California State Grange Session Rules 2010

The Standing Rules of the Convention will apply only to the 138th Annual Membership Meeting of the California State Grange, San Jose, California, 2010. (Reference: National Grange Digest of Laws and Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, Chapter XIX, Section 58.)

<u>REGISTRATION FEE WAIVER:</u> The Registration Fee shall be waived for Junior Grangers and those invited guests approved by the Executive Committee.

BADGES: No one will be admitted to the session without a badge which signifies their registration fee has been paid (except as noted above).

DELEGATE REGISTRATION: Closing date and time for "Delegate Registration" shall be at 8:30 AM Saturday, October 16, 2010. Any late registrant shall have the approval of the State Master.

RESOLUTIONS:

Deadline: The last date for the acceptance of properly submitted resolutions shall be 60 days prior to the opening of Meeting (August 15) and any late resolutions shall only be processed if the Committee Chairman accepts them.

Committee Make-up: Each committee shall have a Chairman and a Secretary

Committee Meetings: Committees shall not meet while the Meeting is in "In Session" and their meeting schedule will be posted in a convenient location.

Committee Processing: After notifying a Delegate of the sponsoring Grange of origin (unless they are not represented at the Convention) the committees will be allowed to kill resolutions for the following reasons:

- a) They restate current policy.
- b) They have been acted upon by the Delegate Body within the past two years.
- c) They are poorly written and the Committee can not achieve the desired results in the resolved.
- d) They cover several subjects which cannot be easily split into separate resolutions.
- e) The Resolution changes current CSG policy, unless they clearly state the intent of the resolution is to change current policy.

Consent Calendar: All "Killed" resolutions will be listed on a "Committee Consent Calendar" and reported to the delegates during the Meeting.

Overriding Committee Action: Any Delegate may bring a "Killed" resolution onto the floor by the passage of a motion.

Committee Presentation: In presenting the resolution on the Convention floor, the Committee spokesman will only read the "Resolved" portion of all resolutions, and then state the Committees action. If the Committees recommendation is to reject the resolution, the Committee Spokesman will briefly explain the reason for the Committee's action.

Amendments to Resolutions: All motions to amend resolutions which are excessively long, shall be presented in writing to the Secretary's Station, so as to be properly entered into the minutes.

Re-Written Resolution Introduction: A vote shall not be taken on a resolution unless it has been in the delegates' hands at least two (2) hours.

Combining C&BL Resolutions: Constitutional Resolutions shall not be combined in Committee (SG-36-82)

FLOOR MOTIONS IN WRITNG: All motions made from the floor concerning subjects new to the Grange and not presented in resolutions shall be presented in writing to the Secretary's Station, so as to be properly entered into the minutes.

FLOOR DEBATE: Shall be limited to two (2) minutes per delegate on any given question.

OFFICER & DIRECTOR REPORTS: The written reports of all officers and Directors shall be submitted to the Secretary's Station prior to the close of the first day of session (if they have not sent them to the State Office prior to Convention) for inclusion in the Journal of Proceedings.

<u>APPROVAL OF MINUTES</u>: The Executive Committee shall have the authority to approve the minutes of the final day of session at their meeting after the close of the session.

<u>CONVENTION SITE VOTING</u>: Voting by the delegate body to select future convention sites for the Annual Session of the California State Grange shall be conducted only by paper ballot. (97-003)

FRAGRANCES: Please refrain from wearing perfumes, after shaves or other fragrances during the session or at any of the functions. Some of our members have allergies and it is everyone's desire to have an enjoyable convention. (Floor Motion - 2007)

138th Annual Convention California State Grange San Jose CA First Day October 14, 2010

Session was opened in the 6th degree by Master Bob McFarland at 10:10am following entrance march of officers.

Lowered to the 4th degree by Master McFarland.

Roll call of officers

Introduction of special guests: Past Master Leo Bergeron, Past First Lady Kathy Bergeron and Past First Lady Martha Stefenoni. Past master Bergeron spoke on patriotism as commemorated by the Flag presentation. He spoke of a constitutional seminar in Siskiyou County, and compared the founding of the country with the founding of the Grange. He is proud to be a Granger because the Grange has propagated the true spirit of the founding of our country. The reason we are here is to promote the values of our country. Keep in mind that we are Grangers, we may disagree, but in the end we come together to make a difference.

Sister Kathy told a story about their vacation in Genoa Nevada. No business or other reason, just pleasure, and she highly recommends such trips. She mentioned the wild horse crossings - they have mustangs there. "This is the day the Lord has made, so let's have a great convention" she concluded.

Sister Martha welcomed all to the Session, and thanked the hosts of the session. A hundred years ago they were organizing the State Grange right here in San Jose. Think of the legacy they left us, she said, and it is up to us to further that legacy.

Credential report given. 12 Pomona Granges attending, 18 Delegates. 51 Subordinate Granges attending, 80 delegates. We have a quorum.

Standing rules discussed. **Katie Squire moved** to delete the section on limiting debate to 3 people. Seconded. *Motion Carried.*

Martha Stefenoni moved to accept the revised standing rules. Seconded. Motion carried.

Agenda discussed. **Dale Baker moved** to approve the schedule of business. Seconded. **Amendment** by BettyAnn Biringer-Rehm to change the agenda changing the times for the release of expo items. Seconded. *Motion carried. Motion carried as amended.*

Executive committee minutes were approved by the delegates.

Budget was brought to the floor. **Motion to approve the budget by Cheri Bunker**, Seconded. *Motion carried*, budget accepted and adopted.

Recess to hand out re-written resolutions.

Reconvened at 10:55am.

Correspondence was read from National Master Ed Luttrell, Wib Justi, Bill Booth, Bob Clouse and Randy Lewis.

Master McFarland stated he wanted this convention to be fun, and introduced Rick Keel who had put together a montage of video clips to the background music, *Hello Muddah Hello Fadder*.

Master McFarland explained the new resolution process for this year. He has asked the Committee Chairs to come up with priority resolutions to process first.

David Lewis of the Water Committee announced that resolution, 10-004, had been placed on the consent calendar.

Health, Education and Welfare chair Patty Allen presented resolutions.

10-045 was amended in committee. Strike *pledges and* in line 13. Favorable as amended. **Moved to accept** the resolution as amended by Darlene Wingfield. Seconded. Discussion. Majority of discussion was educating communities to healthy eating. It was recommended that meals served at local Granges should be healthy as encouragement by way of example. Previous question called and passed. *Motion carried as amended*.

Session recessed.

Special guest Vangie Schumann spoke on the Germany-USA student exchange friendship program. She spoke of how in 1950, only 5 years after the end of WWII, the National Grange supported the need for friendship to heal the world. 500 German students came to the USA and lived on Grange members farms. At the recent 60th reunion in San Diego, it was suggested that the Grange look into reestablishing the program.

Buzz Chernoff suggested that when in session, a motion be made to support the revitalization of the exchange program by National Grange to include other countries.

Recessed for lunch. Reconvened at 1:10pm

Leo Bergeron addressed the delegates about rules of the Grange on introducing your wife at conventions. The EC told the Master that since he did not introduce Wendy, he was fined \$5.00.

The Master gave his annual address to the delegates.

Celebrating a membership net gain, the Deputies brought in sparkling apple juice to toast the upturn in our membership.

Leo Bergeron moved that the Master's Annual Address be accepted and printed in the Journal. Seconded. *Motion passed.*

Deloris Larrigan, the Central Region Youth Director, gave her annual report. She said she wanted to make the members more aware of the Youth and Fair programs available to our children and grandchildren. She suggested that Community Granges seek a project that will spark an interest in the Community. She suggested doing a project after each meeting that could be entered in both the local Fair and Grange Expo.

Brother Jack Eyler, Chief Deputy, gave kudos to his Deputy force for the work they have done this year. He noted the number of Granges they have revitalized and formed during the past year.

Sister Katie Squire gave an initial Expo report. She thanked all those who helped set up the Expo room, and all those who entered the contests. She noted that the Expo entries were down, and posed the question "Do you really want an Expo?" The delegates gave a resounding yes, so she reminded them the future of the Expo is their hands. It is the local Grange that must promote the Expo, must promote the showing of projects by both members of the Grange and members of the community. "The Expo is your tool," she said, "and please, please use it."

Michelle Price, Junior Grange Director gave her report. She explained that the Junior Grange organization has several programs that will help you in forming a Junior Grange in your community. She noted that what must be done is to find out what the kids want to do, what they are interested in, and by giving them a fun, wholesome environment to do it in, it will grow. All it takes is one adult who is interested in kids, and they can do wonders in promoting and forming a Junior Grange.

Darlene Wingfield moved to accept all the Directors reports previously given, and enter them into the Journal of Proceedings. Seconded. *Motion carried*.

Master McFarland suggested that if we hear someone commenting on the resolutions that says basically what you wanted to say, do not get up and reiterate it. Keep the discussion going.

10-026R. **Kathy Bergeron moved** to substitute 026 for 026 R. Seconded. No discussion. *Motion carried*. 026 was then before the delegates. **Kathy Bergeron moved** to amend the resolved. Seconded. No discussion. *Motion carried*. **Kathy Bergeron moved** that only the resolved be printed in the Journal, not the whereas'. Seconded. Discussion. Leo Bergeron noted that the 'resolved' must stand on its own. Others argued that the whereas' are part of the resolution as passed. Betty Ann Biringer-Rehm called for the **previous question**. Seconded. *Motion carried*. **Vote on the motion** - division of the house. Ayes 34 Opposed 33. *Motion carried*.

10-063 R. Committee recommended favorable. **Leo Bergeron amended** the resolution to change line 8, cross out "the" and insert "water", and add an "s" to measure. Change line 12 - cross out the word "the" and make the word "bond" plural. Change line 9 to make the resolved plural, instead of a single measure. Seconded. Discussion. Lewis brought up that the resolution was aimed at a single water measure, not any future possible measures. Further discussion. *Motion carried*. The amended version now on the floor. **Katie Squire moved to amend** by striking "good and bad" and replace with "current Grange policy." Seconded. Further discussion. **Kathy Bergeron moved** to recommit to committee. Seconded. *Motion passed*.

Recess called. Reconvened at 3:20PM.

Government Affairs Director Mike Green gave his report, after approaching the podium between the Bible and the Graces.

Joseph Stefenoni moved to accept the Directors report and print in journal. Seconded. Carried.

Howard Sihner, Chair of Grange Law and Activities Committee.

10-056. Reported unfavorable. Conflict with resolution of last year. **Marion Nichols moved** to accept the committee recommendation of unfavorable. Seconded. *Motion carried*. Resolution failed.

10-058R. Recommendation unfavorable. **Joseph Stefenoni moved** to accept the committee recommendation. Seconded. At the request of Kathy Bergeron, Sihner explained that the reasons that the committee found the motion unfavorable. Master McFarland gave up his sash to respond. Discussion continued. **BettyAnn**

Biringer-Rehm moved to table the resolution. Seconded. *Motion failed*. Discussion continued. **Trudie Martin called for previous question** Seconded. Division of the house. Ayes 48 No 36. *Unfavorable recommendation adopted*. Resolution failed.

10-065R. Committee action unfavorable. Explained the recommendation. **Bill Thomas moved** to accept the recommendation of unfavorable. Seconded. Discussion. Committee report rejected. **Kathy Bergeron moved** to substitute the original motion for the committee recommendation. Seconded. Discussion. **Joseph Stefenoni moved** to postpone indefinitely. Seconded. *Motion to postpone failed*. (Two-thirds vote needed.) **Kathy Bergeron called for previous question**. Seconded. *Motion carried*. Resolution carried. **Joseph Stefenoni called for a division of the house**. 2/3rd is 54 votes. *Ayes 51 Opposed 30. Resolution failed*.

10-012. Committee report unfavorable. **Charlie Betschart moved** to accept the committee resolution. Seconded. *Motion carried* – resolution failed.

10-041. Committee report unfavorable. **Moved by Betty Ann Biringer-Rehm** to accept the committee report. Seconded. *Motion carried*. Resolution failed.

10-048 exactly the same as 10-041. Sent to consent calendar.

10-060. Committee action unfavorable. **Motion to accept** the committee report by Charlie Betschart. Seconded. Division of the house. Ayes 55 opposed 31. *Committee report adopted*. Resolution failed.

10-002. Committee report unfavorable as current policy. **Moved by Dale Baker** to accept the committee report. Seconded. *Motion passed*. Resolution failed.

10-005 Sent to consent calendar. Current policy. Enacted last year. Point of order – it was pointed out that last year's resolution passed State with the number of Granges one could affiliate with was 4, this resolution called for two. This resolution should not be on the consent calendar. Changed to Committee action unfavorable. **Cheri Bunker moved** to accept the committee recommendation. Seconded. *Motion carried*. Resolution failed.

10-011. Committee action unfavorable. A decision of the State office, not the delegates. **Moved by Marion Nichols** to accept the recommendation. Seconded. *Motion carried*, committee report accepted. Resolution failed.

10-013. Committee recommendation Unfavorable. **Dale Baker moved** to accept the report. Seconded., *Motion carried*. Resolution rejected

10-019. Committee recommendation unfavorable. Current policy. **Bill Thomas moved** to accept the recommendation. Seconded. *Motion carried*. Resolution rejected.

10-059R combined with 10-30. Amended to read "Resolved: National Grange will cease to assess the State Granges \$1.00 per member for their annual National Grange Convention." Seconded. *Motion carried*. Amended resolution on the floor. Resolution Passed.

10-046. Committee action unfavorable. Discussion. **Marion Nichols moved** to accept the committee report. Seconded. Discussion. **Dale Baker moved** the previous question. Seconded. *Carried*. Vote on the committee recommendation of unfavorable. Division of the house. Ayes 45 No 40. *Motion passed*. Resolution rejected.

Session closed at 5:30 PM.

Howard Sihner, chair of GLA committee, continued his report.

10-052. Committee recommendation unfavorable. It is the responsibility of each Grange member to Grow the Grange. BJ Fitzpatrick moved to accept the recommendation of the committee. Seconded. Discussion. Bettyann Biringer-Rehm called for the previous question. Seconded. Passed. Recommendation of committee on the floor. Recommendation accepted, resolution failed.

Master McFarland reiterated not to repeat arguments on a resolution if already stated. Sihner thanked his committee.

Two resolutions were passed out at 9:50: 10-063R2 and 10-006.

Jan Saxton of the Conservation and Energy committee reported.

10-008. Consent calendar as already policy. 10-015 Consent calendar as already policy.

10-027. Committee recommendation favorable. Motion to accept by Bettyann Biringer-Rehm. Seconded. Discussion. It was noted that this is a complicated issue involving CalEPA, EPA and other air quality regulators. Buzz Chernoff moved to table the motion. Seconded. Motion carried, resolution tabled.

10-067. Committee amended the first resolve: Add after the word "wild" the words "an adequate assessment has proven GMO salmon to be safe for human consumption." Committee recommendation favorable as amended. Bettyann Biringer-Rehm moved to adopt the committee report. Seconded. Discussion. Leo Bergeron moved to amend by adding the resolved – "That unless an adequate environmental assessment has been conducted that shows minimal likelihood of GES escaping into the wild." Seconded. Discussion. John Luvaas moved to amend the amendment to delete the word "minimal" and insert "there is no possibility" in the new resolved. Seconded. Amendment accepted. The amended resolution is now on the floor. Moved to accept the resolution as amended. Seconded. The resolution as amended passed.

GLA Committee resolution 10-066 was reported unfavorable as written. Moved by Joe Stefenoni to substitute the original resolution for the committee report. Seconded. Division of the house called. Ayes 43 No 47. Motion failed. Committee report of unfavorable on the floor. Moved by Kathy Bergeron to accept the committee report. Seconded. Discussion. Bettyann Biringer-Rehm called for the previous question. Seconded. Point of order. Can a speaker talk on the resolution and then call the previous question. No. Motion ruled out of order. Discussion continued. Shirley Baker called for the previous question. Seconded. Motion of unfavorable now before the delegates. Committee recommendation accepted, resolution failed.

Passed out 2 resolutions. At 10:45: 10-068 and 10-063R2.

Credential report made. 13 Pomona Granges represented with 21 delegates. 56 Subordinate Granges represented with 87 delegates. Total Granges represented 69, total delegates 108.

Marion Nichols, Community Committee, reported her committee's resolution.. 10-051 withdrawn. 10-035 combined with 10-010.

10-010. Committee amended to delete the word "all" in the resolved. Committee recommended favorable as amended. Seconded. Kathy Bergeron moved to amend. Strike "and all Granges" from the resolve. Seconded. Passed. Amended resolution on the floor. Discussion. Bill Allen called for the previous question. Seconded. Passed. Committee report adopted, resolution passed as amended.

10-025 - Consent calendar.

Marion Nichols gave her final report thanking her committee. Cheri Bunker moved to accept the committee report and put in journal. Seconded. Passed.

Cherie Bunker reported for the GLA Committee.

10-037. Committee action unfavorable as already policy. Joseph Stefenoni moved to accept the report. Seconded. Recommendation accepted, resolution failed.

138th Annual Convention Mt. Hamilton Grange, San Jose Master's Address – October 14, 2010

Brothers and sisters, welcome to the 138th annual meeting of the California State Grange.

Imagine, one hundred and thirty eight years ago our very first California State Grange convention was held *right here* in San Jose. Ulysses S. Grant was President of the United States, Levi Stauss invented blue jeans, and Jim McDaniel wrote 14 resolutions to present to the delegates. Among the resolutions Jim submitted that year, a proposal to lift the hunting ban on wooly mammoths.

First things first. Let's take a moment to show our appreciation for our Brothers and Sisters of the Mt. Hamilton Grange who have welcomed us here to share their hall. Members of the Mt. Hamilton Grange, please rise.

Our theme this year is *Growing Together*. Appropriate, after a year of getting *Back to our Roots*. We meet here at this beautiful Mt. Hamilton Grange, in San Jose, California.

It is my honor, privilege and pleasure to be here today. By your grace, I stand here before you, grateful for this opportunity to serve. I pledge that I will never betray your faith in me. I will ever strive to see that your will is carried out and do my best to promote, protect and preserve the Grange, for ourselves and for generations of Grangers yet to come.

We are a grass roots organization. Our inspiration grows from the ground up. Our pride springs from the collective efforts of dedicated and caring individuals. Our success is measured by the good work we do in our Grange halls and communities.

One year ago, we gathered in Orangevale, determined to get *Back to our Roots*. For many, this was a defining moment in our history. Together, we set a new course for the California State Grange.

Thomas Jefferson said, "The only purpose of government is to serve the people." This principle has been applied to the new leadership of the California State Grange and its obligation to our members.

We promised to exercise fiscal responsibility, provide accountability and transparency in our affairs, promote membership growth, and re-focus the resources of the California State Grange to best serve our members and their communities.

My partners in crime this past year have been the members of the Executive Committee, Shirley Baker, Leo Bergeron, Inger Bevans, Larry Kroger, Jon Luvaas, and Martha Stefenoni. We've worked together in harmony, facing difficult challenges and making the right decisions.

Please join me now, in showing our appreciation for this dedicated group of individuals that make up your Executive Committee, please rise.

We are equally grateful for a fine group of Officers and Directors who give their time and effort to the Grange. Officers of the California State Grange please rise and accept our welcome.

We owe the staff of the California State Grange our gratitude as well. Without them, our organization would come to a grinding halt. Staff please rise and receive our thanks. Rick Keel, Jay Hartz and Amy Self.

Finally, I'd better mention my wife, Wendy or I'll be in the back yard dining on Kibbles & Bits. Wendy works full time. She tends to two kids still at home. Even still, when I return from a long road trip, she cares and comforts me. Everything I am, I owe to Wendy, my wife of 29 years.

I have here, the original minutes of the first meeting of the California State Grange that took place in Napa City on July 15, 1873. Considering all that has taken place since, this book is sacred. All that the Grange is today, we owe to the vision of our founders.

In the aftermath of the divisive and destructive Civil War, as smoke still hung over the battle ground with the soil still damp with the blood of American sons and daughters, our founding patrons first met. Rising from the fields and farmlands, we gathered on common ground to heal and support each other, work together, and honor traditional values.

We built halls across the rural landscape of America, inviting family, friends and neighbors to share the harvest from the fields and celebrate the bounty of life. For more than 140 years, we've preserved our founding principles of unity, liberty and charity.

Did you know that our motto, "In Essentials Unity; In Non-essentials, Liberty; In All Things, Charity" did not originate from the Grange? It was first spoken in European churches in the early 17th century, and was commonly known as the "Peace Saying", pleading for an end to the devastating 30 Years War between Protestants and Catholics.

In this context our motto, borrowed by our founding patrons, is better understood as applied to the Grange. The beginning of the Grange in 1867 coincided with the beginning of the Reconstruction Era, as our nation's leaders pleaded for peace, forgiveness, and generosity to restore and heal our country after the Civil War. The purposes and goals of the Grange mirrored the populist sentiment of the time.

Oliver Hudson Kelley, an agent for the new Department of Agriculture, was assigned to travel through the south and report on farms and rural communities. Kelley witnessed first-hand the devastation and desperate conditions following the war. One out of twenty men were killed or wounded in the Civil War. Women were left to tend their family farms with their children.

Recall the phrase from the closing of the Grange 4th degree: "Let us be quiet, peaceful citizens, feeding the hungry, helping the fatherless and the widows".

These matriarchal farm families were welcomed into the Grange and for the first time, women received some measure of respect previously denied them. Just as the Reconstruction Era Congress was enacting laws giving voting rights to former black slaves, women were welcomed as voting members of the Grange.

With the expansion of the Grange, battle fields were transformed once again into farmland. Farmers put down rifles and took up plows.

The Grange brought farmers together, to share common interests and promote the common good. The Grange organized farmers into one of the first collective bargaining groups and empowered them to negotiate more just and profitable agreements with railroads and suppliers, and influence legislation.

Today, cities have grown up around our rural Grange halls and we have adapted into a community service organization. Never-the-less, our agriculture heritage still grounds us today. Our first degree ritual proclaims, "Agriculture is the first and noblest of all occupations."

We have fewer farmers in the Grange, today. Our interests in agriculture have expanded to include how our crops are grown, where they come from and how they find their way to our tables. We're learning about food safety and security. We want to reach into the classroom and educate students about healthier life choices. We're not just planning what we're having for dinner tonight. We're asking, what will our children feed their children?

Grangers have always been the tillers of the soil, the honest laborers of the day, the leaders of our communities and the stewards of our future. Are we prepared to carry on this legacy?

We must not stray from our heritage and commitment to help farmers. The Grange has been a voice for farmers for 140 years.

Across the country, farmers are returning to the Grange. These farmers are our friends and neighbors and they are facing significant challenges. While they work to feed us, sometimes they can barely feed themselves. These farmers need and want our help and we can do nothing less than provide it.

Before you this year is a resolution that proposes we create a Farmer's Bill of Rights.

This Farmers Bill of Rights is our declaration of allegiance to the farmers of California. This Farmers Bill of Rights will put us back on the map as the oldest and grandest agriculture organization in the country. I urge your support of the resolution creating a Farmers Bill of Rights.

By no means are our trials and tribulations as great as those facing Grangers in the aftermath of the Civil War. But not unlike them, we imagine the rewards of working together, growing together, and healing together.

Returning to our roots, we renewed our commitment to some basic principles that founded the Grange:

- Harmony and unity,
- Equality and respect,
- Honesty and integrity,
- Common goals for the common good,
- Preserving our agricultural heritage, and
- Affirming that we are a grass roots organization and all of us are leaders.

Let us examine how far we've come this year and whether we have kept the promises we made. We promised:

- To exercise fiscal responsibility,
- To provide accountability and transparency in our affairs,
- To re-focus the resources of the California State Grange to serve our members and their communities,
- And to promote membership growth.

Let's take them, one at a time.

Exercise fiscal responsibility.

We started out in October, 2009 riding three straight years of red ink and deficit spending:

2007 (\$31,235) loss 2008 (\$79, 852) loss 2009 (\$24,362) loss Our budgets were out of control:

2007 \$741,974 2008 \$813,918 2009 \$669,585

Now let's take a look at how things have changed in 2010.

Through June, we are \$37,505 in the *black*. Our budget for 2010 is \$539,693. That's \$130,000 less than last year.

In light of the \$24,000 loss in 2009, I am surprised that a few members still persist in that we should have held last year's convention at the Radisson Hotel in Fresno. The cost for that convention would have been in excess of \$50,000, which would have increased our losses in 2009 to over \$74,000.

Friends, you do the math. Does it make sense to spend 35% of the dues we collect from you on a convention where only 2% of the members attend?

Folks, there's a new Sheriff and a new Posse in town. And we reckon, we're not gonna spend that money for you. *We're gonna spend that money on you!*

Wisely, *getting back to our roots*, you decided to hold our conventions at Grange halls. Last year at Orangevale, we actually made over \$4,000. That is the first time we have ever made a profit on a convention.

Tell the truth. Do you miss those expensive \$109 per night hotel rates? Well, yes, I know that Bill Thomas misses playing in the fountain in the lobby. But do you miss those \$25 breakfasts?

How many of you attended the GWA breakfast at the Sacramento Holiday Inn? No offense to Betty Eyler, because she had nothing to do with it.

But, honest to God, for \$25 bucks the Holiday Inn served a plate of food that looked like it came out of a doll house. With itty-bitty eggs, (I think they were parakeet eggs), and itty-bitty pieces of bacon that must have come from some kind of miniature pig.

It was pitiful. I should have gotten a clue, when I walked passed by this table with a place name that read, "The Donner Party".

Improving cash flow.

We are not real estate agents. It makes no sense that we would be content managing empty Grange halls around the state and paying the utilities, property taxes and upkeep and on those properties. Not to mention, these halls take up a great deal of our staff's time. Unattended, these vacant halls deteriorate, becoming victims of the elements, graffiti and broken windows.

There is nothing sadder than an empty Grange hall. They are blight on the community and a bad reflection on the Grange. These lonely buildings deserve our utmost attention.

One year ago, we had ten empty Grange halls in California. I am happy to report that we have started new memberships in 6 out of 10 of these halls in West Visalia, Biggs, Eastlake, Fowler, Lucerne Valley, and Chino. Finding new members to take over these six halls will save us \$1,200 a month in property expenses.

Brothers and Sisters, it's been a good year. In all we have re-organized or opened ten new Granges.

These include:

West Visalia Grange – 10-9-09 re-org Vista Grange 12-7-09 – re-org Biggs Community Grange – 1/1/2010 new Redwood Grange – 1-5-10 re-org East Lake – 2-27-10 re-org Clovis-Sanger-Fowler Grange – 3/20/2010 Lucerne Valley Community Grange – 4/3/2010 new Sacramento Community Grange – 4/12/10 new Chino Valley Community Grange 10-1-10 Surprise Valley Grange 10-1-10

The Healdsburg Incident. When I was the Public Relations Director, I came across an old roster showing a Grange hall in the town of Healdsburg, about an hour north of San Francisco. When I asked about it, I was told that the hall had been sold, some years ago.

One day, I was driving through Healdsburg and decided to go by the old hall. The hall was now being used as a dance studio. There were no signs anywhere on the building to suggest it had ever been a Grange.

Inside, little girls in leotards were running around everywhere, doing things that little girls in leotards do. The dance instructor appeared and when she saw the Grange logo on my shirt, she seemed a bit startled. We exchanged some small talk. I explained I was just in the neighborhood passing by, and we left it at that.

On the way back to the office, I couldn't help thinking about that odd reaction she had when she saw the Grange logo. So the next day I had a title search done on the property and found out it was still owned by the Grange, even though the Grange had dissolved seven years before. It had not been sold, as I was told. Apparently, this one fell through the cracks.

Recently I had an attorney do some investigating and we found out that for the past seven years, the dance studio has been paying \$700 per month rent to an ex-officer of the Healdsburg Grange.

Long story short, the dance studio is now sending their rent checks to the California State Grange. We are in the final stages of re-instating the corporation and transferring the title of the property to the California State Grange. And we now have an additional \$700 per month income.

Producing Income.

We have several vacant buildings on the Grange property in Sacramento. In this economy, we have not had much success attracting renters. This significantly impacts our income. Fortunately, we just re-negotiated a new lease with U C Davis, our last major tenant.

We have sought to be pro-active until the rental market improves. Early this year, the staff came up with the idea of renting parking spaces on the Grange property. We soon discovered there was a great interest and in very little time we rented all the available parking spaces and we even have a waiting list. As a result, we added \$800 per month to our income.

Performing Arts Center. This is one of my favorite projects. One of our vacant buildings on the Grange property is the old GBO building. This building has a large one-room space with high ceilings.

Earlier this year an opportunity to partner with the Sacramento City College Theatre Arts Department arose, and we made plans to change the building into a multi-purpose performing arts center. The Executive Committee backed the idea, approving a \$75,000 loan to complete the project.

The multi-purpose Performing Arts Center will accommodate theatre, music, dance, poetry, town hall meetings, lectures and Grange events. It is another way for us to grow, bring attention to our organization, and broaden our interests. It is projected that the Performing Arts Center will pay back the loan within six years.

Due to delays getting building permits and the inability of City College to provide the in-kind donations that were part of our agreement, the project has taken a new direction.

Unoccupied offices in the front of the building will be leased as studios to performing arts groups. Our first tenant is a visual artist that rents a small office for \$150 per month. Several other groups have expressed interest.

The Sacramento Grange, started in April of this year, is a collection of performing artists that are pleased to see the Grange providing these opportunities. There are already over 30 members in the Sacramento Community Grange.

More than \$4,000 in donations have already been received toward the project. A CD of Grange music recorded by Grange musicians will go on sale with proceeds benefiting the project. Granger Ken Donnell has generously donated a professional guitar fitted with an acoustic microphone to be auctioned off with proceeds going to the Performing Arts project.

Vista Grange. Most of you are aware that we had been fighting a legal battle between the California State Grange and a subordinate Grange for many years. It was costing us upwards of \$3,000 per month in attorney's fees and when all was said and done, the bill came to \$60,000. The emotional toll on all parties involved and our organization was costly, as well.

By adopting Resolution GA 09-074 last year, you directed that "the CSG Executive Committee be given full authority to resolve the Vista Grange issue." Last December, an honorable settlement was reached, returning the members of the Vista Grange and their hall back into the Grange family and upholding our bylaws.

Investment Accounts. A resolution this year asks how we may better invest the money in our asset accounts. We have assets collected from inactive Granges totaling \$854,650.32. We are the managers of those funds.

Current interest rates for deposit accounts are at $\frac{1}{2}$ %. Our bankers, Wells Fargo and Morgan Stanley tell me that we can expect those rates to drop even further, to perhaps even 0% interest. Would you want your money parked in an account like that?

What if we invested some of those funds in real estate for the express purpose of developing new Grange properties? For example, there are empty Mason's halls, schools, and other properties currently on the market that are exceptional values. Real estate is a much better long term investment. Please give this resolution your full consideration.

Wisteria Hall Payments. As you may or may not know, to renovate Wisteria hall into the new offices of the California State Grange, in 2007 we borrowed \$400,000 from asset funds. Understand that those funds are the

accounts of individual Granges and money from surrendered Granges that has not yet reverted to the California State Grange. These are interest bearing accounts.

We were not making any payments against this debt to pay back money we borrowed from you, the members. At the beginning of this year, we were in arrears over \$50,000, in *interest only*. I'm happy to say that for the first time since 2007, we are caught up on at least our interest payments, although we have not managed to reduce the principle.

Provide accountability and transparency in our affairs.

A past member of our Executive Committee once told me, "If we let members attend our Executive Committee meetings, we won't be able to say what we want to say."

If there are any members of our Executive Committee that still believe we should hold closed meetings, I'm not one of them. You are all welcome and encouraged to attend. The meeting times and places of our Executive Committee are posted on our website, and in our magazine for all to see, as are the minutes of those meetings.

We've even made it easier for you. In May, we traveled to Humboldt County to have our first outreach meeting. It was well attended. We toured several Granges. We thank our gracious Brothers and Sisters of Humboldt County for making us feel welcomed and for feeding us so much food that Shirley had to be strapped down to the top of the van for the trip home.

Next year, our Executive Committee would like to have an Outreach Meeting in San Diego County, even though we understand it is a foreign country and will require passports.

In the past, Executive Committees had difficulty accessing the financial information of the organization. This is not the current policy. The Executive Committee must have unfettered access to these records to do their work.

My door is always open to any member, including members of our Executive Committee. Although, sometimes I wish Leo would take his boots off my desk.

Re-focus the resources of the California State Grange to serve our members and their communities.

In a state that is 250 miles wide and 700 miles long, with nearly 200 Granges and 10,000 members, that is by no means a small task.

Rule number one in our efforts to focus our resources and serve our members, is to provide you with the information, the tools and support you need.

On average, our office receives over 200 phone calls, emails and letters per day, mostly from members seeking help and answers. Our staff believes that each and every one of those members deserves our full attention. Amy dices and slices those calls with the skills of a Benihana Chef.

Our website has been re-designed to promote our organization and provide resources for our members. Visitors will find information on Grange history and programs, and an invitation to join. Members will find a library of downloadable documents and information on current events. New staff member Rick Keel does a great job keeping our website appealing and up to date.

The new California Grange News Magazine is a refreshing improvement over the old format. After 30 years of the 16 page tabloid, Editor Jay Hartz was ready to try something different. We believe the new magazine is more appealing and the content more relevant.

Jay and Rick make up our Public Relations Department. This department was created to promote the Grange to the general public and to assist Granges with promoting their own events and programs. These services are available to your Grange, along with our ability to send out press releases to over 800 newspapers, television and radio stations around the state.

Early this year, we opened the Heritage Room at the California State Grange office. The Heritage Room has a myriad of Grange resource books, historical documents and photos, a desk and computer with internet access. Any Grange member may use the Heritage Room during regular business hours.

Next year, the State Grange will have a grant researcher and writer on staff to help community Granges find funding for your projects and hall renovations.

This past year, I have visited more than 80 community Granges. This is the most rewarding part of my job. These visits give us a chance to share ideas and for me to discover how I can better serve you. I look forward to many more visits in 2011.

Insurance. As I have traveled the state this year, I often hear concerns from our members regarding insurance coverage for their halls, events, farms and livestock. Premiums are going up. Coverage's are going down.

Folks, I am not an insurance salesman. But I'm meeting with Grange members who are insurance professionals and together we are exploring how we can best provide our members with the coverage they need at competitive pricing. This is a work in progress.

Many of you have GIA insurance. GIA was originally a Grange program started in the late 1800's. Over the years, GIA has been revamped and renamed and today GIA is a separate entity and not under the control of the California State Grange.

Tomorrow, we welcome Tom McKern, the Chairman of GIA, to address our membership. Under a marketing agreement, the California State Grange receives annual commissions from GIA. These commissions have been substantial in the past, amounting to approximately 25% of our income.

Unfortunately, these commissions are decreasing. This year, the commissions were reduced by \$14,000. Next year, we will see another reduction of approximately \$30,000. That's a \$44,000 direct loss in our income, roughly the equivalent of two staff positions.

The writing is on the wall. We must be prepared for these commissions to continue to decrease. We must replace this income by other means. Let's work on this together. And we need to work on it now. I'm open to suggestions.

Conflict of Interest Policy. In the interest of protecting our nonprofit status and due to new IRS guidelines, I will appoint a committee to develop a Conflict of Interest Policy for the California State Grange. Such a policy was recommended several years ago by our attorney but was never implemented. It is common practice for a nonprofit organization to have a Conflict of Interest Policy.

Youth Program. The California State Grange Youth Program needs our support and attention. There are many Granges with remarkable Youth Fair Programs around the state: Lake Earl, Ione, Alpine, Rubidoux and

Rainbow Valley, to name a few. To attend these county fairs and see these young Grangers wearing their red vests in competition with 4H and FFA, is inspiring.

Overall, there is room for improvement in our Youth Program. We need to make a better effort to bring more youth and young families into our Granges. This will require us to provide more interesting and attractive youth programs. We'll be working on that in 2011.

One of the projects I would like to see developed in 2011, would be to create a *Grange on Wheels*, a mobile classroom that could travel to schools and communities to share our rich history and educate people about the good work the Grange does. It would be the kind of one-on-one promotion we need to build interest in our organization. Local Granges could participate and recruit new members.

Legislative Program. You'll be hearing from our Government Affairs Director Michael Greene, so I won't go into great detail on our legislative program, except to say that historically, the Grange has been a leader in legislative action and we are exploring how we can be more aggressive in bringing attention to our causes.

Getting Along & Working Together. Why are we so preoccupied with judging each other based on political, religious or personal beliefs? If we were half as committed to tolerance, understanding, and fellowship... imagine what we could accomplish together.

You can't judge a book by its cover. Why do you think we call him Buzz? How do you know he is not a bee keeper?

How we are different is not important. How we are alike, is. We take an oath that pledges we will not "knowingly wrong or defraud a Brother or a Sister of the Order or allow it to be done by another if within our power to prevent it."

Let's find our common ground. Let's work together and respect one another. Camaraderie is a word we should all know. And by the way, if you are not having fun, there is something wrong.

The issues we deal with, the causes we take on should be within the interests and work of the Grange. I'm as devastated as you are that Pluto is no longer considered a planet. I haven't slept since the announcement. But I don't need to write a resolution about it.

Finally, *Promote membership growth*.

We are all aware of the difficulties we face trying to grow our membership. We're losing whole generations to technology. We are socially challenged.

In these times of economic hardship, it is very likely that both parents must hold down jobs. On weekends, there is soccer; during the week, homework and household chores. With most things nowadays, it is easier to just say "no." People are struggling just to survive. They must make choices in their lives. The Grange, in any form, is a choice.

We are not alone. The Masons, Odd Fellows, Lions - all fraternal organizations have suffered significant membership loses in the last few decades.

The average age of a Grange member in California is 64. We honor our older Grange members, and we're grateful for their guidance, their contributions and their many years of dedication. While we praise them, we also must think about our future. We are not replenishing our older membership with younger generations.

At many Granges, our older members carry the torch. To my older Brothers and Sisters, I say, don't let the torch burn out. Open your doors, your minds and your hearts. Pass the torch to a new generation.

And to those of you who may have lost faith in our organization... I'm here to tell you, the Grange is on the rise again. We find ourselves on the threshold of a Grange Renaissance, embracing the best in all of us, and celebrating our conviction that the Grange provides value and meaning to our lives today, and offers hope for a brighter future.

I've tracked our membership numbers back to 1983. That's as far as our records go. There was no membership growth that year, and there hasn't been any since.

In 1983 we had 43,000 members and over 309 Grange halls. In 2009, we closed out the year with 8,500 members and 175 Granges. It's been a long, slippery slide.

A few years ago, we came to realize that if we didn't reverse this trend – the Grange would go the way of the dinosaurs. Some mathematical calculations suggested that our comet would arrive as soon as the year 2025.

If you are the pilot of a plane that is nose-diving toward the ground, do you take time to serve the cocktails? I think not.

The effort to pull our plane out of the nosedive began with Jan Saxton and Rich Sax, our membership directors for 2007 - 2008. They tried persuading us to open our doors and invite the community into our Granges. They woke us up to the idea that we are not a private club but a community organization.

I followed Jan and Rich as your Public Relations Director. At our convention in 2008, I heard gasps as I shared with you the sobering truth about our declining membership. I asked each of you to share in the effort to rebuild our organization, to prove your faith and dedication. Over two years, that trail led me to almost every Grange in California.

Brothers and Sisters, I'm am proud to announce that for the first time in 27 years or longer, the California State Grange has grown by 261 members this year. Congratulations.

Together, we've pulled our plane out of its dive. We are climbing toward the sky and new horizons. I hope you now realize the historic significance of our motto of this year: *Growing Together*.

Tomorrow night at our Awards Ceremony, the winners of our Membership Growth contest will be announced. I can't top the news I have just given you. So, in closing my address I have just a few more thoughts to share with you.

What we have explored together here today should bring us satisfaction that one year ago, we made the right choice to go *Back to our Roots*. Now, we can rejoice that we are *Growing Together*. Let's celebrate our accomplishments, and face the challenges ahead as we travel together, down life's pathway, ever facing the light.

Brothers and sisters, we are at a crossroads. We've been insensitive to the harm we've brought upon ourselves. We've spent far more time closing Granges than opening Granges. It seems at times we lost our will and our purpose.

Throughout this convention, you will have the opportunity to decide the course of our organization. There is a fundamental question you must decide for yourselves. Are we a dying organization, and are all of us simply the caretakers of the estate? Or does the Grange still have relevance in our lives? Are we pathfinders,

confidently leading our organization toward new and brighter horizons? Do we prepare for a funeral or for the future? The Grange is in your hands.

When I was a boy in little league, many, many years ago, I wanted so much to please my father by one day hitting a home run. I watched other kids do it. Why couldn't I? But no matter how hard I tried, I couldn't do it. I felt defeated.

My father said, "Son, if you cannot *imagine* hitting the ball and watching it as it sails over the fence, then you will never hit a home run." It was the best advice I ever got. And you all want to know, did I hit the home run? Well, I ask you – can you imagine it? And if you can, then I did.

Brothers and Sisters, it is my great pleasure to be on our team and to go to bat for you. Thank you.

Committee is: Marion Nichols, Inger Bevans, Shirley Baker, Linda MacCracken, Bob McFarland.

Bob McFarland gave his masters report. He reported on the website, the Grange news, National Convention, resolutions, heritage room. Suzan Guerra from Bayside Grange has experience with preserving historical documents. She is looking into grant proposals to help us preserve our documents. Baker updated the Committee on the happenings for the 2010 Convention. The Bakers and the Chernoffs, who helped with the 2009 convention, are heading down to Mt. McFarland introduced Larry Lozano from American Income Life who explained the benefits of the AIL program offered to our members. **Bevans moved** to allow the AIL letter to go out to all the members with information in the Grange News. Bergeron second. All in favor, 0 opposed. *Motion carried*.

Property Report: Bob Clouse reported to the Executive Committee on the Property Rehabilitation committee. Populated by Howard Sihner, Dale Baker and Bob Clouse, the committee goes around the state and evaluates State managed Granges. They will then report back to the Executive Committee with suggestions on what to be done.

Other Grange Properties:

Delhi: Email meeting established the sale of the Grange.

Welcome Grange: Welcome Grange requested \$7,900 from their asset management account to redo their water system back in June. Now a second request has been received to repair their roof. **Luvaas moved** to release the remainder of Welcome Grange's asset management account for the repair of their roof. McFarland Second . All in favor, 0 opposed. *Motion carried*.

Pleasant Hill Grange: The CSG had filed a claim for escheated funds for Pleasant Hill Grange over a year ago. Now the State is saying they don't have the file. Larry will pay the CA State Controller's office a visit.

Fowler Grange: Fowler also has funds that we are trying to reclaim. Larry needs some additional paperwork before he can take it to the State Controller's office. When he was talking with Fresno Grangers Credit Union about another matter he asked if Fowler Grange had any remaining accounts and the reply was affirmative.

Roeding Grange: Roeding Grange may also have some funds that we should try to acquire.

Healdsburg Grange: Healdsburg Grange is currently closed and their corporate status is suspended. The hall is currently being occupied by a dance studio. There is no Grange signage on the building. The property also has two titles. Pursue getting California State Grange on the title for the Healdsburg Grange. Kroger suggests that all the property management Granges have the California State Grange on the title.

West Visalia: Discussion on the debt against the West Visalia Hall. **McFarland moved** that the West Visalia Grange hall be leased to the West Visalia Grange under a triple net lease for \$1 year, the CA State Grange will own the property and will be named as an additional insured. The CA State Grange will get on or stay on the title until the debt is retired. In favor: Baker, Bergeron, Bevans, Kroger, McFarland. Opposed: Luvaas, Stefenoni. *Motion Carried*.

Costa Mesa: Costa Mesa requested \$7,500 from their asset management account for a scholarship fund. **Bergeron moved** to give them up to \$5,000 from their asset management fund for their scholarship fund as per our current policy. Stefenoni second. All in favor, 0 opposed. *Motion carried*

Discussion of streamlining resolutions to facilitate searching through them and cross tabbing to aide in reducing uplicates.

Kroger is working on the executive committee website.

Income

Renting the conference room and parking spots was discussed as a possible source of income. Suggest days in January for a volunteer clean up day. 10th was decided.

Sunday January 31, 2010 State Office

Chairman Larry Kroger called the meeting to order at 9:19 AM. Officers: Master Bob McFarland, Chairman Larry Kroger, Executive Committee: Shirley Baker, Leo Bergeron, Inger Bevans, Jon Luvaas, Martha Stefenoni. Secretary: Kalie Benson.

Guests in attendance: Cheri Bunker, Frank and Marian Nichols, Mike Byers, Marta Kroger, Ed and Leslie Parker, Buzz Chernoff.

Master Bob McFarland gave the Master's report. He updated us on his travels across the state, sharing pictures from Grange functions and Grange Halls. Biggs, Redwood, and Eastlake have been reorganized. A number of Granges need help. Fowler needs to be reorganized. A couple of halls are in bad shape and need to be looked at: Laytonville, Freshwater. A number of Granges are thriving and are putting on great programs in their community: Fort Bragg, Garcia, Rohner, Little Lake, Morgan Hill, Mt. Hamilton.

CB Ellis is done being a rent coordinator for us. We are going to take control of renting the buildings and try to rent out some of the parking spaces at \$50 a piece. We are looking at renting the spaces for \$1 or less per square foot. Need to get renters in there fast. McFarland is looking into putting an ad in the yellow pages to rent out the conference room.

After the AIL letter went out, McFarland has received 3 complaints. McFarland has tried to contact Larry Lozano but has been unsuccessful. A sit down may be required to fix the problems.

Fowler Grange: Kroger is working on retrieving the escheated funds. Needs a notarized letter from Secretary.

Office problems: continuing to have problems with office equipment and services. Our email is still being handled through Drew Dreshler, virus problems have put some computers temporarily out of commission, and the network is slow. Eric has been called in to look at our system and he is currently trouble shooting the system. There needs to be a solution.

Memo of understanding: for East Lake Grange and West Visalia Grange. There is debt against the hall. McFarland will follow up with a letter outlining lease agreement and utilities payment.

We have had great success putting membership into vacant halls. Two more vacant Granges need attention: Fair Valley, and Lucerne Valley.

El Camino's rent is now current and we're close to closing deals with this hall and Delhi's hall with a title company.

Baker: McFarland is to be commended for his travels. There are also a lot of halls that need help. The property team is ready to get out there and help these people.

Mike Byers: Lake Earl Grange. Mike Byers reported on the profits and losses of Lake Earl Grange. They are loosing money because they have lost rental income. They now have new membership, an active Grange Fair program and community based functions that are helping to gain new members. Want to start paying back the CA State Grange. Agreed to pay \$100 a month to get the ball rolling until they get permanent renters in the front offices and they will then start paying back more. Byers will get this agreement in writing. All the payments are going to interest. Amy Self suggests putting together a committee and conducting an audit.

Crescent Redwood Grange: Hall was closed after attempts to revitalize were unsuccessful. A group that is in there has been renovating the Grange and paying Lake Earl Grange. CA State Grange is still paying utilities and property tax. The 12 step program is now going to pay State Grange and take over the payments. Byers want to reorganize the Grange and says he has people interested to do it. Byers recommends, shutting down income from Crescent Redwood to Lake Earl, make Crescent Redwood a Grange again and make a new lease to have them start paying for their bills, now Lake Earl will have to fix their own money problems since they are currently loosing money

Bergeron moved to take Crescent Redwood out of Lake Earl's control and have the CA State Grange take over rental income from the hall. Baker 2nd. All if favor, 0 Opposed. *Motion Carried*.

McFarland moves to appoint Byers to reorganize Crescent Redwood. Bergeron 2nd. All in favor, 0 opposed. *Motion Carried*.

Bevans moved to accept any money received on either loan to be applied to the principal for 1 year. McFarland 2nd. All in favor, 0 opposed. *Motion Carried*.

Stefenoni moved that McFarland and Byers create an audit team to look at both Granges books. Baker 2nd. All in favor, 0 opposed. *Motion Carried*.

Richard Roth of **Chico Grange** came to the board to discuss programs that would be good for local Granges. He is looking into writing grant proposals to fund programs that would teach nutrition, set up mentoring programs to help kids and give the Grange a roll in actively fighting diabetes. He asks that the Grange and the Foundation help with these costs that would come out to about \$8,500 a year. McFarland formed a sub committee to help Roth with his task. Stefenoni, Bevans, and Luvaas are going to get together with Roth at a break and share emails to keep in touch.

GBO Building Proposal: McFarland proposes to turn the GBO building large room into a performing arts center. Buzz Chernoff, Chris Cook and Ryan Halbert have all shown interest and are willing to help renovate the room. Sac City College is also interested in the space because they don't have a space for next year. This could help us get the room ready.

Chernoff as State Lecturer is interested in using the space for informational meetings, town hall forums, and as a way to promote the Grange. As a musician, a venue in Sacramento that is not a bar would be very valuable. Cook stresses the community aspect of theater. Halbert also says the space is ideal for video projection and for shooting video and photos, renting out the space as a studio or art gallery. Since spaces are in need, it's a good time for this kind of thing to happen.

Spaces go for \$500 a weekend and are rented in 5 week blocks. Days that are dark can be used for other things. Ticket prices can vary due to the event. Discussion.

McFarland moves to approve a committee to be appointed by the master to come up with a business plan for the GBO building as a performing arts center. Bergeron 2^{nd} . All in favor, 0 opposed. *Motion Carried*.

Broke at 12:20 PM for lunch and a tour of the GBO building. Reconvened at 1:00 PM

Convention 2010: Shirley Baker gave a convention report for the 2010 convention at Mt. Hamilton. Lodging: Holiday Inn off 4th street is \$79 a night and wont nail us down to a block of rooms to be saved. We are still waiting to hear from Wyndham Hotel and Hampton Inn. Holiday Inn Express on Silicon Valley Road (7.4 miles from hall) has offered a king bed room at \$79. 50 rooms can be held up to 21 days before with no obligation, 75 king bed rooms may be held until 21 days before event with 25 room guarantee of payment, 100 king bed rooms may be held until 21 days before event with a 50 room guarantee of payment from client. Rooms booked within 21 days of the event will be accommodated (if available) at the rates of \$89 king, \$94 double, \$119 suite. Meals: looking into local high school culinary program.

Layout: the layout looks suitable and since the convention will probably be smaller in an off election year, the hall shouldn't be a problem. 68 parking spaces should be sufficient. Baker recommends that we stay with Mt. Hamilton as a convention site for 2010. Discussion.

Financials: Amy Self passed out the financials as up to 12/31/2009.

Made recommendations on some accounts that can be closed that will not then incur yearly fees. **Baker moves** to close MS Operating New and Wisteria Hall accounts and move them to Wells Fargo. Luvaas 2nd All in favor, 0 opposed. *Motion Carried*.

Bevans declares the need to clean up the fixed asset accounts. The first week in May has been set aside to work on the fixed asset accounts. Bevans, Amy Self and Baker will work on the accounts. Discussion on accounting practices and the procedures of the billing process. Baker expresses the need for up to date financials as to make decisions. Amy Self says there needs to be policy in place so she can have reports prepared for the meetings. The new administration is in line with the budget. McFarland recommends moving the discussion forward.

Proposed Youth Budget: Marta Kroger comes to the Executive Committee with a proposed budget for the Youth Department. Proposes to separate the Youth and Junior funds and to take the Youth Fair out of it completely. Looking at a Youth Director, Youth Fair Director and a Junior Director, and different budgets for all of them. The family camp will still be under the Youth Director. A budget needs to be proposed by each director, taking into account the already approved budget, to the Master and on the Master's approval then it will come to the EC.

Grange Funds: Bevans reports that there are funds that are about to revert to the AR. Approximately \$15,000 from Riverbank and \$45000 from Easton in June. According to the newly adopted resolution, the money is first applied to AR debt accrued by property management Granges. Discussion. **Bevans moves** to apply the reverted funds from Riverbank of \$15000 to Biggs, Hessel, and West Side. Discussion on who qualifies for these funds. **Bevans amended** to include all Granges on the AR which will be Biggs, Hessel, West Side, Eastlake and De Sabla to be applied proportionately to their debt. Stefenoni 2nd. All in favor, 0 opposed. *Motion Carried*.

Claims, Loan Requests, Office Update: Kroger reported that escheated funds we thought we could claim were already claimed and they had just not updated their records.

Fowler and Roeding: need to get certificate of revivers for these Granges so we can claim funds from them.

Janitorial service: There's isn't anything in the budget for a janitorial service for the office. Amy Self came with a proposal for two janitorial services. We have VanGuard right now and it was decided to keep the current service and revisit the agreement at the next meeting.

Request from the **FFA Foundation** to sponsor awards: They are asking we sponsor 4 awards for \$1200. Discussion. **McFarland moves** that we sponsor two of the four awards, Ag Education for \$400 and Emerging Ag Technology for \$400. Baker 2^{nd} . 6 in Favor, Bergeron opposed. *Motion Carried*.

Rutherford Grange: request a loan. \$43,000 to make repairs for safety purposes to their roof. Discussion. **Stefenoni moves** that we request from Amy the whole amount of the Grange hall loan fund, when the CD matures and then decide to make the loan after we have all the information. **Luvaas amends** that we know the net gain of the hall. Friendly amendment accepted. **McFarland moves** the question. Baker 2nd. All in favor, 0 opposed. *Motion Carried*.

Computing in the Clouds: Kroger brings to the committee the idea of putting our server on a virtual network. Cost would be from \$100 to \$300 a month. Never have to worry about replacing the server or loosing information if our server crashed. Kroger would like permission to set up a trial program with a virtual server. **McFarland moves** that we allow Kroger to use the virtual server on a 6 month trial basis to back up our server and that the passwords should be shared by the Chairman and the Master. Baker 2nd. All in favor, 0 opposed. *Motion Carried*.

Master's Fly-In: McFarland brings up the Master's Fly-In in Florida. Tab would be about \$2000. The money would come out of the National Convention budget. **Baker moves** to approve the 12-5-2009 minutes. McFarland 2nd. All in favor, 0 opposed. *Motion Carried*.

Baker suggests executive session be moved to the beginning of the meetings.

Meeting was adjourned at 4:35 PM.

Sunday, March 21, 2010 CSG State Office

Executive Committee Chairman Larry Kroger called the meeting to order at 9:15 am. Officers roll call: Master, Bob McFarland; Secretary Pro Tem, Leslie Parker; Committee Chairman, Larry Kroger; Executive Committee members, Shirley Baker, Leo Bergeron, Inger Bevans. Absent: Overseer, Martha Stefenoni; Executive Committee Jon Luuvas.

Guests in attendance: Ed Parker

Chairman Kroger asked if there were any additions to the presented agenda. **Moved by Bob McFarland**, to accept the meeting agenda as written. Second by Shirley Baker. *Motion carried unanimously*.

Moved by Bob McFarland to approve minutes of the last meeting. Second by Shirley Baker. *Motion carried*: 4 approved 1 opposed.

Worthy Master Bob McFarland presented slide show and outline of Grange reports, visits and events.

Fair Valley hall is still vacant.

Coalinga is still being worked on.

Fowler Grange had reorganization meeting and would like to be called Clovis Sanger Fowler Grange. Discussion: on making sure the corporate number for the new grange will not be affiliated with the original Fowler corporation numbers.

CCOF (California Certified Organic Farmers) Conference in Chico. Bob suggested to the CCOF that they might be able to use Grange halls for future CCOF regional conferences. CSG had a booth there (free of charge). They discussed the possibility of having a farmers market here on the Grange Triangle. Bob is working with the current Master of Pleasant Valley, who is one who certifies farms to be organic.

Rutherford: Bob and some staff went to their meeting and discussed the loan on the property.

East Lake reorganization meeting: The new membership is active and has already had a craft fair to earn money. They understand their obligation to pay down the debt this is on the property.

Deputies meeting held March 6 at CSG. 20 deputies were in attendance.

Capay Grange revitalization meeting May 15th event.

Redwood Grange suddenly got reorganized after reports of them wanting to give the hall to the Fire Dept. CSG will investigate this and make sure the Grange is viable.

Sacramento Grange now known as Sacramento Performing Arts Grange was reorganized March 2. Members there will put on Ag Day for us.

Crescent Redwood is being handled by Mike Byers.

Fieldbrook needs to be attended to soon.

He attended the Vacaville Autumn Leaves meeting at the invitation of Chairman Kroger. He now understands more about that organization.

Had a meeting with Buzz and Mike. They want to do an Industrial Hemp Festival on May 22 with speaker and all. Perhaps in conjunction with Famers market if it's set up.

Ag Day. Giving out lady bugs with a note "I want to live in your garden" and info on the Grange, fiddler player and anything to attract attention. The goal is to get the word out that the Grange is "Watching out of the little guy: family farmers." There is a hearing that same day regarding the Light Brown Apple Moth that is destroying orchards around the state. The Big Guys want to spray to eradicate the bug (like the med fly) but others do not. Policy at CSG is whatever it takes to protect the farmers.

Performing Arts Center: Had a meeting with SCC (Sacramento City College) Performing Arts Dept. Currently, working out agreements. SCC's season is September through May. The discussions have been very amicable. When theater is done, they will leave their older equipment behind for us: chairs, risers, lights. A really good relationship is developing. The plan right now is a two year lease with an option of a third. We would get a portion of the box office and concessions in lieu of rent payments.

Website: Revamping going well.

New CGN format examples handed out: magazine form rather than the old tabloid paper. Publish dates are Mar 1, June 1, September 1 and December 1. Fund raisers are anticipated to offset the costs of the CGN printing.

Rental spaces – Put ad on Craigslist and have rented 7 parking spaces so far. Parking time is 6a to 6p. Ads have been placed in the Sacramento yellow pages to rent the conference room.

April is membership month. As leaders, we need to open our doors to the public to take in new members.

Lucerne Valley: Currently working on reorganizing the Grange. Found in old files, two bank accounts with 11K in one and 19K in another. The 11K was sent as a check made out to Lucerne Valley Grange and mailed to a PO Box. It is not known where the money ended up. The 19K was "donated" via check to Lucerne Valley Scholarship Fund which the Bank Manager founded. Bob is following up to find out who the PO Box belongs to and what legal routes we may need to follow to regain these funds.

Moved by Shirley Baker that we notify the First Mountain Bank that we want an accounting of all disbursements and balance of that account from 2002 to present and that account be frozen until such time as the legality of the transfer of funds has been established. Seconded by Larry Kroger. Discussion. *Motion carried unanimously*.

Moved by Leo Bergeron that the Master be authorized to proceed to identify the PO Box and discover what association the person who has the PO Box, that received that 11K distribution made out to Lucerne Valley Grange. Seconded by Bob McFarland. Discussion. *Motion carried unanimously*.

Renegotiated the Kone Elevator service contract saving 30% and increasing the services they will provide.

Financial Report: Amy Self, CSG bookkeeper joined the meeting at 10:30am. Amy handed out the Current Loan status spreadsheet as of 2/28/10. She explained the status of each account and the currency of the payments.

SLO Grange was charged for a legal bill regarding a cell tower. The State Grange paid the bill. Amy would like permission to write this off the books. **Moved by Leo Bergeron** to write off this \$400 attorney fee charged to San Luis Obispo Grange at end of the June accounting period, allowing Master Bob to feel out SLO about paying this \$400 invoice that was sent to them. Seconded by Inger Bevans. Discussion. *Motion Carried unanimously*.

Amy presented old debt items that need to be cleared off the books. She handed out a spreadsheet of housekeeping items, possible budget adjustments, and substantial differences in some income sources. She would like permission to make these changes.

Discussion of GIA funds. The actual funds coming in are less than budgeted. This must be given consideration for future budgets.

Discussion on the convention expenses and allocation of budgeted funds.

Discussion of the utility bills for the Grange triangle. It was suggested to review the utilities and leases to tighten up the distribution of expenses. Shirley volunteered to help with this review this.

Discussion on ADP payroll processing and bank account fees.

Inger suggested that the EC review these items on the budget and come back to the next meeting.

Shirley proposed to activate the finance subcommittee as talked about at the December meeting to adjust the budget, since there has been refocusing of the purpose of the Grange with the new administration. There should be a mid-year review on the budget anyway. Once it's been done it should be published.

Bob requested that the budget be revisited regarding the website and other such expenses so that the CSG can continue to revamp and upgrade the functionality of the website, and other PR activities.

Amy suggested that Rick could also be used to develop new brochures.

Right now we have no brochures to send out as we have exhausted the supplies we had, which were from National. National no longer prints most of those brochures.

Meeting adjourned for lunch at 12:15 pm. Meeting reconvened at 1:55 pm.

Old Business

Convention 2010: Shirley reported the next step is to go back down to San Jose to finalize many of the details. The members of Mt Hamilton like the idea of utilizing the Cordova Culinary Academy that was used at Orangevale last year. The culinary director, Diane Goldman, has received approval from the School District to proceed. Diane would like to accompany someone there to see the facilities and approximate their needs. Also a decision regarding the lodging needs to be made soon.

Property Management

Delhi Grange Hall has been sold.

El Camino's lender has pulled out of the deal. The fees charged to the buyer were outrageous. The Title Company needed to have the corporation in good standing which was done but the escrow documents were not completed and now the lender has backed out of the deal. Leo will review the insurance policy of the tenant to be sure the CSG is covered. The rent payments for this property are current. **Moved by Inger Bevans** to allow the tenant of El Camino another 90 days to find new financing. Seconded by Leo Bergeron. Discussion. *Motion carried unanimously*.

Lake Earl/Crescent Redwood – Bob talked to Mike Byers. He's working to reorganize that Grange with several previous members and some new folks from the community. Mike estimates that he needs about 30 days to finalize. Inger reported that from the documents she has reviewed Lake Earl Grange is not making enough money to survive on their own.

It was suggested that perhaps we need a property manager/management entity to provide continuity in the care of the Grange Halls. This position would be funded by a percentage of the rentals and fees. This would also provide continuity when there is a change of administration. **Moved by Bob McFarland** to pursue the idea of finding a property mgmt person to manage properties at 10% commission and that person would be responsible for managing Grange properties. Seconded by Shirley Baker. Discussion. *Motion carried unanimously*.

Fowler claim, Roeding (bank accounts). We requested a certified copy of the SI100 form from the Secretary of State for Fowler and Roeding. Bob will follow up with the request for escheated funds from the State Controller's office. Any funds for Fowler or Roeding at the Fresno Credit Union will be retrieved and will belong to the California State Grange.

CCHE Grant: The program details were not complete when presented at the last EC meeting. The Grant has been submitted.

Cloud Server: This project is currently on hold pending re-evaluation of the current server and after Eric finishes his work. The overall network seems to be working better now after Eric was here working on it. However, the VOIP phones are worse. The Master has a couple of proposals for full hard wire phone service and internet service, for less than we pay now and we can get better service.

Email: We finally got the passwords and the necessary info to take control of the email system. Virus protection has been installed. **Moved by Shirley Baker** that the Master be given the authority and the discretion to enter into an appropriate agreement for a new phone system. Second by Leo Bergeron. Discussion. *Motion carried unanimously*.

West Visalia Grange: Currently those expenses are being carried as Accounts Receivable. It should actually be booked as a fixed asset. Inger will work with Amy to accomplish this.

New Business

Grange Hall Loans

Correlitos Grange requesting a Grange Hall Loan of \$25,000 to pave their parking lot. They have had small loans before and have never been a problem. There paperwork seems to be in order. Inger would like to go visit them first and talk to them about their financials. **Moved by Larry Kroger** that we tentatively approve the \$25000 loan to Correlitos Grange, pending the availability funds. Second by Shirley Baker. Discussion. **Friendly amendment** was accepted that approval is conditional on the report back to the Executive Committee by Sister Bevans. *Motion carried unanimously*.

Moved by Leo Bergeron to approve the \$43,000 loan to Rutherford Grange once all the appropriate documents have been received. Second by Larry Kroger. Discussion. **Friendly amendment** accepted to encourage them to repay the loan more quickly to replenish our Grange Hall Loan fund. *Motion Carried unanimously*.

Moved by Larry Kroger that a draft of the Executive Committee minutes be emailed to the members of the committee within 72 hours after the meeting and be approved by the committee by email, then be signed at the next meeting. Seconded by Leo Bergeron. Discussion *Motion carried unanimously*.

Next Meeting: Bob proposed that for the next meeting we have an outreach meeting, since the Executive Committee has been invited to Humboldt County, and that the meeting be on May 16th. Discussion on the times scheduled for Executive Committee meetings.

Moved by Bob McFarland that the next Executive Committee meeting be held in Humboldt County on May 16th. Seconded by Leo Bergeron. Discussion. Meeting will start at 10am. *Motion carried unanimously*.

Moved by Bob McFarland that the meeting following the May meeting be held Monday, July 12th starting at noon at the State Office. Seconded by Shirley Baker. Discussion. *Motion carried unanimously*.

Bob recommends that we have a procedure for conducting email meetings. Each meeting to be regarding one subject only. Each meeting be conducted by the chairman and the votes are counted by the chairman.

Meeting adjourned to Executive Session at 4:10 pm.

May 16, 2010 Humboldt Grange Eureka CA

Meeting was called to order by Chairman Larry Kroger at 10:12 am. Officers Master Bob McFarland, Chairman Larry Kroger, Executive Committee: Shirley Baker, Leo Bergeron, Inger Bevens, Jon Luvaas, with Martha Stefenoni Absent. Secretary: Lynda Briggs, pro tem. Guests in Attendance: Curtis Lindley, Dale Harvey, Laura Sullivan, Mary Meyers, Dwight Winegar, Marta Kroger, Mrs. Kroger, Fern Miller, Bob and Loretta Betschart, Barbara Staples, Lois Trumbull, Betty Crile, Betty Ann Biringer-Rehm, Mike Byers.

The minutes of the March 21, 2010 meeting were approved and signed.

Agenda was approved.

Master's Report: Master Bob McFarland thanked Humboldt Grange for allowing them to come and have the meeting here. They will be going around to the different granges in their "Grassroots Campaign". Bob then asked if Curtis Lindley would like to say a word.

Curtis thanked the Executive Committee for coming and meeting up here. He told about the small population numbers in our county compared to the rest of California. Our Granges are small with attendance small even though we are the second largest county in California. The average grange attendance at a meeting is 10 to 15, but Mattole Grange commonly has 35 people.

Master McFarland went on to say that there is nothing sadder than an empty grange hall that is ready to be sold. Slides of West Visalia Grange and Biggs Community Grange both reorganized in 2009. Redwood Grange #504 in Redcrest was going to give the hall to the fire dept. and instead brought the fire dept as new members into the grange and now has 27 members. Eastlake Grange had a roof leak and ruined the hall floor and lathe work, which CSG had to pay for. On Feb 27, 2010 it was rechartered again. Fowler Grange has combined with Clovis and Sanger forming the Clovis Sanger Fowler Grange.

Lucerne Valley Community Grange reorganized on April 3, 2010.

Coalinga, empty but have people interested in reorganization.

Crescent-Redwood, report from Mike Byers later today.

Davis Creek, Leo will go there next Friday. The cemetery district has been paying for it.

Fair Valley in Chino, rented by a church and in bad shape, just starting to work with it.

When all of these are re-chartered and reorganized then there will be NO empty granges in the State of California.

AG Day was March 23" in Sacramento. That same day the California Senate had hearings on the Light Brown Apple Moth which is destroying many orchards in the state. Many of the farmers are against spraying and spraying doesn't seem to be controlling the moth anyway. CSG had a table and was giving away lady bugs and information about taking them home and putting them in the garden to control pests. CSG's policy is "whatever it takes" to protect the farmers.

Capav Grange – The Master and his wife moved to Chico. They wrote a letter to the members saying the grange was closed. There will be a fund raiser in July.

Hesperia Grange – home to a lot of consolidated Granges in the area, now known as the High Desert Grange.

lone Grange - on May 13 a Junior and Youth Grange had a challenge to come up with recipes and fix them and then be judged. Bob said all of the young people did a really good job and the judging was really hard.

Mt. Hamilton Grange, - big hall and famous for their dancers. Photos shown

Orangevale Grange recently celebrated their 100th Anniversary. They had mobile toilet race with 5 or 6 entries and a Barber Shop quartet.

Prunedale Grange – On March 25th had an International Salad Bar Event. \$1200 was raised by Inger at the huge salad bar.

Several Granges are still doing talent shows. They offer \$200 awards, people brings their families and also bring in new members.

Bob then went into a review of the newly revised CSG Website. He mentioned the CSG support for the Industrial Hemp Campaign. He also mentioned working with WEAVE this past week as CSG gets into discussion of being a supporter of them.

Ranchito Grange – Asset Account should be reviewed. Since 1990 when the Grange was sold the interest from the \$300,000 has been earned by the grange. Bob feels that these Granges that have large asset accounts should be reviewed.

Adelanto Grange – Has only 2 members and has requested that they be allowed to consolidate with High Desert Grange, which also only has 2 members. Moved by Bob McFarland to allow Adelanto Grange to merge with High Desert Grange. Seconded by Shirley Baker. Motion carried unanimously.

Lucerne Valley Grange – Still investigating the approximately \$11,000.00 check that was mailed to the P.O. Box approximately 7 years ago. The person was not a grange member and has not been very cooperative in the investigation. **Motion made by Leo Bergeron** to try to determine what happened to the money. Seconded by Shirley Baker. Friendly amendment by Bob McFarland to send a registered letter to the person who received the check and then to continue to follow-up. *Motion carried*.

In the same vein, Bob McFarland said that First Mountain Bank wrote a check for approximately \$19,000 from the Lucerne Valley Grange account to set up a scholarship fund. This was started by the bank manager. Originally \$19,000, the fund has been used to give scholarships and has collected donations. In speaking to the manager Bob told her the funds needed to be frozen. Shirley Baker said she thought the funds were being used appropriately to benefit youth. Leo Bergeron feels that the Granges should be made to understand that they cannot do what the want with CSG money and property or they will be prosecuted. Bob McFarland said he thought the money should be turned over to the new Lucerne Valley Community Grange and that they should manage the scholarship fund. And the bank manager should be made aware of the non-profit laws as to Grange monies. **Motion made** by Leo Bergeron that Bob McFarland make the bank manager aware of the 501c Non-Profit laws as to the handling of Grange funds. Second by Jon Luvaas. *Motion carried unanimously*.

State Grange HQ Property Parking Spaces – Bringing in \$800.00 per month from parking spaces. They are all rented and there aren't any left.

HQ Water Leak – There is a leak in the tank at the old 2101 Stockton Blvd building. It is being checked out and will be fixed as soon as possible.

Staff Changes – Kalie Benson resigned her position as California State Grange Secretary.

50th Anniversary of National Grange building – Will happen in June. Bob McFarland passed around some pins he had to commerate the event.

Convention Update – Shirley Baker said they want to have a finalized contract with Holiday Inn at \$79.00. They are also going to try to incorporate more fun into the convention. There is talk about bringing in the Orangevale Culinary Institute again.

Ell Camino Grange – In escrow, an appraisal will be done this week. Bob wondered if a copy of it could be had. Larry said the renter was getting a reduction in rent for upgrades to the property by turning in receipts. Yet he didn't see where any receipts had ever been turned in. He thought that the rent reduction should be discontinued as of now. Bob ask if the CSG really wanted to take a note from her. **Moved by** Bob McFarland to give the Morgan's 45 days to close escrow or she needs to vacate the property. Seconded by Jon Luvaas. *Motion carried unanimously*.

Fowler- Bob McFarland has received certified copies of the SI 1 00's and on closing the funds will be deposited into the CSG asset management accounts.

Office Phones – VOiP phone service is not good as no one can hear when they call into the CSG offices. The plan is to go to hard line phone service when the 01 contract ends in October. However, the T1 line is still needed in the office so a plan would have to be in place to keep that. The contract between now and October would cost \$1200 so there was some discussion about stopping the contract and putting in the hard line phones now. **Moved by** Jon Luvaas that we still need T1 line but we should discontinue the 01 contract when it is up in Oct, 2010. Seconded by Leo Bergeron. Amendment by Jon Luvaas that CSG stop paying the contract as of now and put in the hard line phone service. *Motion carried unanimously*.

Crescent. Redwood – Mike Byers hasn't been able to travel much due to several surgeries and dealing with medical issues. Bob said he didn't think that CSG had gotten any money from them yet. It was thought that one had been received from them. It was the consensus of the EC that the collecting of the rent from Crescent Redwood should be taken out of the hands of Lake Earl and sent directly to CSG. Mike said he would work with Betty Ann Biringer-Rehm about some of the stuff up there that he hasn't been able to do.

Grange Hall Loans -

Corralitos Grange, – They received a short term \$25,000 unsecured loan from a Grange member to pave their parking lot. Now they would like to borrow that amount from the CSG to pay the member back. Bob stated there is \$56,000 in the loan fund and one of the Granges needs \$50,000 to stay open. Inger said that there is other funding in restricted funds available to loan for both requests. **Motion made** by Larry Kroger to take \$25,000 from the restricted funds to invest in the loan to Corralitos Grange loan. Seconded by Shirley Baker. *Motion carried unanimously*.

Rubidoux Grange Has an opportunity to purchase an approximately 30x40 foot metal building for \$8000 and place it on the property of one of the grange members. This building could then be used for Grange meetings, storage etc. Rubidoux Grange is asking for \$25,000 to be advanced against the interest in their Asset Account. This Asset Account has approximately \$487,000 in it and earns around \$12,000 per year in interest. The \$25,000 would cover the costs for grading the building site, water and sewer lines, plumbing and electricity and any other expenses needed to get the building set up and also the cost of the building. **Motion made** by Bob McFarland to decline the request of Rubidoux Grange to buy the building and put it on private property. Seconded by Shirley Baker. Discussion. **Motion made** by Leo Bergeron for previous question. *Motion approved unanimously. Original Motion made by Bob McFarland approved*.

Open Forum

Lois Trumbull thanked the Executive Committee for coming up and meeting here. Fern Miller-ask about the AIL Grange Insurance. Her question was about whether or not you have to have them come into your home? And whether or not you have to buy more insurance to get the basic insurance that is offered as a Grange member? Bob answered. No you don't have to let them into your home. You are automatically covered for \$3,000 by the State Grange and \$2,000 by the National Grange benefit. You don't have to buy more coverage unless you want to. As a member in good standing you are covered. A suggestion was made to put an article in the Grange News about the AIL insurance and members and their benefits and the agents that sell the insurance. **Motion made** by Bob McFarland to put an article in the Grange News about the AIL Insurance for Grange members, their benefits and the agents that sell the insurance. Seconded by Larry Kroger. *Motion approved unanimously*.

Fern Miller then asked about the CSG sponsoring initiatives on the State ballot? Leo Bergeron said that if you started in your own local Grange with a resolution about something that you wanted to see changed. One Grange didn't like the trucks going through their neighborhood throwing rocks all over the place. So they got a resolution going, got signatures, sent it to the CSG Convention for passage there, then after that it went to the State Legislature and got voted onto the ballot for passage as a law in the State of California that all trucks had to have mud flaps. Eventually, all the states adopted the same law and so now every truck has to have mud flaps, and it all started with one small CA Grange.

What is Commercial Hemp? Bob said that it was actually Industrial Hemp, and products made from Industrial Hemp are sold all over California, even Hemp Milk at the Co-op. There are a lot of clothing products made from Hemp also sold locally. Hemp cannot be legally grown in the United States.

Ann Anderson asked Adopted policies regarding Farmers Markets and small farmers support. Jon Luvaas mentioned policies proposed from Chico that were passed last year. Bob told about what many Granges are calling the "Grange Renaissance movement" going on this year. For example, what is going on in Mendocino County. The CSG is supporting GMO labeling later this year, and "Healthy Communities"; local farmers, small business, and even the arts, outreach support for battered women, and disaster preparedness.

Humboldt County Alliance of Family Farmers, Bob mentioned "canning". It is food preservation and food safety-an old tradition; making quilts, another old tradition. The basic premise of Grange is Family Farming, and we differ from Farm Bureau Leo said, as it deals with the larger farms and ranches, and was a spin-off at one time from the Grange, but we didn't have the huge corporate farms back when Grange began. As we have gone along, Farm Bureau, Cattlemen's Association, Wine Grower's Association have taken the spotlight, and tended to forget the family farmer. The Grange has evolved into more of a family association, and small self-employed family businesses that includes Agriculture.

Bob Betschart-Asked about the number needed for a quorum. GWA only needs 3 whereas the Grange requires 7 for a quorum. He wondered if there was anyway it could be changed to a lesser number. The policy is set by

the National Grange. Bob answered that each grange can actually use their own judgment since CSG realizes that sometimes there just aren't enough people present to fill all the officer chairs at a meeting.

Budget Discussion - We are still in the black, but just by a little. Shirley Baker said that they take the Budget very seriously. At the last meeting it was noticed that one of the line items was out of order from what it should be. They focused on several GIA service agreement line items.

Bank Fees - Amount changed to actual cost. Will talk to Wells Fargo about adjusting the fees, see if they will remove them, or maybe the CSG with change banks.

Deputy Cell Phone- Internet Services - The amount will have to be increased

Ambassadors – The amount is currently at \$24,000. Bob said he thought it could be reduced to \$12,000 (for the remainder of the year).

Grange News – Dept 650 up postage & printing costs, cut advertising income. They have gone through and eliminated a lot of the double addresses which has reduced the mailing costs but more needs to be done in that regards. Bob suggested getting away from Access and going to SQL as it is much more efficient.

Parking spaces – Have contracts for all the spaces which bring in a total of \$5,400 per year.

Utilities – Bills come in and are collected, then are emailed to UCMed. Finally a payment comes in but not in a timely manner. When the contract comes due we need to know how much the utilities are so we can renegotiate a good contract. Bob said he would like to see the upstairs tenant take over the whole building at a somewhat lesser rent. That way they would be paying the whole utility bill.

Rent – A predicted 30% decrease was changed to a 10% decrease. It will be left at \$73,000.

Motion made by Shirley Baker to accept the revisions to the Budget as noted above. Motion seconded by Leo Bergeron. Motion approved unanimously.

Balance sheet – Income Statement Page 1 May 14 Receivable on Delhi Grange which was sold. Asset Management on Fowler

Motion made by Jon Luvaas that staff immediately provide first level admin passwords to the Master to be shared with the Chairman of the Executive Committee. Motion seconded by Shirley Baker. *Motion carried*, with Bob abstaining.

Bob then requested that Amy provide information to the EC about the questions they had on the Balance Sheet & Income Statement.

Jon had a question on West Visalia Grange, about whether or not it is an AR or Asset Account.

Motion made by Leo Bergeron to look at the title of West Visalia Grange and see to it that the title is transferred to the CSG. Motion was seconded by Jon Luvaas. *Motion carried unanimously*.

Lucerne Valley Community Grange – will get title to their building and will begin receiving income from the rental of the building.

Crescent Redwood/Lake Earl – Note receivable/Account Receivable. We pay the bills and utilities and they have been getting the rent money from the renters. From now on that should change and CSG will start getting the rent money.

This is a significant day for Non-Profits as it is the day that they have to have their 990 filings in for 2009.

GBO Building-Bob spoke about the conversion of the GBO Building into a Performing Arts Center. He has spoken to Sacramento City College and they are going to need a performance art space while theirs is being redone and are very enthusiastic about helping to upgrade the building. And he has even gotten a letter of support from Sac City College for the project. Bob got an estimate from one contractor for \$75,000 which he thinks is way too high. Bob is thinking more like \$50,000 to redo the building. Bob has ball parked a spreadsheet that indicates a pay-off for the project in 5 to7 years, not including utilities. Leo ask where the funding was going to come from for the project. Larry and Bob both said that the money could come from the Asset Accounts. **Motion made** by Leo Bergeron that up to \$75,000 be used to proceed with the renovation of the GBO Building to tum it into a Performing Art Center. Motion seconded by Bob McFarland. *Motion carried unanimously*.

New Business

Jon Luvaas has a request from Chico Grange for a loan to get their grange in compliance with building codes so they can continue to operate. They have had their well (1903) tested and it is contaminated with Nitrates and cannot be used and needs to be replaced. There is an estimate of \$15,000 to dig a new well, and close up the old one by filling it with concrete. There is the possibility of getting a bid from another company to do this for \$12,000. Also the range hood over the stove is out of compliance with State Fire Code and needs to be replaced. The estimate for this is \$5,000 and includes the needed fire suppression system. They also need a handicap ramp out of the main auditorium to be ADA compliant. The estimate for that is \$3,000. The bathrooms are also not handicap accessible so they both need to be redone. An estimate has been received for \$16,000 and one of the members will do the work. Another \$1,500 is needed to replace the ceiling tiles in the dining room as they have not been replaced for many years. All together the amount needed is approximately \$50,000 to get the Grange up and running again.

Motion made by Bob McFarland that CSG make a loan of \$50,000 to Chico Grange to the needed repairs to bring their building back up to code. Motion seconded by Shirley Baker. *Motion carried* by a unanimous vote.

Betty Biringer-Rehm had a question at this time. She said that Dows Prairie Grande was having a property dispute with one the neighbors about a right of way. She wanted to know if there was anything the CSG could do to help them. Bob McFarland said that the CSG did not have an attorney on retainer. It would be better to contact a local lawyer or someone in the area to help them.

Executive Committee Moved Into Closed Session at 4:19PM

Meeting adjourned at 5:14 PM

Kings River, Riverdale Grange meeting in restaurants. Want to consolidate. Think about helping them get property and encourage classes in schools.

Budget Committee - .Have asked Cheri Bunker to be Chair.

Healdsberg – Hired an attorney to assist with county paperwork. . We need a Grant Writer. Lots of activity in this area. . Need to talk about Granges that have asset accounts but no Grange halls. Often using money wrongly. . Non Profit Mailing Status - We are now a tax exempt organization and can mail our newsletter out cheaper. . Looking for Chairs of numerous committees.

FINANCIAL REPORT: Amy Self reported that with the help of Inger Bevans, a lot of corrections have been completed and the Balance Sheet now reflects those changes. She explained many of the changes and answered numerous questions from the EC. There is still a lot of work to be done. (Frank and Marian Nichols left the meeting at this time.)

(Step 3) If step 1 and Step 2 fail to produce then she is given a 30 day notice to vacate, followed by legal proceedings for unlawful detainer, if necessary. 2nd by Leo Bergeron. *Motion carried*. (Bob McFarland abstained.)

Lake Earl - Still needs follow-up consultations.

Crescent Redwood - Needs to be shut down. Leo to check this out further.

West Visalia – Status of title being researched. Fowler - Needs amendment to articles by new Grange using hall.

Fowler claim. Escheat Office needs a copy of last tax return. Do a 990N and submit.

Passwords have been obtained by Bob.

Reminders: Grange Stock, National Master coming, Convention.

3. Vista Grange can proceed in its efforts to sell its real property (Grange Hall) consistent with Grange law; with the approval of the CSG Executive Committee; to be sold at fair market value for the highest possible price (the hall has not been sold, to date).

4. Proceeds from the sale after costs will be distributed through escrow: 20% going to the CSG and 80% disbursed for purposes approved by the CSG Executive Committee to include scholarships for fields related to agriculture, and books and educational materials for children in the Vista community.

5. General releases on both sides.

6. Dismissal of action by the CSG.

Motion carried. All in favor, 0 opposed.

Convention

Inger Bevans passed out a policy manual two meetings ago that re-affirmed the CSG convention policy regarding reimbursement policy for officer, delegates and deputies. She will put together a rough draft to make official at the meeting following convention.

long as there is a building to protect. A top coat will need to be sprayed on about every 20 years as needed at about a forth of the cost of a new roof. This means that we can spend the difference in our reserve on improvements instead of an expense that is lost every 20 years. We are already seeing a significant energy savings due to the increased insulation and the reflective nature of our new roof.

The following resolutions were passed at the 2010 Session:

AGRICULTURE

10-028

Title: Methyl Iodide

Proposed By: Santa Cruz/Live Oak Grange #503

Whereas: The original Grange mission statement support sustainable farming; and

Whereas: The California Department of Pesticide Regulation (DPR) is proposing to permit the use of methyl iodide, a recognized carcinogen, to replace methyl bromide for soil fumigation; and

Whereas: Fifty-four scientists, including five Nobel Laureates in chemistry, have opposed the use of methyl iodide in a letter to the EPA; and

Whereas: The Scientific Review Committee of the DPR reported that methyl iodide is highly toxic, with potential to cause cancer, harm fetuses, damage DNA, and contaminate groundwater; and

Whereas: Farmworkers, children in schools near farms, and nearby residents would be adversely affected by the use of methyl iodide; and

Whereas: There are alternatives to methyl iodide, as demonstrated by 127 certified organic strawberry growers in California who do not use methyl bromide; therefore be it

Resolved: That the CSG lobby against the use of methyl iodide and communicate that opposition to the California Department of Pesticide Regulation and advocate the use of safer alternatives for the control of soil borne diseases.

Title: USDA Reclassify The Light Brown Apple Moth And End Government Quarantines Of California Farmers

Proposed By: Sonoma Valley Grange #407

Whereas: The California Department of Food and Agriculture's (CDFA) and the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) current quarantine policy for the Light Brown Apple Moth (LBAM) unfairly benefits foreign farmers shipping harvested crops into the United States over the interests of California farmers. Currently, California farmers would be quarantined if the apple moth is found in their orchards or farms. New Zealand does not quarantine produce grown on farms where the apple moth is present. Instead, inspection for the apple moth happens at the point of export from New Zealand into the United States. Thus apples grown in a New Zealand orchard where the apple moth may be found, once through inspection, could end up in American grocery stores.

As an example of this trade policy inequity, if one of our local Gravenstein farmers in Sebastopol, Sonoma County were found to have an apple moth in his orchard, the CDFA would not allow him to sell apples to his local grocery store. This farmer could walk into that same store and buy imported apples which came from a farm in New Zealand that was riddled with the light brown apple moth while his crop sits only a few miles away, restricted from sale domestically based upon the exact same conditions. This is an unfair policy built on faulty scientific assumptions that benefits foreign growers over domestic ones; and

Whereas: Numerous independent scientific experts, including a review by the National Academy of Sciences challenge the need for the present regulations, the eradication program and the likelihood that eradication will succeed. A large number of California farmers (over 100 statewide) have signed a letter requesting reclassification (which was entered as evidence/testimony at the CFDA Committee hearings) and many more California business owners have also expressed support for California farmers; and

Whereas: It has been government (CDFA and USDA) quarantines, not crop damage due to LBAM, that have caused significant financial and management burdens to California farms and nurseries, including driving some out of business. Reclassifying LBAM to more accurately reflect its status as an insect of minor concern and harmonizing trade agreements related to LBAM are more reasonable long-term solutions for California farmers; therefore be it

Resolved: That since the LBAM (Light Brown Apple Moth) program is being conducted throughout our state, we ask that this resolution be sent to California Secretary of Agriculture requesting reclassification for LBAM as a non-actionable pest; and be it further

Resolved: That the CA State Grange ask all our elected representatives to work diligently and forcefully to sever the taxpayer funding for the Light Brown Apple Moth eradication program.

Title: Encouraging A New Generation Of Family Farmers

Proposed By: Little Lake #670

Whereas: The average age of American farmers is 55 and rising; and

Whereas: It is important to begin now to train the next generation of farmers, and many young people interested in farming do not have family members who can provide the experience necessary; and *Whereas*: Many young people interested in farming have found volunteering or interning on small, family farms an ideal way to try out their interest while learning important skills; and

Whereas: Farmers who take on volunteers and interns not only benefit from the work of these individuals but contribute in untold ways to their education; and

Whereas: The State of California has recently begun a campaign of enforcement of state labor laws aimed at forcing farmers hosting volunteers and interns to comply in all particulars with those laws, imposing insupportable burdens on farmers who wish to host volunteers and interns and imposing thousands of dollars in fines on farms that are struggling for survival; therefore, be it

Resolved: That the California State Grange call upon the California Division of Labor Standards

Enforcement to cease investigation and prosecution of farmers hosting volunteers and interns unless pursuant to a complaint; and be it further

Resolved: That the California State Grange petition the State Assembly to begin hearings to review California Labor Law in the light of recent legislation in Oregon and Washington aimed at accommodating the practice of volunteering and interning on small farms; and be it further

Resolved: That the California State Grange support a specific exclusion from existing law for farms grossing under \$100,000 annually who wish to host volunteers and/or interns.

Title: Use Of Antibiotics In Healthy Food Animals

Proposed By: Sacramento Community Grange #843

Whereas: In 1977 the California Grange adopted a Resolution favoring the use of tetracycline and penicillin and other antibiotics in the feed of livestock raised for human consumption; and *Whereas*: Now, antibiotics that kill microorganisms like bacteria are routinely given to healthy

livestock to make them grow faster and to compensate for crowded and unsanitary

conditions on industrial food animal farms; and

Whereas: The unnecessary use of antibiotics on livestock raised for human consumption creates an environment in which bacteria can develop antibiotic resistance; and

Whereas: current day research indicates that animal resistance to antibiotics is passed to human beings who consume them and this reduces the effectiveness of antibiotics to treat human illnesses; therefore be it

Resolved: That the CSG opposes the routine feeding or injection of antibiotics in healthy animals raised for human consumption.

10-003R - National

Title: Control Of Genetic Use Resriction Technology

Propsosed By: Mc Cloud Grange #831

Whereas: US Patent #5723765 jointly held by the USDA and Monsanto, Inc. describes bio-technology that when deployed detrimentally impedes the biological competence of seed-bearing plants in both the reproductive and vegetative stages of growth.

Whereas: The GURT-modified genes may uncontrollably spread to non-target crop and native plants to the economic detriment of farmers and the degradation of the broader natural eco-system. Therefore be it *Resolved*: The California State Grange (CSG) and The National Grange (NG) actively promote legislation to ban the field testing and commercialization of GURT (Genetic Use Restriction Technology) in the United States, as described in US Patent #5723765, and be it further

Resolved: The CSG and NG actively partner with other national and international organizations to permanently ban the GURT on a global basis.

Whereas: The FDA has indicated that it will approve the production of genetically engineered salmon fish for human consumption; and

Whereas: The FDA's Environmental Assessment of the safety of genetically engineered salmon fish does not include adequate independent consideration of the potential for the escape of the genetically engineered salmon into the wild; and

Whereas: The FDA has indicated that they will not require labeling identifying salmon or salmon products that have been genetically engineered; therefore be it

Resolved: That the CSG and National Grange oppose FDA approval of genetically engineered salmon for human consumption and that adequate assessment has proven the GMO Salmon is safe for human consumption; and be it further

Resolved: That the CSG and National Grange advocate for clear product labeling of all genetically modified salmon and salmon products, and be it further

Resolved: That the CSG and National Grange oppose FDA approval of genetically engineered salmon unless an adequate Environmental Assessment has been conducted that shows there is no possibility of GES escaping into the wild.

Whereas: The notion of corporations being "persons" and having "rights" has been wrongly foisted upon the people by judges, not by legislation, and now (with Citizens_United v FEC) by the Supreme Court; and

Whereas: The Supreme Court has argued that contributions of money to political campaigns and in support of specific public policies amounts to "speech," permitting corporations to spend unlimited amounts of money in their efforts to promote their own interests; and

Whereas: A government of the people, by the people and for the people cannot compete or coexist with a government of, by and for immortal corporations with millions of dollars at their disposal for influencing public opinion and political office holders; and

Whereas: "Rights" pertain and belong only to natural-born human beings; therefore, be it *Resolved:* That the California State Grange declare that corporations are not persons, people or human beings, and therefore should not enjoy the protections of the Bill of Rights; and be it further

Resolved: That the California State Grange and National Grange lobby strongly for an amendment to the U.S. Constitution that would declare corporations as non-persons and therefore do not enjoy the rights of a natural-born citizen.
