- 1. I currently serve as Master of the California State Grange, a position that I have held since 2014. The California State Grange was created in 1873 as a subordinate, constituent part of the National Grange of the Order of Patrons of Husbandry, a hierarchical fraternal organization that is made up of multiple levels, or "divisions," including the California State Grange. For purposes of this Declaration, I shall use the term "National Grange" to refer to the highest level of the Order of Patrons of Husbandry, and I shall use the terms "The Grange" or "the Order" to refer to the Order of Patrons of Husbandry as a whole, from the National Grange down to the lowest levels of its hierarchy.
- 2. I have been a member of the Order of Patrons of Husbandry since 2003, when I joined the Rainbow Valley Grange, a Subordinate Grange in California. I have held various offices in the Rainbow Valley Grange, including Master, Youth Director, and member of the Executive Committee. I am also a member of the San Diego Pomona Grange, and serve on its Executive Committee. From 2006 until 2009, I held the position of Youth Activities Director in the California State Grange, and from 2006 until 2012, I was the representative of the California State Grange on the Rules and Ethics Committee of the California Department of Food and Agriculture. I also served as a deputy of the National Grange in California from 2013 until my election as Master of the California State Grange in 2014. Through serving in these roles, I have developed knowledge of the rules of the National Grange and California State Grange, as well as of the relationship between the California State Grange and the other Granges of the Order, including the National Grange. I also have developed knowledge of and familiarity with the documents that the California state Grange creates in the normal course of business, including its Constitution and By-Laws and the Journals of Proceedings of the annual meetings of the California State Grange's delegate body. All statements made in this Declaration are based on my personal knowledge or my review of documents produced in the regular course of business by the California State Grange, or otherwise identified herein. If called, I could and would testify competently as to all facts stated herein.
 - 3. The California State Grange was formed in 1873 upon receipt of a Charter from the

National Grange. Attached to the concurrently-filed Appendix of Exhibits as Exhibit A is a true and correct copy of an excerpt from The Patrons of Husbandry on the Pacific Coast by Ezra S. Carr, published in 1875, detailing the founding of the California State Grange and setting forth its first Constitution and By-Laws. This book contains an account of the organization, first meeting, and adoption of the original Constitution and By-Laws of the California State Grange, and is generally acted upon as true by members of the California State Grange and the Order.

- 4. The foundational document of any Grange, including the California State Grange, is its Charter, which may only be issued by the National Grange. The California State Grange's Charter provides "[t]hat the officers and Members of the State Grange hereby constituted, and their successors, shall at all times comply with the Constitution of the National grange and with the By-Laws of the State Grange, which must be in harmony with, and conformity to, all National Grange laws and rulings."
- 5. The Constitution, By-Laws, and other laws and rulings of the National Grange are collected in its Digest of Laws. The Digest of Laws is the supreme law of the Order and thus supersedes any rule adopted by any other Grange, including the California State Grange.
- 6. The California State Grange's Constitution and By-Laws adopted in 1873, and amended over time, are binding on all Community Granges and individual members in the California State Grange. However, these rules only supplement, and may not conflict in any way with, the National Grange's rules.
- 7. Attached to the concurrently-filed Appendix of Exhibits as **Exhibit B** is a true and correct copy of the 2009 version of the California State Grange's Constitution and By-Laws.
- 8. Attached to the concurrently-filed Appendix of Exhibits as Exhibit C is a true and correct copy of the 2011 version of the California State Grange's Constitution and By-Laws.
- 9. Since I first joined The Grange in 2003, it has been commonly understood that all Granges and their members are subject to and bound by all of the rules set forth in the National Grange's Digest of Laws. Indeed, until at least late 2012, after the dispute underlying the abovecaptioned matter arose, on the "Members Only Information" page of the California State Grange's website, under the heading "Bylaws," the National Grange's Digest of Laws was the first set of

rules identified, even ahead of the California State Grange's rules. Attached to the concurrently-filed Appendix of Exhibits as **Exhibit D** is a true and correct copy of a screenshot of the California State Grange's "Members Only Information" page taken on September 14, 2012, and sent to the then-Master and then-members of the Executive Committee of the California State Grange, including Robert McFarland, Jon Luvaas, and Damian Parr.

- 10. In order to become a member of a Grange, an individual must submit an application for membership. All application forms used to apply to become a member of a Grange in California before 2012 included a promise of faithful compliance with or acknowledgment that the applicant agrees to be bound by the rules of the National Grange. Attached to the concurrently-filed Appendix of Exhibits as **Exhibit E** are a true and copies of several membership application forms used in California before 2012.
- 11. In order to hold office in the California State Grange, an individual must be installed in office. Prior to being installed, the candidate must promise to comply with the rules of the National Grange at all times. This is done during the installation ceremony, when the candidate swears an "obligation" (*i.e.*, an oath) to support and comply with the National Grange's rules. I have participated in several installation ceremonies, and witnessed several others, and the obligation to comply with the National Grange's rules was taken by each candidate, including me.
- 12. An individual may hold office in the California State Grange only so long as he or she is a member of and in good standing with the California State Grange and the Order of Patrons of Husbandry. An individual who is not a member of the Order, or who is not in good standing, may not hold office in the California State Grange. While in office, all officers of the California State Grange must "ensure that the Constitution and By-Laws of the Grange at all levels," including the National Grange, "are observed and obeyed."
- 13. There is not and there has never been any provision in the rules of the California State Grange for the unilateral disaffiliation of the California State Grange or any other Grange in California from the Order of Patrons of Husbandry.
- 14. The California State Grange has sent representatives to the annual meetings of the National Grange since it was formed in 1873. I am not aware of any annual meeting of the

National Grange before 2012 to which the California State Grange did not send representatives.

- 15. At various points after receiving its charter on July 5, 1873, the California State Grange acquired real and personal property. Details about such property are contained in the Journals of Proceedings and other records currently in the possession or control of the Defendants in this lawsuit.
- 16. In 1946, the California State Grange wished to acquire a new headquarters building. In order to hold title to the property in its own name, the California State Grange passed a motion to incorporate itself, "provided by-laws can be written that confirm to the by-laws of the California State Grange" in effect at that time. Attached to the concurrently-filed Appendix of Exhibits as Exhibit F is a true and correct copy of an excerpt from the 1946 Journal of Proceedings of the California State Grange.
- 17. In September 2014, I requested copies of the articles of incorporation of the California State Grange's corporation formed in 1946 (C#0210454) from the California Secretary of State. Attached to the concurrently-filed Appendix of Exhibits as **Exhibit G** is a true and correct copy of the articles of incorporation provided to me by the Secretary of State.
- 18. In 1946, the rules of the California State Grange required that its officers must agree as a condition of their installation in office to comply with the rules of the National grange, and that all officers must be members in good standing of The Grange. That requirement was in place at all times through at least September 2013, even assuming that the supposed amendments to the California State Grange's By-Laws during the unauthorized annual meeting in October 2013 had any effect.
- 19. In 1965, the California State Grange acquired property on which its current headquarters in Sacramento is located. Attached to the concurrently-filed Appendix of Exhibits as Exhibit H is a true and correct copy of the deed whereby the California State Grange acquired title to that property. Its headquarters building was dedicated in 1966 pursuant to the National Grange's dedication ceremony for Grange halls, during which it was dedicated "to the use and purposes of the Order of Patrons of Husbandry." Attached to the concurrently-filed Appendix of Exhibits as Exhibit I are true and correct copies of excerpts from the 1966 Journal of Proceedings of the

California State Grange.

- Attached to the concurrently-filed Appendix of Exhibits as **Exhibit J** is a true and 20. correct copy of the 1986 version of the California State Grange's Constitution and By-Laws.
- 21. Attached to the concurrently-filed Appendix of Exhibits as **Exhibit K** is a true and correct copy of excerpts from the 1987 Journal of Proceedings of the California State Grange.
- 22. Attached to the concurrently-filed Appendix of Exhibits as **Exhibit L** is a true and correct copy of the 1988 version of the California State Grange's Constitution and By-Laws.
- 23. Attached to the concurrently-filed Appendix of Exhibits as Exhibit M are true and correct copies of excerpts from the 2008 Journal of Proceedings of the California State Grange.
- 24. Attached to the concurrently-filed Appendix of Exhibits as **Exhibit N** are true and correct copies of excerpts from the 2009 Journal of Proceedings of the California State Grange.
- 25. Attached to the concurrently-filed Appendix of Exhibits as **Exhibit O** are true and correct copies of excerpts from the 2011 Journal of Proceedings of the California State Grange.
- 26. In September 2014, I requested copies of the articles of incorporation of the California Grange Foundation from the California Secretary of State. Attached to the concurrentlyfiled Appendix of Exhibits as **Exhibit P** is a true and correct copy of the documents provided to me by the Secretary of State.
- 27. Attached to the concurrently-filed Appendix of Exhibits as **Exhibit Q** is a true and correct copy of the California Grange Foundation's financial statements dated December 31, 2011.
- 28. Following the revocation of the California State Grange's Charter on April 5, 2013, there was no active State Grange in California. Many Subordinate Granges in California were in compliance with the National Grange's rules and wished to remain a part of The Grange. I was appointed to be a deputy of the National Grange to assist in the efforts of those Subordinate Granges to reorganize the California State Grange. Those Subordinate Granges took the necessary steps to reorganize the California State Grange pursuant to the Digest of Laws.
- 29. On July 7, 2014, the National Grange restored the California State Grange's Charter. At that time, the California State Grange once again became an active State Grange. Attached to the concurrently-filed Appendix of Exhibits as **Exhibit R** is a true and correct copy of

the Charter of the California State Grange.

- At a meeting of the reorganized California State Grange on July 12, 2014, I was 30. installed into the office of Master of the California State Grange by the Master of the National Grange, Ed Luttrell. The other duly elected officers of the California State Grange also were installed into their offices by the National Master on that day. I am a member in good standing in The Grange, as are the other officers of the California state Grange installed in July 2014.
- Robert McFarland and his followers refused to relinquish control of the California 31. State Grange's corporate entities and properties after the revocation of the Charter on April 5, 2013, and remain in control and have refused to return those entities and properties to the California State Grange.
- Following its reorganization, the California State Grange needed a corporate entity 32. to hold its property and accounts and conduct its business. However, the former officers of the California State Grange - the Defendants in this lawsuit - had refused and still refuse to relinquish control of the California State Grange's corporate entities. Accordingly, in 2014, a California nonprofit corporation called "The Grange of the State of California's Order of patrons of Husbandry, Chartered" was incorporated to hold an administer the property of the California State Grange until control of the nonprofit corporations called "California State Grange" and "California Grange Foundation" is recovered from Defendants.

I declare under the penalty of perjury under the laws of the State of California that the foregoing is true and correct and that this declaration was executed on February ______, 2015 in Fallbrook, California.
