates. Orangevale Grange is currently party to two lawsuits — one civil and one small-claims.

It was moved by Squire to have Bro Dupray and Master Bergeron review the Orangevale Grange file and to seek legal council for the State Grange if necessary, with notification to the Executive Committee members. Seconded by Bergeron. Motion carried.

Ranchito Grange:

Member of Ranchito Grange #754, at convention, spoke with CSG Treasurer, Bud Hill, and E.C. Member, Johnny Squire. They are concerned regarding the balance showing for the trust funds and the variations in the interest they have been receiving.

It was moved by Bergeron that this matter be reviewed with accountant, Nancy Koschyk. Seconded by Squire. Motion carried.

Trust Funds:

These will be reviewed with the accountant, Nancy Koschyk. Audit is scheduled and questions can be answered at that time.

Office Staff:

Master Bergeron advised that if Bro Dupray is absent from the office, Jay Hartz will be the office supervisor.

New Hampshire:

Our National Grange guests, Brother Dan Bascom & Sister Kim Bascom, Master & First Lady of the New Hampshire State Grange were impressed with California. They have invited Master Bergeron to attend their Session later this month. It was moved by Squire that expenses be authorized for Master Bergeron to attend the convention in New Hampshire. Seconded by White. Motion carried.

Expenses for State Master:

Question from Master Bergeron with regard to the expenses for the State Master. Expenses are covered. If the Master is going out of State, the Executive Committee requests approval. Master Bergeron will keep track of expenses for the first year on a monthly basis and provide information to the Executive Committee for budgeting purposes. Master Bergeron expressed that he is a person who does things and will be traveling. However, he will set a schedule to visit areas and the schedule will be coordinated through Bro Dupray in the State Office.

Meeting was moved to the patio outside.

Convention Debrief:

Tom Stefenoni: Request for Jay Hartz to print up press releases for the home-area newspapers of the State Grange officers. Need form for the State Officers to sign up for business cards and name tags — both with the new logo. Also, all officers are to make signature available for scanning so a letter can be done in their name, with their authorization, and mailed from the State Office.

Need new Delegate orientation and a basic parliamentary procedure. Convention Coordinator will include this. Question for Executive Committee, why were three staff members flown down? Will be reviewed for next year.

Martha Stefenoni: Installation of officers. Need to have box with implements for installation. Martha will put together and submit a bill to the CSG. Authorized by common consent.

Inger Bevans: Looked for signs directing them to the Exhibits – none there. Liked the Memorial Service on the first night.

George Dupray: Need a Central Directory and a lay-out of the building. Financial procedures this year were a problem — have to set better procedures next year. Bud Hill directed to write letter stating what is needed prior to convention, at convention, and immediately after convention. Submit to Bro Dupray.

Ernie White: Officers are not responding to invitations, and were not sent out last year. Master Bergeron advised that if a State Officer is invited, then you need to attend

as much as possible. Letter will be sent to the State Officers advising them of this and the allowable mileage for attending.

Lillian Booth: Memorial service was nice, but we need to end on a happier more upbeat tone. Registration – still a problem. Banners & Signs were not ordered. Process was better this

year than last. More improvement needed next year.

Items will be referred to the Convention Committee.

Next meeting:

December 7th and December 8th in Sacramento. Start at 9AM on 12/7. Call the State Office for reservations. Will set a schedule for the year for meetings. Mail Bro Dupray any significant items for which we need staff support. Add items to the agenda as they come in to the office.

Grange News:

(1) Next issue will outline the new structure and how it will free the Master to do the work of the Grange. (2) The synopsis of the Executive Committee Minutes has been missing from the last issues. Lillian Booth directed to prepare the synopsis and get to Jay for inclusion in the upcoming issues. (3) It was moved by Bergeron to authorize an extra page in the next issue to print photographs and bio's of the new officers. Seconded by White. Motion carried.

Communication:

This is extremely necessary, especially with the State Officers, Directors and Deputies. Each group will be brought in for training.

Lecturer:

After reviewing the information provided by Travel Consultant, Martha Stefenoni, it was agreed to send Steven Hood, State Lecturer, to the National Convention under the same criteria as the other representatives. Martha to contact involved parties to set itineraries.

Meeting adjourned at 4:40 p.m. Next meeting Friday 12/07/01 and Saturday, 12/08/01.

December 7 & 8, 2001

Meeting was called to order at 0900 hrs on Friday, December 07, 2001. Members present were Chairman, Don Sharp; members Johnny Squire, Ernest White, George Dupray, and Inger Bevans; Master Leo Bergeron & Secretary Lillian Booth. Visitors: Mike Byers, Kathy Bergeron, and Legislative Director Maggie Bloom.

Minutes:

Minutes of October 13, 2001, were discussed. It was moved by Dupray to approve the Minutes of October 13, 2001, as corrected. Seconded by Bevans. Motion carried.

It was moved by White to approve final

day's Journal of the State Session as corrected. Seconded by Squire. Motion carried.

Chairman Don Sharp:

Thanked the Committee for the opportunity to serve as Chairman. Commented that the challenges are to act and proceed as a Board of Directors for the California State Grange. Many things have to be accomplished in this next year. Purpose of our meetings is to get the job done and "Find A Way To Make It Work."

Master Leo Bergeron:

If something is important it is worth saying three times. Meeting today is for the Executive Director and the operation of the Grange. Has had productive trips to New Hampshire. National Grange Session had 10 freshmen Masters at the Convention, all participated and were proactive. Influence of new Masters was definitely felt at the Convention. Resolution was presented by New York State Grange asking the National Grange to assist with the Klamath Basin issues. Had a number of Resolutions from California, only one was rejected.

Notice to all Directors, Chairmen, and Deputies was sent advising them of the termination of their appointments with the installation of the new Master. Many have contacted the State Office to ask for reappointment. Three or four have confirmed that they do not wish to be reappointed. A number are in the field and need to bee seen in their locations. That is in process.

State Officers Meeting – discussion will be held regarding Directors and Chairmen. Find A Way To Make It Work will be the working motto of the Grange.

Legislative/Resolution Committee structure will be changed to be a standing

committees for the year. Water committee was an experiment that worked.

Mike Byers will start his employment as the Membership Coordinator. Membership Committee will be more of an advisory committee only. Deputy Masters will be incorporated into that arena.

Executive Director Report:

George Dupray reporting. Binders have been prepared for Executive Committee meetings. Goal is to get the bulk of the material out approximately 15 days prior to the Executive Committee meeting. Things do change on a day-to-day basis.

Executive Session was called at this time for personnel issues. Visitors were

excused.

George Dupray gave official resignation as a member of the Executive Committee effective 11/30/01. No pay has been received by George for the last six weeks in compliance with the bylaws regarding the Executive Director position.

Don Sharp, as Committee Chairman, entertained motion that in the interest of the California State Grange the Executive Director needs to be a member that knows the workings of the State Office, is available in the community and requested that the person be George Dupray. It was moved, as stated by Chairman, by Bergeron and seconded by Squire. Motion carried. Vote was unanimous with the exception of Dupray who abstained.

It was moved by Squire to accept George's resignation. Seconded by Bergeron, carried. Unanimously.

It was moved by Squire that the appointment of George Dupray as Executive Director, be effective 12/01/01, until another Director can be hired. Seconded by Bevans. Motion carried.

It was moved by Bergeron that the salary for George Dupray be as set by the Delegates at the State Convention, \$3500 per month. Seconded by Bevans. Motion Carried. Unanimously.

The office of Executive Committeeman will be held vacant until an Executive Director can be hired to replace George, at which time, the Executive Committee will consider the appointment for the position.

Objectives of Executive Director.

Get control of flow of monies flowing through the office. In order to do that, have to have personnel.

Employee Handbook. Will not be done until December 30.

Position Descriptions: First hiring will be State Secretary's Assistant. And Secretary/Receptionist – need to have a full-time employee in both positions. Formal position descriptions are in development for bookkeeper. After all others are put in place and functioning, the Executive Director will be put in place.

Inventory Control – Formal inventory will be such that equipment and other items will be marked. Have to develop procedures to check materials out.

Inventory of Real Property – starting to work that issue. Where it is, what it is and what type of liability the State Grange is open to.

Discussion regarding the flow of authority of the Master, Executive Committee and Executive Director.

Tom Stefenoni, Overseer, joined the Committee at this time.

Legislative Director – Staff Position that reflects the established legislative agenda/program of the delegate body as established by the delegates and resolutions of the California State Grange. Need continuity that transcends the election of a Master. Redefine the title of the position. Need job descriptions and who they report to. This will be reviewed and worked on.

Assistant to State Secretary – will now be the General Administrative Assistant. Job description reviewed.

It was moved by Squire to accept the general job description, with the understanding that further changes need to be made. Seconded by Bergeron Motion carried.

Receptionist/Secretary for State Office – must be a full-time position. It was moved by Bergeron to approve the general job description. Seconded by White. Carried.

Accounting/Bookkeeping – Status discussed. Job description is in process, no draft available.

Issue of Late Deposits: Discussed. Problem has been corrected and procedures are in place to no longer have an occurrence.

Accounting Contract Fee Proposal from Karl Gunther's office was reviewed for Executive Committee information. Due a complete audit first part of January 2002. Will address with Nancy Koschyk tomorrow. Copies of signed contracts cannot be found.

Christmas Leave Bonus report. Cash bonus plus lunch in Sacramento. Office will be closed from 12/25 through 01/01/02. Mail will be held in the post office as usual.

Health Care Benefits: Employees opted to go to Kaiser health plan at this time. California State Grange to pay entire amount for the employee only. CSG realized a definite cost savings of about \$500 per month. Total premium is \$947 per month versus \$1400. Plus will save the employee their own out-of-pocket expenses. Tom Stefenoni is the agent on the Kaiser Plan.

Membership Database: Switching to an Access-based membership database. Need to update the program, make it more flexible, and it can accommodate membership and other needs.

Accounting System: Will become part of the General Administrative Assistant Duties for the Accounts Receivable of the Granges. Data will be entered directly onto the Business works system for the per capita etc. General Session was called and meeting was opened to visitors.

Report of Granges:

Costa Mesa: Report on Costa Mesa Grange Hall. Has expended \$25-30,000 of the monies that they were given. Took out \$70,000 from trust account of Garden Grove Grange (from the consolidation), then received an additional \$30,000, for a total of \$100,000. They are requesting another \$200,000 from buying out their note and a loan of \$70,000. George went to meeting on 11/12/01 and made report regarding the Hall. Only piece of property owned by a Grange in all of Orange County. Lot is 60 x 100. There are 26 dues-paying members and 7 Gold Sheaf members.

Mike Byers went to meet with Steven Hood of Costa Mesa Grange regarding the membership plan in the community. At least 1-2 years before anything will be determined. Steven is strong advocate for getting this Grange re-built. Could not get names & numbers of organizations that are willing to use the Hall. No solid plan to rebuild the membership.

Segue into discussion of the Trust Accounts by John Squire. He has developed a spreadsheet from 1993 to the present from the audit reports. The current accounting in the audit included the value of any trust deeds currently held for them plus cash in the total amount.

Return to discussion of the Costa Mesa Grange Hall. It was moved by Bergeron to form committee of Stefenoni, Squire & Bevans to write up protocols & procedures for disbursement of funds from the Grange Hall ioan funds and Grange Trust Funds. Seconded by Squire. Motion carried. To be received for review at the next meeting.

Motion by Bergeron to notify Costa Mesa Grange that there are not enough funds available to satisfy their requirements and the information supplied shows it to be doubtful as to their ability to repay the loan. Seconded by Squire. Discussion. Motion carried. Staff will prepare letter for the Chairman of Executive Committee to sign.

Orchard City Grange: It was moved by Squire to approve the request to withdraw \$8,000 from their trust funds as per their written request. Seconded by White. Motion carried.

San Marcos Grange: Request received to completely close out the trust account in excess of \$17,400. It was moved by Squire to send letter to San Marcos advising that a copy of minutes bearing the Seal of the Grange, from the

meeting where the request for disbursement of funds was voted upon, needs to be received in the State Office before any disbursement can be made. Seconded by White. Motion carried.

Garcia Grange: Complaint was received from Garcia Grange directed to Past Master Fletcher. Master Fletcher sent Deputy, Bruce Brunell, to a meeting to handle a problem. Meeting was volatile and Bruce took a proactive stance. Leo verified the facts of the meeting. Problem in that Grange has been solved. Since that meeting, the Grange has now brought in 12 new members.

San Dimas Grange: Does not have a Hall. Only three people are active in the Grange. Want to close their doors. Want members to demit to another Grange. Current membership shows 60 members with 71 Associates. Matter will be looked at and brought back at next meeting. Per message received from the Secretary, dues will not be billed

because they have voted to surrender their charter. Per State Master, dues will be billed through the State Grange Office and held for San Dimas until situation is resolved.

Ranchito Grange: Concerned about interest in trust account – resolution to problem in process, to be addressed by the accountant. Concerned that trust has depleted and the accounting procedures showing their amounts. Concerned about request to previous State Master for funds from trust to buy or build a hall. Letter to be sent from the Executive Committee that concerns were addressed by Bro Squire and the State Office is looking into the problems.

Pleasant Hill Grange: Property is for sale again. Current owner has listed with Real Estate agent, and are in arrears in payments to us. Has a probable buyer.

Fair Valley Grange: No new info at this time.

Buckeye Grange: Trying to fix the problem. The Hall is to be closed, Grange restructured and re-organized. Some members want to rejuvenate the hall. Day Care Center and Church wants. Church is also ready to rent the Hall. Cannot get the keys to the hall to gain entry, members are not in control of that Hall. Motion by Squire that the Master & Executive Director formulate letter to be sent to present Master & Secretary that we must have an answer in 10 days, then with no response, will start procedures to take possession of the Hall. Seconded by White. Secretary will prepare dues notices to the members with a note in that Reorganization is in process, dues will be sent directly to the State Office, and held in trust for the Grange until reorganization

Manton Grange:

Ernie received call that unless someone else is going to take the Master's position, they are going to close the doors. Ernie & Mike will attend the next meeting.

Parisi Insurance:

Joe Hart, Vice-President and Health Insurance Specialist & Michael Buno, Account Manager of Parisi Insurance Services, joined the meeting at this time. All plans are marketed under GAIN Insurance Services. Only the health insurance is marketed. Have two Health Net Plans, two Kaiser plans, and Western Health Advantage in the general area. This is a member benefit, must be a member for 30 days and must work 20 hrs per week. Long-term members can qualify, but must wait for open enrollment to apply.

Pamphlets sent out include the Associate Membership Application Form. Would like to get assistance from Parisi for an ad campaign for the health program in the newspaper. Do campaign during the open enrollment periods. Currently the firm has 80 subscribers in Health Net, 25 in Kaiser and 10 in Western Health Advantage for the Grange. These are Guaranteed Issue policies. Cannot be turned down if during open enrollment. If self-employed, need the participating requirement, employee can sign up but pay with personal check.

Report of Granges (continued)

Fresno Property: Ready to go into escrow. Small Business Admin Loan Guarantee is on hold. Net proceeds be placed into the GBO Funds per resolution in 1992. California State Grange can recover all of the clean-up costs, prior to the net amount.

Biggs Grange Hall: Local realtor recommends that the property be listed at \$80,000 as a meeting place, hoping to get \$60,000. If it doesn't go within six months, he recommends reducing to \$40,000 as a residential property. Inside needs finish carpenter, window molding, paneling, etc. Kitchen in good shape. One rafter has some dry-rot. Monies were loaned to the Grange and further monies were expended to upgrade the Hall with a total amount of \$11,000. Any sale of the property will have to satisfy the interest of the State Grange in repaying a loan and funds. The balance of the monies will then go to Gridley Grange, where the Biggs members consolidated, to help them with maintenance on their Hall. George will secure the local realtor to list the property for the \$80,000. George will contact Dahlmeier Insurance Agency/Granite Insurance, to determine the

insurance policy information. Need to secure endorsement as mortgagee.

It was moved by Squire to approve George's report on Biggs Grange, seconded by Bevans. Motion carried.

Grange Properties held by the State Grange:

George will inventory and evaluate the reverted properties for liability risk, value, and evaluate to negate any liability hazards to the California State Grange. It was moved by Bevans, that the Exec Director be authorized to take whatever steps are necessary to protect the interests of the Grange on vacated or empty property that is not viable and a liability hazard. Seconded by White. Motion to amend by Bevans to add to notify the Exec Com within three weeks. Seconded by White. Motion carried, amendment carried. Motion as amended carried.

Casper Institute of Agriculture:

Master Bergeron will investigate and bring report to the next meeting.

Accounts Receivable

Accounts Receivable from employees for personal items will no longer be a procedure in the office. No employee loans will be allowed.

Office rearrangement.

Will take all of the older financial records in the dark room and move it upstairs. Then will paint interior and put all of the non-transitory filing in that room with a copy machine. Files will be consolidated.

Have started to empty the old press room and clean it out. Will put the sales items, i.e. shirts, jackets, etc., in that area and secure them.

Need to organize materials so that things are marked for convention, ready to ship in a box.

Attorney Retainer:

Need to have counsel available when the CSG needs it. George to check with the Non-profit resource center or the Referral Service for an attorney who will be able to assist us with our needs.

Real Estate School:

School on Fundamentals of Real Estate Closings. Seminar costs \$199 for a one-day class. Jay Hartz will be sent to this training.

Food Land & People:

Representatives from this organization

have been calling about projects that were in process that Naomi was involved with. Legislative Director, Maggie Bloom is connected at the Ag Network, Rural Crime Prevention Task Force. Maggie will take up the involvement with the Food Land & People project.

Label Maker:

Labeling programs on computers inhouse don't work very well. This machine will make labels up to 2 1/4" wide, disk, audio cassettes, and standard address labels. Costs \$299. George will purchase for the State Office.

Dos Palos Grange:

Want to close the Grange, Merced County. George will check to see if members can be demitted to Merced Colony. Hold for next meeting.

Orangevale Grange:

Leo to install their officers next week. Grange is in arrears in per-capita payments and loans to be paid. Have a promissory note from them stating that they would pay per capita in 24 payments, have not heard from them. Small Claims Court action against them, George has to appear on 12/14 to file a disclaimer regarding the \$4,000 request with regard to removing an abandoned vehicle from the property. Second lawsuit has more ramifications with respect to a liability loss from a renter. Insurance has lapsed and CSG was never notified of that lapse while holding the mortgage.

Discussion regarding the insurance policy. Phone call to Bob Clouse Insurance, who advised he had quoted a policy to cover building. caretakers home, contents and liability. Premium was approx \$4,000 per year. Quote was provided to Master, Dawna Conas who advised that the membership could not afford that, and wanted only liability coverage. Clouse Insurance refused to write the policy. Conas advised that the group she belongs to is going to take over the Hall for \$2,000 per month, and they will rent the Hall themselves. Clouse recommends buying a policy to replace it, and tack it on to the amount owed. Clouse was directed by Leo Bergeron to obtain a Fire, Actual Cash Value Policy of \$100,000. Clouse will also secure liability for \$300,000.

Letter will be sent demanding proof of insurance to the State Grange within 10 days. Per Capita Tax Issue. Letter to Orangevale Grange will be sent indicating that on October 9th the Orangevale Grange agreed to correct their arrears in dues with a promissory note of \$3,779, which stipulated payments over the following 24

months. As this is December, approximately 60 days has passed. a payment has not been received and we would appreciate a payment on the promissory note. It was so

moved by Bergeron. Squire seconded. Motion carried.

Cell Phones:

Two additional phones have been purchased for the Executive Director and Legislative Director while on the road.

Teleconferencing:

Jay Hartz joined the meeting at this time. Video conferencing. All parties would have to be on DSL and other items, cost would be \$8,000-\$10,000. Item will be dropped at this time.

Costs for Executive Committee Meeting. Costs are approximately \$1,000 per meeting for lodging, meals & mileage.

Audio conferencing is quoted at \$326 per hour. At this point it is more cost effective to bring people in.

Report complete. Will not pursue at this time.

Employee Handbook:

Draft reviewed by Committee. Changes can be made by drafting the change, posting the change for 30 days and advising the employees, with a signed receipt from the employee.

Document outlines legal provisions for the employee and employers. CSG is an at-will employer and has been from the beginning. At-will says that employees may quit at any time and employees can be terminated by the CSG at any time.

Secure personnel files will be set up for each employee by the Executive Director, and certain information will be kept in those files and photocopies can be given to the employee of certain items.

It was moved by Bergeron to approve the Handbook with the corrections noted. Seconded by Squire. Motion carried.

All members will have copy of employee handbook

State Secretary:

It was moved by Bevans to increase the salary to the State Secretary by \$5,400 for the year 2002 to cover the increase in duties and training a new general administrative assistant. Seconded by White. Motion carried.

Meeting adjourned at 5:15pm for the Grange Foundation.

Meeting reconvened at 5:21pm.

Report from Travel Coordinator, Martha Stefenoni: Best airline fares are 14 days or further out on advanced purchase. Fares can double and triple if short notice is given. When Grangers need to travel, they need to give more notice for better fares.

Members present as per yesterday's roll.

Secretary's Report.

Membership has declined from 18,068 to 16,137, Sept 2000 to Sept 2001. This represents a decline of 10.7%, Associate members have declined the same period from 1,548 to 972 members which equals a 30% decline.

Current projects:

Audit of Quarterly Reports for 1999-September 2001. This will encompass the monies received, when received, what is still owed by Granges and which ones are delinquent.

Bookkeeping System: Writing the Standard Operating Procedures and will encompass putting the information directly into the system. Invoices and credit memos can be generated at that time.

Journal of Proceedings: Completion is planned for December 15th. Unknown if it will be jobbed out or printed in-house. No bids have been secured.

Roster: Forms will be mailed by the end of December with return. Info will be printed directly from the database, members will only have to make corrections and add e-mail addresses this year.

Dues Billing Service: changes from the membership verification lists had not been entered and billings are going out late. Priority to make changes to those Granges needing the service. Some are run and being stuffed by Judy Byers.

Secretary's Office: is in the process of reorganization and will be that way for the next year. Priorities will be handled first.

Ultimate Goal: Secretaries will be able to bring up their own lists, make changes, add, delete and correct membership, print their quarterly reports, e-mail the report to the State Grange and just send in the check.

Grange Properties: Making list of Granges that have Halls in the State. Also making list of Granges with notes receivable and

verification of their insurance policies.

Grange Exposition:

Written report from Katie Squire. 179 Total Exhibitors. 36 Granges, 742 judged entries. Premium amounts available \$5,135. Paid: \$2,451, 47.3% of prize exposure was paid. 2002 Premium Book is completed and ready to go to print.

Proposed total premiums available \$9,327. Participation should go up with the information sent out early.

It was moved by Bergeron to accept the premium book for 2002, as written. Seconded by White. Discussion. Motion carried.

Discussion that it has been suggested that the Exposition needs to be a separate department. Costs and distribution of checks needs to be factored into the program – is an administrative duty.

Organizational Chart Review:

Discussion. It was moved by Bergeron that the Lobbyist/Legislative Director be moved to report to the State Master, not the Executive Director. Seconded by Bevans. Motion carried.

Financial Reports:

Nancy Koschyk from Karl Gunther's office made presentation at this time. Bud Hill also joined the committee at this time. Has received over 30 resumes from the ad run on 12/02/01.

Break out of funds for the GIA monies and Membership Development fund spent. Convention, not everything has been posted yet. Still a great deal of activity to be posted for Convention. Looks like a \$35,000 loss on Convention, which is about average.

Discussion regarding Trust interest allocations. Accountant to re-compute the allocations for the current year, for cash interest received on the cash funds. Interest earned for the notes has not been allocated. Accountant will set up the numbers and provide information to the Executive Committee.

Accountant needs to get the audit started by January 3rd. Inventory is the primary activity that needs to be completed.

Roll of State Treasurer:

Needs to be defined. Signature on all accounts, assist with budget process, assist bookkeeper at State session, clear & extend vouchers, sign checks, sign payables approximately 2 times each month as prepared by CSG bookkeeper.

Check registers for payments signed by George. Administrative arrangement. No payroll checks. Regular routine bills, SMUD, water, gas,

etc, that can be mailed from Bud's home, will be sent to him for signature and mailing.

Bud available on Friday's about 2:30pm for one-day meetings for Executive Committee.

Roll of Auditing Member:

Ernie used to received copy of checks, list of all accounts receivable that didn't pay, credit card bills, etc, for review of the auditing member. Inger will request information as necessary from the bookkeeper — will work with George to obtain information.

Web Site Presentations:

Jay Hartz presented information on the following:

Winnet Technologies: Was asked how to get to the point where we are now and allow us to go in and make changes as we need them done. \$399 to get on the web, with own site and e-mail connections. Puts us in the place we are now with our own server. \$99 per year for the domain name. In-house staff would have to make changes and maintain.

Web Hosting: Basically same, Fair Oaks Organization. Would have to provide her the materials and she would put on the server. \$36.00 per month, and only put us in the position we are in now.

AMS-Affinity Media Services.
Presentation by Bill Booth. AMS is owned by Bill Booth. The company will develop, maintain web-site and do the work. No worries about in-house staff having to learn, be trained, etc. Place site with AIT. Basic rate runs \$18.00 month and \$39 for initial set-up. Two parts to the web-site, general public, and members only under a member password. Cost would be \$57.95 per month for hosting, \$300 per month for web-master. Initial set-up fee for web Master of \$500 plus \$39.00 for the initial set-up, and \$14.00 for two year registration of domain name. Cost would be \$4,100 per year.

Communications should be the proper budget item.

It was moved by Bevans to accept the proposal from AMS-Affinity Media Services for the year 2002 to develop website, and consider it a communications expense. Seconded by Squire. Discussion. Motion carried.

Must have website put on line and

immediately take off the other website. It was moved by Bergeron to adopt the domain name of "grangeonline.com". Seconded by White. Motion carried.

By-Law Revisions:

Need to clean up the by-laws referring to the Executive Director. Johnny Squire will bring back a draft at a later meeting.

Meeting Schedule:

Review of schedules. Suggestion that the committee meet every two months for 2002 then review for next year. Meetings are scheduled for Fridays & Saturdays as follows: February 8 & 9, April 12 & 13, June 14 & 15, August 9 & 10, October 8th & 14th, and December 13 & 14, 2002.

Membership Report:

Mike Byers & Russ Harris joined the meeting at this time. MUST wear membership pins so people know who we are!!. Have to attract members to the organization. Have adopted the Youth Fair Program as the common-cause of the Grange. Is a built-in advertising tool. Have ground work and organization to set up. Have to get a standard goal to get everyone to talk about. Now have a purpose to come to the Grange and affects the Grange in Northern, Southern & Central California. Program is changed to be a proactive program, not a reactive program. People will be assigned to the Granges, in a geographic area. Make a hard run in a revised visioning program.

No monies were budgeted for the Youth Fair Program for 2002. The leader was never asked to present a budget and no funds were allocated.

Next Meeting:

Agenda Items to include – Review and revise budget based on new information received during this meeting.

Roll Call:

Roll Call found the following members present: Chairman, Don Sharp; Overseer, Tom Stefenoni: Members, Johnny Squire, Ernest White, Inger Bevans, and Master, Leo Bergeron; Secretary, Lillian Booth; Treasurer, Bud Hill; and Executive Director, George Dupray. Visitors to portions of the meeting included Kathy Foster, First Lady; Mike Byers, Membership Coordinator; Bill Mann, Strategic Planning Team; Norm & Lori Dahlia, Youth Fair Program and Youth Directors.

Minutes:

Minutes of the previous meeting were approved with two minor corrections. Corrections noted and implemented.

It was moved by Johnny Squire that a final Master Copy of the minutes be signed and initialed on each page by each member of the Committee, and retained in the State Office. Seconded by Ernie White. Motion carried.

Meeting recessed for Grange Foundation Meeting at 08:50 hrs.

Meeting reconvened at 0900 hrs.

Master's Report:

Leo Bergeron reporting. The Executive Committee, with Overseer, Tom Stefenoni; Treasurer, Bud Hill; and Secretary, Lillian Booth, met in a working Budget Session on Thursday, 2/07/02 and Friday, 02/08/02.

Presentation was made by Nancy Koschyk, Accountant with the Karl Gunther CPA office, on Thursday 02/07/02, regarding the financial position of the California State Grange. A complete review was made of the restricted accounts, the un-audited expenditures of 2001, and the proposed budget as adopted by the delegates at the San Bernardino Session. It was determined that the prior budget was based on incomplete and erroneous financial information. As such, the Committee met in Budget Session to review and revise the budget.

in order to implement changes to effectively manage the assets, employees, and services of the California State Grange.

Still a need for two more staff members,

and to fund the Grange Youth Fair Program. Somewhere in the original process, this program was completely missed.

Propose taking the two staff positions and put them on hold until we are able to clear some Grange properties that are to be sold this year. Need to fund the Fair Program. A proposed budget will be presented by the Director, Norm Dahlia.

Proposing that the Departments be restructured by eliminating the position of Legislative Director, at this time. These duties will be absorbed by the Executive Director, as per current job description, and the State Master. This will result in a savings of about \$40,000 per year. Proposal and recommendation is made with due consideration. The Legislative Department is one of the most important in the organization. When the State Office is re-organized, the job description of the Executive Director allows time as an active lobbyist out of the office. Also, an internship program can be implemented with possible grant funding available. CSG has the structure now to put it into place.

It was moved by Bergeron to immediately restructure the Legislative Department by transferring the duties to the Executive Director, and the State Master. Seconded by Ernie White. Discussion. Motion carried unanimously.

Executive Director Report:

George Dupray reporting.

Display panels: CSG paid \$4,000 for the transportation of display panels belonging to the German/American Group to National in 2000, are still at CSG office. Have been communicating with the group, and resolution will be forthcoming.

VISA Cards: CSG has had a single VISA card account with limit of \$5,000. Will retain that general VISA card, and it will stay in the office—only two people with access would be Jay or George, who can designate an employee for a specified one-time purpose. Have opened secured account VISA cards with Sacramento Credit Union. These are now issued with the following limits as follows: Master, Leo Bergeron, \$1500; Membership Coordinator, Mike Byers, \$1500; Legislative \$1,000; Executive Director \$1000; Youth Fair Director \$1500. Will have individual accounting by name and expenditures on each

statement.

State Fair: Agri-Fair always had problems filling the slots. Then they began to charge fees and booth's were un-manned. State Fair designed our booth last year and it was not the quality we expected for the cost paid. Have opted out of the fair for this year.

State Secretary: Need to get clarification on the non-profit corporate law regarding paid state officers.

COLA increase: Need to allow room in the budget for granting cost of living increases to employees.

Report on Granges:

Sierra Nevada Grange: Had to open the Safety Deposit Box and B of A charged \$100 to open the box. Ground that the Hall sets on is worth approximately \$100,000. Including the building would add \$60,000. Concrete block building, with bad roof. Very little parking, in awkward place. Only one person left to attend to affairs. Utilities accumulated and CSG expended \$1360 to get utilities current.

Fair Valley Grange: Have an offer from Church of Christ of \$60,000 with initial down payment of \$5000 and payments of \$5000 per month. Grange will have usage two times per month for the life of the loan. Leo has looked at the hall, may be worth more. Dorothy Bolton has said there is some dry rot problems. 4500 square foot building, in fairly decent shape. Will get appraisal before proceeding.

Guenoc Grange: LDS church was going to use it as a Youth Center. Church has rejected contract and no longer interested. The well is bad, existing bid for \$5,025 and does not include the pump. Jay & George will be taking trip up there.

Tulare Farm Show: Have fronted approximately \$800 to get the booth ready. Have not included travel and housing in that amount. Costs will be spread to different accounts to accurately reflect costs per Department.

Costa Mesa Grange: Received notice from City of Costa Mesa to clean the property, or the Grange will be cited. The members have not moved forward with the cleaning of the property. Monies were withdrawn from the trust to rebuild the Grange Hall and placed into a Money Market. Rebuilding plans are on hold. To be discussed later.

Youth Fair Program:

Norm Dahlia, Youth Fair Program Director, joined the meeting at this time.

Blue & Black flyer – sending to all of the Granges in mass mailing to get support from the local Granges to get support of the local people. The more publicity, the more kids, the more we grow. Youth will not only help the Grange survive, but it will help it thrive.

Have continued to revamp the program since its inception. Are now part of Western Fairs Association, and the Fairs & Expositions Association. Program is introduced as a family program. Have garnered approximately 400 members from 5-14 yrs old. Have chartered Rubidoux Jr. Ojai Valley Jr. & Quartz Hill Jr. Granges were reactivated. In Ojai Valley have brought in 125 members. There will be several families coming over after Ventura County Fair this year. Some Fairs make exhibitors obligate to which group you will be showing with as of 1/1/02.

Current committee members are: Tom Osborn, Ventura County (Coastal-Mid-State Rep), Loraine Ferchaud (No Cal) Rough & Ready Grange; Hank & Heidi Hitt (Riverside/San Diego County), Vista Grange, and Johnny Squire, Executive Committee Rep.

Presented calendars of this years' activities. Lori & Norm are certified to teach the Ethics Classes to any group.

Uniform Change: White button-down shirt, with red vest and Grange Logo on the back. Cost last year of \$13.50 for vest. Have new vendor with silk screening cuts the cost in half. Have to order 250 vests this year. Found vendor to make printed t-shirts of \$6.00 per shirt, and long-sleeved for \$10 each.

Buckle Awards: Proposing giving buckles for High point Champions in different areas. Have ten sponsors for each of these buckles, costs approximately \$110-\$120 each.

Norm & Lori were thanked and excused at this time.

Discussion of the proposals ensued. It was moved by Bergeron to take the proposed budget of the Grange Youth Fair Team Department in the amount of \$17,000, and include it in the California State Grange Budget, as a separate Department. Seconded by Squire. Discussion. Motion carried unanimously.

Strategic Planning Team:

Bill Mann was invited to attend the committee at this time. Bill presented report of 11 planning packages and recommended that the Team be dissolved at this time. Many of the recommendations that were made are in the process of implementation by the current administration and these programs should be allowed to work and flourish.

Recommendations were reviewed. Committee would recommend that all granges set up a Strategic Planning Team for their own Grange. Need to develop a 1, 3 and 5-year plans.

Recess was called for lunch & tour of the Shrine Children's Hospital.

Website:

Questions on security and the 2002 proposed resolutions on the website.

Resolutions – (1) Can the resolutions be password protected for the legislative committee? Take off the site for now, until policy can be developed. Policy to be developed at next meeting.

Security—(1) How secure is the e-mailing back and forth through the net? E-mail is forwarded to the personal e-mail. When the officer or director changes, the corporate e-mail stays the same and can be forwarded to the new person. Need to stress that all officers use the corporate e-mail for uniformity and continuity.

It was moved by Bergeron that the corporate e-mail as established be used by all officers/directors, and forwarded to their personal e-mail, for uniformity and continuity. Seconded by Squire and carried.

Group Health Insurance:

Review for personnel. Small change in the plan—no change for worker's within the Sacramento area, but will change to another plan administrator to cover the Membership Development Coordinator, who lives out of the area. There will be an increase in costs, which was included in the revised budget.

State Secretary's Report:

List read of Granges to be suspended for the non-payment of per capita taxes. It was moved by Squire to approve the temporary suspension of the recommended Granges. Seconded by Bergeron. Motion carried. Costa Mesa Grange:

Need to review the monies sent to them versus the amount of actual cash that was received from the sale of the Hall. Letter should be sent to the effect that the funds that were sent to them was for the purpose of rebuilding their Hall and that process is now stalled, so the funds need to be returned. They currently have a legal issue regarding cleaning up the site with the City of Costa Mesa.

It was moved by White that the State Master write a letter to Costa Mesa Grange regarding the earlier release of the trust funds for the rebuilding of their Hall. Seconded by Squire. Motion carried.

Projects:

Per Master Bergeron, will be setting up an in-house procedure manual regarding the Grange Activities/Good of the Order Resolutions; review of the Trust Accounts and Funds; Inger Bevans will be working on the Resolutions that need to be written; have to find Legal consultant for advice on the real estate properties held by the State Grange.

Meeting adjourned at 4:12pm

April 12 & 13, 2002

Meeting:

Called to order at 09:02am at the California State Grange Headquarters.

Roll Call:

Master, Leo Bergeron; Overseer, Tom Stefenoni; Johnny Squire, George Dupray, Don Sharp, Chairman, Inger Bevans, Ernie White. State Secretary, Lillian Booth. Kathy Bergeron, and Mike Byers.

Minutes:

Action postponed until Sister Booth can join the meeting.

Executive Director Comments:

George Dupray introduced Pam Reed as the new office secretary, who will take minutes for the first part of the meeting. He also introduced Rhonda who is a temporary employee who is helping with the back load of production. Costs for the temporary help at this time are \$14.00 per hour, at a total of 30 hours.

George thanked everyone for their

cooperation with the Legislative Department program. Want to continue to improve communication.

Master's Comments:

Communication is important. Updates will be sent every three months on a quarterly basis between newsletters. The newsletter will include a slip to send in their e-mail address. It is important to have these to get urgent messages out as quickly as possible.

Lawsuits: The habitat issue was won with an out of court settlement. Delisting is waiting for court date.

Washington, DC fly-in will be in June. Will attempt to schedule a meeting with a congressman.

Re-established the eight western states in a Master's coalition. Next meeting will be May 8th & 9th of this year.

At the previous Master's Coalition meeting, several items were discussed including the supportive membership status, fair programs, need for livestock insurance to continue. Wyoming is now setting up a premium book for their exhibits next year. A Western States conference will have a full presentation of the Fair Program. The Fair Program is bringing in new families to the Granges in California.

Visited Nevada Star Grange in Sparks. They have a semi-traditional meeting. Had interest in the Fair Program.

Regional Meetings have been very successful. Will visit Butte County and Paradise Grange with an Ice Cream social on Sunday, April 14th. Can touch 6 Granges or more for as little as \$300.

Letter received from State Grange Steward, James Stuart, resigning his office. Master sent acknowledgment letter to Brother Stuart.

Financial Investment:

Carolyn Moulds of Morgan Stanley joined the meeting at this time. She has 22 years with Morgan Stanley, as a certified financial planner. She will work on tools to help the State Grange with management of the monies held in trust. Maximum insurance is \$100,000 per account. Can transfer all assets to three separate accounts, i.e. Mutual Funds, Bond

Funds, and Check writing capabilities in a money market. Can be coded to special accounts. The Company will provide a comprehensive statement each month, and there is online access with the most current information. Must decide how much risk you want to take. Recommend keeping the CD's on a short term basis. With an over-all plan, shouldn't be too hard to manage. No charge for consultants on call.

Carolyn was thanked for her time and excused from the meeting

Lillian Booth joined the meeting at this time. Audit Report:

Nancy Koschyck. State Grange. Total assets are up. Net income at end of 2000 was \$176,000. End of 2001 the net income is only \$2,500. This is a loss of over \$174,000. Part of this is the salary changes of \$32,000 and Consulting Fees of \$29,000. However, there was considerable over-spending in other areas during the last year.

Net rental income went up by \$15,000 for the year. Grange News loss went down by \$2000. Other problem in 2001 was the catalog sales – loss of \$7,000.

Coding of the expenses will be changed with a revision in the Chart of Accounts.

CSG is being audited for the Grange News concerning the unrelated business income. There should be a favorable outcome.

Grange Trust: Have made separation of original amount of cash and property. Will make interest allocations on the cash amount only. Garden Grove is in a negative position because too much money was advanced to them for their remodel. The interest allocation for their property loan will be retained into the working trust until that money is re-paid.

Reverted Trusts. Alderpoint trust, \$5,145 is eligible to be transferred at any time, and Colusa Yolo Pomona trust, \$1,139, is eligible for reversion at 05/02.

Working Trust has amount due from the State Grange of \$8,300 from the repair of the Biggs Grange Hall. Is now properly accounted for. Will be kept as a receivable until the sale of the Hall. Is noted as the payable on the State Grange side.

Nancy was thanked for her time. A

copy of the Draft Audit was left with the committee for approval.

Minutes:

Minutes of previous meeting approved as corrected. Minutes of the previous meeting will be prepared for signature of the committee.

Report of Executive Director:

Retainer of Attorney: Thomas A.

Nickens, Attorney at Law, has been retained on behalf of the California State Grange. Mr.

Nickens is a member of Orangevale Grange.

Currently assisting with the property transfers already in progress. Cost is approximately

\$4,000 per year, with an accumulation of unused hours per year.

Loss of Equipment: Equipment was taken from the vault room at an unspecified time. Loss included the digital camera and one laptop computer. Loss was paid by the insurance less the \$500 deductible. Items have been purchased to replace the loss.

Toll-Free Number: Granges are requesting installation of 800# for the California Service Area. Current quote of \$28.00 to set up, \$5.00 per month, and \$.10 per minute, through Pac Bell. It was moved by Squire to authorize the Executive Director to set up a toll-free number for the State Grange based on the best cost for the State Grange. Seconded by Bevans. Discussion. Motion carried.

Volunteer Protection Act of 1997: Information only.

Orangevale Grange #354: Action regarding Small Claims court case. State Grange is not involved and action is finalized.

Shriners' Hospital: Acknowledgment of donation made to the hospital.

Fair Valley Grange: Originally wanted to sell the hall and put funds into a specified scholarship fund. Are currently re-thinking the allocation. Is in process at this time.

Bank Signature Cards: Have requested signature cards from all the banks. Need to standardize the signatures on each account. Many of these problems will be mitigated if a financial plan is put into place. It was moved by Squire to authorize the following be authorized as signatures holders on the bank accounts of the California State Grange: (1) the Executive Director, (2) State Master, (3) State Treasurer.

(4) State Secretary, and (5) the designated alternate of the Executive Director. Seconded by White. Motion carried. To be included in the Executive Committee Policy Handbook.

Report of State Secretary:

Report of Suspension of Granges:

Four Granges have been reinstated.
Currently investigating another five. Have 26 still outstanding with suspensions until something is heard from them.
Letter received from Clear Lake Grange #680.
Recommendation by Membership Coordinator and Regional Rep, to hold off on any decisions until meeting is held with them.

It was moved by White to refer this matter to Membership Coordinator Byers and Regional Rep Brunnell, requesting a report back from them as soon as possible. Seconded by Squire. Motion carried.

Roster: Several suggestions have been to change the format. It was moved by Squire to change the form of the Roster to only include the Grange information, and list the Master & Secretary. Seconded by Ernie. Motion Carried. Other information is available through the State Office.

Equipment purchase request. Request for laser printer in State Secretary's office, cost of \$400, and additional licensing of the Business works Accounting Program of \$595. It was moved by Squire to purchase the HP1200 laser printer and additional licensing for one additional user for the accounting program. Seconded by Bevans. Motion carried.

Request costs and savings for a color laser printer to be researched for a later meeting.

State Secretary was directed to research the Granges listed as active in the Working Trust and correctly name them.

Legislative Activities:

Putting committees together now. Have eight people who have expressed interest in the committee. More interest is expected since the publishing of the Grange News. Purpose of the Committee structure is to mainly review and scrutinize current policy, and assist with suggestions for the lobbyists to implement the

policy.

Bruce Brunnell joined meeting at this time.

Comptche Grange was closed December 31, 2000. They did not bill any members for dues in 2001, turned Hall back to Community Service District along with \$8,000 in their checking account. It was all done before anyone knew anything about it. State Secretary will bill dues for current year and, if paid, will demit them into Whitesboro Grange.

Guenoc Grange: Andre Pedro will be presented a certificate of appreciation and 50-year membership award. Need to have well drilled and received \$2200 in their checking account. A Church is interested in leasing it for four years at \$100 per month, which will pay the taxes, and all other expenses will be their responsibility. 100'x100' foot lot, not enough parking. Property is marked as a historical site. Is a marker there more because it was a Grange, not for the Grange Hall. All records are on deposit with the historical society.

Ukiah Grange: Redwood Valley Grange and Ukiah Grange are in the process of voting to combine. Will happen sometime in June.

Little Lake Grange: Have found major problems with dry rot under the building, have almost used \$20,000 to fix it.

Convention 2003: Ukiah Fairgrounds rent will be \$1,250 per day, includes table, chairs, 200' x 500' for the main hall and another smaller hall, show arena and stalls for fair. Can do full exposition, full use of two kitchens with tables and chairs. Headquarters Hotel is only ½ mile away and has 177 rooms. Will negotiate rate in October.

Legislative Fly-In:

Scheduled for June 9-12. Will make own schedule for Hill visits. CSG has to pay the travel and lodging for their members.

Financial Reports:

Will discuss in depth tomorrow.

Defining the new structure to include the Auditing member of the Executive Committee as the contact person for the accountant.

Fresno Property:

Small Business Loan has been approved,

he is waiting to accumulate the cash to make the down payment. Rent is still being paid. Will review at next Exec Committee meeting.

Executive Director Committee:

Discussion of the materials regarding the Job Description of the Executive Director.

Recess for the evening, to reconvene at 08:00 hrs on 04/13/02

Saturday, April 13, 2002

Grange Foundation meeting at 08:00 hrs. Next meeting scheduled for June 28 & 29, 2002 in Sacramento. Adjourned at 08:45 hrs.

Executive Committee Meeting reconvened at 08:45 hrs.

Youth Fair Program:

Norm Dahlia joined meeting at this time. Youth Fair Program is keeping everyone busy. Good meeting at Oakhurst with Yosemite High School. Have to explain that a Grange needs to be set up there. Nearest Grange is Merced. They are concerned about joining an organization they know nothing about.

Working on a fund raiser, which will net \$7800 per year through Albertson's Markets.

Will meet with Fairs & Expositions in Wyoming because they want to start a Youth Fair Program. Expenses are paid by Wyoming. Invitations from other States will be paid by the other States.

Loomis Grange have asked for the Fair Program. The Grange has made a commitment of \$5,000 to help develop the program locally.

Has been interest expressed in Arizona. No Granges there, but they can be organized.

Morgan Stanley Proposal:

Work has to be done to set the parameters for the investing of funds. Shares with the Credit Unions are not an asset, but a liability. Need to set up a finance committee made up of three members, in a position to make decisions better.

It was moved by Bergeron to start the process to go with the Morgan Stanley financial program in accordance with the established financial policy of the Executive Committee, with due consideration being given to the Grange Credit Unions. Seconded by White.

Discussion. Motion carried.

Financial Committee appointed by the Chairman, will be Inger Bevans, Johnny Squire, and Leo Bergeron. Chairman will be Inger Bevans.

Job Description of Executive Director:

Review of the Job Description. Amendments will be sent by e-mail for approval. Must start the process of searching for the permanent Executive Director. Suggest that letter be sent to all the Masters with the job announcement. Info can be placed on the website at any time.

Grange Hall Loan Fund Procedures

Policy was reviewed as presented by Inger Bevans. It was moved by Squire to adopt the revised Grange Hall Loan Fund application procedure. Seconded by Bergeron. Motion Carried. To Be included in the Executive Committee Policy Handbook.

Trust Fund Disbursement Procedures:

Draft reviewed and referred back to the Committee for more work.

Parisi Insurance Services:

Western Health Advantage withdrawn from Grange participation. Kaiser Plan and Health Net are still in effect. Information only.

Family Dues Structure:

National will try to do this year to implement at 2003. The concept has been adopted for a family per-capita structure. CSG needs a resolution to implement a family dues structure in the event that a change is submitted by National. Leo will check with National regarding the structure. Will be referred to the Grange Law Committee.

Seed Money to Re-Start Granges:

Have run into position with Granges where the monies were needed to get the power on or pay other immediate bills to get a Hall open again. Some of these need to be reimbursed.

It was moved to set up an account of \$1,000 for start-up expenses to reactivate Granges, to be funded from the contingency funds. Seconded by Squire. Motion Carried.

Travel & Living Expenses:

Master's current travel and living expenses are averaging \$1200-\$1500 per month. Cost is approximately \$100 per day to keep someone in the field for lodging, meals & travel. Need to establish a standardized rate for mileage and per diem for the officers and directors traveling on behalf of CSG.

Referred to the Financial Committee for review.

Website:

Bill Booth, webmaster, joined the committee at this time. Still having a problem with the officers' getting information submitted for the website. E-mailed would be best.

Needs more information sent in. Last week put up 120 photos from the Youth Conference. There is a calendar, can add events to the area.

Consensus decision on e-mails is to reconfigure to have the mis-addressed e-mails bounced back to the sender and not go to the webmaster for forwarding.

Request report of number of hits on the website, etc., at each Executive Committee.

Linking sites – there are two ways to link. The Grange can have a website made up. A Grange can link to their own website also.

Focus Groups:

Missing demographics. People between 23 and 38, are missing. Determine working group of people in that age group and see what the Grange can do for them. Johnny Squire appointed as chairman to work with a focus group.

Action Grange Conferences:

Santa Cruz Live Oak offered their hall for the next area conference. Airlines are not flying direct to Santa Cruz for the National Reps. Hall is available on the date mutually agreed upon. Motels would be expensive at the summer time. Will review at later date.

Granges:

Costa Mesa Grange: Went to Costa Mesa property. Appears to be in compliance with City of Costa Mesa.

Sierra Nevada Grange: Transfer is in process with the attorney.

Fair Valley Grange: There is room to subdivide into four parcels. Room to leave the Hall on two of the parcels and can sell the other

two, cost of \$8000 to file for the subdivision. The Grange is in San Bernardino County with a small part in City of Costa Mesa. The City is annexing property all around the Hall. If it is transferred to the City, there are similar subdivisions of property nearby. A church is currently using it.

Lucerne Valley Grange: Title has now transferred to CSG. CSG is paying the utilities at this time. Grange closed. Will try to reorganize a Grange in that area. Two groups are interested in the Grange Fair Program. Norm will be working with them.

Pleasant Hill Grange: Hall is being resold. Current close of escrow is May 1.

Guenoc Grange: Talked with well-drilling company. Have to wait on any further progress until the well is completed, there is no water to the property right now. Turned the checkbook over to the CSG with \$3,200. This will be used to pay the expenses for the Grange. Cost to do the well is approximately \$600.

North Fork Grange Hall: Trinity County, on 299. No communication, but the Hall appears empty and vacant.

Buckeye Grange: Active Grange and is going again. Reorganization appears complete.

DeSabla Grange: Have to look into that property.

Lincoln Central: Need to determine if per-capita has been paid. Research by State Secretary.

Janesville property: Property is so small that does not appear to be usable as a property with a building. The pre-school next door is interested in purchasing for extra space.

Review of Digest sections 4.12.1 and 4.12.2 page 4-48 and 4-49. It was moved by Bergeron to have the attorney review sections 4.12.1 and 4.12.2 for an opinion. Seconded by Bevans. Discussion. Motion carried. Once we have an opinion from our attorney, we will approach the National Grange legal unit.

Membership:

New updates. Recently went to Tulare Trade show and reconnected with the Ag industry in that area. Lot of interest in the Grange in that area.

Buckeye is running with all new officers and new members. About five members have returned. Now have all the funds locked and

secured with two signatures on the accounts. Also a \$1500 tractor was retrieved which was bought after the Grange was closed. Are involved in the community food bank. Are starting rent their hall. Does not appear to be a Grange that will still need a lot of attention.

Lake Earl Grange - good community. 23 new members with new officers. Will add another 18 new members. Will be an active Grange politically and in the community. Near Fort Dick. Working well, need financial help to start up.

Danville Grange - Master requested information and help. Have unique issues, only four members live in Danville, others live further away. Hall is rented a lot.

Clear Lake Grange - some interest in the Grange in the area. Single member left is tired and needs help. There is community interest, but no plan.

Fieldbrook Grange - only four members active, but interest in community. Some issues in that Grange that need to be fixed.

FFA Conference - coming up next week. Has been a good program before and will continue to be. Treasurer of California State FFA Foundation is Bob Clouse.

Performance Reports:

Need to compile and have information regarding membership results. Reports will be prepared by the State Secretary.

E-Mail subscription management:

It was moved by Bergeron to set up the email subscription account for an additional \$29 per month. Seconded by White. Carried. Brother Booth directed to set that up and prepare information for the Grange News.

Meeting was adjourned.

June 28 & 29, 2002

Meeting was called to order at 9:07am, by Don Sharp, Chairman. Members present were: Johnny Squire, Ernest White, Inger Bevans; Master Leo Bergeron, Secretary Lillian Booth, Executive Director George Dupray. Mike Byers, Membership Coordinator, and Kathy Bergeron were also present.

Minutes:

It was moved by White, Seconded by Squire to adopt minutes of 04/12/02, as corrected. Motion carried.

Master Comments:

New programs are starting to function well. Regional Representatives are moving New Budget for 2003 will have to consider these new activities.

Positive response from the April membership contest. Many have not yet sent applications back in. Members with Granges obtaining 10 or more members from April have been sending in the membership information.

The Regional Representative obligated 150 members at Lake Earl Grange. Obispo has obligated approximately 200 members, which is unverified at this time. Dorris Grange in Siskiyou County obligated 56 new members. This information will be in the Grange News - planned for the front page. Prize monies for the membership contest will be \$1200 total.

Executive Director process has started. Ad was placed into the Grange News, and ads will be placed in the other State Grange newspapers. First area of search will be within the Grange community. While waiting for results, a search will be started through the private sector. A new director is planned to be in place by the end of September. Information will be highlighted on the website.

Secretary's Report:

Lillian Booth, Secretary advised that the database changes were made for the March Quarter. Secretaries have been sending in their full membership lists requesting that corrections be made, which has helped greatly with the reconciliation of the new database. March 2002 membership is currently at a 5% loss. Budget projections were made at a 10% loss. 9 Granges have been reinstated from the original number suspended. Systems and procedures are moving along. Database changes will be made in the State Office as of July 15th.

Executive Director:

Discussion regarding Job Description of the Executive Director. Master Bergeron reviewed the wording of resolution 01-030 Executive Director, Article XVII, whereby the Executive Director is hired by the Master and approved by the Executive Committee. In order to ensure continuity of the business of the Grange, the Executive Director should be hired by the

Executive Committee to work on the business of the Grange. Motion by Bergeron to form a committee of three members, with the Chairman of the Executive Committee on the committee to report back with recommendations on this resolution to the Executive Committee, Seconded by Squire. Motion carried. Committee Appointed: Don Sharp, Tom Stefenoni, and Leo Bergeron.

Financial Reports:

Nancy Koschyck, Accountant with Karl F. Gunther's office joined the meeting at this time.

Review of Balance Sheets as of 05/31/2002.

Cash Accounts and concerns: Jay is working on cards with proper signatures to work on transferring accounts on a case by case basis. Several accounts totaling \$47,000 were closed by obtaining individual checks, depositing into BofA checking and then a check was written to Morgan Stanley for investment. This shows an audit trail.

Restricted and Unrestricted funds will be combined into the pool in Morgan Stanley investments. Tracking of these separate funds will be maintained by Nancy and the CSG Bookkeeper, and will be made part of the Financial packet at each Executive Committee Meeting. It will be several more months to complete the transfers of the balance of the accounts.

GIA monies current balance is \$81,087.62. CSG has received \$99,800, and of that \$73,859 has been spent on general operations, as per the 2002 Budget.

The committee requested that the GIA monies be listed in a separate department in our books to track the information.

After making adjusting entries for the distribution to Grange News, and the Associate membership dues, the will be revenues will still be above the budget projection.

Review of budget to actual – at this point only 18% over budget on expenses in the General Fund. Review of other Departments on an individual basis. Several questions to be delayed until the report of the Finance Committee is made later.

It was moved by Squire to make a policy entry that the Accounting/ Auditor Firm is directly responsible to and reports to the Executive Committee, and between Executive Committee meetings if there is a concern it is to be reported to the Chairman of the Executive Committee, as well as the Executive Director and the State Master. To be included in the Policy Handbook. Seconded by White. Discussion ensued. Motion carried.

Bookkeeping – Inger Bevans, as the auditing member of the Executive Committee, has a password and access to the current Bookkeeping system. Any reports that are run and distributed will be stamped as "DRAFT", and understood this is not an audited report from Karl Gunther's office.

Executive Committee Reports:

It was moved by Squire that, starting immediately, on the first working day of the month, the Accounting Department of the California State Grange shall cause a financial report in the format approved by the Executive Committee, to be printed from our computer accounting program. This report shall cover the time period of the immediate prior month from first to last day. Sufficient copies of said report will be made, stamped "Draft - not for publication", and will be sent to the five elected Executive Committee members, State Master, State Overseer, State Treasurer, and State Secretary of the California State Grange. Seconded by White. Motion carried. To be included in the policy handbook.

Reports to be run will be the balance sheet, consolidated income statement, and other departments as needed.

Executive Director:

George Dupray took the Committee on a tour and review of Wisteria Hall and repairs after vandalism loss. Purchased weather-tight container for \$1600 to store items while being repaired. Fence has been constructed between the GBO building and Wisteria Hall for security.

Report on Granges: George Dupray continued.

Rincon Valley Grange – requests permission to sell a portion of their property to their neighbors in the rear – no easement to property. Currently a financial liability to the

Grange. It was moved by Squire to allow Rincon Valley Grange to proceed with sale of portion of the property. Seconded by Bergeron. Carried. Monies will be used to improve the current hall.

State Grange – there will be an increase to costs of alarm system and utilities. Items referred to Budget committee for inclusion.

Lookout Grange -- Request to withdraw their total monies in trust of \$4,747.00 Requesting usage for scholarships to be given locally.

It was moved by White to send the \$4700, plus accumulated interest to Lookout Grange. Seconded by Bevans. Motion carried.

Wisteria Hall. Report given of expenses to repair the hall. Damage paid for by Grange Insurance Association was \$13,000. Monies are still owed for loss of rents. All repairs were included in the insurance package.

Out of pocket costs were fencing, storage, and outside security lighting totaling \$3,085. Will resurface the kitchen floor for approximately \$150.

Light fixtures in Wisteria need to be replaced. Have obtained bid for \$2960 to replace fixtures with four-foot units. It was moved by Bevans to replace the lighting fixtures in Wisteria Hall for safety and efficiency issues. Seconded by Bergeron. Discussion. Motion carried.

Guenoc Grange – 24 members and only two are active. Active charter. Well has been redrilled.

Pleasant Hill Grange -- Escrow company called in January asking what the pay-out was. Received check for \$100,600, as pay-off of the loan. Money was deposited into BofA and will be added to the GIA funds as reimbursement for funds withdrawn.

Lucerne Valley Grange – Have title to hall and are paying utilities, etc. Grange has \$19,000 and two or three certificates of deposit in the bank. CSG is in process of investigating who has their name on the funds. Nothing was ever said about liquid assets before going into closure – only the real property.

Buckeye Grange - Mike Byer. Have about 61 members now. Is having fund-raisers. Gaining two or three members per meeting. Have found all the funds and equipment belonging to the Grange. They are able to pay all their bills.

Lake Earl Grange - Mike Byers. Now has 161 confirmed members in that Grange. Bank

account is closed, but have about \$200 in assets. Are doing fund-raisers. Are planning on obligating another 50 members. Now a very powerful Grange.

Ojai Valley Grange – Mike Byers. Grange has legal issue with a tenant. Tenant signed lease agreement with prior authority, but is now in legal review.

Clearlake Grange – Will be reorganized. Bruce and Mike are recommending extension on loan payments.

Orangevale Grange Hall – Sandy Costa and Bob Clouse joined the meeting at this time. Mrs. Costa is a neighbor of Orangevale Grange. There have been many noise complaints made by Mrs. Costa to the Sheriff's Office. Bro. Clouse has also been to the Hall when the noise was occurring. He has attempted to work with the members and the neighbors to mitigate the problem. A letter was presented to the Committee regarding the complaint, signed by several neighbors.

A letter will be drafted from Exec Committee to Orangevale Grange stating that a complaint has been received from the neighbors, and that we strongly suggest that they comply with the requests of their neighbors. Also a letter to the Sacramento County Sheriff's Office requesting that they enforce the noise ordinance for any further complaints. Copies will be sent to Sandy Costa and other neighbors.

Fair Valley Grange – Title of the building has been transferred to CSG. Have church rental in the building and discussing the current rental agreements. Property is located in the lower corner of Chino. Can possibly sub-divide the property. Working with Dorothy Bolton on finalizing the closing of the Grange.

Biggs Grange – Demitted members into Gridley Grange. Kay Anderson is the contact person. Grange has surrendered their charter, members were consolidated into Gridley Grange. CSG holds a deed of trust. Currently listed with realty agency in Gridley. Possible offer coming in approximately July 15th. When sale occurs CSG will be reimbursed their costs and money held in trust for Gridley Grange

Panama Grange -- Current renter in the Hall. Being administered by CSG.

Sierra Nevada Grange – seven members in the Grange. Charter will be surrendered. Proceeds from this Grange when sold will go to

the general purposes of the State Grange and not held in trust, per request of the Grange. Resolution from the Grange will be forthcoming. Will be listed with real estate company in Colfax. Appraisal is \$180,000 for a light commercial property. Can be offices, café, or sales office. Sits on less than ¼ acre in prime location in Colfax. Selling as-is. Antique piano in hall, has selling price of \$3,000, per realtor.

Waterford Grange – Grange hall sold. Are currently holding \$88,000 in trust for their purposes.

Farmersville Grange – Hall has been locked up for some time. Title has legal problems. Neighbor claims he paid all the back taxes on the hall and is claiming the property. Currently storing used farm implements on the property. Has been turned over to Grange lawyer. If building is of no value, then the property would be worth less than \$1,000 per acre. Will review after attorney's advice.

Legislative Fly-In -

George Dupray attended, had busy schedule. LeRoy Watson put together full page ad in the ROLL CALL newspaper in Washington, DC. Determined Matsui is not in favor of amending the Endangered Species Act, or the Auburn Dam. Visited Diane Feinstein, who talked about more water storage. S968 has been introduced by Feinstein in which she wants to increase water storage and build a dam north of the Delta. Joe Victorine from Tulelake and Tim O'Conner from Oregon came along to talk about the Klamath Valley water problems.

Met with the Endangered Species Division of National Marine Fisheries, did not receive a warm welcome, but courteous.

Recommends continuous participation in the Legislative Fly-In on a continuous basis.

Apple Valley Grange -

Requesting complete financial breakdown of sale of the Hall, with the interest. To be reviewed tomorrow.

Regional Representatives

Bill Mann joined the meeting at this time. Certificates for completion of the Training program were presented to Don Sharp and Ernie White. Training session will be held in Wisteria for other members of the Committee and other State Officers.

Adjourn for the Regional Rep Training with Bill Mann. Will reconvene at 0800 hrs on June 29, 2002.

Executive Director Continued:

George Dupray reported that the empty space in the GBO building is leased effective 07/17/02. Signed three-year lease with California Association of Resource Conservation Districts, with an escalation clause in the contract.

CSG has been named as co-defendant in lawsuit against Orangevale Grange by Christi Perkins regarding personal injury received at the Grange Hall by a renter. Will be sent to the attorney.

Membership Committee:

Russ Harris, Membership Director, joined the meeting at this time. Report of the Membership Drive Results. Lake Earl Grange #577 won membership contest and Helen Ferguson was the recruiter for all members. Seven Granges complied with the rules of the contest. Prizes will be awarded. Look forward to larger participation next year. Russ will be sending official notification for their awards.

Membership committee will be working in Fresno, Tulare, Kern and Kings Counties. Russ will be working with Buena Vista Grange in Monterey County for a visioning program.

Awards Ceremony will be Saturday, July 13th, at 11:00 am at Wisteria Hall. Sacramento Grange has five people who would like to do a birthday celebration. Four other Granges in local area were chartered at the same time. Have combined the party with other Granges in the area and the California State Grange.

Membership Development Coordinator:

Mike Byers reported at this time. Presented documents showing current projects and status of Granges with which they have been involved for last six months. Report will be attached to original minutes. Program is solid and will be moving forward from here.

Youth Fair Program:

Norm Dahlia joined the meeting at this time. Norm advised that many people have a great deal of interest, but must wait before joining because of other commitments. Placer County Fair contacted Norm regarding prior problems with a Grange exhibitor. The problem has been mitigated and is under control.

Groups are raising money to fund their programs. Made presentation and requested monies for weigh scale, for animals less than 400 lbs. and clippers. This is for educational purposes. New groups like Ojai Valley, Rubidoux, Corcoran Ag and Quartz Hill would use the scale for weeks and/or a month at a time. Part of their record keeping. This would be loaned until the groups can raise their own money. One member is willing to donate a small utility trailer for the transport of the scale.

Have opportunity to print 1,000 posters for \$800-\$900. Full-size posters to hang up in Grange Halls throughout the State regarding the Fair Program. This project is on the back burner.

Finance Committee Report:

Inger Bevans, Chairman of the Finance Committee made report at this time. Reviewed the current policies for reimbursement of Officer and Director expenses. Proposal made to standardize the expense reporting and when eligible for reimbursement.

Expense vouchers – form is outdated, and need to be updated. Spell out which account these are to go to, with an explanation. Executive Director will be approving the reimbursement requests, prior to issuance of any checks. New procedures will be implemented on July 1st 2002.

Johnny Squire also reported regarding the limitations of expenses and when qualified.

Legislative:

Trust Fund Accounting:

Accounting has been corrected on the Trust Funds regarding the interest allocation.

It was moved by Bergeron that a letter of explanation be drafted, have reviewed by the legal counsel, and present to the Executive Committee at the next meeting for approval. Seconded by Squire. Motion carried.

San Luis Obispo Grange:

Master of the Grange contracted repairs to the Grange based on verbal statements by prior Administration regarding a loan through the State Grange. Roof has been replaced. Contractor has been contacted by the State Master and advised that monies were not available. Other private funds are available to them, which they are in process of obtaining.

Fresno Property:

Finance Committee will make recommendation regarding the authorization for transfer of funds. Draft will be presented at the next meeting.

Task Force for Youth Involvement:

Johnny Squire still looking for participants from the 20-30 age group for the task force.

Executive Committee Policy Handbook:

Assigned to Tom Stefenoni for updating and including new information in the Executive Committee Handbook.

New Business:

Grange Camp:

Kathy Parra was advised to use prior structure for securing the camp. Deposit on the camp has been made and some supplies reimbursed.

Medical Release Form:

Forms for medical release need to be reviewed by the Attorney. One form will be standardized for use at all Youth and Junior Grange functions.

Oregon & Washington Sessions:

No representatives were at either Session this year. Master Bergeron could not attend and the State Offices were notified. Decision was not made until last week. Master Bergeron has ongoing relationship with Masters of Washington and Oregon State Granges.

Orangevale Grange:

Per Capita Taxes:

Pension plans are being cleaned up. Appropriate actions are being taken to make investments. Employees will be entitled to 5% contribution of gross salary after 90 days of full-time employment.

Requesting to meet with Department Heads to go over responsibilities with the Convention Expo. Officers and Directors meeting is set for August 24, 2002 at 0900-1700 at Wisteria Hall. This is set for Convention Planning meeting, this will be included. Would also like to plan with the Directors to see where the program needs to go next year.

Award Sponsors – looking for award money. Pick an award to sponsor. Received check from National Grange, which was the Coats & Clarks Awards paid to the members by the CSG.

Peg boards have been disposed of. Display panels have been donated to the State Grange and will be used instead.

All Star Grange Program has been revised. It now covers time period of September 1, 2001 through August 31 2002.

Convention:

Plans are being made and supplies need to be purchased. Costs of \$2,894 for all items presented. Some costs will come back from Registration fees. Sales responses will also defray the costs.

Will not reproduce any items we have purchased in the past.

Recommend placing orders for these items. It was moved by Bergeron to purchase the proposed items. Seconded by White. Motion carried.

Refurbishing Grange Halls:

Mike Byers has source for latex paint costing \$2.80 per gallon in five gallon buckets, in a variety of colors. Currently in negotiation to purchase \$560 for 200 gallons of paint, to be sold at \$5 per gallon (\$25 per bucket). Can repeat the order, not a one-shot deal. Will be a promotion at the State Convention. Fair Oaks, Lake Earl, and Coalinga are all willing to take paint.

It was moved by Squire to make the purchase of the paint for Grange Halls. Seconded by White. Motion carried.

Meeting adjourned until August 9th & 10th. Convention Committee to meet on August 8th.

August 9 & 10, 2002

Meeting was called to order at 9:00 am., by Chairman Don Sharp. Members Present:

Don Sharp, Chairman; Tom Stefenoni, Overseer; Members Johnny Squire, Ernie White, Inger Bevans and, Leo Bergeron, Master; George Dupray, Executive Director; Kathy Bergeron, Jay Hartz, and Lillian Booth, Secretary.

Opening Comments by Chairman Don Sharp:

Theme this year has been to find a way to make it work. The good news is, it is working. It will take approximately three to five years to see meaningful results, but the Grange has turned the corner and we will begin making progress.

Master's Comments:

Master Bergeron received a request to attend a Conference in Washington DC. Theme: Don't let Agriculture be the Next Cash Cow. This conference was to discuss the Class Action Fairness Act to restrain frivolous class action lawsuits by trial attorneys. Only four speakers were allowed to address the Senators, one of whom was Master Bergeron.

Changes in the Endangered Species Act have never made it out of committee. The delisting of the Coho Salmon issue was addressed with individual Senators. One of the meetings resulted in recently receiving a request from one of the Senator's offices regarding the National Park Service taking over the Gaviota Coast. They have asked the State Grange to assist by asking the local members to contact their local Congressman to encourage to them to sign on to the letter requesting the area remain in the management of the local authorities.

People for the USA are interested in merging into the Grange organization. This group formed as a result of the Coho Salmon and Klamath Basin water problem from last year. These members saw how the Grange was received at the Fly-In and are interested in our structure and history with agriculture and legislative issues.

Western States – California stole the show. Good information was given as a whole. Norm Dahlia gave the presentation on the Fair Program with Mike Byer and Master Bergeron.

John Fine, Oregon State Overseer, is the acting Master of the Oregon State Grange, after the recent resignation of Mike Stewart.

Minutes of Last Meeting

Minutes of June 28, 2002, were approved as corrected.

Finance Department:

Nancy Koschyck, Accountant, and Channon Lee, Bookkeeper joined the meeting at this time.

Financial Reports were made regarding the General Funds, GIA Funds, and the areas in which budget concerns were raised last time. Reimbursement receipts were reviewed by the Bookkeeper and re-allocated appropriately for the Membership Coordinator and Youth Fair Program Director. New actual figures were compared to budget figures and reviewed.

Inger Bevans requests a meeting of the Finance Committee after today's session. Finance Committee report postponed until tomorrow.

Executive Director Candidate Search:

Have run ads throughout the Grange Community regarding the position. No responses have been received. The procedure has started to search for someone in the position by September in order to have them on board for Convention in October.

Executive Director Report:

Accumulation of leave for Jay Hartz.

Settlement has been reached, personnel file has been documented. Agreement has been signed. Executive Committee requested a complete breakdown of accounting for the fiscal impact.

Orangevale Grange

Report of Orangevale Grange activities. They were advised that the insurance policy they were to secure in December has never been received.

Complaint has been filed by a number of members. Committee has been established to process the complaint.

Orangevale Grange was notified to pay their utility bills by the 12th of August or the State Grange would pay the bill and start proceedings to foreclose. They have been notified of the requirement of a legal verified insurance binder by 12th of August.

It was moved by Squire that due to the problems with Orangevale Grange regarding the insurance and the arrears on the secured note, if the obligations are not met by August 12, the State Master and Executive Director are directed to start any foreclosure proceedings to protect the interests of the California State Grange. Seconded by White. Motion carried.

It was moved by Squire that the Executive Committee directs the Executive Director and State Master offer Orangevale Grange a second option in lieu of foreclosure to sign a new note which will include the previous loan balance, accrued interest, and arrears in per capita, plus the current amount of any insurance premiums on the property, and any legal fees, which is to be signed and recorded immediately. Seconded by White. Motion carried.

Rental Properties:

Jay Hartz, property manager, reporting. All units of for rent are full. Crossroads is renting at \$6069.23, leasing through 2006. UC Davis is leasing for \$6020.72 through 2005 with five options to renew, through 2010. California Association of Resource Conservation Districts are leasing offices at \$619.50 through July 2005 with three year option to renew through 2008. Sacramento Grange Credit Union is renting month-to-month at \$1,041.45. The Credit Union Board is looking for another space with more exposure. Wisteria Hall – since the repairs have

been completed from the break-in, the rents are steadily increasing.

Grange Halls:

Biggs Grange: Still on market for \$180,000, with a possible offer pending. Total amount due to the State Grange is currently \$12,100.27. Insurance policy is current.

Fair Valley Grange #752: Unknown how many assets there are at this time. Property could be sub-divided into three parcels, but the fees would be very high, and probability to sub-divide in the County is unlikely. Received determination that the property is not able to annex to the City of Chino. Building is currently rented.

Guenoc Grange: Well has been drilled, new pump is installed. Shed will be constructed to cover the pump and pressure tank. Building will then be ready for rental. Grange has been dedicated as an historical site. Will attempt to reorganize Grange now that the Hall can be occupied.

Janesville Grange #434: Has been vacant property since 1993. Still available for sale.

Lucerne Valley Grange #673: A newer building, and very nice. After closure of the Grange, it was discovered that the Grange did not disclose they had funds on deposit, State Office has contacted the Bank. Found account was closed on 3/4/2002. All funds were withdrawn and sent to them. Contacted Barry Renfro. Valley Mountain Bank, had check withdrawn for 7/17, for \$17351.40. George will gather more information, and report.

Panama Grange #566: Payments are continuing and insurance is paid up.

Sierra Nevada Grange: Property has been sold "as is" to buyer. Net proceeds to CSG was \$138,482.43, after closing costs. These proceeds will be deposited into the GIA membership funds account in total.

Fresno Property: Small Business Administration was requiring the buyer to obtain another environmental impact report, minimum cost of \$7,000, before a loan would be issued. Buyer is now offering to purchase with \$20,000 down on a 20 year contract, due at end of 10 years, interest to be negotiated. Recommend taking the offer.

Motion by Bergeron to authorize the Executive Director to negotiate the final details based on the information we have, and make the

deal to close the purchase on this property. Seconded by White. Motion carried.

Recess for Foundation Meeting.
Reconvene for Executive Committee

Visitor, Tom Nickens, attorney for California State Grange, joined the meeting at this time.

Executive Director Report continued:

Staff project augmentation – one temp was hired for the printing and collating of the Regional Representative Books.

Office Equipment Acquisition: Membership Department & Youth Fair Department had two projects to do in full color. The bids to do the two jobs was \$300 more than the cost of a color printer. A printer was purchased in lieu of the print costs. Printer will print both sides at one time. Per piece cost inhouse is \$.24. Bids are \$.31 each. Printer cost was \$2,800.

National Grange Session Attendees: Convention will be in Portland, Oregon this year. No proposals to send representatives other than Master & Spouse at this time.

Constitutional Resolution: Article XII – Suggest to change the word "matter" into "affiliation". Bevans will write Executive Committee resolution, and submit at tomorrow's session.

Apple Valley Grange Request: Request from Aileen Dillow for full accounting of interest received from Apple Valley. Assigned to Sister Booth to research any differences in amounts sent to Apple Valley and the interest received from the note payments.

Trust Fund Review: It was moved by Bergeron to establish a Trust Fund Review Committee made up of Inger Bevans, Tom Stefenoni and Lillian Booth. Seconded by White. Motion carried.

Bill Booth Request: Bill Booth sent billing for Foundation Web-site design. Referred to the Foundation.

Travel Reimbursement Policy: To be discussed by the Finance Committee and presented tomorrow.

Roof: Proposal received from Sacramento Valley Roofing to repair to the roof of the Headquarters Building. Bid is \$5,600. It was moved by Squire to accept the bid for \$5,600,

seconded by Bergeron. Motion carried.

Closed session for Personnel Discussion:

All visitors were excused for closed session to discuss personnel.

It was moved by Squire to give Master Bergeron consent from the Executive Committee to remove the State Grange Lecturer for nonperformance of the duties of the office. Seconded by White. Motion carried.

Legislative:

All chairmen have responded and accepted appointments. Committees members will be chosen at the August 24th meeting. Have pool of 8 or 9 people to choose from for each committee.

New delegates session will be held to explain how Convention is being put together. Will be held on Wednesday.

Review of items for delegates' packets. Items have been received, and are in-house.

Need to promote local media contacts. Will work with Jay.

Still need a Day-Care coordinator. Looking at Child Development interns from a local University.

Saturday the Youth BBO will be at the

local fair grounds, with Youth Fair demonstration and Youth Fair awards.

Martha Stefenoni joined the meeting at this time. Amtrack has a Kids & Trains programs for transportation. Costs are \$5.00 per segment (a segment is from Bakersfield to Fresno, and Fresno to Stockton, and Stockton to San Francisco). Anything that involves children or Youth under the age of 18, qualifies for this program, which includes the advisors. Applies only to the San Joaquin route from Sacramento to Bakersfield. Need to apply for the program on behalf of the Grange organization. From Sacramento it would be a bus to Stockton, then the train to Bakersfield. The train station is right behind the hotel. It was moved by Bevans to increase the minimum Associate dues to \$50. Seconded by White. Motion carried.

Secretary's report.

Current membership figures show a gain for the June 2002 Quarter over the March 2002 Quarter. Still approximately 40 Granges need to report. Fair Oaks Grange is actively increasing membership in the Subordinate and increasing membership in Pomona. Planning to start a Junior Grange, had a mini-Jamboree, where 12 neighborhood children participated.

Lake Earl Grange – membership has taken off to a good start. People for USA, Farm Bureau and Grange were in same Fair booth. Had new people in the booth every hour. Picked up 13 signed applications with the funds that day. Grange may be renting anteroom to Farm Bureau

for an office. Lake Earl Grange Overseer is chairman of the Farm Bureau.

San Dimas and Fair Valley Grange. San Dimas property has been leased to church. There are still 85 dues paying members in the area. No records of phone information. Have 100+members paying dues, but are not participating.

Mariposa – leaders made contact with the Grange at the FFA conference, then e-mailed for additional information through the web-site. Met with six leaders of the FFA and 4-H program area. I have audited the accompanying statement of financial position of the California State Grange, a nonprofit corporation, as of December 31, 2001, and the related statements of activities and cash flows and supplemental information on pages 13 to 29 for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the organization's management. My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on my audit.

I conducted my audit in accordance with United States generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that I plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. I believe that my audit provides a reasonable basis for my opinion.

In my opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial

position of the California State Grange as of December 31, 2001, and the activities, changes in net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

My audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole. The supplemental information on pages 13 to 29 is presented for purpose of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements, and, in my opinion is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

NOTE 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The California State Grange (the Grange) was incorporated on October 7, 1946 under the laws of the State of California as a nonprofit corporation. The Grange is subject to and governed by the constitution of the National Grange. The Grange is a fraternal, family, and community service organization seeking to preserve agricultural heritage and traditions.

Basis of Accounting: The financial statements of California State Grange have been prepared on the accrual basis and accordingly reflect all significant receivables, payables and other liabilities.

Basis of Presentation: Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations. Under SFAS No. 117, the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets and permanently restricted net assets.

<u>Fund Accounting:</u> To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Grange, the accounts of the Grange are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes to funds established according to their nature and purpose. Separate bank accounts are not maintained for each fund. The following is a brief summary of each funds' activity and purpose:

General Fund: Accounts for all transactions of the Grange not accounted for in the other funds. The funds are unrestricted, however, unrestricted funds are used to pay expenses of the restricted funds and a due to/due from is recorded in both the general fund and respective restricted fund.

Deaf Activities Fund: Provides resources for Grange members to act as advocates for deaf and hard of hearing people; promoting deaf awareness (education about deafness, hearing and the need for hearing protection); affording leadership for county, local and Junior Granges; providing community service to organizations benefitting the deaf; donating time, efforts, skill, equipment and funds to better fulfill the needs of the deaf community. Funds are donated and occasional fundraisers are held. Donations are disbursed through a separate entity, the California Grange Foundation. The Deaf Activities Fund Committee expenses are paid through the Deaf Activities Fund.

Extension Fund: Provides resources for the internal and external promotion of the Grange and for education of members about the Grange. Income sources include donations from affiliates. Expenditures include tokens of appreciation, promotional prizes, Officer/Deputies supplies, and membership director expenses. The fund is also holding Emergency Relief Effort donations received by the Grange.

<u>Convention Fund</u>: This fund was created so an accurate accounting could be made of the Convention income and expenses. The Convention is the annual policy making session where

representatives from each Grange statewide attend. The delegates provide resolutions for the good of their community, county, state and nation. These funds are unrestricted.

Rental Fund: This fund was created to account for properties owned by the State Grange that are leased to provide additional income. These funds are unrestricted.

Grange News Fund: This fund was created to account for the properties of the official publication of the California State Grange. It is issued bimonthly, providing information on link to the 30,000 plus members statewide. These funds are unrestricted.

<u>Youth Fund</u>: Provides resources for activities oriented towards younger members. Income sources include donations, conference fees and resale proceeds. Expenditures include conferences, director expenses, youth and young adult officers and ambassadors expenses, meetings, camp, coordinating council and fundraisers. These funds are restricted for these purposes.

<u>Conference Center Fund</u>: Provides resources for the promotion of camp and conference facilities. Funds are being collected to build or purchase grounds/complex for a combined center for conferences, camps and conventions. These funds are restricted for this purpose.

Junior Grange: Provides resources for activities oriented toward children ages 5 through 14. The fund sponsors programs for children to become involved in community activities, fair programs, and learning situations all involved with the Grange. "Junior Granges" are independent though affiliated with a Subordinate Grange. These funds are restricted for this purpose.

Grange Women's Activities Fund (GWA): Provides resources for activities oriented to-wards female members. The programs of the GWA give women opportunities to participate in community services, and educate others in many ways. Income is derived from the sale of cookbooks Expenditures include directors expenses to plan programs, organize contests and sponsor events. These funds are restricted for this purpose.

Grange Youth Fair Program: Enables Junior Grangers and Grange Youth members, ages 5 through 22, the opportunity to display their talents at local, county, and state fairs. These funds are restricted for this purpose.

<u>Grangers Business Organization</u>: Established for the purpose of holding proceeds, from the sale of the dissolution of the former Grangers Business Organization. These funds are restricted for this purpose.

Office Contingency: Established to provide emergency funds for the Grange to cover un-foreseen events. These funds are restricted for this purpose.

<u>Grange Hall Loan Fund</u>: Established to loan funds to local Granges to assist in their development or improvement of Grange Halls. These funds are restricted for this purpose.

<u>Capitalization and Depreciation Policy</u>: All expenditures for land, buildings and equipment and the fair market value of donated land, buildings, and equipment are capitalized. These assets are stated at cost or fair market value, if donated. The cost of repairs and maintenance are charged to an expense account as incurred. Significant renewals and replacements are capitalized. Depreciation is computed by the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the related assets:

<u>Inventory</u>: The inventory consists of cookbooks, various publications, jewelry, and supplies and is valued at cost on the first-in, first-out method.

Statement of Cash Flows: The Grange considers all highly liquid debt instruments purchased with a maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents. The Grange had no cash equivalents at December 31, 2001

<u>Donated Services</u>: A substantial number of unpaid volunteers have made significant contributions of their time in conjunction with the Grange programs and services. The value of the contributed time is not included in these financial statements, since it is not susceptible to objective measurement.

<u>Income Taxes</u>: The Grange is a corporation exempt from federal income taxes under Internal Revenue Code section 501(c)(8) and is exempt from state income taxes under California Revenue and Taxation Code Section 23701(1). The Grange may be subject to income taxes on unrelated advertising and membership list revenue over related expenses. No provision for income taxes is made in the accompanying financial statements.

NOTE 2 - Trust Fund Assets

The By-Laws of the National Grange stipulate that proceeds from the sale of real property belonging to a Subordinate or Pomona Grange shall be transferred to the State Grange having jurisdiction to be restricted and held in trust for said Subordinate or Pomona Grange. All income derived from such Trust shall be the property of the selling Subordinate or Pomona Grange. The State Grange may be paid up to 5% of the earned income as a trustee's fee for administering the Trust. During the period ending December 31, 2001, the Grange earned \$3,898 in administration fees.

Funds received from discontinued or dormant Granges, are held in trust by the Grange for the benefit of the inactive Granges in the event said Grange is reorganized. The by-laws provide that such funds revert to the State Grange after seven years. The Grange is entitled to 100% of the income during this seven year period.

The Trust Assets are restricted for the beneficial use of each respective surrendered charter or active grange, respectively.

Depreciation and amortization expense for the year ended December 31, 2001 was \$40,993.

NOTE 5 - Compensated Absences

Employees of the Grange are entitled to paid vacation and sick leave depending on job classification, length of service and other factors. At December 31, 2001 the accrued expense for compensated absences was \$8,156. The maximum amount of vacation that can be accumulated is 40 hours. Sick days accumulate, but are forfeited when employees leave the Grange. The maximum amount of sick leave that can be accumulated is 720 hours.

NOTE 6 - Pension Plan

The Grange adopted a defined contribution pension plan covering all full-time employees after completion of any hours of continuous service. Employees must be employed for three months to be eligible for the plan. This plan is fully funded by the Grange which contributes 5% of gross wages towards the purchase of an annuity for the benefit of the employee. All employees qualify for 100% vesting. Contributions for 2001 totaled \$3,874.

NOTE 7 - Operating Lease

The Grange is obligated under a long-term operating lease for its mailing system. The lease has an original term of sixty months expiring July 30, 2006. The payment under the lease is \$1,086.00. The balance of the lease commitment is as follows:

NOTE 1 - Significant Accounting Policies

Purpose

The California State Grange has created an informal trust to hold and administer funds that belong to active Granges and funds resulting from the surrender of Grange Charters. All funds in the trust are restricted and must be administered in accordance with the National Grange By-Laws.

Basis of Accounting: The financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and accordingly reflect all significant receivables, payables and other liabilities.

Statement of Cash Flows: The Trust considers all cash on demand and certificates of deposit accounts to be cash and cash equivalents.

Asset Restriction: As disclosed in Notes 2 and 3, the assets of the Trust are restricted for the beneficial use of each respective Surrendered Charter or Active Grange, respectively.

NOTE 2 - Surrendered Charters:

Funds received from discontinued or dormant Granges are restricted and held in trust for the benefit of the inactive Granges in the event said Grange is reorganized. The by-laws require such funds to revert to the California State Grange after seven years. The California State Grange is entitled to 100% of the investment income during this seven year period. These funds are reported as both an asset and a liability on the financial statements of the California State Grange as restricted funds.

NOTE 3 - Active Granges:

The By-Laws of the National Grange stipulate that proceeds from the sale of real property belonging to an active Subordinate or Pomona Grange shall be transferred to the State Grange having jurisdiction to be restricted and held in trust for said Subordinate or Pomona Grange. All earned income derived from such funds shall be the property of the selling Subordinate or Pomona Grange.

The Organization has concentrated its credit risk for cash by maintaining deposits in banks located within the same geographic region. The maximum loss that would have resulted from that risk totaled \$333 at the end of 2001 for the excess of the deposit liabilities reported by the banks over the amounts that would have been covered by federal insurance.

NOTE 7 - Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Notes to Financial Statements December 31, 2001

NOTE 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The California Grange Foundation was created as a nonprofit corporation. The purposes of the corporation are to provide educational activities to the public concerning the preservation of the agricultural heritage and traditions of California and of America, through publications, workshops, assisting in research, and to provide educational assistance in the form of scholarships. The California Grange Foundation is affiliated with the California State Grange.

<u>Basis of Accounting</u>: The financial statements of the California Grange Foundation have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and accordingly reflect all significant receivables, payables and other liabilities.

<u>Investments:</u> The Foundation adopted SFAS No. 124, "Accounting for Certain Investments Held by Not-For-Profit Organizations," in 1996. Under SFAS No. 124, investments in marketable securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are valued at their fair values in the statement of financial position. Unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets.

Basis of Presentation: Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations. Under SFAS No. 117, the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets.

<u>Fund Accounting:</u> To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Foundation, the accounts of the Foundation are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified according to their nature and purpose. Separate bank accounts are not maintained for each fund. The following is a brief summary of each funds' activities and purpose:

General Fund: Accounts for all transactions of the Foundation not accounted for in other funds. These funds are not restricted.

<u>Youth Fund:</u> Accounts for Youth activity transactions of the Foundation not accounted for in other funds. These funds are not restricted.

<u>Junior Fund:</u> Accounts for Junior Activity transactions of the Foundation not accounted for in other funds. These funds are not restricted.

<u>Deaf Activities Fund</u>: A health project designed to educate and serve deaf and hard of hearing people. These funds are restricted.

<u>Sehlmeyer Fund:</u> Established for the purpose of aiding, through college scholarships, the education of the Grangers. These funds are restricted.

NOTE 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

<u>Doris Deaver Fund</u>: Established for the purpose of aiding, through college scholarships, the education of Grangers. These funds are restricted.

<u>Dixon Fund</u>: Established for the purpose of aiding through college scholarships, the education of children. These funds are restricted.

Runyon Fund: Established for the purpose of aiding through college scholarships, the education of children. These funds are restricted.

Marinoff Fund: Established for the purpose of aiding through college scholarships, the education of children. These funds are restricted

<u>Donated Services</u>: Volunteers have made contributions of their time in conjunction with Foundation functions. The value of the contributed time is not included in these financial statements, since it is not susceptible to objective measurement.

Statement of Cash Flows: The Foundation considers all highly liquid debt instruments purchased with a maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents. At December 31, 2001, the Foundation had no cash equivalents

Income Taxes: The Foundation is a corporation exempt from federal income taxes under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3) and is exempt from state income taxes under California Revenue and Taxation Code Section 23701(g). No provision for income taxes has been made in the accompanying financial statements.

NOTE 2 - <u>Investments - Merrill Lynch</u>

Investments - Merrill Lynch are stated at market value. On February 28, 2000, \$35,000 was invested in a Certificate of Deposit with All First Family at FNB Maryland, \$42,000 was invested in a Certificate of Deposit with First USA Bank in Wilmington, Delaware, and \$35,000 was invested in Lehman Brothers Bank FSB Wilmington, Delaware. The certificates will mature March 8, 2002, March 10, 2003 and July 19, 2004 respectively. At December 31, 2001, the cost and market value of the funds were as follows:

Audit & Budget Committee Report

Brothers and Sisters,

This has been a very enlightening year so far. As my first year on the committee, and as auditing chairman, I have discovered there is much to do in order to keep all departments aware of their budget limitations. The Executive Committee has been made aware of the true financial condition of the California State Grange and has been working to get a clear picture of our funds and income sources. We are also tracking expenses and setting new guidelines and limitations.

This year, in order to track income and expenses easier, the budget committee has added the departmental account numbers for reference. A chart on the first page lists each department by number and name. The GIA service agreement income

is included on the summary page as it cannot be assured as regular income. Although a portion of these past funds have been put into a reserve, it has been used to cover budgeted expenses. Last year a large amount was withdrawn for capital items; please note the misc. items at the bottom of page ten. This amount is included in the summary page as "other" expenses. It is not known how long this income will continue, so we need to look at other sources of income for the future.

In 1985 dues income provided 96% of our total income. We had over 37,000 fraternal members at that time. Ten years later in 1995 we had 28,000 members and dues provided 70% of our total income. Last year, with just over 15,000 members, dues provided only 35% of our total income. Rentals provided 25%, the GIA funds

provided 27%, and the remaining 12% came from other sources. Not only has the loss in membership reduced our dues income, so has the Grange month "free" members, the "youth" dues, the Golden Sheaf members for which National dues are paid, and the number of delinquent Granges.

Increased emphasis has gone into our Membership Development department to increase membership and rebuild dormant Granges. The Grange Youth Fair project is also bringing in new members. We need to continue supporting the efforts of this team in securing our future growth.

Please look at the summary page. The 2002 budget as adopted by the delegates last session was revised in

pages 116-126

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February of this year to adjust for known factors and changes in staffing. We reduced the expected loss by over \$7,000 for a better bottom line.

For 2003 we have a projected deficit of \$79,715 unless there is additional dues income. If we have a \$4 increase, we will still have a shortage of \$28,020. A \$9 increase may allow us to have a profit of \$36,592. This is still not enough to cover the \$199,600 of income from the GIA agreement should that cease. Please consider your options when the dues proposals are presented.
